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MINUTES.

Tuscaloosa. Ala., July 18, 1889.

Wednesday at 10 o'clock a. m., the Alabama State Baptist Convention met in its Twenty first Annual Session with the African Baptist Church, Tuscaloosa, Ala.

The President, Rev. W. R. Pettiford, called the Convention to order and said. "Dear brethren, it is a strong testimony of God's blessing upon us that we are permitted to meet again. And we should be thankful to Him for His kindness. Let us act while here as messengers of God."

Rev. C. S. Dinkins, of Marion, conducted the devotional exercises. The hymn "O for a Closer Walk with God," was sung by the Convention. Rev. D. Dinkins read the Eigth Chapter of Romans. and Rev. Wm. Maderson, of Greensboro, led in prayer. The Convention then sung: "So Let Our Lives and Lips Express The Holy Gospel We Profess.

The time having arrived for the annual sermon to be preached, Rev. M. Tyler, of Lowndesboro, ascended the pulpit and addressed the Throne of Grace, singing: Pass Me not O Gentle Savior.

Brother Tyler took for his text Exodus 14:15. And the Lord Said Unto Moses, "Speak Unto the Children of Israel, that They go Forward." Then he preached a very interesting sermon, and one that was especially appropriate to the present status of the Baptist of Alabama.

Rev. P. Murrell, of Tuscaloosa, then worded the hymn, "Jesus, I My Cross have Taken," "which was sung by the Convention. Prayer by Rev. Murrell.

On motion of Rev. M. Tyler, Brethren J. M. Foster, W. R. Dawson, Frank S. Moody and Black Wilder. Messengers from White Baptist State Convention, of Ala., were introduce to the Convention, and spoke very encouraging words relative to the warm feeling which their Convention has for ours. The remarks were responded to by the President, Rev's. Booth, McAlphine, Purce, Murrell and McEwen.

At this point Rev's Smiles, pastor of the A. M. E. Zion Church, Hamilton, of C. M. E. Church, Taylor, of the Presbyterian Church, and Spates, of M. E. Church, were introduced to the Convention, and made remarks encouraging the work of the Convention.

The Convention then adjourned to meet again at four o'clock p, m.

FIRST DAY .-- AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention re-assembled at four p. m. with President W. R. Pettiford in the chair.

After singing, "Jesus lover of my soul," Rev. J. W. White, of Canden, led in prayer. Then sang, "Nearer my God to thee."

The enrolling clerks then proceeded to read the names of the names of the Associations, Churches, Sunday Schools, etc., which were enrolled, and correctious were made when necessary.

Rev. L. P. Foster moved that the name of Rev. D. Boyd be taken from the roll of delegates, and on motion of Rev. C. O. Booth that motion was tabled until a more appropriate time.

The Convention at this point proceeded to permanent organi

zation, Rev. A. N. McEwen presiding.

On motion of Rev. C. O. Booth, all the old officers were unautously re-elected by acclamation, which resulted as follows:

The President elect was escorted to the chair by Bro. C. W. Childs, after which all the officers made remarks, thanking the Convention for the honors conferred upon them in electing them to the several offices.

On motion of Bro. J. C. Blevins, the programme prepared by the State Mission Board was adopted.

On motion of Rev. W. H. McAlpine, Rev. C. O. Booth was appointed to preach to night.

The Committee on Preaching reported that there will be preach-

The Convention then adjourned to meet to night at eight o'clock. Benediction by Rev C L Purce.

FIRST DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment at eight o'clock p. m.

The house was called to order by the President, Rev W R Pct-tiford, who announced that, according to the order of the day, the

Rev C S Dinkins of Marion worded the hymn, "Oh, for a thousand tongues to sing," which was sung by the convention; after which Rev T W Walker addressed the throne of grace. Bro Booth then read the second chapter of Daniel. Sang, "Jesus, I my cross have taken," and Bro Dinklin led in prayer.

"Rock of ages cleft for me" was sung by the choir. Bro Booth took as a text 1st John, 5:4. Theme—The durabilities and victories of godliness. He preached a very interesting sermon, and one that was enjoyed by the audience. After the sermon the choir sang "My faith looks up to thee."

The pastor of the church, Rev J M Mason, was invited forward and gave the welcome address on behalf of the church; after which Rev A N McEwen of Montgomery responded.

A collection of \$9.96 was raised. The Convention then adjourned with benediction by Rev S Jones.

SECOND DAY-Morning Sussion.

TUBCALOOSA, ALA., July 19th, 1888.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock with President Pettiford in the chair.

The minutes of the previous day were read and adopted. On motion of Rev L J Green, Rev G C Casby was put on the

Committee on Grievance instead of Rev C S Dinkins.

The report of the Board of Trustees was called for, but the

Board not being ready to report, on motion of Rev J W White, the Convention was resolved into a committee of the whole to discuss the question: "Should a church which has drawn out from the Association of which it was a member be received into the Convention! Rev C O Booth spoke first: "No church is enslaved to an Association." Rev. J T Prince: "I think the Convention will do well to instruct such churches that they cannot draw out from their associations and be received into the Convention."

Rev R Z Deyampert spoke on the subject. Rev P Murrell. The spirit of this Convention is that, if you are not right at home you cannot come here. "Rev A N McEwen: "A church is not compelled to unite with an association, but it is better that the churches work in the general work through the associations.

The b and being ready to report, the discussion closed, and Rev W H McAlpine proceeded to read the report. Then the several recommendations in the report were taken up and considered.

The three of the report bearing upon the theological department of the chool being supported by the ministers giving at least \$10.00 to it support was very warmly discussed by the brethren, after which there was raised by cash and subscriptions (See names of subscribers under Appendix.)

The appointment of a Ministerial Board, recommended in the report was, on motion of Rev () O Booth, referred to the Board of Tru tees, and the good board appointed shall not employ the teacher until one third the money for his salary will have been raised.

On motion of Rev D T Gully, the recommendation of an additional teacher for the literary department of the school was referred to the Board of Trustees, with instructions that, if practicable, they avoid the employment of a teacher.

At this point Rev W J Simmons, D.D., District Secretary of American Baptist Home Mission Society for the South, was introduced to the Convention; also Rev W R Forbs, pastor Eufaula Baptist Church

Pending the adoption of the report of the Board of Trustees, the Convention adjourned. Benediction by Rev C L Purce.

SECUND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION,

The Convention re assembled at four o'clock p m, with President Pettiford in the chair. The hymn, "Am I a older of the Cross," was sung and Rev T W Walker led in prayer.

The Convention sang, "Tis the promise of God full salvation to give."

At this juncture, Sister Anna Brooks, President of the Women's Baptist Convention of Alabama, was introduced to the Convention, and made some reports touching the women's work

in the State. Dr. Simmons also spoke on the same subject. Subscriptions were then opened for the building of a ladies hall, when several subscribers were raised, making the amount by cash and subscriptions \$12.35.

Rev. C O Booth moved that it be the sense of this body that the Board be instructed that any person giving \$25 to the building may be honored with the inscription of his name on the walls of one of the rooms. Carried.

On motion of Rev D T Gully, the person paying the largest amount of money to the huilding, provided it be not less than five hundred dollars, will be honored with having the building named after him.

On motion of Rev W H McAlpine, the person giving one hundred dollars to the building shall have his name inscribed in the chapel of the building.

On motion of Bro C M Wells, the person giving five dollars to the building shall have his name put on the roll of honor.

On motion of Bro W H McAlpine, the Board was instructed to present the subscription list for the building to the various associations that the different churches may subscribe.

Rev W II McAlphine read a resolution (see resolution) satisfying the sale made by the Board of six acres of school ground. On motion the resolution was adopted. The report of the Board of Trustees was then adopted.

The committee on "New Bodies" made their report (see report) which was adopted.

The Convention then adjourned with doxology, and benediction by Rev J M Mason.

SECOND DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 8 o'clock p m and engaged in singing and prayer. By 8:30 there had assembled a large audience to witness an educational muss meeting.

The President announced that the hour had come to begin the meeting. Rev C S Dinkins, of Marion, read a paper on "education as a factor in the religious, financial, social and political elevation of the race."

The paper was well delivered and set forth in a striking manner the things that will elevate the race.

Dr. Simmons discussed the paper and said many good things.

A collection amounting to \$14.05 was raised for the proposed lady's domitory on the Selma University grounds.

Adjournment Benediction by Rev J P Barton, of Talledega.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Friday morning at 9:30 the Convention met pursuant to ad-

journment, Rev C R Rodgers presiding.

The hymn, "A Charge to Keep I have" was sung. Bro Rogers read Twelfth Chapter of Romans, after which Rev S Jones led in prayer.

The minutes of the provious day were read and approved.

The hour for the report of the State Mission Board arrived Rev S L Ross moved that the order of business be suspended for the purpose of hearing a resolution by Bro J C Blevins, Rev A N McEwen moved that the motion be tabled Carried.

The report of the State Mission Board was then read by Rev W

II McAlpine

After the reading of the report it was discussed by several brothren.

Rev CO Booth: "Nothing will make men fit to be drawn upon and to have life like the Gospel of Jesus Christ. There is a great deal of heathenism put for religion."

Rev W H Alpine: "If we don't do something in the line of mission work, the very life will be whipped out of the work. We want the people over the State to feel that we are interested in the salvation of their souls.

Rev A N McEwen moved that the phase of the report bearing upon the appointment of eight missionaries be adopted with the amendment made by Rev C O Booth, namely: That the Board be instructed to employ them as the means for their support is raised.

Pending the adoption Rev A C Jackson snoke: "Some of our people are so reluctant about giving to the set hat our agents are at a loss what first to present them. Let the missionaries be appointed.

Rev J Q A Wilhite gave several examples of the willingness of the people to give when the gospel is made the prominent feature.

Rev R Z Deyampert spoke on the subject, after which the recommendation was adopted.

The part of the report recommending that each member of the several churches be requested to give 10 cents for the mission work was discussed by Brethren Casby, O'Bryan, Childs, Jamison, Washington, Forbs, McEwen, Booth, Barton; after which the recommendation was adopted.

The recommendation to appoint a missionary jointly with American Baptist Home Mission Society was discussed, at which time Dr. Simmons, District Secretary for the Society spoke, presenting the work of the Society. The recommendation was then adopted.

The recommendation to accept the proposal of the American Baptist Publication Society to pay half the salary of a Sunday-school Missionary and his expenses, and the State pay the other half of his salary was adopted.

On motion, the second Sunday in March was decided upon as "Home Mission Society Day," at which time all the churches in the State are requested to take a up a collection for the Alabama Baptist Home Mission Society of New York. Adjourned with benediction by Rev. S. E. Alexander.

THIRD DAY-APTERNOON SESSION.

The convention re-assembled at 4 o'clock P. M., with Vice President, Rev. J. Q. A. Wilhite in the chair. Singing-"Alas! and did my Savior Bleed,"—and then the Rev. H. Scott of Blockton led in prayer.

Singing--"Ninety and Nine."

On motion of Rev. A. N. McEwen, the New Town Sunday School was ordered to be put on the roll of Sunday Schools. The following resolution offered by Bro. J. C. Blevins was adopted:

A paper, Destitute Fields and the Kind of Work we should undertake, was read by Rev. E. A. McCall of Union Springs. The paper was afterward discussed by Rev. C. (). Booth and L. Bryant.

The report (see report C) of the committee on preaching was was read by Rev. J. M. Mason and on motion was adopted.

The report of the committee on temperance was made and

discused.

Rev. C. O. Booth gave an interesting talk, showing the effect

of strong drink on the system.

itev. A. N. McEwen: "It is not easy to break off from a bad habit. Drinking and immorality of the basest sort go hand in hand."

R. T. Pollard: "My churches have quit the use of fermented wine at communion services; but got their wine from New York. This wine is said to be pure. The church is the greatest agency by which intemperance will be broken up."

Bro. C. W. Childs - "People are not apt to live better than

their leader. Therefore leaders should avoid drinking.

Rev. T. W. Walker and Bro. Jno. Green spoke on the subject. Pending the adoption of the report Revs. W. M. Munds, J. A. Baker of Atlanta, S. E. Alexander, R. F. Farley and M. Edwards were introduced to the convention.

The convention then adjourned with benediction by Rev. Jas.

A. Henderson.

THIRD DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

The convention re assembled at 8 P.M. to listen to a sermon

by Rev. W. J. Simmons, D. D. The Doctor was introduced to the Convention, and read the first chapter of Judges. Singing—"O for a Faith that will notshrink,"—after which the Doctor took for his text Judges 1: 6,7; and Matt. 7: 1,2; and preached a very interesting sermon on the retributive justice of God. The speaker demonstrated very clearly the justice God in making men eat the fruit of their doings.

Prayer by Rev. C. L. Roberts.

Rev. J. Q. A. Wilhite moved that a collection be taken up for the Home Mission Society on the amount promised by the State. Carried. Collection for Home Mission Society, \$26.30. The Convention they adjourned with benediction by Dr. W. J. Simmons.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION.

TUSCALOOSA, ALA., JULY 21st, 1888.

The convention met pursuant to adjournment, Rev. L. J. Green of Selma presiding. The devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. James Roberts.

The minutes of yesterday were read and adopted.

At this point, Rev. E. J. Fisher, messenger from the Georgia

Baptist Convention was introduced to the Convention.

The Committee on Time and Place made their report; and after a great deal of discussion, the report was so changed, as to make the time of the meeting of the Convention to remain as it was: namely, on Wednesday, before fourth Sabbath in July, 1889. It was then adopted. (Appendix C.)

Rev. W. H. McAlpine read a statement decided by the Board, namely that Rev. J. Q. A. Wilhite be employed as Financial Agent in connection with his pastoral work at Uniontown. The

subject was discussed with much interest.

Rev. L. J. Green: "We cannot do without a man on the field—one who can give his whole time. Let me predict: if we agree not to put a man in the field, we will take a step backward."

Bro. C. W. Childs: "The Board has done the very best thing, and we should accept it."

Rev. A. W. Wilson: "We need an agent on the field, and must have one."

Rev. W. H. McAlpine: "The Board of Trustees is seeking to economize the expenditures for the work."

Rev. C. Jackson: "If we do not have the eight missionaries, and it seems doubtful, then we ought to have a regular man," The recommendation was then adopted.

The Financial Agents and Treasurer made their reports which

were adopted.

The following report from the finance committee was adopted: (See report E.)

The convention then adjourned. Benediction by the President,

FOURTH DAY--AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 4 o'clock P. M. the convention met, with President Pettiford in the chair. Singing—"Jesus, keep me near the Cross," after which Rev. R. Donald led in prayer. The Convention went into the election of the State Mission Board as follows:

Bro. J. E. Timothy led in prayer in behalf of the widows of the deceased. The report was then adopted.

The report on "Baptist Leader" was made by Rev. C. M. Wells, the business manager. After a great deal of discussion about the paper, it was on motion turned over to Bro. C. M. Wells with the understanding that he assume the present debt over it, and also be responsible for all debts made while in his hands.

On motion of Rev. C. L. Purce the State Mission Board was instructed to elect delegates to the next session of the "Educational Convention organized in Washington last May.

The Convention then adjourned with benediction by Rev. S. S. Sisson, of Selma.

FOURTH DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention was then called to order in the basement of the African Baptist Church, of Tuscaloosa, President Pet iford presiding. Rev. E. E. Perryman led in prayer.

The following brothren were elected members of the Board of Incorporators: Revs. A N McEwen, D T Gully, R T Pollard, L J Green, C L Purse.

Pro. McEwen asked the Convention to allow him to use what means he can to raise the five hundred dollars he subscribed to the ladies hall. The matter was on motion, referred to the Board.

On motion the matter relating to Rev. D. Boyd was taken from the table. After proofs given by Rev. L. P. Foster and others that Brother Boyd was drunk on the train going to the Convention, on motion of Rev. E. E. Perryman Rev. Boyd's name was ordered taken from the roll of delegates, with the amendment, made by Rev. A. N. McEwen, that it be made known to bis church that he is considered excluded from this body of Christian ministers.

On motion, the sexton was allowed one dollar per day. On motion, two thousand minutes were ordered printed. On motion, the Secretary was allowed \$16.00 for services.

On motion, \$60.00 were allowed for printing minutes and postage.

The Secretary read a letter of fraternal greeting from the Georgia Baptist Convention, and on motion was ordered published in the LEADER, and Rev A N McEwin responded to it.

On motion of Rev M Tyler, the following brethren were appointed messengers to the Nashville meetings in September next: Reve W R Pettiford, J Q A Wilhite. J M Masou, W H McAlpine, M Tyler, A N McEwen, R T Pollard. D T Gully, W M Munds, W R Forbs, C L Purce, C S Dinkins, L J Green, C O Booth.

On motion, Rev W H McAlpine and President Pettiford were appointed messengers to the Georgia Baptist State Convention,

and Revs J Q A Wilhite and A N McEwen to the State Convention of Tennessee.

Thus ends one of the most interesting and prosperous sessions ever held in the State by this body.

The Convention then adjourned to meet with St Philip St Baptist Church, Selma, Ala., on Wednesday before the fourth Sabbath in July, 1889.

WHEREAS, he has been re-elected to that position by the Board of Trustees, therefore be it

Resolved, That this Convention approve the action of the Board in re-electing President Purce for the next scholastic year.

WHEREAS, at a session of the Board of Trustees of the Selma University, be gun and held at Selma, Ala., on the 19th day of April, 1688.

The following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, at the session of the Baptist State Convention of Alabama, (colored) held in the city of Montgomery in July, 1887, a resolution was adopted appointing the Trustees of the Schna University, the Corresponding Secretary of the Alabania Baptist State Convention and the Financial Agent of Seina University a committee to sell the following portion of the school lands of said Conven tion at Selma, Ala., to-wit. Beginning North of Philpot street, running north to the Keeth Place, thence west to Vally Creek, thence southwest with the line of said creek to Philpot street, thence east to starting point for the purpose of reliev ing the said Selma University of the embarrassment caused by the claims held against the same hereinalter mentioned, and directing them to make such sale, and whereas at the last meeting of this Board Moody H. Mav, Esq., was, by reso lution thereof, duly authorized to make such sale on behalf of said Convention and said Selma University, and whereas on the 30th day of March. 1888, by virtue of said authority the said Moody H. May, for and on behalf of said Convention and University, agreed to sell the following portion of said property to R. A. Self and Solomon Kohn, and to convey the same to such person or persons as they might designate, to wit: Six acres in the northeast corner of the property known as the fair grounds, particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point forty feet west from the intersection of the centre line of Maple street with the centre line of Philput, thence north along the western margin of Maple street, 448 feet more or less to the northeast corner of said fair grounds, thence west at right angles to Maple street, 583 feet more or less, thence south at right angles and parallel to Maple street, 448 feet more or less, to the centre line of Philpot street extended west, thence east along said extended centre line of Philpot street, 583 feet more or less to the point of beginning, the said Convention and University re serving the artesian well and basin; but granting to the party to whom said land is sold the right to use water from the same, but not to conduct the water away, in consiperation of which the said grantee agrees to pay their one-half part of the expense of keeping said well in repair: and also not to use the premises sold to them for any purpose detrimental to the property of said State Convention and Selma University, or incompatible with the use thereof as a school; and the said Convention and University and the grantee of said property and their assigns agree to keep open a street on the southeide of said six acres, so that there shall be a street in extension west of Philpot street running the full length of said six acres and situated one-half on the property of said Convention and University said

Convention and University reserve the right to remove from said premises all buildings and other improvements on the same within a reasonable time after the month of May, 1888, which contract was made in consideration of the relinquishment and satisfaction by the said R. A. Self and Solomon Kohn of all claims and demands held by them or either of them against said Selma University. Now, therefore be it

Resolved, That the said contract as above set forth and modified be and is as is hereby ratified and adopted; and the said R. A. Self and Solomon Kohn having designated Moses Seigle as Trustee of the person to whom said lands shall be

conveyed under said contract; be it further

Resolved And directed that said lands be accordingly conveyed to said Moses Seigle as Trustee by deed signed by said Baptist State Convention (colored), by and through this Board of Trustees, acting through its President and Secretary, and by the Corresponding Secretary of said Baptist State Convention and the Financial Agent of Selma University and by the members of this Board or a majority of them.

Be it further resolved, That the said contract as above set forth and modified be and is hereby in all things ratified approved and adopted for and on behalf said Selma University, and that a deed be at once executed for said lands to Moses Seigle as Trustee by said Selma University through the President and Secretary

of this Board in the manner authorized by law.

Be it further resolved, That the members of this Board of Trustees or a majority of them in whom the legal title to said property was vested as Trustees for said University by deed execute? by the "Selma Exposition" on the 18th day of March, 1879, are hereby directed to convey the land (sold as above set forth) to the said Moses Seigle as Trustee by joining in the execution of said deed. Therefore be it

Resolved, That the resolutions of said Trustees of said Selma University above set forth and the contract and sale therein mentioned and receited be and is the same, are hereby in all things approved, ratified, adopted and confirmed

Resolved, That we do all we can to assist and encourage the good women of the state who are struggling to lift up fallen humanity to a standard of purity and greatness above that of ignorance, debauchery, vice, and drunkenness.

We recommend, further, the use of unfermented wines for communion purposes, inasmuch as the least temptation may lead one

astray.

Resolved, That we pray the legislature to pass prohibitory laws against the importation, manufacture, sale and use of all liquors, wines and beer; believing such laws would tend to improve the condition of the colorored race.

ON DECEASED MINISTERS.

Bro. President: Your committee on deceased ministers beg leave to make the following report:

In looking over the circle of ministers in the state, we find that God has moved from our midst, Rev. John Dozier, pastor of the church at Uniontown, Ala.; Rev. H. Woodsmall, who, though not in the state at the time of his death, but had been away in another state for over two years, yet we look upon him as one of us. Rev. G. W. Berry, pastor of the Baptist church at Eufaula departed this life, Sept. 10th, '87. Rev. John Dozier departed his life, Feb. 5th, 1888, at his home in Uniontown, Ala. Rev., H. Woodsmall was removed from labor to reward, Feb. 27th, '88, while at his post of labor in Memphis, Tenn.

Bro. Dozier was one among the founders of this convention. No matter how things went, he was always on hand at the annual meetings. He was one of the first members of the Board of Trustees of Selma University, and was among the foremost in contributing to the purchase of the present school property. He was the leading influence in the organization of the Uniontown association, and was very influential in making the Association what it is to-day. He was a pious and consistent Christian. His

word in any matter was his bond. In this respect Bro. Dozier was looked upon as the model Christian. He had, in a rare degree, the confidence of all who knew him. His name for truth and veracity stood out as one of the prominent features of his life. He was for twenty three yesrs the pastor of the Uniontown church and was much beloved by his congregation. In point of scholarship and a clear knowledge of the scripture he had few equals for his chances.

It pleased Almighty God in his all wise providence to remove

this beloved and faithful brother from us.

Bro. Woodsmall came to Alabama in the fall of 1876. His first meeting with us was in Talladega, Nov. 18th. 1876. He labored one year as a general missionary under the appointment of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, and at the fall session of the Convention in Eufaula, 1887, was chosen by the Board of Trustees, Pres. of the school at Selma. He remained at the head of this institution four years.

In this capacity he did us a great deal of good in this state. The work he did in helping to lay the foundation of the Selma School, in building up our paper and in giving shape to the mission work in the state can never be forgotten; and only eternity can tell what blessings come to us through the labors and efforts

of this devoted and faithful servant of God.

After Bro. Woodsmall resigned his place in the school, he took charge again of mission work, under the American Baptist Homo Mission in Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas. At

the time of his death he was engaged in this work.

Bro. Woodsmall was an unselfish, sacrificing worker for the master. No man was ever more faithful. He was of the purest Christian character. It has pleased God to take this dear brother from us.

Bro. Berry was pastor of the Eufaula Baptist church for something over a year. He attended only two meetings of the State Convention; but he made for himself in that short time many friends,

Bro. Berry was a young man of great promise and usefulness. He had at the time of death won his way to the hearts of the people over whom he had charge.

The news of his death threw a shock over the members of this

body.

No minister had become more prominent for the same time. Bro. Berry was modest, quiet, and refined in manners.

We would, therefore, recommend the following:

Resolved 1, That in the removal of these brethren from our midst, we have sustained a great loss.

Resolved That we tender to the families of the deceased brethren our heartfelt sympathy.

Resolved 3, That we devote at least one half hour in a memorial service.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers shall be a President, Vice President Corresponding Secretary Recording Secretary and Transaction and the Incentive Board shall not exceed different number, who shall be annually elected by acclaimation.

ARTICLE V.

The Executive Board shall constitute a Board for the transmitten on no ladering the recess of the Convention. and take fresh courage. Let us do carnestly what lies before us, and the same God, who brought us thus tar out of our gloumy night of debt and discouragements, will not forsake us, but rather will bring us clear out into the bughtness of his nounday sun of love, light and prosperity...

I am glad to state that I attended the women's Convention held in Montgom ery, and by their earnestness, they showed that they intend to raise \$1,000 00 iminediately for our ladies' hall at Selma. God bless these noble women in their laudable undertaking. Brethren, give them, your support and sympathy.

My financial statement for the school home and boarding hall is couched in the Treasurer's report. Allow me, then brethren, in view of the above facts to recommend to you the following:

1. That we take immediate steps towards the erection of a commodious hall for

dormitory purposes.

2. That we endorse and encourage the efforts of the Baptist Wennen's Convention in the State in raising means to build a ladies hall in Selma for our girls.

3. That a building committee be appointed to get plans and bids for the ercetion of the building. And that this committee be empowered to make all necessary arrangements for building as soon as practicable.

4. That the Convention supplement the \$2,000.00 given by the Home Mission Society with a similar amount for this building, and that some practical plans be immediately put on foot to raise that amount for the said purpose.

That a committee ho appointed to draw up suitable resolutions of thanks to the Home Mission Society and to the women's Baptist Convention for their noble

efforts.

6. That since the appropriation for teachers by the Home Mission Society is less than last year, that you will make some provision for the support of another teacher, besides the Theological teacher.

7. That Misses Seeley and Redmond be paid what is due them. Respectfully submitted

Report of W. H. McAlpine. Financial Agent of Selma University and General Missions for East Alabama, and made a part of the report of the Board of Trustees and of the State Mission Board.

To the Missionary Baptist State Convention, colored, of Alabama, which met in Tuscaloosa July 18, 1888.

DRAR BRETHTEN: It is my happy privilege as well as my duty to you to make this annual report of my work as Financial Agent for Selma University and General Missionary for the East half of Alabama.

I was appointed to the work by a joint session of the State Mission and Trustees Boards August 1887, and commenced work the first of October 1887.

I have been engaged in the work for ten months. In conducting the work on my side of the State, I have tried to follow the instructions of the Boards by which I was appointed. Namely: To raise funds for the Education and Missions and to visit as many of the destitute churches as possible. The most of my efforts have been devoted to raising funds, and this has caused me to miss a good many of the destitute places that I other-wise would have visited. I have taken the work as much as I could by associations, and have made it my aim to visit the churches in the different associations in some systematic order, as near as I could The churches across the center and South of the State were visited in the winter and spring and those in the Northern part were visited in the Summer.

On account of the cold and mud we could not visit as many of the country churches in the winter as we desired. In February 1998, we found it necessary to cancel all the appointments of that month because they were mostly in the country and because of the rains and mud, and make them in the towns and cities for that month. It was decided by the Boards that a certain per cent of all the money raised should go for Education and a certain per cent for Missionand so we kept no seperate accounts of the amounts raised. The money, as shown below, has been raised from associations. Sunday-school Conventions. Churches, Sunday schools and individualls and we have tried to keep an account of all that has come into our hands.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

I have raised since October 1, 1887, to July 20, 1888, the sum of \$1741,53

This amount, except what has been raised in July, has been turned over to the treasurer, Descon C. W. White, and I have his receipts for the same.

The money has been raised from Associations, Sunday-school Convention-Churches, Sunday-schools and individuals.

For convenience I have arranged the financial state in the following order:

- 1. The amounts paid by the different Associations.
- 2 The amounts paid by the Sunday school Conventions.
- 5. The amount paid by the Churches, Sunday schools and individuals in the different associations, and then a total of all done by each association with the Churches, Sunday-schools and individuals in that Association.

BRO. PRESIDENT AND BRETHREN:

We we the most and the mineral material and continue of learning, to submit this, and anomal to the condition, and surrounded with such a prosperous outlook for future usefulness. Under the management of our tefficient and faithful President Rev. C. L. Purce, and the associate workers, a good strong faculty, the school has done better than at any time in its previous history.

In the bounds of the Alabama District Association erry, Lowndes, and parts of Uniore and Bullock cour in 11-22 associations in the state, there much mission work needed. We ought to have

a missionary to take charge of the work in and around the city of Montgomery. There are at least ten Baptist churches in the city of Montgomery, and the Baptists in that city outnumber all the other denominations put together, but we only outstrip them in mere numbers. There are not less than six Baptist churches in the city of Montgomery that need to be helped in the way of a Missionary pastor. Then down in the Spring Hill, Troy, Mulberry, and East Alabama associations, taking in southeast Alabama, is a very large and a very important field. Only one of these four associations are co-operating with the state convention.

Then taking north and south of a certain line running east and west and west, and we have the Pine Grove, the Enfauta, the Bowen East, the Ebenezer, the Auburn, the Brownville, the Morning Star and Elmore Central Associations. In these nine associations there are only three that are really co-operating with the state convention. There are vast populations of our people in the above associations and very important centres of population in the towns and cities of

these associations.

There are a very few competent ministers in all this section. Then passing into what is ralled North and North East Alahama, into the mineral region of the state, and it just simply baffles tungue and pen to describe this field and its destitution, importance and need. No part of all Alabama has greater claims for mission work than North and North east Alapama

Thus you see the very great destitution that prevails in the state. The Board thinks that not less than eight missionaries should be put in the field another year, who can devote themselves entirely to the mission work, and who will not have to

raise their own salaries, or be compelled to act as sub, financial agents.

To support a vigorous missionary work in the state for another year, the following plan is recommended.

1st. That every incinber in our Baptist churches be requested to give ten cents

tur missions alone.

2d. That the corresponding secretary make out a statement to each church in the state of the amount that will be required of them on this ten conts plan, and

3d, That missionary days be set, at which time the churches will be asked to give what they can of their amount, and that the second Sunday in September next be set as the first Missionary day. We also recommend that efforts be made at the coming meetings of the associations, to raise as much as \$100, to be known as a Book Sinking Fund; and that this fund be put in books from the Pub. Society, and that each Missionary who goes out in any destitute section, shall be allowed to have books to sell and distribute, and that a certain part of the profits on the sales of the books be allowed the Missionaries as a supplement to their salaries and that said amount shall be determined by the Board.
