CONSTITUTION.

-OF THE-

ALABAMA COLORED BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION.

ARTICLE I-Name.

This body shall be known as the Alabama Colored Baptist State Convention.

ARTICLE II-Object.

The object or this Convention shall be the promotion of the gospel of Christ and general and ministerial education.

ARTICLE III-Membership.

This Convention shall consist of delegates sent by the Baptist Churches and Associations composing this body and individuals complying with the terms of admission.

ARTICLE IV-Representation.

Associations and Churches holding and practicing the dectrines of Missionary Baptist Churches, may be represented, as follows:

First, Associations. An Association shall be entitled to one delegate by the payment of five dollars, and three dollars for each additional delegate.

Second, Churches. A Church shall be entitled to one delegate by the payment of five dollars, and two dollars for each additional delegate. Individuals connected with any acceptable Baptist Church may be admitted to annual membership by the payment of one dollar, and to life membership by the payment of five dollars.

ARTICLE V-Officers.

The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary, who shall be elected annually and shall perform the work usually belonging to such officers. They shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VI-State Mission Board.

This Convention shall have a Board, known as the State Mission Board, consisting of seven persons named by the Convention, the moderators of the Associations belonging to this body, and the officers of the Convention, whose duty shall be to prosecute the mission work, and any other necessary business of the Convention.

Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE .VII - Treasurer's Security.

The Treasurer shall give such security as shall be approved by the Convention. He shall keep a faithful account of all mone ye received and paid out by him; and report the same at each annual session of the Convention. He shall pay out no money except by order of the Convention or State Mission Board, signed by the President and Corresponding Secretary.

ARTICLE VIII-Board of Trustees.

There shall be a Board known as the Board of Trustees, whose duty shall be to take charge of all properties belonging to the State Convention, and to have control of the educational work of the Convention. The Board shall consist of twelve members, four of whom shall be elected every year as provided by the charter and shall serve three years.

ARTICLE IX-Reports of the Boards.

The State Mission Board and the Board of Trustees shall make annual reports of their respective works, make recommendations, and keep the Convention informed of the educational and religious condition of the field.

ARTICLE X-Amendments.

This Constitution may be amended by a vote of three-fourths of the members at any annual meeting.

PROCEEDINGS.

EUFAULA, ALA., Nov., 22nd, 1893.—At 11:30 a. m. the Aiabama Colored Baptist State Convention met in its twenty-sixth annual session in the First Baptist Church, Rev. J. W. Jackson, pastor. The convention was called to order by president C. S. Dinkins, D. D. The devotional services were conducted by Rev. C. P. Jones, Selma, who led in prayer and then read Matthew 18th chapter. Singing "Awake my soul in joyful lay;" after which C. O. Boothe, D. D., Normal, led in prayer. On motion the enrellment of messengers and the election of officers will take place immediately after the introductory sermon.

The president then introduced Rev. J. P. Barton, Talladega, who arose to preach the introductory sermon. Bro. Barton read the 22nd, chapter of Luke, and preached the introductory sermon from Jer. 1:10. The sermon was received with much interest.

After the sermon the Mayor of the City of Eufaula was introduced to the convention and delivered an address of welcome on behalf of the City: "It is a duty you owe to yourselves, to your country, and to your God to take advantage of the epportunity you have. I am a Baptist and have been one for twenty-five years. As you go out you should see to it, that your children be taught the cardinal points of the doctrines of the Baptist denomination.

It affords me great pleasure to welcome you to Eufaula. As mayor, I promise you that you can have every liberty you may have in the world."

At this point the motion by which the enrollment of messengers and the election of officers were ordered, immediately after the introductory sermon, was re-considered, in order to have the address by the president. The president delivered his annual address: "Never was there a time when we have such reason to rejoice as now. The work done by the missionaries and colporteurs, the work of Selma University, and the average of the pastors have had telling effect. I believe that we have demonstrated to the world that we are united. Many times, doubtless, brethren may have had wrong notions, but their intentions were good. While we should have liberty of speech, let us be cautious about what we say.

I would call attention to the fact that this closes the first quarter of a century of service of our convention."

The address was inspiring.

FIRST DAY-EVENING SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 6:30 p. m. with president Dinkins presiding. Rev. S. A. Rivers, Talladega, led the devo-

tional services.

Singing O God, our help in ages past; after which 119 Psalms was read, and then Bro. Rivers led in prayer. Singing, "My Jesus I love Thee." At this point the president introduced the newly elected president who then assumed the charge after having made a few remarks.

On motion the program prepared for the Convention was a-

dopted.

On motion the program was so suspended as to allow of the election of the Board of Incorporators at this time.

Singing by the choir of the First Baptist Church then Rev. E. B. Young, Tuskegee, responded on behalf of the Convention.

The hour having arrived for preaching, the Convention sang "Let Zion's watchmen all awake." Rev. W. H. McAlpine, D. D., Selma, read 4th. chapter of Ephesian, after which he led in prayer. Singing "Go preach my gospel etc." Then Dr. Mc, Alpine preached a ver interesting sermon from Eph. 4:11, 12. After the sermon the Convention sang, "Soldiers of Christ arise." Collection \$7.05.

Adjourned with benediction by Rev. W. H. McAlpine, D.

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SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Convention met 9:45 o'clock a. m. with president Barton in the chair. The devotional services were conducted by Rev. F. R. Kennedy, Anniston. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

On motion the program was suspended for twenty minutes in order to get the sense of the Convention concerning a statement made in the sermon of Rev. J. P. Barton bearing upon the

Home Mission Society's help in our educational work.

Then Dr. C. O. Boothe offered the following resolution bearing upon the Home Mission Society (See resolutions No. 1.) Carried.

The report of the Board of Trustees of Selma University was called for; but the Board not being ready, on motion the consideration of the report was postponed till the beginning of the afternoon session.

Rev. W. B. Crumption, Corresponding Secretary of the white Baptist Convention; J. G. Bow pastor white Baptist Church, this city; Rev. L. M. Luke, Field Agent of the Foreign Mission Convention of the United States were introduced to the Convention and spoke.

H. L. Moorhouse, D. D., addressed the Convention: I came to see what are your methods of work, and what as a Convention you are accomplishing. The missionary work in Alabama is in a very unsatisfactory condition. Nor is Alabama an exhibition. In other states the brethren say to me that they had almost dispaired:

If the Convention have not the energy to evangelize the world, it ought to die. The churches in the state will not contain the until they believe that the work done is worth con-

I am not here to say what ought to be done. Lam here to say that the Home Mission Society which has worked for the evangelization of the colored people, and which has contributed more than two million dollars is profoundly interested in you. We are hopeful that the future will be better than the past.

Dr. M. McVicar spoke: As I am interested in the educational work, would prefer to speak after the report of the Board of Trustees will have been submitted, As far as I can understand, there is a misunderstanding in the affairs of Selma Univerty. Young men, be sure that you take counsel. Don't forget the division of Israel. It is an easy matter to tear down. Any kind of a man can tear a building down, but it takes a mechanic to put it up.

I thank God for the revelations of want to spend my strength in any other directions than to contend for the faith once for all delivered to the saints. Our glory must consist in our work.

On the grounds of Selma University you have buildings that

are an honor to the denomination.

Do you think that the nine years spent at Selma by myself were spent for foolishuess? Men, not things must be our motto.

The address was listened to with much interest.

The resolution offered by Bro. J. C. Leftwich was referred to the committee on resolutions.

Rev. Ephriam Smith, Tennal; and C. H. Young, Atlanta, Ga, were introduced to the Convention.

The report of committee on divine services for the Sabbath

were read and approved.

Rev. P. S. L. Hutchine read the report of the Conference with the Board of Trustees (see report.) The report was

The committee on Time and Place made their report Carried. (See report.)

Collection for Foreign Mission \$8:25.

Adjourned with benediction by Rev. T. L. Jordan.

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

The Alabama Baptist State Convention reassembled at 3:45 P. M. with Vice-President Rev. Wm. Madison in the chair.

Singing; "Am I a soldier of the cross?" Prayer was offered by Bro. T. H. Posey.

On motion the subject of the "Baptist Leader" was taken up for consideration.

The editors, Rev. R. T. Pollard and A. J. Stokes, spoke on the paper, and were followed by the Rev. S. W. Bacote. Then the committee on the "Leader" made its report, which on motion was adopted. (See report.)

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The report of the Board of Trustees of Selma University which embraced the report of the Financial and Cor. Secretary and the Treasurer was read by Rev. L. J. Green Secretary of the Board, and was referred to an auditing committee consisting of Prof. R. B. Hudson, Revs. P. S. L. Hutchins, and S. A. Rivers.

The following resolution bearing upon the new charter for Selma University was reed by M. McVicar, D. D., and was on motion adopted. (See report.)

At this point a subscription was opened for the purpose of raising money to complete and repair the buildings of Selma Amount subscribed was \$34 10. University.

The following offered by Rev. A. F. Owens was adopted. (See resolution No. 3.)

The following resolution offered by Rev. T. W. Walker, was adopted. (See resolution No. 4.)

The Convention arose and sang the doxology.

THIRD DAY-EVENING SESSION.

The Convention being assembled engaged in the evening services.

Singing: "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" after which the audience engaged in the reading of the scriptures, being led by Rev. L. M. Luke.

Bro. Luke began to speak to the Convention on the work of African Missions: The heathens are dying for the bread of life Three hundred million in the jungles of Africa to-night are crying, Come. Bring the loaves: Reach the pastors and you can reach the people.

In order to give to God, make sacrifices. How many men and women are there here who spend seventy cents weekly for beer?

Bro. Luke's address held the Convention's attention, and accordingly much interest was manifested. After the very interesting sermon a collection of \$32.62 was taken for African Missions.

The following resolutions bearing upon the death of Rev. J. J. Cole offered by Rev. P. S. L. Hutchins were adopted.

The committee on new bodies made their report which was

adopted. (see report)

The Convention then adjourned with benediction by Rev. D. T. Gulley, Selma.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Baptist State Convention met pursuant to adjournment with Rev. Wm. Madison Vice-President presiding.

The devotional services were conducted by Rev. V. B.

James, who read Pealm 33rd and led in prayer.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Rev. L. J. Green, Selma, read a paper on the necessity and support of our denominational schools. Pending the motion to adopt the paper it was spoken to by Rev. S. L. Ross. On motion of Rev. C. J. Davis the paper was ordered published in the Leader.

Sister Susie A. Stone presented several articles made in the industrial department of Selma University, Mrs. A. A. Bowie teacher. Several articles were bought by the brethren.

A collection of \$4.15 was raised for the woman's work.

Bro. T. H. Posey read a paper on "How to reach and retain our young people." On motion the paper was adopted.

The following resolutious presented by Bro. J. C. Leftwich

were adopted. (See Resolutions No. 6.)

R. T. Pollard, statistical secretary, made his report which, on motion, was adopted.

On motion of Bro. C. M. Wells, R. T. Pollard was re-elected statistical secretary.

Rev. H. L. Morehouse, D. D. read some recommendations coming from the State Mission Board, which on motion were adapted (see appendix) Further recommendations from the State Mission Board were read by Rev. D. T. Gulley. The recommendations were tabled.

The Convention elected the following brethren together with the moderators of associations members of the State Mission Board: Revs. J. W. Jackson, C. R. Rodgers, C. L. Purce, L. J. Green, C. J. Davis, R. S. Hudson, W. H. McAlpine, D. D.

Adjourned with benediction.

FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention re-assembled with President Barton in the chair.

Rev. C. R. Rodgers led in prayer.

The report of the committee on Temperance was read by Rev. S. L. Ross; and upon its adoption it was spoken to by Bro. C. M. Wells, Rev. A. Underwood.

It was carried that the Secretary write a letter to the Southeast District association setting forth the good feeling of this Convention toward it.

The report of the Finance Committee was read and approved (See report.)

The committee appointed to audit the report of the Board of Trustees reported that the figures of the report are correct but the vouchers are not present.

On motion the auditing committee is authorized to give a statement of the indebtedness of the school.

On motion 2,000 minutes were ordered printed.

On motion the Recording Secretary was allowed twenty dollars for service.

On motion the Corresponding Secretary is to be paid for the actual expenses incurred in the correspondence.

On motion \$80 was set apart for printing and distributing

minutes.

On motion the sexton was allowed \$6 for service.

The following report from the auditing committee was adopted. (See report.)

On motion ten dollars was paid R. T. Pollard for sevices

as statistical secretary.

On motion the following amounts were ordered paid; Rev. C. R. Rodgers fifteen dollars due for services as missionary; Rev. D. T. Gulley ten dollars due for services as missionary; Bro. Wm. Watkins ten dollars due him for the same amount paid out by him on account of State Mission Board.

The balance of the money was ordered turned over to the Board of Trustees of Selma University for the payment of the

teachers.

The report on Foreign Mission was read and approved.

On motion the first two collections on Sabhate are to be given to the industrial department of Selma University.

On motion of C. L. Purce, D. D., a vote of thanks was tendered the president and vice-president for impartiality in ruling. Also a vote of thanks was tendered the recording secretary for efficient service.

On motion of Rev. D. T. Gulley the president of the Convention was requested to visit as many places in the State as possible in the State work.

On motion of Bro. J. C. Leftwich, the president, Revs. T. W. Walker, and A. A. Battle are requested to visit the State Convention of Tennessee Valley.

The following resolution, offered by Bro. C. M. Wells, was

adopted (See report.)

The Convention then closed to meet with the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Anniston, Ala., on Wednesday before fourth Sabbath in Nov. 1894.

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REPORT OF THE STATE MISSION BOARD.

FOR THE YEAR BEGINNING NOV. 1ST. 1892 AND ENDING OCT. 318T, 1893

Dear Brethren;-

By the blessing of God we are able to submit to you our annual report.

At the close of the session of the last Convention every body went home jubilant over the outlook for a successful year. Success was assured because of the excellent plans adopted by this body for the prosecution of its mission work. This hope was heightened by the fact that we had a strong man in the person of Dr. W. R. Pettiford to push these plans.

The year financially was without a parallel in the history of this Convention. The financial panic that struck the country affected even the work of missions. The result is, there has not been done financially as much as the Board had hoped.

But after all the Board is of the opinion that under the present plan the foundation has simply been laid. And the great good will come only by constant effort.

According to your plans decided upon at the last session at Mobile an Executive Board consisting of Revs. C. L. Purce, R. E. Brown, L. J. Green. W. H. McAlpine, and Bro. R. B. Hudson, was located at Selma, and attended to much business that the State Mission Board would have had to incur expenses to attend to.

The Board is sorry to inform the Convention concerning the loss of the services of Revs. C. O. Boothe, D. D., General Missionary, and D. T. Gulley Sunday-School Missionary jointly by the Publication Society and this Board. The former's resignation took effect Mar, '93 to accept a pastorate of 26th Avenue Baptist Church, Meridian, Miss., and the latter's resignation took effect June 30th '93 to accept a call to pastorate at Blooton. These brethren by being in the service several years had become acquainted with the field. They were therefore prepared to and did render great service. The Board has been able since to secure Rev. S. L. Ross to labor under the joint appointment of Publication Society and this Board instead of Bre Gulley. Bro. Ross entered upon the field Oct. 1st.

To this the successor to Dr. Boothe has not yet been agreed upon by this Board and the Board of the Home Mission Society.

The Board is grateful to mention the continual help received from the white Baptists of Alabama and the Southern Baptist Convention in the support of W. H. McAlpine, D. D., who has given valuable help both in giving instructions to ministers in the State and in Selma University. Dr. C. S. Dinkins who about one year labored as missionary in the State under the Publication Society has resigned to accept a position in Selma University.

The Board hopes the Publication Society will give us a successor to Dr. Dinkins and under the same plans.

The results of the plans adopted by your last session for the prosecution of the mission work will be fully reperted by Dr. W. B. Pettiford, Fin. and Cor., Secretary.

The Board is constrained to say however, that the mission work of the State is not second to any work that the Convention is prosecuting. The churches need to be disciplined; and there is no greater agency the Convention can put forth for this discipline than good earnest missionary work. The churches need men like Paul and the other early missionaries to go and strengthen them,

THE BAPTIST LEADER.

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When the Convention adjourned at Mobile it adjourned with Rev. A. F. Owens as editor and Bro. J. C Leftwich business manager. It was not long. after the Convention adjourned before Bro. Owens thought it necessary to resign from the editorial chair, thus leaving no editor; but Mr. Leftwich carried the paper on as best he could acting both as editor and business mana. ger. The Board can say that Bro. Leftwich under this condition of affairs did remarkably well in carrying on the work; but it was apparent that to assure the regularity of the paper it was necessary to increase the staff for the running of the paper. So after some effort the Board secured the services of Revs. R. T. Pollard and A. J. Stokes as editors with Bro. J. C. Leftwich and A. J. Knight as business managers to carry the paper to the meeting of this Convention. After the paper had suspended about two months this force began to publish the paper July 1st. under very gloomy circumstances. The Board is glad to report that the paper under the management has again assumed life. Many friends have been made for it, : nd consequently its circulation is increasing every day.

The Roard decided during last Spring to purchase a press on which to print the paper; and accordingly appointed a committee who was intrusted with this project, but as yet the committee has done nothing. However, the editors and business managers of the paper have opened in the columns of the paper a Baptist Leader Press Fund to which individuals, churches, and associations are contributing. This effort was begun with the hope that the Convention at its present session would assume the project and at once purchase a press.

The Board does highly endorse the effort and would recommend that the Convention take immediate steps toward purchasing a press.

STATEMENT OF RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING AND FINANCIAL SECRETARY, W. R. PETTIFORD, TO THE STATE Mission BOARD, AND MADE A PART OF BOARD'S REPORT TO THE CONVENTION.

BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA, NOVEMBER, 20, 1893.

My work this year has tended towards permanency rather than incidental or spessedic. Your Secretary is decidedly of the opinion that the most effective missionary work, that the Board can do is to operate through the lighter and missionaries of the associations and the field men.

OUR DESTITUTION.

The destitution that exists is not that we need so many more new churches, for we have churches nearly everywhere they are needed with few exceptions.

Our destitution exists in that of weak members, weak pastors, weak officers, and moderators. We need to have these weak members, pastors, officers, and moderators, made strong in knowledge in influence as christians and strong in their devotions to the worship and service of God. This is the character of our destitution.

MY WORK.

Dr. Morgan, Cor., See'y of the H. M. S. in reply to my letters informs me that no doubt their Board will recall all general missionaries and turn their entire efforts towards our educational work. Revs. D. T. Gulley and C. R. Rodgers, S. S. Missionaries. Rev. D. T. Gulley's resignation went into effect June 30, and C. R. Rodgers——.

Rev. S. L. Ross has been appointed as S. S. Missionary for the East of Alabama and has accepted and commenced work on Oct. 1st. 1893.

I have assisted pastors, mis ionaries and S. S. workers by holding conferences in the bounds of associations, where much was a complished for our missionary and financial work both of church and state. Much can be done toward "unifying," and building up the work by the Secretary co operating with the Brethren in their local work and they with him in the state work.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

- (1.) That the Baptist Leader if possible remain as it is and the editors be instructed, not to allow articles of a fighting nature to appear in its columns. That we encourage the purchase of a press and printing outfit.
- (2.) That a regular campaign be commenced by the moderators, and presidents of S. S. Conventions, assisted by the Cor. Secretary, to be continued until every church and S. S. in the state are taking and complying with the Triple Pledge. By moderators corresponding and holding conferences with their pastors and the presidents of S. S. conventions with their Supt., these efforts aided by a bountiful distribution of reading matter, aptly composed will arouse our people as never before to the interest of our great work.

A letter from Dr. Morgan will be of interest to you.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY.

Rev. A. C. Jackson, missionary in the bounds of the Mt. Pilgrim Association, worked four months, traveled 575 miles, visited 40 churches, 8 Sunday-

schools, attended 22 prayer meetings, visited 78 families, sermons and religious talks 106, pledges taken from churches 5, from individuals 131, ministers ordained 3, church conferences attended 3, institutes held 4, days of labor 68, money collected, \$87.36, paid to missionary by collections; \$87.36, by cash, \$70. by cash, \$60, total paid\$157.36 \$200 less \$157.36 leaves a balance due missionary of \$42.64 Amount of pledges turned in unpaid, \$362.95.

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Rev. G. J. Brooks, missionary in the bounds of the Uniontown Association, worked 6 months, miles traveled, 981, lectures and sermons, 77, money

collected, \$152.64 pledged \$284.25 balance due, \$31.

Dr. C. O. Boothe, up until he hunded in his resignation March 31, had collected \$127.77 and the same was paid to him, leaving a balance due of Rev. C. R. Rodgers collected \$35.81, which was paid to him in March

Rev. D. T. Gulley, as Sunday-school missionary for 8 months from Nov. 1892 to July 1893, collected \$224.58 of which \$200 was paid on his salary and \$24.58 was paid on his expenses, leaving a balance due of \$34.50

NOTE.—The report of Rev. J. Q. A. Wilhite, Treasurer of Selma University, was not received, by the recording secretary and therefore it does not appear in these minutes.

Since, the meeting of the last Convention we have done all possible to foster the great work assigned to us.

At the close of the last school year, three young women and as many young men graduated from the normal department of the University.

At the annual meeting of the Board, June 8th, Rev. C. S. Dinkins, D. D., was elected president of Selma University. The corps of teachers as it now stands is as follows: C. S. Dinkins, D. D., President; Miss L. M. Seeley, Lady Principal; Prof J. H. Eason, B. D.; Miss. Bertha E. Davis; Prof. E. W. Knight; Rev. W. H. McAlpine, D. D.; Mrs. A. A. Bowie, Sewing Department, Miss Mamie M. Wilhite; Model Department; Miss Lula I. Watkins music teacher: I. M. C. Inge, printing department.

All of the departments of the institution are represented at present.

Even though quite a cloud has hung over our institution, we have reaces to believe that the work is prospering.

WORK DONE.

The old building has received a new covering, and the various rooms are undergoing repairs. The work will be completed in a few days, and will give sufficient room for teaching. We are glad to note that the most of the work has been done by the students and teachers under the direction of Dr. McAlpine.

SEWING DEPARTMENT.

This department is being fostered by the sisters of the State. They with the Board, have secured the services of Mrs. A. A. Bowie to give instruction in sewing to the young ladies.

HELP FROM THE NORTH.

The American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York, we are glad to report, gives us this year on teachers' salaries, two thousand dollars. This society has done and is still doing much for us.

The following are the names of the new members of the Board of Trustees: Revs. C. O. Boothe, D. D., and J. W. White, instead of Drs. Pettiford and McAlpine respectively, resigned; Rev. C. P. Jones in place of Rev. L. J. Green; term ended; Rev. A. J. Stokes, in place of Bro. H. A. Loveless; term ended; Bro. Ad. Wimbs in place of Bro. C. W. White, deceased; Rev. M. Tyler, re-elected; H. L. Morehouse, D. D., re-elected; Dr. M. McVicar was elected honorary member of the Board. The Executive Committee of the Board are: Revs. M. Tyler, C. S. Goldsby, C. P. Jones, J. Q. A. Wilhite. The officers of the Board are: Revs. M. Tyler, president, C. P. Jones, secretary; J. Q. A. Wilhite, treasurer.


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
