CONSTITUTION

Baptist Women's State Convention.

Article I. This body shall be known as the Baptist Women's State Convention.

Article II. Object: The object of this Convention shall be to promote the cause of Christ by laboring for the up-building of the Alabama Baptist University and by doing such mission work as possible.

Article III. Membership: Any woman's society whose members are connected with a regular Baptist church, and women in good standing in their churches, may become members of this organization.

- 2. Any woman in good standing in the Baptist church may become a life member by the payment of \$5.00, or an annual member by the payment of \$1.00. All societies are requested to send annually to the convention ten cents per member.
- 3. Any male member in good standing in the Baptist church may be received as an honorary life member by paying \$5.00, or honorary annual member by paying \$1.00.
- 4. No society shall send a male member to the convention, none but women shall be allowed to vote or hold office.

Article IV. Officers-

- 1. The officers of this convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, and a board consisting of fourteen members.
- 2. The President, Vice-President. Recording Secretary Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer shall perform the duties which usually falls to said officers in similar bodies.

Article V. Board. The board of fourteen members, including the officers of the Convention, shall have the power to carry out the object of the Convention and in general do anything necessary to secure the full and complete organization of the women of the State; provided, always, that they conform to the constitution. The Board shall have its headquarters at Selma, and five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article VI. Annual Meetings. This Convention shall meet annually on Thursday before the Fourth Lord's Day in June.

Article VII. This constitution can be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote.

BY-LAWS.

This constitution shall be governed by such by-laws as usually govern religious bodies.

Proceedings.

BESSEMER, ALA., June 21, 1900.

The Fifteenth Annual Session of the Women's Baptist State Convention assembled, according to appointment, in the Jerusalem Baptist church, Rev. J. T. Bibb, pastor.

President Mrs. E. W. Pollard called the meeting to order and announced the arrival of time for beginning of the work of the Convention. Mrs. C. L. Fisher and Mrs. Mary Duncan were asked to conduct the devotional exercises. "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was sung. Scripture Lesson read, Psalms 132. A number of prayers followed.

The president asked the corresponding secretary to come forward and read the program. After supplying the places of absent ones the program was adopted. Mrs. J. H. Harris, of Birmingham, was called to the chair.

Mrs. Pollard then made a motion that the report of the Executive Board programmed for 8:45 to-day be changed to 12 o'clock to-morrow. The motion prevailed.

By motion it was decided that Dr. C. S. Dinkins preach Sunday at 11 o'clock and Rev. W. C. Bradford preach to-night, as Rev. Bradford could not be present Sunday.

The president then gave her annual address, opening with these words: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain." She then spoke of the responsibility that rests upon each one of us She said she had not been able to prepare an address but desired to leave with the members the thought of their great responsibility. She hoped all would show forth Christ in all their ways, and remember "To let this mind be in you which was also in Christ." And using the words of our Savior and changing the place she felt that this Convention must needs go to Bessemer:

'It is not ours to make reply, It is not ours to reason why, It is ours to do or die.'

We needed as many presidents as members, as many secretaries as members; each one has something to do. Even if we cannot see the reason why now that will excuse none from duty. Let us show forth Christ in all our lives." She then spoke of the meeting of the Women's State Convention of Gainesville, Fla., and thought that words of greeting should be sent them. Mrs. S. H. Wright, of Montgomery, moved that greetings be sent. Carried. Mesers. Hudson and Wells and Mesdames A. S. Prince and R. E. Pitts were appointed a committee to collect the money and send greetings by telegram. Miss Rosa Miles spoke of the meeting of the Women's State Convention of Arkansas. By motion, a telegram bearing greetings was also sent to the Arkansas Convention.

The time for an informal meeting having arrived, Mrs. Harris, of Birmingham, spoke of the blessing of God in one of her children coming to Christ and of better health. Miss Knapp said how much we could do to have more reading of the Bible and more praying in the families. Mrs. Horn, of Selma, spoke of her thankfulness to God for His goodness to her. Mrs. Armstead was thankful that she was spared to meet the sisters once more. Mrs. Mosely, of Calera, was glad to be in the informal conference as she was too late for it last year; she felt that all should heed the president's address. Mrs. Mollie Smithermans of Blocton, said she was here to de all the good she could. Mrs. Bryant, of Birmingham, said she had not had the privilege of being with us in several years but had always prayed for us. Mrs. Walton, of Snow Hill, was glad to be here, Mrs. Elvira Johnson said though this was her first visit to the convention she would put her shoulder to the wheel and do all she could. Miss Polly Henderson said although at times she had feelings of dullness still it was a pleasure to meet with us and get the feelings

revived. Mesdames Deyampert, Ellis, L. E. Preyor, Rena Warner, H. Cunningham and Hattie Johnson also made interesting talks. Mrs. Bowie spoke of how many familiar faces she missed, yet was glad to see our first president and a few others who were in the organization present. Mrs. Nixon, the first president, was called on for remarks. She was extremely glad to be with us. Mrs. Goldsby. of Snow Hill, said the women of that vicinity had organized a Women's District Convention. Miss Rosa Miles spoke about how she had been inspired to work by seeing the work done by some of the noble women of this convention. Sis ters Anna Belle Shaw Jennie Kirksey, Davis, Simpson, Leach, Baylum, Gardner and Johnson were glad to be present and were willing to do all possible for the furtherance of this great work.

COMMITTEE TO SECURE REDUCED RAILROAD RATES.

Revs. W. T. Bibb, S. L. Ross and Sister S. H. Wright.

Sister Bowie asked that we hear from the District Conventions. Sister Walton made a report of the work done by the Snow Hill District Convention. She felt that they were not doing so much but the women of the district are working and hope to accomplish much in the future. Sister Rebecca Pitts reported for the Uniontown District. The women are working and the interest is growing. Sister M. L. Mosely spoke of the Shelby Springs Association. Sister Armstead spoke of the East Lilly Hill Association. Sister Smitherman spoke of the Bibb County Association. She complained of their not getting the minutes but are at work. Rev. C. J. Davis spoke of the work being done at LaFayette, also Sister Finley. Sister Cordelia

Taylor spoke of the work done by the Mt. Pilgrim Association. She said the work was progressing; Sister Fisher said this was a model Association as regard to time everything was as clock work, so to speak.

The Committee on Permanent Organization recommended the following for officers: Mesdames R. T. Pollard, president; A. A. Bowie, vice-president; E. C. Ross, secretary; S. H. Wright, corresponding secretary; L. R. Burwell, treasurer. The report was adopted unanimously. Sister Pollard thanked the Convention for the honor conferred upon her and said if the members of the Convention were pleased with her as a leader she was not pleased with them as followers; she felt that we should be united and that we should not do so much for policy, and that we should give her our undivided support; she felt that she had carried the burden too long. She asked for an expression from each officer. Sister Bowie, vice-president, said she felt that she was vice-president in name only but she was willing to work. The Recording Secretary thanked them for the honor and assured the Convention she would endeavor to perform the duties of the office assigned her. The Corresponding Secretary thanked the Convention and said she would try to do her duty. The Treasurer also expressed thanks and promised to do all she could.

Dr. C. S. Dinkins, president of the Selma University, next spoke and thanked the sisters for the honor they did not confer upon him; he said all should support the work. He spoke of uniting our efforts to build a chapel on the University grounds at Selma, and urged that we rally all our forces. Some discussion as to the night session was engaged in.

Announcements. Adjournment.

Afternoon Session.

The Convention reassembled at 4:80 o'clock. Sisters Bryant and Taylor conducted the devotional exercises. Sister Taylor then took the chair and asked Sisters Duncan, Washington and Gibbs to read letters from the Missionary Societies; after which Rev. A. A. Battle, of Anniston, addressed us. He said he believed in the rights of woman, and that the time had arrived when the woman should select and choose her husband and not sit idly waiting for some man to choose her.

Spoke of

the book he had written, "Anniston Normal Industrial and Theological College."

Rev. Bradford then spoke. He said he held in his hand a medal offered by the State Mission Board to be presented to the sister reporting the largest amount of money for State Mission work. Prof. C. M. Wells said he represented the fifteenth wonder of the world—The National Publishing Board. Rev. S. L. Ross said he represented the largest house in this country for Baptists—The Baptist Publication Society—and spoke of how cheap he could sell Bibles. Sister Shaw, of Birmingham spoke of the work af the Alabama Colored Old Folks' and Orphans' Home. Sister Taylor spoke of the Hospital hoped to be erected in Birmingham for colored people in the near future. Sisters Ellis and Henderson were asked to take the collection. Amount contributed \$1.48.

Mrs. L. R. Burwell, of Selma, read some plans coming from Rev R. T. Pollard concerning the raising of the \$10,000 for the chapel to be erected at Selma University. He asked that we have a committee of three appointed to collect money from the women of the State. The following committee was appointed: Sisters Pollard, Gray and Fisher. Sister Pollard said she would add all presidents of the District Associations to the committee. Prof. R. B. Hudson made a rousing speech concerning the \$10,000 rally. Little Carrie Combs, of Tuscaloosa, sang a beautiful song, "January." Benediction by Rev, Ross.

Night Session.

The Convention reassembled at 8 o'clock. After devotional exercises, by motion Mrs. E. H. Berry, of Auburn, was asked to respond to the welcome address. "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross," was sung and Sister Bibb, of Bessemer, delivered the address of welcome. She welcomed us to the Marvelous City for the good we might do for Christ and humanity. At its conclusion every one of us felt that she was wanted and welcomed. Mrs. E. H. Berry responded in fitting words. Rev. Bradford asked that we sing "Come Holy Spirit Heavenly Dove," Prayer by Dr. C. S. Dinkins followed. "Am I a Soldier of the Cross" was sung and Rev. Bradford preached from Mark 14-8: "She hath done what she could." The sermon was instructive and enjoyed by all present. Prayer by Dr. Dinkins. Dr. Dinkins

then introduced Mr. M. Dodona, a native African, who attends Selma University.

The finance committee took up the collection; amount contributed, \$9.01.

*"Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," was sung. Benediction by Rev. A. A. Battle.

Second Day-Morning Session.

BESSEMER, ALA., June 22, 1900.

The Women's Baptist State Convention assembled in its second day's session at 9 o'clock. Praise service was conducted by Sister S. H. Sullivan. Scripture lesson was read by Prof. C. M. Wells. Revs. Bradford and Battle made enjoyable talks. Quite a number of prayers and talks followed. The meeting proved to be a helpful and enjoyable one. The President and Vice-President being in attendance upon the Executive Board meeting, Sister Cordelia Taylor presided. The Journal of the previous day was read by the Secretary and approved.

Mrs. E. G. Shaw made a talk on plans to increase the work in the rural districts. She said one hindrance to the work was that the sisters were not true to their obligation and another was that the pastors do not enter heartily into the work. Prof. Wells said he heard the bretheren complaining that the sisters do not allow them to talk enough in their meetings, consequently they are leaving. Miss Ingram, of Pratt City, said the pastors are often great hindrances to the work and that the sisters put more stress on their duty to the different orders to which they belong than to mission work. Sister Jones, of Gainesville, extended an invitation to all missionaries to visit her district and assured them a hearty welcome, also money. Rev. S. M. Fisher spoke of his interest in the work. A paper-"The Junior Union; how formed, how conducted"-was read by Miss Ella Knapp. She read five verses from Matthew 19: "The Lord loves the children." She said in forming the union send to headquarters and get literature. Have a leader from the senior union. Let them have their own officers. Study the Bible Readers' Course.

At this juncture the Vice-President took the chair and the report coming from the Executive Board was read by Sister S. H.

Wright. The recommendation that the Woman's Era and Student's Voice be consolidated called forth a very lengthy and animated discussion. A motion prevailed to consolidate the papers if the arrangements could be made by the committee appointed to con'er with the management of the Student's Voice.

A motion prevailed to reserve \$25.00 in the treasury for running the Era provided the consolidation could not be arranged. The report of the Executive Board was then adopted. (See Report.) Mrs. Pollard thanked the Convention for accepting her recommendations and for deciding to pay the indebtedness of \$10.60 upon the Era; and said she would give the \$10.60 to start the \$8,000 fund to be raised by the women.

Rev. Keller introduced Dr. Rankin, of New York, who made a very lengthy address. He said he was sent South by Mr. Martin, a rich man of New York, who is spending part of his money to help the colored people. A motion prevailed inviting Dr. Rankin to visit Selma University.

Rev. Bibb then introduced several visiting brothers, among whom was Rev. English, of the A. M. E. church, who said he welcomed us to Bessemer; he said he opened to us his church, his home, his pocket book.

Collections amounted to \$2.90. "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," was sung. Adjourned to meet at 4 p. m.

Afternoon Session.

The Convention reassembled at 4 p. m. Praise service was conducted by Sisters E. L. Gibbs, of Bessemer, and C. L. Fisher, of Birmingham. Miss Gibbs read the 100th Psalm; Prayer by Miss Knapp and Mrs. Pollard. A paper—"Curfew Law and Its Effects"—was read by Mrs. E C. Ross, of Birmingham. A paper—"Whose Responsibility is the Greater, the Mother or the Teacher?" Mrs. S. H. Koyton read a well prepared paper; Mrs. Seabrooks not being present, the mother's side was discussed by Mrs. Pollard, who made an instructive talk on the subject.

Professor Hudson asked Dr. Dinkins "What is it to train a child!" Dr. Dinkins replied: "To train is to teach him obedience—obedience is one of heaven's first laws; teach the child to be respectful, prompt, industrious, economical; don't let the children spend money for every trifle; teach them to study God's word, be truthful; keep them from the neighbors' children if

they are not good and desirable ones for them to associate with."

Miss Gibbs read several references from the Bible. Revs.

Bradford and Boatwright and Prof. Hudson made timely remarks.

Reading of letters from societies followed. The Committee

on New Bodies reported. (See Report).

A letter was read from the Union District Convention asking that the \$6.00 sent go to make their president, Mrs. L. C. Walton, a life member of the Convention. Some thought this a bad precedent to set, but by motion Mrs. Walton was made a life member of the Convention. A collection of 77 cents was taken up. Adjourned to meet at 8 p. m.

Night Session.

The Convention reassembled at 8 o'clock with President Mrs. E. W. Pollard presiding. Music was rendered by the choir. Rev. N. P. Anderson led in prayer. Rev. S. M. Fisher read the 116th Psalm. Text: "I will walk oh Lord in the land of the

living." Theme: Christian walking. The sermon was well prepared and all present felt benefited by it.

"Oh, for a Thousand Tongues to Sing" was sung. Prayer by Rev. S. M. Hall. Prof. Hudson then introduced Rev. M. Dodona, a native African, who, through the influence of the Carey Missionary Society of Selma, came 10,000 miles to study the Gospel. He said when he shall have finished he will return and carry the Gospel to his people in Africa. He gave a nice talk upon "Civilized and Uncivilized People." "Over the Ocean Wave" was sung and he received a donation of \$7.10. The Convention collections was \$2.16.

The committee receiving money from contestants reported, See Report), and the first prize, a gold medal, was awarded to the Missionary Society of Sixteenth Street Church, Birmingham; the second prize, given by Rev. Deyampert was awarded the Sisters' Bible Band, of Mobile, represented by Miss Minnie G. Gibbs.

Rev. Deyampert was requested to preach to-morrow at 1 p. m., if time permitted. Benediction by Rev. S. M. Fisher.

Third Day-Morning Session.

BESSEMER. ALA., June 28, 1900.

The Convention assembled at 10 o'clock. Devotional exercises were conducted by Sisters Lizzie Savage and Charity Brooks. A number of fervent prayers were offered. The Scripture lesson was read by the President. She then asked that we give attention to the work of the Convention to-day, as we were behind with the business and much work was to be done.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved.

Rev. N. P. Anderson said he was not satisfied with the contemplated consolidation of the Era and Students' Voice. Sister Sallie Brown, of Jenifer, said the brothers ought to keep quiet and let the sisters do the talking. Mrs. Cordelia. Taylor moved that we reconsider that part of the report referring to the Woman's Era. The motion was carried, A very heated discussion of the Era followed. Mrs. C. L. Fisher, of Birmingham, made a motion that the Era be run another year as formerly. The motion prevailed. Sister Pollard asked Sisters Fisher and Burwell

to take subscriptions for the Era; \$17.75 was collected from subscribers, and quite a number pledged themselves to work for the paper by getting subscriptions. Letters from societies were read by Sister Burwell. The committee on Foreign Mission work reported. (See Report). Miss Rosa Miles spoke of her work. She asked the Convention to pay half a month's salary of Brother Jackson, superintendent of mission work in South Africa; she said the dollars were made round to keep rolling around, and asked that some be rolled to Africa to dispel the darkness. Several gave a dollar; \$7.02 was raised, and Sister H. C. Miller moved that the Convention make the donation \$25.00 for Brother Jackson. It was so ordered.

Mrs. A. J. Jordan made an excellent talk on "What Would Jesus Do." She said she wanted it known that none of the societies of the Mt. Pilgrim Association gave, hoping to receive a prize, and that she did not understand that the Sixteenth Street Society was contesting for a prize. Sister C. S. Brooks, of Montgomery, spoke of her district's jail work. Sisters Miller, Wright and Smith also spoke of this work. The President appointed Sisters Miller, Brooks, Smith, Savage Kirksey and Jenkins a committee on jail work. Sister Watts, of Tuscaloosa, spoke.

Sisters Shaw, Maddox and Jordan were appointed a committee to investigate the work of the graded school at Fitzpatrick. The President appointed the following committee to name members of the Executive Board: Sisters Miles, Jones and Seabrooks. The committee reported and the report was adopted. (See Report).

A motion prevailed to give \$25.00 to Selma University.

Committee on Jail Work reported which report was adopted. (See Report).

Committee on Accounts and Claims reported that no claims or accounts had been presented to them.

By motion it was decided to pay the Corresponding Secretary \$2.50 for services. On motion the Recording Secretary is to receive \$12.00 for services. Adjourned.

Sunday-Fourth Day-Morning Session.

BESSEMER, ALA., June 24, 1900.

Sunday School mass meeting was conducted by Sisters Armstead, of Montgomery, and Amy Horn. Several of the sisters made interesting talks. Collection \$2.25.

Mrs. A. J. Gray, of Talladega, conducted the devotional exercises at 11 o'clock. A number of earnest prayers were made.

Revs. Bibb and Dickerson ascended the rostrum and Rev. Bibb read the Scripture lesson and Rev. Dickerson read from Titus 2nd chapter. He selected for his text the 90th Psalm, 4th verse. His sermon was practical, containing many truths. After the sermon Rev. W. Justin Waytes, B. D., of Marion, made some interesting remarks concerning the women of the State. "Man cannot exist where woman does not exist; man may build a ladder of thought in mid air and climb step by step until he reaches the tor thereof, but if the influence of woman is not there man cannot live there." Sister Mollie Hicks, of Evergreen led in the beautiful song, "Let Your Light Shine;" prayer by Rev. C. L. Scott, of C. M. E. church. The choir rendered excellent music, after which the good people of Bessemer gave \$5.10. Sisters Armstead and Shaw spoke of how nicely the people of Bessemer had entertained the Convention. Benediction by Rev. Dixon.

Afternoon Session.

The Convention reassembled at 8 o'clock. Devotional exercised and memorial services were conducted by Mrs. A. J. Gray, of Talladega. A solo was sung by Mrs. M. E. Duncan: "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross;" followed by prayer by Miss Knapp-A portion of the 20th and 21st chapters of Revelations were read "Come Ye Disconsolate," "Go Bury Thy Sorrows" and "My Jesus Loves Me" were sung.

. The Committee on Obituary reported. The life of Sister Ellen Moore, of Eufaula, was the first one spoken of. She was

a good woman; also Sister Brazier, of Eufaula, who was nearly 100 years old at the time of her death, was remembered by the Eufaula sisters for her goodness and exemplary life. Sister Lou Jackson was presented and was spoken of as having been a faithful-worker. Sister Roxie Harris, of Selma, and Sister Edwards, of Uniontown, were next spoken of by the sisters. Sister Bettie Riley, of Birmingham, was spoken of in loving terms by Sisters Harris, Gray, Pettiford, Bowie and Dr. Pettiford. The next name presented was that of Mrs. Lula C. Hudson, of Selma, who at the time of her death was our beloved Treasurer, Many were the loving tributes paid her memory by Sisters Sullivan, Mosely. Pitts, Pollard, Ross, Dr. Dinkins, Rev. Ross, Dr. Pettiford and They said she was sincere, faithful, full of sunshine and gentle. Prof. Hudson asked that we pray for him that he might rear their child in the right way. Mrs. Burwell asked the prayers of the Convention that she may be the Christian her sister Sisters Maria Brown, of Randolph, and Jenkins, of Sumterville, were next spoken of as being true Christian workers; also Sisters Nancy King and Thomas Ware. Rev. Wyates, of Marion, read a resolution bearing upon the memory of our departed ones. The resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions.) The report coming from the Committee on Obituaries was adopted. (See Report.)
