

CONSTITUTION

Baptist Women's State Convention.

Article I. This body shall be known as the Baptist Women's State Convention.

Article II. Object. The object of this Convention shall be to promote the cause of Christ by laboring for the up-building of the Alabama Baptist University and by doing such mission work as possible.

Article III. Membership. Any woman's society whose members are connected with a regular Baptist church, and women in good standing in their churches, may become members of this organization.

- 2. Any woman in good standing in the Baptist church may become a life member by the payment of \$5.00, or an annual member by the payment of \$1.00. All societies are requested to send annually to the convention ten cents per member.
- 3. Any male member in good standing in the Baptist church may be received as an honorary life member by paying \$5.00, or an annual member by paying \$1.00.
- 4. No society shall send a male member to the convention; none but women shall be allowed to vote or hold office.

Article IV. Officers-

- 1. The officers of this convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer and a board consisting of fourteen members.
- 2. The President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer shall perform the duties which usually fall to said officers in similar bodies.
- Art. V. Board. The board of fourteen members, including the officers of the Convention, shall have the power to carry out the object

of the Convention and in general do anything necessary to secure the full and complete organization of the women of the State; provided, always, that they conform to the constitution. The Board shall have its headquarters at Selma, and five members shall constitute a quorum

Article VI. Annual meetings. This convention shall meet annually on Thursday before the Fourth Lord's Day in June.

Article VII. This Constitution can be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote.

BY-LAWS.

This Constitution shall be governed by such by-laws as usually govern religious bodies.

PROCEEDINGS.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., June 20, 1901.

The Sixteenth Annual Session of the Women's Baptist State Convention assembled in the African Baptist Church, Rev. W. C. Bradford pastor.

President Mrs. E. W. Pollard called the meeting to order. Sisters Miller and Lucas conducted the devotional exercises. "All Hail the power of Jesus' name" was sung. A series of prayers followed, led by Sister Miller, who prayed earnestly for the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit during the meeting. Mrs. Lucas read for the scripture lesson 27th Psalm. After singing, the informal Conference followed, in which many expressed themselves as wishing for a peaceful and profitable session. The corresponding secretary read the program; after supplying the places of absent ones it was adopted. The president appointed the following committees.

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION—Miss Edwards, Uniontown; Mrs. Martin, Perry county; Miss McMillan, Talladega; Miss Johnson, Eufaula; Mrs. Davis, Opelika.

ENROLLMENT-Miss Malissa Roberts, Mrs. Barnett.

NEW BODIES—Mesdames Jones, Duncan, Sullivan, Hunnicut, Conner, Wright, Goldsby.

FINANCE-Mrs. Lilcas, Mrs. Rebecca Pitts, Miss M. Leftwich.

REDUCED RATES—Mrs. Wright, Mr. Hudson, Rev. DeYampert, TO SELL BUTTONS—Mrs. Goldsby, Mrs. Burwell, Miss Mc-Creary.

Enrollment followed.

A motion prevailed that a button and piece of white ribbon be sold for 10 cents as convention badges.

We next listened to the reading of letters from different societies, also a very interesting communication from Anti-Saloon League of Washington, D. C., which was referred to the following committee: On Temperance—Mesdames Pettiford, Miller, Walton. Announcements. Adjournment.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 4:45, with Sisters Boothe and Jones conducting praise service. Ninetieth psalm was read by Mrs. Jones. A number of prayers followed.

Mrs. R. E. Pitts took the chair. A communication from Dr. Boothe was read.

The report of the ex-Board was read by Mrs. Wright and adopted The Treasurer's Report was adopted (see report). Prof. by sections. Hudson was asked to look up \$4.00 sent by Bibb County District Association and not mentioned in report. Report of the Sewing Teacher was adopted (see report). The Report of the Baptist Woman's Era was adopted. The editor having resigned, a motion prevailed that the resignation be accepted; but Prof. Hudson suggested that a committee be appointed to consider the resignation, and the following were appointed on said committee: Mesdames Pitts, Jordan and Johnson. A letter of grievance was read from Sister Eason. Sisters Boothe, Harris and Brown were appointed to consider it, and recommended that the society represented by Sister Eason be admitted, which was done. Sisters DeYampert and Walton were asked to look up the basket lost at Bessemer; they reported the basket had been found and taken care of by Mrs. Bowie. A vote of thanks were tendered Mrs. Bowie for her kindness. Mrs. Boothe read a letter from Mrs. Dinkins, stating that she had done all she could for the advancement of the work during the year. Committee on New Bodies rendered its report (see report). Adjournment.

EVENING SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 8:15, with Sisters Winston and Johnson conducting the praise service. Matthew, 22nd chapter, was read by Sister Winston. The president not having arrived Mrs. Pitts presided.

On motion, Mrs. C, M. Wells was placed on the Nominating Committee in the place of Mrs. Johnson of Eufaula, as it was reported that Mrs. Johnson had been called home by the sad intelligence of the death of her father. "How lovely is Zion" and another anthem were rendered by the Tuscaloosa choir to the delight of all. After which Mrs. S. H. Koyton, in eloquent words, welcomed us to the historic City of Oaks and to the homes of its citizens. Mrs. Burwell responded in a way pleasing and entertaining to all. "Drifting with the tide" was sung by Mrs. Sullivan of Selma, which was much enjoyed.

The president then delivered her annual address. In beginning she said she felt honored to deliver to us her seventh annual address. The address was instructive and entertaining. A motion prevailed to

have it printed in the minutes. (By request of the president it was not printed.) "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," was sung, and Rev. DeYampert announced that it afforded him no little pleasure to stand before the Convention in the capacity of preacher. He announced as his text, Hebrews, 8:5, "Make everything according to the pattern." After a good practical sermon prayer was offered by Rev. Boatwright. Collection amounted to \$6.05. Prof. Barnes and Hudson announced that the Conventiou would be allowed to visit the Asylum at 2:00 p. m. tomorrow. The Convention agreed to do so. At this juncture Mrs. C. O. Boothe, of Selma, read a well prepared petition to the Constitutional Convention being held at Montgomery, asking that body not to deprive our husbands and sons of the right of suffrage. The petition received the indorsement of the Convention and all of the members were asked to sign the same. The Committee on Permanent Orgnization recommended the following as officers of the Convnetion: President, Mrs. E. W. Pollard; Vice President, Mrs. Lula C. Johnson; Recording Secretary, Mrs. E. C. Ross; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. S. H. Wright; Treasurer, Mrs. L. R. Burwell. A motion was made that the name of Mrs. S. H. Wright be inserted for President instead of Mrs. Pollard. Mrs. Wright declined, and after some discussion the report of the committee was adopted as read. (See report.) On motion the names of Mrs. Seabrooks and Mrs. Gray were taken off the Ex-Board, as too many had been elected to compose the Board. Miss Foster, Miss Phillips and Miss Penn were appointed to assure the sympathy of the Convention to Miss Johnson in her bereavement, owing to the death of her father.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., June 21, 1901.

The Women's Baptist State Convention assembled in its second day's session at 9 o'clock. Praise service was conducted by Sisters Davis of Opelika and Brocks of Montgomery. Mrs. Boothe read and explained Acts, II Chapter, for the scripture lesson. The journal of the previous day was read by the secretary and approved. It was decided that we have no sermon today since Rev. Madison, who was to preach, is not present. It was decided by motion to arrange a time for Miss Foster, treasurer of the Women's Convention auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, to address us concerning her work. Revs. Haynes, Morrow, Foster, Byrd, Crawford and Prof. Barnes were introduced and speke a few words, also Rev. S. L. Martin, who said he was a Baptist by conviction, hence a full fiedged Baptist.

A motion prevailed to have a prayer service for ten minutes, praying for the success of the petition to be presented the Constitutional Convention. Mrs. Boothe read the petition, and for ten minutes many earnest prayers were offered, beseeching the Heavenly Father for the preservence and protection of the rights of our husbands and sons, and

deliverance from the impending evil.

Prof. Wells made a plea for the New Chapel, followed by a paper full of good thoughts by Mrs. R. E. Pitts, which was discussed by Mrs. M. A. Goldsby, who said she had traveled sixty-five miles in interest of the Chapel Rally. Reading of letters was resumed. Mrs. Wells spoke on the work of Woman's auxiliary to the National Convention, and a motion prevailed to indorse the work. The Convention adjourned to allow the members to visit the Insane Asylum, and requested that all reassemble at 5 p. m.

AFTERNÖON SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 5:25. Praise service was conducted by Sisters Balum of Gainsville and DeYampert. Scripture lesson: Matthew, 18th chapter, read by Sister Balum.

The president nor vice-president being present, an opportunity was

given members to sign the petition and a recess was taken.

EVENING SESSION.

The Convention was called to order at 7 o'clock by the president, who with Mrs. Walton conducted the praise service.

A paper, "The Twentieth Century Missionary Society," was read by Miss Kate Bowen of Waugh, Ala. The paper was indeed excellent and all present not only enjoyed it, but felt inspired to do more mission work than ever. "Throw Out the Life Line" was sung. Quite a discussion followed upon the paper and Prof. Wells offered to print three thousand copies of the paper.

Prof. Hudson introduced Rev. M. Dodona, who addressed the Convention. A collection was called for him. Amount received \$1.88. A motion prevailed to make the amount \$5.00. The following committees were appointed. Committee on resolutions: Prof. Hudson, Misses

The Corresponding Secretary was asked to write to Mrs. Bibb and collect for two aprons.

A motion prevailed to give time tomorrow for some white ladies to speak, who had expressed a desire to visit the Convention.

Dr. Dinkins, president of Selma University, spoke to us of his recent visit to Boston, and how glad he was to be with us. We next listened to an address on the B. Y. P. U. work, by Mrs. A. A. Bowie, followed by Prof. Hudson upon the same subject. A collection of \$1.95 was taken up, and on motion a donation of \$5.00 was given this work.

Mrs. C. M. Wells of Montgomery, made a strong plea on behalf of African Mission work. Mrs. Shaw spoke along the same line, after which Miss Susie V. Foster of Montgomery, treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, spoke of our duty to that work. A donation of \$10.00 was given Mrs. Wells for Foreign Mission work. Rev. J. C. Samuel of the A. M. E. Church, was introduced.

A motion prevailed, owing to the lateness of the hour, to have no sermon tonight. Announcements. Benediction.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., June 22, 1901.

The Convention assembled at 9 o'clock. Sisters Phillips and Conner conducted Praise Service. Vice-president, Miss Nellie Johnson presided. The journal of the previous day was read and approved.

Sisters Brooks of Montgomery and Lewis of Greenville spoke of the work they had done in visiting jails, etc. A collection of \$2.06 was given for jail work. Dr. Dinkins read a letter bearing on the petition to be presented the Constitutional Convention.

Mrs Donald and Mrs. Allen, two distinguished ladies of Tuscaloosa, were introduced and made eloquent addresses. They said they were delighted to be present and listen to our papers and hear of the work we were doing. They spoke many encouraging words.

Mrs. C. O. Boothe of Selma then read an exceedingly eloquent paper on "The work of the Fireside School." The Corresponding Secretary

read a communication from Miss J. P. Moore of Nashville, and was asked to reply to same. On motion Mrs. Boothe's and Miss Bowen's papers were ordered printed in Guide No. 3. The report of the Committee on State Mission Work was read and refered back to the Committee. The report of the Committee on Temperance was adopted. Mrs. Cousins of Entaw read a good paper, "How to interest our young women in mission work." A vote of thanks was voted Rev. A. N. Mc-Ewen of Mobile for a donation of \$5.60 from his church and Sunday-school.

Mrs. S. H. Wright of Montgomery was unanimously elected editor of the Baptist Woman's Era, and subscriptions were taken by her for the paper.

A motion prevailed that all printing ordered done under the auspices of this Convention, save Minutes, for the next year, be sent to the editor of the Era for publication.

Professor Hudson was asked to prepare a resolution thanking the retiring editor for service done.

It was carried that the President be sent as a delegate to the National Convention at Cincinnati.

A letter from Sumterville was given the treasurer to collect the donation spoken of.

One dollar and eighty-four cents was given Sister Francis Cowan of Union Springs, who lost her pocketbook.

The president said the board had decided before this meeting to have Guide No. 3 printed. Quite an animated discussion followed. A motion finally prevailed that Guide No. 3 be not printed. Mrs. Burwell made a motion that the Woman's Era state that Guide No. 3 would not be printed, so that the sisters would not be writing to her for it. The motion prevailed.

The report coming from the Committee on Devotions was read and adopted. See report.

The Committee on Time and Place reported having received invitations from the societies of Talladega, Sumpter, Evergreen and Eufaula, and recommended that the next session of the convention be held at Eufaula with the First Baptist Church. The report called forth much discussion but was finally adopted.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The convention met at 4:45, with Miss E. M. Foster and Miss Jessie Wilson conducting devotional exercises.

Committee on Foreign Missions and Committee on Accounts and Claims made reports which were adopted. (See reports.)

Rev. Bailey of the C. M. E. Church was introduced.

"An Hour with the Children" was conducted by Mrs. J. Winn of

Eufaula, which all enjoyed very much. One dollar was given the sisters, who said they had to pay board while here.

On motion, it was ordered to pay the secretary \$12.00 for service,

and to give to Rev. Calaway \$2.50.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., June 23, 1901. Sunday, 9:30 o'clock.

The Sunday-School Mass Meeting was conducted by Mesdames Bowie and Wright. The Sunday-School lesson was taught by Dr. Dinkins. Remarks by the superintendent of school followed.

A collection of \$4.05 was taken up for the convention.

11 o'clock—"Holy, Holy," was sung by the choir. Rev. W. C. Bradford read 34th Psalm as the scripture lesson. Prayer by Dr. Dinkins. Rev. S. L. Martin was then introduced by Dr. Dinkins and took for his text Nehemiah 2-20: "The God of heaven he will prosper us." Theme—Race Building. The sermon was indeed scholarly, and was pronounced by all as being the sermon of the convention. On motion of Mrs. Bowie, a synopsis of the sermon was ordered to be printed. Collection \$5.00. The corresponding secretary was asked to write the society represented by Sister Eason. Benediction by Rev. W. C. Bradford.

EVENING SESSION.

6 o'clock—The devotional exercises were conducted by Sisters Keith and Sullivan. After which the memorial service was conducted by Mrs. R. A. Williams of Tuscaloosa.

The report of the Committee on Obituaries was adopted, and the following who had passed from labor to reward were spoken of with tender and loving expressions: Sister Rosa Thomas, Mrs. Youman

A motion prevailed that a memorial window be placed in the new chapel to be erected in honor of the deceased officers of the convention. On motion, all money took up at memorial services be reserved for said window. Collection \$1.00.

Reports coming from Committee on Resolutions and the State Mission Work were adopted.

On motion, that hereafter no donations be made until after the Finance Committee make report, and that said committee be requested to make a daily report.

SEWING TEACHER'S REPORT.

Following is report of the Sewing Department for the year begining October, 1900, and ending May, 1901.

In begining the work this year I found only two machines I could use and six in need of repairing, two dozen thimbles, one dress form, four tables, one work case, quilt scraps, ten unfinished quilts, and four window shades. I found the work to be very interesting and pleasant this year, and as a teacher I endeavored to do my whole duty. By the help of God and through the kindness of friends, namely: Miss A. A. Morgan; I received from the Torre Haute Missionary Band, squares for two quilts, one spool of thread, four ball of darning cotton and eight yards of calico. Through Mrs. Dr. Tyler, one pair of pillow shams. Through Mrs. L. L. Burwell, two yards of white bleaching and 25 cents for sewing. Through Professor Councill, one sewing machine. Through the mail, squares for four quilts. From Mrs. Dinkins, 2 papers of needles and 1 yard of domestic. Mrs. R. T. Pollard, 25 cents. Mrs. Walter of Snow Hill, Ala., 10 cents. Mr. Jennison 10 cents. From Mrs. B. D. Miller of Montgomery, 8 yards of calico and two bunches of

finishing braid. Money Received for Work in Sewing Room—October, \$1.10. November, \$1.20. December, not any. January, not any. February, not any. March, \$25.35. April, \$2.05. May, \$5.00 for robes. Total \$34.70. Garments Sold by Friends: namely, Mrs. Walton, amount to \$1.80. By Miss Ella Cooker, amount to \$2.25 Aprons sold by Mrs. Violet Jackson, amount to \$4.15. Aprons sold by sewing teacher, amount to \$2.00. Total \$10.65. Money received in sewing room, \$34.70. \$34.70 and 10.65 amount to \$44.90—grand total received.


