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CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER

Article I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Home and Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

Article II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Home and Foreign Mission Convention shall be the fostering of the kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with our Northern and Southern Missionary Societies, and all bodies in fellowship with this Convention, or who may hereafter come into fellowship with it.

Article III.

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, one Vice-President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statistical Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually, and serve until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall perform the usual duties of such officers.

Sec. 2. There shall be elected annually two Boards, a Home Board and a Foreign Board, of each of which the officers shall be ex-officio members; each of which Boards shall be composed of nine members and an additional member from each State and Territory represented. The Home Board shall have charge of the home work of the Convention, and the Foreign Board shall have charge of the foreign work, both on the home and foreign fields.

Sec. 3. The Home Board and the Foreign Board shall together constitute the Executive Board of the Convention, which latter Board shall represent the Convention when not in session. The Foreign Board shall be located with a quorum at Richmond, Va.,

and the Home Board with a quorum shall be located at Raleigh, N. C.

Sec. 4. The Convention shall meet annually on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September, at a place provided by the body or Board, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Article IV—Membership.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organizations may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of five dollars per delegate. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by payment of one dollar, and a life member by the payment of ten dollars at one payment.

Article V.

Visitors may be invited to seats, but not to vote.

Article VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches or the leaders.

Article VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the Treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention, a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER

Art. 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises, and closed by benediction or prayer.

Art. 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its deliberations.

Art. 2. Enrollment of delegates.

Art. 4. Appointment of committees.

Art. 5. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body, and shall not be at liberty to

absent themselves without permission from the chair.

Art. 6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes, nor more than once on the same subject till all have spoken who may wish to speak, without permission from the house.

Art. 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed, and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Art. 8. Reading and conversation by the members in their seats not allowed during the meeting of this body.

This constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months' notice having been given; and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

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PROCEEDINGS

Washington, D. C., September 3rd, 1919.

The Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention was called to order in the Third Baptist Church by the President Dr. C. S. Brown at 10 o'clock A. M.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. A. Mial and Dr. G. W. Moore. After singing "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood," etc. Dr. Moore read the 23rd Psalm. Rev. Mial led in prayer. The hymn "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less Than Jesus Blood and Righteousness" was sung.

In announcing the session ready for the transaction of business, the President said, "The conditions under which we meet are very auspicious and this bids fair to be the greatest session in the history of the Convention." A committee on enrollment was appointed. While the membership of the Convention was being enrolled the choir furnished several beautiful selections.

The Committee on Finance was announced and called to duty. After which addresses of welcome were delivered as follows:

Hon. Brownlow, one of the commissioners of the city, spoke words of welcome for the city. He said in part: "In behalf of the capitol of your nation I bid you a hearty welcome. If there is any one part of the various phases of denominational work worth while it is the foreign mission field. I have traveled in many foreign countries including parts of Africa and Asia and observed the work of various denominations. It is perfectly wonderful what has been accomplished for the natives in many of these countries. I would mention especially the work in Egypt where the Coptic church is being revived and Abyssinia where marvelous success is being achieved. I can speak with equal emphasis of the successful work in India, Ceylon, Burmah and China.

It is almost impossible for you to conceive of the good your money is doing in foreign fields. You have my hearty wishes for a most successful convention."

Rev. Dr. W. H. Brooks spoke in behalf of the Baptists of Washington and vicinity. He said among other things: "It affords me no ordinary pleasure to extend to you the welcome of the Baptists of Washington and vicinity. As you and I are Baptists and have one common Lord, it would be impossible for me to do otherwise than rejoice at your coming. I am wonderfully pleased with the personnel of the convention. I realize I am standing in the presence of the best of the people whom you represent. You have observed in all your session, 'Let all things be done decently and in order.' I recognize you as a body of men and women of self sacrifice. All of your membership seems to be imbued with that spirit, the spirit not to get but to give. You are interested in Africa and Haiti. The Baptists have been interested in Africa for more than a hundred years. You have now taken on Haiti. I have asked my church to put \$100 in your treasury. It is worthy of the admiration of all men that 75 per cent of your money goes into the foreign field. May God prosper your work every where that He opens the field for you."

Rev. Jos. H. Leo welcomed the convention in behalf of the Pastors Conference of Washington and the District. "I want," he said, "to bring to you the most hearty welcome of the Pastors Conference. Not only as Christians but as courageous Christians, living as Christians every day, I welcome you. It takes that kind of courage to stand for what is highest and best. God cannot use a moral coward. There are times when we must stand alone for God contending for righteousness and for the Master's kingdom. We feel that you who are here have gained a vision of the need of the great work in extending His kingdom. We welcome you to all of the social affairs, spiritual uplift and intellectual events of the city."

The above addresses were responded to by Rev. Dr. A. J. Payne of Western Pa. "It gives me great pleasure to be affiliated with God's chosen workers. The above addresses show that the people here are not sleeping, not even dozing. The pastors Conference seems to be in accord with what we are doing, carrying to all parts of the world the life and love of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In behalf of the Convention, I accept the welcome given by you. We are here on business for the Lord. I have lived long enough to know when an organization can and will do the work of the Lord; and, I am glad to say, this convention can do, will do, and does do the work for which it was organized."

After a beautiful anthem by the choir, welcome in behalf of the various denominations was extended by Prof. John R. Hawkins. "I realize that there are gathered here men and women who have done something and are going out to help others. I am glad for that reason to be with you. The thing closest to our hearts is the work and the spirit for which you have come. You do not come to make Washington better but to get hope, inspiration and courage. Your convention stands for helping others always, everywhere and in a whole-hearted manner. God has put in us a spiritual part so that when the physical part fails the divine will save us. Turn loose the evils in us and the world will be lost; but the love that God has given us makes us help to save the world. The one law for all men, for all nations, is the law of love and that is why I welcome you here today."

On behalf of the business men of the city Mr. J. W. Lewis addressed the convention. He said, "There are about 12,000,000 colored people in the United States. So far they have not given very much attention to the financial and industrial side of life. While they should be loyal and faithful in their service to God, they should not neglect the material side of life. As they earn and save they will become more of a fac-

tor in the community life; and will thus be in position to demand and get better treatment from the community."

Miss Mabel R. Williams spoke in behalf of the ladies of the city. "We, the ladies of Washington, welcome you to the city. It is a blessing that you zealous men and women have heeded the call to help the heathen. Success must be yours. May you labor on and accomplish much."

On behalf of the press the welcome was extended by Editor J. W. Wilson of the Eagle. "It gives me great pleasure," he said, "to welcome you to the city. We pen-pushers have a great mission to perform in this country as you have in the foreign fields. I present to you the key to the Washington Eagle office. We know you are here for the good of this convention and our latch-string is on the outside. Any favor that the press can render you, that favor is yours."

Rev. Dr. G. O. Bullock, the pastor spoke on behalf of the Third Baptist Church. He said, "I am sure you feel welcome after hearing the addresses already made. We have been looking forward to your coming for the past twelve months. You have labored faithfully for twenty-two years and have met your obligations to the missionaries. You have not been discouraged over failures or elated over success. Each victory helps you others to win. Last year you went to Rocky Mount with \$11,000. This year you come with \$25,000 of which this church gives \$650. We welcome you to our church, our homes and the best we have."

Responses on behalf of the Convention were given by Rev. D. L. Cosby and Dr. C. C. Somerville. "I have a task unlike that of those who have preceded me," said Dr. Cosby, "I appear as sponsor for the convention and I am delighted to be sponsor for one of the greatest Conventions the world ever held."

He made pleasing and pointed references to the addresses of welcome delivered by the various speakers.

and interesting style. He pointed out the principles for which the Convention stands; and, the great accomplishments of the Convention and its larger future undertakings.

Rev. Dr. I. J. Hailey, a representative of the Southern Baptist Convention was presented to the Convention. He was very cordially received. He said he had five boys who fought to win the victory in the great world war. "We have a greater war to win," he said, "I cannot stop to tell you how great are the difficulties to be overcome. There is something in the nature of righteousness you should have. I cannot disentangle it but you should have it. You and I have nothing to do with your coming here. It will be poor business for you and me to go through this world walking backwards. In coming here, you received a country, a language, a religion; and, if this is a true religion, let us stand by its principles. Race lines have their significance only so far as God recognizes it. In Acts is said, "Out of one blood God created all nations," etc. God's hand is in this and we should try to cooperate with God." He spoke of his long and continuous efforts to get the Southern White Baptists to establish a university of first grade for the colored people. "Your young men and women should have the best. When the matter finally came to the convention there were only two opposing votes. That the University will be established is now a fact. Of the \$75,000,000 now being raised by the Southern White Baptists, funds for the university are provided for."

A vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Hailey for his inspiring address.

A motion to cooperate with the Southern Convention in the support of the projected University was referred to the Executive Board.

Committees on Organization, resolutions, temperance, place of next meeting and new bodies were ap-

pointed.

The convention adjourned with benediction by Dr. Spiller.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The president called the convention to order at 3:30. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. L. E. Kaiser and Rev. G. E. Sally. After singing, Rev. Sally read the 28th chapter of Matt. Dr. E. E. Ricks offered prayer. There followed a service of song and prayer in which many brethren took part. At the close of this service the president called to the chair Dr. F. W. Williams, Vice President from Virginia, who in turn presented the president to deliver his annual address.

The address of the President was comprehensive, pointed and instructive and delivered with force and effectiveness. Attention was called to the great loss sustained in the deaths of Rev. A. Binga, D. D., who through all of the history of the convention was a faithful supporter and adviser; and to Rev. Dr. W. M. Alexander who for 22 years was the faithful corresponding secretary of the convention. The address contains an extensive review of the work being done on the West coast and in South Africa and Haiti, the news from all these fields being very encouraging. Five specific recommendations were made by the President. (See address.)

At the conclusion of the address the audience sang "Over the Ocean Wave." A committee on the address of the President was appointed. (See committees.)

Dr. J. C. Taulton who could not be present owing to illness sent congratulations and one dollar for annual membership.

The President announced the receipt of a telegram from Col. J. H. Young of Raleigh, N. C., stating that he had sent to the convention as a personal donation, \$50.

Rev. B. Elliott, pastor of the Sharon Baptist Church, Baltimore, the church formerly pastored by Corre-

sponding Secretary, Dr. W. M. Alexander, was presented to the convention. He spoke of the prosperity of the church, mentioning among other things that 125 members had been added to the church and \$7000 paid on the church debt. He had impressed upon the members to give and not beg for missions. As a result they were able to lay \$250 upon the table of the Lott Carey Convention.

Miss Ada Morton, editor of the paper "Hope" was introduced to the convention. She mentioned the two fold work of Sister Joanna P. Moore, the Fireside School work and Hope. Her remarks were both encouraging and helpful.

After some announcements the convention adjourned with benediction by Rev. N. B. Brown.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

The session began at 8:00, the President presiding.

Several beautiful selections were rendered by the choir. Rev. Dr. C. Fox was introduced and made some very timely and encouraging remarks. He said he has the highest opinion of the earnestness and efficiency of the Lott Carey Convention. His church, he said, is not representing at this session, but he could say with positiveness that it would in future.

The President announced that the annual sermon would be preached by Rev. P. J. Wallace, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Norfolk, Va. Rev. Wallace was accompanied in the pulpit by Rev. A. Hobbs and Rev. W. D. Jarvis. After singing hymn No. 521, Rev. Hobbs read the first 27 verses of the 2nd chapter of Acts. Rev. Jarvis led in prayer. The choir rendered a selection.

Dr. Wallace used as a text the 17th verse of the 54th chapter of Isaiah. Subject: "The Success of the Church."

He said the text declares all opposition to the church shall fail. God Himself is the leader of it. The utter failure of all powers against the church is contained in the prophecy spoken at the time of the

fall of man when it was declared that the seed of the woman shall bruise the serpent's head. In one period of Egyptian history it seemed that the church would be crushed. In the extremity God caused the waters of the Red Sea to roll back and make a pathway for his people, the rock gave forth water to quench their thirst and the church went marching on. In a hundred ways devious methods have been worked out to destroy the church but the greater the efforts put forth to destroy it the more the church prospered. Many volumes have been written against the church. These volumes are now forgotten and their authors have gone the way of the earth. The church still lives and is multiplying. The mission of the church. These volumes are now forgotten and of the world can not effect or hinder its winning and saving influence. God holds all things in His hands; the church, therefore, must be successful. The church does not need more nor a different kind of leaders. It needs more loyal following on the part of those who claim membership in the church. The church succeeds because God furnishes the standard and He is its authority. The Bible is our rule and practice.

At the close of the sermon the choir led in chanting the Lord's prayer.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Wallace for his instructive and inspiring sermon.

A collection of \$154.51 was taken for missions.

Mrs. E. S. Means of Baltimore sung several selections and a collection of \$13.25 was given her.

Announcements and the convention adjourned with benediction by Dr. G. D. Wharton.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The convention was called to order at 10:00.

Rev. W. B. Crawford and Rev. J. J. Bowling conducted devotional exercises.

The audience sang "Come Holy Spirit Heavenly Dove." Rev. Bowling read a part of the 2nd chapter

of Acts and offered prayer. Song and prayer service followed in which many took part.

The minutes of Wednesday's sessions were read and approved.

The Executive Board reported through the Secretary, Bro. Nelson Williams. (See report). It was voted that the report be adopted subject to such facts as may develop.

Rev. Dr. J. N. Jeter was presented. He spoke in behalf of the Pastors and Laymen humane Movement, an organization designed to work for uplift and betterment of the young people of the race, especially those of the cities.

Resolutions by Dr. Davis and others were referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Rev. Dr. M. A. Tally, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Selma, Ala., submitted some very timely remarks. At the conclusion of his talk Dr. Tally presented his church for membership in the convention. The church was cordially received.

The Committee on reorganization submitted its report which was adopted. (See report.)

Through Dr. W. T. Johnson, the First Baptist church of South Richmond sent \$25.00 for a scholarship in our mission in West Africa, the amount to be continued from year to year.

Rev. R. T. Reid, president of the Maryland Baptist State Convention was voted a life member, the convention having sent through him \$50.00 for missionary work.

Rev. Dr. J. E. Jackson, President of the New England Baptist Convention was presented. He commended the convention upon the large per cent of the money raised that is sent to the foreign fields. You represent the higher and spiritual freedom of all people. In that respect you have never been slaves. May God succeed you in your great work. I bring warm greetings from the New England Convention.

Brother Smiley favored the convention with a song.

According to program D. W. T. Johnson spoke words of consolation, encouragement and inspiration on the life of Dr. A. Binga, Jr., for more than forty years was pastor of the First Baptist Church of South Richmond. Dr. Binga was, first of all, an earnest, upright, devoted, faithful Christian man. Strong and positive yet gentle and sympathetic in character, scholarly in his attainments, wise and prudent in counsel. He was one of the prime movers in the organization of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. Forty years of success as pastor of one church is evidence of his ability as a pastor.

Dr. W. J. Howard in a very fitting and touching way, spoke of the life and work of Rev. W. M. Alexander, late corresponding secretary of the convention. Dr. Howard said they had known each other intimately from boyhood days so that he could speak with authority. From the time he was a young man, Dr. Alexander had an ambition and a high aspiration and a vision of great things. As a young man, he worked at different callings but always with one object in view, to prepare himself for the higher duties of life. He was a man of faith and aggressiveness. He was interested in every movement pertaining to the uplift and betterment of his race. He had the courage to follow his convictions. Many of the privileges of the people of his city are due in no inconsiderable part to the efforts of this man of God. For twenty-two years he was the faithful corresponding secretary of the convention. He was an honest man and faithful to duty. How well he did his work, the foreign field and you can testify.

Dr. Spiller also submitted some remarks on the lives of Dr. Binga and Dr. Alexander.

A motion that the eulogies pronounced upon the lives of Dr. Binga and Dr. Alexander by Dr. Johnson and Dr. Howard was referred to the Executive Board.

Bro. Smiley being called upon, sung another selection. A collection of \$17.37 was taken and given to

Brother Smiley.

The convention then adjourned, benediction by Dr. P. S. Lewis.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The convention came to order at 3:30. Rev. J. H. Lee and Rev. S. M. Robinson conducted devotional exercises. After singing Rev. Lee read some verses from the 17th chapter of John. Prayer was offered by Deacon Oldham. The audience sung "Pass Me Not, O, Gentle Savior."

The committee on new bodies made a partial report. Rev. C. H. D. Griffin pastor of the Central Baptist Church, Berkley, Va., sent to the Convention, a letter containing \$65.00—\$60 from the church and \$5.00 personal donation from himself.

Hon. John C. Dancy, formerly Recorder of Deeds of the District of Columbia, was introduced and made some very timely remarks.

Dr. J. M. Waldron addressed the convention on "Reconstruction and its effect upon Foreign Missions." After defining what is meant by "reconstruction," he said had the churches been true to Jesus Christ, there would not have been any world war. It has been demonstrated without a doubt that Roman Catholicism is a failure. No Baptist church in this day has a right to the name that is not a missionary church. God is calling upon the Negro to go forth and give other races a new view of Jesus, namely the true gospel of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. He called attention to the obstacles the British government put in the way of Negroes who are trying to carry the gospel to the darker races. He advised that a committee wait upon Congress and ask that this embargo be lifted. This is an age of big things and the Lott Carey Convention should get in the spirit of doing big things. The address met with general approval. "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," was sung.

A motion to appoint a committee to wait upon

Congress in reference to the fact that the British government is opposed to Negro missionaries going to South Africa to preach the gospel, was referred to the Executive Board.

Bishop I. N. Ross was presented and made a very interesting and touching address.

After which the convention adjourned with benediction by Dr. G. W. Moore.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock. After singing hymn "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less, than Jesus Blood and Righteousness," Rev. F. R. Mason offered prayer. The business of the day was taken up. Rev. C. C. Boone, M. D., returned missionary from Liberia, made some very interesting and instructive statements concerning our work in Africa.

Dr. G. E. Reid, the statistician, made his annual report. As usual the report was very comprehensive and full of information. A vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Reid for his report.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved that the constitution of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention be so amended as to require the corresponding secretary and the treasurer of the convention to make during the first week of each month in papers named by the board, detailed statements of all monies received by them.

Rev. Dr. Bennett of Jamaica was presented and spoke of the church activities of the Island; and of the misfortune that had overtaken many of the churches when their church buildings were destroyed by a storm a year ago. He is trying to raise money to help the churches rebuild.

The following brethren were introduced to the convention: Rev. E. Gholson, Rev. J. W. Faulk, Rev. S. A. Donnell, Rev. C. R. Murry, Rev. W. H. Hester, Rev. G. T. Terry. Some timely remarks were made by Rev. Gholson.

Rev. P. S. Lewis spoke on Missionary Propaganda. The address was carefully prepared and forcibly delivered.

Rev. R. J. Langston addressed the Convention on "How Best to Finance our Missionary Program." The address was full of suggestions. He recommended the following: (1) That a Lott Carey Day be observed by all the churches of the convention. (2) That each church be asked to make a foreign mission contribution every Sabbath.

The convention adjourned to meet at 3:00 P. M.

Benediction by Rev. H. C. D. Wilson.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Praise service was conducted by Dr. P. F. Maloy. After singing "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name," Dr. Maloy offered prayer which was followed by several songs and prayers.

The Committee on Resolutions reported through its chairman, Dr. C. C. Somerville. A motion prevailed that be considered by sections. (See report.)

The committee on place of next meeting reported through Prof. J. R. L. Diggs and recommended that the next session of the convention be held with the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Portsmouth, Va. The report was adopted.

Rev. W. A. Taylor, D. D., was presented to the convention. After words of encouragement on the part of Dr. Taylor it was unanimously voted that he become a member of the convention.

The following resolution offered by Dr. J. M. Waldron, was, after some discussion, adopted: Whereas many of the young people of Baptist churches belonging to this convention are members of C. E. Societies in said churches and are loyal in their support of their own churches and their conventions, therefore, be it, resolved, that while we, the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention believe that Baptist Young people could not do better than to organize B. Y. P. Unions, join them and make them all they can become in the

development of Christian character and usefulness yet we see no objection to our young people joining C. E. Societies in Baptist churches so long as they are loyal to their own churches and the teachings of the Bible.

Rev. Dr. Brown of Howard University was presented to the convention.

The Enon Baptist church of Washington through its pastor, was received as a member of the convention.

The committee on the President's address reported. Report adopted. (See report.)

A motion thanking the B. Y. P. U. organizations for their loyalty to and interest in our work was adopted.

The convention then adjourned.

FRIDAY EVENING SESSION

The convention was called to order at 8:00.

After a song service of 15 minutes, Rev. G. W. Watkins entertained the convention with stereopticon views of Africa and Haiti, which created much interest.

The newly elected corresponding secretary, Dr. A. A. Graham was then presented. He addressed the convention, briefly outlining, in part, the work he will endeavor to do and asking the cooperation of all the brethren in the great task.

The ten missionaries who are soon to leave for foreign fields under the auspices of the Lott Carey Convention, were introduced.

Mrs. F. B. Waison, Kansas City, Kan., Dr. D. S. Malekebu, Africa; Mrs. D. S. Malekebu, Africa; Miss Clarice Gooding, West Indies; Rev. G. A. Burke, Mrs. G. A. Burke, South Carolina; Rev. and Mrs. A. C. Miller, Ohio; Miss Minnie Lyon, Oxford, North Carolina; Miss Alice Pierre Alexis, Haiti; Miss Christine Francois, Haiti.

A collection of \$92.20 was taken to pay the traveling expenses of the newly appointed delegation to Washington and back to their homes.

The finance committee of the Woman's Auxiliary reported through the secretary. The total cash collected

during their session was \$5950.00. The amount turned over for the immediate work of the Convention was \$4,500.00.

REPORT OF C. S. BROWN,

ACTING CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

To the Executive Board, Lott Carey Convention:

Folloing the death of Dr. W. M. Alexander, I was requested to take over the business of his office and conduct the same until the annual meeting of the convention. This duty, I have endeavored to perform to the best of my skill and ability. I am certain that nothing led you to take this extraordinary step but the desire to obtain ample time to recover from the shock caused by his death, and to decide deliberately the best course to pursue to fill the important vacancy caused by his demise. Dr. Alexander held by far the most important position in our organization. It will not do to fill it with a novice; the life and death of the organization are in the secretary's hands. The corresponding secretary of a Baptist convention like this is not simply a clerk, but a diplomat, a man who knows how to meet, win, and lead men. If we fail in our choice, the mistake will be serious.

On assuming the duties of this office, the brethren throughout our territory kindly offered their help to assist me in holding the business together that the work might not suffer. I feel profoundly grateful for their co-operation. In fact, many have taken fresh courage to work, and today, we are in better condition than we have ever been. I am optimistic enough to predict that our total receipts will reach the twenty-five thousand dollar mark this year. There is enthusiasm all along the line.

Owing to complications that arose in the settlement of Dr. Alexander's estate, I have been so far unable to get possession of the books, papers, etc., belonging to our convention. No blame however must be attached to the good name of our lamented secretary. He loved this convention above everything else, and desired in his last hours that no inconvenience come to it in consequence of his death. "He fought a good fight; he finished his course; he kept the faith." We are hoping to have the business between us and his estate satisfactorily adjusted soon.

One serious mistake we made with regards to the official relation of the corresponding secretary and our organization, our minutes do not show anywhere that he had any financial obligations resting upon him, or that he received and disbursed any funds. Our auditor has had difficulty with the attorney

for the estate on this particular point. Business must be done in a business-like way, or the enterprise will be wrecked. Our money must be handled efficiently and honestly. We cannot afford now to wreck our organization by lack of decision and sagacity. We are at the point where we can insure against financial disaster.

Our Workers and Their Work.

A survey of the field gives us great hope. Rev. C. C. Boone, M. D., who has been at work in and around Monrovia for the past six years, is now in this country. He came to visit this convention and to report the progress of the work in Liberia. Dr. Boone was for some months secretary of the U. S. Legation in Monrovia, and has gained considerable influence in the Capital city. Unfortunately he was seriously injured in an automobile accident in New York recently, and may not be able to come to our meeting. Brother Boone had to reach America by a very circuitous route, via. Porto Rico, Cuba and Florida.

Rev. W. H. Thomas asked for a furlough for himself and wife to return to this country. He desired very much for a commission to visit his field and bring with them new workers. He complains of severe hardships, resulting from famine, but hates to see the work retarded. We cabled him twelve hundred dollars to meet traveling expenses home. I also cabled recently to ascertain if he had left for America, but no reply has come. His report is inspiring.

Rev. J. O. Hayes, our senior missionary, sends us a good report, in which he gives these items: weeks of service, 52; miles traveled, 192; converts, 9; baptisms, 9; members in church fellowship, 140; teaches in Lott-Carey Mission School. He ordered a consignment of food, which has been sent.

Rev. A. R. Hayes, who works out in the interior, gives a glorious account of his struggles, toils and sacrifices. He reports eight stations or churches in the interior with a total membership of 565; a new church organized called, "Goa-Dea;" he has with him an evangelist, Rev. Henry Clements, who is "doing a great work." He reports baptisms as follows: first quarter, 36; second quarter, 30; third quarter, 23. He complains of weakening health on account of exposure.

Rev. W. J. Wood, honorary secretary of our co-operative

work in South Africa, sends us an itemized statement of the expenditures of the money we sent—all of which was spent to keep alive the work established by the late Rev. and Mrs. Tule. Along with this comes a letter filled with interest from Rev. C. W. Pearce, a missionary in the Transkei country. Rev. Wood adds: "I am enclosing you herewith, for the information of the Lott-Carey Convention, the following:

(1) A letter from Rev. C. W. Pearce, our missionary in Kaffraria and Transkei, who has taken oversight of your work here. He is one of our most able and respected missionaries, and I think that his word should have great weight with your people.

(2) A statement of the accounts of the Lott-Carey Funds drawn up by our treasurer showing how that the funds you have sent us were almost exhausted by the end of 1918, and of course, by now are quite gone."

He adds further: "You can see from Mr. Pearce's letter how great the need and opportunity is. There is no Baptist work in South Africa more full of promise than that you are supporting and goes by your name."

The letter from Mr. Pearce referred to appeared in the Lott-Carey Herald for August. I insert it herein because it is worth preserving. Is this work not worth supporting?

An Interesting Message from South Africa

By Charles W. Pearce.

"It may be a surprise to receive this communication from me, for I fear that I am quite unknown to you. It is however about time I was known to those who are the leaders of the Lott Carey Baptist Convention of America, inasmuch as I hold the position of Acting Superintendent of the Lott Carey Baptist Mission work in the Transkeian Territories of South Africa. This appointment was made by the committee of the South African Baptist Missionary Society, and confirmed at the Annual Assembly of the Baptist Union of South Africa held in October, 1917, at Bloemfontein.

"For 25 years, I have been a missionary of the South African Baptist Missionary Society and am quite conversant in the Kaffir language and with the customs of the natives in Kaffraria and the Transkeian Territories. In my capacity as Sup-

erintendent Missionary of my Society's work in those districts I frequently came in contact with the ex-Superintendent of our Lott Carey work, Filbert Bluza Mdogana and his assistant native ministers. Whenever I could I used to advise and help them and soon became well known by them. Unfortunately, F. B. Mdogana is now running an opposition 'Lott Carey' Society and is doing his utmost to discredit the work of your ministers. When F. B. Mdogana on account of his enormities was rightly deposed by your Convention in America from his position as Superintendent as well as his status as an accredited minister of the Gospel, four of the ministers contrived to carry on their work at their stations independently of Mdogana. They were (1) James Yaka of Qora Springs; (2) Shadrack Mashologu of Qumbu, Griqua Land East; (3) Alfred K. Maqanda of Cizele and (4) Booker B. Mdogana (F. B. Mdogana's uncle). As their work progressed, Blyth B. Mgwanga was called to be assistant minister to A. K. Maqanda of Cizele, and Aaron Msimela was appointed to be assistant minister to B. B. Mdogana at Talemi.

"The Rev. B. Vernon Bird, ex-Secretary of the S. A. Baptist Missionary Society, has already reported to you the circumstances under which the first minister, James Yaka, was received in 1914 by our Society. Afterwards the second minister, S. Mashologu was received in 1917 on similar conditions. The third minister A. K. Maqanda, was only received last year on receipt of the funds which your Convention forwarded to our Society for the support of the 'Lott Carey' ministers and workers accepted and accredited by our Society. At Easter, 1917, we held our first United Convention at Qora Springs, when all the above ministers were present with their deacons and we had a season of great blessing. Last Easter we had another United Convention at Tohabo in Kaffraria, where our first Baptist work among the Kaffirs was begun just 50 years ago, and where we shall celebrate our Jubilee this Eastertide. There are four native ministers and two evangelists whom we are as yet unable to receive, as your Convention has not sent us sufficient funds to pay regularly the men already received in your name by our Society. Since the last Easter Convention, a fifth minister, ordained by the National Convention, James

Ntleki, and father of Rev. P. D. Ntleki, has applied to be received, and a sixth man, Fred. Nzekeni, as assistant to the Rev. S. Mashologu is waiting to be appointed. In that district alone there were 52 baptisms last quarter and 47 baptisms in this, bringing the total membership up to 404 with one church building, 19 out stations and 27 deacons and preachers.

Funds are most urgently needed at once to support and extend your 'Lott Carey' work in South Africa, and as your Convention in America has already put its hand to this plow there must be no looking back or slackening on the part of your home churches in regularly forwarding liberal financial support so that our Society may be able to pay your devoted workers. Some of the ministers not yet received are starving, and finally in rage for they cannot keep themselves and families, on the miserable pittance which they collect from their church members, neither can we expect them to do so. With deep regret I have to report the death of James Yaka, the first 'Lott Carey' minister to be received under our Society. He was 'cut off' with the epidemic of Spanish Influenza last November. He was a real man of God, a faithful minister of Christ, a diligent pastor, an experienced counsellor, a devoted friend, and a ripe Christian. For Christ and the gospel's sake, he traveled thousands of miles, swam flooded rivers, preached hundreds of sermons, led hundreds of souls to Christ, and baptized several hundreds of his people into the Triune Name. His name and work for Christ and Africa are a sweet savor to the Lord, and his memory will always be cherished and kept ever green. His smile was a benediction, but what must it have been like when he heard the 'well done' of his Lord he loved so well and served so faithfully? When I visited his congregation in January and preached his memorial sermon from 2 Tim. 4:7, 8 (part of his farewell message to the church at Cebe), baptized four of his converts clad in his baptismal gown, my tears fell with those of his sorrowing people. When afterwards I visited his grave, so affectionately kept by his people, I again consecrated my life to the salvation of Africa's dusky sons and daughters.

"Approximately there are now seven circuits returning 35 out stations, 954 members, 150 candidates for baptism and 63 deacons and preachers.

"I have just returned from a conference of the 'Lott Carey' ministers and workers held at Cizele near the great Bashee river. They are very greatly concerned over the privations which your workers will have to endure this winter, if funds are not immediately forthcoming. You have splendid and most earnest workers in this field, a marvelous opportunity for propagating Baptist Churches among the native Africans, and for extending the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ in this country. It is a great joy as well as a privilege for me to visit and encourage your native ministers and to help them all I possibly can to maintain our Baptist testimony as well as to evangelize Africa's millions of heathen. As the new converts emerge from the darkness and horrors of heathenism, they will take up the Gospel torch in their turn to dispel the gloom, and to create faith in Christ and hope for the future of Africa, by the ever sufficient power of the Holy Spirit of God. May we count on your earnest prayers and loyal support and that of the churches of your Lott Carey Convention in America?"

Dr. A. M. Moore, Secretary of our Haitian Committee, will give a full account of the work done during the year in that interesting field. Great interest is being created in favor of Haiti's redemption, and relief will no doubt be extended to these people. We have met the salaries of our workers there up until October 1, 1919.

More Laborers for The Vineyard

Additional workers should be employed to aid and relieve those who have labored so well and long, and we praise the Lord that worthy applications are coming in. I desire to call your attention especially to the following:

Mrs. Frances B. Watson, Kansas City, Kansas, the secretary of the Woman's Convention of the Western States and Territories. She comes highly recommended by the Convention and other Baptist bodies, and seems eminently fitted for the work.

Rev. D. S. Malekebu, M. D., and wife of Chicago, a native African, a graduate of several of our best schools—Meharry Medical College, etc., His wife is a graduate of Spellman Seminary, Atlanta, Ga., Dr. Malekebu is highly recommended for Christian piety and scholarship by the heads of all the schools

le has attended. Their petition is before you.

Also the petition of Miss Clarissa Gooding, Washington, D. C., a member of Dr. J. Milton Walden's church. She is recommended by her pastor and others.

Also our hero from Western Pennsylvania, Rev. Dr. O. S. Simms, is urging the appointment of a young man in his church for a station in South America.

Rev. E. W. Douglass, Oakley, Kansas, is applying to undertake industrial missions in connection with some stations in Africa.

I have also other applications and letters which go to show the growing confidence among Baptists, far and wide, in our organization. We have the confidence of the people. Let us plan to hold it.

Reduced Rates on the Certificate Plan.

I felt, that at point of membership and dignity, we were entitled to apply to the railroad officials for reduced rates to our annual meeting. So, application was made, and rates were granted on the certificate plan: i. e. on condition that 250 such tickets are bought by delegates and friends coming to the meeting. In order to make certain this number, our ministers were asked to buy Convention tickets instead of using their permits. The difference in cost is very little, and the gain to lay delegates would be considerable. Please report all certificates to the secretary promptly, in order that we may have them "vised" and may know whether the reduced rates can be had.

The State of the Country.

All true patriots can but deplore the restless condition of American citizenship, as indicated by the strikes and riots throughout the country. The war has aroused the belligerent spirit among the people, and only a slight provocation is sufficient to produce serious disturbances. The attempt to make the "Negro know his place" is met by bitter resentment. As christian men and women we must plead for peace. We must counsel patience and self-restraint. As a rule the Negro is sincerely patriotic and peaceful, and wants to live on peaceful terms with his white brother. He has borne much, even when his heart was sore and bleeding because of injustice and oppression. He asks now no special favors; he only pleads for sim-

ple justice and fair treatment—the right to vote, if qualified, on equal terms with other citizens; the right to ride freely on public carriers without color discriminations; the right to use the courts like other men. The Negro is not demanding social equality in the sense that the white man interprets it. Men choose their associates. No colored man wants to dominate over white men; and how do our enemies think the Negro feels to have them dominate over them. Let us all learn to respect those who "rule over us" for our common good; and treat each other as men. To share in the government, to which he has ever been loyal and to enjoy the protection of the government, to which any and every citizen is entitled, the Negro will be satisfied to reap such rewards as his ability character, and usefulness will merit. We are proud to claim American citizenship, and should not be condemned for seeking the full enjoyment of this high honor. In a country so uncompromisingly pledged to "democracy" freedom and protection are sure to come to every citizen.

REPORT OF LOTT CAREY BOARD TO CONVENTION ASSEMBLED

Richmond, Va., Aug. 30, 1919.

Following the close of the annual meeting of 1918 held at Rocky Mount, N. C., and the adoption of a general outline for the forward movement in Foreign Missions for the coming year, your Board has endeavored to push forward the general plans of operation on the African and Haitian fields. In Nov. at a grand meeting of the Executive Committee held in Richmond, a special report submitted by Dr. A. M. Moore, some of the Haitian Mission respecting the work of Rev. Ton Evans. An order was entered terminating the service of Rev. Evans, Dec. 31, 1918 and Dr. A. M. Moore, Sec'y, was ordered to so inform Rev. Evans. The plan of making expenditures to aid the various smaller stations instead of establishing a centralized industrial school was adopted by the Board. Drs. Brown and Moore were authorized to visit the Haitian field early in 1919 if possible under war conditions.

African Field

Reports of Corresponding Secretary directed the attention of the Board to the good condition of the field work under Rev. Thomas and his fellow workers. Payment of salaries had been made through Brown Bros., Bankers, Balto. Delegates to the proposed African Congress on Missionary matters at Philadelphia were authorized to be appointed by Chairman Dr. Johnson.

Scholarship funds for African students were ordered forwarded to Rev. Thomas through the Corresponding Secretary. Haitian and African funds for salaries of missionaries were also forwarded through the office of the Corresponding Secretary.

Corporation

Letter of Dr. L. G. Jordan respecting corporation in African Missions was referred to the Cor. Sec., for consideration of any plans official by Dr. Jordan's Board.

Death of Corresponding Secretary

On April 14, 1919, following the death of Dr. Alexander, a general meeting called by the Chairman was held in Sharon Baptist church in Balto. Matters of the funeral had been arranged by the officers of your Board and notices sent out both to the home and foreign fields. The Board attended the funeral in a body. Eulogies and devotionals were conducted by Drs. C. S. Brown, W. T. Johnson, O. S. Simms, W. J. Howard, W. H. Stokes, J. H. Randolph.

President C. S. Brown was authorized to look after the work of the office of Corresponding Secretary assisted by the Chairman and Secretary of Board up to the meeting of the convention, taking them as early as possible to account, books, papers in the office.

The Board recorded the following eulogy:

"In sorrowful, but in sweet remembrance of the hero of Foreign Missions, Dr. William Moncure Alexander, who for 22 years served the cause with fidelity and love in efficient service for his Master and beloved by thousands and admired by his fellow workers, falling asleep in peaceful repose, April 10, 1919 honored by a grateful city and nation for his manly Christian virtues. Peace to his memory."

Memorial Services

A special program of memorial services was authorized for the Convention respecting Drs. Alexander and Bings, Drs. W. J. Howard and W. T. Johnson were appointed to make the eulogies.

Washington Meeting

The Board at a meeting held in Washington, July 1, 1919, authorized the return of Rev. and Mrs. Thomas home on request from the Minorcans and ordered the acting Corresponding Secretary Dr. Brown to cable the necessary funds. The Executive officers were ordered to check up the accounts of Treasurer and office of Corresponding Secretary. Dr. C. S. Brown was authorized to secure full settlement and act in all matters pertaining to the office of the Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Mattie Murl was authorized to continue work on the Home Field under the direction of office of Corresponding Secretary.

On adoption of report of Program Committee the Board authorized the opening session to begin on Tuesday night with the young people's program under the direction of the pastor of the church of the annual sessions.

Letters from Dr. C. C. Boone giving reports on the African field and the Alexander Memorial meeting held at Brewerville, Liberia, were filed for future reference pending the arrangement in office of Corresponding Secretary.

Dr. Boone Hurt

On Aug. 14th, after reaching this country from Liberia, via Cuba, Dr. Boone was badly hurt, being struck by an automobile while crossing a street in New York City and taken to Harlem Hospital. Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman of your Board ordered the Secretary and Treasurer to look after him and report his condition immediately. On Aug. 30, Dr. Boone was much improved and plans to be to the meeting of the Convention this week.

Woman's Auxiliary

Your Board desires to here express its high appreciation of the splendid work of the Woman's Auxiliary during the year under the efficient leadership of Mrs. J. H. Randolph and her co-officers. Mrs. Murff has also kept up her work with zeal in

the various churches and schools.

Lott Carey Spirit

Under the leadership of Drs. Brown, Alexander, Pegues, Hughes, Graham, Read, Stokes and Moore, the home field, as well as the African and Haitian, has sent forth the great spirit of Lott Carey throughout the land, in church and home as is evidenced by your bright and hopeful faces here today. We commend our workers in the Master's cause during these times that stir men's hearts to the over-turning of Kingdoms and making of nations in the rebirth of a higher idealism in this old world.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

For twenty-three years I have had the honor to address you as the official head of this convention, out-lining the policy to pursue for successful operation, and giving observations of the progress achieved, but a solemn feeling of bereavement possesses me as I come before you today, because the Death Angel has made two visitations during the past year that greatly disturbed our official family and weakened our working force. It therefore becomes my painful duty to announce the "home-going" of that stalwart champion of foreign missions, Rev. A. Binga, Jr., of Virginia, one of the founders of the convention and a member of the Board, and Rev. W. M. Alexander, D. D., of Baltimore, Md., our great corresponding secretary, from our organization. Those men were giants. In token of our respect, let us stand and sing:

"Servant of God, well done;
Rest from thy loved employ;
The battle's fought, the vict'ry won;
Enter thy Master's joy."

In consequence of the loss that we sustain in the death of

these and other workers, coupled with the reconstruction that must be made to supply vacancies, and the pressing demands to enlarge our work, this meeting will mark a new era in the history of this convention. I am thoroughly satisfied that each of you realize the gravity of the situation and have come to this meeting with but one single aim—viz: to do the best thing possible to promote the welfare of the organization. In this crisis men and friendship should count but little compared with the welfare of the work before us. However great, efficient and enthusiastic our late corresponding secretary was, his work is done, and the Master will not allow His work to flag for the lack of some great soul to assume the unfinished obligations. We must look to His guidance in the choice of Dr. Alexander's successor.

A Crucial Period in Human History.

A famous Roman orator, during an excited period of Roman history, in the midst of a great speech, exclaimed: "O Mores, O Tempora," but the excitement of his day as compared to the universal upheaval in social and civil affairs the world over, was as a zephyr to a hurricane. For more than four years, the nations of the earth have been morally and spiritually drunk, "the world has reeled and rocked like a drunken man," simply war-mad; and now they are passing through a period of "delirium tremens." The German hordes have been checked, but the German spirit is evidently prevalent throughout the entire world. Democracy is still but a fictitious thing, existing only in the minds of men who profit by its advocacy, but do not actually desire its realization. All attempts to secure universal peace by political measures have proven abortive, because when reduced to actual truth they lacked genuineness. No scheme of government or contract of nations can bring permanent peace that refuses to recognize in reality "the brotherhood of man." We pity the would-be statesman who, on account of race bigotry, and prejudice, cannot discern that the laws of right are exorable, and that their maintenance is backed by omnipotence. "The Mills of the god's grind slowly, but they grind into powder." There is another adage very true: "Whom the Gods would destroy, they first make mad." The

world is blind; the church must furnish the eyes. The great national problems that threaten the welfare of our great country—the labor problem, the race problem, the social problem—will continue to menace our peace until settled in harmony with the Golden Rule. All arguments to the contrary simply delay settlement and intensify the thunder cloud that must sooner or later burst with terrific fury. Political governments are a necessity, and work for the welfare of the people when the laws are righteous and righteously administered; but enlightened people will not stand oppression and deprivation of the ordinary rights to which men generally subscribe, without protest. No nation or race of people in history has ever oppressed a weaker people without suffering immensely for the crime committed.

At this critical time, the church is needed as never before to quiet the universal unrest, to allay the passions of men, and to establish confidence in rulers, and to preserve what civilization we have gained. Germany is a sad object lesson that comes from stubborn political bigotry. My conscientious advice to my people during these perilous times is to be patient under tribulation, to be obedient to law, to have faith in God, and to be honest and industrious; and thus win respect on account of real worth rather than by coercive methods. We win by doing right; we lose by doing wrong. Let us stand by the church. There is more power in God than in all the combined governments of earth. Will the church rise to its present privileges and opportunities?

The Age Demands Great Things of the Church.

This is an age of big things—an age of miracles—an age of super-human achievements. Money is counted in piles of millions and billions; man no longer walks, he flies. Every human project has been geared up to the highest speed; the church alone seems inclined to plod on "the same old way." Progressives are demanding, however, to "speed up" in church activity. Evangelists of divine truth are urged to take the aerial route and meet St. John's vision, in which he saw "another angel flying through the midst of heaven, having the everlasting gospel to preach." In this "speed up" propaganda, the signs are somewhat encouraging. The great Methodist church recently sub-

scribed 160 million dollars for educational and missionary purposes; The Northern Baptists, six million; The Southern white Baptists, 75 millions; and colored Baptists show also evidences of more intense activity and liberality.

In fact, all the great branches of the Christian church are giving evidences of spiritual revivification. The great world struggle is not only political and civil, but moral and spiritual. Real genuine Christians who interpret rightly the spirit of Christianity, are at peace with each other the world over.

These men of vision in all lands must win the world to see the Christ-way of saving humanity.

It is useless to preach universal brotherhood and practice universal discrimination. A life, a living Christian among the heathen is better than a Bible. A million consecrated Missionaries and billions of dollars for their support is the strongest answer the church can give to the backset given to civilization caused by the great war, and challenge of inefficiency alleged against its integrity. We who command so large a following of the King's forces must not be contented until a sector commensurate with our ability has been assigned to us to subjugate and defend.

Germany must be conquered if the Allies must bring their soldiers from America, Japan, China, Egypt, Africa, Haiti, or from the cotton fields of our own Southland. Race and color must be forgotten, for the good of the cause. So should it be in this great moral struggle. We must have an army big enough to win regardless of race or nation. That is good sense. Church co-operation is necessary to an aggressive world campaign.

Our Special Fields Reviewed

It is with gratification that I bring to you good news from every field and station where we have undertaken work. The general appeal comes for "more help and more helpers." Interest still centers in that great and mighty continent—Africa, whose sable sons have been the chattel of cruel slave-dealers for centuries, and whose vast treasures and valuable resources attract selfish exploits even now whose maddened passions for material gain force them to inflict upon the simple minded natives most inhuman restrictions. Since the tyrant's arm has been so greatly weakened by four years of war, let us hope

that conditions will be now brighter for Africa's redemption; and that government control will permit christian workers greater liberty to work among the natives.

It is said that the key to the continent is Liberia. Here we have centralized our activity; and our loyal band of workers, whose names I like to repeat: Rev. J. O. Hayes, Dr. Boone, Rev. Thomas, Mrs. Thomas, Rev. Gale, and Rev. A. R. Hayes are doing real helpful and constructive work, as their reports clearly indicate. More workers must be put into this field and more buildings must be erected to make their work permanent. Most splendid reports come to us concerning the mission stations planted by us a number of years ago in South Africa by Rev. and Mrs. Tule, which work we have fostered by co-operation in a limited way with the British South African Baptist Mission Society. We must keep this work alive and enlarge it, if political conditions are at all favorable. The exclusion and prohibition of colored missionaries from the principal colonies in Africa is a tragedy against Christianity and an act repulsive to justice and fair-play. This ban should be brought in every legitimate manner until it is abrogated.

that I have heretofore given. It is the only Negro government

Our work in Haiti invites our deepest interest for reasons that I have heretofore given it is the only Negro government in the Western world and should not be permitted "to perish from the earth." The pleas made for Haiti's salvation have evidently made some impression upon American christians, and soon we hope to see an army of workers there, adequately supported. Having studied this field closely, your committee has done its best to conduct this work wisely and economically, with but one aim in view, viz: the amelioration of the condition of the people on the island. We rejoice to inform you that our white Baptist brethren have decided to investigate Haiti's needs, and to go to the rescue of her perishing millions. The report of your committee will bring this important field squarely before you, and we hope the convention will decide to increase the appropriation for workers there. When we entered Haiti, we took a step that greatly strengthened our claim as a practical missionary organization and thus won the admiration of American christians generally. By virtue of this movement

we occupy strategic mission points in this important field, and gives us precedence over other organizations that may enter hereafter to do work. We have had some trouble with one or two of our workers but this is to be expected in all untried fields. Let us trust our leaders and push ahead. We cannot exaggerate the suffering, the destitution, the pitiable condition of people whom we are striving to help. Before the war, when normal conditions existed, their needs appealed to our sympathies greatly, but think of them today, deprived of food supplies—with prices soaring upward, millions on the verge of starvation and our missionaries themselves suffering for the common necessities of life. Let their burdens reach our hearts, and let us be determined to do our duty to those who depend on us for support.

In the interest of lost humanity, the millions of blinded, misguided pagans in many lands, the millions of our black brothers and sisters in African jungles, whose fate has made them and their fair country the human cattle pen and prey of the beastly slave trader for centuries. I press anew this appeal to you, upon our churches, and upon our christians generally, in this fair land of schools, hospitals and churches. We must give help to them because we know of their great need, and because the Master places this duty upon us as a divine obligation.

Recommendations

Permit me therefore to recommend how we may push this great work more effectively and efficiently.

1. Let us make the Lott-Carey Herald a stronger and better paper. I firmly believe in the power of the press. The Herald, so efficiently edited by Dr. Stokes has great influence. It will be stronger if we support it more generously.

2. Let us decide to erect a Mission house in Monrovia, to be known as our missionary headquarters for the continent, where missionaries embarking or entering Africa, may find a home, and where all supplies entering Africa, may find a home, and where all supplies entering Africa for missionaries may be sent. In fact, let it be a mission house, home and headquarters.

3. Let us select more workers at once to assist and relieve those who are now on the field. They need re-enforcement. Let us plan for enlargement.

4. I recommend also the appointment of a commission to study the fields, to visit our stations and determine what we should do to make our work permanent and more definite. We need first-hand information, by eye-witnesses direct from the field. This is necessary and should be undertaken without delay.

5. Larger appropriations should be made for our Haitian work. This work needs careful supervision, encouragement and support. If proper help can be had, we may look for great results for Christ in this wonderful island.

6. We must plan to collect quarterly sufficient funds to meet the salaries of our workers. It is indeed hard to have the missionaries appeal for unpaid salaries and add that food is scarce and hard to get, even if they had the money to pay for the same. We must have their salaries on hand to remit promptly.

In conclusion, may I urge you as men of God to enter candidly upon the duties of this present convention to do only what a high sense of right prompts for the welfare of our mission cause. Let our discussions be tempered with fraternity, and let selfish interest be entirely crucified, to the end that the results of our transactions may enhance greatly the cause of Christ both at home and the lands that now lie in darkness.

Resolved that this nation offers to God, thanks for the cessation of the conflict and for the beginning of peace that seems assured to the people everywhere.

Resolved, (2) That our potency in the social and economic fabric of the nation will be measured by the part we play in its business and to that end it is our duty to cooperate along

business lines and follow the example of those who have built the country in economics and wealth. It is time we were taking a deeper and firmer hold upon business everywhere.

Resolved, that with the facts before us of the wonderful progress of the missionary work done in Haiti during the past year, we see signs of spiritual relief and in awakening among those unchristian people, and it is the sense of your committee that we should redouble our efforts and reconsecrate ourselves for the redemption of the same. Your committee believes that we should spare neither pains nor money in giving the help that is so much needed in this work.

Whereas the Humane and Reform Movement to better the condition of the colored race throughout the United States (1) industrially, (2) educationally, (3) religiously as it was begun in Baltimore 1916 and endorsed by this body, therefore be it,

Resolved, that we renew our endorsement of the same and to Dr. J. N. Jeter who is a leader in this movement,

Resolved, that the visit of the newly elected President of Liberia and his wife, to the Lott Carey Convention and in addressing the same on Thursday night, the convention was highly honored and encouraged by the words of good cheer they brought us.

Resolved that since the Third Baptist Church, its pastor and officers have so generously entertained this convention during this session, we do sincerely tender to them our heart-felt thanks and to the sister churches that assisted in this entertainment, to the choir for its magnificent service, to the press for the liberal notice given this meeting.

We pray that God's blessings will rest with the church and the city always and that in the enjoyment of the prosperity that has been so evident with this people it may be the pleasure of God to continue always.

CONSTITUTION

Article I—Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

Article II—Object.

Sec. 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

Article III

Sec. 1. The officers of this Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as are common to the office they occupy.

Sec. 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be

elected.

Sec. 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry in effect the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Sec. 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

Article IV.

Sec. 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Sec. 2. Any Baptist church or Sunday School Missionary or educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Sec. 3. Visitors may be invited to seats, but not to vote.

Sec. 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

He came forward and in his own way, made some touching remarks. Mr. Smiley of Louisville, Ky., rendered a very touching solo, "Take You Burden to the Lord and Leave it There." Then Dr. D. J. Avery, Pastor St. Paul Baptist Church, Gastonia, N. C., who had been chosen to preach the annual sermon, was presented. Accompanying him were Dr. O. S. Bullock, Pastor 1st Baptist Church, High Point, N. C.; and Dr. J. W. Faulk, Pastor Ebenezer Baptist Church, Charlotte, N. C., Dr. Bullock lined hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign." Dr. Faulk offered a fervent prayer. The choir rendered music. Dr. Avery used the following selections of scripture, John 9:4; 20:21; Acts 1:8 for a text. Subject, "The Inevitable must of Jesus an incentive for the church to vigorously prosecute its world-mission program."

From these passages of scripture the speaker preached a helpful and inspiring sermon, which held the attention of the vast audience. Among the many things said, some are these: 1. "Christ was compelled to perform the mission of love and mercy for which He had been sent, because He was Heavenly centered. If we would get men vitally in touch with God, we too, must be Heavenly minded." 2. "The compelling force that drove Jesus on with an inevitable must, was because His will was completely absorbed in the will of His Father. Being sent by His Father, it was constantly His desire to know and do the will of His Father under all circumstances. To accomplish the work that the Master has given us to do we must know and do His will wholly.

3. "The mighty compassion of Jesus for the multitudes drove Him along with wonderful impetus to accomplish His Mission. No one ever had sympathy like Jesus. The world is in great need of genuine heart sympathy. Some one has said, 'The world is

hungrier for love than for bread.'

4. "Jesus was bound by an inward irresistible force to accomplish the work He was sent to do, because His keen vision allowed Him to view His Kingdom, as an all-conquering world-wide universal Kingdom. The kingdoms of this world with all their pomp and splendor, must eventually crumble and fall. No so with the world-wide, all-conquering Kingdom of Jesus. It will stand forever. The nations of the earth will be given into His hands for His purchased possession. 'I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day.' As the Father hath sent me, even so I have sent you. You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit is come upon you. "And shall be my witnesses, both in Jerusalem and all Judea and to the uttermost parts of the world.' "

After the sermon, the President of the Auxiliary, Mrs. A. B. Randolph, asked Dr. C. S. Brown, President of the Lott Carey Convention to introduce Dr. C. B. D. King, President-elect of Liberia, Africa. Dr. Brown said he would ask Dr. Jernigan, Washington, D. C., to introduce Dr. King, Dr. Jernigan introduced **President King with choice words.** He said it was a great pleasure indeed for him to have the privilege of introducing the only Negro President of a Republic, in the world. The very large crowd arose and gave in honor of the President and his wife, the Chautauqua salute thrice. Then he, with much grace and dignity, spoke complimentary of the great work the Lott Carey Convention is doing in Liberia. Also he said, "why is there so much unrest in the world while the Christian churches are so numerous in the world? We are lifting up other things rather than Christ. Let us lift up Christ. Then there will be real peace. I bring you, my brethren in America, greetings from Liberia." He urged that this great Convention continue its work in Liberia. Mrs. King, wife of the President, was introduced. She is a charming woman of rare abilities. In very modest, yet graceful manner,

she said, "I was born in Africa. I am glad to meet you women of America. I bring you greetings from the women of Liberia."

Dr. C. C. Boone, returned Missionary from Liberia, was presented. On account of his having met with a serious accident in New York, he was not able to make a speech. But we were very glad to heartily cheer Dr. Boone.

Dr. A. A. Graham, Corresponding Secretary-elect of Lott Carey Convention and Mrs. Amelia J. Felton, Corresponding Secretary-elect of the Woman's Auxiliary, lifted the offering, which amounted to \$103.63. The session was closed by singing, "Blest be the Tie." Benediction by Dr. G. O. Bullock.

FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION

Praise service was conducted by Mrs. Lucy Thompson, Mrs. Amelia J. Felton, Mrs. D. G. Mack and Mrs. A. L. E. Weeks. After singing several selections, Mrs. Felton read 1 Cor. 13th chapter. Prayer by Sister Thompson. Several scripture quotations were given, praise service closed by singing "Blest be the Tie." and a general hand-shake.

The minutes of the previous sessions were read and adopted. Your presence here, means that God intends that we shall play a conspicuous part in the great Arena of the World's work. The time has come when woman must arise to the full measure of her strength, throw off the mock modesty of the past and surrender her life entirely to Christ who has exalted her to membership in the New Testament Church, which recognizes male and female alike as heirs and joint heirs with Christ. "Who is my mother and my brethren?" "They that do the will of my Father."

Each year, we look into the faces of a large number of new delegates who come representing New Circles and to help in the great Cause for the redemption of mankind. This means progress in the home churches, as well as this Auxiliary.

The call comes ringing over land and sea to all believers in Christ, "Come over and help us!" This call is a present day challenge to organized Christianity in every land and tongue of the redeemed. The task of saving a lost World was, and is now, the immediate task of Jesus, and it was the one to which the Disciples dedicated their lives under his direct training.

It is a challenge of our love for Christ. "If ye love me, keep my commandments." "Go ye, therefore unto all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

It is a challenge to our Christian pride which should always stand for truth, righteousness and loyalty to Christ.

It is a challenge of our sympathy and love for humanity, a test of the Christ life in us, which leads us to rescue the perishing, lift up the fallen, care for the dying.

The call is a challenge of a large number of men and women whose bones lie bleached in the sands of Foreign Lands.

The call is a challenge from India with her 358,000,000 of souls, China and Japan with their millions and Haiti with her millions, our own benighted country, Africa, with her teeming

millions of which it is said that there is room enough on the lower end of the continent for the United States with her 100,000,000 of people. Europe with her many states and millions can be placed on one side of Central Africa, China with her 400,000,000 on the other half of Central Africa; and still there will be room enough for all India, Wales, Scotland and Ireland in the lower valley of the Nile and along the coast of the Mediterranean, besides having ample room for Porto Rico and the Philippines and the Island of Madagascar. Think of the land yet to be possessed.

I speak of other countries, because I believe that our sympathy should go out to them; that our hearts should be broad enough to answer the call anywhere; as we read we find that hundreds of Missionaries are going to other Countries, while just a few are being sent to Africa. The unfinished task is before you, what will you do with it?

Shall we cast it aside, shall we feel content with what we are doing, or shall we say by the help of God we will do more, to unfurl the Banner of Him who said, "the foxes have holes, the birds have nests, but the Son of Man hath not where to lay His head." My Sisters what has Jesus done for us? "He has redeemed us." Count the cost. What has Jesus sacrificed for us? "He gave His life for us." Count the cost. What does Jesus promise us? "If we trust Him, that He will receive us unto Himself." Count the Cost. What will be your reward? "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Count the cost. Then let us ask ourselves the question, as followers of the Lord: Have we done all that we can for Jesus? Have we counted the cost of what Jesus has done to redeem the world? If not, let us begin to give our best service to Him, for the harvest is great, but the laborers are few.

Things Needed

We need men and women for the foreign field who are well-trained, refined and cultured; who have consecrated all which they have acquired through our Christian Schools with their native ability to the salvation of the Heathen. I call upon you as a Convention to pray daily that God may impress Himself upon this class of men and women to offer themselves for His

service. We need more enthusiasm on the part of the Ministers and laymen touching the great program of World Wide Redemption. The people of our churches will do their full duty if they are given information concerning the needs of the field, which must proceed from those whom God has made overseer of the flock; and those immediately associated with them. To this end, I call upon you to urge that in the arrangement of the year meetings in your Churches, that special prayers will be offered for our Missionaries and their work.

We need more workers on the field and more money to meet the expenses incident to the increase of the work, for those who sacrifice home comforts and friends, should be well supported that they may labor unhampered.

We need more faith in God who bids us "Go labor in my vineyard." Faith leads us to sacrificial service and a willingness to wait patiently for the results of our labor of love and self-denegation. There are those in our churches, who will not join our Missionary Societies, but are willing to give, if asked, for the work. Why not have a sacrificial club in your Church?

I suggest on returning home, that we inaugurate a Campaign for new members to our Societies, and that Mission Study Classes be formed wherever possible for the giving of information concerning the Missionary fields and their needs.

Again, that we organize in every church, a Junior Society, and in every Sunday School a Cradle Roll Department, that mothers and fathers may be interested in our Auxiliary through their children and thus unite the whole family circle of home and church in the interest of the lost world.

I wish to commend most heartily the work already accomplished by these Junior Societies in connection with our Convention and also congratulate those who have so efficiently led these young people into this new field of Christian Endeavor.

In our last meeting at Rocky Mount, N. C., it was agreed that the women of this body should build and equip a dormitory in Africa as an inspiration to the women of this Auxiliary. We hope that you have kept this in mind during the year and have come prepared financially to do your share.

One of the interesting features in our work is the scholarship

fund, which is increasing rapidly. Men and women are contributing largely to this fund. This shows the anxiety on our part to educate the Heathen children and thus unfetter their benighted minds for the reception of religious truth.

By invitation, I attended the Baptist Re-Union at Richmond, Va. July 30th to Aug. 3rd to deliver an address on Foreign Missions. While there, I attended the separate sessions of the Woman's M. and Educational Association; The Sun School Convention, B. Y. P. U. The first two mentioned are members of this Auxiliary. I tendered them your thanks for their contributions and interest in our work.

We congratulate the promoters upon the plan of the Re-Union which was so nobly carried out and from which such splendid results were obtained.

Leaves have their time to fall,
And flowers to wither at the North winds breath
And stars to set but all,
Thou hast all seasons for thine own, Oh! Death.

Since our last meeting, death has claimed some of our most consecrated workers--viz: Drs. A. Binga, Jr., Wm. M. Alexander, Mrs. Gross. Drs. Binga and Alexander were among the organizers of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. Their work and worth in the home and foreign field will be eulogized at this session of the Convention already arranged. Mrs. Gross had just entered upon a career of usefulness in our Auxiliary. Her strains of music and her interest in the work will long live in our hearts.

Recommendations

1. That an hour be set apart in our next meeting (1920) for a round table talk conducted by some one, well informed on Missions, so that the women of this Auxiliary may receive instructions that will help them in the prosecution of their work.
 2. That all of the Junior Departments of this organization be organized in a special department having an adult as their Superintendent to be elected by the Auxiliary.
- In consideration of the great amount of publicity given to

our Woman's work through the Herald, and the increased amount of work to be done in the present year, if we prosecute the work we shall undertake, I wish to recommend that we give to the Editor, Dr. W. H. Stokes, \$100. that he may, without embarrassment, keep the Woman's Department before the Women of the Country.
