CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Emptist Foreign Missionary Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all bodies in fellowship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at least (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

ARTICLE III.

Section I. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice-President from each State or Territory represented a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statistician, a Treasurer and Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty as the said board shall require of him.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Doard during the interim of the meetings of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a.m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Daptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) Five Dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) Five Dollars, and a life-member by the payment of (\$25.00) Twenty-five Dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part of all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER.

Article 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its deliberations.

Article 3. Enrollment of delegates.

Article 4, Collection of Finance,

Article 5. Appointment of committees.

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 8. No discourteous language shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article 9. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve month's notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

introduced. He extended greetings from the Haitian field, giving a brief survey of his field of labor. In a very impressive way he expressed deep gratitude to this body for its interest in Haiti. He requested prayers and moral support as well as financial, closing with the song "Where is My Wandering Boy tonight?"

ANNUAL ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT

Dear Co-Workers:

During the past twenty-seven years of occupancy of the high office of president of this Convention, I have never felt more keenly the responsibility which it involves, than I do at the present time. Circumstances and vicissitudes, both good and ill, have marked the labors of the year and brought sensibility to my remembrance the famous statement: "Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown." Experience has taught us that the work expands our problems and difficulties multiply. Two great facts have kept away discouragement: faith in God and the consciousness that we are engaged in a great work. We therefore come before you today happy and hopeful. Happy because our Master has led us by day and by night by a villar of cloud and a pillar of fire; hopeful because of your increasing enthusiasm and gracious sacrifices. I therefore greet you, my comrades, in the name of the Lord, and stand ready to pledge anew with you our lives to carry forward the work so well done to the regions yet untouched by the gospel of Christ. It is perhaps useless to state that we are a distinct foreign mission convention, and that we are determined that nothing shall move us to change this course. Our one supreme mission is to magnify the last great command of our Lord and Master. This is the biggest object before the Christian world today. In the prosecution of this great mission, we invite and solicit the co-operation of any and all existing Baptist organizations.

CO-OPERATION IS OUR POLICY.

This organization of Baptists was founded on fraternity and cooperation. In every annual address, we have pleaded for and urged co-operation, and in constructing our constitution, we inserted "cooperation" as a leading feature. We hate no class of Baptists; we belong to no klan; we love all, and pray that we may be one, at least when we go to labor among the poor, benighted heathen. We cripple our Master's work when we wrangle, dispute, and devour one another. We must somehow cease contentions if we hope to do permanent service in non-Christian lands. We are filled with amazement to find some objecting to our co-operating with certain Baptist churches and brethren because they do not bear certain worldly "trade marks" on their backs. Our doors stand wide-open to cooperate with any and all existing Baptist churches in doing mission work, and we do not intend to allow that door to be closed. We want all Baptist churches united on Christ and not on men. True to the settled policy of this Convention and inspired by a deep desire to unite Baptists in doing work among the heathen, we entered into a mutual agreement with the National Baptist Convention, Unincorporated, to do our foreign mission work conjointly and together. We have no apology to make because of this contract. These brethren are not strangers, but our co-laborers in a great cause; and many of them are regarded and classed as foremost race leaders, and as eminent preachers in this country. We certainly feel it no disgrace to be associated with them.

HEADQUARTERS FOR THE CONVENTION.

Two or more years ago, owing to the rapid expansion of our conventional interests, we decided to make Washington City our National headquarters, and appointed a committee to look out for a home for the convention. Early in this year the committee made a selection and reported the same to the board. Their report was approved and the property purchased at the cost of \$15,500,00. We are happy to report that this transaction has met with the approval of all of our constituents. We hope to have a formal opening of our "headquarters" soon, at which time a formal dedication should be held. Should it please you to approve this suggestion, the dedication should be made a notable event in the interest of missions.

A SURVEY OF THE FOREIGN FIELD.

We desire you to become thoroughly familiar with the fields where we are endeavoring to work and to keep posted on the developments therein, and also to note the difficulties under which we operate. The work is yours, and you are entitled to all the information that comes into our possession.

Our nearest mission field is Haiti-six days sail from New York. We have a peculiar interest in Haiti, because it is the only negro republic in the Western World, and because the people are inclined to be Baptists. By mutual agreement, the American Baptist Home Mission Society has consented to assist in the evangelization of Haiti. We feel that this marks a new day in the work among the two and a half million Haitians. We must, however, keep up our present interest in the island. We are deeply interested in the political as well as the spiritual welfare of Haiti, and cannot bring ourselves to believe that the United States means to crush by force the aspiratians of the Haitian people and deprive them of the right to govern themselves-a freedom for which their forefathers fought, bled, and died.

Our interest in Africa has grown with the years. We are praying to see the day when her vast jungles shall be invaded by eager, tireless, consecrated representatives of the cross of Jesus. We have a small band of native workers in South Africa. These are paid by and through the board of white Baptists representing the South African Baptist Alliance. They are urging us to enlarge our activities in this section. But for obvious reasons we have decided to con-

centrate our efforts in Liberia. In this field, we have placed fully a score of men and women, who are not resting on their oars. In fact, both in the number of trained men and women and in the stations established, we greatly exceed the other evangelical denominations, and yet we are not doing what we can to give the native peoples the opportunity to know the Lord. We have at heart the well-being of Liberia both as to its importance as a political state. and its strategic importance with regard to the evangelization of that vast continent. We welcome to this meeting especially Rev. Mr. Bryant, one of our mission workers and a native of that country, who comes to us with information concerning the work and the perplexing problems incident thereto. We are determined to put up the proposed buildings as speedily as possible. The building program is of first importance in making permanent our work in Liberia. We must stop sending missionaries over there until we can make provision for those whom we have already employed. Our foreign mission work is largely experimental, and therefore, blunders must be expected. We are studying the problems and praying for light to the end that the greatest good may result from the efforts and means employed. We are thoroughly convinced that the building of houses and furnishing of equipment, are the main essentials at the present time.

The building program includes: (1) The Sallie Mial Building at Brewerville; (2) the equipment of a workshop and (3) installation of a lighting plant at the same point; (4) the erection of a hospital; and (5) the construction of a good building at Careysburg. Other smaller houses are also needed. We beg your patience and support while we push to empletion this program.

We are meeting satisfactorily our obligations with the Russian workers. The needs there are great indeed; and it is marvelous to observe the devotion and self-sacrifice that our workers there display in their determination to preach and teach, in spite of the unspeakable dangers and difficulties. The Lord is smiling on our work.

CARE IN THE EMPLOYMENT OF MISSIONARIES.

I feel it my duty to offer some advice in the selection of missionaries. We are daily learning how to do this work. We have not been sufficiently careful in the selection of missionaries. We have been too sympathetic with persons who have merely a romantic desire to go to Africa, and have employed them without careful and prayerful examination as to their character, fitness, ability, Christian experience, adaptability and consecration. It should be known that a person who aspires to be a missionary must understand that he seeks a life of tremendous self-sacrifice, suffering, and possibly death. He is called upon to surrender country, home, friends, pleasures, conveniences, comforts and ease, for a hard pioneer's life. He sacrifices every prospect of pecuniary gain and earthly preferment. His only reward lies in the fruitage of his work, and often he realizes none of this during his life time. In fact he loses his life for the gospel's sake. If any man goes prompted by any other motive he will be deceived and will be a misfit.

I fear we have missionaries who have entered the service without counting the cost. Their time is spent largely in expressing their disappointments, manufacturing complaints, and begging money. We scarcely ever get a report telling of the eagerness of souls to accept Christ or the good they are doing to alleviate suffering and give hope to the despairing. The missionaries do not realize that complaints only tend to kill interest on the home field. We are convinced that some have been sent to the foreign field who are temperamentally and spiritually unfit. It will help the work to reorganize our mission forces. A few consecrated workers will accomplish more than a thousand complainers and self-seekers. In fact, to make a successful missionary, a man must have more than grace; he ought to be put through a missionary training course, and be brought to understand the awful responsibility he is about to assume. Going to Africa as a missionary is not a pleasure trip, but it is more like going to a slaughter. It means nothing less than the surrender of life. If a soul is truly inspired, he can gladly and joyfully accept this fate.

I mean to assert that a man whose one aim or craving is to engage in missionary work, is called to do a peculiar task, different from any other work; and to make this career a success he must exclude every other purpose from his mind, and resolve that this one thing I do. Unless we can find men and women thus consecrated, it would be best to send no more abroad to represent us.

A FINANCIAL SURVEY.

We cannot run the convention on faith and prayer alone; we must have money, and this money must come largely from our churches. The salaries of missionaries must be met promptly. We must not allow the salaries to drag behind. We must realize more fully the moral obligation that we are under to the men and women who represent us abroad. In a large measure their lives are in our hands. We agree to give them monthly a certain sum or salary out of which they must live; they make their plans accordingly; and when we fail to send their salarles on time, we cause them to suffer greatly. Let us make a self case of it; here in this country many of us need what we earn every Saturday night, and if we do not get it, we are greatly cramped. Imagine how the missionary feels who fails to get his quarterly check. We must not allow petty misunderstandings to cause us to withhold our contributions and thereby cause our workers to suffer. Each member and church

is bound so long as one man or woman remains in Africa, sent there under the inspiration of your influence. First of all, we must provide for the prompt payment of salaries. Let us require faithfulness on the part of our missionaries and let us be absolutely faithful to them.

It is to be regretted that the high sense of duty has little or no weight with so many; their whims, jealousies, and selfish moods govern their benevolences and determine their obligations. A contract is binding whether we are sick or well, or whether we are mad or glad. I can conceive of no contract more binding than that made to a helpless missionary who goes to a heathen land depending on his Christian brotherhood in the homeland for support.

A PLEA TO GO FORWARD.

Christian friends, an irrestistible compulsion, generated by God's Spirit, commands us to go forward. We are not only called upon to give the gospel to the simple minded heathen, whose faith feebly clings to their grotesque gods made of wood and stone, but Africa is staged for a deadly conflict between the followers of Christ and the fanatic adherents of Islam. Already hordes of Mohammedan missionaries are sweeping down from the north and combating with fanatic hostility the thinly set lines of Christian workers. Say what you will, Islam is spreading with the certainty and irresistibility of a rising tide. Already every mission station north of the equator is imperiled by Moslem agitators and prophets, and the alarming question is, will the Christian church be able to resist this tide, and check its further advance among the people? It is enough to create alarm and compel us to renew the fight, and with deadly earnestness declare, "they shall not pass."

I therefore plead for unity among us, at home and abroad, for therein alone lies success and victory. We must not let the banner trail in the dust. The Master expects every man and every church to do his or its duty. "The light of the world is Jesus"; let the love of Christ constrain us to fight this good fight of faith.

Beloved pastors, you are God's chosen leaders; you are charged with grave responsibility "to go forward" into all the world and to see to it that every creature is given a chance to know Christ. Rev. Dr. Hugh T. Kerr, of Pittsburg, speaks well, when he says: "It can confidently be asserted that the pastor is the key to the foreign missionary program. If the light which he holds in his hand burns clear, the whole church is full of light. If it is a smoking flax, his people can hardly escape being asphyxiated." The pastor's responsibility to the missionary movement cannot be successfully evaded, and yet in many cases, pastors are tempted to leave this most vital thing in their ministry to precarious chance. A pastor owes it to his people to become himself thoroughly posted on his denominational missionary activities, to ally himself actively with its foreign

mission agencies, and to keep before his church an adequate missionary program. No pastor can justify himself for neutrality or inactivity in the effort to execute the Master's great and last command. His sermons should be pregnant with thrilling records and accounts of our faithful missionary workers, who are facing grave dangers to give the gospel to those who sit in darkness, and no pastor should accept a church budget that does not include foreign missions as a leading item. I quote another: "It is that burning and shining light held aloft in the pulpit that alone can light the path to triumph, and when that light burns true, missionary education, missionary recruiting, missionary budgets, will all be adequate for the business of the Kingdom."

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

As a strong and potent factor in our forward movement, let me mention with gracious commendation our Woman's Auxiliary, under the splendid leadership of Mrs. Randolph. These good women are doing their bit nobly. I mention also with appreciation the juvenile department, supervised by Mrs. Bullock. This new branch is destined to do great service in enlisting the young people in Christian service.

LOTT CAREY HERALD.

The Lott Carey Herald, edited by our honored colleague, Dr. Stokes, has done unique service and deserves the widest circulation. Each friend should subscribe and pay his subscription, and thereby help to contribute to its usefulness.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In conclusion, I recommend:

- 1. Preparation for a formal opening of our "Headquarters" in Washington.
- 2. That we set aside a sufficient surn of money to guarantee the prompt payment of the salaries of missionaries, or establish a credit for said purpose.
- 3. That we proceed to recall such missionaries now in our service as cannot be used advantageously.
- 4. That we hasten as rapidly as possible on the buildings planned to be erected in Liberia.
- 5. That we take under advisement the appointment of a field secretary, who will spend his entire time developing the home field and raising funds for the Convention. We realize that it is a physical impossibility for the Corresponding Secretary to do both the office and the field work.
- 6. That we urge our missionaries who control boarding schools

to plan to make said schools self-supporting as far as it possibly can be done.

- 7. That we declare our good-will toward the perpetuation of the only two Negro governments in the world—Haiti and Liberia—and offer to them our sympathy in their efforts to maintain their independence and freedom.
- 8. That we take up the work at "Ricks Institute," in Africa, donating for this work \$500.00.
- 9. That we cement by resolution and service the co-operation formed between us and the National Baptist Convention, Unincorporated.

CONCLUSION.

The work as I see it is briefly placed on the trestle-board for your consideration. True to our time-honored policy, let the business of this meeting be done solely with the view of "lengthening our cords and strengthening our stakes." Take courage and go forward!

"Say not the struggle naught availeth,
The labor and the wounds are vain,
The enemy fainteth not, nor faileth,
And as things have been they remain.

"If hopes were dupes, fears may be liars;
It may be in you smoke concealed,
Your comrades chase e'en now the filers
And, but for you, possess the field.

"For while the tired wave vainly breaking
Seems here no painful inch to gain,
Far back, through creeks and inlets making
Silent gains, flooding in the main.

"And not by eastern windows only,
When daylight comes, comes in the light,
In front the sun climbs slow, how slowly,
But, westward look, the land is bright."

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to make the following report:

In this hour of extreme traffic in alcoholic beverages and noxious ingredients of morphine and narcotics; these accompanied with rampant violations of the prohibitive laws enacted by the State and statute, and seeing the great encroachment that has been made against the mandates of God which command men to be temperate in all things.

Taking the situation under consideration, we view it as appalling to the best interest of humanity and the establishment of the Kingdom of God in the hearts of men.

Therefore be it Resolved, That the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention go on record as entirely in accord with all prohibition enactments by the Federal Government relative to temperance practically and the Laws of God in particular. That our ministers and churches keep this matter in view and preach it very frequently to the people.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I-NAME.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE H-OBJECT.

Section 4. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Sec. 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

Sec. 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Sec. 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nina members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Sec. 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Sec. 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to votes.

Sec. 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

ANNUAL ADDRESS BEFORE THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE LOTT CAREY BAPTIST F. M. CONVENTION.

BY MRS. J. H. RANDOLPH, President.

Dear Co-workers: It is a privilege of supreme joy and pleasure to us to assemble today in the city of Norfolk as the guests of First Calvary Baptist Church, a church that is noted for its wonderful achievements and largeness of heart; a church known far and near for its zeal and spirituality, from the days of that veteran gospel preacher, the Rev. Madison Lewis, and the Rev. P. J. Wallace, that master builder and pulpiteer of note and fame.

But we are here through the broad-hearted invitation extended by the Rev. O. J. Allen, their esteemed and beloved pastor.

We greet you who have gathered here from the different States to put over the great program which has been planned for these sessions of our Convention.

Twenty-five years ago the Woman's Auxiliary was prought into being by the members of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, at Alexandria, Va., on August 31, 1900. The Provident, Dr. C. S. Brown called together a group of women in attendance upon the Convention, and stated the need of a woman's organization to assist the brethren in fostering the Kingdom of Christ at home and abroad, especially in Africa. At the conclusion of the remarks, Mrs. Alice E. James was elected president and the organization effected and launched upon the denominational seas. How well she has kept the course through baffling seas, is evident by the multitude of women who are now embarked upon her; and with sails unfurled to the breezes of Gospel power. These women of faith and prayer are saying, "Sail on! Sail on"

We find ourselves assembled today with God's approval of our attempts and efforts to continue the work, which for twenty-five years has become a definite part of our duties and cares.

The success and achievements which have been attained in this specific enterprise are due to the unbiased efforts, earnest endeavors and Christian fortitude shown, with a consciousness of God's abiding hand leading, and His boundless love overshadowing us. Again, success has been attianed because of the quality of the work, the ability of the workers and a keen insight into the needs of such work; which have proven a great blessing in stabilizing the Missions Program of our Convention.

The age in which we live is regarded by those who are students of history as the greatest known to the human race; and the happy thought of living at this time, and to be engaged in the work that

The world today is craving for the truth, and if we would satisfy this craving we must offer them Jesus Christ, who is the Truth and the Life. We must sow the seed and God will take care of the harvest. We are commanded to proclaim Christ to all the world, for our field is the world, and we can find in it at all times men and women who are ready to be saved. The work of Christian Missions is a common cause of expansion, extending from the fireside of every well-regulated Christian home to the uttemost parts of the world. This burning zeal and fervor springs from the fountain head, the Church at home, and leads on to foreign missionary achievements and victories on this foreign field. Our task is a tremendous one; we are to effect an ethical and spiritual revolution in the whole world, and change the attitude of men toward men, nations toward nations, by giving men and women a thrill of new life in Jesus Christ our Lord. Will you do your share? The Master calls, will you obey? The S. O. S. call comes ringing over land and sea, from Africa, China, Burma, Haiti, and the Islands of the sea, pathetically saying, "Save our souls, lest we perish." What will you do? Let none hear idly saying that there is nothing we can do, while the souls of men are dying and the Master calls for you.

If we have felt the touch, and realize the call to service in the vineyard of our Master, then let us answer, "Take my life and let it be consecrated Lord to Thoe; take my hands and let them move at the impulse of Thy love."

The work in which we are engaged is a dignified enterprise; it is the work that angels would gladly do, but the opportunity has been given us. The angel rolled the stone from the door, but the women had the honor of telling the story of His resurrection. May that same joy and enthusiasm that moved them to begin that stupendous task, inspire us today to toil on, until every gate to every heathen city shall be opened, and the standard of the Cross of Christ shall be planted in the darkest jungles. Then shall a new age dawn in this blighted world; and a civilization, a Christian civilization, that will make the world what Christ would have it be—a. New Creation.

Let us not falter nor fear because of the contrary opinions of modernism, evolution, and the like, which tend to offer ease and complacency to those who would indulge in sin and ignore the fundamentals of the New Testament teachings and faith. These new

teachers lacking in spiritual life, stressing the "letter" at the expense of the Spirit and the more weighty things of God, are only making clear the Holy writ; that the time would come when teachers would appear with shrewdness of speech and mental agility and would devour the very elect.

LOTT CARRY FOREIGN MISSION CONVENTION

Be firm, my Sisters, in the faith once delivered to the saints. Indulge as little as possible in controversies over the things that do not profit in your Bible classes, but lead the young further from God through the strife of tongues. But teach them potent factors in Evangelical and modern missionary movements; that they may earry forward the work of soul-winning and Kingdom building, when we shall be called to our reward. We must lay the foundation of our missionary work on a true basis and intrust it to none other than regenerated hearts, both at home and abroad; for at best, we are inadequate to the task of meeting and contending with modern devices of unparalled combinations of human skill, without a deep sense of loyalty and duty to Him who said, "Co ye, therefore, into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

The impregnable wall of Confucionism, Buddhism, the wretched systems of cast and racial prejudice, must be met, and its problems solved by the principles of the Christian religion. Therefore we must have a larger inducement of the spirit of God, with faith, love and sacrifice to challenge the materialistic tendencies of this new age, and accomplish our task of saving the world for Christ.

The Annual Address delivered yesterday by Dr. C. S. Brown, was one which gave to us encouragement and hope for better work in the future and a more satisfactory fulfillment of our plans and purposes, and especially his reference to immediate construction of our buildings on the foreign field.

We also heartily commend and approve of his recommendations pertaining to the requisites that should be required, and the training and temperamental examinations that should be given our missionaries before their acceptance for the foreign field.

In fact, if the Executive Board, of which we are a part, shall act immediately upon his resolutions referred to us for action, then, in my opinion, the future holds in store for us a bright and glowing prospect for better and more substantial work than ever before in the history of the Convention.

We are glad to have Dr A. A. Graham, the Corresponding Secretary of the parent body, present with us, after having passed through such an ordeal of affliction during the interim of our Convention. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Norfolk, Va., August 30, 1925.

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Lott Carey Foreign Missier Convention met with the Second Calvary Baptis; Church, Tuesday Noon, August 30

The President Mrs. P. G. Shepherd, presiding. The usual devotionals were conducted, and a beautiful and uplifting spiritual praise and testimonial meeting was held.

The house was then called to order and the most of the board members answered to the roll call.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with the necessary corrections.

The President of the Auxiliary brought to the Board the blue print of the prospective girls' dormitory to be built by the Auviliary at Careysburg. She also explained the part (he Auxiliary would be expected to play in the execution of the plan. The information obtained through Dr. A. A. Graham, of the parent body's intention to begin the construction of the three buildings at once, gave great joy and impetus to the hearts of those who have worked and prayed and hoped for the time when these buildings would be

A motion prevailed that as the addressed names of officers of

the Auxiliary, and Executive Board did not appear in the minutes. that the Recording Secretary would secure the same and see that they were printed in the minutes and that she send to the secretary of the board a copy of the names and addresses of the officers and Executive Board members.

The saw mill proposition was explained by Mrs. Randolph, and also the apportionment for the Auxiliary and the women of North Carolina. These payments were to be made on the installment plan. The amounts paid to be credited to the buildings we have sponsored. The Sallie Mial by North Carolina women, and the Girls' Dormitory by the Auxiliary. \$2,000 has been paid by the women of North Carolina on their \$2500. \$2833 1-3 has been paid by the Augiliary on its apportionment of \$3500.

A motion prevailed, that the lending of money from the treasury of the Auxiliary, be left to the discretion of a committee composed of the President of the Auxiliary, the Secretary of the Executive Board, the Treasurer, and three other members of the board to be named by the President of the Auxiliary.

A motion prevailed after discussion of the training of our Junior Workers, that the officers of the Junior Department be changed every two years, that as many as possible have a chance for training for future usefulness.

A motion prevailed that the Auxiliary would give a certain sum to be used to furnish a delco system of light for our station at Brewerville, Africa.

It was motioned and carried, that a letter and some token of recognition be sent to Dr. and Mrs. Pegues to express the boards sympathy for them in their trials of sickness.

Mrs. Ora B. Stokes explained that a statistician was an unnecessary adjunct to the Auxiliary as Dr. G. E. Reid covered the whole ground in his report, who tendered her resignation as statistician of the Auxiliary.

Her resignation was accepted with thanks for the information.

Many other things were discussed which belong entirely to the work of the board, and much was done to get things ready for another year's work. The meeting closed with prayer,

We have passed another land mark in the history of our work. We enter a new year. We look back with joy over what has been accomplished, and the bell rings "out the old and in the new" with a deep trust that the great spirit will give us strength and a spirit of sacrifice that the work may go on.
