#### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America,

#### ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all bodies in fellowship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this Society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at least (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

#### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice-President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statisticion, a Treasurer and Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The Treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty as the said board shall require of him.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Board during the interim of the meetings of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a.m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) five dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) five dollars, and a life-member by the payment of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars at one payment.

#### ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

#### ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

#### RULES OF ORDER

Article 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Director shall control this body in its deliberations.

Article 3. Enrollment of delegates.

Article 4. Collection of Finance.

Article 5. Appointment of committees,

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article 8. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve month's notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

## **PROCEEDINGS**

Richmond, Va., August 30, 1927.

The 30th annual session of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America convened with the Sixth Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Rev. A. W. Brown, D.D., pastor.

#### TUESDAY EVENING-LOCAL PROGRAM

Dr. A. W. Brown, pastor, presiding.

Scripture lesson, Psalm 46, read by Rev. R. W. Underwood of North Carolina.

Prayer was offered by Attorney T. C. Walker of Virginia.

Chorus "Oh Hail Us Ye Free" by the choir of Sixth Mt. Zion Baptist Church.

Pastor Brown expressed very cordial relations between the races of Richmond and presented Hon. Thos. B. Moore to represent his honor, the Mayor, J. F. Bright and Governor Byrd.

Mr. Moore brought greetings from the white Baptist constituents of Richmond and expressed real joy in having this body assemble here. He declared that Virginia has played her part nobly in the building of this the greatest nation the world has ever known. Richmond has also made great contribution to the growth of the nation.

He commended this body for its noble purpose in the uplift of humanity in foreign lands.

He discussed the health conditions of Richmond as being exceedingly good, giving statistics of its death rate, being very low. There are six welfare organizations for social uplift among its colored population. The educational system of Richmond was highly praised. Because of the fine race relations the industrial conditions of Richmond are satisfactory. His message was warm and cordial.

Mme. Savilla Griggs sang a solo which was greatly appreciated by the large audience.

Mrs. A. W. Brown, wife of the pastor, extended a welcome on behalf of the church. She gave missions its proper place in the Christian world and as the chief object of the church. Unto this end Christ came and unto this end this body has assembled. She declared that the membership of this church is big in heart and liberal in spirit. She paid a fine and befitting tribute to the honored and lamented pastor of the church, Rev. John Jasper. Her words of welcome gripped the hearts of the messengers and made us feel highly welcomed.

Welcome on behalf of the Baptist Ministry of the General Association was delivered by Dr. W. L. Ransome.

Dr. Ransome spoke of the great advantages of Virginia in climate, soil, health, education and religiou. This state, he declared, offers some of the most beautiful scenery in the world. Richmond's progress was noted by the speaker.

He praised the people of Richmond for their hospitable spirit, religious inclination and predominating Baptist faith, their sound belief in the fundamental principles of Jesus Christ. His words of welcome were very pleasing.

Rev. R. M. Williams, pastor of the M. E. Church, expressed welcome on behalf of the other denominations of the city, six in number. He recounted and highly recommended the excellent report of the Corresponding Secretary of this body at the Norfolk session. He further commended this body for heeding the call of Jesus Christ to the fields of missions, noting its activities in Africa, Russia and other countries. Dr. Williams also expressed the desire that the Negro race produce a larger number of great preachers and thinkers. This can be done when big hearted laymen take the burdens off the shoulders of pastors and give him a chance to develop himself.

He hoped that this body in this session will give inspiration to some young man or woman who will become fired with a zeal for missions, such as Dr. Swatcher of Berlin had in going to Africa and spending his life there.

He spoke very effectively of the great Lott Carey who offered himself in the service of redeeming Africa.

Welcome on behalf of the business enterprises of Richmond was delivered by Mr. J. H. Peters. He brought greetings from

the colored business men of this city. He advocated the combining of business and religion. He also invited this Convention to visit the colored establishments of the city.

Dr. A. A. Graham, Corresponding Secretary of this Convention, was presented to introduce the speaker who is to respond to the welcome addresses. Dr. Graham stated that this spot is sacred and deeply spiritual, made so by its former pastor, John Jasper, one of the greatest preachers of his day. He expressed the desire that this session shall be the most happy, most holy, and most profitable in its history, and in keeping with the spirit of this people. He then introduced Dr. C. C. Somerville of Massachusetts to respond. In his usual pleasing manner Dr. Somerville accepted the words of welcome on behalf of the Convention.

He said that these words of welcome should mean the following things to us:

1st. An open gate to Africa and how best to carry on our work there.

2nd, A clearer revelation of our obligations to Africa.

3rd. Greater inspiration for the prosecution of our task.

He urged this body to send a representative to the New England Baptist Convention to speak of our work.

Pastor Brown then introduced the deacons, trustees and their wives, the social worker, Mrs. Harris, the pulpit aide, the Decorating Committee and the Ever Ready Circle.

Words of praise and gratitude to God were expressed by several messengers in the devotional hour.

Dr. C. S. Brown, president of the Convention, at the knock of the gavel, declared the Convention duly opened for business. He expressed great delight and profound gratitude to God for the assembling of this Convention on this sacred and historic spot.

Words of welcome on behalf of the white Baptists were given by Rev. Roscoe Meadows. He expressed greeting from the white Baptist group of Richmond and a deep and abiding interest in our group. He stressed an increasing enthusiasm for missions.

The Committee on Enrollment was appointed.

The Finance Committee was also named. (See committees.)

Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman of the Executive Board, presented the President, Dr. C. S. Brown, to deliver his annual message.

To the Convention:

The Board submits the following report and recommendations, having been adopted by your Board.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the entire indebtedness of \$20,739.94 of the Convention be wiped out at this session, the salaries of the Corresponding Secretary, his clerk and the missionaries taking precedence.

2. That, because of the very evident need of retrenchment no fee be paid the presiding officers of Convention or Executive Board, but that reasonable expenses be allowed.

3. That no due bills be accepted and counted as money.

4. That all unpaid pledges made or worthless checks given by salaried employees of the Convention be deducted from the salary allowed such employees.

5. That further efforts be made to collect the moneys represented by the worthless checks given by delegates to the Convention and certain members of the Executive Board.

6. That all notes, checks and other official papers be signed by officers in their official capacity and not as individuals.

7. That all bills be itemized.

8. That all moneys be placed in the treasury to be disbursed therefrom.

9. That no expenditures be made without due authorization.

10. That long trips of officials be made by the usual mode of travel rather than by auto, when such trips are made at the expense of the Convention. If auto trips are made, they may be made with reasonable expenses.

11. That all moneys paid in by Auxiliary of affiliating bodies or by individuals for salaries for certain missionaries be paid such missionaries and not diverted to other channels.

12. That when this organization is compelled to borrow money from banks or individuals such money be deposited in the treasury and checked therefrom by the Treasurer.

We, your Committee, desire to make the report on the President's Address:

We have carefully perused the thoughtful address of our honored President and after careful consideration recommend that the address to be printed in full in the Lott Carey Herald.

Second, that the resolution on budget be adopted with the provision that no moneys be spent for building purposes until the current indebtedness is paid.

That the recommendation number 2 be changed to read, "That all moneys shall properly and promptly be reported to the Treasurer monthly and statements of receipts of said moneys be printed monthly over the signature of the Treasurer in the Latt Carey Herald."

That the recommendation number three be adopted.

That the recommendation number four be adopted.

That recommendation number five be adopted as read.

#### RESOLUTIONS

Richmond, Virginia, September 2, 1927.

Whereas, the new enactments by the several states requiring that all graduates in medicine from the several colleges and universities before applying to the several state boards for examination to become licensed physicians shall take an interne course at some "A" grade hospital, and

Whereas, there are such few "A" grade hospitals in the United States to which colored graduates in medicine may apply for entrance to serve as internes, and since this so vitally affects the race, as there may be no colored physicians in the future, or a very limited number, unless there are additional "A" grade hospitals established in large centers so as to furnish hospital facilities under colored management insuring colored graduates opportunities to take interneship;

Therefore be it resolved by this Convention assembled; that it go on record as endorsing the idea of establishing "A" grade hospitals in large cities, such as New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Richmond, Virginia, Atlanta and such other cities. And that this Convention encourage our people to support such movements for the purpose of alleviating suffering humanity, performing a Christian duty of the highest culture and furnishing hospitalization for the highest development of efficiency in our physicians and surgeous.

#### LAW AND ORDER

The Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, since its organization has been known to stand for law and order, and the enforcement of the provisions of the Constitution, and now in its thirty-first annual session, does re-affirm with emphasis its position along this line and urge that the constituency of this great body wherever found, will stand solidly behind the Convention in its declarations and pre-amble.

#### STATE OF THE COUNTRY

While it is evident that there is a state of unrest in the country on account of the fluctuations in trade and business; and while there is a great deal of unrest in politics, the fruit of the growing tendency of communism, socialism, and radicalism; and while the unsettled condition of labor and capital has kept up a constant agitation for immigration; and while the desire to follow the call of fashion, has had a rather demoralizing effect, especially upon the young people of our group; yet faith in the principles and doctrines of the Christian church, leads us to believe that it has not lost its power, and will through the guidance of the Spirit lead the nation out into the region of confidence, fraternity, peace and a better understanding toward all manking.

## ADHERENCE TO DOCTRINE AND FAITH

This Convention was born out of the idea of doing missionary work according to the doctrine of the Bible which teaches that Christian men should strive to give the gospel of Jesus Christ to the heathen without regard to race, or people or previous condition of servitude, and during these years this has been the attitude of the Convention, and believes now that through faith in Jesus Christ we should go forward and give the gospel to the heathen.

#### NEW TERRITORY

While it has been the spirit of this Convention to occupy fully the territory covered by this Convention, we realize that our task is not done until we have done our best to reach and incorporate that territory not occupied in these United States. Just beyond us is the great New England territory, already ready "to harvest" as soon as this Convention shall undertake to invade. Your committee suggests that this matter be considered in this meeting and some steps be taken as soon as possible to get into this unexplored field.

### PUBLICATION OF PROCEEDINGS

That the proceedings of this body should be published to the world daily through the press, is admitted without argument, for without such publication very little will be known outside of the place in which the meeting is held. It is therefore necessary to have the proceedings published, and to that end a reporter should be appointed at the opening of each meeting to see that the doings of this Convention find its way in the public press.

## ENTERTAINMENT

Because of the very hospitable entertainment of this Convention by this great church, Sixth Mount Zion Baptist Church, and its pastor, Rev. A. W. Brown, together with his members and its friends, we desire to express our heartfelt appreciation. The entertainment has been liberal and generous. We feel greatly indebted to these good people for our entertainment. We can wish for the continued welfare of this great church and its pastor.

#### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I—NAME

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

#### ARTICLE H-OBJECT

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1. The officers of the Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Sec. 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

Sec. 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Sec. 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carcy meets.

Sec. 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Sec. 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to votes.

Sec. 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises,

How to overcome these difficulties, we need a baptism of the missionary fire that will burn out these evil desires.

Christ is potential, is a fact.

Another difficulty is that our field of activity is so far from our home base.

The non-consecration of the missionaries and our tendency to accept without hearing the other side.

The lack of confidence in our leaders.

The unbusinesslike methods of making reports from our missionaries and secretaries.

Inaccurate facts, the lack of literature.

Non-respect of authority and of funds to put in print helpful facts.

I. Plans for raising money:

Talent Rally, Candle-light Service, Million Dollar Wedding. But the best way of all to raise money for God's cause is Tithing.

What we have is a trust fund to be given to foster the cause of Christ.

We need more faith, more knowledge, a deeper vision.

## ANNUAL ADDRESS TO WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

On this occasion I come to you with a prayer upon my lips and a heart full of love and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for permitting us to meet again in another annual session.

We are grateful for the invitation to meet in this historic city, and we are especially pleased to hold the session of our Auxiliary in this commodious and beautiful house of worship. This church is widely known for its noted pastors and Christian workers. The name of Dr. Richard Wells was a household word in this city among the high and the low. His sagacious utterances and gentle manner gave him a unique place in the religious life of the denomination and the race.

The present pastor, Dr. W. II. Stokes, is known for his scholastic attainments, his fervent gospel messages, and his forensic power. But we know him best as the editor of the *Lott Carey Herald*, which keeps before us the doings of our Convention throughout the year.

We are more than pleased to greet such a concourse of women here assembled in the interest of a worthy cause which should claim the attention of every Christian man and woman of every clime and nation; and that is soul-saving.

You, as delegates, have left your several homes to be present, to faithfully look after the real interests of the work of the Conven-

tion, and to carry back a true and honest report of that which you have seen and heard. You are here for observation, consideration, and expression touching the vital issues which may arise concerning the extension of the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour among the peoples of the world.

There are many possibilities before us for larger and greater service; therefore, let us arise and lay hold of the present opportunities for molding Christian character at home, as well as extending the kingdom of God among the heathens. The field is large and unhedged, and it is our duty to labor while it is day, remembering that we are laborers together with God.

The Christian of today who will answer to the call of duty will not have idle hands, drooping eyes, slothful feet, and inactive minds, but all of the alertness that should characterize a true disciple of Christ.

The aim of men today is to achieve honors pertaining to material things; to dig, to search, to explore, to soar high in the heavens, that they may win for themselves a name that will place them among the most honored of the world. If these men labor thus for those things which perish with the fleeting years, how much more important it is for us as believers, toilers, and winners of souls in this evil world to press the claims of Him who said, "And I if I be lifted up from the earth will draw all men unto me?"

The church has a mission, and is serving its mission when it opens its doors to all mankind to enter and receive the gospel.

The church is serving its mission when it launches out to send the gospel abroad, and to lend a helping hand to those desiring to know the great Teacher Jesus Christ, who said, "If any man will come after me let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

We are here as followers of Christ to fortify and strengthen the weak places in our common cause, and to carry on with Christ until He shall see of the travail of His soul in the gathering of the nations.

There was never an age when true womanhood was more thoroughly tested and needed in human society than now. The strain and demands were never greater than they are in modern society at the present time. Woman is forging her way forward in every line of human endeavor, achieving and demanding her rightful and meritorious place in the world's progress, both in the scientific and spiritual movements of world advancement.

We have chosen for our sphere of service and human betterment as an organization, cooperation with God in His great plan of human redemption.

Let us act well our part until the Master comes to reward the true and faithful; and then with the true and tried; with the dross of life cleared away we shall come rejoicing, bringing in the sheaves from every land, for they that win souls shall be counted wise, and shall shine in the kingdom of God forever.

As we think and ponder over the work which lies before us, we realize each day that it becomes more and more a part of our task, it demands our serious consideration; for the problems to be solved are many, the hour is at band when we must quell the emotions of our souls and settle upon a sane and solid basis for future work.

The hour is at hand when every opportunity should be utilized in molding and forming sentiment that will give life and vigor to the women of this organization, help and encouragement to the parent body.

If we want to do our best it should be now; if we want Christ's name glorified through our work, it should be now; if we want our lives to be given to His service, it should be now. We must strike while the opportunity is at hand, for with the passing days, time rushes on and leaves precious opportunities unused.

Some years ago it was recommended and adopted by this body that we should organize subordinate branches to this Auxiliary in districts wherever enough circles were found closely associated, for the purpose of cooperation and stimulation in the objects of this body. This has not been done to the extent of our expectation. Only one branch has been formed, and that is the district branch of Washington, D. C., Mrs. G. O. Bullock, President. Let us go back to our homes and organize, that better results may be obtained along all lines in our work.

The dormitory to be erected at Careysburg, West Coast, Africa, by the women of this Auxiliary still holds its place of interest in the great building program of beautifying and improving the possessions of the Lott Carey Convention. There has been some anxiety about securing some one to superintend the erection of our buildings in Africa. We pray that God will send us missionaries who are consecrated to carry the gospel to the unsaved.

In our executive meeting a few weeks ago, the question was asked why don't you pray for some one to go to Africa to erect our buildings as well as pray for the missionaries? Then one of the members arose and said that I will go to Africa and stay one year and superintend those buildings. We were happy and ready to approve of his going, for we know of his ability to look after such, and of the business-like way in which he deals with any matters assigned to him. I have asked permission to use his name, and it is none other than our estcemed Dr. F. W. Williams, formerly of Norfolk, Va., but now of Pittsburgh, Pa., who is willing to go for our Convention.

Among the notes from the Corresponding Secretary's office, we learn that the government is building a new hospital in Monrovia, and it was felt that there is no need to duplicate this work in Monrovia. The Lott Carey Convention has been given some money

to build a hospital. If the Convention, with the consent of the donor, should see fit to cooperate in having a ward in the government hospital, I would suggest that in connection with out-buildings at Brewerville and Careysburg that clinics be established and maintained for minor cases, and all major cases be cared for at the hospital, and that a nurse be employed for each clinic.

No plan in our work has been given a larger support than the making of garments for our people in foreign lands. For several years large supplies of goods and garments of all kinds, shoes and articles too numerous to mention, have been sent up for the missionaries and the people in distant lands.

We have at present a full supply on hand, and with those that are sent up this year will be sufficient for a few years. At the same time, I have in mind that there are new circles which have come with us, and if they wish to get the thrill of making and contributing garments we shall accept them and add to those which we have on hand. Arrangements are being made to send a large shipment of goods within a few months to Africa, Haiti, and India.

My sisters, I want to ask, for next year, that those who have so kindly sent in goods will now turn your attention to help clear the indebteduess on our Lott Carcy headquarters, located at 1501 Eleventh Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. This effort would retieve the Convention of a part of the responsibility, help to dispense with the taxes, and give room for the entire building to be fitted and used in keeping with what should be styled as Headquarters.

I want to ask also that you will accept this plan and set apart a day to rally for this indebtedness, that each member will at least give \$1.00 for such a worthy cause.

This building belongs to you, to your children, and even to the unborn, who will some day rise up and revere, honor and call you blessed for such a gift.

Here is an opportunity for the Children's Department to share in this great rally, their amounts to be apportioned by the supervisor, the president, and her official staff.

The Junior Department, Miss Bullock, president, held an inspiring meeting, which delighted all who were present. The president's address was well constructed, historical, and informing. Reports from the delegate's showed that they have done excellent work throughout the year. Each year of its existence shows progress.

The National Baptist Convention, Unincorporated, met in September, in Indianapolis, Ind., with a large delegation of men and women. Meetings were held at the hall and Rev. Mr. Hendon's Church. There are many phases of work connected with the Woman's Auxiliary. Interesting reports were given by the delegates and the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Fuller. The president, Mrs. Georgia DeBaptist Davidson, delivered a splendid address.

I received a large box of clothing from the Auxiliary. An invitation has been extended me to be present at Denver, Colo., to be on the program and to give echoes from the Lott Carey Convention. I regret that I shall not be able to attend, because of matters pertaining to the death of my father. I wish, however, to thank you for the opportunity given me last year to meet that noble body of Christian workers.

While we have gathered together from the different sections of our country and greeted each other, yet there is a silence that steals over us, and a stillness of remembrance that death has robbed us of some of our choicest workers, who have been our companions in service for a lifetime. I refer to the passing of Mrs. C. S. Brown, our First Vice-President, and Treasurer Mrs. J. H. Blackwell, and others. While absent from the body, and present with the Lord, yet I am deeply impressed with the thought that they are with us today in spirit.

There is no death! The stars go down
To rise upon some other shore,
And bright in heaven's jeweled crown
They shine forevermore.

And ever near us, though unseen,

The dear immortal spirits tread,
For all the boundless universe
Is life "there are no dead."

I listened attentively and with much interest to the address of the President of the parent body, Dr. C. S. Brown, and wish to express my hearty approval and commendation of such a course of leadership and direction as were expressed therein, and sincerely hope that these recommendations may be concurred in by all the members who heard them, and shall serve to place our body in its rightful place in the minds of our entire constituency.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

For some years I have carefully noted the progress of this Auxiliary and its development along all lines, and I feel that every available means should be used to improve its methods of operation and the preparation of its workers on the home field for more useful service; therefore, I wish to recommend that the program of our annual meeting be so arranged as to make it possible each day for conducting a missionary institute for at least one hour that shall be fraught with deep and fervent prayer, along with a thorough study of missionary methods and Christian work by a well-prepared

and trained instructor. I further recommend that a committee be appointed to consider the advisability and the agrangement for this special mission study hour.

My sisters, we are living in an age of advancement, and improved and modern methods are required today as never before to accelerate the work of organization. Therefore, I recommend that a typewriter be purchased for this organization and be placed in the office for our corresponding secretary's use, but shall be the property of this body.

That our usual donation of \$100 be given to the editor of the Lott Carey Herald, Dr. W. H. Stokes, for the work of the Herald.

And now, dear sisters, the thoughts which I have expressed concerning the betterment and future usefulness of our organization as a vital force for good in our chosen field of endeavor have not been uttered merely by chance, but after much solicitation and anxiety for larger service, which cannot be done without information and concentration to our common cause.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

Madam President, Officers, Members and Friends of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I greet you in this our twenty-seventh annual session in this historic city of Richmond. I consider it a great privilege, as well as a pleasure, to greet you in the city of my birth, in the city where I was taught to love the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and found Him precious to my soul, I thank God for this privilege, and I thank God for the loyal, selfsacrificing, faithful women of this Auxiliary. They, having caught the vision of service and cooperation, have made it possible for me to render this, my annual report. At times during this year clouds of criticism have hung dark and heavy over the work of our Lott Carey Convention. The work of the Auxiliary has been crippled, but we are not discouraged, we have not lost faith, we are working right on, doing our best to lift the Lott Carcy banner higher.

Knowing that we are trying to do this work in a Christian business-like way, making our reports quarterly, sending in the names of Circles and money sent by them. No, we are not discouraged: our dear women are at the broadcasting station, teaching the love and good will of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

During the year more than nine hundred circular letters have been sent to the various circles.

Many circles respond regularly, but sisters we are not satisfied; we are anxious to hear from every church connected with our Lott Carey Convention. I will be very glad to get the names and addresses of presidents or secretaries represented here at this meeting who do not receive the circular letters. You are urged to subscribe to the Lott Carey Herald, that you may get information concerning our work. Through the courtesy of Mr. James L. Sibley, your Corresponding Secretary attended, in February, a very splendid conference of missionaries, teachers, and workers who have served in Liberia, and candidates for the foreign field at Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va. Representatives of the Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopal, and Baptist churches met on the common ground of Christian fellowship, to consider the best methods of doing educational and missionary work in Liberia, Africa. Missionary work is a great big problem, and it is our problem. It was brought out at this conference that the native Africans are looking to the American negro to help solve this problem.

At present, Liberia is undergoing a great change. The Firestone Company, of New York City, has a lease on thousands of acres of land for development, employing about twelve thousand men, paying them a shilling a day for their services. We talked with returned missionaries and workers of the Foreign Field. They spoke well of the Lott Carey work, and especially of the work that is being done at Brewerville by Rev. and Mrs. Thomas and Miss Minnie Lyon, the work of Miss Gooding and Dr. Hubbard. It was whispered to me that their greatest need was money; hence I stress missionaries' salaries, and every dollar that comes to me undesignated I report it on missionaries' salaries.

During this year our hearts have been saddened by the home going of dear Mrs. C. S. Brown, first Vice-President; our beloved Treasurer, Mrs. Annie E. Blackwell, and many other faithful workers.

I sincerely thank you, my dear sisters, for your love, your sympathy, your words of encouragement, and your cooperation in this great work of sending the Gospel to those who have it not, I again thank you.

LOTT CARRY FOREIGN MISSION CONVENTION

Richmond, Va., August 30, 1927.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, met in the Sixth Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Richmond, Va., at 1 p.m. Tuesday, August 30th, Mrs. P. G. Shepherd, the President, presiding. "Onward Christian Soldiers" was used as the opening song. After a short but beautiful Scripture lesson and prayer, the President, in a few well chosen words, aroused the spiritual side of the meeting, and a general praise and consecration to service swept over the entire delegation.

At the proper time the meeting was open for business, Mrs. J. H. Randolph asked that the Board retire to a private place for meeting.

The pastor's study was kindly opened for the comfort and privacy of the Board. The roll was called and most of the members were present.

On motion the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted with necessary corrections.

On motion the meeting was thrown open for business.

The Junior Department was discussed by Mrs. Weeks, Mrs. Grey, and Mrs. Shepherd. All expressed themselves as anxious that the Junior Work be so broadened that each section from time to time be given a chance as young people for thorough training as future workers.

The next feature to claim the attention of the Board was the minutes. After discussion it was decided to see if the parent body could not do something, and if not that the Board act itself.

Mrs. J. H. Randolph made a stirring appeal for trained workers, and some one to train them.

The late Mrs. C. S. Brown and Mrs. A. E. Blackwell's work was dealt with in a most lovable and complimentary manner, and by common consent, Dr. J. H. Blackwell's privilege to read and explain Mrs. Blackwell's work, was approved.

The outstanding loans of moneys from the Auxiliary's Treasurer was also explained.

All moneys out on interest and that in banks were carefully explained to the satisfaction of the Board.

Other business claiming the attention of the Board was discussed by a number of delegates. After all had expressed themselves, a committee was appointed to go to the parent body and get a set time when the Board could be heard.

On motion, a Committee on Grievances was appointed as follows: Mrs. J. H. Randolph, Mrs. W. T. Johnson, Mrs. M. L. Penn, Mrs. P. L. Anderson, Mrs. M. E. W. Puryear.

Mrs. Puryear the Secretary was asked to prepare in writing a questionnaire which would cover the things causing dissatisfaction.

The hour having arrived the questionnaire was presented to the

committee, approved, and the meeting adjourned to attend the meeting of the Executive Board of the parent body.

After the report of the Executive Board of the parent body, Dr. W. T. Johnson explained to the Board that the committee from the Auxiliary wished to bring before them some matters of importance. The Board kindly granted audience to the committee. The Secretary presented to the parent Board the grievances in the nine questions asked.

After the rereading and explanation of the questions asked, their "whys" and "wherefores," they were left in the hands to be studied and answered by the Corresponding Secretary, Dr. A. A. Graham.

The Board adjourned to meet with the parent body August 31, 9 a.m.

#### AUGUST 31, 9 A. M.

The Executive Board of the women's body met with the Executive Board of the parent body.

The meeting, after proper devotions, was opened for business.

After discussions on the questions submitted by the Executive Board a committee was appointed by the parent Board, allowing two members from the Auxiliary, Mrs. R. J. Grey and Mrs. A. J. Felton were chosen to act with the Auditing Committee of the parent body and to examine vouchers and audit the accounts of the Corresponding Secretary.

The meeting adjourned to meet when the committee was ready to report.

At 2 p.m. the Board reassembled to hear the findings of the Auditing Committee.

The committee after hard and careful work reported the following, "The moneys were satisfactorily accounted for, only there seemed to have been an undue extravagance in the use of the same. This was not countenanced by the Board nor the committee and a motion prevailed putting a safeguard around such expenditures in future. A motion prevailed that rules and regulations would hereafter be enacted so as to remedy moneys being used for purposes not designated, and that all sent up for salaries would be placed in the proper channel."

The parent Board appointed Dr. W. T. Johnson, Dr. W. H. Stokes and Dr. Reid to meet the Board of the Auxiliary and be present when the findings were reported. The Secretary of the Auxiliary was then requested to reread the questions which caused a grievance.

Dr. W. H. Graham was asked to answer the same. He said, there were not enough funds to get the minutes from the press. But the Secretary would be asked to put the all important matter of 1926 under cover of 1927 minutes and get them out as early as possible.

2nd. Moneys sent up hereafter designated by the body, would be placed where sent, unless some debt had been previously paid, then it would be used to reimburse the Treasurer from which it was paid.

3rd. The saw mill in Africa which had been paid for, but through some mismanagement is in litigation.

4th. The dormitories would be built as soon as the proper contractor could be found.

All were pleased at the suggestion that probably Dr. W. F. Williams would consider the work.

5th. The \$500 given for the Delco plant at Brewerville was in the treasury and the lights would certainly be put there, as soon as President King, Governor of Liberia, had decided certain facts pertaining to the work of our missionaries there.

6th. The Lott Carey Convention cannot build a hospital, but can maintain wards in the government hospital to be built by the Liberian government.

7th. That scholarship funds would hereafter be used for educational purposes in our foreign schools.

8th. The work of the Auxiliary not reported in the report of the parent body was an oversight.

9th. It is a custom to have certain persons sing and play at such bodies.

These were the findings:

After discussion by Mrs. B. G. Cousins, relative to the Auxilary's program being broken into by the parent body, the moneys paid out by Mrs. Puryear and plea for the careful handling and disbursements of the same so as to stimulate the work on all fields, and a most Christian-like plea from Mrs. A. J. Felton and Mrs. R. J. Grey, the Board's assurance that the future would be carefully looked after; with the best of spirit, the Board adjourned.

#### SEPTEMBER 2, 1927

The Women's Executive Board met at the Ebenezer Baptist Church at 3 o'clock p.m.

The President presiding. After the usual devotional exercises were beautifully carried out the unfinished business was taken up. The findings of the committee aforementioned and the explanation given by the Corresponding Secretary were read, discussed, and approved.

Drs. Stokes, Johnson, and Reid of West Virginia spoke to the Auxiliary and affirmed the findings and expressed themselves as grateful to the ladies for the splendid work done and the attitude taken to satisfy themselves fully about the future work.

They pled with the Auxiliary to assist in paying the back salaries. After expressions of future fidelity to the work, the meeting adjourned to meet Saturday a.m. to finish business.

#### SATURDAY 9 A. M. SEPTEMBER 3, 1927

The meeting of the Auxiliary was held in the parlor of a private ome.

Drs. Stokes and Hughes were present.

The business left undone was taken up.

Reports of financial conditions were splendid.

All debts of the present sitting were canceled, small donations were made helpers at the churches, and the entire debt on missionary salaries was paid by the Auxiliary, also debts that were unpaid because of lack of funds.

It was motioned by Mrs. M. M. Lewis and approved by the body, that Mrs. Randolph be allowed a stenographer whenever she needed one to expedite the arduous work she had to do for the body.

The meeting adjourned, with thanks from the representatives of the parent body. Joy in the hearts of the workers and a zeal to put over the next year's programme with a greater effort to push the Gospel on into the heart of the places yet unreached. The President, Mrs. Randolph, asked that instead of sending garments another year, to send the money that schools and buildings may be creeted for our workers and their charges.

Richmond, Va., August 31, 1927.



#### ANNUAL ADDRESS

Bu MISS NANCY E. BULLOCK, President

Officers, Members of the Junior and Intermediate Department, and Friends:

It is with unmitigated pleasure that we greet you on our seventh anniversary. We are also happy that this anniversary is taking place in the same State in which we came into existence. A bearty and cordial welcome is extended to all of those circles that are making their initial representation with us, and it is our sincere desire that they join whole-heartedly with us in the work of sending the gospel to heathen lands. For the benefit of these circles and those who have not been so closely connected with our phase of the work, I shall give a short history of our department.

At the regular session of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention, which met in Portsmouth, Va., September, 1920, Mrs. J. H. Randolph, President of that Auxiliary, with great foresight, suggested the organization of a Junior Department. A few young people who were attending the Convention, came together at the "children's hour" at the Friday afternoon session and effected their organization, choosing their own officers and making plans for future work. Our mother auxiliary appointed a superintendent and work began in earnest. Since that time, at our various annual sessions, there has been a noted increase, both in numbers of delegates and amount of contributions. At our first annual session in Newark, N. J., our total contribution was less than \$500; last year, in Brooklyn, N. Y., our total contribution exceeded \$1,000. This year we are striving for \$1,500.

However, in our effort to swell our contributions, we do not want to lose sight of our purpose-to send the gospel to the heathen boys and girls. We desire to use these contributions solely as a means to an end. It may be possible that some of us fail to have a full realization of the plight of the heathen. We think of it slightly, perhaps contribute a nickel or dime, and then it passes without further consideration from our minds. Last year we studied the historical background, including the early settlement of Liberia, its struggles for existence, independence and things of that nature. We found that of the 2,060,000 Negroes, only 50,000 were civilized. This does not mean that the small number of 50,000, as compared with the 2,060,000, have been touched by the work of our society, but that this number has become civilized through various agencies. This also shows the great amount of work left for us and future generations to do. If we can thoroughly realize the needs and situation of the heathen children, there will be little trouble in securing funds to send them aid. I am sure,

We become indignant when we read of the repression and exploitation of China. We agree with its demands for freedom from "foreign assumptions of superiority" and with its efforts to "make its own tariffs" and to "exercise judicial functions on her own soil exactly like other sovereign nations." When we read of like oppressions and subordination and exploitation of India by Great Britain, even though we do not make ourselves fully cognizant of all the facts in the case, our sympathy is placed with the Indians. The sufferings and privations of Russia during the change of governmental conditions were a source of pity to us and everything possible was done by us to alleviate starvation. But what is all this as compared with the plight of the heathen? the starvation of souls? Can our sympathies be aroused in their behalf to the extent that we will do all in our power to send the light to them?

In the latter part of the eighteenth century, in England there was a condition, the parallel of which has never been reached since. The rapid growth of city populations created problems which at first received no attention. Water supply, drainage and cleanliness were all ignored; and proper housing conditions did not exist. The masses of workmen and their families dwelt in den-like garrets and cellars, bordering upon crowded pestilential alleys, in perpetual filth, misery and disease. But, above all this, there was a greater evil: little children were compelled to work in factories and mines from twelve to sixteen hours a day with a small pittance for pay. Women and children comprised the greater portion of factory employees. Parish authorities had the power to take children from pauper families in order to apprentice them to employers; and destitute or disolute parents sold their offspring into such service by written contracts. In their earlier years of the century, gangs of belpless little ones, from six to seven years upward, secured in this way, were auctioned off, thousands at a time, to great factories, where their life was a ghastly slavery. They received no wages, they were clothed in rags, their food was insufficient and of the coarsest kind and often they had to eat standing at their work while the machinery was in motion. They were driven to work from twelve to sixteen hours a day by inhuman torture; they had no holidays, and the few hours of sleep were spent in filthy beds from which some other relay of little workers had just been roused. Of schooling and recreation there was little.

In 1800, a terrible epidemic among children in certain factory districts aroused attention, and in 1802 a law "reduced" the hours of labor for child-apprentices to twelve a day. In 1819 and 1831 mild attempts were made to shorten hours of labor for children, but the laws were not enforced. Lord Asheley, Earl of Shaftsebury, spoke with great emotion forty years later of how he used to stand at the factory gates and watch the children come out, "sad, dejected, cadaverous creatures," among whom "the crippled and distorted forms might be counted by hundreds"; and the poet, Southey, in 1833, declared of the factory system that the "slave trade is mercy compared with" it." Indeed, this piteous story defies language, but it found its best expression in a passionate protest from the great heart of England's chief woman poet, Mrs. Elizabeth Barrett Browning, in "The Cry of the Children":

Do ye hear the children weeping, O my brothers,
Ere the sorrow comes with years?
They are leaning their young heads against their mothers,
And that cannot stop their tears.
The young lambs are bleating in the meadows,
The young birds are chirping in the nest,
The young fawns are playing with the shadows,
The young flowers are blowing toward the West.
They are weeping bitterly!
They are weeping in the playtime of the others
lu the country of the free.

Now, tell the poor young children, O my brothers,
To look up to Him and pray,
So the Blessed One who blesseth all the others
Will bless them another day.
They answer. "Who is God that He should hear us,
While the rushing of the iron wheels is stirred?
When we sob aloud, the human creatures near us
Pass by, hearing not or answer not a word.
And we hear not (for the wheels in their resounding)
Strangers speaking at the door!
Is it likely God, with angels singing 'round Him,
Hears our weeping any more?"

But sad and piteous as this cry, there is yet a "cry of the children" wafted across the ocean on each breeze that might stir a heart of stone. This cry comes from children in dark, benighted, heathen lands. The touching description that Mrs. Browning has given of the suffering of those poor factory waifs is indeed worthy of sympathy, but how much more so is that of children whose souls are being lost, like the bodies of those children of 150 years ago! Those poor children of whom we have been speaking were suffering woeful bodily ills and abuses, but they at least had the opportunity, if they did not use it, of embracing a faith that would give them eternal joy and make easier the bearing of the tortures on earth. The heathen children have not that consolation.

The sad condition of the factory children of eighteenth century England has been alleviated, and through the efforts of philanthropists and humanitarians, their sufferings were taken away in the course of time. The situation and conditions have so changed that we cannot feel very deeply such wrongs; they seem more like a story or fairy tale to us. We can have little conception of the reality of such a life, and should thank God for the amelioration and changes that have taken place, and that we are living in an age of advancement and improvement. But can we sit back in complacency while souls of people who have never had the chance to hear the gospel are being lost? Is it not more incumbent upon us by virtue of the fact that we are enjoying certain privileges denied others, that we make an exemplary effort to save those in dark heathen

We speak of the youth of today as represented by such achievements as that of Lindbergh. All of us cannot be Lindberghs or bring to pass such feats in aviation or any other field, but we can lead out, be pioneers among the youth in our small groups, working and laboring to bring forth tangible results in Liberia and other countries where our Lott Carey Society is represented.

We, as workers in young people's missionary circles, can do much to inspire other young people to help us in our efforts. We cannot do this if we wear long faces and act as martyrs while we are working. We must enjoy the work ourselves, put our whole heart and soul in it. This will be done if we can keep before ourselves a vivid picture of the needs of the African and Haltian youth.

May I, at this moment, appeal to the executive officers of the Junior and Intermediate Department? I am asking that during the year they strive harder and harder to infuse into the local circle to which they belong the spirit of our department and Convention. May I impress it upon them that they set an example for the other members of their circles for hard work and continued interest, that during each of the quarters we might have favorable reports from each circle. Further, let us urge the various supervisors to continue in earnest endeavor, not to let the standard of our department be lowered, to keep the morale of the local organization in compatibility with that of our national organization.

May we finally arouse the supervisors to the extent that they, as well as the delegates from the various circles, carry back inspiration gained from the Convention-that they picture in vivid portrayal the needs of the heathen in such a way as to make it unnecessary to beg or urge contributions and help, but that even the smaller and younger members of their groups will listen, not to "The Cry of the Children" of eighteenth century England, but of the twentieth century Africa, as they say:

> "Oh, Buddha is cold and distant; He does not regard our tears, We pray, but he never answers; We call, but he never hears.

"Oh, Brahma, in all the Shasters, No comforting word has given. No help in our earthly journey, No promise or hope for heaven,

"Oh, vain is the Moslem prophet, And bitter his creed of 'fate': It lightens no ills to tell us That Allah only is great.

"We have heard of a God whose mercy Is tenderer far than these: We are told of a kinder Saviour By Sahibs from over the seas.

"They tell us that when you offer Your worship, He always hears: Our Brahma is dead to pleadings. Our Buddha is blind to tears!

"We grope in the midst of darkness. With none who can guide us aright: Oh, share with us, Christian children, A spark of your living Light!"
