CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all bodies in fellowship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this Society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at least (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice-President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statistician, a Treasurer and Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The Treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty as the said board shall require of him.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Board during the interim of the meetings of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a. m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) five dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) five dollars, and a life-member by the payment of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER

Article 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Director shall control this body in its deliberations.

Article 3. Enrollment of Delegates.

Article 4. Collection of Finance.

Article 5. Appointment of committees.

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article 8. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months' notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

PROCEEDINGS

Winston-Salem, N. C., August 28, 1928.

The 31st annual session of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America met at the First Baptist Church Tuesday evening 8 o'clock.

LOCAL PROGRAM.

Col. James Timlic presiding.

Music—National Negro Anthem, led by the chorus of the First Baptist Church.

Prayer by Dr. W. M. Wells, of the M. E. Church, this city.

Selection by the Mount Pleasant Quartett.

Welcome address on behalf of the Baptists of the City by Rev. C. W. T. Barnes, pastor West End Baptist Church. Rev. Barnes brought greetings from the 18 Baptist Churches of the City, comprising one-third of the City's population.

He extended welcome to this body because of its passion for bleeding Africa. He declared that this is the largest Convention in the world devoted exclusively to a foreign mission program. Having carried the light to thousands in heathen lands, this body stands for the spreading of the Kingdom to those afar off. He commended this assembly for its Educational as well as religious program.

Faithful stewardship of finance was attributed to this body in that from 75 per cent to 85 per cent of its finance goes to foreign fields.

In closing he declared that this was the largest City in the State, with its 500 miles of paved streets, great educational advantages, big business enterprises, and its vast commercial system bids you a cordial welcome.

Dr. W. H. Wilcox extended welcome on behalf of the white Baptists of the City.

He stated that any City is to be congratulated upon having such a body of Kingdom builders come within its bounds.

This Convention possesses the higher type of selfishness in

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helping others, so that they may help us. The relation between the races is fine in this State.

(This Convention assembled from the East, West, North and South for the purpose of extending the Kingdom of God over all the world, receives the hearty welcome not only of the white Baptists, but of all of the constituents of the 91 churches of this City.

Welcome on behalf of the Women's Home and Foreign Mission Circle of this Church was delivered by Mrs. E. O. Donoho. She stressed the following points:

Man's desire for freedom.

World-wide evangelism.

Brotherhood of Man.

Our debt to the heathen world.

Women's part on this program, cordial welcome to this body.

Selection of Music by the Radio Four Quartett.

Violin solo by Mr. George Christian.

Dr. J. A. Bonner delivered an eloquent address of welcome on behalf of the Ministerial Union.

He declared the gospel to be universal, educational and progressive.

The world's deepest need is the gospel. This Convention stands for world-wide evangelization and for that reason it is entitled to a most cordial welcome.

Vocal solo by Mrs. Ceola Foote.

Welcome on behalf of the business and professional men of the City by Attorney W. A. Jones.

"When business bids you welcome it means business," declared Mr. Jones in his opening remark.

54 per cent of the people of this city are busy he further stated. He referred to the Bus Corporation. The largest of its kind in America.

The Colored bank solicits our patronage. Doctors, lawyers, dentists, undertakers and real estate men stand ready to help, as well as the 44 cafes, 8 drug stores, 22 Beauty

Parlors, 52 Barbers, 42 Tailors, 152 school teachers and 52 grocers unite in this welcome.

Because of our purpose in linking together the darker races of the earth he bids us welcome.

"Men of integrity is the greatest crying need of today."

He also emphasized the importance of putting more business into religion and more religion into business. He delights to be called a servant, having served his country in many capacities. He stands for the defence of this race and desires no higher honor.

The Sunday School was represented by Mrs. Nora L. Lewis.

She earnestly stressed the importance of the Sunday School whose purposes are to teach the Word of God, indoctrinate its pupils, educate in Bible study and raise the moral standard. She made a plea for attendance in Sunday School by all the people. She extended cordial welcome.

Mrs. Flora Gray rendered a vocal solo.

Response to Welcome Addresses by Dr. J. H. Hughes, of Orange, N. J.

Dr. Hughes humorously declared that welcome is felt rather than expressed in words.

"Finding ourselves is our task" declared the speaker. "All men were included when Christ declared 'It is finished.' We are to teach the heathen that they are included in this great program of redemption. He stated that this Convention rises above racial barriers. We never impress our people any more than we are impressed ourselves.

He believes the world is growing better and closed with an earnest plea for the execution of Christ's program.

He introduced Rev. C. M. Bryant, of Liberia, Africa, who paid a glowing tribute to Lott Carey who opened the door of hope to thousands in dark Africa. He spoke of what has been accomplished by this body and of its future possibilities.

Miss Sarah Williamson, missionary to Africa, under the National Baptist Foreign Mission Board, and Dr. East, Secretary, were next introduced.

Miss Williamson praised highly the work of the retiring Corresponding Secretary Dr. A. A. Graham and urged that we pay more and complain less.

She brought greetings from Africa and the National Baptist Convention.

Her chief desire in early life was to be a Missionary to Africa.

She emphasized the need of a practical religion for the heathen, training of hands, mind and heart.

She made a strong plea for aid to be sent to the foreign fields.

This address was the crowning feature of the Convention and was greatly enjoyed by the entire vast audience assembled.

Foreign Mission rally and report of Finance Committee followed.

Dr. J. H. Randolph, the newly elected Corresponding Secretary expressed gratitude for the honor conferred upon him and sought the hearty support of the entire body.

President C. S. Brown closed the Convention with fitting remarks, declaring that Dr. Graham's connection with this body will continue and that he will represent this body over the country.

REPORT ON PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Winston-Salem, N. C., August 29, 1928.

We, your Committee on President's Address, beg leave to submit the following:

A careful perusal of the Annual Message of our President discloses thought and wisdom; and clearly sets before the Convention the scope, policies and needs of this great Convention. The Committee approves of his recommendations for further developments of the Convention by the extension of our bounds as well as intensifying the work of the fields already occupied:

1. We recommend that special stress be laid on the financial needs of the Convention; and that the churches and individuals be urged to make larger and more frequent donations to the work during the year.

2. We commend the President for his strong expression of a Co-operative Spirit with all Baptist Bodies.

3. The Committee approves the President's stand on Co-operating with the National Baptist Convention in establishing a Baptist Hospital in Liberia--and your Committee recommends that the plan of co-operation expressed by him be carried into effect by this body.

To make more effective our work on the foreign fields as urged by the President we recommend that a Special Supervisor be sent to the foreign field to supervise the work as soon as possible.

We also heartily commend the President for his stand on the dis-

tribution of funds, and urge the Convention to see to it that at least 75 per cent of all money coming into this Convention be spent on the foreign field, and further commend the President in designating Brewerville as the headquarters of our work in Liberia and that special stress be placed upon the development of this particular field as appears desirable to the Executive Committee.

RESOLUTIONS.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

These are crucial times in which we are living; changes of a radical nature are everywhere evident in business, in the social and religious life of the people in all sections of our country. A spirit of contention and strife is seen in many localities growing out of a struggle for bread and some times because of racial differences. The question of politics and the lines of division as drawn by the two parties, has widened the breach of good fellowship and is likely to become intensified. The farmers in the West are somewhat demoralized because of the low prices of their products and are making loud complaints asking for relief from some source.

On account of the great exodus of the Colored people from the South and increased influx of this population in Northern cities, and the new conditions in which they found themselves, which has caused some friction and misunderstanding among the people, but these conditions have become more tolerable, and the people of all races are getting along with a better understanding.

Because of these conditions we feel that the great panacea for these ills is prayer and a charitable disposition toward our fellowman, and a tolerant spirit. We feel that as a Convention we ought to do all we can to encourage a feeling of good will, toward our fellowman, white and colored, and to teach them as far as possible that the grace of God is sufficient, and that if men want the best of life, and a hope for that to come, they must have faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

LAW ENFORCEMENT.

Because of law enforcements of the respect for the organic law of the Constitution in the 14th and 15th and 18th amendments to the Constitution, and because of the enormous cost of enforcement, and because of the greatly increased numbers of law violators, we feel it our duty to let it be known that this Convention stands for enforcement of the amendments without the slightest variation.

We believe in the doctrine of citizenship and manhood rights with the doctrine of the "fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man" and that all men ought to be treated as men, and as equal in the eyes of the law, without distinction on account of race, colors or the previous conditions of servitude.

CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER BAPTIST BODIES.

In the efforts to develop a closer fellowship with all of the Baptist bodies we still maintain our claims that we shall do our utmost to that end. To aid in this we recommend the utmost of discretion shall be used in the remarks made in our sessions concerning other Conventions.

IV—POLICY OF EXPANSION.

The Sons of this world are wiser than the sons of light. A Successful policy of secular organizations is to expand aggressively as well as to work intensively the field already occupied. The opportunity of the Convention is nation wide. Certain sections of this great country are begging for the organic activities of the Convention. Other sections are ripe and ready for incorporation. Still others seem a bit indifferent, but will respond readily to a program that is open, broad and virile. The Committee urges that the Convention adopt and prosecute a real aggressive policy of serene expansion of its work in these United States of America.

V—COURSES IN MISSIONS.

Materialism of these present days is having a peculiar effect on religious workers. Not only are we facing a decline in the number of students entering our schools of religion but those who enter in the majority of cases have the wrong spiritual prospective. Hence, when their educational careers are finished they enter the work of the Kingdom with wrong standards and unhealthy motives.

This Convention makes a plea, therefore, that our theological seminaries, schools of Religion and other schools that are free to teach matters religious, place in their courses of study the subject of Missions. Unless religious workers in particular and all believers generally are taught in an intensive way their obligations to the work of Missions, the time will not be long when our missionary efforts will be a reflection and a mockery.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I—NAME

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Sec. 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

Sec. 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Sec. 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Sec. 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Sec. 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to votes.

Sec. 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

From the close of the last session of our Convention, the second, minute and hour hands of the clock have continued their rounds in their division of what we are pleased to designate as time.

And now the hand points to the hour, long expected by the personnel of the Convention to give account of our stewardship during the interim of our sessions.

The Creator of the Universe and Father of all mankind has been mindful of us and kept us from dangers seen and unseen during our absence one from another.

We are now comfortably housed in this historic city, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, the guest of the First Baptist Church, whose congeniality and hospitality are widely known. The hearty welcome, cordial greetings, and friendly hand-shakes extended us, by you, thoroughly prepare us for the work which we have to do.

We wish in turn, to again assure you, that we accept these friendly expressions with the hope that this shall be a record making session, and a reconstructive period of our Convention in the interest of Foreign Mission Endeavor. And when we leave Winston-Salem, we shall hope that a sane and sound program will have been effected by the true and loyal men and women of this Convention that will insure success with Christian union for all future times.

For twenty-seven years during the entire life of our Auxiliary it has had but one objective—reaching the unreached and saving the unsaved. This is the field in which we are endeavoring to specialize, by our Christian character, daily contact and deportment. We are striving to win souls for the Master in the homeland, by our financial sacrifices, we are helping to support our Missionaries, Teachers and Preachers on the foreign fields.

Through the kindness of the Circles and friends of our organization we have been able to send a large amount of clothing, goods, machines and other useful articles to Africa and Haiti.

Our greatest ambition is to build a Girls' Dormitory in Africa, but in this respect we have been greatly hampered and hindered in making real, this outstanding feature in our program. But to this

end we shall never tire nor hold our peace until we shall have erected at Carysburg that building for which the corner stone was dedicated in our annual session at Norfolk in 1925. Our plans and specifications have been drawn and paid for by you. As soon as a definite agreement shall be reached in regards to gathering the material and placing it on the grounds, we have the assurance of a man who will go over and superintend its erection.

We see the need of a more constructive plan of operation in our work, both at home and on the foreign field, if our work in the Master's vineyard is ever to measure up to our aims and ambitions, we must put a larger amount of practical business in every phase of our consecrated labor. If we would hold our well earned place and prestige as an organization, we must push to completion our building program, that something more tangible may be seen by all men; and serve as a back ground of inestimable value, and convincing force of our worthiness to occupy a place in Foreign Missionary Endeavor.

LIBERIA.

The major part of our Foreign Mission work is being done in Liberia, West Coast Africa; among a people of our own kith and kin; a Negro Republic, which is securing a real foot-hold and praiseworthy standing among modern Nations.

There is a growing and intense desire among them for larger and better educational opportunities. Though these people are handicapped in various ways because of disadvantages in shipping and other National needs, yet they are buoyant, hopeful and aspiring.

The eyes of this advancing people are set upon the dawning of a brighter day, and a new era ahead of them, when the dormant forces now slumbering shall be aroused by Christian education and culture to meet the present day awakening of racial and national consciousness of the world.

It was reported to the State Department by William T. Francis, United States Minister resident and counsel general, that the Liberian Government dedicated on May 13th, 1928, a well equipped Hospital, with a staff composed entirely of Liberians with the exception of one who is a German and a practicing Physician. The nurses of this hospital, namely Misses Magdolene L. Cooper, Jeanette L. Howard and Lucile Todd received their training at Lincoln Hospital, New York City. Miss Cooper, the chief nurse, is the sister-in-law of President King, of Liberia.

This report further states that there are two other hospitals, one by the Lutherans, known as Phoebe Hospital at Harrisburg, 35 miles from Monrovia; and also one of the Holy Cross Mission, near the French border, operated by the American Episcopal Church. Again it states that the National Baptists of America have in the course of construction a small Hospital at Monrovia.

For two or three months they have had in their service a female physician, a dentist and a nurse. With these adjuncts at work with the gospel for the alleviation of human suffering we can see an age of re-construction and human betterment in the affairs of the entire country.

Another notable avenue of material progress which is attracting the attention of those who are deeply concerned in the general welfare of Liberia is, what effect will the great Firestone Millions invested in Liberia have upon Native life? This company occupying large tracts of land and employing hundreds of Native laborers will afford an opportunity for development heretofore unknown. The liberal attitude manifested by Mr. Firestone toward the development of the country, and the good of the Natives, while carrying out his great plan of rubber production, is convincing the Liberian Government it is said, that he is not there for exploitation but legitimate business in human progress. This is evidenced in the well equipped schools, Hospitals and the comfortable living quarters provided for the laborers in his employment.

In surveying, therefore our African field, and noting the changes that are taking place in the economic and social relation among the people and the opportunity to earn a livelihood, which make living conditions more favorable than in former years, I see the need of a Missionary force maintained by us on the field that is not mercenary in its aims, nor self-seeking but spiritual minded and loyal to Christ and to the Convention which employs them.

I am praying that the day will soon dawn upon us when a Missionary Training School, will be equipped and financed in some suitable place as a common center for Missionary training of all the workers whom we shall send to the foreign field; I believe that many of the misunderstandings which we have on the field would never occur, and if they did occur would be more easily clarified and forgotten, if they had a clearer vision of their mission.

The influence of this training school with its wholesome atmosphere and contact would serve the purpose of making the Missionaries one in the common cause of soul-winning. It would also teach them how best to meet the common problems on the field and solve them in the spirit of Him who went about doing good. It would also teach them the right attitude to all the vexing social relations which are common to those who labor among the heathen.

HAITI.

Our work in Haiti is reported to be progressing under the supervision of Rev. Boaz A. Harris who has been for a number of years under the board of our Convention

INDIA

Our Missionary to India, Mrs. Banerje, who served for a short time under our Board, died in October, 1927. She had returned to India with high ambitions of doing a great work for her people, but our Heavenly Father directed otherwise and took her unto Himself.

RUSSIA

Our Russian work is still in tact and is asking any help that we may be able to extend. Our support to Russia in the past has been by donations to the crying needs of an oppressed people. Our prayers are still ascending unto God for their full emancipation and religious freedom.

OUR CHILDREN.

The opinion of parents concerning the conversion of children is gradually changing; while some refrain from allowing their children to become Christians and full fledged members of the church, others encourage their children to accept Christ and to be useful in His service.

Thank God, we find ourselves blessed with an organization of children, who by their efforts are sowing and reaping; bringing in sheaves garnered by them in their earnest endeavors to forward the Kingdom of God. All honor to the parents who are training their children religiously. An appreciation of gratitude to the Supervisor Mrs. O. S. Bullock and her staff of workers in training them. Words of commendation to the President, Miss Nancy C. Bullock, and the entire body for the praiseworthy work which they are doing.

God grant that this work may continue in our homes, churches, Bible Schools, and the community at large, that we may see greater fruits of our labors manifested in the growth, perpetuity, and the spirit of the organization. Our district branch presided over by Mrs. G. O. Bullock is keeping pace with its past record of activity. There is also a Children's Department superintended by Mrs. J. L. S. Holloman.

I attended the meeting of the Auxiliary to the General Baptist Association of Washington, D. C. This body of women has done a commendable work, but is now known as the Woman's Auxiliary Convention to the Baptist Convention of the District of Columbia, and is led by Mrs. S. F. Lewis. Clothing was sent to our Auxiliary from this organization for Africa.

The newly elected Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Belle Hendon, of the National Baptist Convention, Un-Incorporated, sent a large box of clothing for the missionaries.

GARMENTS

On July 21st, 1928, there was shipped by W. O. Smith & Co., 32 Water Street, New York City, on the S. S. West Kebar of Monrovia, four large boxes of goods for our Missionaries. 1 box for Mrs. F. B. Watson and Miss Clarice Gooding, 1 box for Rev. W. H. Thomas and 1 machine, and two boxes for Rev. E. D. Hubbard. Cost \$81.83. One box was shipped to New York to be sent to Rev. Boaz A. Harris, St. Marc, Haiti. The requirements by the Haitian Consular were of such, and with which I could not comply, that by my request the company returned the box to our headquarters at Washington, D. C.

1300 3-8 yards of new goods, 915 dresses, 223 pieces of underwear and many other articles were sent. I wish to mention the names of those who gave a part of their time to help arrange these goods for shipment: Mrs. Minnie King, Miss Sarah Whetts, Mrs. Pocahontas Donohue, Mrs. G. O. Bullock, Mrs. Ellen Gray (deceased) Mrs. Margaret Cole and myself.

I sincerely trust that you have brought up to this meeting a gift for our Lott Carey Headquarters, which is now occupied by the Corresponding Secretary of the Convention. The following persons made it possible to have the building in order for the moving of Dr. Graham and his family, namely, Mrs. Sophia Cross, Irene Garland, Minnie King and myself. Throughout the year I have served as Secretary of the Committee appointed by the Convention to pass upon all orders and bills to be paid by the Treasurer of the Parent body, and also attended the meetings of the Executive Committee with the exception of one.

Continuing to serve as Treasurer, from our last session until Mrs. G. O. Bullock received her bond, I wish to make the following report:

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

Madam President, Officers, Members, and friends of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention:

We are indeed very thankful to our Heavenly Father for this the privilege of greeting you in our Twenty-Eighth Annual Session in this great City of Industry and Education, Winston-Salem, N. C. We consider it a pleasure to be able to render unto you an account of our stewardship. The unrest of our workers on the foreign field

and clouds of criticisms that have been heaped upon our Convention on the home land has made this an unusually hard year for missionary work. We have sent hundreds of circular letters during the year and I am proud to be able to say, New Circles have answered, several regularly each quarter. These circular letters were typed on the Royal Typewriter bought by the Auxiliary for my use. I indeed thank you again for the typewriter, it has saved a little on our printing bill this year.

In April we had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Ketter, a splendid type of Christian manhood, a native of Liberia, West Africa, the product of a Mission Station, having been brought out of the jungles a little boy in the year of 1900. He asked me to urge you not to lose faith in your Missionaries. He said they are doing a good work there, but could not care for all of the children brought to them from the hinterlands, owing to the food situation. This is a great big problem with them. I have received two letters from Africa this year. I had hoped that Mrs. F. B. Watson, our worker at Careysburg, would have been home for this meeting, but she changed her mind and wanted to remain longer on the foreign field.

Our Lott Carey Herald, edited by Dr. Stokes, is a very helpful asset to our work. It is our medium for inspiration and information concerning our work. Please subscribe to the Herald.

Christ came down to earth with one object, to seek and save that which was lost. While Christians today are having good times, often at ease and indifferent, the cry of millions in heathen lands is going up against them. The heart of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is stirred. He is still moved with compassion for the multitudes. Let us arouse ourselves to a sense of our responsibility and make His desire our own. We find a great many Christians who are living for themselves, who think nothing of the cries of despair constantly going up by millions in heathen darkness. Is it nothing that souls are dying without the knowledge of the Savior you love? Make His interests your own. Take up your cross and live for Him and for the perishing millions in Africa, Haiti, India, and other heathen lands. You will find it a joy to be spent for Him in service.

Our hearts are saddened by the Homegoing of many of our faithful workers. Among them was our dear Sister Mrs. L. C. Humphrey, of Dallas, N. C., a faithful member of our Executive Board. Mrs. Bannerjee, our Missionary to India, was called to the great Beyond after a brief illness, and many others have answered the roll call. We bow humbly and submissively to the will of Him who doeth all things well.

Dear Sisters, you, who have caught the vision of service and co-operation are responsible for this financial report that I will en-

PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE WOMANS
 AUXILIARY TO THE LOTT CARY F. M. CONVENTION.

Winston-Salem, N. C., August 28, 1928, 11 A. M.

The Executive Board met in the Mount Zion Baptist Church. The President not being present, Mrs. A. B. Randolph presided.

The meeting opened by singing, "I need Thee". Mrs. Randolph read the 24th Psalm. Miss Lyons led in a fervent prayer for the work and its needs. The audience sang "All the Way."

Mrs. Shepherd having arrived took the chair.

The roll was called and the members, most of whom were present, answered with appropriate Scripture verses.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted with the necessary corrections. The correction related to the clause relative to the hospital. It should have read, "It is not deemed necessary to build a hospital in Liberia, since the Liberian Government has one which takes care of the situation, and in which we may be able to maintain wards." The President asked Mrs. Randolph to speak to the Board about the work generally. She also asked each Board member to be ready to freely express herself relative to all phases of the work. Mrs. Randolph spoke on the needs of the work, the financial struggle through which the parent body was passing, the hard financial year, and the general outlook. She explained the settling up with Rev. Boaz Harris, and the other workers on the Foreign fields.

Mrs. Shepherd produced letters from Rev. Thomas requesting a settlement of what he deemed back dues, basing Mrs. Thomas' salary on the salary paid Miss Lyons. Miss Lyons reported that she had received all of her salary. \$1700 plus \$400 sent her by the women of North Carolina, which she used for traveling expenses from Liberia to America.

Mr. Shepherd stated that the \$400 was not sent as salary, but to defray traveling expenses. She also stated that she hoped the other expenses or salary claimed by Rev. Thomas would be paid. A lively discussion followed. Mrs. Weeks, Mrs. W. T. Johnson, Mrs. M. E. W. Puryear, Mrs. Viola Colerain, Miss Lelia Johnson and Mrs. Penn took a part. They spoke of the discouraging letters always coming from the field; the unrest because of a clamoring for money by the missionaries; the tiresomeness of waiting to hear results of Christian endeavor, and the disappointments arising from petty jealousies amongst Christian missionaries. Mrs. Johnson spoke of the terrible effect of such, on those amongst whom they labored.

It was voted to take no action on the salary question presented by Rev. Thomas, because the contracts for missionaries were made by the parent body, and we were only its Auxiliary. The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the President.

AUGUST 29—2 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. J. H. Randolph. Mrs. B. G. Cousin led in prayer.

Mrs. Randolph stated that she had called the Board at this hour to take into consideration the resignation of Mrs. P. G. Shepherd. The Board for a while was shocked.

The resignation was called for and read by the Secretary. It stated briefly that declining health made it necessary to resign from publicity and seek complete rest. She expressed gratitude for the confidence shown her all of the years she had been retained by the Board and stated that she would always use her influence for the work and hoped to be retained as a member of the Board. After discussing Mrs. Shepherd's work and loyalty, and deep regrets that she was Providentially incapacitated to remain at our head longer, the resignation was accepted, and she was voted Honorary President.

A motion prevailed that she be given a donation of \$50 to aid her in her physical condition.

FRIDAY P.M., AUGUST 30.

The Board met to finish unfinished business. Mrs. Randolph presented to the Board the proposition of Dr. C. S. Brown relative to having our Corresponding Secretary go to Washington once per week to work in the office of Headquarters. After noting the extra expense which would be incurred, the matter was dropped, no decision being reached. Another suggestion was presented, namely the condition of Headquarters. After discussion, the Board voted to take a part in fitting up the building. Plans were suggested how to begin.

A motion prevailed to put on a shower for the same, to come off Thanksgiving. The Corresponding Secretary was empowered to begin at once to solicit for the same, including money and food stuffs for the Missionaries. It was also hoped that money to purchase wire for garden would be added. Miss Lyons asked that something be done along that line to protect the crops they could raise from animals running at large.

Mrs. Randolph suggested that another year, in place of a sermon for the Auxiliary, that the Auxiliary stage a National Pageant, this to include a representative of all nations. This was accepted unanimously by the Board, and the getting up of the same was left in the hands of the President of the Board and other workers she might choose.

On motion of Mrs. W. T. Johnson, Mrs. A. E. Weeks was granted

a raise in salary, instead of \$15 per sitting or year, \$35 was allowed for her work as Recording Secretary.

A motion prevailed that the Board nominate a President in place of the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Shepherd. Mrs. Pegues, Mrs. L. L. Walker and Mrs. B. G. Cousin were nominated.

On motion the nomination was closed.

Mrs. B. G. Cousin was elected.

Mrs. Cousin peacefully and humbly acknowledged the honor conferred upon her and asked the prayers of the Board for strength to do her best with Christian fortitude and love for so great a cause.

Mrs. Walker was elected Vice-President and acknowledged the same with the winning Christian graces she always exhibits in the meetings.

After discussing and considering other matters entirely pertaining to the Board, we closed our year's work, and prayerfully awaited our induction into office for the ensuing year's work. We gratefully acknowledge the goodness of our Heavenly Father's care, and beseech Him to allow us to continue in the great work of soul saving.

We say good-bye to the past, and enter upon the new year in the strength of our Lord to carry on the cause we have espoused.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

Officers, members of the Junior and Intermediate Department and Friends:

With the most grateful thanks to Him who is the Father of us all, do I meet with you today and extend to you my heartfelt greetings. I do not hesitate to affirm that you feel with me the deepest gratitude for the privilege accorded us. In order to show this gratitude in a tangible and more intelligent way, we have met together today—a group of young people endeavoring to express their relig-

ious impulses in an acceptable manner. Our group may be thought of as one of the many groups of the younger generation which have met and are meeting during this year, trying to solve some of the most vital problems of the nation. These groups—mostly student groups—six hundred in number last year, are being held in behalf of national purification from recognized social evils and the spread of peace, and challenge the sneer that the youth of today are failing to recognize religion and its place in our lives. It has been suggested that our group today, although not meeting in the capacity of student groups, yet is composed of students and thus our discussion will not be particularly unlike student discussions.

As we grow older and time brings our school days to a close, we begin to think more seriously about ourselves, our neighbors and the world at large. In particular we think of the age, era and year in which it is our privilege to live. That brings about the thought of the duties and responsibilities falling upon us by reason of the heritage which the past has bequeathed us.

This year—1928—is one memorable to those of us who in our school work are interested in anything which might make clearer the solutions of the problems which face us. Three hundred years ago this year there was born in Eistow, England, a man who because of his boldness in preaching the Gospel as he saw it, regardless of the forms accepted by the Established Church of England, was thrown into prison and while there wrote the book which is known next to the Bible in all civilized lands. The man was John Bunyan, born 1628; the book, "Pilgrim's Progress." Two hundred years ago this year, 1728, was born an English poet and novelist, Oliver Goldsmith. His spirit of quiet meditation, moralizing strain and winsome view of rustic country life as seen in "The Vicar of Wakefield," have won for him a place in the hearts of all lovers of literature. One hundred years ago this year, 1828, Henrik Ibsen was born in Norway. The apology for mentioning his name in such a meeting as ours is seen when one considers that the whole life of a period and people may be viewed through the drama of the time and that such a powerful man as Ibsen has together with others brought about our new emphasis on psychoanalysis, new thought and in general, has cultivated the development of our present day youth. In other words, work like that of Henrik Ibsen mirrors the characteristics and the trend of the present day thought and furnishes the basis for the freedom and seeming lightness of the young people of today. Thus we are carried back to the first thought, that this year—1928—is a memorable year, the tercentenary, the bicentenary and the centenary anniversary of three great men whose influence one may see in the life about us. In the main they represent three fields of thought: Bunyan, the religious, Goldsmith the literary and Ibsen, in the deepest sense, the psychoanalytical. What has all this to do with a gathering of the Young

People's Department of a Foreign Mission Convention? Simply this: Is there anything in the lives or influence of these men that will give the youth a key to the solution of its religious problems which naturally include the foreign mission project? Does the heritage of the last three hundred years mean anything to us if so, what? I shall not attempt to answer these questions but only make some suggestions which I think are worthy of thoughtful consideration.

In thinking of the critical position of Christianity in China due to Chinese hatred to anything foreign, Mr. Edward H. Hume, President of Yale in China and a leader among American missionaries, hopes that foreign missions will cease to be. He believes that the revolution in China will give birth to a naturalized Chinese Christian Church.

"Christianity remains a vital force in China today," writes Dr. Hume. "The very opposition to its foreign elements may be the needed factor in aiding its naturalization." In other words, he means that the Christian movement in China must be adapted to Chinese environment. Whether we agree with Dr. Hume would cause almost endless discussion, but the main thing to be noted is that as the future leaders of missionary enterprises do we not need to consider the project of a broader and less individualistic sense? Will not the Lott Carey Convention of 1948 need to think of the problem of christianization in a different light from that used now? Will not our group be the ones into whose hands these problems will fall and should not those hands be prepared? Because we are dealing with religious matters does not mean that we should conduct these religious affairs along antiquated channels. We must study the progress of the secular world, transferring all the best in that world to our religious work for the furthering of God's Kingdom on earth with the greatest efficiency. The religious world is just waking up to the fact that the efficiency and economy of time, to be used for the promulgation of the gospel. The carrying out of this discovery to its logical conclusion, in work, is the task of the younger people.

The force of the Industrial Revolution is one of the things in our modern life which must be taken in consideration in our forward-looking thought of missionary enterprise. For instance, we read that darkest Africa is getting light as fast as American and European capital can make it. Practically unknown to the white man twenty years ago, a dozen railroads now cross it, joining prosperous towns that are British, French, Dutch, Portuguese or Belgian rather than African. Scientific data about man, beast and geography are being gathered at a tremendous rate. The world has "cultivated" the continent with an intensity probably unequaled in the history of any other backward country. Because of this a hundred million or so natives have been obliged to adjust themselves within a quar-

ter of a century to the devices of an industrial civilization which the white man has taken 300 years to build up and absorb. Their problem of adjustment, assimilation and acculturation is the one to be considered in their Christianization. Anarchy and strife are evident in various parts of the continent due to interferences by foreign governments and industrial agencies. It seems that Africa will find it necessary to follow the suggestion of Dr. Hume concerning China—an African Naturalized Christianity, able to be easily assimilated by the natives.

The same application may be made concerning Haiti. We read in the "Review of Reviews" that "the missionary spirit is as strong now as it was when Stanley searched for Livingstone, but the approach is different. Cleanliness goes with godliness in efforts to convert to religious faith. The inventions and discoveries of the last hundred years have done so much to enhance the enjoyment of life that the modern altruist seeks to make them known to backward people." The way pointed by our own government is one along this line and one which is feasible and advisable that we follow.

Again we come back to the practical question: of what worth is this to the young people of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society? It is my thought that we begin now as suggested a few minutes ago, to prepare ourselves for the leadership which twenty years hence will be fully in our hands that we discard to a large extent the antiquated views and practices of former missionary effort and that we set out to solve the missionary problem with all the zeal that we use in solving our own social, religious and economic problems. I fully agree with Mr. Cadman and others that the youth is not irreligious and does not lack a proper regard for the deeper and more spiritual elements of life, and I also think with him that the thing that the young people desire is not theory, cant and emotionalism, but a practical, every-day working thesis upon which they may found their moral and religious beliefs. That means that they want their elders who more often criticize than guide, to teach more by example than precept. In their missionary teaching the old story of dark benighted Africa and the emotional strain caused thereby must give way to actual concrete facts, data and accounts before the youth can and will be willing and able to take the load upon their shoulders. Youth is now thinking, and concreteness, deepest sincerity, honesty and truth is demanded of those who would have us take up the work where they leave it off.

We live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths;
In feelings; not in figures on a dial.
We should count time by heart throbs. He most lives
Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best
Life is a means unto an end—that end
The beginning, mean, and end of all things—God.

This is the plea and defense I make for the youth which is so often misunderstood in our own group we have evidences of the earnest and sincere effort that characterizes work of young people, as shown in the work of the past eight years.

Those of us who were attending the Lott Carey Convention meeting in Portsmouth, Va., in 1920 will recall the circumstances of the organization of the Junior Department. It is well for us to think of that first meeting at the Children's Hour during the session of the Woman's Auxiliary, and compare it with the gathering today. Those of us who were present on that afternoon and are here today can see the marked growth that has taken place. Most of us are session in Newark when our offering was little less than \$500.00 through our various annual meetings until last year in Richmond where we closed our session not quite reaching our goal of \$1500.00; but with determination and confidence unshaken. Our department has expended so much, both numerically and in the age scope, that our Superintendent and the President of the Woman's Auxiliary saw fit to add the name "Intermediate" in order that all might be included. Most of the major officers who are serving now, including your humble servant were elected at that first afternoon session. As I have suggested, all of us were really children then, but eight years' growth mentally as well as physically has changed us considerably. We were then in the elementary school, but in eight years, we have reached undergraduate and graduate standing. Seriously and thoughtfully considering this matter, I have come to the conclusion that it is time for the younger members of this Department to begin thinking of taking the reins of this Department into their own hands after the close of the year which the present officers are now beginning. It has been in the mind of our Superintendent, to offer the older members of this Department to the Woman's Auxiliary as the first fruits of this portion of the work.

Thus, we as the chartered and older members are now thinking of our withdrawal from this Department to join our Mother Auxiliary after our next session, and of reminding our younger workers to become more seriously interested and more zealous in work.

Before I close, I have a few words to say to the body at large in behalf of those who have cooperated so wonderfully with me. It has been my pleasure to note what a fine spirit exists between all the officers and how heartily they have joined with me in endeavoring to carry out the plans mapped out by our Superintendent. A special tribute I feel is due to two of our officers of whom we may speak as chartered officers since they have served with me in these capacities since the organization. These officers are our treasurer, Miss Imogene Brown and our Corresponding Secretary, Miss Wilhelmina Bullock. These two officers as well as your hum-

ble servant for eight years have not missed a single session of the Junior and Intermediate Department, following it from north to south, east to west; in Brooklyn, Pittsburg, Charlotte, Norfolk and all the sessions since 1920 at their own expense—costing the Junior and Intermediate Department not one cent for board and lodging or railroad fare. It is not often that we find officers in the adult convention willing to make such sacrifices that the work of the body might be carried on with the least expense.

I could not close without saying a word in commendation of the earnest work of our Superintendent. Having the rather peculiar position of being very intimately associated with her, I know in detail the sacrifices and struggles she has made to further the Cause of Christ on the foreign field. I can say positively that the work for the heathen has been relegated from the position of second nature, so far as she is concerned and has become almost first nature, almost instinctive. She has thrown all that energy toward the work of this Department and of her particular circle which represents with us yearly. Oftentimes I have seen her do this work when she was physically unfit for any work and personally have become indignant at the lack of self-protection. I say this to the young people gathered here to let them know that the "power behind the throne" in the Junior and Intermediate department is our Superintendent. Thus as I have suggested, as we more experienced members begin this last year of our work in this Department, let us work all the more hard to leave a better and more efficient organization as we pass on. Let us endeavor to correct the mistakes that we have unfortunately made, and try more and more to place the standard higher and higher.

To these young members we bequeath not our failings and faults, but the progress and efforts that have been made. The experiences that have accumulated in the life-time of our Department are at their disposal to use as they see fit. Let the fine spirit of our officers and the co-operation of the committees, and members ever exist, which will prove assets to the work. Our future is bright—with the aid of these zealous workers and the help of our maker, the Junior and Intermediate Department will grow on and on. Then as I close, let me say that in this life we all "have our day and cease to be" and that as the Wheel of Time rolls on in its endless journey to Eternity we must pass by one by one and try to leave our little cheer as we go. We are similar to that of which Longfellow so beautifully writes:

Ships that pass in the night and speak to each other in passing

Only a signal shown and a distant voice in the darkness;

So on the ocean of life we pass and speak one to another

Only a look and a voice, then darkness again and a silence
