CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all bodies in fellowship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this Society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at least (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statistician, a Treasurer and Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The Treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty as the said board shall require of him.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Board during the interim of the meetings of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as

the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a. m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

SECTION IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) five dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) five dollars, and a life member by the payment of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER

Article 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its delibera-

Article 3. Enrollment of delegates.

Article 4. Collection of Finance.

Article 5. Appointment of committees.

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 7. No discourteous in guage shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article 8. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months' notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Pittsburgh, Pa., September 1, 1931.

The Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America convened in its 34th annual session at the Rodman Street Baptist Church, Rev. S. A. Thurston, D. D., pastor.

Local Program

Rev. A. M. Patterson, master of ceremonies. Devotionals conducted by Dr. M. A. Tally. Music by the choir of Rodman Street Baptist Church.

Welcome Addresses.

On behalf of the city of Pittsburgh, Mr. Earl R. Jackson. He extended a cordial welcome to the convention declaring that we were in the beauty spot of America and the workshops of the world, with 99 bridges built in Allegheny County within the last year. Colored people are law abiding and progressive he stated.

Atty. O. S. Brown presented Mr. Robt. L. Vann, editor of the Pittsburgh Courier to extend welcome on behelf of twenty Negro businesses. Mr. Vann expressed great delight in having this body assemble for its fourth time in Pittsburgh. He declared that pig iron is king here and that Negro leaders are doing well toward developing our group under trying conditions.

Rev. S. A. Thurston, D. D. pastor of Rodman St. Church, was greatly pleased to have us meet again in this historic church, made so under the leadership of Dr. O. S. Sims, deceased. His message of welcome rang true and his efforts for entertaining this body were evident on all sides.

Selection by the Jubilee Quartet.

Welcome on behalf of the Ministers of Pittsburgh by Dr. C. A. Ward, pastor of Central Baptist Church.

He stated the following reasons for extending welcome:
1st. We bear the gospel message to home and foreign fields.

2nd. Because of the spiritual values we represent.

3rd. Because of the wise investment being made by the

churches of this body. He made a plea for stronger foreign missionaries and larger contributions for their support.

Dr. W. R. Brown, pastor of the Metropolitan Baptist church was presented to give words of welcome on behalf of the state of Pennsylvania. He set forth the importance of uniting our forces for the big task before us. Rev. N. L. Young, represented the Allegheny General Baptist Association with words of Welcome, declaring his abiding interest in this Convention for the last thirty years and introducing its work in this state.

On behalf of the Union Baptist Association, Rev. D. B. Russell, moderator. He declared his association is the product of Lott Carey sentiment, whose influence is still permeating the earth. Dr. Thurston introduced Rev. Paul Storeker, pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church (white) whose church is to be the seat of the Woman's Auxiliary session. REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

My Beloved Co-workers:

We are deeply grateful to God for permitting us to meet and greet you for this our thirty-fourth time as member of the Convention and for the thirtieth time as Chairman of our Board. We have weathered many a storm together and we have had some days of pleasant sailing.

Many of our true and faithful ones have fallen by the way and entered into the haven of rest. Others have come in to take their places to help us carry forward the work that has been so well planned and executed up to the present.

A word of encouragement to our workers would not be out of place just here, so we take the liberty to say—the age in which we live is the most wonderful that ever recorded the march of time. Never before have the people of the earth witnessed such achievements in art, science, invention and government. Never before has the human race enjoyed so many comforts and conveniences in matters which pertain to this life. Distance has been annihilated, and the nations of the earth are being rapidly drawn together as members of a common family.

But this marvelous advancement is not confined to things purely temporal. The church of God is stronger today than ever before. We have more buildings and better buildings dedicated to the service of God, more men and women who are wearing out their constitutions in the spreading of the Gospel among the children of men, and more people who have accepted the salvation of Christ than ever before in the history of the world. It is true we have many church members who do not live up to their opportunities and privileges—to say nothing of their Christian duties, yet I believe them living more exemplary Christian lives than did many leading church members many years ago.

The religion which Christ taught was one that makes man subdue self and live in large measure for his fellowman. As members of the Executive Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Missionary Convention U. S. A. it is our most pleasant task to emphasize the following facts in our churches—

"Missions has rights in church work, absolute rights.

"Missions is not merely an extra, a sideline, a charity, which may or may not be given to in church work as the church may elect and as

its finances may make convenient. On the contrary missions has rights of its own in a church program, rights along with current expenses of the church, inalienable, incontrovertible rights, inperious rights. The rights of missions are declared in the New Testament and may not be gainsaid.

"Indeed, the rights of missions are rights of the highest privilege. However, these high rights of missions are not often recognized, even in our Missionary Baptist churches.

Last year in the city of Baltimore, Maryland, definite policies of our convention were reemphasized by our honored President, Dr. C. S. Brown and the convention voted its approval and the board was put on notice to strictly adhere to them. Both as Chairman of the Executive Board and chairman of the Executive Committees. I have in mind all the work that you mapped out and referred to the Executive Committee.

As chairman of your Executive Committee, I have sought to have your orders executed in a way that would be most profitable to our great Convention.

The general work of the convention was reported in a healthy condition. A check of \$210.00 was reported from the National Baptist Convention through Dr. J. H. Wynn. The following persons were elected members of the National Baptist F. M. Board: Drs. C. S. Brown, J. H. Randolph, G. O. Bullock.

The following stations are asking for assistance: Rev. W. H. Thomas, Brewerville. A teacher and repairs. Miss Clarice Gooding, Lott Carey Station, a worker and repairs needed. Rev. C. M. Bryant, Kipu Station, asking for assistance. Rev. Tish of Middledrift, South Africa, asked that his work be placed under our board at \$50 per month. Rev. Boaz A. Harris asked that he be given another teacher at \$25.00 per month. Mrs. A. R. Hayes asked \$1066.00, a Mr. Graham asked to do work in Haiti. Rev. C. C. Boone desires to go as a medical missionary under our board. Mrs. Harris asked to be employed as a matron at the Brewerville station.

It was decided that no more Missionaries would be employed until we find some further resources. The decision was that the Board would give a donation to Mrs. Harris should she go as a matron to the Brewerville station. The Cor. Secretary was authorized to correspond with Rev. M. Luther Hayes and make clear his resignation. The Board

decided that it should be distinctly understood that Miss Lyon is returning as a trained nurse, Missionary and not as a matron. A vote of thanks was given Shiloh Baptist Church for a Stove for Miss Goodings station. The Board did not think it wise to send Mrs. Watson to Africa this year. It was voted that we enter into cooperation with the National Baptist Convention and Virginia Union University in the support of a chair of missions in the said university the consideration being \$900 each per annum, the details to be worked out by following committee: Drs. W. T. Johnson, J. H. Randolph, Mrs. M. L. Penn, Mrs. B. G. Cousin. Mrs. J. T. Randolph was authorized to see parties better known to herself and solicit funds for the same.

The Corresponding Secretary recommended that plans be made to pay \$5482.83 now due. Dr. W. D. Jarvis is made his report showing we needed \$2765.45 money due, and for running expenses of headquarters.

The Board authorizes Cor. Secretary to pay Prudential Bank \$1200.00. The committee was authorized to borrow \$1200.00 from some other source to replace the \$1200 paid to the bank. The Committee was also authorized to borrow \$1200.00 more to meet payments on the head-quarters. Committee: Drs. W. D. Jarvis, J. H. Randolph, G. O. Bullock.

The following committee was appointed to make an appeal to the constituency of the Lott Carey Convention for Ten thousand dollars to meet the urgent indebtedness of our work. Committee: Dr. A. W. Brown, G. O. Bullock, W. T. Johnson, J. H. Randolph, Mrs. B. G. Cousin, Mrs. M. L. Penn, W. H. Stokes, C. J. Brown. It was voted that the members of the Executive Committee use their influence to have their churches and organizations make more contributions to the work. Dr. Wynn was providentially hindered from the meeting. Dr. A. W. Brown led in prayer for Pres. C. S. Brown, who was absent because of illness.

The Haitian Commission gave a very interesting report of their visit to Haiti. They were welcomed by omeials and the President, because they were there to do uplift work among the natives. Haiti has a population of 10,000,000, 85 per cent of whom are illiterate. Catholicism predominates, Baptists are second in strength, the field is now ripe for our Missionary work. The Commission was entertained in the home of Dr. Boaz A. Harris, Supt. of Missions and were thereby able to sympathize with him in the work they are doing. Rev. Harris has charge of sixteen stations, seven native preachers who visit these stations and work in harmony with him. Dr. Harris' previous training in native, vision and consecration amply fits him for the work.

The commission recommends that a house be purchased at St. Marc for Rev. Harris which is to be known as Lott Carey Headquarters and that a church be erected on the lot purchased by the White Rock Baptist Church of Durham, N. C., at a cost of \$1000, and that Rev. Harris be granted a furlough to assist in raising money for the same.

The Secretary recommended that a Finance Committee be appointed in each state to raise money for the work and report at the Pittsburgh meeting. The appointment of said committee was left with the secretary. The secretary recommended that in keeping with the growing demands of the work at Careysburg under Miss Clarice Gooding that provisions be made for an assistant worker. This matter was left with Cor. Secretary. It was decided that the Cor. Secretary would confer

with the Women of the Auxiliary and that a portion of the basement room of the L. C. Headquarters be used for printing our L. C. Herald and other Missionary Literature, this is in keeping with previous action of this convention.

A letter was read from Rev. Hayes acknowledging a receipt of \$100 and stating that he had complied with the request of the Board. Dr. Wm. D. Jarvis, chairman of the house committee reported as follows:

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Junior and Intermediate Department of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Lott Carey Convention.

ARTICLE II.

Section 2. The object shall be the same as that of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The members of this department shall be supervisor, president, a vice president from each state of district representing in this department, secretary, treasurer and corresponding secretary. Each of whom shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in a similar organization.

Section 2. The superintendent of this department shall be ap-

pointed by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 3. A Supervisors Board shall be composed of representatives of each state or district and executive officers of the Junior and Intermediate Department which shall be elected annually, whose duty shall be to advise with the superintendent and to study ways and means by which this department shall be developed.

Section 4. The Constitution may only be revived by the recommendation of the Board of Supervisors and adopted by the Junior and Intermediate Department at its annual session providing the notice of this

change be given twelve months prior to annual meeting.

Section 5. All money raised in this department shall be turned over to the Woman's Auxiliary, who in return shall be responsible for expenses incurred in operating this department.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Officers, Members of the Junior and Intermediate Department and Friends: After a year of success and failure we meet together again. It is with a great deal of pleasure and thanksgiving to God that I am able to greet you in this a new session of our Convention.

The years 1930-31 are years that will be remembered by us all. The economic depression has struck us all. This depression has and will leave its imprint upon us as a group. But it is absolutely necessary that we must keep in mind that we are a group of young people in training for missionary work. We must not let the fact escape us that the situation of today must not keep us from our duties. Since we are in training a question that would naturally arise in our minds as a group of young Christian workers is, "What is the training necessary for a missionary?"

There is no matter so intimately connected with the progress and success of missions as the training of the missionaries. The work to which he goes is difficult and complicated. His first idea about it is that it is simple and uncomplicated, and that success is more dependent on zeal and missionary warmth than on special knowledge of his, hence the many mistakes the missionary makes.

Complete and thoroughly trained fitness for work, whatever that may be, is not merely the tendency but the absolute demand for the present day and the man who possesses that fitness and capacity to use it is the man who is preferred for any position.

For the missionary more is necessary than a general theological course before we can say "Now, go and preach to the heathen." If men are not sent to foreign fields for administrative work without special training nor even sent to plant trees without a course of instruction at some agricultural college, why should they be sent to plant Christianity in India, Africa and elsewhere without some training to fit them for such work?

The missionary needs to be guided before he actually enters the work, as to—How to deal with a false religion?—How to deal with a dead conscience?—How to deal best with a people who have a different environment and whose real opinion about Him individually and nationally is so difficult to reach, because so carefully concealed. That which is necessary then to aid the missionary is some course of in-

struction which will help him deal with two things: Heathen religion and Heathen human beings.

If any of the young people here are considering foreign mission as a life work they should consider carefully what has been said so as to be able to better the work done by our forefathers. Not only should these consider it who are actually going to the foreign fields, but those who remain should also think about what has been said so that they may catch the spirit and thereby do better work. We must also remember in thinking of this work that more is necessary for the missionary than even the spiritual life and the sacrifice of self. His influence will be what he is himself, and the order seems to be this-first, his spiritual life: second, temperament and mental ability; and third, qualifications added by training Temperament always modifies for better or worse, a man's influence among other men; but training and temperament together produce the best results in missionary work. The departing missionary whether he carries written instruction or not should carry at least oft repeated admonition that has real force and secret of his power and success is mostly spiritual.

"For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace."

Both the missionary abroad must have the spirit of Christ if they are to carry on successfully.

My object will have been achieved if attention has been given to urgent necessity for the Junior Department to prepare themselves thoroughly so that they may improve upon the work that has been done before them. The supporters of missions have a right to expect that the men who are sent at their expense should be thoroughly qualified as a reasonable and practical course can make them providing the education touches the question of progress and results of mission.

God is moving on.

His march is swift, and our time is short.

No such age has ever before shone on this planet,

No such doors ever before opened to his church.

Who will fall into line with God.

Join in his majestic march,

And in the sure advance of his plan

Reach the golden fruition of the ages.

I wish to recommend the following:

That each Junior Organization send our supervisor quarterly donations for the work.

Secondly, That efforts be made for better representation of junior at the annual meeting.

I further recommend that special missionary classes be established among the juniors so that they may be better informed of the work.

SUPERVISORS' BOARD MEETING

The Supervisors' Board meeting held at the St. Peter's Lutheran Church was opened with prayer by Mrs. M. M. Lewis. The meeting was in charge of Miss Sarah Whetts. Miss Whetts called on Miss Bennetta Bullock, president of the Junior and Intermediate Department to express her views and outline the work of the Junior Circles for the ensuing year. Miss Bullock emphasized the need of quarterly dues and Junior representation in the conventions. Miss Whetts suggested a fifty-fifty basis. That is the Senior help to pay expenses of the Juniors who are to represent. Miss Holloman, the vice president, offered her suggestions next. She heartily endorsed the suggestions of the president.

Miss Whetts then explained how in order to swell the treasure of the Juniors permit the Juniors to hold a program every fifth Sunday. Miss Nelson stated that in her church the Young People have the third Sunday in each month.

Mrs. Holloman asked how to persuade the same group of Juniors to work in two or three different lines. Miss Whetts told how one class in her Sunday school is the Junior Circle and they raise the money. Miss Bullock spoke how in her church the Junior and Intermediate B. Y. P. U. have special work for missions. Mrs. Lewis again urged the systematic quarterly dues. She stated that the Junior Circle should be urged to join the convention directly.

Next we heard from the Supervisor, Mrs. O. S. Bullock. Again Mrs. Bullock urged the circles to send up the quarterly dues. She told how at Hallowe'en she gave a party. In November a sacred program was given with a Thanksgiving offering. Later a Silver Missionary Tea would be held. She also suggested a Guest Rally. The person bringing the highest amount receives a prize. Refreshments may be served.

Mrs. Bullock urged the Supervisors to train their circles in Paliamentary Laws. It was planned that next year before the meeting the president should be trained. Mrs. Bullock then read the constitution of the Junior and Intermediate Department of the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention. The constitution was adopted and was to be printed so the officers might have a copy.

Mrs. Green brought \$11.00 from the Blue Stone Convention of Virginia. Miss Whetts suggested that the Juniors be represented on the opening program. We were dismissed by the Watch Word.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.-Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II.-Object.

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue

in office until their successors shall be elected.

Section 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Section 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Section 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

Section 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

The President's Annual Address

Kept and sustained by our Heavenly Father, who is gracious, merciful and boundless in His love toward His children, we are permitted once more to assemble as a Convention and Auxiliary to commit ourselves unto Him for future usefulness and a stronger determination to unfurl the banner of love, to plant the word of truth, and herald the message of Salvation to all the world.

16 years ago, we met with the Rodman Street Baptist Church, the late Dr. O. S. Simms was then Pastor. We find ourselves at this Session being entertained by the Church and their efficient and progressive Pastor, Dr. S. A. Thurston.

The mission which brings us here should be one of joy, filled with the very best thoughts and plans with which to begin our work the coming Year. The assembling of ourselves gives us an opportunity to better understand and to consider the needs of the Foreign Field on which we operate; and to express definitely our convictions and aims of the manner in which we should prosecute the work entrusted to us.

We realize that the obligation to give the Gospel to all the world is the duty of the Christian Church, and that as co-workers in the common cause of Missionary Endeavor, we must not let this work rest lightly upon our minds, but thoughtfully and soberly put our shoulders to the wheel, pushing and directing until results are obtained, commensurate with the importance of our task.

Then, what has been done by others for us through the Gospel, should actuate and inspire us to accept the

challenge of not only the Millions of Africa, and the 3.000,000 in Haiti, but mankind the world over.

It is of supreme importance at this stage of the world's needs, that we assume sane and definite attitudes toward the problems to be solved in our work at home and on the Foreign Field. In every perplexing situation, when the way seems dark, talk it over with Jesus and He will make it right, and guide our timid steps to victory.

At the close of the Lott Carey Convention, I attended the Meeting of the National Baptist Convention of America. The attendance upon the Convention was very large. The Auxiliary made a splendid showing. Women were present from a large number of the States. They have many objectives, among them is fostering work in South Africa. The usual courtesy of the Body was extended me, and more, in that I was elected as their 2nd Honorary Vice President. I asked the Auxiliary to send their President, Mrs. M. A. B. Fuller, to this Meeting.

Lust after the Convention, there was held at the Shiloh Baptist Church, Washington, D. C., Oct. 1930. a very interesting and instructive Echo Meeting of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, under the auspices of the District Branch to the Auxiliary. Every speech by the delegates and visitors was filled with thought that inspired those who came to hear of the doings of the Convention. Mrs. J. L. S. Holloman, the Chairman, received many congratulations and words of appreciation for the splendid way in which she directed and presided at this Meeting.

There was held in Richmond, at the Ehenezer Baptist Church, under the auspices of the Over Sea Society, an Echo Meeting of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. A beautiful program was rendered by those who attended the Convention. Every effort was made to make it interesting and attractive. Mrs. Bettie G. Cousins, the Chairman of the Executive Board of the Auxifiary, sponsored this meeting and another at the First Baptist Church, So. Richmond, Va. The people were happy to have the opportunity to attend a meeting of that kind.

April 1931, The District Branch, for the first time, held a three days Conference, which was a success in every way. Addresses were delivered by some of the most influential men and women in Christian work. Lectures and pictures were shown by the Haitian Commission which enlightened the people concerning our work in that Country. The Children's Evening was in charge of Mrs. J. L. S. Holloman. This Conference will be held, Annually. This Organization has a splendid corps of Officers and workers, who contribute monthly, to the Lott Carey Headquarters. An extra donation of Fifty Cents, each, is given by the Circles to the Corresponding Secretary, Dr. J. H. Randolph, for the upkeep of the Headquarters.

I wish to mention Mrs. Josephine Jones of Cofield, N. C., who is giving \$1.00, monthly, as a contribution to the Cause of Missions. Through my persuasion, she is allowing her name to be placed in the Laymen's Corner of the Herald. May others follow the example of this good woman and contribute systematically, for this great Cause. I also received \$10.00 from the Bank St. Baptist Church, Norfolk, Va.

I wish also to mention, \$51.00 sent from the Texas Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, Mrs. V. M. Alford, President; Mrs. C. L. Johnson, Cor. Sec. They sent also a package of Bibles and other literature to be sent directly to J. M. Sonjica, Koreston Village, Port Elizabeth, South Africa.

During the year, 2 Shipments have been made to Africa. The first was made to Miss Clarice Gooding and Miss Minnie C. Lvon, Nov. 15th. 1930. Miss Gooding's box consisted of Muslin, Towels, Doll Baby, Cradles, Dolls, and all kinds of Toys, Picture Charts and many other articles. This box was sent in answer to a request by Miss Gooding, for Dolls and Toys, used by the children here, for the boys and girls at her Station. She wanted them to have a real Christmas.

Miss Lyon's 2 boxes—1 contained 68 Books, Sunday School Cards, Pamphlets, Pins, Material, 1 Bed Quilt. 2nd, contained 18 Rolls of Bandages, Epsom Salts, Cotton, Soda, Peroxide, Vick's Salve, Tablets, Mouth Wash, Sal Hepatica, Boric Acid, Quinine Sulphate and Soap.

The 2nd Shipment was made March 28th, 1931. The Goods were sent to the following: Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas, Miss Minnie C. Lyon, Mrs. M. L. Walker, Miss Clarice Gooding and Rev. and Mrs. C. M. Cousins, and to the entire constituency of the Woman's Auxiliary, my heartiest thanks and appreciation, for the support given to the work throughout the entire year, in sending up means through our Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. M. L. Penn.

Your prompt responses, quarterly, have gladdened the heart of the Corresponding Secretary, Dr. Randolph. At times when the way seemed dark, your gift made it possible to meet many of the needs on the Foreign Field.

And—, That in the near future consideration be given in the erecting of a building at a moderate cost, at Brewerville, Dr. Thomas' Station.

I further recommend that every circle in the Woman's Auxiliary will ask each member to give individually \$1.00 to help pay off the debt on the Lott Carey Headquarters—That the money be sent to our Corresponding Secretary of the Auxiliary, Mrs. M. L. Penn, 2021 Division St., Baltimore, Md.

That \$150,00 be given to Dr. W. H. Stokes for the Lott Carcy Herald.
