Round Table Discussion led by Dr. J. H. Wynn, Texas. Dr. Wynn stated that the main work of the church as set forth in Luke 15 is to look after the lost sheep, the lost coin and the lost boy.

People who are lost to the churches' program are to be sought and found and placed into it. Many a church member is lost to world wide mission sitting in the pews of our churches.

Subject: "Some of the Fundamentals of Missionary Eneavor."

- He set forth the difference between a legal command and a spiritual command.
  - (a) People are trying to carry out the command by substitution, but it does not excuse them.
  - (b) The Holy Spirit must be given the place he is to occupy in our lives, following which he then (commands.
  - (c) Legal and spiritual systems discussed.
  - (d) Christ came to earth in interest of souls. The history of the saints is the unfolding of this same spirit.
- II. Missionary Zeal Emphasized.
  - (a) The great and primary need in the prosecution of mission work is not money, but a burning zeal and love for the cause.
  - (b) People will respond if their hearts are stirred by the Spirit.
  - (c) We should become thoroughly acquainted with the missionary program.
- III. The church's chief task is the evangelizing of all nations.
  - (a) Indifference to missions is a serious back-set to Negro Christians.
  - (b) If we neglect the task our churches will dry up and die.
  - (e) Strong appeal for a new baptism in missionary zeal.

Dr J. H. Randolph, presiding. 8:00 o'clock. Music "I am thine oh Lord" was sung. Prayer by Dr. S. L. Parham.

President Brown again visited the convention, being brought to the front in his rolling chair as the convention stood.

Dr. A. L. James made special recognition of Dr. Brown's presence and then presented Cor. Sec., Dr. Randolph to serve

as master of ceremonies.

Or Randolph then with timely remarks introduced Mrs. Cora Pair Thomas, who for twenty-three years has been serving under Lott Carey Board in South Africa as missionary. Mrs. Thomas hegan her address by expressing thanks to God for the high privilege of serving him in foreign fields.

She gave a very glowing account of the work she and her husband are doing in evangelizing and training the children at their Brewerville Station. She assured this convention that it is doing a great work in Africa and she offered special praise to the support of the Baptist women of North Carolina, who have supported her for several years through

our board.

The gospel has wrought great changes within the twenty-three years of mission work. A church-building has been erected and great crowds gather with high enthusiasm. Two hundred pupils are enrolled in the school, most all of whom are Christians. Boys and girls are very receptive to Christian training and higher culture. She made an earnest appeal for financial aid to not only carry on but to enlarge the work.

Set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth." was her message to America, she declared. With deep earnestness she sent her message to the hearts of the vast audience.

Mrs. Boaz A. Harris Missionary to Haiti was introduced. She was highly pleased to greet us and report great success during her eleven years with her husband in Haiti. She reported that 3,000 heathen have accepted Christ under the administration of her husband. Her remarks though brief were very much enjoyed.

Dr. A. W. Brown, presented Dr. Booz A. Harris, mission-

ary to Haiti.

In his introductory remarks Dr. Brown gave a vivid and thrilling experience he had on a visit to Haiti last year in company with Drs. Randolph and Bullock. He also paid a very high tribute to the great influence of Rev. Harris among all classes in Haiti.

Rev. Harris thanked the supporters of his work, especially the Baptists of New Jersey and the White Rock Baptist Church, Durham, for the purpose of a site for \$1,000.00 and \$480.00 annually. Sixth Mt. Zion, Richmond pays the salary of a young man on his field.

He also uttered words of esteem and honor to President

Brown, who influenced him to go to Haiti.

He brought greetings from sixteen stations and more than three thousand Christians.

He spoke of Christ's program and the important duty of performing it faithfully. He related experiences through which he had passed and saw clearly the hand of God sustaining him.

Great success has attended his efforts. A church building being erected to seat more than a thousand. This is a bright day for protestantism.

The address was full of information and greatly stirred the body.

# PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Officers, Members and Friends of the Junior and Intermediate Department:

We are assembled here in the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention. We have come under the stress of difficult circumstances to consider the momentous things of the kingdom. It is no light thing to call such a group of people from their homes and customary duties and, therefore this gathering must have some justification, some reason that rises from an emergency or that presses itself by sheer force of obligation upon the attention of the church.

The Supreme purpose of the church of Christ is to extend itself by and through its present established leaders. To neglect or disregard the great command of Jesus is to forfeit the promise that he will be with us always, to the end of time. Our very nature as a Christian church obligates us to bring to men and women everywhere the Christian message of forgiveness and peace and to share Christian experiences and achievements with our brother throughout the whole world.

For the accomplishment of their purpose, the Baptists have established the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention, which through its administrative functions and by its many gifted and self-sacrificing missionaries working the United States and other lands, is lifting up Christ as the only Saviour of the world. It is bringing to the attention of the Church the sore spots and their neglected places, among the world's teaming millions. It is enlisting the youth of the church in the spiritual conquest of the world in Jesus' name. It is that of counseling the church concerning pending problems, to cry out against national and individual evils and to direct attention to materialistic tendencies and social attitudes which hinder or advance the kingdom of God. The aims and purposes of this Convention are in line with and grow out of these functions.

More specifically the objectives of the Convention are thus mentioned. Missionary activity is not the same activity that occupied our energies a generation ago; the spread of culture in now Christian lands has provided a new environment in which our missionaries must work, and give rise to new problems which they must meet, "Who is equal to the task? It can be attempted only by the whole church united and

determined." Our need is not wisdom but power, not organization, but consecration, not plans but a passion for souls, not money but sacrifice, not temporal things but the touch of the living spirit of God. We must revitalize the great commission of our Lord in our own hearts and republish it through the church. We must consider and decide whether we are true to God, whether our task is finished, and what our future course will be.

Our first problem is the financing of the Christian movement. It is not amazing to discover that the economic depression has caused a serious decrease in our giving to Christian benevolence beyond our local congregation, but it was our hope that during this convention we shall see with clearer vision the imperative need and call for a program that will challenge the greatest liberality of our people for the advancement of the kingdom in the whole world.

Again, we are here to consider the missionary spirit in the church. Are we really informed concerning the condition of the world? Since we are informed are we ready to revitalize the Great Commission by going and sending? Has there not settled down upon us the influence of the materialistic and secular forces of the age? It is not easy to fit the Christian idealism and the spiritual aims of the kingdom of God into the prevailing methods and ideals of industry, commerce or politics. We have wanted to call our civilization in America a Christian civilization. I would not detract from the mighty influence Christianity has had upon our country. Many things in our national, social, economic and political life may be called Christian, but our civilization as a whole cannot be termed Christian. All about us is a mode of life and a development of society which is distinctly secular even pagan. It is organized. It is capable of propagation and its votaries are numbered by the millions.

Its aim is the possession of material wealth and pursuit of pleasure. When this captures imagination of man he becomes thoroughly secularized and little time is left for the inponderable and invisible realities of the kingdom of God.

It behooves this great convention to face the facts that there has sprung in our midst another great foe to the Christian movement and onward advance of the kingdom of God. We must capture the forces of civilization transform them, regenerate them, bring them into subservience to the kingdom of God. Only so can we make that kingdom stretch from shore to shore and insure that the earth shall finally be as full of the knowledge and glory of the Lord as the waters that cover the sea.

I am sure the Junior and Intermediate department appreciates the encouragement given them by Dr. C. S. Brown and members of the parent body and Mrs. A. B. Randolph and members of the Woman's

Auxiliary. We are very grateful to our Sup. Mrs. O. S. Bullock, for her untiring efforts in striving to develop this department.

I wish to recommend the following: (1) That we study more closely the working of the parent body so that we will be efficient when the time comes for us to enter into the adult organization. Secondly, that we ask of the parent body to furnish literature that will give us sufficient information for tuture guidance and development. Thirdly, that each Junior Circle have a missionary study class assembling bi-monthly enabling us to get a larger group to work on the missionary activities of the world.

# CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I .- Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

#### ARTICLE II.-Object.

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

#### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

Section 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Section 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Section 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

Section 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

ing to make such great sacrifices, what about us. We grow as we labor.

She commended Mrs. Holman and the Juniors and Intermediates who put over the wonderful Missionary Pageant Tuesday night, "World Service."

She mentioned every phase of the work and gave an itemized account of the articles sent up for the Thanksgiving Shower and the boxes sent to the workers on the field.

She mentioned the fact that a bundle of clothes is laid aside for Dr. and Mrs. Boag A. Harris to take back to Haiti with them, and a gift of \$20.00 sent to them.

She asked if some would rise up and pledge to support other workers on the field whose support has not been assured.

She also urged us to work on, pray on, and fight on. The God of our Salvation will bring a sure reward.

She stated that there were legal reasons why the building had been delayed.

She invited Mrs. Cora P. Thomas, the returned missionary from Africa, to demonstrate just how the children are gotten for the Mission Station.

Mrs. Thomas had a rude hut, resembling the huts the natives live in in Africa. She also had a mother and children thinly clad living in the hut.

The Missionary visited the hut carrying an armful of clething and made acquaintance with the mother and offered to put clothes on the children. This pleased the mother and children greatly, and after each child had been dressed, then the mother and children sat on the mat and listened to the story of Jesus, and the mother gladly gave the children to the Missionary for the Mission School.

After the demonstration Mrs. Thomas made a strong appeal to all of us, urging that we do more than ever before for the cause of Missions.

Next came a report from a special committee appointed by the Chairman of the Executive Board, authorizing the President to make such a recommendation as she desired to make.

The Report, read by Mrs. Rebecca Gray:

Whereas, the president of our body has brought to our minds some very important matters pertaining to the progress of the work, We, your special committee from the Executive Board, have carefully considered what was set before us and submit to this auxiliary body the following:

Lord let me live from day to day In such a self-forgetful way, That even when I kneel to pray My thoughts shall be of others.

The thought expressed in these lines seems to be one of the outstanding virtues of our president. It seems that for months she has thought and prayed over the heavy weight and responsibility resting upon the parent body and she has come to her Board asking permission to lighten that burden.

The Board, knowing that as an auxiliary, we are to help in whatever our hands find to do, gladly grants her request to do the thing which has so lain upon her heart. This Committee, therefore, desires so to report, and expresses its entire approval of the proceedure to be followed as suggested by the President.

Though very feeble and brought in in a roller chair it cheered him much and gave him fresh courage.

All of this was a part of the President's Annual Address. Dr. J. H. Randolph, Corresponding Secretary of the Lott Carey Convention, was happily surprised and so expressed himself. Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman of the Executive Board, spoke words of joy and appreciation for the gift and extended a vote of thanks.

Dr. C. S. Brown, though very sick, was filled with enthusiasm and caught fresh courage and made some very strong missionary remarks, and would have preached a sermon if the president had allowed. Though very s.ck, he said to the Convention, "I am the happiest man in the house and I believe I'm going to get well."

A motion prevailed that the President's address be placed

in the hands of a committee:

And thus passed into history the gift of \$10,000 by the Auxiliary to the Parent Body.

He needs us, because He gave His life for us. He needs us, because we have accepted Him as our Saviour. He needs us to work in His vineyard—the harvest is great but the laborers are few.

He needs us to work in the homeland, and to send the Gospel to Foreign lands that souls may be saved. It is our duty to improve the precious moments allotted us in Kingdom-building, Spiritual uplift, and service, for we grow as we serve. Let us enter into the beautiful garden of prayer, where Jesus is waiting to receive us, that we might learn from Him. His will, that it may be done in earth as it is in Heaven.
