

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society incorporated, of the United States of America.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all hodies in followship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this Society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at last (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, and Executive Secretary, a Statistician, a Treasurer and an Auditor, each of whom, except Executive Secretary shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The Treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty at the said board shall require of him. The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite period. In case of a desired change by the body of Executive Secretary a ninety day's notice prior to his resignation with this body or its Executive Board.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Board during the interim of the meetings of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a. m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September, at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Ind., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) five dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) five dollars, and a life member by the payment of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER

Article 1.' The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its delibera-

Article 3. Enrollment of delegates.

Article 4. Collection of Finance.

Article 5. Appointment of committees,

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article B. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months' notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present

PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY

9:30 a. m. As host of the Union Baptist Church, Connellsville, Pa., the 38th annual session of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America was duly opened by Vice President, A. Hobbs in the absence of President C. S. Brown.

The devotional service was conducted by Rev. G. W. Watkins and Rev. B. D. Ellis. Song No. 395 "O Zion Haste" was sung. Scripture lesson read by Rev. Watkins. "The Power of Prayer in the Missionary Program," was ably discussed by Rev. Watkins from the following points: "The necessity and power of prayer."

Following the devotional period, the various committees

were announced.

Dr. J. H. Randolph presented Dr. Henry Allen Boyd, Sec'y of the National Baptist Publishing Board. Dr. Boyd is an annual visitor and liberal contributor to this convention. He brought greetings from the National Baptist Convention and expressed great delight in following up this body. He offered a plan and proposition by which he could pay the salaries of all our missionaries and teachers.

Dr. J. T. Hill spoke to the address of Dr. Boyd and urged that this body give careful consideration to the plan of-

fered.

Selection of music was sung while the president, Dr. C. S Brown was preparing to deliver his annual message.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

For thirty-eight consecutive years Dr. Brown has been the presiding officer of this convention and each year he has brought to its constituents a message of hope, inspiration and guidance. Out of his years of contact and wide experience and out of a heart consecrated to the cause of missions, he has always fired the hearts of his addience in his annual address.

He set forth in the beginning of his message the one and

chief objective of this body namely; the spreading of the Kingdom of God throughout the world.

The temptation to turn aside from this objective has been met and nobly resisted.

The commission of Jesus Christ is still ringing in our ears; and the preachers are the trumpeteers of this commismion.

. He further urged that we think in world terms and not be too near sighted and narrow in our plans.

Education is helpless apart from Christianity he declared. He pleaded for the application of the Golden Rule and the fatherhood of God and brotherhood of man.

The church needs a new awakening in kingdom work and it must be done by the preacher, God's spiritual specialist, as the controling force for teaching, the indoctrination of missions; the chief financial force and the recruiting officer.

He gave a brief survey of world conditions, deploring the fact that Rome, the capital of religion is leading in warfare. He offered the following recommendations:

1st. That we cancel our debts.

2nd. That we put up a building in Brewerville.

3rd. Install lighting system in Brewerville.

That we erect a memorial building at Gareysburg. 15th. That we build a church at St. Marc.

In closing the president expressed words of commendation for the workers on both home and foreign fields.

He especially praised Rr. Randolph for his excellent record during the year, and the auxiliaries for their loyal support.

By motion of Dr. W. L. Ransom, seconded by Dr. O. S. Bullock a rising vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Brown and his address referred to a committee.

The Executive Board submitted its report. (See report.)

By motion the report was approved.

The morning session was closed with an offering and the benediction by Dr. G. O. Bullock.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

2:30 p. m. The devotional service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Nowlin and Rev. J. A. Younger.

Following several song selections led by Rev. Nowlin, Rev. Younger read Luke 10th chapter and commented from same. He set forth some of the hindrances to the missionary work of the church, namely: materialism, eagerness for wealth and desire for ease.

The church which is liberal towards missions is greatly blessed. "Hark the voice of Jesus crying" was sung.

Dr. J. W. Coleman, Illinois, vice president took charge and presented Dr. J. H. Bandolph, Executive Secretary to de-

liver his annual report.

Dr. Randolph expressed great delight in the president's message of the morning. He also highly appreciates the fine spirit of cooperation throughout the body. He declared that the work has gone forward in spite of many difficulties. Workers are knocking at the door for opportunity to serve on the foreign fields. A deeper consecration on the home field is needed.

Dr. Randolph made an earnest appeal for larger income with which to darry on the work, stating that gratitude to God will manifest itself in active service for the great cause

of missions.

Regular contributions were urged, and also that prayer circles be organized for special petition to God for the work. He set forth Christ is the true example of mission spirit and

work. Soul saving was also stressed in his report.

He spoke of several churches that are contributing regularly. He gave a brief survey of the fields of operation and the workers. The outlook is very bright for Lott Carey and she is gaining territory rapidly. Far off churches are responding to the work as they read the Lott Carey Herald.

The report was forcefully presented and gave strong evidence of Dr. Randolph's deep interest and consecration in

the work.

By motion the report was approved. (See report.)

Report of treasurer Dr. J. H. Hughes, was submitted and approved by motion. (See report.)

Dr. E. E. Ricks, auditor made his report, which was

ar opted by motion. (See report.)

Report of Lett Carey Herald was made by Dr. J. H. Raudolph, business manager. The report was approved.

Dr. C. C. Adams, president of the Baptist State Convention of Pennsylvania was introduced to the convention.

Dr. Adams in a pleasing manner expressed great delight in being present and greeting old friends. He also made an earnest appeal for unity in the prosecution of mission work.

The convention closed with the pronouncing of benedic-

tion by Rev. A. S. Hoard.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Vice president E. E. Smith, presiding. Song service was conducted by Rev. W. C. Williamson, Pa. and Rev. W. A. Nowlin, Pa..

Scripture lesson John 17:1-11 read by Rev. N. L. Scarborough, Ohio.

Prayer was offered by Dr. A. W. Brown, Richmond.

Selection of music by Mrs. Richardson.

Vice president Smith presented Dr. A. S. Croom, pastor of the Union Baptist Church, Durham, N. C. to preach the annual sermon.

Dr. Croom expressed joy for the privilege granted him on this occasion.

He announced his text from Rom. 8:10 and as a subject: "The Happy Consequences of Christian Suffering."

He preached a very powerful sermon from the following

I. The acquisition of glory through suffering.

II. The Incomparable Glory Dethroning the Powers of Earth.

IV. Suffering the Gateway to Glory.

Dr. G. E. Reed, statistician, submitted his annual report. Using a chart he proved that our foreign mission offering did not decline as much during the period of depression as did the white Baptists.

In view of the funds gathered for the propagation of our work upon the various Foreign fields the Board asks for your most sympathetic consideration in what appears to be a ganing of interest in the missionary program of this convention.

The future of the Lott Carey Convention is undimmed. Its horizon is extending, its sense of responsibility heightens with the passing

years. In the execution of its program the Board seeks divine guidance and the prayers of His people.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman and members of the Executive Board: It is with pleasure that I do submit to you my eighth annual record of the work done by the Executive Committee of this board, during the interim of the Convention. The first meeting of the Committee was held in the First Baptist Church, Roanoke, Va., August 31, 1934. Dr. W. T. Johnson, presiding, the committee was organized as follows: Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman; Dr. W. L. Ransom, Vice Chairman; Geo. O. Bullock, Secretary; Mrs. Geo. O. Bullock, Assistant Secretary. The committee adjourned with benediction to meet at the call of the chairman.

The second meeting of the Executive Committee was held at the Headquarters Building, 1501 11th St., N. W., Washington, D. C., October 23, 1934 at 12 o'clock. Fourteeen members were present, prayer was offered by Dr. J. P. Reeder of Columbia, S. C. Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman, made very encouraging remarks on the outlook of our missionary

work. The minutes of the Roanoke meeting were adopted, the Corresponding Secretary submitted his report which showed a period of exceptional good will and cooperation in our missionary activities. He reported having visited the National Baptist Convention in Muskogee, Okla., The Pomunkey Association at Rumford, Virginia, The West Roanoke Association of Ahoskie, N. C., The Lumber River Association at Dillard, S. C., The New Hope Association, Durham, N. C., The African Baptist State Convention, Newark. N. J. From all these points the Secretary reported a fine spirit of cooperation and splendid contributions for the work. The report was adopted. By a vote of the committee the Corresponding Secretary was elected the legal representative of the Convention for the fifty acres of land (near Alex. Va.) left jointly to the Lott Carey Convention and Hampton Institute. A motion passed that Rev. Smith of Chicago would be asked to help support Miss Gooding's station. It was also decided by the board that Mrs. M. L. Walker's status on the home field would be as former returned missionaries' status has been. The decision of the Committee was that Corresponding Secretary set apart sufficient funds to be used in payment of his salary in proportion to other paid workers. The Committee voted that the work of Rev. Mdodona with the National Baptist churches be under the direction of the Corresponding Secretary. The following Campaign Committee was appointed to direct the drive for \$50,000: Drs. C. S. Brown, J. H. Randolph, W. T. Johnson, G. O. Bullock, J. P. Reeder, Mrs. J. H. Randolph. Said committee is to cooperate with the Corresponding Secretary, select persons to assist in directing the drive.

The motion passed that the termination of Mrs. Watson's time be left in the hand of Corresponding Secretary. The consolidation of Mrs. Watson and Miss Gooding's stations was discussed. A motion to centralize the work in Rear Careysburg was adopted. It was voted that a copy of the Times Despatch of Richmond, Virginia carrying a splendid article of Lott Carey be sent to the office of the Corresponding Secretary for future reference. It was decided that at the next meeting the committee would hold a mass meeting and request the members to remain for the evening meeting. Benediction, Rev. J. T. Crump.

The Third meeting of the Executive Committee was held at Headquarters Building, 1501 11th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., March 19, 1935 with fifteen members present. After devotions the following business was transacted. Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted. The Secretary reported our work in Africa highly approved by the Liberian Government so much so that the President and officials attended Commencement of our schools directed by Rev. W. H. Thomas and assisted in the ground breaking for a new building. The president lifted the first shovel of dirt and pledged \$100, and his wife with the second shavel/of dirt pledged \$50 for the school. Miss Clarice Gooding is doing a spendid work and has been requested by the Secretary of Education to deliver some lectures in the Public schools on Domestic Science. Rev. G. W. Steward of Bermuda requested the Corresponding Secretary to visit his field of labor during the month of May. At the time of this meeting the Rev. C. M. Bryant had been quite sick, he thanked Mrs. Randolph for the box and the Secretary for the assistance given him. The Corresponding Secretary reported successful visits to Greenville, N. C., Baltimore. Md., New York, Durham, N. C., S. C., N. J., thence to the Adoram Baptist church in Wallace, N. C. where he was received cordially and given a generous offering of \$150.00. The Secretary was the order of the day for the Baptist Ministers' Conference of Washington and vicinity. Their contribution for foreign mission work was \$155.90. Thence to the Ministers' Conference of Richmond, Va., he was cordially received and given a splendid offering of \$52.17. The report of the Secretary was adopted. The special committee appointed to arrange for the \$50,000 reported as follows: A statement was made by the Chairman Dr. C. S. Brown on the arrangement of the drive for \$50,000. Outlining plans as conducted by N. C. in the general State drive.

1. On motion, A general committee be appointed on the \$50,000 drive. Adopted.

That a state wide committee be organized in each state consisting of 111 persons. That 1,000 persons be requested to raise \$50,000 each.

On motion we accepted the setup of N. C. as a model for the \$50,000 drive. On motion it was agreed that G. O. Bullock, J. H. Randolph be the Committee to select the Chairman of the States and sections. The report was adopted and the committee urged to go forward. The Corresponding Secretary told the committee of the barrels he had planned to use over the fields to raise foreign missions money, the committee voted to accept the same. The committee expressed the sympathy of the Convention to Dr. Brown in the passing of his son. The attention of the Convention was called to the fact that the school founded by Dr. Brown fifty years ago was honoring him, at his 76th anniversary. The committee voted that the Chairman of the Executive Board represent the Lott Carey Convention on this occasion with a token of \$25.00. The House Committee reported as follows:



Constitution

ARTICLE I.-Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II.-Object.

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the auxiliary shall be a President and one Vice President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue

in office until their successors shall be elected.

Section 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Section 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Section 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

Section 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

DEAR CO-WORKERS:

Our meeting with the First Baptist Church, Roanoke, Va., Dr. A. L. James, Pastor, was one of the best in the history of our Convention. We still cherish pleasant memories of our stay there.

We are here enjoying the hospitalities of the pastor, Rev. Mr. Colvin and the good members of the Union Baptist Church. It is good for us to be here. Let us rejoice and be glad. May the sessions be helpful to all who have assembled.

In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He will direct thy paths. The occasion which brings us from our several homes, making new history in soul-winning is one of great moment. Our efforts combined with the great forces of Christian workers throughout the world, strengthen and hold in tact the true purpose for which Jesus came, that all nations may know and learn of Him, and be saved.

Therefore, more atress should be placed upon the necessity of building a strong foundation of loyalty, faithfulness, confidence, endurance in stabilizing our work that the King in all of His glory may have full sway in the hearts of men. Our mission is to extend the King-dom of God. The dullness of Spiritual vision and the mad rush after worldly pieasure make it highly necessary that we survey well the ground, and thoroughly note the scope of work to be done in view of existing conditions in every State and County. Prince. Representatives from all parts of the country were in attendance. The President delivered a wholesome and helpful address. He was positive in his utterances and admonished his hearers to make the Convention all that it should be.

COMMITTEE.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article I.

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Junior Young People's Department of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Lott Carey Convention.

Article II.

Section 1. The object shall be the same as that of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Article III.

Section 1. The members of this department shall be supervisor, president, a vice-president from each state or district representing in this department, secretary, treasurer and corresponding secretary. Each of whom shall be elected and qualified, and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in a similar organization.

Section 2. The superintendent of this department shall be appointed

by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 3. A Supervisors' Board shall be composed of representatives of each state or district and executive officers of the Junior and Young People's Department which shall be elected annually, whose duty shall be to advertise with the superintendent and to study ways and means by which this department shall be developed.

Section 4. The Constitution may only be revised by the recommendation of the Board of Supervisors and adopted by the Junior Young People's Department at its annual session providing the notice of this change be given twelve months prior to annual meeting.

Section 5. All money raised in this department shall be turned over to the Woman's Auxiliary, who in turn shall be responsible for expenses incurred in operating this department.
