Constitution and By-Laws

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Society Incorporated, of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with all bodies in fellowship with it either in the United States of America or in the countries where it operates mission stations.

Section 2. In order to carry out the purpose of this Society not more than (25 cents) twenty-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended for operating expenses of this work and at least (75 cents) seventy-five cents out of every dollar shall be expended in the work of missions as carried on by this Society.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, one Vice President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, and Executive Secretary, a Statistician, a Treasurer and an Auditor, each of whom, except Executive Secretary shall be elected annually and serve until their successors are elected and qualified and shall perform the usual duties of such officers in similar organizations. The Treasurer of this body shall give bond to the board in such penalty as the said board shall require of him. The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite period. In case of a desired change by the body or Executive Secretary a ninety days' notice prior to his resignation with this body or its Executive Board.

Section 2. There shall be elected annually a Board known as the Foreign Mission Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Incorporated, of the United States of America. The officers shall be members of this Board and such other additional members as may be elected by the organization in its annual meeting.

This Board shall have charge and shall execute the work of the Convention during the interim of its sessions, and shall make reports of work done to the Convention. This Board shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine members, which committee shall represent the Board during the interim of the meeting of the Board and shall make its report to the Board. This Board shall be located at Washington, D. C.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the Society shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. It shall convene annually beginning at 10 a. m., on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September at a place provided by the Body or Board.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc., of the U. S. A., shall end July 31st of each year.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any Baptist Church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of (\$5.00) five dollars per delegate provided no church shall be represented by more than five delegates. Any member of a Baptist Church in good and regular standing may become an annual member by payment of (\$5.00) five dollars, and a life member by the payment of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches, associations, conventions or leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Society a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER

Article 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer. The same shall apply to each session of the Convention.

Article 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its deliberations.

Article 3. Enrollment of delegates.

Article 4. Collection of Finance.

Article 5. Appointment of committees.

Article 6. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the house.

Article 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

Article 8. Reading and communications by members in their seats will not be allowed during the meeting of the body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months notice having been given in writing and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Amendment—Submitted 1937, Approved 1938

The President of this body shall not succeed himself more than four consecutive years in office.

PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

9:15, devotional by Rev. B. D. Ellis and Rev. J. H. Marshall.

President A. L. James following the devotional period, took the choir and made appropriate remarks, duly opening the 43rd annual session. Enrollment of delegates by the committee.

By motion, the enrolled list of messengers such as are legal delegates constitute the membership of this body.

The presence of Dr. Henry Allen Boyd was recognized by the choir, and Dr. Boyd made brief remarks, honoring the fathers who established our institutions and pledging himself to keep the National Baptist Publishing House going, founded by his sainted father, Dr. R. H. Boyd.

INTRODUCTORY SERMON

The president presented Rev. J. H. King to deliver the Introductory Sermon.

Rev. King expressed peculiar delight in the high honor conferred upon him. He announced the following subject, "The World's Need—World-wide Missions." Text: Matt. 24:6-8; 2 Tim. 3:1-3; Mark 15:16.

Rev. King set forth the appalling condition of the world, its economic condition, its military condition, its moral and religious condition. He declared that the gospel of Jesus Christ is the only hope.

In closing he stated reasons why the Church should accept the challenge and set herself to the important task of world evangelization.

Following the sermon, Dr. Q. J. Allen led in a song service.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

Dr. G. O. Bullock, first vice president, presented Dr. A. L. James to deliver his annual message. In his opening

remarks, Dr. James stressed the importance of this meeting in the city of Washington, the Nation's capitol.

He referred to the passing of some of the strong supporters of this work. He further stated that it has been his policy to send out two written messages each year to the members of this body. He made several visits to annual gatherings during the year, and called special attention to the Baptist conclave held in Raleigh, N. C., by the various state bodies of North Carolina in August. He referred to the fine work of the Women's Auxiliary on the headquarters building.

He thanked the official staff for their loyal support.

Dr. J. H. Randolph, retiring executive secretary was highly commended for the excellent service rendered for 12 years, greatly reducing our debt and establishing confidence.

Dr. James made a strong appeal for Evangelism and Missions. He declared that consecration is the greatest need of today. Christ, he stated, offers eternal life to a weary world, and a new heart produces a new administration as set forth by Zaccheus.

In closing he thanked God that it is our privilege to share in his great task in world-wide missions.

The message was greatly enjoyed. Dr. Bullock highly commended the president for his fine message and by motion a vote of thanks was extended for same.

The report of the Executive Board was read by Rev. W. C. Somerville, secretary. Excerpts of the report touching Rev. Somerville, were presented by Dr. W. T. Johnson, chairman.

A motion was made to adopt the report of the Executive Board.

By a substitute the report of the Executive Board was approved, except that part referring to the election of the Executive Secretary.

A roll call was asked for and the membership roll was called. Those in favor of ending the debate were 106, those opposed 23.

The previous motion was taken with 62 approving the report of the Executive Board and 79 disapproving.

At this point the convention adjourned for dinner.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Devotions conducted by Rev. P. B. Bynum. Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

By motion the matter pertaining to the election of the Executive Secretary was referred to the Committee on Nomination of Officers. The order of the day was voted.

Greetings from the Women's Auxiliary were presented by Mrs. M. J. Brown, Raleigh, N. C. Mrs. Brown made a strong plea for missions and for the hearty support of the women.

Dr. C. C. Adams, president of the Baptist State Convention of Pa, and chairman of the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention was presented. He made brief remarks, bringing greetings from the State and National Conventions.

Dr. Henry Allen Boyd was again presented. Dr. Boyd came forward and made brief remarks and then presented to the convention a full receipt of \$199.00 for the printing of our minutes of the previous session.

Dr. J. H. Randolph made a motion that a vote of thanks be given Dr. Boyd for his generous gift.

The report of the Executive Secretary was presented by Dr. Randolph. He declared that more than ten thousand prayers have been offered in the office during his administration these 12 years. He expressed deep appreciation to all who helped to support the work. He also gave the financial standing of the convention and closed by urging us to carry on the worthy work committed to our hands.

A rising vote of thanks was given Dr. Randolph for his excellent work and a committee was appointed to secure a suitable token of respect for his service. Several spoke to the motion in hearty commendation.

The afternoon session was adjourned with benediction by Dr. W. T. Johnson.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Rev. C. W. B. Gordon conducted the devotional period. He spoke from the topic: "World Conditions Challenging Christianity." He called attention to the changing conditions, declaring that Christianity is being falsely paraded. New isms are springing up and trying to substitute for the church. The church, the only divine institution for the salvation of man.

He further declared that the kingdom of God needs to be rediscovered, and that the church of today is to battle

against atheism. In closing he declared that Christianity will win out in the great conflict.

The Lord's Prayer was then chanted. Rev. P. B. Bynum led in songs.

CONVENTION SERMON

Hymn, "Go preach my gospel," was lined by Dr. J. H. Brown. Dr. W. T. Johnson offered prayer, following the scripture lesson by Dr. J. T. Hill.

Then Dr. H. M. Johnson presented Dr. W. L. Ransome, Richmond, to deliver the Convention Sermon.

Dr. Ransome in a very pleasing manner set forth his long standing with this body. From the text Luke 4:18, 19 he selected the following subject, "The Program of Jesus." He discussed the following outlines:

1. Christ visiting his home town.
2. His program set forth.
3. His baptism.
4. His conflict with Satan.
5. His Sermon on the Mount.
6. His death, burial and resurrection.
7. His message to women.
8. His ascension.
- II. His Program Turned Over to His Followers:
 1. Under guidance of Holy Spirit.
 2. Persons on program qualified.
 3. Program's stage—the world
 4. Witnesses on program.
- III. Conclusion:
 1. God himself the Judge of all transactions.
 2. What will be the verdict?

The sermon was rich with spiritual power and information.

By vote of thanks the message was received.

Rev. Bynum and Dr. O. J. Allen sang selections.

Dr. Randolph asked Rev. P. A. Bishop and Dr. E. L. Harrison to take the offering, which amounted to \$100.02.

Report of the Treasurer, Dr. A. W. Brown.

Report was approved by motion.

Report of Lott Carey Herald by Editor Dr. J. L. S. Hollo-man.

By motion report was approved.

Report of Statistician, Rev. P. A. Bishop.

By motion, approved.

Report of Auditor as approved by Executive Board, Rev. H. N. Johnson.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Dr. W. L. Ransome was elected to serve as chairman during the election of officers.

Dr. J. T. Hill, chairman of Nominating Committee, called upon Rev. A. M. Patterson to submit the report.

By motion that part of the report upon which the committee agreed was approved.

A minority report was submitted by Rev. Patterson. The convention voted upon both reports as follows:

Minority report, 39; majority report 106.

By motion the election of Rev. W. M. Somerville was made unanimous. Convention adjourned.

Benediction, Dr. J. T. Hill.

THURSDAY MORNING

Joint session with Women's Auxiliary.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Devotions conducted by Rev. N. L. Scarborough and Dr. Ashburn of Ohio. Dr. Ashburn spoke briefly upon the topic of "Worship," with the following outline:

1. Thankfulness.
2. Guilt of sin must be felt.
3. Depend on God.

Rev. Scarborough closed the period with prayer.

Minutes of the previous sessions were read and by motion approved.

Dr. R. C. Barbour, editor of the National Baptist Voice was introduced to the body. He expressed surprise at the appearance personnel and intelligence of this body.

By motion Dr. Barbour was thanked for his visit and interesting remarks.

"Blessed assurance," was sung, and Rev. A. S. Hood presented Rev. B. H. Gayles to preach. Rev. Gayles made appropriate remarks and announced his text. Acts 3:6, and spoke from the subject, "Making Use of What We Have." He developed the following points:

1. Using and giving such as we have is the story of mankind.

- (a) Moses, his rod.
- (b) David, his stone.

2. The Begging Cripple and Peter's offer.

3. Christianity demands that we give such as we have.

4. Peter offered: (a) A life of consecration (b) Safe companionship. (c) Clean living. (d) Jesus.

The message was very helpful. The Convention extended a vote of thanks to Rev. Gayles for the message.

Dr. Nelson of Howard University was introduced. He extended a cordial invitation to the Convention to a reception given in honor of the members of the Convention on Howard University campus.

The Convention closed with benediction by Rev. B. J. Ivey.

FRIDAY MORNING

The Convention was opened with devotions conducted by Rev. D. J. Bradford, Richmond, Va., and Bro. Johnson chorister of Mt. Moriah Baptist church, Washington, D. C.

Rev. D. H. Presley, Pa., discussed the following subject: "Salvation and Its Cost, and Its Missionary Implications." The message was well prepared and greatly enjoyed.

A general discussion on missions was engaged in for some time by several of the brethren.

INSPIRATIONAL SERMON

The Inspirational Sermon was preached by Rev. S. A. Thurston, Pittsburgh, Pa., who was presented by Dr. J. A. Brown, Richmond. St. Mark 13:10, was selected as a text and from it the following subject was announced: "Publication of the Gospel Among all Nations." The speaker stressed the following points:

1. Advertising Jesus.
2. Various Kinds of Advertising.
3. Attractive Advertising.
4. Prophets, advertising agents.
5. All Christians should advertise.

Following this strong message, Rev. R. M. Pitts offered prayer.

By motion Dr. Thurston was thanked for the message.

By motion the Convention accepted the invitation extended by Dr. W. N. Nelson, Dean of Howard University to a reception this afternoon at 2:30.

By motion Dr. E. L. Harrison was authorized to receive

a copy of the revised constitution and place same in hands of recording secretary for printing.

Dr. W. H. Jernagan, Pres. S. S. Congress was presented with brief remarks.

The Committee on Obituary made its report and conducted a brief memorial service. Dr. W. T. Johnson, chairman. The Convention closed with benediction pronounced by Rev. H. C. Rhone.

FRIDAY NIGHT

Annual Missionary Mass Meeting, joint session, Executive Secretary, master of ceremonies. Devotions led by Dr. O. J. Allen and Dr. A. Hobbs.

Returned missionaries were presented as follows:


1st Rev. Peters. He highly praised the work of this convention on foreign fields.

He disclosed it a difficult task to convert Mohammedans to the Christian faith. He related his experience in Africa as a missionary.

The choir of the Good Will Baptist church rendered a selection of music. Rev. T. O. Dosurna, M. A., a native African, was next presented as the principal speaker of the evening.

He in a very serious mood set forth: "The Case of Africa." He declared himself to be deeply interested in the religious economic and political life of Africa.

He praised the churches of Virginia and Western Pennsylvania for their open doors and candid spirit. He also highly commended Dr. Randolph for his earnest efforts in giving the gospel to his native people.

 The speaker declared that the Africans feel that the time has come for the solidarity of the negro races of the world. He desires to see the time when African products can be exported to us in America.

He also related the Negroes contribution to civilization and what the mission cause has done. The message was very forceful, penetrating and informing.

At the close of his address, Dr. O. J. Allen pledged the support of First Calvary Baptist church, Norfolk, Va., in taking care of the salary of this young African in his native land under the Lott Carey Board.

An offering of \$130.00 was received.

President James spoke of the fine hospitality extended during this session by the good people of Washington, and

the Second Baptist church, also of the excellent session just closing.

The newly elected Executive Secretary, Rev. W. C. Somerville, was presented by Dr. G. O. Bullock. Rev. Somerville made very earnest remarks, pledging himself to the great task as suggested by the speaker of the evening.

PRESENTATION

Dr. J. L. S. Hollomon was selected to present a token of appreciation for faithful service rendered this Convention for 12 years by Dr. J. H. Randolph, retiring Executive Secretary.

A presentation was also made by Mrs. W. T. Johnson from the Women's Auxiliary.

Financial reports were submitted by committees of both bodies. (See reports)

The Women's Auxiliary donated \$2050.00 to the parent body.

Committee on Resolutions made report and was approved.

The Forty-third Annual session was duly closed with the benediction by Dr. W. T. Johnson.

It is our pleasure to bring before you our fourth annual report of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Missionary Convention of America.

I must take this opportunity to thank you one and all throughout the entire Brotherhood, through your fine cooperation, I have collected all back checks and am able to report a one-hundred percent (100%) collection of the same. This has meant work and extra effort but those of us that work for the Master's vineyard must work from morn until night.

In dealing with your business, we have endeavored to be honest, faithful, diligent and punctual; trying to eliminate delay and waste wherever possible in the Treasurer's Office. As a result we are happy

to present to you again all drafts and checks issued on the foreign field to the amount of \$50.00 free of charge given to the Treasurer's office through the courtesy of the First and Merchants National Bank of Richmond, Va., whose capital stock is over seventy-five million dollars.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Washington, D. C., November 9, 1939.

The Executive Committee of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention met at Headquarters Building, 1501 11th Street, N. W., at 12 o'clock noon of above date, with 14 members present. After devotionals, the Executive Secretary submitted his financial report, which was adopted. (See Executive Secretary's Report). A letter of thanks was read from Dr. Russell Brooks accepting our fee of \$100.00 to the World's Baptist Alliance. A letter was read from Rev. Olivah Dosumui applying for work under our board on the Foreign fields. A motion prevailed that Rev. Dosumui be notified that his application is filed for future reference and should there be an opening, he would be considered. A letter was read from Dr. Scott of the N. J. State Convention stating Dr. Harris had written him of his dire need of money and asking for \$500.00, which he sent. Meanwhile, our Executive Secretary had sent him \$500.00. A motion passed that we confer with the N. J. State Convention and ask that they get in touch with our Executive Secretary before paying any money to our workers. The Secretary stated that we needed \$1,400 to meet pressing bills.

Recommendations of the Executive Secretary were as follows: I. That we borrow \$1,500 to meet partially the present urgent needs of the work; that we may pay the bills and reimburse the Treasurer of overdrawn designated money. (See bills). II. That a special committee be appointed to prepare some special feature of importance touching the history and lives of our convention leaders for the annual session to be held in Washington, D. C., August 27-30, 1940. The last recom-

mendation was made so that whatever arrangements for this special feature, this committee may be privileged to review the plan prior to the work of the program committee. Mrs. Randolph, Secretary of House Committee, reported for the committee. The report was adopted. A motion passed that the bills of the House Committee be paid through the Executive Secretary's Office.

The Executive Secretary submitted his resignation contingent on payment of back salary, which was \$3,400, and in keeping with the Constitution. A motion passed that action on the Executive Secretary's resignation be deferred until after the special committee made its report. Dr. W. T. Johnson, Chairman of the Board, reported for the special committee as follows: That the members of the Committee who were asked to investigate the negotiation of a loan of \$3,500 back salary of the Executive Secretary reported from the following cities, Raleigh, N. C., Richmond, Va., and Washington, D. C. The committee considered the terms of the Industrial Bank of Washington, D. C., the best, which were as follows: That 6% interest be paid in advance on said note. \$50.00 per month be paid on or before the 20th day of each month for nine months, and that the remainder be paid on the 20th of September, 1940. This note is to be signed by the proper officers of the Convention and the special committee. The plans were not perfected to secure the money in this meeting because the Executive Secretary refused to sign the note. A motion passed that all the proper Officers should sign the note. The meeting adjourned with benediction by Dr. J. L. S. Hollo-mon.

The Second Meeting of the Committee was held at Lott Carey Headquarters, February 8, 1940, at 12 o'clock noon, on the above date, with 14 members present. Following the devotions, the Executive Secretary presented his financial report which was adopted. (See Executive Secretary's Report.) The Secretary reported the Christmas Drive was a success; the Easter drive as progressing nicely. The Executive Secretary recommended to the Committee, the Rev. Dosumui to serve as a missionary under our Board, stating he is well prepared for services on the foreign fields having received his training from Virginia Union University, Tuskegee Institute, Lincoln University, and a Master Degree from Columbia University, New York. Rev. Dosumui is a member of the Shiloh Baptist Church of Washington, D. C., and has the assurance of the assistance of a number of Pastors, such as the Rev. Garnett of the Baltimore Conference, which we feel will aid him in rendering more effectual service on the foreign fields.

A compromise of the Clarice I. Gooding case was reported, accepted, and the case closed. As per statement from her lawyer, total amount to close the case, \$225.00. A letter from Rev. and Mrs. Burke thanking the Convention for full payment of its indebtedness to them. They

deducted \$25.00 from their bill and said they hoped to be present at the next session of the Convention. Letters from Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas were received with encouraging reports of their work. Rev. Thomas deducted \$200.00 from his salary. Encouraging letters from Miss Minnie Lyons, Rev. Samuel Stubblefield, and Rev. Boaz A. Harris. Rev. Harris asked for a motor for his boat, which will cost \$350.00. The Secretary gave, approximately, a statement of the indebtedness of the Convention, through July 31, 1940, \$15,148.52, plus indebtedness on Headquarters Building.

The motion passed that the report of the Executive Secretary be adopted with the amendment that the expense of the Convention be given as information. Rev. G. O. Bullock reported as follows that \$3,500 was borrowed from the Industrial bank of Washington on the following terms: 6% interest was paid in advance. \$50.00 per month to be paid on or before the 20th of each month, for nine months; the remainder to be paid the 20th of September, 1940. The Executive Secretary was paid in full November 21, 1939. The report of the special committee was adopted. A motion passed that the resignation of the Executive Secretary be accepted according to the Constitution. A motion that a special committee be appointed to cooperate with the Executive Secretary until the Convention. Said motion was amended that the Secretary be asked to serve to the Convention with the assistance of a special committee, namely: G. O. Bullock, H. T. Gaskins, J. L. S. Hollomon, Dr. W. T. Johnson. Amendment adopted. A committee was appointed to select a suitable man to recommend to the Executive Committee as a full time Executive Secretary, namely: Dr. W. T. Johnson, G. O. Bullock, W. H. Moore, J. T. Hill, A. L. James, O. S. Bullock, Mrs. J. H. Randolph. Meeting adjourned with prayer and Benediction by Dr. A. L. James.

The Third Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention assembled at the Headquarters Building, 1501 11th St., N. W., July 9, 1940, at 12 o'clock noon, 16 members present. After devotionals, the Chairman called for the report of the special committee appointed to select a full time Executive Secretary to be submitted to the Executive Committee. The special committee submitted the following report: The Committee met in the Church at Hampton Institute, Hampton, Virginia, June 25, 1940. After the devotion, the Chairman, Dr. W. T. Johnson, announced the purpose of the meeting. The following names were presented for consideration for full time Executive Secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, Rev. W. C. Somerville, Rev. Presley, Rev. Porter W. Philips, Rev. W. G. Wilson, Rev. D. C. Rice, Dr. J. L. S. Hollomon. After carefully considering the above named persons, Rev. W. C. Somerville was selected to be presented to the Executive Committee for full

time Executive Secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention Committee. Dr. W. T. Johnson, Geo. O. Bullock, D. S. Bullock, A. L. James, Mrs. J. H. Randolph. Members absent, Drs. W. H. Moore and J. T. Hill. After much discussion, the report of the special committee was adopted and the Rev. W. C. Somerville was selected to be recommended to the Executive Board of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention for its full time Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary submitted his financial report which was adopted. (See Executive Secretary's report). Mrs. J. H. Randolph voted against the report of the committee. A committee from the N. J. State Convention, which assisted in the maintenance of Rev. Boaz A. Harris and his work in Haiti met with a committee from the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention to consider further support of the work. After much discussion, the N. J. Brethren expressed themselves as being well pleased with the way the Lott Carey Convention was handling the work and pledged their continued support. The matter of the salary of a full time Secretary was considered. After much discussion, a motion passed that we offer the full time Executive Secretary the same salary that we paid the last full time Executive Secretary, which was \$2,500 per year, the use of Headquarters Building, and traveling expense. The following visitors were presented and accorded a seat in the committee room. Rev. -----, Mrs. A. W. Brown, Mrs. Annie Robinson and daughter. A motion passed that Dr. J. H. Randolph be privileged to cooperate with Dr. J. L. S. Hollonton in arranging for entertainment of the Convention. A vote of thanks was given Mrs. J. H. Randolph and the women of the Convention for the very splendid improvements made on Headquarters Building. Dr. A. L. James spoke encouragingly of the work and of our interest in one common cause and that we may continue to go forward. Dr. James stated that \$150.00 was in tact by a church in New Jersey for the motor for Rev. Harris' boat. Meeting adjourned. Benediction by Rev. H. T. Gaskins.

REPORT OF STATISTICIAN

Mr. President,

Officers and Members of the Lott Carey Baptist
Foreign Mission Convention:

Last year when I submitted my report at Columbus, Ohio, the President of this Convention requested that for this session, I should confine my report to the work of the Lott Carey Convention only.

I have endeavored to make a study of the growth and development of the Lott Carey Convention. In the report of Dr. G. C. Reid, Statisti-

an of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of 1931, I find that this report covered the work of the Convention from its origin up to 1931. I have endeavored to bring you an average of the work of the convention from 1931 to 1940.

We have an average of 107 bodies reporting to this Convention and an average delegation of 179. Our records show that we have operated in 22 States in the last ten years. Virginia, North Carolina and the District of Columbia are the largest contributors in finance and attendance.

North Carolina has an average of 55 delegates; annually, Virginia, 3; District of Columbia, 30; Pennsylvania, 11; Maryland, 9; Delaware, 1; New Jersey, 2; Ohio, 1; New York, 3; Michigan, 1; West Virginia, 1; Georgia, 1; South Carolina, 1; Texas, 1; California, 1; Illinois, 1; Kansas, 1; Florida, 1; Connecticut, 1.

In Virginia, North Carolina, and District of Columbia, not one-tenth of the Churches and Organizations are representatives in the Foreign Mission Convention. The 107 bodies contribute annually to the Lott Carey Convention, \$12,403.50.

We have 12 Missionary workers and 5 native evangelists, 59 native workers on the Foreign fields. We have in operation 3 Stations on the Foreign fields.

In our past Session in Columbus, Ohio, our record shows 119 delegates and ----- bodies represented and \$12,742.09 amount of finance for the cause. At Convention, \$4,648.42. During year, \$8,058.67.

It is no easy task to collect information pertaining to the Lott Carey Convention, but I have submitted to you my very best efforts in finding the data that this report contains.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR OF THE LOTT CAREY HERALD

To the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, U. S. A.

Dear Brethren:

I here submit to you an account of the activities of the Editor's office of the Lott Carey Herald for the past year.

I think that I should say at the very outset that life for me during the past twelve months has been rather crowded with a multitude of duties. In addition to being a full time pastor I have had an unusually busy year as President of the Washington Baptist Seminary. Then, too as the official host of the Convention for 1940, my duties have been most strenuous.

I can conscientiously say, however, that notwithstanding much pressing work, I have in no way neglected the editorial work of the Herald. I have studiously followed the March of Events and I have faithfully endeavored to give a true interpretation of the same. Constitution

ARTICLE I.—Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II.—Object.

Section 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the auxiliary shall be a President and one Vice President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as is common to the office they occupy.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

Section 3. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board whose duty it shall be to carry out the purpose and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

Section 2. Any Baptist Church or Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist Church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

Section 3. Visitors may be invited to seats but not to vote.

Section 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

This can be done by love, sacrifice, consecration and untiring vigilance in keeping His banner unfurled; and by heralding the good news of salvation, and glad tidings to all men.

Moments spent in the service of the Lord, reclaiming fallen humanity are more precious in the eyes of the Saviour, than the sparkling

dewdrops of a summer's morn. These moments of service help humanity back to God—back to the Christ-way of life.

We must enrich and adorn by consecration. Christian life and service among men and women, if we would win their attention and respect for the things of the Kingdom which we represent. Our labors of love and sacrifice as missionary workers must impel us to a life of self-abnegation and positive action.

The people who seek God and find Him, who accept his word as truth, are the ones upon whom He depends for service in paving the way for others; for it is they who carry the torch light of truth, which blazes the way through thick darkness, sin, and human debauchery.

These obey His call to come after me, and "I will make you fishers of men."

The Son of God goes forth to war
His kingly crown to gain
His blood red banner streams afar
Who follows in His train?

Perhaps there has never been a time when the need and call for sincere and unselfish workers in the vineyard of the Lord was greater than now. We are the instruments through whom the unfolding of the Divine plan has been committed to save the world.

It is ours to elevate and transform the lives of men and women; and to keep in perpetual motion the flame of gospel truth at work in the world, for the enlightenment of all people.

When we think of the work that is being done in maintaining missionaries on the field; and the good news of the onward march of the gospel through their labors, I have great joy in every reflection on these achievements and victories under God. When I am reminded that we, as co-workers, are a vital and integral part of all that is being done by the Parent Body since we all are workers together with God.

The women of this organization, possessing various characteristics and accomplishments, are truly examples of Christian culture. From your ardent labours and obedience to the great commission, you share a great opportunity among the religious organizations in giving the gospel to the world.

With all that is accomplished, let us not forget that prayer is an essential element in the prosecution of the work of Foreign Missions.

As workers on the home field, we should not forget that our aims and hopes should be inseparably linked with those who go to the battle front; we should exercise daily prayer for the health and com-

fort of those who work unceasingly for the education and the salvation of the heathen.

Prayer is the one unconquerable element in the progress of the Christian religion, and faith, coupled with prayer, can move mountains. This has been recognized among the people through the ages, and we must still pray and trust in our great Redeemer.

If we shall expect power to come into our lives and the church, sufficient to save and extend the Kingdom to all nations, our faith in this connection should be rooted and grounded in God whose word is unfailing; whose love is abounding; and whose promise is secure. "For without faith it is impossible to please Him."

Prayer and faith have awakened hope in a long neglected people, but in response to the word of truth, they have embraced the joy of salvation in accordance with the promise of God. Psalm 2:8, "Ask of me, and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth, for thy possession." 2 Peter 3:9, "The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some men count slackness, but is long-suffering to usward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

The imperative command is that we should go into the vineyard and labor prayerfully and faithfully with the promise that we shall receive reward, for the earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, the world and they that dwell therein. It is the business of the King that has brought you from the various counties, villages and cities, and it is upon Him that we must rely for help and guidance in the motivation of the work of His kingdom. This help is at hand in the person of the Holy Spirit, whom the Master said would guide us into all truths.

You represent the choice of many churches, Sunday schools and organizations; and therefore, much is expected of you, because of the superior opportunities which you have had in the home, Bible school and church life.

I trust that many of you will catch new visions and receive greater inspiration for service in these meetings than ever before. I hope further, that you may carry back to those at the home base, information which you may gather that shall quicken the lives of many and that large results may be seen in every phase of the work.

Seventeen years ago I gave to you a bit of history concerning the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Through the kindness of Dr. G. E. Read, who was Statistician of the Convention at that time, by my request, he forwarded me a minute containing the proceedings of the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention. It reads:

Proceedings of the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention. Alexandria, Va., August 31, 1900.

At 3:00 P. M., the meeting was called to order by Rev. Brown, D. D. He stated that the ladies would take charge of this meeting and organize an auxiliary.

Mrs. T. S. Eaton of Henderson, N. C., was called to the chair as temporary President, and Miss M. A. Webb as temporary Secretary. Mrs. A. E. James led in singing hymn No. 334, and the first Psalm was read by Mrs. P. G. Shephard.

Prayer was offered by Mrs. O. S. Simmons. A committee of five was appointed to nominate officers, viz.: Mrs. P. G. Shepard, North Carolina; Mrs. Ella Gallery, Baltimore, Md.; Miss M. A. Webb, Pennsylvania; Miss Atlanta L. Brown and Mrs. N. Weaver. Mrs. William Scott was asked to speak a word to the ladies. She spoke very impressively of the needs of the work. A paper was read by Miss Mary E. Vernon, of Alexandria, Va., subject—"The Bugle Call." Mrs. O. S. Simms read a paper, and among other things she said, "We as Christian women, have a stand to take. Let us try to obey the commands of Christ."

The Committee on Nomination of Officers submitted the following report:

C., Recording Secretary; Miss M. C. Webb, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Rebecca Callis, Baltimore, Md., Treasurer.

On motion the report was adopted as read.

A paper was read by Mrs. Gallery and a collection of \$5.15 was taken. The Finance Committee reported \$10.60 received.

The following resolutions were adopted: Resolved—That the name of this Convention shall be the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention.

Resolved—That the annual meeting shall be held at the same time and place as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention.

Resolved—That the Constitution of this Convention shall be the same as that of the Foreign Mission Convention.

Resolved—That the officers for the first year shall constitute the Executive Board.

A paper was handed in from Mrs. C. B. Robinson but as our time was all taken up, the paper was not read.

Adjourned with singing and prayer.

REPORT OF TREASURER

Madam President, Members and Friends of the Woman's Auxiliary Lott Carey Baptist F. M. Convention, we are happy to greet you in this, our annual gathering, and to make a financial report of the work.

It seems that progress in Foreign Missions is exceedingly slow and requires great faith and patience. It is difficult, therefore, at the outset to understand properly its true significance, and even more difficult to translate its meaning into terms of practical service.

What is to be done will be found in the more practical consideration of what can be done. The heathen world is large, immeasurably large, and its citadel of darkness is so firmly and deeply set as to render it almost impregnable. Yet, we are trying to do our bit in our day and generation to give them the gospel.

We have, at least, formed a definite policy which we believe will guide us in our endeavors toward a lasting impression upon those areas in foreign fields occupied by our workers. As intimated these areas are small but our policy and plan, we believe, will lead to something permanent and abiding.

Our policy is to establish centers around which we can continue to build, indefinitely, to introduce Christian ideals through the process of education. Our purpose is not only to evangelize adults but also to take native children in infancy and early youth and teach them a knowledge of the Christ, and safeguard them from paganism and heathen practices which surround them. This work is being done. We believe further, that it is the only way in which work among the heathens can have lasting value. We thank you who have so loyally given your support to this great cause.

Proceedings

Mt. Carmel Bapt. Church, Washington, D. C., Aug. 28, 1940
