THE REPORT OF THE NATIONAL BENEFIT BOARD

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept., 1933.

Mr. President and Delegates:

Indeed it is a pleasure for me to be present and present this report. Beside the peculiar joy that it gives one to work for a worth? cause. I believe that it is a blessing to represent a denomination, whose tenets and dogmas are sublime. We represent the practical side of life, nothing sentimental in the endeavors to care for aged ministers and their dependent widows and orphans, and missionaries.

For indeed we get our example from the Book. In Leviticus we reed "Thou shall like care of the Levite as long as thou shall live; for he has no inheritance among his brethran." We cannot say that our people are indifferent to the cause of God as a religious organization, but the difficulty has been, the board has been unable to find a workable plan that it could venture the good faith of the denomination upon. However we think at this (time you will be presented in this report.

Much time has been lost by the filness of the Corresponding Secretary, who was suddenly taken III last July a year ago, and is not fally restored at this time, but is able to perform the duty that is encombered upon his office. There is no greater cause before the people of the earth today, both civic and religious, than the compensation of those who made possible our present degree of success. The contries of the world are providing old age pensions. All of the great industries are not overlooking the men and women who have given their strength and energy to bring success to their institution; they should be remembered and are being remembered by the continuing of the success of the institution which they have served and lined up.

Shall Daptist churches do less for their untiring workers who have given their best manhood days for the prospects of the Baptist Church of this department? They should be financed with a promising hope and a joyful eventide. We will make the contention that other denominations shall in no wise sleep on this great proposition, for they are piling up their buge sums in order to invite young minimisers into their folds.

I am pleased to report that we are making some progress in the cetablishing in the home and we are pleased to help quite a few ministers, both young and old, and we have not neglected our duty of encouraging our ministers of the National Baptist Seminary. We also we much more could be done but we suffer for the lack of funds published the work of this great Board for the future, we recommend the following:

That all ministers that are enrolled will become enrolled upon the books of this Board and after they have served the denomination the period of forty (40) or more years and they have reached the years of dependency that they shall receive an allowance of \$20.00 a quarter for the first years, or \$80.00 per annum.

. And upon their death, their widow and dependent orphans shall receive this amount as long as they are honorable and upright. The above amount shall be flexible in proposition to the overs or unders in the years of service. Orphans under (15) shall be pensioned at the same ratio as the aged fathers.

The church shall be permitted to carry it upon this roll by payment of \$2.50 per quarter. The great God of Heaven will not ten the rein of leaderable over to any people because they are white or black, rich or poor, nor because they are lettered or uniettered

The religion of the future will be the religion of humanity and love; the people that can love most will lead and govern the early for the widening of our capacity for the enduring Spirit of God Let us create a little moral for our present day minister by caring for the faiher whose sun is about to set. The young blood, high metite, oncoming here, who is just buckling on the harness must be encouraged, and by the plan we lay for the present day minister. Your blood seen a hrighter day for our aged minister.

Just sheed for too much of the same spirit is being distributed by other institutions and God's church will not be reduked by secular organizations and not let them show more love to their workers I am plending that each minister enroll his name upon the book of the Board, give the number of years he has served the denomination and whether he has been loyal to the causes of his denomination and the Board will take up the matter with his church or churches, and they will be induced to keep up with the quarterly payment. We must put up a sincere proposition that our churches will hear. The obligation and the quarterly dues will be a sacred fund leid saids for pension alone, and if they are decrepit, we can put them in the home that we have already prepared, and if there are any of our ministers, who have broken down and desire rest, write to the Corresponding Secretary and we will send you a certificate properly sign ed and you will be admitted free of charges, stay until you are fully restored to health. We can help you; it is certainly healthful out there now again. And we clothe our aged and retired ministers who have carried a paller for 5 years and who have heen preaching the geopal for 40 years or more shall he invited to retire at the age of 75, if he so desire (no computation), and when he has so done, he shall be salitled to the following amount, \$15.00 per quarter or \$60.00 per annum. When they have been enrailed upon the hooks for a penalon of 10 years.

his pension shall be \$20.00 per quarter or eighty (\$80.00) dollars per annum, and if they are leaving ,widowe they shall receive one half of the designated appount as in class U. and B.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SEMINARY REORGANIZATION:

Appointed and given authority by the Convention to carry out the provisions of a certain RESOLUTION, adopted September 8, 1922, at the Nashville meeting, directing that application he made to the Tennessee Legislature for the passage of a Special Act, enabling the reorganization of the Nat. Bapt. Theological Seminary and Training Corporation, so as to give to the Convention full nower in the election and control of the Trustee Board, holding the management of the property of the corporation, desires to make the following re-

The Committee was organized with David E. Over as chairman, who was directed to immediately negotiate an agreement with the Trustee Board of the Seminary to transfer all properly boldings of the present Corporation to the proposed new Corporation when such Corporation had been fully provided for and organized; and then to proceed with the matter of the initiation of the "Special Act" so as to provide the legal means for the reorganization, in which service Mr John B. Keeble was to be retained at the fee of \$1000.00, which service was to also include the legal work of reorganization and transfer.

The chairman secured the following agreement from the Board of Trustees, signed by each of its members:

We, the surviving members of the Corporation known as The National Baptist Theological and Training Seminary, in consideration of the facts set out in the resolution adopted this day by the National Baptist Convention, and the perfection of the plans therein outlined, hereby blod ourselves to con-

ver to the corporation contemplated in said resolution, the property of the Seminary of which we are the corporate members, and to surrender the old charter at the proper time; and we blad ourselves to the Convention, pending this arrangement, to hold said property and administer the same as truetees for the National Baptist Convention.

At the close of the Convention the chairmen took up with Mr. John 3. Keeble of Nashville, the legal steps necessary for the accomplishnest of the aims of the Convention as contemplated in the said resolution and secured with him the following agreement:

- (I) To prepare a competent Act, present it and follow it through the Legislature to its final passage.
- (2) To prepare a charter for the organization of the new corporation, and the proper corporate minutes for the adoption of the charter by the new corporation.
- (3) To organize the new corporation, and prepare all necessary minutes for the old corporation for the transfer of the property of the old corporation.
- (4) To execute all deeds and transfers to the new corporation.
- (5) The fee for this legal service to be \$1000.00.

This agreement was concluded on the 12th of September, but the chairman, unxious to incur no unnecessary expense, wrote from Denver, September 15th:

Bear Sir:

It is my purpose to return to Nashville in a few weeks, at a time convenient to you, but before so doing, I shall be pleased to receive a letter from you, giving your opinion as to whether this matter could not be satisfactorily adjusted under the special "Act of 1915," to which you referred as we were leavlog your office.

This law was much discussed in the Convention and it is be belief of many that it is wholly adequate. If upon examination such should prove to be the case, it would possibly ears the expense of another trip to your city and also materially reduce the cost of the entire transaction.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of September 15th, I find on my deak on my return to the city.

I had not overlooked the "Act of 1915." In my judgment, it is subject to the same criticism that the Act of 1897 is subject to in reference to churches and denominations. I reached the conclusion long ago, that there was just one question about that, as there was in regard to the charter of the publishing boards.

I know of no other way to solve the problem without controversy, than the one I outlined,

The first meeting of your compilitee, during the meeting of the Convention, was held with the chairman and a number of the members of the Educational Board, and it was agreed that the Board would finance the legal expenses incurred by the committee. Acting upon this agreement, the chairman on a subsequent trip to Nash ville, in conference with Mr. Keeble, worked out the final procedure by which the whole matter abould be consummated. After his return to Denver, under date of October 2nd, Mr. Keeble wrote as follows:

Deer Sir

Referring to our conversation in reference to my being epployed to procure the passage of an Act of the Legislature to the proper incorporation of a Theological Seminary under the

expices and control of The National Baptist Convention: In order that there may be no misunderstanding in case anything should happen to either of us, I thought it best to write

you a letter.

I proposed, and as I understood you accepted, the proposition that I should undertake to prepare an Act and follow it through the Legislature which meets here in January, providing for the incorporation of such an institution, upon the condition that it should be under the control, as far as the election of trustees and members of the corporation was concerned, of the National Baptist Convention. A charter is to be prepared for the organization of the new corporation under this Act, and proper corporate minutes for the adoption of the charter by the new corporation and the organization of the new corporation, and all necessary minutes for the old corporation for the transfer of the property of the old corporation to the new corporation, and when this is done, the deeds are to be executed and the property transferred to the new corporation. For this work I was to be paid \$1,000.00. If for any reason the entire program is not carried out, then I shall be paid a reasonable fee for such work as I have done in the premises.

The chairman replied to the above letter, under date of November 3rd, as follows:

Mr. John B. Keeble,

Keeble and Seay,

Nashville, Tenn.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of a few days ago reached me and I am answering to say that you are quite correct in your understanding that it is the intent of the Committee to have you proceed with the matter of seeking to have the enactment passed as advised.

It is also our understanding that you will also render all other legal services necessary to the organization of the new corporation and the transfer from the old when the statute will permit you to take such a course. The fee of \$1,000.00 to cover the entire service.

I neglected, however, to get a clear understanding as to what part, if any, you will desire that we pay in advance. It you will kindly inform me on this item, I shall be greatly obliged

and will endeavor to be ready to favor you with a check by December first.

Hoping to bear from you by return and thanking you to your disposition to serve our Convention in this matter, I am Respectfully,

Mr. Keeble's reply informed the chairman that a remittance of \$500.00 would be sufficient. A few days later he received word from the chairman of the Educational Board, letters dated November 3th and 20th, that owing to trouble in raising a mortgage for the seninary properly it would not be possible for the Board to assist the committee till some time later.

There was left to the committee only one recourse, and that, to attempt to raise at least the \$500.00 payment by direct appeal to the brethren. As a consequence the chairman sent out several handred letters directing them to the men who appeared the most greatly interested. The result was a rather generous aggregation of splendid promises, but the net cash results were less than \$100.00. The first of December had passed and the Legislature met early in January Judge Keeble had informed that it was wisdom to offer the bill in the early days of the session. A number of the brethren had made promises which indicated they would be able to assist after the boll days, the President of the Convention having written the request that all monies available be sent to Dr. Harding to be paid directly on the bonus for the school loan. On January 23rd, the chairman informed Mr. Keeble that the difficulties incident to securing the loan and saving the property had made it most difficult to seture funds for the committee's work and expressed the fear that the time had passed in which to offer the bill to the Legislature.

On January 26th, Mr. Keeble wrote as follows:

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 23rd arrived. It is not too late to do what we had discussed.

If you will agree to be responsible for the fee and see that it is raised, I will prepare the bill and present it to the legilature. You can wire me on receipt of this letter what you wish me to do.

The chairman wired Mr. Keeble to proceed; and on April 4th the following letter was received:

Dear Sir:

The Legislature passed the bill authorizing the incorporation of your seminary so as to preserve the rights of your Convention, and I am prepared, at any time you desire me to do it, to take up the question of the reorganization and transfer of the property.

I livet you are meeting success in raising the fee we have arreed upon.

At the meeting of the Executive Board, in conjunction with the Sunday School Congress at Indianapolis, it developed that the total amount necessary to save the property from foreclosure had not been raised, and the Educational Board, consequently, was not yet in position to assist the committee Suancially. The 26th of June the chairman wrote Mr. Keeble as follows:

My Dear Mr. Keeble:

You may be assured that it has taken considerable courage for me to persuade myself to write you just now. And the reason for my hesitation need not be explained to you—I have simply failed to keep with you my promise.

While I do not desire to unload the blame on any other man, the simple fact is that by some mistortune or mishandling of shalls the property of the seminary was saved from foreclosare with extreme difficulty, by the united effort of those who were willing, at our meeting just closed in Indianapolis a few dava ago.

However, we are now assured that the crisis has been page ed, and now the way should be opened for me to get a little money. I am not unmindful of the fact that I have made my self responsible for this obligation and I shall bear it until the money is gotten. I believe that between this and our meeting in Fort Worth in September the most of it will be forthcoming.

In answer, dated June 29th, the following was received:

Your letter of the 25th inst., received. I appreciate the sitestion you are in, and will accept \$400.00 in full payment for the services I have rendered to date. In case I have to do any thing further in the matter. I think we ought to discuss the question of additional compensation—that is, if I am ever called on to reorganize the corporation. But we will agree apon that.

This, of course, is accepted upon the basis of prompt payment Yours truly.

The chairman has had no information from the President as to whether this amount has been paid. He went as for as he has good in the matter under the explicit understanding that the committee was given by the Convention full authority to act. It is boped that the committee was not mistaken in its conclusion that the matter was in its hands entirely until the whole was reported at this meeting.

In conclusion the Committee has two recommendations to make. in the persuasion that the Convention is of the same mind relative to placing the Seminary under its control by the power to elect from time to time the Board of Trustees or management.

(1) That this meeting make provision for taking care of whatever functed obligations the Convention is under to Mr. Keeble.

(2) That your committee he instructed to direct Mr. Keeble to proceed with necessary steps in carrying out the reorganization and

(3) That a Board of Trustees, chosen by the Educational Board, and ratified by the Convention, he chosen at this meeting, pending the proposed reorganization under the new statute.

The long controversy concerning the ownership and management of the Seminary will then have been closed.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Brother President, Fellow Officers, Worthy Messengers, Distinguished Visitors, Ladies and Gentlemen:

In humble obcdience to the evident will of this grand body as expressed in your vote at our last session, it is with pardonable pride. and becoming felicity, that I come at this time, to render to you an accounting for the trust reposed in merat your hands. The seriousness of the hour is superinduced to my mind, by the comparison outstanding in the retrospective, introspective and prospective contemplations which engage my soul at this moment. In the former, I reflect with sincere regrets and negation, upon our most excellent beginning as a convention. I can see now fading like the crimson lines of the horizon under the touch of Somnus the goddess of slumber, dear old New Salem in Chicago throwing wide her doors to recalve the servants of the King who dared to strike the shackles of

occlesiastical servitude from the denomination in which the Christ fived, suffered and died. I can see too, that staiwart giant and bis bearted pastor, Dr. Haywood, whom to know was to love, throwing the strength of his mammoth influence on the side of those who believe that the hour had struck when Baptists of color, should demostrate to the world that the Negro race is not a liability on the shoulders of other races in America. I can see the sainted John Thomas lining up with our Convention and lending it the strength of his mannal mous personality and nation-wide influence, and swearing by all that is good and true, to stand by this Convention to the last dick.

I can see also, the nefarious activities of those who had aimed the javelins of hell liself at the breast of the grandest Roman among us in the person of the lamented Dr. R. H. Boyd. I can see him moving quietly among us with tear dimmed eyes, conselling us to be ustient and pray. I can see too, the very uniforms and maces of that gang of policemen, whom the enemy of the kingdom had influenced to come into the Convention for the express purpose of thwarling the will of the majority. I can see lastly of the retrospect, but not least by any means, our own Dr. Edward P. Now to the prospect. Brethren, there remains the much land to be possessed if we would maintain the diguity of a real convention. We have not lived up to our God-given opportunities. The spirit of the Christ has not been as evident as the cause demands at all times. We began under most favorable, pay, fattering auspices. We had the lion's share of the great Baptist family. We have started brilliantly. Our great Publishing Plant and Educational Nester stand over there in Nashville as living monuments to the gesius of our leadership. But brethren, gainsay it as you please, our grand old ship is in a very bad way. We seem to have lost both that: and compass insolar as management is concerned. Breibren, we bave no program. At least no tangible one. We seem to be irest ing ourselves to the merciless waves of an uncharted sea. It is time

to take soundings. It is time to megaphone for help from above. Our Convention should return to its moorings and get a little morof Christ and less of self into its machinery. We are now being looked upon as a set of scheming selfish politicians, whose only ambition is to perpetuate ourselves AND OUR FRIENDS IN OFFICE. No self respecting, Christian minister can afford to be classed thusly. God's men wants a clear conscience. He must cast his activities in the mold of the spirit. He must be sincere in his dealings both with God and man. I must therefore, after thanking you one and all for the evident confidence which you have manifested in me, which confidence you have made quite obvious in the repeated honors which you have laviahed upon me, respectfully ask to be relieved of further official connection with our Convention. This position does not either presuppose or intimate that I have the slightest intention of deserting the ship. Indeed I shall die loyal to the proud tenets which ighere within this group. But I feel that I owe It to my conscience to sound this alarm, and since I have reason for believing that the conditions to which I have called attention will not be remedied by present methods of procedure, and since I am absolutely powerless to remedy them myself, I incline to the opinion that since I cannot render my very best service to the denomination under the conditions here complained of, I should not burden my brethren who have continued to honor me, by rendering service in a slipshod way. For illustration. Let us look around for a moment. Where is Dr. Bolden of Norfolk? Dr. Brooks of New Orleans? Dr. Austin of Pittsburgh? Dr. Collina of Houma? Dr. Harper of Youngstown? Where are hundreds of strong men who quice sat in the counsels of this body? Gune, gone, gone. Not to the other side, but gone from us. Now since there is no effect which is not traceable to some assoclate cause, this Convention should find the cause and remedy it. I believe with all my heart, that the cause lies at the door of those who have been placed in the lead. I dare not charge it all to any one man. But it is chargeable to the leadership of the Convention. We are living in an age of thinkers. Men will no longer tax their congregations for the purpose of being financed for an annual trip in the name of the National Baptist Convention. As we grow older, we get further and further from rabble procedure in the name of a Convention. Men who have succeeded in their own personal affairs singlebanded and alone, will not longer support a Convention which causet faise sufficient finance to meet its obligations. Our Convention has no intelligent conception of either its assets or liabilities. Our Executive Board is a monstrous misnomer. Our finance is handled in such an unbusiness-like manner as to bring down the

condemnation of our laymen upon the head of every paster among os. To be frank, we need some changes. Let's have them, I ap ceady to strike the blow for freedom and progress. We need now, a set of trained Haptist leaders trusted and true, who because of their records in the states from which they hall, can compand the confidence and respect of our constituency. Baptist statemen are the need of the hour. We have passed the day of big speeches and fruitless activities. In closing my brechren, I desire to remind yet that you only paid me \$25 on a \$100 debt year before last, and \$50 last year. You are therefore indebted to me in the sum of \$75 for year before last, \$50 for last year and \$100 for this year, making a total of \$225 to date. I desire to donate the \$25 and the \$75 to the Educational Board, and ask you to pay to me, the \$100 due for the year. I therefore ask that this body so direct its Executive Board. Trueting that you my brethren, will accept this report in the same kindly spirit in which I have submitted it, and pledging you under God, to stand by the Convention to the last day of my life, and as curing you that I have only offered my resignation or declined to be a candidate for office unless some changes are made, I beg that you ever regard me as the faithful servant of the Convention and its Gol.

The Functionings of my Office for the Year

The largest activities of your Corresponding Secretary have been to plant the grand old flag of our Convention on the remperts of the enemy throughout the country. This we have accomplished in a splendid manner.

For instance, when i first went north as a pastor, the unincorporated Convention constituted an occasion for laughter and ridicals wherever mentioned. Not because the populis were our enemies, but because the territory had not been cultivated by our methods of operation. It is quite different today. Last year we only brought love persons from Pennsylvania, this year we hring 27

Our Convention has appealed to such learned men as Dra Placo and Adams, the "Keystone" state, and I delight to honor them both, and to number them among our aplended delegation and my book friends.

We had only three persons at our Congress last year, we had twenty five this year. Only two churches used our literature two years ago, 17 use it now. We were afraid to even speak of our leaders there two years ago. Henry Allen has been to Pitteburgh as guest of the City Ministers' Conference, and Indeed they made a two over him. Even inviting him to return this fall.

We had only one pastor in and around Pittsburgh two years ago,
we have eleven today. We were referred to as "the Rump Conmation" by years ago
Gantestion today. Indeed things have changed.

We worshipped in a dilapidated ball away from the body of Colored People two years ago, and had a membership too small to give us 11.01 as salary. We own the best church campus of any Negro congression to the city of Pittsburgh, and preach to a large and results following in our own all steel house of worship.

Retiring Corresponding Secretary

Mr. President and Brethren of the National Baptist Convention;

One year ago I was elected to represent this body in the World's Bapilat Alliance at Stockbolm, Sweden, beginning July 21-27, 1923. According to your wishes we took our journey June 30th, 1923. Arriving in New York on or about the 25th of June, we salled according to program, arriving in Southhampton time enough to reach Stockbolm on the day appointed for the opening of the World's Baptlat Alliance, July 21st.

Our stay to the city of Stockholm was the most pleasant of our lives. The World's Baptist Alliance gave us the first Insight of the day of Pentecoat. The fact that we found fity or more countries represented with their Christian activities, speaking thirty-two difficult tongues; etrange to say that we understood when these tongues were speaking; they were talking of the kingdom of Jesus Christ. Some of them gave evidence of heing paraecuted for the word of God such the testimony which they gave and believed Some of theme brethren were just out of prison. It could be seen that they had

been in prison for many days because they were work, three and just out long enough to attend this meeting. Money was taken to defray expenses to their homes.

The Lott Carey Convention promised to begin missionary work among the Roumenians. There are atill other fields where the Catholics are planting their Priest-ridden doctrine in the hearts of the people.

The Colored Baptists of America should hurry to give the doctins to these people of the earth. I must confess that there were obtations, and the Executive Board was notified not to allow any colored organizations to be represented unless they came with credentials from Dr. L. K. Williams. I found no communication had passed between this Convention and the World's Baptist Alliance and when I received the credentials from the President of this Convention the Alliance was in session, and I was on the floor of the Alliance when the letter came. I had already entered and paid the representation fee for this Convention and had my badge on when Drs. Carter and Hall arrived. There was some besitancy, but I was informed by the Secretary that our name would go in the reord. However, I know we three were received as messengers and were given the courtesles of the meeting.

it would be well for us to interest this Convention in that phase of work—the Alliance is the Lookout Mountain of Christian activities throughout the Baptist World. We therefore, would do well to keep our eyes open upon the enemies of our work. I saw a spirit anchristian enacted in the Executive Committee, Our President and Secretary of this Convention should begin immediately to correspond with Secretary Shakespeare in London, England, of the World's Baptist Alliance, get the literature which will place them in position to keep apace with the Baptist world. This is just as accessary as for us to operate our National Convention and other Christian activities.

In the hall of fame was found pictures of many schools, churches, missions—home and foreign. It would take several rays to pass and see all the work being done by Baptists throughout the world, especially, missions and schools. The people of Stockholm raceived us with open arms. Every hotel was open to the measures—white and colored—no discrimination. It was the only meeting I have visited of mixed races where you could see we were all one is Christ Jesus.

The colored messengers were especially favored in that they were given prominent places in both hotels and homes. Many of the

leaders extended us invitations to visit their country, preach the gospel and sing. They were warm in the extending of these invitations to us

I here state I am the Recording Secretary of the National Convention of the Euroliment Committee, appointed by E. P. Jones on Wednesday, September 5, 1923.

Thursday night, Sept. 6, the Convention by motion ordered that I turn over the roll to the Convention Secretary, Dr. C. P. Madison, and I attempted to obey the order of the Convention when a controversy came up over the procedure, with some contending that it should not be turned over, others that it should. Whereupon, Secretary Madison said that we will go in the room and settle this about. When we entered the Enrollment Committee room, other members of the Committee followed, namely: Rev. E. D. Evans, Ark.; Rev. G. A. Long and others who were not members of the Committee, among whom were Dr. W. M. Johnson and others. Secretary C. P. Madison and I agreed that we would copy the roll so each of us night have a copy of the same. Upon this agreement, others stated they would remain to see that it was correctly made. Secretary Madison thereupon said that he had been elected by the Conven-

tion and did not need any bosses to stand over him, and walked out of the Committee room, leaving the report in my hand. Almost findediately Rev. G. A. Long, Little Rock, Ark., came over, snatched the roll from me on the table. Though I protested and asked for a return of the roll, Dr. Long refused to do so and went out of the Committee room with the roll still in his possession to the best of my knowledge.

In submitting this report we beg leave to call your attention to the statement to the Convention when in seasion Friday afternoon by the Rev. Lovelace of Little Rock, Ark., whose attendent to the Committee could not be had because he was called home. But to refresh your memory we report his words to it: "I was standing on the outside of the church, Thursday night, about eleven o'clock when I saw someone's hand out the window and a small roll of paper dropped down beside me. Three women, one of whom was dressed in black, stooped, picked up the roll of paper and placed it under har chothing in such a way that it could not be seen. Within the next

few minutes I saw my friend and brother, Rev. G. A. Long, come out the side door, rush to these women and asked one in black for the roll. He placed the same in a band bag and went down the street I, at this time, did not know nor suspect this to be the Cottention roll for I had no knowledge that the same had been lost. We, your Committee, having written Dr. Lovelace, ask that his reply he made a part of this Committee's report when forwarded

to our Convention Secretary within the next few days
We, also, wish to call the Convention's attention to the acknowledgement on the part of Dr. G. W. Alexander of Chicago, Ill., before the Convention that he was responsible and not Dr. G. A. Long

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION

To the President, Officers and Members of the National Bapilet Convention:

In the life of each and every one of us, there comes a moment, who the time, the place and the occasion form such a homogeneous conjuncture, that a flood of emotions bursts in upon our sools, mering us to such ecstatic joys and rapturous pleasures, that in the moment of our exhibitation, we are wont to exclaim, as did the disciples on the Mount of Transfiguration, "It is good for us to be here."

Such is the feeling that overwhelms me at this moment, while standing here between the sacred walls of this magnificent structure, dedicated to the honor and glory of him who hung upon the cross, that you and I might have a right to the tree of life.

As I look out upon your faces, I recognize some among you who have come from the far west where the placid waters of the Pacific play hide and water through the Golden Gates of Cattornia; again I see some among you who have made your way from the atteme east, even from the State where Crispus Attacks, dusky son of Ham, poured out upon the streets of Hoston, the first blood that was of tered upon the altar of American liberty. From the Canadian boders on the north and from the evergiades on the south, you are here to do business for our King and race.

I thank God, that although I was put into the harness near the close of the fiscal year, I am permitted to come before you today accounting for my atewardship as Secretary of the Educational Board of our great National Haptist Convention.

In attempting to perform the duties of this office, I am not unmindful of the fact that I am making a feeble effort to "Carry On" the with so nobly begun by the late C. J. W. Boyd, whose mame will and must forever be synonymous with the development of the educational work of our National Baptist Convention, which stands out as the most self-reliant, the most solvent, and the most powerful organization of Negro Baptists on the face of the earth.

It is just a few short years ago, while looking for some one to be associated with Dr G. L. Prince, who heads our Educational Hoard, that the eyes of Negro Baptists fell upon a young man, tall in stature, cleasing in personality, protound in thought, convincing in argument and because of his proven veracity, loved and honored by his brether. By reason of his unawerving loyalty to the principles of our-convention he was made the standard hearer of its Educational Resaid.

As he ascended the hill of opportunity, his eyes swept over a vast valley, whose surface was attewn with the dried honce of thirty odd years of disappointments over which filtted the translucent spirit of a dying hope which ever and mann lifted its head only to sink again amid the ratifling bones of lost confidence, shattered faith, and broites promises. Suddenly, out from the mysterious somewhere came a still small voice saying, "Boyd, can these dry bones live again?" and the man answered, "Lord, God Thou knoweth." And as the spirit of altruism began to flood his soul, he went rushing hither and thither like a mighty wind through the valley, transfusing faith, reviving hope, kindling ambition, atimulating self rellance, and awakening enthusiasm in the hearts and minds of his brethren, until a noise was heard--mighty and far reaching-like unto the rattling of bones coming unto bone and sinew unto sinew, as renewed confidence came unto the hearts of Negro Baptists, who, arousing themselves from their somnambulistic spell, rubbed the mist of doubt from their eyes, looked toward the bills of Tennessee and there on the banks of the peaceful Cumberland river, beheld standing in all its majestic giory, a real Theological and Training Seminary, whose voice can be heard throughout all Christendom saying "He, all ye that hunger and thirst for knowledge! Come hither and drink deeply of the Pycrian Spring which has here been opened in answer to the prayers of the fathers who, growing tired of waiting and waiching for the advent of this Institution, have long since folded their tents and quirtly marched away to join their sires in the land of eternal

Then sins! Just us it seemed that our work was about to be crowned with success, the icy hand of death fell suddenly upon the

ehoulders of the lamented C. J. W. Boyd, who, answering the final summons, laid down his burden and waded across the Jordan to join his loved ones awaiting him "On the other shore."

In his lifetime, I am happy to say that he adhered to the things he believed conducive to the best interests of the people and stood unequivocably for the principles that form the bone and sinew of our great National Baptist Convention. It was not while moving bact and forth like a shuttle-cock across the country; it was not while sitting through the long midnight hours, pendering, dreaming and planning how best to lay the burden of Christian education open the hearts of his brethren; nor was it white upon the foor of the Convention, forensically engaged in an effort to win the hearts of his co-laborers to his way of thinking that his character so fully revealed itself, but it was in that dread hour, as he gazed out and new these wening shades begin to appear, then, turning to Dr. Prince, in a parting breath he said. "Tell the boys to carry the work on."

I am reminded of the fact that General Wolf, when he lay tying on the plains of Abraham, said "I die in peace because the English army has won"; General Montcalm said "I die happy, because I shall not live to see the surrender of Quebec"; Captain Lawrence, when mortally wounded on his boat, the Chesapeake, said "Boya, don't give up the ship." But these words, noble though they be, fall into insignificance, when compared to the dying words of C. J. W. Boyd-Soldier of the cross, follower of the lamb, whose last message is bis brethren was: "Tell the boys to carry the work ou." That my brethren, was a challenge hurled to you and to me from the lips of a dying man. Are we equal to the emergency? Are we capable of carrying on this work of Christian Education? These, my friends, are questions for you and me to answer.

Yonder in Nashville stands the National Theological and Training Seminary, for which a generation of Negro Baptists have keed, longed and prayed, but they died ere they had realized their earnest hopes and fondest dreams.

For the past six years we have been going about the country, boasting of our great Seminary, but the fact remains, that very little has been done to reduce to any appreciable degree, the amount that was due on this property when Dr. C. J. W. Hoyd was laid in his grave. I ask, is this carrying the work on?

Those beautiful buildings younder in Nashville, are rapidly deterforating in value, simply because of lack of funds with which to make the needed repairs. The foundations are being undermined, because we have not the funds with which to put in the necessary drainage. The inside walls are crumbling because of lack of those with which to calcimine; our creditors are constantly dunning our intelligences, simply because we have failed to put into their hands the money with which to meet our numerous and very pressing chilesions.

Pour years ago, you voted to throw open the doors of that Institation. There are those among you who have visited that school and beheld with your own eyes, a student body made up of boys and girls, men and women, who came from litinois, Florida, Mississippi lows, Missouri, Texas, Alabama and other states. Looking over this assembly today, I see men among you who have had your divinity degree conferred upon you by that Institution. But what of that school today? Alas for us! After three years we were forced to close its doors, simply because we could not pay teachers and satisfr creditors at the same time. Our case was very much like that of the parrow gauged engine that carried a big mogul whistle. The boller on this little engine was so tiny that it could not furnish enough steam to run the engine and blow the whietle at the same line. The result was that when this locomotive was pulling a heavy train, if the engineer desired to blow the whistle, he would have to stop the engine because the boiler could not furnish steam enough for running the engine and blowing the whistle at the same time. That was exactly the fix your board found itself in with regards to our school. We desired to keep the doors of that school open, but we had not the means with which to pay creditors and teachers at the same time. Hence the school was rejuctantly closed and what is worse it must remain closed until we can prove ourselves capable of furnishing steam to blow the whistle and run the engine at the

But my brethren, while this is a fact, it ought to make every self respecting Baptist bang his head in shame. Think of it! Four million Negro Baptists in America! Conservatively estimated, at least one million and five bundred thousand of these are affiliated with the unincorporated Convention of America. If these constituents would contribute only ten cents per capita, it would mean an annual income of a hundred and fifty thousand dollars for our Educational Board. With this amount we would not only be able to employ the very hest teachers and secure the best possible equipment for our Seminary, but we would be able to give substantial assistance to the numerous schools being run by our denomination in the various States in the Union.

Year after year, a tew brethren, who really have the work of Christian education resting heavily upon their hearts, come to this Convention and lay down their hundred, fifty, twenty-five, their ten, or

their five deliars for the benefit of our school. This shows to what extent they are interested in this work. But such sacrifices, though they may and do give temporary relief, cant... se expected to tunish sufficient means to liquidate the debt now pending equinat that institution.

Four million Negro Baptists in America, with twenty thousand ordefined ministers, twenty-four thousand churches and about twenty thousand Sunday schools, and still we have been more than in years trying to pay off the insignificant sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

Brothren, with this vast throng of constituents, we should easily be one of the strongest denominations, financially upon the face of the earth; and it is nothing short of criminality on our part, if we tall to utilize the resources at our command.

When we note the lethersetic manner in which Baptists of the antire country respond to the appeals for means to support our Seminary, we are forced to conclude that the pastors generally, have not laid this matter fully upon the bearts of their people.

Enlightenment precedes enlistment. If then, our people have not been enlisted in the work of education, it is only due to the fact that they have not been properly enlightened. And, it the people have not here enlightened, it is no fault of theirs, but it is the fault of those of us who have the information at hand and fail to impart it to our constituents.

My brethren, it behooves us to awake from our lethargetic and inexcussible indifference, to so saturate our four million constituent with a fundamental knowledge of the absolute necessity of Negro ownership and control of Negro institutions that they will gladly give of their means for the proper maintenance of the schools now being operated by our denomination throughout the country.

It is not very much to our credit that in this day and time, when our face is operating insurance companies with more than two miltion dollars worth of assetts; owning seventy-two banks, doing a hundred million dollars worth of business annually, and yet, practically all of our schools for higher education are owned and controlled by corporations from which our racial group is entirely excluded.

There are about one hundred and twenty-four schools being operated for the benefit of Negro Raptists. These achools have a valuation of about six million, five hundred and fifty-three thousand dollars, including their endowment funds. Fifteen of these achools are owned by one northern corporation and are valued at about three million dollars, according to the Negro year book.

The estimated wealth of the ten million Negroes of America !!

one billion, ave hundred million dollars. Negro Baptiste constitute to per cent of America's black population. At this ratio, Negro Baptiste own about 40 per cent or all hundred million dollars of the Americao Negro's wesith. Of this vast amount we have invested forty million dollars in Negro Baptist Church property and about three and a half millions in school property.

A very vital question here is, "Can three million dollars invested in sducational plants, furnish sufficient brain power to stabilize the forty million invested in religious institutions?"

Northern Baptists, with upwards of a million and five hundred housand constituents, have invested a hundred and twenty million dollars in church property and a hundred and fourteen million dollars in achools. Southern Baptists have invested about ninety-five million in church property and thirty-eight million in schools, but Nagro Baptists with four million constituents have invested forty million in churches and about four million in schools. In other words, when northern Baptists spend one dollar for churches, they spend ninety-five cents for schools; when southern Baptists spend a dollar for a church, they spend only dollar for a church, they spend one dollar for a church, they spend only dollar for a church they spend for the form they spend for they spend for they spend for the form they spend f

These figures, my brethren, apeak for themselves. And, (am sure that you will agree with me, that it does not require the vision of a prophet to see the impending doom that awalts us unless we take renewed interest in the educational work of our denomina-

As we go down from this place to begin the work of a new flacal year, may we not start out with a determination to go up to the next place of meeting, showing to the world that we are determined to make a new record for Negro Baptists in the way of supporting our Educational Institutions?

I now hand to you a brief statement showing the money raised and spent through my office from June 15, to the present time.
