

### CONSTITUTION

### THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America and the National Baptist Convention of America, do unite ourselves together for the purpose of doing Missionary, Educational and all Religious Work among ourselves, and throughout the world, therefore we adopt this Constitution.

### ARTICLE L-Nume

This Body shall be known and styled, "The National Baptist Convention of America."

### ARTICLE II.-Membership

SECTION I.—The membership shall be Annual, Orthodox Baptist Churches. District and General Association and State Conventions. If there he a group of churches within a State which has no General Association; or State Conventions connected with this Convention, this group of representatives from these churches shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that

SECTION II.—Any individual in good and regular standing with a Baptist Church may become a member with full privileges by paying the sum of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

SECTION III.—Each church shall pay Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollers for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Tea (\$10.00) Dollers for each additional messenger.

SECTION IV.—Each District Association shall pay Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION V.—Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to five messengers and Ten (10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

### ARTICLE III.-Use of Finance

All finance received by the Convention shall be placed into the treasury for its expenses and appropriations, provided that designated money shall be paid as so designated.

### ARTICLE IV .- Officers

The Officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President. Recording Secretary, First, Second. Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries, Corresponding Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, General Auditor, and Historian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association cooperating with this Body shall be Associate Vice President.

### ARTICLE V .- Duty of Officers

SECTION 1-The President:

He shall be the Presiding Officer; sign all Calls for regular or special meetings: sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body. He may make any visit that will be profitable to the Convention. He is the Chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION II -First Vice President:

At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon him.

SECTION III -Second Vice President:

He shall perform the duties that are carried on by the President and First Vice President when necessity demands.

SECTION IV - The Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session, compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are countersigned by the President, and make a report to this Body annually.

SECTION V.-The First Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annual meetings and to do whatever the Body may require through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VI.-The Second Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VII.-The Third Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention. He shall report to the Convention as required by the Convention, and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary

SECTION VIII.-The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record all the work of the Committee on Accounts and Business, and do whatever the Body requires through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION IX.—The Corresponding Secretary:

This Secretary shall do all the corresponding of the Convention and Executive Board as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make his report annually to the Convention.

SECTION X -The Statistical Secretary:

This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and report same annually preparing it for distribution.

SECTION XI.-Treasurer:

He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention. He shall keep his records so as to preserve them perpetually for reference, and report anawally all receipts and disbursements.

SECTION XII.—General Auditor:

He shall receive and audit all reports of the Board as audited. also the report of the Treasurer of the Convention, each given to him thirty days prior to the annual sitting of the Convention.

SECTION XIII - Reporter:

He shall give publicity to all the doings of the Convention necessary to be published.

SECTION XIV.-Historian

He shall act for all Boards and shall keep a correct Mistory of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference.

### ARTICLE VI.-Boneda

SECTION 1.-This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Educational, Publishing, Evangelical Benevalent, B. Y. P. U.

SECTION II.-Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, elected by the said State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, said election shall be annually.

SECTION III.-Officers:

The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION IV -Duty of officers:

The Chairman of Board shall preside at all Board Meetings The Recording Secretary of each Board shall keep a true record

of the doings of the Board.

The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Tressurer of each Board and shall do all the corresponding of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION V .-- Management:

The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and three other members of the Board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each Board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does at recess or during the meeting of the Convention.

SECTION VI.—Reports of Boards:

Each Board shall make its report annually.

SECTION VII.-Duties of Boards:

The Home Mission Board shall have charge of all the Home Mission and Church Extension work done by the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall have charge of all Foreign Mission work.

The Educational Board shall have charge of all the educational work in the Convention.

The Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publication and publishing work of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall have charge of all the evangelical

work done by the Convention.

The Benevolent Board shall have charge of all the business pertaining to the rellef of aged ministers and members of the Conven-

The B Y. P U. Board shall carry out the work of the B. Y. P U. of the Convention

### ARTICLE VII -Auxiliaries

SECTION I.—There shall be a National Brotherhood Convention a Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, and a Junior National Baptist Convention. Youth National Baptist Convention, all of which shall be subject to the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION II.—All monies collected at the Annual Session of this Convention by all Auxiliaries, shall be reported and turned over to the Parent Body, along with their bills and expenses, to be voted out by the Parent Body before any disbursements of said auxiliaries shall take place at the Convention.

### ARTICLE VIII.—Reilroad Commission

This Commission shall consist of five members, elected annually by the Convention it shall have charge of all transportation, transit, and travel, and work harmoniously with the several States, as will best soit the interest of the Convention, and report annually to the Convention.

### ARTICLE IX.—Special Committees

There shall be three business committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the Convention. The regular Committee shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the Convention. The second Committee shall receive and investigate all bits, accounts and recommend the amount of all causes, and after being approved by the President, it shall bring the same to the General Body for adoption before execution. The third Committee shall investigate, if required, all applying for membership into the Convention that the Constitution requirements may not be violated. There shall be a Standing Committee on Orthodoxy and one of Social and Economic Welfare.

### ARTICLE X .- Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of all the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of each Board. It shall hold its meetings as the President sees it. It is the Board of Management.

### ARTICLE XI.-Annual Meetings

This Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday night. The place shall be selected by the Convention in session. The Executive Board shall have power to change the time and place when the necessity demands, informing the Convention of the same.

### ARTICLE XII,-Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Convention.

### ARTICLE XIL-Sularies

The Salaries of officers shall be as follows: President \$500,00 First Vice President, \$150.00; Second Vice President, \$125.00; Secretary \$250.00; First Assistant \$75.00. Second Assistant \$50.00; Fourth Assistant \$50.00; Corresponding \$75.00; Treasurer, \$275.00

## Dr. G. L. Prince Delivered Inspired Address Sept. 6

"To the National Baptist Convention of America: It is by the grace of God we have the opportunity to meet again in another annual meeting. We should lift up our voices in praise and thanksgiving to Him for all that He bath done for us.

We meet at a time of great world confusion and distress, when the minds of men are troubled. No man can tell what the future holds for the world. Fear and uncertainty prevail. We should keep in mind that Jesus Christ prophesied that the present condition of the world would be, but he admonished the believers in Him to "See that ye be not troubled, for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation; kingdom against kingdom; and there shall be famines and pestilences and earthquakes in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrow."

The prevailing conditions of the world should have the sobering effect upon us while we meet here in Cincinnati. None of us shouldhave come here to enjoy sensual pleasures. Our conduct should be

such as becomes Christians.

### OBLIGATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITY

This Convention being one of the largest Christian organizations in the world, is responsible to God to use its tremendous influence for the betterment of the world. This can be done first, by taking a stand against immorality in the social, economic, industrial and religious life. Standing for truth and honesty. One of the greatest social evils is divorce; another is the love of money, and another is

2nd. We should make known our position to the world on this question of exploitation of the colored world by the white world.

We should make known that Christianity is a religion.

### WHY TWO NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTIONS

Thirty-six years ago in Chicago, the National Baptist Convention of America divided because its constituent membership was of two schools of thought in regard to the capability of the Negro race. They did not differ in regard to denominational or Christian doctrines Both groups were of the same faith and order. The question in the minds of many who did not understand why the separation, was the cause of the separation sufficient to justify the separation since there was not any difference about Christian doctrine. History records that Godly men have differed about questions that on the surface seemed not to he of a religious nature, but was of sufficient importance to cause separation. Abram and Lot separated because their "Substance was too great, so that they could not dwell together." Gen. 13:6 It was an economic question which caused them to separate

The prophet Amos states the justifiable reason for separation: Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" Amos 3:3. The white Baptists of the U. S. separated because they differed on the

nuestion of Negro slavery. Negro people are human beings also thus Negro Baptists separated because of a difference of racial attitude toward the capability of the race.

The National Baptist Convention of America is composed of groups of Negro Baptists who believe that Negroes can build and maintain institutions for themsolves. This kind of faith in the race is spiritual heritage which we received from the pioneers who had courage to push through the wilderness of doubt and to begin to build Christian Institutions for themselves. This faith was demonstrated first in the building of great church congregations and building where they could worship according to their own desires. Then they conceived the idea that in order that their children might be intellectually and spiritually free, they had to build Christian schools controlled by leaders and teachers of their own race. Recently thoughtful men have begun to build other institutions which will conserve for the use of the race some of the material resources, such as banks and insurances. Most Negro denominations have built their own publishing houses, which so so of the greatest steps in the forward movement of the race.

Regardless of the progress we have made, there is yet potential unexpressed power for race development. Were it possible for me to help the members of this National Convention to actualize its powers and untaped resources for race development I would have rendered some worthwhile service for our race.

### THE MOST VITAL DOCTRINE

There are but few professing Christians who have accepted the temendous implication in the Christian Doctrine of faith as taught by Jesus Christ and the aposites. Christ said: "Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is cast into the even, shall He not much more clothe you. O ye of little faith?" Mart. 6:30. Because of your unbelief: for verily I say unto you. If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain. Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall be removed; and nothing shall be impossible unto you. Matt. 17:20.

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen For by it the olders obtained a good report." Heb 11:12

All men who have succeeded in accomplishing anything worthwhile, possessed faith.

### LOYAL AND PATRIOTIC CITIZENS

At this time when loyalty of many citizens is suspected, the most amazing thing manifested is the faithfulness of Negro citizens to our government. Though denied the common rights granted other citizens, they are the most loyal and patriotic citizens of any race group in this country. The majority group in control of the government seems to be without a conscience to recognize the unrighteousness of its conduct toward Negroes. One of the amuzing things to be considered is how can this nation consider itself a Christian Nation when its chief characteristic is race haired and prejudice.

When this nation undertakes to impress the colored world that it has good intentions toward it in its effort to prevent it from being brought under communism, the colored world cannot believe in its sincerity, because of its treatment of its Negro citizens in this country.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The kind of education that is being given it, most of the colleges and universities is being manifested in skepticism and atheism. The only hope to counteract this kind of training is to build and support Christian institutions. All other Christians should be like Catholies and Mormans. In seeing to it that their children are educated in their own schools. We are not inferior The institutions of our cace will stand on equality with those of any race in this country. I Brains know no color. Negroes have awakened to the fact that they have the ability to accomplish and build like any other group.

### ORTHODOXY

Some years ago I appointed a Cummittee on Orthodoxy. This committee was and is composed of some of the outstanding theologians in the denomination. The purpose of the appointment was that the committee would compile the differentiated doctrines of the Missionary Baplist denomination. But there is still such a difference of doctrine being taught that it becomes necessary for us to get together on interpretation of the Christian Doctrines. Paul said: "Let us walk by the same rule. Let us mind the same things." Phil. 3:16

### SOCIAL EVILS

This Convention should declare itself on social evils that are undermining the foundation of civilization such as divorce, intemperance, immorality, parental delinquency and violation of the laws of the country. Christianity is the basis of a standardized morel social order. We must conclude that the only way to produce a social order that can produce a way of life for the welfare of humanity is the acceptance without substitution, the principes of Christianity.

## WHY THE SPLIT IN THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

An address by Dr. E. M. Elmore, delivered before the 71st Annual Session of the National Beptist Convention of America. In Cincinnati

Eruther President, I am happy to submit the following as my findings as to why the National Baptist Convention of America split The National Baptist Convention of America was organized in Montgomery, Alabamu, in 1880, Rev W. H. McAlpine was our first President. His successors were: Rev J. Q. A. Wilhite, 1883, Rev J. 4 Foster, 1884; Rev. W. A. Brinkley, 1835; Rev. W. J. Simmons, 1886, Rev E. M. Brawley, 1891; Rev. M. Vann, 1892; Rev E. C. Morris, 1894, Rev. E. P. Jones, 1915; Rev. J. E. Wood, 1923, Rev. J. W. Hurse, 1930, Rev. G. L. Prince, 1933

According to records, there were until 1894, several bodies of National note doing business in the réligious field. In this year in Montgomery, Alabama, where the National Baptist Convention of America was organized, and where Dr. E. C. Morris was elected President of the National Baptist Convention of America, the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, the National Baptist Educational Convention and the National Baptist Convention of America' resolved to merge their several interests into one Body the following year. Accordingly in Atlanta. Georgia, the next year, 1895, the merge was completed, taking our nome. National Baptist Convention of America. Under this name we have openined since 1850 when we organized.

FACTS ARE:
In 1912, when the National Daptist Convention of America met in 1912, when the National Daptist Convention of America met in Houston, Texos, Prof. M. M. Rodgers, who had been in the Federal service for several years, and was at that time a school teacher, residing in LaGrange. Texos, introduced a resolution in the Convention calling for a caarter or for chartering the National Baptist Convention, which would have made, it a body politics, a corporation, a person in law. He was joined in this resolution by several other members of the Convention. This created quite a str in the Convention. Dr. E. C. Morris, President was presiding, and when he saw how unpopular this was, he declared the resolution out of order, but, referred it to a combilities made up of one member from each State Convention of Charcal Association, with instruction that they study the resolution for twelve months and then report back to the Convention at the resolution for twelve months and then report back to the Convention at the resolution for twelve months and then report back to the Convention at the convention

This committee met and organized, selecting as Chairman, the late Rev. Jackson, pastor of the New Hope Baptist Church, Dallas, Texas, as secretary; one Rev. Mr. Jackson who was pastoring up in Cambridge, Mass.

This Committee employed an attorney named William Harrison, who was then practicing law in Oktahoma. This Committee Inhored for one year. So, when the National Baptist Convention met in Nashville, Tenn. in 1913, they (Committee) reported to the Convention through their attorney, without a division or a minority report, which in substance was: "We recommend, after twelve months study, that our Convention do not incorporate, for the reason that as an unincorporated body we would have more jurisdiction and influence over our several Boards, than we could have if we were a corporated body; that all Baptist authority, including Edward Histora as well as Marshall on Baptist Jurisprudence, look with disfavor on incorporated Baptist Conventions." This report was unanimously adopted in Nashville, Tenn. 1913.

Nothing more was said about chartering the Convention during this session. In 1914 when the Convention met in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the matter of incorporating the Convention never came before the Convention proper, so the Convention leaders considered the entire matter closed.

The Convention adjourned in Philadelphia to meet in Chicago, Illinois in 1815. However, early in 1915 in about April or May, seven men, members of the Convention, under the leadership of Proft M. M. Rodgers, F. Gross, W. A. Wilbank, employed a man named Wilbur Smith in Brooklyn, N. Y., to draw up a charter, a constitution and by-laws, incorporating the National Routest Convention. The

Reverend gentlemen declared in their affidavit that they were authorized by the National Baptist Convention to secure such a charter.

It was therefore, issued in the District of Columbia, which is not a state. News of the issuing of this charter spread throughout the United States. The incorporators denied that such a charter had been issued But a certified copy of it was secured from the District of Columbia. So, that when the Executive Board met in Atlanta, Georgia, in the month of June, away from the session of the Congress, which was convening in Birmingham, Alabama, the matter came up for consideration, but it was denied that such a charter was in existence. Toward the close of this executive board meeting this certified copy of the charter was presented by the late Dr. R. H. Boyd and In spite of the fact that Dr. Morris name was on the coarter, he denied any knowledge of it. The seven men whose names were on the charter swore in their affidavits that they had been authorized by the Convenied in Nashvillol Tenn, had voted not to incorporate.

Time and things moved on and there was newspaper controversies, over the charter. When the Convention convened in Chicago, Illinois, in 1915, and the program of the Convention was submitted on the first day for adoption, it was found that there was no provision on the program for a charter.

A motion was made for the adoption of the program. A Rev. Mr. Brooks of South Carolina called for unreadiness. He was recognized by President Morris. Mr. Brooks said that he wanted to preface his unreadiness, which he did. He said that he had a program copy for the week, and that he had learned that a charter for the Convention had been issued, and that this charter was registered in Tennessee and Illinois, and that he felt therefore, that the question of the charter should be placed as number one on the agenda. He offered a resolution therefore to place the charter on the program. His resolution was seconded. When the second was made and the motion was put, a motion was made that the resolution be tabled. Since the motion to table was not debatable, the matter was placed to vote The resolution carried. Someone called for a division of the house. The division was ordered. The resolution to put the charter on the program still carried. Confusion reigned, order was hard to secure.

President Morris, who was presiding, thinking to save the charter attempted to adjourn the Convention. It was evident to ninety percent of messengers prosent that the proponents had lost and President Morris order to adjourn the Convention was appealed from This caused another division of the house. The Convention voted almost unanimously not to adjourn. President Morris along with his lieutenants who were in favor of the charter walked out of the Convention.

At this moment, the late Dr. E. P. Jones, president of the State of Mississippi, came to the rostrum, picked up the gavel and called the Convention to order. The charter was put on the program. The Convention voted not to accept it and proceeded with its regular order of business. Mr. R. B. Hudson, Secretary of the Convention kept the records. The Convention proceeded with the regular business the remainder of the afternoon and carried out the program.

Jones and another large delegation from Texas, led by the late Dr. L. K. Williams had telegraphed that their trains were one day late, so they did not arrive in Chicago until sometime in the night of the first day.

These are the facts. Of course many statements were made, but this is what led up and is what actually split the Convention. The National Baptist Publishing Board was never mentioned. It was after Convention split that the charter proponents seized upon the idea of pitching a fight against the National Baptist Publishing Board, and they continued this fight for many years. It was not until later that the charter proponents had held a meeting, organized what they called the National Baptist Publishing Board, elected nine members, which was in the charter proponent and the could have been elected in one year, they elected a secretary-treasurer and ordered a series of literature prought out. The Court in handing its decision, said they could not hold a National Baptist Publishing Board meeting, which is a Tennessee corporation, in Illinois; and second, had it been legal, they could have only elected three members; the six members' terms had not expired. This last is a matter of Court record.

The late Dr. John H. Frank, Chairman of the Foreign Mission Board, who was then residing in Kentucky was opposed to the charter. The late Dr. L. G. Jordan, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board was opposed to the charter. A majority of the leaders of the Convention were opposed to the charter. Some were not as pronounced as others, some straddled the lence, so that the whole separation came as the result of seven men swearing that the Convention had authorized them to charter it, when the records of the Convention itself, in session in Nashville, Tennessee, 1913, voted overwhelmingly not to incorporate.

Such is "Why the Split."

### REPORT OF THE RAILROAD COMMISSION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

To the President Officers and Members of the National Baptist Convention of America, in session in Cincinnati, Ohio—Dear Christian Friends:

We, the members of your Railroad Commission, having been elected in Kansas City, Missouri, last September, held a meeting, organized with the following officers and members: Rev. J. M. Harvey, D. D., Chicago, Illinois, chairman; Rev. Henry A. Boyd, Nashville, Tennessee, secretary: Rev. J. S. Morgan, New Orleans, Louisians; Rev. R. B. Porter, Los-Angeles, California; Rev. C. J. Smith, Sanford, Florida, Aside from the meeting held in the organization in the municipal

auditorium in Kansas City, we have not held another meeting, although the chairman and secretary have had several conferences, one during the Executive Board meeting in Houston. Texas and the other during the Sunday School Congress session in San Francisco, California, but the secretary sent out a letter to all of the Trunkline Railroad utificials mostly to the presidents of these Lines, notifying them of the officials who had been selected at Kansas City for the ensuing year for our Convention, with the names and addresses of all the members, urging that whatever they could do consistently in belging in their missionary and denominational work, that they do so.

The secretary also made a request of the Trunkline Passenger Association, the Eastern Clergy Bureau, Southern Clergy Bureau, the Western Clergy Bureau and the Transcontinental Bureau for the Sunday School Congress session in San Francisco, California, as well as for the National Baptist Convention of America, meeting in Cincinnati. Ohio that a rule be promulgated whereby ministers and missionaries holding Clergy Permits would be permitted to buy their round trip railroad tickets on whatever 1951 Clergy Book they hold. This request was granted, and by this action several of our ordained ministers, pastors, and missionary workers were able to take advantage of this concession and to round trip tickets to San Francisco California, as well as to Cincinnati, Ohio. Many of them were able to buy diverse route tickets which enabled them to go one way and come back another. The secretary of your Railroad Commission has also been instrumental in getting refunds to some of the members of the Convention on tickets that they had not used, or the unused portion of them. He has also been able to assist members of the denomination in getting certain routings on tickets where the tariff did not particularly specify that routing. Then we have sent out a general letter to the denominational leaders and forces urging them to secure their routes to both the Congress and the Convention, and to make their requests for equipments to the Railroads through their Passenger Agents and Traffic Managers sufficiently far enough in advance to see to it that their delegations were not embarressed. We have had only one report where the delegates did not get what they had but upon investigation we found that the leaders of the delegations were not logether on the routing, so we did not pursue the matter any further.

The only expense that the Railroad Commission has is for the printing of the Letterheads for the chairman, secretary and three lay members of the Commission, and the postage bill for the year, totaling 159.52

National Baptist Convention of America, Dr. Green L. Prince. President, Cincinnati. Ohio, September, 1931.

Brother President, Officers and Members, here assembled, we the committee on chaplains representing the National Baptist Convention of America. Affiliating with the General Commission On Chaplains, with Headquarters at 122 Maryland Avenue, N. E. Washington 2, D. C. Greetings:

We desire to submit the following report:

Dear Brethren, another year has passed, many who were alive one year ago, if their names were called today would fail to answer the roll-call for the reason they have been called from labor to their final reward.

VOICE OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH:

There are forty-two church organizations of the Protestant Faith, representing different denominations. Among them is The National Baptist Convention of America, of which Dr. G. L. Prince is its very efficient president and chieftain. I am very happy to be associated with this community of fine Christian man.

Since 1917 the Church has been very definitely represented on the General Commission of Chaplains, Also the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C.

A.: Y. M. H. A., and H. B. A. Os. are affliated groups.

There is a shortage in all branches of the service for Chaplains. I do not think that this shortage is due to the ministers not being interested, but much of it is due to the very high standards set by the Government for Chaplains:

### QUALIFICATIONS:

The educational level, 120 Semister Hours in some accredited College or University 90 Semester Hours in a Theological Seminary.

A health certificate from a regular Physician. At least two letters endorsing the character of the applicant. The age must not exceed thirty-five years before the application is investigated and approved. He must be an active member of some church of his faith. A letter certifying same must be forth coming from the said church, association or convention, state or national.

The United Fellowship of Protestants, with headquarters at 122 Maryland Avenue, N. E., Washington 2, D. C., has issued two Cards of identification. One card is sent to the Chaplain and the other is given to the member of the church or organization, signed by the pastor, moderator or president, or in the case of a local church without a pastor, the person in charge may sign the cards. A sufficient number of these cards can be secured with no charge to the pastor or local church.

There are two regular meetings during the year, October and

April We are subjects of call meetings at the discretion of the President of Executive Board.

At these meetings the regular business is brought before the meeting for regular consideration as proper for the body. Preceding the Regular Business Meeting of the General Commission is a Meeting of the Executive Board, the transaction of which is reported to the General Commission for final approval

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AUDITOR

National Baptist Convention of America, Office of the Auditor. Virginia Seminary. Lynchburg. Virginia.

Ciprinnati, Ohio, September 6, 1851,

Mr. President, the following is the annual report of the Auditor of the National Baptist Convention of America:

The system of bookkeeping for the boards and departments of the Commention, authorized by the Convention during its last annual session, was put into effect during the month of March, 1951.

This system of bookkeeping consisted of receipt books, with carbon stubs, and monthly report blanks for receipts and disburmesents, with earbon stubs. All of the boards were handicapped because this material was late getting into their hands. The most of the boards have really tried to cooperate in the new bookkeeping system.

Now that sufficient time has been given the hoards to learn how to use this bookkeeping system, the auditor should be in position to present a comprehensive financial statement of the work of the Convention at its next annual session.

It is here suggested that the Author visit the office of the boards that bandie large sums of money and check their records. This will incure some expense. The auditor shall not do this unless he is authorized by the Convention.

This check up would give the auditor an opportunity to present to the convention a true picture of the effectiveness of the Convention's program. This statement would show the percentage of the receipts of the Convention that is used in the operation of the Convention and what percentage of the total receipts is actually being used for the objectives of the Convention. This financial statement would show the salaries and operating cost of each board and of each officer of the Convention.

Is any officer in this Convention prepared to give to the Convention or to the public the percentage of its operating cost each year, I doubt it. In the eyes of the business world this is a poor business collect.

Now this is only a suggestion. The Auditor will not take the convention; of such an analysis without being authorized by the Convention.

The Auditor of the Convention is not on a salary. It appears that the boards should make contributions to the Auditor for his services. This is not a good practice or policy. If the Auditor is to receive anything for his services, it should be done by the Convention.

This Auditor is not requesting nor even suggesting that he be paid a salary, or that the Convention pay him anything for his services. But, he definitely condemns the practice of donations from individual boards. It is not a sound business policy. This Auditor would be satisfied with the Convention paying the actual expense incurred by his services.

The Auditor makes his report to the Convention, and not to the boards. Therefore each board is urged to keep in mind that the Convention's fiscal year begins July 1 and ends June 30 each year. This will give the Auditor sufficient time to compile and publish his report for the Convention. The Auditor will not make any more reports to the boards.

## THERE IS BUT ONE RACE OF HUMAN BEINGS ON THIS EARTH

And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell of all the face of the earth, and hath determined the time before appointed, and the bounds of their habitation.—Acts 17:26.

INTRODUCTION—

The life is in the blood. The Apustle Paul sees this life stream of the whole HUMAN RACE to be ONE, flowing from ONE SOURCE

At this time, it is expedient to make a few fundamental observations relative to the ILLOGICAL, erroneous, inconsistent, diabolical IDEAS that the sons and daughters of men hold in reference to the division of the Human family into RACES. Cruden's Unabridged Complete Concordance to the Old and New Testaments has recorded

only four references in the entire Bible where the word RACE IS USED.

Let us note the following passages of Scripture:—Rejoiceth as a strong man to run a RACE (Psalms 19.5); I saw the RACE is not to the swift. (Ecclesiastes 9:11). They which run in a RACE run all, but one receiveth the prize. (I Corinthians 9:24); Run with patience the RACE set before us. (Hebrews 12:1.) We observe:

1. The expression in Psalms 19:5 that is translated to run a RACE, is to Dramein odon autout which really means to run his path:

2 The expression in Ecclesiastes 9:11 has translated the word dromos to mean RACE, and that is the name of a running contest.

3. The passage in I Corinthians 9:24 has en stadio translated so as to mean—in a Race, whereas en stadio really means—a race course, that is, the place where races are run.

4. And we may also observe that in Hebrews 12:1 where we have the phrase . . . RACE set before us . . . , it is the word 'agona' which is translated so as to mean RACE: but the word 'agona' really means "Contest." The idea is, that if the contest is that of running, it is a RACE: if that of fighting, it is a WARFARE; or the contest may be that of Boxing or Wrestling, etc., etc., etc. We very carefully notice and understand that not even one of these words which is translated RACE is ever used in reference to a division of the Human Family. That words are good translated RACE, which is used in reference to the Human Family. That words 'Genea' and means—Breed, Kind. Bort. Specie; it is from the verb Ginomai which means to be, become.

Prise, be born, created, he made to grow.
You may often read and hear different divisions of the Human Family into RACES. Some scientists and sociologists predicate their divisions upon the color of the skin; others on the texture of the hair, and yet others base their classification upon the contour of the face. As a result, some say that there are Five Races and some three, and others say that there are 38: and they also assert that there are some people who do not belong to any Race. So you see It is very evident that the whole system is wrong and absolutely false and should not be tolerated any longer. The principal reason is because the Bible does not support the idea of the DIVISION of the HUMAN FAMILY predicated upon the color of the skin, texture of the hair, the contour of the face, or ony other individual, personal sharacteristic: therefore all who do so, make a very grave mistake and cause all kinds of unnecessary confusion, strife, hatred, envy, malice, etc., etc., wors and rumors of wars, which things could be easily avoided if we, who claim to be intelligent would accept of God's method of division. The Lord our God predicates the division of the Human Family upon the geographical outlines of one's habitation, domestic ties, and language spoken. Therefore the Bible speaks of Nations, Kindreds, Tribes, Tongues, Languages and Peoples. If God's Classification is made use of every individual of the Human Family will be found in some special Division; but to make use of be many individuals left without any special classification whatsoever There are thousands of others who know this just as well as I do. and many of them know it better than I and have known it longer. but they don't have sufficient Christian Integrity to tell the truth and nothing but the TRUTH. Furthermore we are reminded of the fact that Unity is indivisible Therefore let us hear the Word of the Lord- Of one Blood hath God made all Nations of men, etc., etc." We also learn from the Bible that the first man was civilized. Among the physical elements which furnish material for study and a basis for Classification, the following figure prominently:-color of skin, shape, color, section and texture of the hair, stature, shape of the eye, and the general contain of the face. Yet however, notwithstanding all these factors, such classifications, do not, will not, and cannot stand up under the pressure of revealed facts. To thus attempt to classify-

MANKIND, we lose time, energy, peace, happiness, joy, love, set isfaction, respect, kindness, friendship, common sense, brotherly kindness, and many other of the higher Virtues that belong to us a members of the Human Social Fabric. We will be beachitted more than a thousand-times more if we leave the Classification of the sons and daughters of men to be effected by the Lord God our Creator. And let us go forward day by day, week by week, month by month and year by year conducting ourselves in harmony with the Principles for Practical Christianity as set forth in the Teachings of Jesus Christ our Redoemer and Friend. We are to remember that God is no Respector of persons, but whoever loveth Him and worketh righteousness is accepted with Him.

We observed that last Sunday the general topic for our Sunday School Lesson was Christian Relations Among Races, as though ther were more than one Human Race. We observe in the lesson the characters made use of were two Jews, one Samaritan and one Roman, as though there were a Jewish Race. A Samaritan Race and A Roman Race. There is no such thing as a Race of Jews, a Race of Samaritans and a Race of Romans. The term Jew is a religion designation. Any one who accepts of Judaism as their religion, is a Jew whether they be red, yellow, brown, black or white: and to

whether they live in Europe, Asia, Africa, North America, Central America, South America, Australia or the Isles of the Seas.

Rabbi D Philpson explains the meaning of the three names applied to the Jews as follows: Broadly speaking, I define the three terms thus: "Hebrew." is the Linguistia: "Israel," the National; "Jew." the religious designation. If we still used the Hebrew as our language in daily life, it would be correct to call us "Hebrews;" if we were still a Nation, the proper appelation would be "Israelites." which was the distinguishing pattern applied to the people when they inhabited Palestines as a Nation, in contrast with the surrounding peoples. Philistines, Noabites, Syrians, Edmonites and the like. Since Hebrew is no longer our spoken language, since further we are not a Nation, our National existence having ceased with the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans it is technically incorrect to apply either of these names to present day Jews. There remains, then, the third. "Jew," this is primarily the Religious term the name of the professor of Judaism. The distinguishing mark of the Jewish People is their Religion. They are a Religious Community, bence the proper name is Jew. Our Faith is called not Hebraism, nor yet Israelitism but Judaism, and the corresponding term to "Judaism" is "Jew."

The term "Roman" is a National designation, and not RACIAL the Apostle Paul was a Jew, yet however, on one occasion he asserted that he was a Roman. We also observe that the term "Samaritan" is no RACIAL designation, but social and Civic therefore the Samaritan woman refers to Jacob as her father, when she says to Jesus. "Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us the well, and drank from it himself, and his sons, and his cattle?" So their differences were not RACIAL but SOCIAL and RELIGIOUS.

The last verse in the lesson under consideration is taken from Paul's letter to the Colossians, in which he refers, to Greek, Jew. Circumcision, Uncircumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, Bond, Free! Not a one of these terms used by Paul is a Racial Designation. Greek is national; Jew. religious; Circumcision and uncircumcision, are religious; Barbarian, cultural; Scythian, cultural, while Bond and Free are terms of social designation. Even these differences are not considered when one is in Christ Jesus All partition walls are abolished. Hear this Inspired Apostle as he speaks in Ephesians 2:13-15.—But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the Blood of Christ. For He is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us; having abolished in his flesh the ENMITY, etc.; etc. They who are in Christ Jesus, to a normal degree will not be an ENEMY to THEIR ENEMITES, etc., etc.

After a thorough study of our Constitution, we have made an effort to keep within the framework of our Constitution. Our report will be divided into two sections:

Section I, will provide for the operation expenses of our President, Boards of Convention and Auxiliary Conventions.

Section II, will provide for the principles guiding these expenses.

### SECTION 11

Principles guiding these expenses

I. An Executive Fund should be established and the amount provided as stated above. This fund should be under the direct actionity of the President and spent in connection with his responsibilities as the Executive of the National Baptist Convention of America.

2 The above figures will include salaries of Officers of Board and Auxiliaries as well as travel, food, lodging, secretarial work as all other operational expenses that are not provided for by the Costitution of the Convention. In keeping with the Constitution the details of the expenditures will be worked out by the Board of Management, of each Board and Auxiliary.

3. In the event the expenses of any Board or Auxiliary exceed that provided for in the recommendations, the additional expense must be submitted to the Committee on Claims and Accounts, Accept

4. All other financial matters not provided for in these recommendations or in the Constitution of our Convention must be submitted to the Committee on Claim or Account to be accepted or rejected.

5 We further recommend that the necessary action be taken by the Convention to make these recommendations valid

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON SOCIAL JUSTICE

Brother President and Members of the National Baptist Convention of

Our commission is one of the new aspects of the work of the National Baptist Convention and thus has demanded a great deal of attention that we might maintain the standards of work required by this Convention. The members of the Commission live in different sections of the country and we have had the problem of meeting together to discuss as often as we would like the issues involved in this report. We believe that we have been able to overcome the problem in a measure and thus regard very highly this opportunity to present our first report:

### Our Universal Responsibility

We cannot hope to understand the work of this Commission without first understanding our responsibility as Christians It is the tesk of this Commission, as an instrument of our Convention, to dechare our responsibility as Baptist to our social order and to urge the exceptance of this responsibility as a united expression of our Convention. We believe as Christians we are accountable to God and thus responsible for our neighbor. It is clearly stated in I John 4:20 -If a man says, I love God, and hatelh his brother, he is a liar for that toveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen? Our faith will not allow us to be septrated from those interests that affects our total society over which God presides. The issues involved in our faith pour over into the life of the community What man of you can ignore the needs of his neighbor and still hold fast to his faith in God? We live under the authority and by the example of Jesus Christ who suffered death on the cross that all men might be saved. We are aware of God's presence and in His presence we are compelled by his demands to see all men our brother

We cannot limit our responsibility to any special class or group, for our faith is universal and those our responsibility is universal. As Christians we are sensitive to the desire of all men for justice and as Negro Christians in America we have a deep understanding of their desires. As Negro Baptists we are interested in all men who have been deprived of their just rights as efficient of our country We believe as Christians that "justice" beings to all, regardless to their religion, creed, color or national origin. We accept as our Christian responsibility the task of opposing all forces that deny men their "human rights."

### Christian Decisions in the Face of Conflicting Authorities

We Baptists of the National Baptist Convention of America are well aware that the laws of the land are binding on Christians as on other men. We have no desire to provoke men to violence. We know that Caesar must receive his due. Although Caesar makes his demands on us, our faith declares that the will of God is supreme. Wherever God's will is in conflict with human authority, the Christian must not hesitate to make his decision. He must obey God rather than men. Above all we accept the authority of our Master. This way of life is in keeping with the tradition of the Christian Church and the teachings of the Scripture Our decisions are determined not by "public opinion" nor established secular ideas, but by the will of God as reflected in his Word.

We are not moved by hate or the desire for power but by our lave of the Christian way and thus our love for our fellowman Paithfulness to the "Christian way of life" in the face of social injustices, demands of us the type of courage that characterized the early Christians. Their unwillingness to bend to human authority when it conflicted with God's will, accounts for the measure of social justice we now enjoy. They moved with patience and determination They counted the cost and offered even their lives to pay the price. Today, so long as we are guided by God's own purpose we will find ourselves on the side of social justice for all men. As Baptist our position in social affairs is clear, for we can take no other COURSE than that which is provided by God's purpose for all manalized.

Our Challenge As A National Body

We are all aware of the injustices in our social order. We as the faltering hand of justice in the courts, educational institution in employment, and in the limited freedom of minority groups a America. We believe that no person should be deprived of life, in erty or property without due process of law. It is our firm convition that all citizens of our nation should have equal educational or portunities with equal access to all the supported institutions. The right to be employed on the basis of skill and intelligence should belong to all citizens of this nation. Every law which makes a day tinction in treatment between citizens based on religion, creed, cole or national or tin SHOULD BE REVOKED. As Christians we held that these rights are "HUMAN RIGHTS" not merely civil right When they are violated every Christian must be concerned.

It is needless for us to say to this group that many of the vielations of "human rights" in our country are supported by powerful and evil forces. The forces have accepted the undemocratic na tern of "white supremary" as their social objective. They are been on maintaining the unjust practices and laws now enforced in man sections of our country. Those powerful and evil forces infecting our native land with human suffering cannot be met by Christian with indecision and division, but must be met with determination

and unity.

Our Appeal

Realizing that we are, as Baptist believers, accountable to Go and responsible for our brother we do hereby make the following

We appeal to the Baptist churches throughout our nation to examine their program with a view to strengthen their efforts in the cause of social justice.

We appeal to the Baptists of our National Convention to use their influence to oppose injustice without reference to religion, creed color or national origin.

We appeal to Baptist churches throughout our nation to give special consideration to the following objectives:

1 The enforcement of that provision of the Constitution which provides that "No person . . . shall be deprived of life liberty or properly without due process of law.

### THE BIBLE DOCTRINE OF STEWARDSHIP By E. M. ELMORE

The Bible Doctrine of STEWARDSHIP is the Doctrine that God Creator and only absolute Owner of all THINGS and BEINGS, that all things cometh of Him and are His Own, and that men hold such as cometh into their possession as stewards of God's purposes. Four basic principles should be every Christian's creed:

(I) I believe that God is the Owner of all things, Psalms 24;

Chronicles 29:11-14: Psalms 10:11; Haggai 2:8.

(2) That God requires me to give a definite portion of my Income for His service in acknowledgment of His ownership and my slewardthip, Leviticus 27:3-32; Matachi 3:8-10; 1 Corinthians 13; 2; II Corin-

(3) That I am His steward and must account for all that I have.

Luke 16.2; I Corinthians 2.

(4) That I should use the residue-what I spend and what I keep

in ways that are pleasing to Him.

The Doctrine of Stewardship is one of the greatest doctrines ever taught in the Bible. But, it is one of those doctrines which has been laught but very little by the majority of Ministers and Churches. Before there can be very much spiritual advancement, uptift and real kingdom progress much careful and prayerful thought must be given to what stewardship means. Men should so account of us as ministers of Christ, and stewarls of the mysteries of God. Moreover: It is required in stewards that a man be found faithful. I Cor. 4:1. 2.

The Bible Doctrine of Stewardship means the acknowledgment of God's ownership, the acceptance of our trusteeship, and the administration of the same according to the will of God. I Corinthians 4:1, 2. I Timothy 6:20. A very careful study of the following Scriptures: Gen. 15:2: 49:13: 49:16: 44:1, 4: I Kings 16:9; I Chronicles 28:1; Daniel 1:11: Matthew 20:8; Luke 8:3; 12:42; 16:1-4, 8; I Corinthians 4:1, 2; Titus 1:7; I Peter 4:10; will show the very meaning of the words, ateward and stewardship. In every case it is seen that a steward is one who handles the property or administers the affairs of another. A steward's position is one of trust, honor and responsibility.

Stewardship is not limited to raising money. Most any gambler bootlegger or racketeer can do that. To consider money as the only thing involved is to seriously err. Stewardship is not hearding, To pile up or hoard the Master's money is a great sin. Selfishness and coveteousness must not enter. That which has been committed to one must be returned to the owner on demand. The steward cannot own that which has been entrusted to him. The steward must make a report of his management on demand. Many stewards are in condemnation today for allowing the thought of the "trust-fund" to enter his thinking as MINE.

The following Bible teaches of the TIME shown that we are Mewards, and that God has a right to demand revenue from us. The relation of a steward to God is that of a tenant of a house to the wher. His rent acknowledges the ownership. The interest at the bank acknowledges the loan and the owner of the money. Slewardship is the Bible way of saying. All that we are and har belong to God and is entrusted to us to administer as partners wit God for the work of His Kingdom. The most difficult phase of Clas-

tien Slewardship to accept is the PRINCIPLE of TITHING, and the TENTH as a minimum is the one point where most Christians call

To say that the principle of TITHING has been abolished in Christ is to contend that white in everything else Christ enlarged Moses, but in this respect the Cospel sounds a retreat. That Constignity has lowered the standard of the virtue of liberality. That with greater than the Jew, the Christian may give less for the aske of the whole world than the Jew gove for Palestine. That it in Dawful for the Christian to be more selfish than the Jew. That the Jew did more under loveless Law than the Christian under the Law of Love. That Moses was greater than Christ and Sinai was stronger than Calvary. That the outcome is better when Moses seremely drives than when Christ lovingly draws, and that for the sake of the whole world with all its heathenism and sin we had better return to the yoke of bondage and believe that there is more salvation in Judaism than there is in Christianity. Such a conjecture cannot stand the light of reason. If the Christian today had the proper conception and attitude towards Stewardship rather than the pagen conception of ownership, we could in one Sunday lift the Church to a higher plane than it has been since the first century.

Most Churches today are resorting to paganistic methods for support. This is largely because most of our members have paganistic attitudes towards what belongs to God. In all the shame of paganism the crowning infamy is that beggary sits in the Church high and liftup while God is still challenging the Church and saying to it as He did over two thousand years ago, "Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation. Bring ye all the TITHES into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house and prove me now herewith saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of Heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it. And I will rebuke the devourer for your sakes and he shall not destroy the fruit of your ground; neither shall your vine east her fruit before the time in the tialds saith the Lord of hosts. And all nations shall call you blessed. for ye shall be a delightsome land, saith the Lord of hosts."-Mal. Il is significant that the days of Israel's worse spiritual declension and material reverses always followed her failure to bring in the TITHE into the storehouse. On the other hand from the earlyest recorded examples of TITHING-Gen, 14:20-28-to this present time when ever and where ever God's people have faithfully practiced the principles of the TITHE, they prospered not only materially but spiritually

God says that the TITHE belongs to Him. In giving the Law from Mt. Sinai, the very first mention of the TITHE is the simple announcement that the TITHE is God's, Lev. 27:30-"And all the tithe of the land ... is Jehovah's: it is holy unto Jehovah. God does not say.

Be it enacted that the TITHE shall be the Lord's." He simply an-He simply announces that it is His.

Jesus praised tithing, and said, "The Scribes and Pharisees sit it. Moses' seal: all things therefore whatsoever they bid you, these do and observe." And in the very same speech He said to them, "Ye tithe mint and anise and cummin these ye ought to have done."-Matt. 23:1, 3, 23. This is certainly a strong endorsement for the Scribes taught a great deal about tithing.

Tithing has never been abolished. The custom was thoroughly established and regularly practiced. If it was to be entirely set aside it would seem necessary that such be so stated. No such setting aside is recorded

Is there any reason why the Lord should abolish tithing? On what grounds would the Lord care to abolish tithing? It belongs to Him. He alone has a right to abolish it.

Would He abolish the tithe to provide for giving more than the tenth? That was already provided for The tithe was always only the minimum below which the people were not to fall. They were always free to give much more than that as they wish. No such rule as the tithe and no more was ever heard of m the Old Testament not in the New Testament teaching.

Would He abolish the tithe because all our possessions belong to God? That was just as emphatically true in the Old Testament times as in the New Testament times. In the Old Testament we read "Behold, all souls are mine, as the soul of the father, so also the soul of the son is mine—"Ezek 18:4 "The world is mine and the full-ess thereof."—Psalms 50:12. "The silver is mine and the gold is mine."— Hag. 2:8. "Jehavah thy God giveth the power to get wealth" Deut. 8 :18. "All things cometh of thee, and of thine own have we given thee."-1 Chron. 29.14.

Would the Lord abolish tithing in order that giving might become voluntary. It was voluntary under the Old Testament system. Payment of lithes was never forced. With one possible exception, and that only for a short time. Ethes were never collected by officers as taxes were collected. The paying of the tithe should be regarded as a standard, it there were no standards of coduct we would never know whether we had done our duty or not. If there were no standards for mesoning our giving, then a man of great wealth might say that. He had given according to his ability, when he had given only one per error his income. While the poor man might feel that it was necessar that he given a per cent. But the tithe is the standard in such maters and no one can claim to be a standard Christian in the mate of giving unless he give the tithe.

The tithe is the minimum. It always was that. In Old Testamer times no Israelite who gave less than the tithe could claim to be standard. They could always give more than that, and frequent they were required to give more, if they did their duty. They must never give less. We should practice tithing in the same way today to tithe today would give to us a universally recognized standard it would establish proportionate giving.

No Christian can justify himself in refusing to tithe. Conside these facts: God declared that the tithe belonged to Him. It was never abolished. We can think of no reason why the Lord should abolish it. The New Testament teaches proportionate giving. The when people understood and practiced tithing, Jesus strongly educated the act and never did say one word against it. In view of these facts it would require very strong consideration against tithing to justify any Christian in disregarding it. The burden of proof is a the one who refuse to tithe.

Therefore, we would ask the person who refuses to tithe. Dyou believe that it is your duty to give money for religious world Do you believe that such giving should be proportionate? any make according to his ability and as he may prosper? If so, why do you not practice tithing. Homestly, if you throw away all considerable of stinginess or coveteousness, would you not get rid of all that a keeping you from tithing? Will you get on your knees before Go and tell Him that you refuse to tithe and tell. Him why you fedself tithing will displease God, by all means let us not practice it. It will please Him, then let us do it.

Christian stewardship goes beyond Old Testament Stewardship—Gal. 3:24. It is based upon love rather than upon Law—Rom. 13:20. It is an expression of gratitude rather than compulsion—II Cor. 9:7. I Peter 5:2. It is entering into partnership with God rather than seeking to drive a bargain—II Cor. 6:1. It thinks of God as a loving Father and not merely as Creator and Judge—Mall 6:8. It seeks to be faithful in all life and not merely in giving of part of our time and money—Rom. 14:8. It seeks to emutate the example of Christ the GREAT STEWARD, who did the will of God in all things—John 13:15. It puts the Kingdom of God first—Matt. 6:33.

Special emphasis should be given to the following points:

1. Christian Stewardship is not primarily a means of raising money, but a plan for making the right kind of men. "I seek not yours but you."—II Cor. 12:14.

2. We are not to be stewards simply because God made us but

also because he redeemed us.-1 Cor. 6:19, 20. /

 Christian Stewardship is not so much in matter of duty as it is an expression of gratitude. It is the economic expression of Christian experience.—II Cor. 9:15.

4 Christian Stewardship is not only a matter of Law requirement but of love expressing itself in practical service.—John 14:15.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

Brother Chairman, Members of the National Baptist Publishing Board of the National Baptist Convention of America—Dear Christian Friends and Co-workers:

I am bringing to you this report of your Board for the fiscal year 1950-51. I pray and urge your prayerful and careful consideration of the facts contained herein. We have passed through many and varied conditions since we made our last annual report to you, in that our nation is in an undeclared war over in Korea. Our government is wrestling with a foreign policy, our denomination is facing conditions that we have never witnessed or gone through before, but your Board has worked together spiritually, denominationally, racially and conscientiously to meet the rising conditions that change almost over night; and yet we have in our humble efforts, used the wisdom, strength and foresight that God has given to us, to carry on.

We have been able to bring out a series of Denominational Helps containing source material for practically every phase of our denominational work, from the Cradle Roll Department clear through the Sunday school, B. Y. P. U. Mission Circle, Women's Auxiliary, Organized Classes, and the Brotherhood Union. We have not missed a month is meeting our obligations. While this has not been easy, it has been made possible because we looked ahead a year in advance and anticipated that there would be periodithrough the quarters that would be extremely lean. Church finances are always uncertain, and extending credit is just one of the hazards that those in business, whether it is religious, secular or financial must face.

Your secretary has kept in touch with practically every religious movement that has to do with giving guidance and insight to operational methods, in which other large publishing houses have taken membership. Particularly do we have reference to our National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A., the International Lesson Committee.

the Protestant Church-owned Publishing Association, the World Sunday School Convention, the Department of Religious Education of the National Council, and our own Denominational Organizations, such as the Baptist Ministers Associations, District Associations, State and National Organizations. In addition to these we have from time to time, made commitments and donations to such movements as the American Red Cross, the Cancer Fund, the March of Dimes, the Community Chest, and like national movements set up for the purpose of giving relief, encouragement, support, and in a measure helping to carry out the great spirit of the American people in unifying all of the efforts and agencies, religious, charitable and benevolent.

These activities have consumed practically every waking-moment of your secretary, and I am thanking the Board. I individually and collectively, as well as our denomination, for giving religious, moral, denominational and sympathetic support to the secretary and to the Board during the past year.

# THE PERSONNEL OF THE BOARD

There have been no changes in the personnel of the National Baptist Publishing Board since the convention met in Kansas City, Mo., last September, Rev. J. B. Ridley, pastor of the MI. Olive Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn., is the chairman, Rev. S. A. Pleasants, pastor of the St. John Baptist Church on Dowling Street in Houston, Texas, is vice-chairman: Rev. S. H. Simpson, pastor of the Greater St. John Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn., is a member of the executive committee: Rev. Henry A. Boyd, Nashville, Tenn., is the secretary of the Board and the Executive Committee; Rev. E. M. Elmore, pastor of the Bates Memorial Baptist Church in Louisville, Ky., is a member of the Board, Rev. John W. Williams, pastor of the St. Stephen Baptist Church, Kansas City, Mo., is a member of the Board; Rev. A. A. Lucas, pastor of the Good Hope Baptist Church in Houston, Texas, is a member of the Board. These have cooperated one hundred percent in their official duties and rendering service throughout the year.

Each state delegation and general association nominates annually a member of the Publishing Board. The list selected at Kansas City Mo., was not handed in to me. so it does not appear in this Report.

## PROTESTANT CHURCH-OWNED PUBLISHERS ASSOCIATION

There was organized, set up and chartered in the city of Philadelphia, Pa., this past year a corporation made up of forty or more Religious Publishing Houses belonging to various denominations, known as the Protestant Church. owned Publishers Association. Your secretary was not only present, but as a representative of this Board we became charter members and helped in the selecting of the officers including a full-time secretary, in the person of Mr. Gordon Grant. (The chairman is Mr. Pat Beard of the Methodist Publishing House in Nashville) The offices were opened in the Witherspoon Building in Philadelphia.

The purpose of this movement was to have some one to give full time in keeping the publishers informed on trends in trade relations, government regulations, watching Congress to see that as far as possible no adverse legislation would be put on the books that would embarrass these religious publishing houses in their operations, because it looked for the time that there would be paper rationing that would be severe if invoked, and would create an embarrassing situation; to watch labor conditions, labor laws and regulations, keep the religious publishers informed on market prices, paper allocation, and watch the market on printing material, with the end in view that we might join our forces, buy in a bulk, getting the best possible prices at the lowest cost.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON COMMITTEE

Your Board has maintained its membership in the International Lesson Committee, which is now a Department of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. and which is made up of from two to five members from the various denominations through their editorial departments. This Committee has held four sessions this past year; one in Nashville. Tenn., one in Columbus, Ohio, one in New York City and the other in Chicago, Ill. They are to hold their next meeting in Toronto, Canada in the month of Ortober

We have had the following representatives at some or all of these meetings: Miss Mae E. Hunter, Rev. V. W. Mc-Lawler, Rev. E. H. Borden, Mrs. K. B. Roach and your humble servant, so that whenever the committee is called together and the roll is called the National Baptist Publishing Board is represented, and its members serve in the various sections, taking their part of the responsibility in preparing the Lessons quarterly in the various Cycles, because we work out these five years in advance.

We believe that such representation, even though it is expensive, is desirable because it puts the National Baptist Publishing Board in the category of supporting membership and helping to maintain this organization which has been in operation for more than a half century.

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Your Board maintains its membership in the Religious Education Department of the National Council which was formerly the International Council of Religious Education. They maintain headquarters now in Chicago at 206, S. Michigan Avenue, and by keeping such membership in this phase of the National Council work it puts the Board in a position to get all the first-hand information on the work of religious education in the various communities, and while our National Baptist Convention of America has not seen fit to carry out the recommendations of the Executive Board several years ago in New Orleans, La., and again in Jacksonville, Fla., in having a full-time secretary of Religious Education, we are glad to report that the work is being done through your Board at the annual session of the Sunday School Congress which is a departmentalized movement, and which specializes and majors in training the youths in our denomination on the local church and convention level, giving them the advantages of the new trends as they are developed from year to year, without disturbing the work as our denominational people understand it, even in the one-room Sunday school clear through to the departmentalized church school.

## NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN THE U.S. A.

I am reporting to you that the secretary of your Board was present, took part in and helped to formulate what is now known as the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S. A., a movement of national and international importance, maintaining headquarters in New York City. The National Baptist Convention of America, by unanimous vote in Kansas City, Mo., last September authorized membership in this organization. Your secretary, along with Dr.

P. S. Wilkinson of San Antonio. Texas, were in Cleveland Ohio when the National Council was chartered, incorporated and launched. Your secretary was privileged to sign this charter as a representative of the National Baptis. Convention of America.

There were forty-two denominations that gave official recognition to and became a part of this Council, which has various ramifications of religious activities, taking in the inter-denominations, but not committing them to any police other than as they organize and carry on in their respective

The President of the National Baptist Convention of America, Dr. G. L. Prince, the First Vice-president, Dr. C. D. Pettiway, along with Dr. J. N. Byrd, Dr. P. S. Wilkinson. Dr. J. W. Williams and your humble servant were named on the National Council, and it was the privilege of your secretary to meet in the first call meeting that was held in Chicago, Illinois in March of this year.

We met the financial requirement provided for a denomination in the Constitution, without calling upon the National Baptist Convention of America to go into them limited exchequer to meet these assessments. We recommend a continuation of this membership.

## THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS

The secretary wishes to report that the forty-seventh annual session of the Sunday School Congress was held in San Francisco, California June 6-10 of this year with the churches of the bay cities area, led by their pastors and officers acting as hosts. The Congress headquarters where all the general sessions were held was the Macedonia Baptist Church, Rev. P. S. Ogborne pastor. The religious fervor of the occasion was at burning heat, so to speak, because of the evangelistic spirit, the denominational enthusiasm and the conventional ideals being stressed and felt from early morning each day until the close of the night session.

The attendance this year, along with the enrollment and registration, were evidence conclusive that the need for this Summer School of Methods, this Department of our Religious Education, is acknowledged and will be supported. Thirty-two states were reported as having been enrolled along with two foreign countries. The Story of the Congress is to appear either in the Convention Teacher in the last quarter of this year or the first quarter of next year. Many

of the papers read at this Summer School of Methods have appeared in the National Baptist Union-Review, and the Board anticipates and contemplates bringing out another edition of the Thoughts And Sayings of the Congress.

It is gratifying to report that many of the leaders of the National Baptist Convention Of America were also present in San Francisco during the Congress, because the Executive Board meeting for our convention was held, at which time the elected officers, from President Prince on down, including the heads of the various auxiliaries, were in attendance.

## THE PRINTING PAPER SITUATION

Nothing is definite at this writing as to where the cost of print paper will go, nor what the government will do with regard to rationing and restricting the use, even to religious publishers. The matter is in the hands of the most capable executives of the religious printing industry, and a committee from the Protestant Church-Owned Publishers Association is constantly on duty in the nation's capital, composed of three well informed religious leaders who are familiar with government machinery, who are personally acquainted with the leaders in both the House and Senate. to see that religious publishers and printers are given every possible consideration, in the light of the fact that they serve the armed forces, furnishing material to Chaplains and for religious services at the various camps.

The secretary of your Board has made the contributions annually, even to hospitals where soldiers are being cared for, and yet there has been three advances in prices in the cost of print paper, since we made our last annual report to

THE LABOR SITUATION

#### you for the 1950 convention year.

Securing trained help, keeping a supply of journeymen printers, pressmen and men and women who are familiar with the work of the fourth estate in the art preservative is a daily problem. All of this is due to the fact that few young people now-adays, after they finish college and secure their degrees, are willing to come in as apprentices; in other words, they are not particular about starting at the bottom, learning the printing or publishing trade, and then wait their chance of advancement or promotion. There is a continuous turn over in labor, yet, in spite of this your Board has lived up to the Wage-Hour Law, and has not violated knowingly, any of the rules or regulations of the Labor Regulation Board of the U. S. Government.

Men and women who have organized themselves into various groups are constantly making demands for shorter hours, higher pay, vacation periods with pay, but religious publishers have found it difficult to grant these demands and to meet the requests that are constantly before us; yet your Board has kept a sufficient number of men and women at work so that we have not missed the issuing of our periodicals regularly, nor any of our weekly publications. It has not been easy however, because when you are training help you must take well-trained people to train and guide the work of an apprentice: so you are paying two salaries and getting only a part of the regular production. But we are optimistic, and feel that we are making some headway along this particular line.

# OUR EDITORIAL DEPARTMENT AND ITS WORKERS

One of the greatest problems before your Board is that of securing competent editorial writers who are well versed along theological lines, who understand the principles of our denomination, and who, in the language of my father, the late R. H. Boyd, who used to say, can be relied upon as strictly orthodox and purely baptistic. There is a crying need for editorial writers who are specializing in and trying to do something along the improvement line of building a periodical, getting out lessons, writing materials for the various grades in our Sunday schools, B. Y. P. U's and other church auxiliaries.

We have never been able to secure an editorial writer to give full time in the production of B. Y. P. U. literature and its various arms, such as the B. T. U., B. T. S., B. A. U., the Primary and the Intermediate. We have done very well in bringing out the Senior and Junior B. Y. P. U. Periodicals.

At present our editorial department is only partially statled. The editor-in-chief or editorial secretary does not live in Nashville. This causes sometimes a delay in getting proofs back corrected and in the hands of the printer, but it has not been a serious threat, due to the fact that we work practically one year in advance.

who been in correspondence with several ministers who feel that they are interested in this phase of work, but no reached any definite conclusion or agreement with them

# HOPE MAGAZINE, A MONTHLY PUBLICATION

Without missing a single issue during the past year the Hope Magazine has appeared with clock-like regularity. It is the same highclass periodical now that it has been in the past years, with much improvement. It is calculated to help Mission Circles, Women's Auxiliaries, Sewing Circles, Women's Church Clubs, and it carries many splendid recipies that can be used and are being used advantageously. The editorial work of this publication which your Board took over almost twenty years ago, is conducted by Miss Mae E. Hunter who does the editorial work on this publication, assists in the editorial department and conducts the Fireside School program in Nashville.

We are recommending that this periodical be continued. We have kept the price down in spite of the high cost of

labor and material.

# NATIONAL BAPTIST UNION-REVIEW

For fifty-two weeks during the past convention year your Board has put out, published, circulated and paid all operating expenses of the National Baptist Union-Review, the official organ of the National Baptist Convention of America. The publication is in volume 57, and will soon be fifty-eight years old. It was launched more than a half century ago by the late R. H. Boyd, your former secretary. It costs your Board around \$550.00 every week to keep this paper going, pay the cost of printing, type setting, binding, postage, clerk hire and other incidental expenses that newspapers must bear if their publications continue to go. Rev. M. C. Allen, D. D., President of the Virginia Theological Seminary and College at Lynchburg, Virginia, has served as editor during the past convention year.

Your Board has felt and still feels that the National Baptist Convention of America should bear at least one-third of the operating cost rather than continue to pay just one half of the salary of an editor. The problem of bringing out a religious newspaper every week is far greater than that of bringing out a secular paper, due to the fact that a secular newspaper can take any kind of advertising to help meet its operating cost, and then it can sell the paper on the streets each week at from ten to fifteen cents per copy, while this religious newspaper must keep in the narrow channel of possibility of circulation, made necessary because only certain matter should be put in the paper each week.

Your secretary recommended a plan more than fifted years ago, which was received by the convention but never put into operation by the pastors, that would have relieved the financial embarrassment and would have put not the National Baptist Convention of America's treasur a minimum of \$100,000,00 a year. The secretary still feel that this should be a part of the convention's program for the next fiscal year, and that a place should be given in the convention to discuss improvements, increase in circulation with departments in the paper carrying matter effecting not only the various boards from week to week but some body should be selected to maintain a "President's Column," so that every week, (if not the Chief Executive of our convention) some one representing him, should speak to the demonination through the National Baptist Union-Review.

# OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL PERIODICALS

A complete line of Periodicals appearing quarterly and annually has been produced by your board in the plant struated at 523 2nd Avenue. North. The range of these periodicals and these publications carrying source material begins with the Picture Lesson Card and goes clear through our Sunday school and church Auxiliaries set up until we reach the Sunday School Lesson Commentary, which is yet the premier publication in the whole line, published regularity.

While it is admitted that the improvements that we invisioned sometime ago have not all been reached, the publications have kept abreast with the lesson trends without pitching their scope of reading matter beyond the masses. For many years the secretary of your board has recommended to you and the convention that a policy be invoked through our denomination whereby a piece of religious literature can be placed into every Baptist home, so that a real ocular demonstration of that passage of scripture which says: "Thy Word is a Lamp to my feet and a Light to my pathway can become a reality; because many homes have no Bibles, but these Sunday school periodicals carrying out the regular Cycle arranged by the Lesson Committee, with the Daily Home Readings and Reviews will enable the people who keep up with them to go through the Bible every five years.

We recommend therefore, that our leaders in the pulpits, in the teaching staff and the faculty of our educational department urge the carrying out of this recommendation in the local church; that is, "A piece of Baptist literature in every home."

# THE BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION

This phase of our denominational work is in the hands of a Board created years ago when the Constitution of our convention was amended. This Board has a chairman, a secretary and members from each state convention or general association represented in the National Baptist Convention of America, but the printing and publishing of the material and magazines of that Board was delegated to the National Baptist Publishing Board by the Convention, which, at the Muskogoe. Oklahoma session some years ago voted that all the printing in the National Baptist Convention of America as a recognized body should be done by its own Publishing House, namely the National Baptist Publishing Board at Nashville, Tennessee.

In keeping therefore, with the work of the B. Y. P. U. Board we have issued two Magazines every quarter, namely the Senior and the Junior. Along with these we have produced for circulation, and distribution B. Y. P. U. Pins, both celluloid and gold-filled, Pennants, Arm Bands, Constitutions. Manuals and various Cards such as Invitation and Membership, Object Charts and Wall Charts, and have offered to the B. Y. P. U. Board to carry a column in the Union-Review each week if some official of that board would edit the column. We have not attempted to bring out a Magazine for the B. T. U., which is the Baptist Training Union. for the B. A. U., Baptist Adult Union, the Primary or Intermediate Departments, but we have told many state leaders that when their local groups could assure this board that the bringing out of these three new publications would be justifiable by the circulation and distribution in the way of sales. and when we could find some one selected by this board or directed by this board to edit these three periodicals, the matter could be gone into discussed and finally decided upon.

# THE NATIONAL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON COMMENTARY

There was brought out from your plant through its edi. torial department, its mechanical department and its print ing presses a complete Commentary on the Sunday School lessons, using the International Lesson Series, Subjects Texts. Daily Home Reading and other Outlines. We want to bring to the attention of your board the fact that has often been referred to that this was the first Sunday School Lesson Commentary published by any Baptists in the United States. It was fifty-three years ago last September while your convention was in session in Boston, Mass., that the first Commentary was presented to the Convention, and when such noted Baptists as Drs. Rowland, Morehouse and others who were present in Boston, told my father, the late R. H. Boyd, that a Baptist Sunday School Lesson Commentary could not be printed, could not be maintained, that it would be too expensive. My father listened to them, and his only remark to them at that time was: "Maybe it cannot, but I done done it " and he produced the Commentary.

He further stated back there, more than a half century ago, that "this board does not count dollars and cents when it comes to making a Baptist," so since that time the Commentary has appeared with clock-like regularity. The editorial secretary, Rev. E. H. Borden, D. D., and his able co-workers in that department have furnished the manuscript, your board has set the type, completed the press work and binding, and in Cincinnati, Ohio it will again distribute at least three hundred specimen copies to those leaders who have discriminating taste, and who would like to look at it, criticize it, and then adopt it as one of their text books in their Sunday school teachers' meeting and their state meetings, and then use it in their respective church schools.

# MARCH AGAIN OBSERVED AS MEMORIAL MONTH

Th ough the cooperation of the R. H. Boyd Memorial Commission of which the Rev. A. A. Lucas, D. D., of Houston, is the chairman, the month of March 1951 was again observed by disconsing forces of the United States. Canada Mayic in throughout the confines of the territories of the National Baptist Convention of America, even down in Panama and in the Bahama Islands. A Suggested Outline Program for observing this day or any day, whether

in March or later on, honoring the late R. H. Boyd who organized the National Baptist Publishing Board, and who built the magnificent plant housing this printing and publishing establishment in Nashville, Tenn., was printed in the National Baptist Union-Review and sent to thousands of schools and organizations requesting it.

While few donations were sent in the Commission and the National Baptist Publishing Board expressed their gratitude for the observance of this occasion, and were glad to print a report from those who sent them in. We recommend that your board continue to work with the R. H. Boyd Memorial Commission, thus keeping alive the occasion, perpetuating his name and handing down to coming generations the life and work of one of the greatest leaders of our day in Baptist circles.

## THE BAHAMA ISLAND BAPTIST MISSION WORK

Your board has continued its cooperative work and its encouraging contributions to the seventy or more churches of the Bahamas of which Rev. Talmage Sands is the Superintendent of Missions, and which organization is one of the objectives of the National Baptist Convention of America. Your board has contributed the literature to these Baptist-churches for their Sunday school, B. Y. P. U. and other church circles. We not only donated the literature for the past year as heretofore, but we advanced the money to pay the postage at the foreign postal rate. We also donated cash amounting to fifty dollars this past year to assist Rev. Mr. Sands in helping to furnish food and lodging for the representatives of these churches who met in Nassau for their 1951 Conference.

Your secretary recommends that we continue to give this literature each quarter to assist the Rev. Mr. Sands and his workers in having periodicals carrying source material and study courses for the Baptist young people as well as the grown ups in these Islands.

#### OUR PANAMA WORK ON THE CANAL ZONE

Your secretary is pleased to report that our Panama work on the Canal Zone has continued to progress under the splendid superintendency of Mrs. Bessie M. Thorbourne, the widow of the late Rev. R. H. Thorbourne, who was taken to Panama some years ago by the late R. H. Boyd and who

established the work of the National Baptist Convention of America in that small bit of territory that connects North America and South America. It is a section called Central

America.

Mrs. Thorbourne has been a painstaking, patient, determined Baptist leader. In succeeding to the work a superintendent left vacant by the death of her husband she has done a notable task. She is ably assisted by the Revs. S. N. Brown and A. W. Crooks, whom we designate on he recommendation as her helpers. They are maintaining four churches. They are sent their checks regularly every month from the National Baptist Publishing Board. While the amount is not large it serves to show these workers that the National Baptist Publishing Board of the National Baptist Convention of America appreciates the exceptional service that they are rendering.

In addition to the checks sent regularly the Board donate Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. literature to be used in ther auxiliaries. The board also gives two extra donations raised at the National Model Sunday School in June and September of each year. A third donation was sent this year to Mrs. Thorbourne following the receipt of a letter from her saying the termites had attacked the parsonage that wabuilt years ago, so that she would have some money to help make these needed repairs. Your board recommends again that a nation-wide campaign be put on to raise at least twenty thousand dollars to repair the two churches that are badly in need of attention, and that if it is possible, additional money be raised to bring Mrs. Thorburne back to the states where she might spend at least three months to visit the homeland where she was born.

#### ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

One of the perplexing problems of your board reported to you again this year by the secretary is the large amount of cash owing to the National Baptist Publishing Board by individuals, churches, associations and state conventions which we call Accounts receivable. This amount represent credit extended in the form of printing, literature sales and other service, for which the board enters a charge. We are also still burdened with checks that are sent to us in payment of service, supplies, etc., which checks after being deposited in our bank are often returned marked "Insufficient Funds" or No Account in this Bank." Every time one of

these checks is put in the bank and is not honored, it comes back to us through our bank with a minimum charge of from fifty cents to one dollar, so instead of collecting the money we have to pay the banks when the checks are not cleared or cashed.

We have tried in every way humanly possible to call the attention of the Baptist forces to this situation. For an example, if we extend one hundred thousand dollars worth of credit annually and do not collect one hundred thousand dollars, then that increases the indebtedness by six thousand, making the amount one hundred and six thousand dollars, because six percent interest is expected on all open accounts, known as carrying charge. Augmenting this burdon is the expense of writing letters to these people, supplying the postage, paying the clerk hire, furnishing letterheads and envelopes.

Your Board therefore recommends that our denominational leaders, through our pastors, superintendents and church auxiliary heads see that if a check is sent in payment of an account, that it be certified at the bank, or that they end a postal note, express money order, or some currency exchange, or the cash by registered mail.

# EMPLOYEES BENEFIT PLAN BY THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD

Your secretary wishes to report that we have in force what is called the Employees Benefit Plan, extended to those on the payroll of the National Baptist Publishing Board's plant, and members of the National Baptist Publishing Board. The Plan is as follows: Every person on the payroll who has worked for at least three months is presented at two thousand dollar Group Insurance Policy, which policy is written in one of the largest insurance companies in the United States. The employee has the right to name the beneficiary, so that at his or her death the two thousand dollars will be paid to the person designated by them while they lived.

In addition to this they also receive two Hospitalization Policies in two large insurance companies. These Hospitalization Policies provide a minumum of five dollars per day during the time they are in the hospital, not exceeding a

certain number of weeks. It further provides payment for doctor's fee, operations, surgical supplies, and where the employee is a woman it provides for maternity service.

We feel now, as we have always felt, that this protection and this service are appreciated by the people who are on the payroll of the National Baptist Publishing Board, and we recommend its continuance.

# FIRE AND TORNADO INSURANCE CARRIED ON THE PLANT

Your secretary is reporting to you that we have continued to carry all kinds of insurance on the physical plant of your board which provide a protection and safeguard. For an example few people realize that when you carry fire insurance it does not protect your property if a wind storm or toppado blows the building down, and this falling of the building causes electric wires to cross or something like that, and the building catches fire. In order to protect against this we carry fire insurance and fire—and wind storm insurance. This is what you call full coverage.

We also maintain a watchman's clock, so that the night watchman during the night and holidays must go over the building in every department every hour, because there are eighteen or twenty stations to be punched. We also carry employee's liability and compensation insurance, so that if any one is hurt on the plant your board is protected by the insurance company. We carry insurance on the board's Chrysler truck against fire and collisions.

Your secretary feels that every safeguard humanly possible has been thrown around the board, its personnel and its property.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS

The 47th Annual Session of the Sunday School Congressions where the Summer School of Methods, had an auspiconsession this year, as it was the first time that this organization of the Colden West. ## EVANGELISM BY THE NEW TESTAMENT METHOD FOR BAPTIST CHURCHES

With much interest in this subject on New Tostament Evangelia I submit this statement to you for further study.

There are many examples given us in the New Testament. These are recorded for a very practical reason, that reason is not only be we might know how the early Church began and continued through its mittal stages, but that we might have a practical method by what we ourselves may do effective work

This year of eyangelism in which Baptist Churches are pulled forth definite efforts to reach the unsaved are both a confession in we have been failing in the past to reach lost souls, and a call to the whole Body of our churches to give ourselves anew to this great do and privilege. This writer, therefore offers this in soul-saving of the New Testament Method. As we study the chapters in the Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, we meet three persons involved in the salvation of every soul, namely: Gud, the Christian, and the state

It is interesting to notice the manner in which these three act and the manner seems to be the same in every case, and the manner in which souls are saved today must be the same,

#### SALVATION IS OF GOD-

This salvation is not only His eternal purpose, the plan carried out in Christ, but also the power by which each one is reached. Jesus insisted upon this great truth when He commanded the apostles and disciples to wait. He had given the Great Commission to go forth with the Gospel in all nations, beginning in Jerusalem, and in all Judea not neglecting Samaria, and keeping on to the ultermost part of the earth, but He told them to wait. God has promised power for the performance of this task. That power is the Holy Spirit. They were praying, therefore, not for the unsaved people of Jerusalem, not to implore God to be willing to save people whom they were naming to Him but, they were communing with God that this Mighty Truth might grip them, realizing that the power for the great task must come from God. Before Jesus told His disciples to go, He had said "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth, Go ye therefore." We can go into this work so much needed today if we believe that God is now able and willing to do this great thing for the performance of which we feel so inadequate. Mark ends his gospel with a verse which might be called an epitome of the Acts of the Apostles He said: "And they went forth and preached everyhere the Lord working with them." Here is in part the reason why many who are asked to undertake personal work, answer, "I can't," 'Truly they cannot. They do not have the power. But any and every Christian, the ones who were then in the early Church and those who now are members of the Church, are sure of success if they once learn that God will do this great thing if we shall let Him use us as His human agencies to accomplish what He wishes through us in His own way. God is able, God can; let us wait for the power of God's Holy Spirit. No evangelist can do this work, no Paster, no Church Leader. na Christian but God can, in the salvation of souls God always seems n use the Christian as-

THE CHANNEL OF HIS SAVING POWER

If this is the New Testament Method, then it is not strange if so few have been saved in recent years during which so little personal work has been done by Christian people. The few who have been added to the churches on confession of faith have doubtless been saved through the personal agency of Pastors and Sunday School Teachers and the few others who have allowed God to use them as human hands by which He might touch the unsaved.

God uses preaching, but it is not the first approach to the unsaved The first touch is a personal witness of a believer. The preaching follows, giving instruction, offering the invitation, affordng the necasion for decision and open confession. How ever hidden, it seems that in every case there is the personal approach of the individual Christian. Now I hear this statement as another reason why me Christians are unwilling to undertake personal work to reach the unsaved. "The exercise of this wonderful privilege implies," that

THAT THE SOUL-SAVER IS WILLING FOR CHRIST TO SAVE HM' from his 6wn sin. If there remains sin, allowed, tolerated sin, in that the Spirit has pointed as sin; sin that the Christian has never unsented to give up, God will not use that one as an agent to save some other one. Christians, to be used, must come to the Master that He may wash their feet from the sin which comes from contact with the dusty road of this evil world. God is waiting to be gracious; to fit each one for the service: but we are told to wait until we have been made ready. This brings us, then, to the third person involved

in this great matter of soul-saving.

The New Testament tells us of God's method of dealing with the SINNER himself. There seems to be no case of the worker roing out indiscriminately to approach the unsaved. Probably here is the leason why many carnest Christians who believe that God is able to save sinners today have not actually undertaken to enter upon the Holy Task Just where shall the willing Christian start, whom shall he approach and how and when? We feel bewildered when thrust out into the great mass of the unsaved. God does not seem ever to subject His workers to such conclusion. God sends His willing agent, depending upon Divine Power, confessing and abandoning his own sin, to the particular sinner whom He Himself has prepared for this one's approach. Ah, what a difference! Here is something definite It is one thing for God to say to the witnessing Christian to go out and approach the unsaved, but it is another thing for God to send Philip to interview the Ethiopian eunuch and lead him to Christ. It is another thing for God to show to Philip that He has prepared this inquirer for the approach of His worker.

A NEW TESTAMENT METHOD-to a meeting held in 1933, led by Rev. Wade C., Smith, in the church of Dr. Ferrin in Augusta Ga., this whole plan was beautifully carried out. This minister, Rev. Smith was wonderfully used of God. With fine effect this simple and effective New Testament Method of soul-saving was used. The evangelist and the people were saying to God continually. "Thine is the Power. The Christian was offered the distinction of allowing the Master to use him, then a simple method was employed of assigning to every worker some particular person designated by the Lord.

Himself

It may not be possible for us to review every single instance or case given in the New Testament record, but we mention a few Let us take first, the case mentioned. Philip and the eunuch: Here is a man chosen as a deacon, but who allowed God to fill him with the Holy Spirit: and whose influence is first described in a general way as he wrought in Samaria. Then we are permitted to have an exemple of God's method of using such a man. Philip was definitely directed to go down the Gaza Road He obeyed, expecting God to do something wonderful. Here came in sight a chariot, soon the occupant became visible. Later it was seen that the man was reading. then, that it was the Bible that he was reading Here was not only a point of natural contact, but an evidence that the man was being prepared by God for Philip's work. A man reading the Bible is open to a soul-sever, it was of God that the very Pessage was a prophery of the atoning work of Christ. Philip began at this point to preach Jesus to the Ethiopian officer. This sinner accepted Christ and was baptized and went on his way rejoicing. There was nothing indefinite confusing or embarassing to Philip or the eunuch. It was Gods method and it succeeded.

Then take Peter and Cornelius. God had a time getting Peter in shape to be used. He prepared the centurion before Peter ever heard

that such a person existed, then in a wonderful way He brought together the Christian witness and the prepared sinner

Take the lame mun, and Peter and John It was of God that they made connection at the Beautiful Gate of the temple. Peter and James were just going when the begger was being carried in. Peter emlained that the miracle was performed by the Lord whom they had crucified

There are many varieties of this plan, but at the bottom it is always this method. Even in the case of Jesus and the wuman of Sameria at Jacob's well. To her Jesus was the human agent, she, the sinner, conscious of her sin as she revealed by coming all this way to draw water from Jacob's well for ceremonial purification, while the Messiah whom she later recognized in Jesus did the supernatural saving. In this case, the woman turned right around and became the human touch with her neighbors and brought them to Jesus.

How wonderful if each one of us should believe that God is ready and waiting just now to repeat these New Testament Wonders through us to save the many who are perishing all around us! Why not allow Him to clear our lives of anything which would be in the way of our effectiveness as soul-winners? Why not be ready as we arise each day to report to God for duly if He has any human contact for us to make that day". We should be watchful and ready to follow up any opening which is made. How wonderful it would be if we should leagn from this year of evangelism and from such leaders as these evangelists who have followed this New Testament plan, that each of our churches may be reaching the unsaved by means of this NEW TESTAMENT METHOD OF SOUL-SAVING

SOME OLD TESTAMENT EVANGELISTS-

As helpers to us we can notice some Old Testament Evongelists: Here we find a number of different kinds of Evangelists and

evangelism, we should learn something from each named.

Isaiah is often referred to as the greatest Old Testament Evangelist. He certainly called people to repentance and showed them the way back to God. An intensive study of his great chapters reveals that illumination to us who are trying to preach evangelistic sermons. Notice his first chapter, see the picture of people going through all the forms and ceremonies of religion. They are boing up to the House of God. making the required number and kinds of offerings theerving all the Sabbaths and Holy Days, going through all of the forms of prayers, and doing all the things that were required of them in the Mosaic ritual: yet Isaiah tells us that the Lord is weary of them, that their religious services are abominations to Him and that He does not and will not hear their prayers. In the language of the apostle Paul, they had all the outward forms of godliness but lacked the power thereof. What was the matter" The Evangelist tells them their sins were the separation between them and their God robbing them of Spiritual power

When the Minister speaks to us about our sins we at once think of our personal sins, if we think at all, and it is well that we should do so. Personal sins must be repented of and put away first of all: but Issiah lays his main emphasis upon what we call social sins. Listen to his words: "Wash you, make you clean, put away the evil of your doings from before mine eyes; cease to do evil; Learn to do well; seek judgment, (justice) relieve the appressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow." When the present day preacher calls us to repentance it never occurs to us that it may be that we have oppressed some defenceless person or persons, that we have failed to stand or practice for social justice: or that we have robbed widows and orphans of their rights. Perhaps the time has come when we who are preachers be like Isaiah of old, call people to repentance, not only for their personal sins, but for the social sins in which they may have a conscious or unconscious part.

We hear it often said that the days of revivals are over, we need not expect another revival as they had in the days of Whitfield and Moody. Times have changed. People talk as if God Himself has changed, and can no longer do the things that He did on Pentecost. or in the time of the Wesleys. They probably talked that way in Isalah's time, hear him in his fifty-ninth chapter; "Behold the Lords hand, is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither his ear heavy that it cannot hear." What was the matter then as people were not being saved and God did not seem to hear. He tells them in no uncertain terms: "Your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you, that he will not hear. For your hands are defiled with blood, and your fingers with iniquity; your lips have spoken lies, your tongue hath muttered perverseness. None calleth for justice, tsocial justice) nor any pleadeth for truth." Again you will observe that Isaiah charges them not only with personal sins but with social sins. Their hands were defiled with the blood of their fellow men. He was not thinking of murder but of oppression. The people did not practice social justice themselves, and did not stand out fer it out in social order. I have referred to only two passages in Isaiah. There are many more like them. He exposes and condemns all kinds of public and social sins. Let us study his great sermons. Make a list of the thomes that they touch and see what a large range is rovered in his preaching.

Now let us study another great prophet who lived at the same time. MICAH—Micah was another great prophet and evangelist. His sermons are not as long as those of Isaiah: but you cannot judge the greatness of a preacher by the length of his sermons.

In his sixth chapter, Mieah represents God as calling His people to a great debate. The mountains are to be the witnesses God charges His people of being weary of Him. They cannot understand, certainly they had been going through all the forms of worship prescribed in the writings of Moses and making all the offerings required in the ritual. What more could God want? Would He be satisfied if they would multiply their offerings of calves and rams and oil. Or did He want them to sacrifice their first born to Him as some of the surrounding nations did their gods? The prophet replies. "He hath shewed. O mbn. what is good: and what doth the Lord require of these but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?" Justice and mercy are social virtues. The failure to do justly and to love mercy are social virtues. The failure to do justly and to love mercy are social sins. So we hear Micab. like Isniah. his contemporary, calling the people to repentance for their social sins.

AMOS was another Old Testament Evangelist. He has been styled as a Billy Sunday type. He says that he was neither a prophet nor the son of prophet, but just a herdman, and that God called him to bear a message to Israel. He is the most rugged of all the

prophets and Evangelists of the Old Testament. The sins which he denounces are nearly all social sins. Examine chapter 2, parts of verses 1, and 4, 5 and 6; and verse 7, and 8. In the same prophet we have a picture of the people going through all the outward forms of religion and yet lacking the power thereof Read the words in chapter interpreter. We have seen this picture; chapter 5, verses 21, 22, 23, and 24. We learn from these words the true service of God and not a gorgeous display—but true service of justice rolling on—with no drying up.

With times out of joint, with many tramping our streets in despair, while others live in comfort and luxury, it may be time for us to inquire why such irregularity. We find that war, extreme individualism and extreme capitalism. Inxurious living, the love of dividends in high places, and other similar social sins have conspired to bring about the situation in which the world finds itself today. What would happen if the modern day Evangelists would speak out as plainly as the old Prophets and Evangelists did? We, in our National Bodies meet annually. Will we re-affirm our work of Evangelism and seek to catch the spirit of these old Prophets and with the call to Evangelism issue a call to the people to repent of and turn away from the sins, personal and social which have brought this world to the verge of ruin?

# THE ENDUCEMENT OF THE SPIRIT Rev. J. Caldwell Nicholes. A. B., B. D.

We have maintained previously that the baptism in the Holy Ghost was given once for all on the day of Poncecost, when the Paraclete came in person to make his abode in the Church.

It does not follow therefore that every believer has received this Baptism. God's gift is one thing; our appropriation of that gift is quite another thing. Our relations to the second and to the third persons of the God-head is exactly parallel in this respect. "God so loved the world that He gave His only Begotten Son."-John 3:16. But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the children of God, even to them that believe on His name,-John 1:12 Here are the two sides of salvation, the divine and the human, which are absolutely co-essential. It is as sinners we accept Christ for our justification, but it as sons that we accept the Spirit for our sanctification. "And because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the Spirit of His Son in your hearts crying Abba Father."-Gal. 4:6. Thus when Peter preached his first sermon to the multitude after the Spirit had been given, he said, "Repent and be baptized everyone of you, in the Name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost: Acts

This passage shows that logically and chronologically the gift of the Spirit is subsequent to repentance.

It is evident—says one of our ablest writers commenting on this text—that the reception of the Holy Ghost as here spoken of has nothing whatever to do with bringing men to believe, and repent. It is a subsequent operation: it is an additional and separate esslag; it is a privilege founded on faith already actively working in the heart. The reason is quite simple. The gift of the Hoy that

is grounded on the fact that we are sons by faith in Christ, believ. ers resting on redemotion in Him. Plainty, therefore, it appears that the Spirit of God has already regenerated us

Now as we examine the Scriptures on this point, we shall see that we are required to appropriate the Spirit as sons in the same way we appropriate Christ as sinners. "As many as received Him even to them that believe on His Name," is the condition of becoming sons, as we have seen, receiving and believing being used as equivalent terms.

If we turn from New Testament leaching to New Testament example, we are strongly confirmed in this impression. In 19th chapter of Acis. Paul having found certain disciples at Ephesus said unto "Did ye receive the Holy Ghost when ye believed." And they said unto him. Nay, we did not so much as hear whether there is a Holy Ghost. This passage seems decisive as showing that one may be a disciple without having entered into possession of the Spirit as God's gift to believers. Paul then laid his hands upon them and "the Holy Ghost came upon them." it is added that, "they spoke with tongues and prophesied. They experienced or came into the same condition with the upper room disciples, who received Him some 20 years prior-and of whom it was written that, "they were all filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Let us transfer this incident of the Ephesian Christians to our own times. We need not bring forward an imaginary case, for by the testimony of many experienced withesses, the same condition is constantly encountered. Not only individual Christians but whole communities of disciples are found, who have been so imperfectly Instructed that they have never known that there is a Holy Spirit, except as an influence an impersonal something to be vaguely recognized Of the Holy Ghost as a Divine Person, dwelling in the church, to be honored and invoked, and obeyed and implicitly trusted, they know nothing. Is it conceivable that there could be any deep spiritual life or any real sanctified energy for service in a community like this? And what should a well instructed teacher or evangelist do on discovering a church or an individual Christian in such a condition?

Let us turn to another possage in Acts for the answer Now when the Apostles that were at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had received the Word of God they sent unto them Peter and John who when they were come down, prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Ghost; for as yet He had fallen upon none of them only they were baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid their hands on them and they received the Holy Ghost -Acis 8:14-17. Here were believers who had been baptized in water. But this was not enough. The baptism of the spirit already bestowed at Pentecosi must be appropriated.

We conceive that the great end for which the enduement of the Spirit is bestowed is our qualification for the highest and most effective service in the Church of Christ

Let us observe that Christ who is our example in this as in all things did not enter upon His ministry till he had received the Holy Ghost. Not only so, but we see that all His service from His baptism to His ascension was wrought in the Spirit. Ask concerning His miracles and we hear Hun saying. I, by the Spirit of God res; out devils" Matt 12:28. As's concerning that sacrifice which He accomplished at Jerusalem, and we read," that He through the Bernat Spirit offered H.mself without sput unto God.-Heb 9 14. ask concerning the giving of the Great Commission and we read that He was received up "after that He (brough the Holy Ghost had given commandment unto the Apostles."-Acts 1:2 Thus though He was the Son of God. He acted ever in supreme reliance upon Him who has been called the Executive of the God-head,

Planty we see how Christ was our pattern and example in His relation to the Holy Spirit. He had been begotten of the Holy that is the womb of the Virgin, and had lived that hely and obecent life which this Divine Nativity would imply But when He would ente; upon His public career, He waited for the Spirit to tome upon Him, as He had hitherto been in Him. For this anoingme we find Him braying: "Jesus also being naphized and praying, the heaven was opened and the Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon Him."-Luke 3:22 Had He any promise of the Father, to plead, as He now asked the anothting of the Spirit, if as we may believe this was the subject of His prayer? Yes He had a promise it had been written in the prophets concerning Him. The Rod out at the Stem of Jesse: And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest soon Him; the Spirit of Wisdom and Understanding, the Spirit of Counsel and Might, the Spirit of Knowledge and of the fear of the Lord,-Isa. 11:2 "The promise of the sevenfold Spirit," the Jewish commentators call it.

Certainly it was laterally fulfilled upon the Son of God at the Jordan, when God gave Him the Spirit within measure For He who was now haptized was in turn to be haptizer. "Upon whom thou shalt see the Smrit descending and remaining on Him the same is He which haptizes with the Holy Ghost-John 1:33. 'Indeed naplize you in water unto repentance, but He that cometh after me is mightier than I, He shall baptize you in the Holy Ghost and in fire"-Matt 3:11

And now being at the right band exalted and having the seven Spirits of God." Rev. 33, the tu new of the Holy Ghost. He will med forth His power upon those who pray for it, even as the Father then a forth on Himself.

Let us observe now the symbols and descriptions of the Enduement of the Spirit which are applied equally to Christ, and to the disciples of Christ. THE SEALING OF THE SPIRIT-Listen to Jesus as He speaks to the multitude that sought Him for the loaves and fishes. Labor not for the meat which perishelb but for that meat which endureth unto eternal life, which the Son of Man shall give you, for Him hath God the Father sealed - John 6:27. This sealing named evidently refer to His reception of the Spirit at the Jordan.

We are told by those who know that it was the custom for the priest to whom the service perfained, having selected a lam from the flock to inspect it with the minutest scrutiny in order to distover, if it was without physical defect, and then to seal it with the temple seal, thus certifying that it was fit for sacrdice in the food Beholft the Lamb of God presenting Himself for ins at the Jordan Under the Father's Omniscent scruting the , found to be "A Lamb without blemish and without spot." From the opening heaven God given witness to the fact in the Words: "This is my Beloved Son in whom I am well pleased," and then He puts the Holy Ghost upon Him, the testimony to His Sonship, the seal of His separation unto sacrifice and service.

The disciple is as His Lord in this experience. In whom having also believed we were scaled with the Holy Spirit of promise.—Eph. 1:13. As always in the statements of Scripture this transaction is represented as subsequent to faith. It is not conversion, but something done upon a converted soul, a kind of crown of consecration put upon his faith. Indeed the two events stand in marked contrast.

In consecration the believer receives the testimony of God, and sets his seal to it that God is true.—John 3:33. In consecration Gosets His seal upon the believer that he—the believer—is true. The last is Gods. "Armen," to the Christian, verifying the Christians, "Amen." to God. "Now He which established his with you in Christ, and anonned us, is God; who also sealed us and gave us the corneat of the Spirit in our hearts.—I Cor. I:21, 22. If we ask to what we are committed and seporated by this divine transaction, we may learn by studying the church's monograph if such we may name what is so brought out in a mysterious passage in one of the pastogal epishes. In spite of the defection and unbelief of some, the Apostle says: "Nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure having this seal."

Then he gives us the two inscriptions on the seal. (1) The Lord knoweth them that are His. (2) Let everyone that nameth the name of the Lord depart from unrighteousness.-II Tim. 2:19-Ownership and Holiness. When we receive the goft of the Holy Spirit it is that we may count ourselves henceforth and altogether Christ's. If anyone shrinks from this devotement, how can he have the fulness of the Spirit?. God cannot put His signature seal upon what is not his. Hence if under the sway of a Worldly Spirt we withhold ourselves from God and insist on self-ownership, we need not count it strange of God to withhold Himself from us and deny us the seal of Divine ownership. God is very jealous of his Divine Signet. He graciously bestows it upon those who are ready to devote themselves ulterly and irrevocably to His service, but He strenuously withholds it from those who, while professing His name are yet "serving divers lusts and pleasures." There is a suuggestive passage in the Gospel of John which translated so as to bring out the Antithesis which it conteins, reads thus: "Many trusted in His name beholding the signs which He did; but Jesus did not trust Himself to them."-John 2:23, 24. Here is the great essential to our having the seal of the Spirit Can the Lord trust us Ray; the question is more serious. Can He trust Himself to us? The Holy Spirit which is His signet ring. can He commit it to our use for signing our prayers and for certiourselves and His honor not be compromised?

The other inscription on the seal is: "Let every one that nameth the name of the Lord depart from unrighteousness." The possession of the pure commits us irrevacably to separation from sin. For what is holiness but an emanation of the Spirit of holiness which we is in us. sanctified life is therefore the print or impression of this seal. He can never own us without this mark, the stamp of

boliness. The devil's stamp is none of God's badge. Our Spiritual extraction from Him is but pretended unless we do things worthy of so illustrious a birth and becoming the honor of so great a Father.

The great office of the Spirit in the present economy is to communicate Christ to His Church which is His Body. And what is so truly essential of Christ as holiness? "In Him is no sin; whosever abideth in Him staneth not."—I John 3:8. The body can only be sinless by uninterrupted communion with the Head: the Head will not maintain communion with the body unless it be holy. The idea of ownership comes out still further in the words of the Apostles: "And grieve not the Holy Spirit or Spirit of God in whom ye were scaled unto the day of redemption."—Eph. 4:30.

The day of redemption is at the Advent of our Lord in glory when He shall raise the dead and translate the living. Now, His are in the world but the world knows them not. But He has put His mark and secret sign upon them, by which He shall recognize them at His coming. In that great quickening at the Redeemer's Advent; the Holy Spirit will be the seal by which the saints will be recognized and the power through which they shall be drawn up to God. "If the Spirit that raised up Josus dwell in you."—Rom. 11:3, is the great condition of final quickening. As the magnet attracts the particles of iron and attacks them to itself by first imparting its own, will draw them to Himself through the Spirit to His own, will draw them to Himself through the Spirit.

We must fear lest we mar the seal by which we are stamped to the very deface or obscure the signature by which we are to be recognized in the day of Redemption. Hustration—The allusion to the seal as a pledge of purchase would be understood readily by the Ephesiams. Ephesiams as maritime city seaport fown) which carried on an extensive trade in timber of shipmasters of neighboring ports. This was their method of purchasing: The merchant after selecting his timber, stamped it with his own brand, which was an acknowledged sign of ownership. Off times he did not carry off his possession at the time; it was left in the harbor with other fleets of timber; but it was CHOSEN, BOUGHT and STAMPED; and in due time the merchant sent a trusty agent with his brand, who finding that timber which bore a corresponding impress claimed and brought it away for the Master's use. Thus the Roly Spirit impresses on the sout NOW the image of Jesus Christ; and this is the sure pledge of the everlasting inheritance.

In a word the sealing of the Spirit, Himself now received by faith and resting upon the believer, with all the results in assurance in joy, and in empowering for service, which must follow His unhindered sway in the soul. One has said, If we can learn aright how Christ was scaled, we shall learn how we are sealed. The sealing of Christ by the Father is the communication of the Holy Spirit in the fulness to Him, nuthorizing Him unto and acting His divine power in all the acts and duties of His office, so as to evidence the presence of God with Him and approbation of Him. God's sealing of believess then is His gracious communication of the Holy Spirit unitary so to act His divine power in them as to enable them unto alt they duties of their Holy calling, evidencing them to be accepted with Him both for themselves and others, and asserting their preservation

unio eternal life.

## THE FULNESS OF THE SPIRIT

Immediately upon His baptism we read: "And Jesus full of the Holy Spirit returned from the fordan and was led by the Spirit iale the wilderness."-Luke 4:1 The same record is made concerning the upper room disciples, immediately after the descent of the Spirit. "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit."-Acts 2:4. What is here spoken seems nothing different from what in other Scriptures is called the reception of the Spirit. It is a transaction that may be repeated, and WILL be if we are living in the Spirit But it is an experience belonging to one who has already been converted This comes out plainly in the life of Paul. Why? One would ask a conversion so marked and so radical as that of the Apostle to the Gen tiles need be followed by such as experience as that named in Acu 9:17. "And Ananias departed and entered into the house and laying his hand on him said: "Brother Saul, the Lord, even Jesus who appeared unto thee in the way which thou camest, hast sent me that thou mightest receive thy sight and be filled with the Holy Ghost Here we have a divine something distinct from conversion and sub sequent to it, which we have called the recaption of the Spirit."

"The Enduement of Power" we may name if; for observe box constantly throughout the book of Acts mighty works and mighty ulterances are connected with this qualification. Then Peter filled with the Holy Ghost said unto them (Acts 4:8) "And they filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spoke the word with boldness." Acts 4:31. And they chose Stephen a man full of faith and of the Holy Chost the narrative was regarding the choice of deucons in Acts 6:5." AND HE BEING FULL OF THE HOLY GHOST is the keynote to his great marlyr-sermon. This intilling of the Spirit marks a decisive and most important crisis in the Christian life, judging from the slory of the Apostles conversion, to which we have just referred. This infilling of the Spirit belongs to us as a covenant privilege seems to be clear from Eph. 5:18. He not drunken with wine, wherein is excess but be filled with the Spirit Under the influence of strong drink there is an outpouring of all that the evil spirit inspiresfrivolity, profabily and riolous conduct. "Be God-intoxicated men." the Apostic would seem to say. "let the Spirit of God so control you that you shall pour yourself out in psalms and hymns and spiritual

THE ANOINTING OF THE SPIRIT

After the baptism Christ took to Himself the words of the prophet, as He read them in the synagogue of Nazareth: The Spirit of the Lord is upon mc, because He has anointed me to preach good tidings to the poor. -Luke 4:18 Twice in the Acts there is a reference to this important event in similar terms: "Thy holy servant Jesus whom then didst ancient "-Acts 4-27. "Jesus of Nazareth, bow that God anointed Him with the Holy Ghost and with power." Acts 10:38. And as with the Lord so with the disciples:" Now he that establisheth us with you in Christ, and anointed us is God."-II Cor 1:21. Every student of the Scriptures know the close relationship between all important offices and ministries of the servant of "Jah" and the ceremony of anointing under the old covenant.

The King was anointed that the Spirit of the Lord might rest upon him in power.- YSam. 18:15 The prophet was anointed that he might be the oracle of God to the people -1 Kings 19:16. No servant

of Jehovah was deemed qualified for his ministry without this holy anothying touch laid upon him. Even in the cleansing of the leger this ceremony was not wanting. The priest was required to dip his right finger in the oil that was in his left hand and to put it upon the tip of the right ear, upon the thumb of the right hand, and upon the great toe of the right foot of him that was cleansed. THE OIL upon THE BLOOD of the trespass offering.-Lev. 4:17. Thus with divine accuracy did even the types foretell the two-fold provision for the Christian life cleansing by the blood and ballowing by the oil of justification in Christ sanctification in the Spirit.

If we ask now what this anointing is, the reply is obviously the Holy Spirit himself. As before He was the seal attesting us, so now He is the oil sanctifying us-the same gifts described by different symbols. And as it was Aaron who had been the first anointed who was qualified to anoint others so with our great High Priest. It is He within the well who gives the Spirit unto us-his own,-that He may qualify them to be "an Elect Race, a royal priesthood, a hely notion, a people for God's own possession.- I Peter 2:9 "But ye have an anointing from the Holy One and ye know all things."-I John 27.20. Christ in the New Testament is constantly called the "Holy One, and because the Spirit was sent to communicate Him to the people, they are made partakers of His knowledge as well as of His holine\$5.

If it should be said that this unction of which John speaks is miraculous, the divine illumination of evangelists and prophets who were commissioned to be the Vehicles of inspired Scriptures, we must call attention to other passages which connect the knowledge of God with the Holy Ghost. For who among men knoweth the things of a man save the Spirit of a man' which is in him: even so the things of God none knoweth save the Spirit of God-I Cor. 2:11.

The horse and his rider may see the same magnificent piece of statuary in the park: the one may be delighted with it as a work of human genius, but upon the dull eye of the other it makes no impression, and for the reason that it takes the human eye to appreciale the work of the human mind. Likewise only the Spirit of God can know and make known the thoughts and teachings and revelations of God. This seems to be the meaning of John in his discourse concerning the divine unction. As in service, the contrast between working in the power of the Spirit and in the energy of the flesh is easily discernible, ever, more clearly in knowledge and teaching is the contrast between the tuition of learning and the intuition of the Spirit. While we should not undervalue the tuition of learning it is striking to note how the Bible puts the weightier emphasis on the intuition of the Spirit; so that really the unspiritual hearer is to be accounted less blameworthy for not discerning the truth than the intellectual preacher is for ex-

When, for example, one attempts with the utmost learning to pecting him to do so. convince an unbeliever of the Deity of Christ and falls, the Word of Scripture to Him is: "No man is able to say "Lord Jesus" save in the Holy Ghost -1 Cor. 12:3. The Spirit of Jesus can alone reveal to men the Lordship of Jesus, and this is the Key of Knowledge the Holy Ghost will never put into the hand of my man however learned As it is written that Christ is the 'raying forth' of the Father's glory, and "the express image of His person.-Heb. 1:3, thus by a beautiful figure reminding us that we can only see the sun in the rays of the sun, so we can only know God in Jesus Christ, who is the manifestation of God.

It is so likewise between the second and third persons of the Trinity. Christ is the image of the invisible God; the Holy Ghost is the invisible image of Christ. As Jesus manifested the Father outwardly, the Spirit manifests Jesus inwardly, forming Him within us as the hidden man of the heart, imaging Him to the Spirit by an interior impression which no intellectual instruction, however diligent, can effect.

In this profound discourse concerning the "unction" and accompanying illomination John was only expounding by the Spirit, what Jesus had said before His departure. "Howbeit, when He, the Spint of Truth is come, He will guide you into all truth; He shall glorify me; for He shall receive of mine and shall show it unto you.-John 16:13. "THE SPIRIT OF TRUTH - How much instruction and suggestion is conveyed by this term! As He is called "the Spirit of Truth," as manifesting the truth in all its depths and heights. As impossible as it is that we should know the person of Christ without the Spirit of Christ who reveals Him, so impossible it is that we should know the tenth as it is in Jesus without the Spirit of truth who is appointed to convey it. "The Spirit of truth which proceedeth from the Father."-John 15:26. He can only teach us in intelligent sonship to cry "Abba Father" The Spirit of Truth-He shall guide you unto all truth.-John 16:13. Divine knowledge is all and altogether in His power to communicate, and without His illumination it must be hidden from our understanding.

Thus we have had the enduement of the Spirit presented to us under three aspects-scaling, filling and anointing-All of which terms, so far as we can understand signify the same thing—the gift of the Holy Chost appropriated through faith. Each of these terms is connected with some special Divine endowment-the SEAL with ossurance and consecration: the FILLING with power; and the ANOINTING with knowledge. All these gifts are wrapped up in one gilt in which they are included, and without whom we are excluded from their possession.

While thus we conclude that it is a Christian's privilege and duly to claim a distinct anointing of the Spirit to qualify him for his work we would be careful not to prescribe any stereotyped exercises through which one must necessarily pass in order to possess it. It is easy to cite cases of decisive, vivid, and clearly marked experience of the Spirit's enduement as in the lives of Dr. Finney, James Brainard Taylor, and many others-Read and sludy their lives and observe the remarkable effects which followed in the ministry of those who enjoyed them. Years of barren ministry, in which the gospel was preached with orthodox correctness, and literary finish followed, after the Spirit had been recognized and appropriated by

evangelistic pastorates of the most fervent types, such was the bis fory of not a few of these mighty men of God,

Let not this great subject be embatrassed by two minute the ological definitions on the one hand, nor by too exacting demands for ological sepiritual exercises on the other, lest we pull upon some simple souls a burden greater than they can bear. Nevertheless we ple sours a barrock general control of the divine crisis in the soul which annot emphasize the Holy Ghost may bring. Let the believer receive the Holy Ghost by a definite act of faith for his consecration, as he received Christ by faith for his justification, and may he not be sure that he is in a safe and scriptural meaning and the way of acting the way of acting the way of acting the way of acting the matter was or account of it as a simple acceptance by faith which is an afman to speak an act, which bids eternal truth be a present fact.

# THE SOCIAL, ECONOMIC, AND INDUSTRIAL LIFE OF THE NEGRO IN THE UNITED STATES

Cincinnati, Ohio, September 7, 1951.

Brother President, Officers, Representative Messengers, Ladies and

It is with great pleasure I come at this time to present the fourteenth report on the stated subject. The first report was made in 1937 in Burmingham, the second in Fort Worth, then Los Angeles, Louisville, Shreveport, Chicago, San Antonio, Memphia, Kansas City, Columbia, Little Rock, Houston, and again in Kansas City.

Today we meet in the Buckeye State; thirty-fifth State in size; fourth in rank by population; the State which has more cities of 50,000 population than any other; in no other State have been found so many evidences of man's antiquity as exemplified in implements of stone copper, bone and clay. We meet today in the State which contains within its boundaries the largest inland waterway on earth -Lake Erie.

We meet today in the city which ranks seventeenth among American cities in population, the largest city in America to have a city manager; a city which is 13 per cent Negro and in which the Negro vote usually earlies the balance of power. Longfellow calked the city in which we meet the "Queen City of the West." According John Gonther, this city was a handsome young matron before Chicago was founded and when Cleveland was a helter-skelter village. This city—Cincinnati—in 1820 was the largest town in the country north of New Orleans; for some years it was the headquarters of the government of the Northwest Territory. In 1860 it was one of there cities in America with a population greater than 100,000.

The city in which we meet is one of culture. It has a Literary Chib which was one hundled years old in 1948. It was the first town west of the Alleghenies to have a symphony; it has the oldest and best municipal university in the country. Jounded in 1819 It had the first law school and first medical school in the Northwest Territory. The history of the city is rich with names like Stephen Poster, Harriet Beecher Stone, and John James Audubon.

We meet today in a city where is located the largest machine-tool Plant in the world; one of the nation's largest 50ap business; one of the nation's largest shoe factories. It is the biggest coal distributor in the nation; and the home of the Crosley Coporation WLW, the Crosley Radio Station, is the biggest in the nation in dolar volume of business, exceeding even the great stations in New York City.

The following is/a brief analysis of the progress of the Negro in all phases of Afortican life.

The Emancipation Proclamation came at length as a war measure, which was laire ratified and made general by the 13th Amendment to the Constitution. In subsequent amendments—the 14th which bestowed citizenship, and the 13th which gave the right of franchise—in effect guaranteed the Negro his political rights as a citizen of the republic, in other words, his right to full participation in activities of the government. The substantial and rapid progress of the Negro in modern civilization establishes two definite conclusions. first, that the Negro can survive and advance in the midst of the white man's civilization without hazard to himself or to the white man's civilization without hazard to himself or to the

The Negro begins the last half of the Twentieth Century with greater reasons for hope of first class citizenship that at any other time in the furbulent history of the race in America.

In a leading periodical it was stated that the progressive improvement of race relations and economic rise of the Negro in the United States is a fine example of democracy in action. In 1865 approximately 95 per cent of American Negroes were illiterale. To day that figure is 10 per cent. By 1900 there were a million and a calf Negro pupils in public elementary schools. Today there are more than two and a quarter million. In 1800 there were 92 public schools in the South—today there are 2500 About 10,000 Negroes are graduated from colleges each year, and there are 70,000 in attendance. Incredible as it may sound, there are more than 1,000 Negroe students attending previously lily-white universities in the South.

In 1900 it was stated that disease would exterminate the Negro. Today, as was reported to you last year, the life expectancy of Negroes is sixty years, eight years less than that of whites.

In 1900 Negroes owned 17 per cent of the non-farm houses in which they dwelt, by 1947 this ligure had doubled. Negro home owners total over one million. There are 184,000 farm owners with an average of 70 acres per farm. In this connection it is pointed out that the phase of tace relations which has developed over housing is not a consequence of the Negro's backwardness, but rather of his advancement. There was a time when housing for Negroes praetically settled itself. Where the Negro's band they was determined by his economic condition, as this condition improved, it brought a desire for better living conditions. Negroes have financed and erected 25,000 new housing units.

Negroes own 14 banks, 200 credit unions, 60,000 retail businesses. 26 savings and loan associations and 25 large insurance companies with assets of more than \$100,000,000, with a billion dollars worth of murance in force in 26 States, and the District of Columbia.

More than 1,250,000 Negroes are members of Labor Unions and many pre-dominantly white Unions have Negro officers.

Integration in the Armed Services has proven a success, as was reported to you last year. The Air Force removed racial criteria in May. 1949, and has moved aleadily toward the climination of segregation with gratifying success. The Navy finds no cause to abandon its policy of integration. There have been no developments which would give aid and comfort to those who oppose equality of treatment and upportunity in the Armed Services. The Air Force Times stated in a recent issue "Abolition of segregated thits with Air Force is rapidly nearing completion, recent figures reveal that about 90 per cent of all Negroes in the Air Force are now assigned to mixed units." In July of this year, the Army announced the abolition of the last All-Negro fighting Unit.

On the horizon are "clouds the size of a man's hand" which give

encouragement to a people who only want equality.

Not since the Columbia, Tennessee riots in 1946, has a Negro lost his life in mass racial violence in America. There were two lynchings in 1950 and there have been incidents over housing, swimming pools, etc. in Chicago. Washington, and St. Lauus and the riot in Cicero but in contrast with happenings a decade ago it is easily

seen that there are grounds for the "larger hope."

Manul Florida has a Negro Judge as legal part of its judicial
system, the city also has a total of 40 Negroes on its police force.
Seventy-seven other Southern cities employ Negroes on their police

The most honored of the nine Distinguished Service Cross winners in the Korean conflict was Private Edward O. Cleaborn of Memphis The city named a housing development and park in his honor.

It becomes increasingly clear that an imperceptible change is taking place as relates to the Negro in American life. In Atlanta, delegates to the NAACP were officially welcomed by the Mayor of the City by greeting them as "distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen." Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, grandson of a slave, and Nobel prizewinner, made a speech to the NAACP condemning racial prejudice and its end products segregation and discrimination. After the

speech, white police escort rushed him to the nirport. It was the first time in Atlanta's history that such an escort had ever been provided for a Negro.

The integrity of the individual, his equal worth in the sight of God, his equal protection under law, his equal rights and obligation of citizenship and his equal opportunity to make just and construe tive use of his endowment-these are the very foundation of the American system of values: these are the only demands the Negro

makes of America, and he thinks on such things.

The scientist turns his head toward the universe and thinks about everything; the fool holds his head off and thinks about nothing. The genealogist turns his head toward the ground and thinks about deep things. The astrologist turns his head upuwards and thinks about high things; the butanist looks at flowers and thinks about sweet things; the zoologist looks at the animals and thinks about such things. The philosopher looks at the face of the present and thinks about all things. The optimist looks at the future and thinks about coming things. The Christian gets on his knees and thinks on these things.

The substance for just treatment of the Negro can be found in the words of St. Paul in Phil 4:8 Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are pure,





#### EDUCATION

Education must go side by side with all effective missionary activities cannot save the world without education Experience on home and foreign fields has tugbt that evangelization without education is largely a failure. This is perfectly natural, because evangelization and education have the same author. This author who had just aunounced that all power in heaven and earth was given to him, commissioned the church to "GO." This going implies an age-long task of redeeming the world from sin and ignorance through the process of education.

The great commission (Matt. 28:19, 20) might be formed the Macna Charta of Christian Education. In this commission the Baptist programme is plainly laid out. It consists in making disciples, baptizing and teaching to observe "the all things commanded."

Christian education differs from other education in that it has to do with the things of the heart and soul as well as things of the mind and hands. The person with a keen and trained mind, but an untouched heart is likely to make a daugerous person. An intellectual bad person is infinitely more dangerous and harmful in a community than a bad fool. Christian education is, therefore, the only complete education. It stands for service, service to God and service to mankind. From the very pature of the acquiring, it usually makes one willing to serve and to "give God his best." It reduces selfishness to a minimum and enables its possessor to proceed through life on the idea not of that he may get something out of him.

Christian education means training and development in princioles and doctrines of its Author. Jesus. It goes beyond the merely intellectual. It is not enough to train our youths in the sciences, it is not enough to train them in the languages, it is not sufficient that they should know how old the earth is, how far the stars are apart, or the forces that repel and attract each other. There is something more important that our youth should knowit is to know how to live. Life is a great problem. Christian education best fits one for a life of sacrifice and service. It is so complete that the whole man is reached, every fibre of his being, every cord and sensibility of his nature will respond in loving obedience to the coll of the Master, both in beautiful living and noblest giving -giving of time, giving of talent, giving of means. It will enable us to sing in sincerest devotion: "I will go where you want me to go. I'll say what you want me to say, I'll be what you want me to be. I'll do what you want me to do."

#### BAPTIST SCHOOLS A NECESSITY

This brings us to the question os to whether distinctive Baptiss schools are a necessity. In this connection it is sufficient to say that if Baptist churches are a necessity, distinctive Baptist schools are. We believe it is given to Baptists above all others to perpetuate the doctrine of the New Testament as taught by Jesus and practiced by the apostles and the early church.

Baptists are charged with a responsibility of seeing to it that the plain teachings of Jesus will not perish from the earth. It is sheer foolishness to think that we can have an effective denomination without trained leaders—laymen and women, as

well as preachers.

The government maintains Annapolis and West Point for the training of its sailors and soldiers. These institutions furnish the leaders for the government's fighting forces on land and sea. The government knows why. Baptists ought to have as much sense at the government. Our Baptist Colleges and Semigaries shot through and through with the spirit of the Master, shall send forth ministers and trained women, whose lives and services will show that they have the perspective and spirit of Him whose life was characterized by five simple words: "He went about doing good."

# REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Madam President, Officers, Members and Friend of the Woman's Auxihary to the National Baptist Convention of America:

Once more the finger of time has completed the circle around the dial, and through the Providence of God we are assembled here today closing the fiscal year and ready to launch out anew into another year I count it a privilege to bring to you my annual report. I am very grateful to all of you who have so loyally supported the work through-

out the year.

Perhaps we have not done all that could have been done, but we have done our best under circumstances over which we have no control.

We are facing a new conventional year. Let us enter it with a determination to succeed in all our undertakings Taking God as our leader, we shall know no failure. Let us endeavor to look on the sunny side of life, even though some days are dark. If we keep under the shadow of God's Divine presence, we will be led, as was Ancient Israel, by a pillar of cloud and of fire. Regardless to the sea and the river before us, and His love will protect us.

Through all the struggles and conflicts of life. God leads us and in the midst of every struggle let us sing with the poet. God leads His dear children along, etc.

THEME: "World Peace." Isaiah 2:3-4.

WATCHWORD: "Victory Through Christ." 1 Cor. 15:57.

In the year 1949 through the Council of Churches in 48 states women gathered yards of snowy white muslin, gay cotton prints, beautiful, soft woolen material, buttons, thread, needles, crochet cotton and knitting wool. These pieces and articles were brought to a particular meeting known as World Community Day, and were dedicated as PIECES FOR

What does this mean-this phinse PIECES FOR PEACE: What can there small gifts of our accomplish in this world where there is still so mach understanding? It means that our sights have been raised beyond the boundaries of the United States of America. We have learned something of the one-ness of this world in which our community is a tiny but important part.

We know about the suffering and needs of women in all part of the world, and we are concerned. Are we perhaps beginning to appreciate the superabundance of material things which we possess in this country of ours?

It may be difficult to visualize if you have never lived or visited among people who are utterly impoverished, whose country lies in

Here in our own country we have food, clothing, houses, tools machines, and gadgets-unevenly distributed, it is true-but more than any other country in the world.

PIECES FOR PEACE means that we are willing to share, that we express our faith in a better world—a world of peace among men'and nations—by giving from our relative abundance. PIECES FOR PEACE reaffirms our faith in Got and man. We believe that it is possible to live in harmony with the other Nations of the world. We believe is Paul said to the church at Corinth. "Thanks be to God. Who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

When the women in those foreign countries receive those PIECES FOR PEACE, they will begin making new garments, dresses for children, shirts for husbands But most of all just those pieces of material mean to women in need that someone is concerned about them—someone a stranger and yet not a stranger cares for you.

This is a step toward the achievement of our understanding between women and women Let us express our gratitude for God's abundant blessing in our lives. Let us express our faith in a love which is stronger than armed forces. Let us build bridges of understanding—understanding which is the foundation of PEACE.

In a meeting of Christian women in Buck Hill Falls, Pa. in May of this year, it was decided to issue a call to the Christian women of America, who are working just its we are today, through our Councils, to initiate a program to interpret a Christian woman's personal responsibility for PEACE. The following is part of the program adopted, and I quote:

"I. Recommend a program of setton for world peace based on the following:

"I. We believe that we should strengthen and use our spiritual resources, therefore we shall pray that we may be #sed for peace

"2. We believe that this Nation under God 'can be a Christian Democracy." Therefore we will live democracy in our home town every day.

"3. We believe that we must identify ourselves with the needs, the sufferings and the longings of the people of the world. Therefore We will discipline ourselves to share our abundance of spiritual and material resources.

"4. We believe we must understand the issues in the world struggle for peace. Therefore: We will study and discuss with our family and neighbors the issues of peace."

I believe that men are especially qualified to work with the problems of economics, racial conflicts, political and religious ideologies, and to devise the patterns on interaction for peace. I think that it is the women's special contribution to rear then children so that they will be integrated, poised in spiritual being, able, to carry the burdent of living with equable spirits and equipped to release the full drive of their God-given energies in harmonious and effective activity

In the teachings of Jesus we can find all that we need, both men and women, to guide mutual responsibility for each other's welfare He spoke emphatically and often of Love as the great spiritual energy that can accomplish miracles of counteracting enmity and aggression of healing the wounds of pride and solf-love. He pointed out the way to personal fulfillment of the forgetting of solf and the promotion of the welfare of others Unstinted generosity, compassion, forgiveness even to sevenly times seven, honesty and integrity and perseverance—these qualities He stressed by parable and precept as essential to the

making of peace What we must now add to H - spiritual formula is the purpose to seek and pursue H, and practed with ingenuity and skill to adapt it to every phase of human association, both personal and international.

We would not dore close without saying a word about our dear boys who are fighting in Korea. Let us ever remember them in our prayers—not only them, but their loved ones who are left behind. To them we dedicate this prayer:

Oh. Father, Maker of the sky, of heaven's domain the clouds on high. The universe, the starry dome, the vast beyond which is Thy home—To Thee we lift an earnest prayer, for those in danger in the air.

HOW TO READ THE BIBLE

These suggestions will help you to grow into a real appreciation of Bible study and reading enriching your life and that of others as you influence them.

Read expectantly and thoughtfully, asking. "What is God's message for me, today? In finding this personal message from God, three other questions with help. What does this passage teach me to believe?—teach me to become "—teach me to do?" Through the Bible God spoaks to us. The carre you are willing to been, the more you can hear what he says.

Read with imagination, unhurnedly. Try to picture the scene or setting. Try to conceive of the persons as living people. Use standard helps, such as a reference Bible commentaries, Bible Distingary, Concordance. But do not let them take the place of reading the Bible itself.

Do not be disturbed if there are some passages which you do not understand. Be willing to dig for hidden treasure by repeated readings.

Conserve the results of your readings by keeping a notebook record of what you have read and impression you receive; by memorizing helpful passures or copying a key verse to carry with you for reference through the day.

No matter how you feel, turn to the Bible each day it is not primarily a shew of medicine for emergencies; it is a daily food for daily needs. But it never fails to have a message for us in the emergancy times of defeat and sorrow, feer and anxiety.

Each day when you finish reading, pray again that the spirit of no may lead you; a prayer of thanksgiving for increased strength and blessing; a prayer of confession and repentance for your daily hireds; a prayer of intercession for the needs of others, including the Scripture needs of the world as yet unmet, a prayer of adoration as you think of God with wonder, love praise, and gratitude

### MESSAGE OF PRESIDENT

Mrs. Hattie L. E. Williams, Delivered In Cincinnati, Ohio

September 7, 1951.

Vice President, Official Staff and Messengers.

Young women you have come from the four corners of the earth in this beautiful city of Cincinnati, in holy convocation, under the blood spangled banner of Him who has told us to publish His Name among all nations. The eyes of the world are upon us. From Atlantic's storm shores to the golden strand of the Pacific: from the tall pines of Maine to the Everglades of Florida, eyes are watching the actions and deportments of the young women here assembled today. But more important than the eyes of the whole world that scrutinize our deliberations is the all-seeing eye which has guided us through the years. When I remember that He who has a bigger interest in the Mingdom than any other person here is present and will work

out a program which will bless us all and glorify His Holy Name, I am-content to do my duly featlessly, courageously and faithfully, and leave the results with Him

We live in a period where ideos are more insistently and freely communicated than ever before, when facts are set before us far facts are specified than ever able to absorb them. There is need, therefore, for a responsible evaluation of the time and for a continual emphasis upon the values that have an abiding significance. As the generations pass, ideas are discarded, facts are questioned, theories are demolished and replaced by others, but the Eternal Word of promise endures.

The Twentieth Century began with a strong feeling of optimism. Many of the ideas that previously had been considered fantastic became realities in the form of various scientific inventions. Horse and buggy transportation was replaced by the steam driven locomotives, then the automobile and later the nirplane was added. Much of the labor that had been done by human hands and by the beasts of burden was done by machines.

A new eta dawned apon the world; and men everywhere took a new interest in life. A new enthusiasm permeated the religious world; churches were aroused to a new vision. More people took interest in church work here in the bomeland, and missionary forces were sont to other lands. It was of this time that the angel was speaking when he said to Daniel. Shut un the words and seal the book, even to the time of the end. Many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased.—Daniel 12:1.

Today the increase of knowledge in the form of scientific findings and new inventions is moving the world at such a fast pace that most men in seeking to keep abreast with the world and its changing conditions have lost that zeal for the church which they once had and have separated themselves from God. Many of these people attend-church and have their names on the church books, but they are far from being sincere about their Christian Experience. "This people draweth night unto me with their lips: but their heart is far from me." Matt. 13:8. Their affections are on the things of this world end not on things above. They count the wealth honor, prestige, joys, and pleasures of this world too dear for them to give up for a home in heaven—a place many try to convince themselves does not exist.

There is a point at which a person, and a people, must fall back on simple confidence in the salidity of the future, in the ability of the human race to survive and move forward, without any tangable grounds on which to base this confidence except history. A person cannot look at the painfully slow and halting peace talks in Korea at the troubled international situation or at the confusion of plans and motives in Washington and know what should be done, and his own personal life, as well that problem and situation, confront him in which he cannot know how it is all going to come out.

But history tells us that things do come out. Slowly but inexorably man in each generation lifts his living, his habits and his culture above those of the previous generation. Often he has seemed on the verge of destroying himself, yet he does not One people has often tried to destroy another, yet never quite succeeds. The people which have disappeared have destroyed themselves, through self-satisfaction and decadence, or through greed and excessive ambition.

We can look back into history and find the turning point at which men and nations slopped moving toward apparent destruction and began to work their way out of particular problems and troubles. But we cannot know whether we see the turning points in our lives and affairs as they occur. Times inevitably come when simple faith in the future must be the only basis on which to face the future and keep trying.

JUNIOR WOMEN'S CONVENTION ON THE WAY UP—NOT OUT

We are sometime pointed to as is the old country church on the way out. I am beginning to reach the point where I see red each time I hear that statement. The age-limit, on organization that should not exist and a lot of other nonsense. This new organization which has been an auxiliary holds the same fundamental principles as that of the other, fostering orducation and missions.

In 1928 we launched out on an unknown sea not knowing what the future would be. Our attendance was very small but we lived under the shadow of these two words, "faith and hope." Years passed new life began to come into the organization.

In 1942, down in the Alamo city. San Antonio, Texas, we dawned a new day with much enthusiosm. Annost the many stumbling blocks and other obstructions, we still can say we are on our way up—not

Christ said, on one memorable occasion, "Upon this rock, I build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." We are standing on the rock today here in beautiful Cincinnati and we'll be here until Shiloh comes.

Our Confection has a constructive program, well planned and for the most part carried on in some of the States, not all. Each year new Junior Missions and Y W. A.'s are being added, also City-Wide Junior Missions. All of this bespeaks for us a future organization. So be it known from this day forward that we are on our way UP and NOT OUT.

### OUR OPPORTUNITY

The opportunity of the Junior Women at this time is rare. The aching heart of the poor, the ignorant, the oppressed cry out of their distresses for deliverance. At this time when the Old Book is being attacked, when truth is compromised for gain and worldly glory; when men in whom we once confided as safe defenders for the gospel of Christ give uncertain sound; and the masses are restless and seek the old paths, it is an opportunity for you, the sincere followers of Jesus Christ to sow the seed of the gospel and cultivate it with Christian living. If we shall be wise enough to use the restlessness of the dissatisfied as an opportunity to impart to them the truth which they so much need, we shall win for Christianity a victory imperishable. Earth's sufferings, race clashes, strife between man and man are the opportunities for Christ's followers to hold Him up as the Light of the World, the Adjuster to whom all difficulties may be brought for adjustment Congress the President, the Supreme Court have failed to meet the cry of the common people for redress. We have put millions of dollars into our secular schools. Educational institutions are being richly endowed and yet crime and law violations have not decreased. These conditions are an opportunity for us as a Convention to offer our program to the world or a solution to the social, moral, and industrial problems of the generation.

Our Convention was born and is being sustained by constituency that believe religious institutions exist to perpetuate spiritual things and not primarily to advance the worldly glory or personal gain of men. It should be the high purpose of the young women of this Convention to interest men in Kingdom work until they put their time

and money in the Cause of Missions and Christian Education. You

and I want the world to say to us, those young women at Cincinnat have their minds set on Jesus, and what they did was for His Glory.

The problem of mankind is cessentially a gospel problem. Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free. The generation shall suffer intellectual slavery, physical slavery and moral slavery until we shall agree to live by the Word of God. And, it is the Mission of religious institutions to carry this truth to earth's pinning nations What is needed most in this country and in all lands is a knowledge of God's Word and a willing obedience to His Will ..

The biggest opportunity any religious organization ever had, is given to our Junior Convention today. We want the members of this Convention to demonstrate in their lives the Christ spirit by consecrating themselves unto the Lord; by giving unto Him their talent and their money, and by making such sacrifice as will win the victory we seek. It is reported that we are a race of poor and uniformed people; and we often find men and women in the race who use this allegation as an excuse for our failure to do a man's job. hold that there is wealth enough and Christian training enough, and wisdom enough in aggregation of our young women here assembled to carry forward the work of this Convention in a handsonie, year. in a glorious manner.

The real and permanent advancement of a people must be advancement in morals and intellectual attainments. Greece and Rome attained a high degree of art, literature, commerce, and military power; but their civilization was transitory and their glory has long since laded. We delight to point to the Negro history in this country. In material things his program is without a parallel. His farms and commoditious homes, his banks and insurance companies, his toctories and mercantile institutions stand as monuments to his industry and genius. But I wonder sometimes it we have grown in love, and faith. and good works as we have grown in manual training and physical strength. Do we think as much of our Bible Schools, our missionary work, our church worship as we think of our sheep and cattle, and are we devoting as much time to the making of fine Christian men and women as we are to the task of raising fine horses and fine chickens? I plead for a class of followers of Jesus Christ which will make world surprising devil Trightening contribution to kingdom work If some young woman would rise up in this Convention and write a check for Ten Thousand Dollars to be used in training young women and Christian leachers; and some one write another check for ten thousand dollars for Missions, Satan would become slarmed; but so long as church members will invest fifty thousand dollars in prize fights and Sunday baseball and give lifty cents to redeem the heather world, the julers of derkness will not be disturbed. God grant that you and I will devote less time trying to make big women and big speeches and more time in making big sacrifices and by contributions 10 the objectives of our Conventions.

BUILDING ON THE ROCK

"What do you think of Twentieth Century young people?" Is this a good time to be living?

World War years brought youth a new consciousness of power. They skyrocketed into importance with speeches extolling the virtues of young heroes Young people are still in the limelight, talked about by the pulpit, pew and press. Some people call them revolutionists who will wreck civilization. To others they are reformers who will bring a new day Criticism of youth is not a new thing.

In 1757, Ezekiel Rodgers wrote: "I find greatest grief and trouble about the rising generation. Young People ... strengthen one another in evil by example, by counsel. Oh that I might see some sign of good in the generation, following to send me away rejoicing." cording to Plutarch's "Lives" the same deplorable condition was supposed to prevail as far back as the day of Pericles, 450 years before

Should not adults study the situation before pouring criticism on young heads? As David of old asked, "Is the young man Absalom. We should ask are twentieth century young people safe? Are they building on the Rock. Jesus, or on the rocks of sin and death?

American young people have a rich heritage To enjoy freedom of speech and press: to live in a democracy, to have political liberty with equal rights to worship God according to the dictates of the individual conscience, there are to be the privileges of all in our coun-

Baptist young people have an especially rich inheritance. Their's is a faith that, through the years, has slood for religious freedom even to paying the price in blood.

Spiritual power can revolutionize the world. This is the tank for young people and some one must point a way. They must be guided from the rocks to the Rock for their own sakes of the world. This is the responsibility of the adults. Though the popular saying "the teacher and the taught should learn together," is true. There is much

that young people must learn from adults. The future ideals and conduct of the young depends upon the training they receive. Adults are responsible for this training. Looking at it this way both the present and the future are dependent upon adults. Their willingness to prepare themselves and to accept with sobered minds the responsibility of leading young people is vital to Christianity. Asked about the purpose of Christian work with young people many will say they must be trained that Christianity may be passed on from generation to generation. This is not the whole truth. There is a deeper and fuller reason. The time young people's leader knows that the fundamental purpose of all work with youth is to develop them to their fullest capacity. It is to show them how to live at its best and build on the Rock of foundation. The words of Jehovah to Moses. "He ready in the morning and come up." Fit us of the twentieth century. God calls to a new day. Yesterdays are important but it is what we do today that makes life what it is. Nothing will move into tomorrow that is not carried by youth. Forgetting the past failures, we can rally today to the call of tomorrow's leaders and guide them to the Hock of God Then out of chaos today, youth standing firm on the Rock will see anew God's purpose and build surely and truly for Him. Let us pray and work that youth may not falter.

### EDUCATION

Education cannot be treated lightly

The earliest type of education was a procedure whereby the older generation moved into habits, skills, and arts of its own life. It was comething imparted and given.

Socrates conceived the true purpose of education to be individual independence and self-reliance. His method was to draw out and elicit the resident qualities in this individual. The teacher does not pass on traditions, but inspire the student to be independent of anything given and of the giver. This idea in its pure form never found wide acceptance. But it has influenced all subsequent education

Christian Education differs from other education in that it has to do with the things of the heart and soul as well as things of the mind and hands. The person with a keen and trained mind, but an untouched heart is likely to make a dangerous person.

There are twice as many boys and girls from fourteen to seventeen years of age working tuday as there were during the immediate Pre-War Years Two million eight hundred thousand people under eighteen are now working in agriculture and industry. The Lockheed Aircraft Plant began with 1,500 boys sixteen to eighteen. Finding that their rate of production per kour was better than that of adults on the regular eight-hour shift. Lockheed has steadily increased the number and other Plants are taking up the idea. These young people are missing a high school as well as a college education.

Education gives stability to a man's opinions and judgment, it teaches him to see things as they are to reason things out for himself, to be a more valuable member of society because his understanding is greater.

MISSIONS

Missions go hand in hand with education. We need young blood on the Mission fields. Trained workers are needed on our Home and Foreign Fields. In our local auxiliaties, we don't stress the need of our young women entering the missionary work. There should be volunteers who will stand and say in the longuage of the Prophet Isaich. "Here am I. send me."

The missionary task is indeed tremendous, and more than that, it is unfinished. There are more natural births all the world over than there are births in Christ. Round every nation in every field and in new areas in every field there are abundant opportunities. We pray that an appeal to missionary molive will place new energies in the face of those great challenges.

We need outbreak of vision in the work for without vision the people perish. We need a vision as that of Ezckiel, Paul and Peter and others so that the spirit of missions may be repeated in the heart of others.

We Christians must everywhere seek to build the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ; a kingdom of social value and justice in this life and a kingdom of righteoustiess, joy and peace, instead of kingdom of violence. Cruelty and war, and a kingdom of the redeemed, singing Hallelujah, before the heavenly throne.

CLOSING

It is said of Captain C. B. Miller of the British Navy that when the cruiser Nottingiam was torpedoed, during the World War, and he saw that the ship must go down, that he called his men to order, and ordered them to ship over the rail into their life hoats. He stood on the deck until the last man had left the ship; he then leaped into these as in full uniform, and encouraged his men as he swam about them and was the last man to be rescued. Young women, let us not desert the crew, but, may we support and encourage those who fight for the Cause, as long as there is a young woman on deck of the old ship.

The victories we have won forecast greater victories in the future. We have with our rightful place in most of the States, honce Sister in Christ, we are being welded together in one great religious effort which is destined to make this a powerful auxiliary for kingdom

building in the world. The world is looking to the young women for some things it can't find nowhere else. An open Bible and free speech, personal faith exhibited and a regenerated membership. I cannot calculate the results if we live out these principles. But to shout these principles from mountains and then fail to live them out is open mockery. What shall be the Iruits of the labors and activities in this Convention? What contributions are we making through this Convention to the world's advancements? Are we making these gatherings the means by which men find themselves, and work out the well of God?

As we go from this place may we carry the happy memory of a rich fellowship, of a full cooperation in good works, of a fixed determination to use this Convention for the glory of God and human-

This year has been a test of our faith, sickness and deaths beyond enumeration: We say in that old familiar hymn, "Amazing Grace," etc. And whatever of reverses or successes the future may hold in store; the flowers which beautify and sweeten may sirew our path, or thorns which prick and tear may hodge our way; but yet, our faith in Jenovah shaft not be moved and the joy which comes through companionship with Him shaft abide for ever.

### HISTORIAN

Cincinnati, Ohio, Sept. 8, 1931,

To the President, Officers, and members of the National Baptist Brotherhood Union, in the regular session assembled, I, the undersigned Historian of the Convention, beg loave to submit for your consideration, my report, which is as follows:

The Boptist Biessage and principles encircle the globe and all the space between and we are gloriously happy to be a part of this never ending and ever growing influencing and convincing heritage. By this shall all men know ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another. St. John 13:35. There has been a strong definite urge to bring men together in an organized way for nearly 40 years, but how to do it presented entangling problems which delayed the advent of this great niuvement. Many and varied were these efforts of miny demonifications, including Baptist, who made such attempts, out of all this but to no avail, until in 1941, in the City of Shreveport, La when Dr. G. L. Prince, President of the National Baptist Convention of America, in his Annual Message, recommended that the know Laymen's League, which had previously functioned as a Department of the National Baptist Convention of America, shall here-after be known as an Auxiliary to the National Eaptist Convention of

America, after the adoption of his recommendation, he made strong impassioned pleas to the pastors, ministers and leaders to throw full weight of their influence behind this newly organized auxiliary.

On the next day of the Convention, under the leadership of Prof. W. H. Fuller, Austin, Texas, the following brethren went out to the Convention Hall behind a car barn to formally organize the Laymep Convention Their names are as follows: Prof. Jesse Washington, Ill.; S. J. White, Ohio; G. W. Williams, Texas; Major P. Graham, Ira L. Clark, I. H. Swaizev.

The following persons were elected to office opposite their names: W. H. Fuller. Pres.; Jesse Washington. First Vice Pres.; Ira L. Clark, Treas, and J. H. Swaizey. With this small initial organization, the National Baptist Laymen's League Convention pushed off from the shores on to the bosom of what appeared to be a placid sea. Little did we know at that time that such a small group of men with such loose organization. would ever bud into such a beautiful, composite setup, doing such a wonderful piece of work for Christ "And it does not yet appear what we shall be." The first annual session of the National Baptist Laymen's League Convention was held in the City of Chicago. Ill. in 1942. In this session much of the super structure of the National Brotherhood now rest. Bro A. W. McDonald of Calveston, Texas, was elected President. Willie Lewis of Chicago. Ill., as First Vice President. Bro. J. W. White of South Carolina, was elected Recording Secretary. (G. W. Williams, was re-elected as Corresponding Secretary.)

The next annual session was held in the City of San Antonio, Texas. We were royally entertained by both Laymen and the clergy in this historic city. We then set sail for the next annual session, which was held in the City of Memphis. Tenn. in 1944. It was in this city that our present president, Ira L. Clark was elected in the presidency of the convention. With Bro. J. W. White of Columbia, S. C. they elected to the office of First Vice President. Bro. Clark wisely surrounded himself with some of the most outstanding laymen in the country in order to make some success of the convention.

Say what you will or may, the Baptists of this country owe Bro Ira L. Clark a lasting depth of gratitude and thanksgiving for the fine piece of leadership, which he has given them. Bro Clark solide from being a Christian gentleman of the first waters, is also a courage ous Christian, statesman. He is understanding, and his attitude kindly disposed and zealous an his soul. To know him is to love him.

Shortly after the Memphis meeting, the Laymen Convention was changed by the order of the National Baptist Convention of America, to the Brotherhood Union Convention, because some of the bretheren of our constituency thought that the torus Laymen would exclude pasters, ministers and the clergy in general. The Brotherhood Convention therefore immediately covered twenty-three states of this country like the marring dew covers the earth.

According to the best records available, there are some three thousand Brotherhood Unions in America with a combined active membership of upward of fifteen thousand men. The historian and the officers of the Brotherhood Convention are working like mad to arrive at more accurate figures such as local timons, district unions, state unions. It so happens that all of our men groups are not known as Brotherhood Unions. Many of them are known as various

other names, but they are doing similar work to that being done by Brutherhood Unions. Hence, we claim them and welcome them in our fold. The other seasion of the annual convention and cities in which they were held as follows:
