

CONSTITUTION

THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America and the National Baptist Convention of America, do unite ourselves together for the purpose of doing Missionary, Educational and all Religious Work among ourselves, and throughout the world, therefore we adopt this Constitution

ARTICLE 1.-Name

This body shall be known and styled, "The National Baptist Convention of America.'

ARTICLE II.—Membership

Section I .- The membership shall be Annual, Orthodox Baptist Churches, District and General Association and State Conventions. If there be a group of churches within a State which has no general Association; or State Conventions connected with this Convention, this proup of representatives from these churches shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that State.

Section II.—Any individual in good and regular standing with a Baptist Church may become a member with full privileges by paying the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars.

Section III .- Each church shall pay Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Five (\$5.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

Section IV .- Each District Association shall pay Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Five (35.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

Section V .- Each General Association and State Convention shall pay Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to five messengers and Five (\$5.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

ARTICLE III .- Use of Finance

All finance received by the Convention shall be placed into the treasury for its expenses and appropriations, provided that designated money shall be paid as so designated.

ARTICLE IV -Officers

The Officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries, Corresponding Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, General Auditor, and Historian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association cooperating with this body shall be Associate Vice President.

ARTICLE V .- Duty of Officers

Section I .- The President.

He shall be the Presiding Officer; sign all calls for regular or special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the general body. He may make any visit that will be profitable to the Convention. He is the chairman of the Executive Board.

Section II .- First Vice President.

At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death

or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon him.

Section III .- Second Vice President.

He shall perform the duties that are carried on by the President and First Vice President when necessity demands.

Section IV .- The Recording Secretary.

This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session, compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are countersigned by the President, and make a report to this body annually.

Section V.—The First Assistant Recording Secretary.

This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annual meetings and to do whatever the body may require through the Recording Secretary.

Section VI.—The Second Assistant Recording Secretary.

This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on

Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do whatever is required by the body through the Recording Secretary.

Section VII.—The third Assistant Recording Secretary.

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention. He shall report to the Convention as required by the Convention, and do whatever is required by the body through the Recording Secretary.

Section VIII.—The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary.
This Secretary shall record all the work of the Committee on Accounts and Business, and do whatever the body requires through

the Recording Secretary.
Section IX.—The Corresponding Secretary.

This Secretary shall do all the corresponding of the Convention and Executive Board as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make his report annually to the Convention.

Section X .- The Statistical Secretary.

This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and report same annually preparing it for distribution.

Section XI .- Treasurer.

He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention. He shall keep his records so as to preserve them perpetually for reference, and report annually all receipts and disbursements. Section XII.—General Auditor.

He shall receive and audit all reports of the Board as audited, also the report of the Treasurer of the Convention, each given to him thirty days prior to the annual sitting of the Convention.

Section XIII.—Reporter.

He shall give publicity to all the doings of the Convention necessary to be published.

Section XIV .- Historian.

He shall act for all boards and shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference.

ARTICLE VI.—Boards

Section I.—This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Educational, Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, B. Y. P. U.

Section II .- Each board shall be composed of one member from

each state Convention and General Association, elected by the said State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, said election shall be annually.

Section III .- Officers.

The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

Section IV .- Duty of officers.

The Chairman of Board shall preside at all board meetings.

The Recording Secretary of each Board shall keep a true record of the doings of the Board.

The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Tressurer of each Board and shall do all the corresponding of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Tressurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

Section V .- Management.

The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and three other members of the Board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each Board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does at recess or during the meeting of the Convention.

Section VI.-Reports of Boards.

Each Board shall make its report annually.

Section VII.—Duties of Boards.

The Home Mission Board shall have charge of all the home mission and church extension work done by the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall have charge of all foreign mission work.

The Educational Board shall have charge of all the educational work in the Convention.

The Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publication and publishing work of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall have charge of all the evangelical

work done by the Convention.

The Benevolent Board shall have charge of all the husiness pertaining to the relief of aged ministers and members of the Conven-

The B. Y. P. U. Board shall carry out all the work of the B. Y. P. U. of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII.-Auxiliaries

Section I.—There shall be a Laymen's League, a Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, and a Junior National Baptist Convention, all of which shall be subject to the general body of the National Baptist Convention of America.

Section II—All monies collected at the annual session of this Convention by all Auxiliaries, shall be reported and turned over to the parent body, along with their bills and expenses, to be voted out by the parent body before any disbursements of said auxiliaries shall take place at the Convention.

ARTICLE VIII.—Railroad Commission

This Commission shall consist of five members, elected annually by the Convention. It shall have charge of all transportation, transit,

and travel, and work harmoniously with the several states, as will best suit the interest of the Convention, and report annually to the

ARTICLE IX.-Special Committees

There shall be three business committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the Convention. The regular Committee shall receive and be responsible for all finance comiging into the Convention. The second Committee shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts and recommend the amount of all causes, and after being approved by the President, it shall bring the same to the general body for adoption before execution. The third committee shall investigate, if required, all applying for membership into the Convention that the Constitution requirements may not be violated. There shall be a Standing Committee on Orthodoxy and one of Social and Economic Welfare.

ARTICLE X .- Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of all the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of each Board. It shall hold its meetings as the President sees fit. It is the Board of Management.

ARTICLE XI.—Annual Meetings /

The Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the second Lord's day in September and close the following Sunday night. The place shall be selected by the Convention in session. The Executive Board shall have power to change the time and place when the necessity demands, informing the Convention of the same.

ARTICLE. XII.-Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Convention.

PROCEEDINGS

NEW YORK, NEW YORK September 10, 1952

The 72 Session of the National Baptist Convention of America convened in the Rockland Palace under the auspices of the Oak Grove Baptist Church, A. F. Williams, Pastor. Meeting was called to order at 9:30 A.M. by Pres. G. L. Prince of Galveston, Texas. 123 Psalms was read by Rev. G. G. Griffin. Song "Glory To His Name" was sung. Prayer was offered by Rev. G. G. Griffin, Inspirational singing was lead by Mrs. Virgie C. De Witty, Austin, Texas, with Mrs. R. B. Porter at the organ. Wholesome remarks were made

ANNUAL REPORT

BAPTIST JOINT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Joseph M. Dawson, Executive Director

To the several Baptist conventions which officially sustain this Committee, it is gratifying to report a year of substantial progress.

Once more the stout conviction of Baptists as to the continuing need of this Committee has been amply justified. To understand the situation it is quite necessary to keep in mind that church-state separation in the interest of religious liberty for all represented in the beginning of our Republic a tremendous conversion. It was the conversion of a powerful majority accustomed to union of church and state and restrictions on religious minorities. As to be expected, those who had long enjoyed public tax support for their church institutions felt extremely reluctant to surrender such a privilege. They thought to side-step the strict provisions of the Federal Consitution by advocating equal, or nonpreferential, aid to the churches. But for James Madison, who showed the evasive proposal, if recognized, would be equivalent to the state establishment of religion, the studied efforts of the reactionaries would have succeeded. From that day till this, groups unreconciled to the First Amendment's prescription that Congress shall make no law looking to the establishment of religion have not ceased to press for what was rejected by the Founding Fathers. Even today the Roman Catholic Church and some individual Protestants are still clamoring for equal, or nonpreferential, tax aid. Their unrelenting campaign for it constitutes the most prolific source of open or concealed violation of the Nation's law.

The backsliding from the Constitution in other respects which at other times have been pronounced is still conspicuous. For example, in the Jackson era the ultra-conservative clergy affiliated with the Pederalist party of privilege, in an effort to claim tax support for the churches, declared that the word "democracy" was synonymous with atheism. Religious liberty for some groups was jeopardized by the clergy's campaign against what the clergy stigmatized as "free-trade religion." Jackson, as a Presbyterian strongly supported by the Baptists, replied that the security of religion in America must never become imperiled by involvement with government. The reactionary

clergy's effort was defeated.

Today some of the clergy of like mind have again centered their attack upon a word, "secular," asserting that since our system of government and public schools is secular our culture is doomed and tax funds must be given a substitute system of parochial schools. The attack will not succeed. Roger Williams long ago convinced all reasonable minds that the government must be secular, because it occupies an area concerned with civil affairs alone, apart from all organizational connection with the churches. Thus the government can never promote religion financially nor through its agencies; but this does not signify hostility to religion or imply separation of governing officials from religious character, ideals or principles.

For long, at regular intervals, strong pressure has been exerted to have our government single out one church for special recognition and advantage, by entering into ambassadorial relations with that

church.

The Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs made certain helpful contributions during the year toward maintaining the cherished American principle against these attempted encroachments.

First, in books, pamphlets, monthly newsletters and numerous press releases the Committee sought to inform of recent specific at-

tacks upon the bulwarks of religious freedom. The Committee engaged Mr. C. E. Bryant, head of press relations at Baylor University, to spend six weeks in diligent inquiry into the allotment of Federal funds to church agencies. His atudies have been examined, evaluated and approved by a special committee, and his report is being widely circulated, not only among Baptists but among others and is helping to alert the country against violations of the Constitution.

The Committee shared influentially with other Protestants of the Nation in defeating the late Truman nomination of an ambassador to the Vatican. Since, it has remained alerted to any possible renewal of such a proposal and stands prepared to resist such to the limit. It is likely that the Committee influenced a final official clarification of the true relations between any American ambassador to Italy and the Vatican. Unabated interest in U. S. diplomatic representation at the Vatican is attested by the huge volume of requests for

Your Committee has insisted before all comers that sectarian interests should not control appointment to public office. The Constitution of the United States forbids denial of public office to anyone on grounds of religious faith. By the same token no one should be appointed to public office because of his particular church affiliation. For this to happen would mean eventually the recognition of a permicious church-quots basis for all political appointees in the United States, and would end disastrously. Under such conviction the Executive Director appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to insist that Dr. James B. Conant should not be refused appointment as High Commissioner to Germany on charges, which, if proven, would have maneuvered the Senate into acting in behalf of sectarian interests.

Fortunately, the Committee has enjoyed unstinted cooperation from Baptists, north and south, white and colored. Enlarged funds provided by the Conventions have enabled it to keep out of debt and to extend and expand services. Through the generosity of a number of personal friends, who provided for all expenses, the Executive Director was permitted to attend the Baptist All-European Congress, which met in Copenhagen in July, and a week later to participate in the extradordinary retreat conducted by the Baptist World Alliance Executive Committee at Tollose, Denmark. At Tollose he submitted the report of a group which made a world survey of religious liberty. It is reasonable to expect that your Committee may continue to justify its activity and that it will meet with an ever-increasing measure of success.

To the National Baptist Convention of America, I wish to make the following report of the Foreign Mission Board of receipts and disbursements covering eleven months from August 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952. Much has been the concern of our interest in trying to carry

forward the work of the Foreign Mission Board in accordance with the recommendations of the auditor, adopted by the convention, to which recommendations, I regard are commendable and are worthy of the deepest consideration, by the secretaries of the boards. But permit me to say with all sincerity, that under the method of the deepest consideration, by the funds for the convention, it is impossible for this secretary to give a report as required by the recommendations of the auditor that are adopted by the convention. First, because the recommendations require that the secretary receipt for all moneys received and report the same together with the receipt stubs, the check book, the deposit and return cancelled checks for all disbursements made, which could be done if such were the case, but the corresponding secretary in giving account for all moneys raised, has to office. Hence, he can only record the receipts and give credit to the proper persons that the disbursements have been made to. Second, in doing this, he violates the orders of the recommendations, of the auditor, adopted by the convention, and at the same time, held responsible to show in his report a credit for all funds disbursed in the unme of the board by members and churches of the convention.

of the board by members and churches of the convention.

I hope it can be clearly understood in the analysis of my report, that I am trying to give a true record of all funds collected and disbursed by the board for the convention, and in doing so, many items of disbursements which appear in this report, the auditor refuses to audit, because I have only receipts to show for the collecting of the funds, and paying out of the same, without any bank record to which deposit, receipts and cancel checks, can be presented. Therefore the following, is an honest effort upon the secretary's part, to bring a correct report to the convention for its consideration, without having the corrections required in the recommendations by the auditor and adopted by the convention.

SUNDAY OR SABBATH.—WHICH SHOULD CHRISTIANS OBSERVE?

A BIBLE ANSWER

By E. M. Elmore

Many honest people are greatly confused about the Sabbath question. The trouble here, as in the case of other doctrines, is because many follow human leadership and tradition instead of the Word of God. There are those who say that the Sabbath is the seventh day and that all Christian people ought to keep the seventh day as a day of rest and worship, Some even go so far as to say that salvation depends upon the Old Testament Sabbath and that "the mark of the beast" mentioned in Revelation is keeping Sunday instead of Saturday as a day of rest and worship! Another group of men answer back that since the Resurrection of Christi, the Sabbath is changed from the seventh day to the first day and that all Christians ought to observe Sunday as a day of rest and worship. These call Sunday the Christian Sabbath, call Sunday School "the Sabbath School," and believe that all the commands in the Old Testament about the Sabbath or Saturday, the seventh day of the week, ought to be applied to Sunday, the first day of the week,

BOTH ARE MISTAKEN. We may be sure that the Bible has a very clear teaching on this subject and when we are willing to search the Word of God and take God at his Word we can know without doubt God's will for us concerning this and other necessary matters of Bible doctrine and Christian life. The Bible does not say that Christians should observe the Sabbath today. The Bible says nothing about "the mark of the beast" being the observation of Sunday. On the other hand, the Bible certainly does not call Sunday the Christian Sabbath nor any other kind of Sabbath.

THE OLD TESTAMENT SABBATH IS THE SEVENTH DAY Exodus 20:10 plainly says, "But the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God." Concerning this there can be no difference of opinion, The Sabbath of rest followed six days of labor and was counted the last day of the week. Saturday is the Old Testament Sabbath.

THE SABBATH IS AN OLD TESTAMENT AND NOT A NEW TESTAMENT COMMAND.

The average Bible student has strangely missed this fact: the Sabbath is part of Mosaic Law and was never given to anybody

but Jews under the Law. Many preachers who would not think of urging Gentile Congregations to observe the command about circumcision or to refrain from pork meat and catfish, yet sincerely preach to them, "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy."

They really mean "Remember Sunday to keep it holy" and call Sunday the Sabbath. However, there is no more command for Christians to keep the Sabbath than there is for Christians to avoid pork meat or catfish or to be circumcised. Let us read carefully Scriptural proof and get the matter settled in our heart.

First, in the entire New Testament there is not a single command to observe the Sabbath! Every other one of the Ten Commandments is repeated—some many times. The one to keep the Sabbath is excepted. Of all the sins mentioned in the New Testament, Sabbath-breaking is never once mentioned as a sin! Jesus did not command His disciples to keep the Sabbath. He was repeatedly called in question on this matter of the Sabbath but never once did He ask the public to observe the Sabbath.

The Jews hated Jesus because He Himself did not keep the Jewish Sabbath. In rebuking them for their criticism when the disciples gathered grain to eat on the Sabbath—Matt. 12:1-8, Jesus refered them to the Scriptore, "I desired mercy, and not sacrifice"—Hosea. 6:6, and said that if they had understood the Scripture, they would not have condemned the guiltless. Jesus clearly meant that the Sabbath was a part of the ceremonial law, like sacrifices, which was fulfilled in Jesus.

Jesus did not teach anybody to keep the Sabbath. This fact cannot be desired! The Apostles did not teach the New Testament Churches to observe the Sabbath. The Council at Jerusalem, mending word to the Gentile converts as to what they should do did not even mention the Sabbath—Acts 15:19-24. The Books of Hebrews and James, written to dispersed Israel, do not even refer to the Sabbath as a day to be kept; and Paul in all His Epistles to the Churches never once intimated that Christians are to observe the Sabbath! The Sabbath is Old Testament and not New Testament.

THE SABBATH IS MOSAIC LAW GIVEN TO ISRAEL UNDER THE LAW

As remarkable as is the absence of the Sabbath command in the New Testament, is its absence before Mount Sinai in the Old Testament. Genesis 2:1-3 teaches that when God had finished Creation Be rested on the seventh day and blessed that day and sanctified it. But no command is given to man concerning that day either in the Garden of Eden or afterwards until Mount Sinai. There is no record that God ever spoke to Adam, Enoch, Noah or Abraham about the Sabbath, nor that any of them ever observed it or ever heard of it? Remember that this passage here in Genesis 2:1-3 was not written until Moses wrote the first five books of the Bible under divine inspiration in the wilderness, after Mount Sinai. The first time the word Sabbath is used in the Bible is in Exodus 16:23, and men never heard of it until that time.

This is all the more remarkable when you remember that the people already had the week as a period of time, Gen. 8:10-12; Gen. 29:27. When you read about the incident in Exodus 16:23-36, it is quite clear that it was a strange new teaching to the people of Israel and that they had never observed it before.

and that they had never observed it before.

Now we turn to Neb. 9:13-14 which says: "Thou camest down upon Mount Sinai, and spakest with them from heaven, and gavest them right judgments and true laws, good statutes and command-

ments; and madest known unto them thy holy sabbath, and commandest them precepts, statutes, and laws, by the hand of Moses thy

After recounting the oppression in Egypt and the crossing of the Red Sea, the Scriptures tell us that God came down on Mount Sinai and "made known" to the people His holy Sabbath. The Sabbath, then, was a part of the Mosaic Law. It was not a previous command incorporated in the Mosaic Law, like marriage, the tithe, or even circumcision. No, the Sabbath was given to Israel as a part of the ceremonial law. It was "made known" on Mount Sinai! No man on earth had ever heard of it before then.

This same teaching, that the Sabbath was first given or made known at Mount Sinai, is taught in Ezekiel 20:10-12 .- "Wherefore I caused them to go forth out of the land of Egypt, and brought them into the wilderness, and I gave them my statutes, and shewed them my judgments, which if a man do, he shall even live in them. Moreover also I gave them my sabbaths, to be a sign between me and them, that might know that I am the Lord that sanctify them.

Notice carefully that the Lord Himself says concerning Israel at Mount Sinai: "I gave them my sabbaths to be a sign between me and them." No man ever heard of the Sabbath before it was given to Israel as recorded in Exodus 16:23-36.

THE SABBATH GIVEN AS A SPECIAL SIGN TO ISRAEL

That matter was quite clear to Israel, On Mount Sinai the Lord revealed to Moses that this command was given to Israel as a Special covenant between God and that Nation, In Exodus 31:12, 13, 16, 17 the Lord says: "And the Lord spoke unto Moses, saying, Verily my sabbaths ye shall keep; for it is a sign between me and you throughout your generations; that ye may know that I am the Lord that doth sanctify you . . . Wherefore the Children of Israel shall keep the sabbath, to observe the subbath throughout their generations, for a perpetual covenant. IT IS A SIGN BETWEEN ME AND THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL FOREVER: for in six days the Lord made heaven and carth, and on the seventh day he rested and was refreshed.

Ezekiel repeats in 20:12 that explanation of the meaning of the Sabbath, It was a sign between God and Israel, It becomes clear then by the plain and repeated teaching of God's Word, that the Sabbath is a command to Israel under Mosoic Law as a sign or covenant between them and God and was never commanded to Gentiles in any dispensation.

When we speak of the Sabbath, then we speak of the seventh day, Saturday, as the Old Testament command of the ceremonial law

NEW TESTAMENT CHRISTIANS PLAINLY WARNED AGAINST KEEPING THE SABBATH

Now when we turn again to the New Testament, we find that instead of being commanded to keep the Sabbath, the keeping of the Sabbath is discouraged. In Colossians 2:14 we are cold that Christ blotted out the hand writing of ordinances, since that was against us, "and took it out of the way, nailing it to His Cross." Then we are plainly commanded in the verses 16 and 17: "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, OR OF THE SABBATH DAYS: which are a shadow of things to come; but the body is of Christ."

Let no man judge you concerning Sabbath days! That was a shadow which was all right until the coming of Christ, but now He is come and the shadow is fulfilled! Therefore no Seventh Day Adventist nor Jew has the right to pass judgment on any Christian con-cerning the Sabbath Day. The command about the Sabbath was pailed to the Cross with the commands about certain meats and with other ceremonial laws. God does not want Christians to observe the Jewish Sabbath and plainly says so.

In Galatians 4:8-11, Paul evidently refers to the same thing. The Galatians Christians had been led away into Judiasm. Paul in this letter is urging them to break the old tie to Judaism, "the weak and beggarly elements" or "bondage" of the Old Testaments ceremonial law. In Galatians 4:10-11 he says:

"Ye observe days, and months, and times, and years. I am afraid

of you, lest I have bestowed upon you labour in vain.

The DAYS mentioned here were Sabbaths, part of the Old Testament ceremonial law for Jews. Paul did not want New Testament Christians to be in bondage to the Old Testament Sabbath or other days, months, times and years of the ceremonial law.

UNDAY, THEN, IS NOT THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

You can easily see then that persons are wrong who say that Sunday is the Christian Sabbath, or who say that the Sabbath has now been changed to the first day of the week. The word Sabhath, speaking of one particular day of each week, the regular Sabbath, as used in the Bible, always means Saturday, the Seventh day of the week. There is not anywhere in the Bible any record where the Sabbath was changed from, Saturday to Sunday. Persons who use such an argument in explaining why they do not keep Saturday will find themselves greatly embarrassed when they cannot prove it by the Scriptures, and their congregation will be many times troubled by perone teaching the Mosaic Law.

CATHOLICS DID NOT START FIRST DAY WORSHIP

There are those who claim that Catholics changed the Sabbath from the seventh day of the week to the first day of the week. The funny part is that some Catholic writers admit that they did! Persons who claim such ought to know, however, that Catholics simply mean that they claim Peter as the first Pope and say that the Sabbath was changed in New Testament times by the Apostles and therefore by the Catholic Church. It is true that the Catholic Church has backed some civil laws enforcing Sunday as a day of rest. Catholic popes and rulers tried to enforce by civil laws of the observance of Sunday as if it were the Old Testament Sabbath, making it legalistic or ceremonial. That is an entirely different matter from starting the use of the first day as a day of worship. Acts 20:7 clearly shows that that began in New Testament times. That verse reads as follows: "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until mid-night.

It is clear that New Testament disciples met on the first day of the week, and it is infered that this group may have met regularly

on this day to take the Lord's Supper.

First Corinthians 16:2 also indicates that the first day of the week had special meaning to New Testament Christians and that Sunday, as a religious day, was not an invention of Roman Catholics and the mark of the beast as Adventist claim. Remember, however, that this first day of the week is never called a Sabbath in the Bible, and we should not call it Sabbath.

THE FIRST DAY, THE NEW TESTAMENT DAY OF WORSHIP

The New Testament gives many records when Jesus, and later Paul met with Jews in their synagogues on the Sabbath or seventh day and preached to them. That is just as when a preacher of teady has service at such times and places as he can get a crowd. A preacher should go where the people gather and prach to them. But when it comes to the meeting of New Testament disciples for worship, we never find an account of churches using the Sabbath for that day. On the other hand, Acts 20:7 clearly states that the disciples met on the first day of the week and the context indicates that this was a regular service at a regular time to take the Lord's Supper. First Corinthians 16:2 plainly shows that "the first day of the week and the context indicates that this was a regular religious significance to New Testament Christians. They were commanded to set saide on that day their gifts for the Lord's work. It is probable that the Lord's Day of Revelation 1:10 means the

It is probable that the Lord's Day of Revelation 1:10 means the first day of the week on which the disciples were accustomed to gathering for worship. John was worshiping the Lord on this day, that is, he was "in the Spirit on the Lord's Day." Certainly the Bible nowhere teaches that "the Lord's Day is the Sabbath or seventh day. The Bible does not even hint that any other day besides the first should be used as a day of worship. The Lord's Day must be our Sunday. New Testament Christians did not have a day commanded for rest, but they used the first day of the week, not the Sabbath, as a day of Worship.

JEWISH SABBATH NOT A DAY OF WORSHIP

The Sabbath, Saturday, in the Old Testament, was for physical rest alone, not a day of worship. When you read again the Old Testament commands about the Sabbath, you will notice that it was never given as a day of worship. "But the Seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidaervant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates."—Ex. 20:10.

The word "Sabbath" in the Hebrew language (in which the command was given), means "cessation" or "rest." Worship went on in the tabernacle and in the temple seven days a week just the same except for certain national religious holidays when the program was somewhat varied.

We find that during the period between the Old Testament and New Testament the custom of necting in the synagogue on the Sabbath arose, but not by divine command. There is no Bible command for the synagogue per for any of the synagogue worship. The Sabbath of the Mosaic Law was purely a day of rest, not a day of worship nor Church going.

We may be sure that the principle of one day's rest in seven for man and beast is a good one, and on such grounds Christians have many times advocated civil laws to provide a day of rest one day a week. Usually the day selected has been Sunday, when Christian people would want to use the day for worship. HOWEVER, NEW TESTAMENT CHRISTIANS HAVE NO COMMAND FROM GODTO ABSTAIN FROM LABOR ON ANY CERTAIN DAY, NOR EVEN TO MEET FOR WORSHIP ON A GIVEN DAY OF THE WEEK. That is for a Christian a matter of grace and should be voluntary.

SHOULD CHRISTIANS THEN OBSERVE SUNDAY?
Since Christians are not bound by the Old Testament command to observe the Sabbath, is it right for Christians to observe Sunday?

The answer is that we should not observe Sunday as a legalistic Sabbath, part of the ceremonial law; but that we do well to observe the Lord's day voluntarily for our own good as a day of worship. The Scripture plainly says: "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is"—Heb. 10:25.

We are commanded to meet for worship. Since New Testament disciples in Acts 20:7 met on Sunday; and John, a lonely axile on the Island of Patmos, worshipped on the "Lord's Day" (evidently Sunday—First Day); and since First Corinthians 16: 2 mentions Sunday as a day of religious duty, certainly we ought to give ourselves to worship on that day.

Some people object and say if you worship on Sunday, you keep a day dedicated to the sun since Sunday was named for the sun. Well, Saturday is named for Saturn! All the days are God's days, and all should be used for Him no matter how they were named. The days of the week do not have the same names as they did have in Bible times, but we do have the same days whether we call one Sunday or the first day of the week, or another Saturday or the first day of the week week. New Testament Christians met on the first day of the week before it was called Sunday. Jews kept Saturday as a day of rest before it was called Saturday. But what has that to do with us? We settle this by God's Word, not by history.

Certainly Christians aught to make it possible for as many others as possible to worship on Sunday with them. For employers of labor to close their business on Sunday makes it possible for workers to attend services as God's command, and besides provides needful rest. We cannot put it on the basis of Jewish Law and ought not to. We ought to put it on the basis of grace as Christians who seek to honor

the Lord and treat our fellowman as would be treated.

Let us not use our liberty in this matter for an occasion to the flesh—Gal. 5:13. Christians should not let their liberty concerning the Lord's day be taken as a license to do wrong. Surely Christians ought to use this day in a way which would please the Lord Jesus for whom it was named—"the Lord's Day."

Some Christians have a legalistic idea of Sunday, calling it the Sabbath. We should not cause them to stumble and be an offence to them by our liberty. Many things we should do for their conscience's sake and for the sake of unsaved people who might not understand our liberty. For Paul, under divine inspiration concerning meats offered to idols which were an offence to some, wrote:

Conscience, I say, not thine own, but of the other; why is my liberty judged of another man's conscience? For if I by grace be a partaker, why am I evil spoken of for that for which I give thanks? Whether therefore ye cat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God. Give none offence, neither to the Jew, nor to the Gentiles, nor to the Church of God; Even as I please all men in all things, not seeking mine own profit, but the profit of many, that they may be saved." I Cor. 10:29-38. Yes, Christians should use Sunday for their own good and the Glory of Christ as a day of worship and service to God, seeking to offend none but save all and bless all.

THE SPIRITUAL MEANING OF THE FIRST DAY OF THE WEEK

Six in the Bible is a man's number, and seven is the divine or complete number. Six days of labor followed by the Sabbath of rest pictures man living a perfect life under the law and earning the rest perfection and salvation pictured by the seventh day. Of course men failed under the Law, and no one was ever able to keep it.—Acts 15-10, Rom. 3:20, Gal. 3:11.

But the New Testament Christians, worshipping God on the first day of the week, means that he already has salvation as a free gift before he did any work, and now being saved, the Christian works the rest of his life to glorify the Saviour he loves—Heb. 4:9, 10.

From Mark 16:2, 9 it seems clear that Jesus rose from the dead on the first day of the week. In the twentieth Chapter of John we find that when Mary and others came to the sepulcher on the first day of the week, very early while it was yet dark, Jesus appeared to her and said, "I am not yet ascended to my Father." It appears that the Saviour sometime in that night which was a part of the first day of the week, had come out of the grave. Here is a great blessing for us. Jesus rising from the dead for our justification—Rom. 4:25 means that now we are counted righteous without any labor and without the deeds of the law and "have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Heb. 4:10, "For He is entered into his rest, he also has ceased from his own works, as God did from his."

From Hebrews 4:9-11 it seems that two rests or "Sabbaths" are mentioned (the word "rest" in Hebrews 4:9 is the same word as Sabbath in the Greek). That is the teaching with which all Jews are familiar. One of the greatest feasts which God gave to the Jews, or Israel, shows this idea of the rest of a Christian, one at salvation and the other after the resurgection. The feast of the unleaven bread following the passover supper, is given in Exodus 12:15, 16 lasted seven days. This week represented the complete cycle of a Christian life after conversion, which conversion is pictured by the passover lamb at the beginning of the feast. 1 Cor. 5:6-8.

The unleavened bread represents, surely, our feeding on Christ, our fellowship and communion with Him. That fellowship of peace begins immediately at conversion as Israel atc the unleavened bread with the passover-lamb. The peace and joy of a Christian life should begin immediately when one trusts Christ at salvation. The first day of that feast of unleavened bread was a day of rest when no work was to be done. That pictures a Christian resting from his own works when he has partaken of Christ.

At the close of the week was another day of rest. At the close of life's journey, Christians will enter into perfect rest, for "there remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God"! Heb. 4:9. You can see why Israel under the Law, should keep the Sabbath just as they kept the passover supper and the feast of the unleavened bread. All of them pointed towards Christ. A Christian need keep neither the passover supper nor the feast of the unleavened bread nor the Sabbath since we have Christ Himself, the fulfillment of all the shadows and types and ceremonial law.

On the other hand, the Jewish Sabbath (Saturday) is clearly a picture of a rost earned after work. Under the Law, if one was perfect all his life, fulfilling all the commands, he would deserve Heaven. Since no one was ever perfect but Jesus, nor did anyone besides Him keep the Law, man could not be saved by the Law. You can see then how much the Jewish Sabbath, picturing salvation by good works, is out of place in a dispensation of grace. We are saved by grace, freely justified without the deeds of the Law, so we worship on the first day of the week, representing peace and rest obtained without labor. The Jewish Sabbath, Saturday, is ceremonial law, and does not fit a grace dispensation. Our Lord's Day, the first day of the week does fit every Christian.

GREAT DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE SABBATH AND THE LORD'S DAY

1. The Sabbath was for the Israelites only, under Mossic Law. The Lord's Day is for New Testament Christians, under Grace.
2. The Sabbath was Law, enforced with the penalty of death by the command of God—Num. 16:32-36. The Lord's Day, or first day of the week, is grace, without command or penalty, observed voluntarily by Christians if at all.

3. The Sabbath was day of physical rest, Ex. 20:10. The Lord's

Day is a day of worship-Acts 20:7; Rev. 1:10.

4. The Sabbath typified salvation by works; the Lord's Day typifies salvation by Grace.

CHRISTIANS ARE NOT UNDER THE LAW

Our Seventh Day Adventist Brethren, like the Galatian Christians, have tried to lead us into the yoke of bondage of the Mosaic Law. Many of them teach, and most of them believe, that salvation depends on keeping the Mosaic Law. They not only preach the Old Testament Sabbath, but they often teach the Old Testament Laws against eating certain kinds of meats. They teach the tithe as a part of the way to be saved or atay saved.

For that matter they might as well teach the rest of Jewish ceremonial laws if one must keep the Law to be saved. As a matter of fact, the ceremonial laws as given to Israel were plainly fulfilled and not for us according to Colossians 2:14-17 and 1 Tim. 4:8-5. God plainly tells us that the law about not eating certain meats is not binding on Christians. "For every creature of God is good, and nathing to be refused, if it is received with thanksgiving; for it is sanctified by (Hia Word) the Word of God and prayer." 1 Tim. 4:4, 5.

ABOUT CIRCUMCISION, NEW TESTAMENT CHRISTIANS ARE PLAINLY, TOLD:

"Is any called circumcision? Let him not be circumcised"—1 Cor. 7:18. So about the Sabbath, the command about it was nailed to the cross and blotted out with other ceremonial laws, as the Lord specifically says in Colossians 2:16, 17.—"Let no man therefore judge you in mest, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the New Moon, or of the SABBATH DAYS: which are a shadow of things to come; but the body is of Christ."

If a Christian were under the law about the Sabbath, then he should be stoned for picking up sticks on Saturday as God commanded in Numbers 16:32-36. He could not even have a fire in the house on Saturday as God commanded Israel in Exodus 35:3. Thank

God, that heavy burden of ceremonial law is not for us!

The moral law concerning lying, stealing, adultery, murder, etc., are repeated many times in the New Testament. These sins are inherently wrong, were wrong since before the Mosaic Law, as when Cain killed Abel. Christians ought to keep the moral law, to do right and not wrong. But it is not true that men are saved by keeping the Law. They never were and never will be. People are saved by simply trusting in Christ, and have everlasting life on that basis alone, and not by keeping either the ceremonial or moral law.

Read again these Scriptures, and have settled in your hearts forever that you are not under the law but under grace!: "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast" Eph. 2:8, 9.

Titus 3:5 also plainly teaches that men are not saved or kept saved by acts of righteousness: "Not by works of righteousness which

we have done but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost." Then let us:

"Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage." Gal. 5:13 —Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the Law, being made a curse for us."

"Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the New Moon, or of the Sabbath Days: which are a shadow of things to come; but the body is of Christ" Col. 2:16, 17.

FURTHER PROOF THE SABBATH WAS CEREMONIAL LAW, FOR JEWS ONLY, NEVER COMMANDED FOR NEW TESTA-MENT CHRISTIANS

1. That is what the Scriptures expressly say. Read again Colossians 2:13-17.—"And you, being dead in your sins and the uncircumcision of your flesh, hath he quickened together with him, having forgiven you all trespasses; 14. Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross; 15.—And having spoiled principalities and powers, he made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it. 16.—Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the Sabbath days; 17.—Which are a shadow of things to come; but the body is of Christ."

That Scripture is talking about the Jewish ceremonial law which was fulfilled and done away with when Jesus died. The Gentiles were in uncircumeision, says the Scripture; the handwriting of ordinances of the Jews was against the Gentiles and contrary to them. But "this handwriting of ordinances" which was against uncircumcised people, Christ "took out of the way, nailing it to His Cross." Certainly that refers to the ceremonial law.

Was the moral law done away with when Jesus died? Are men new free from obligation about the commands "Thou shalt not kill," "Thou shalt not commit adultery," "Thou shalt not steal"? You know that we are not free from obligation to do right about such matters. The moral law was not erased, not rescended when Jesus died. It was not nailed to the cross, crucified, killed. That was the ceremonial law which lost its force when Jesus died because it was already fulfilled.

So verse 16 above plainly says Christians are not to be judged concerning these ceremonial laws. "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the Sabbath days."

Leviticus, chapter 11, named as part of the ceremonial law a number of animals that the Jews were not to eat, such as pork, fish that did not have both fins and scales, etc. And in that connection Jews were plainly told that if the lizard, snail, mole or other such animals which were ceremoniously unclean, should fall into an earthen vessel, then the water of that vessel would be likewise unclean, and the vessel must be broken. Lev. 11:34 says, "Of all meat which may be eaten, that on which such water cometh shall be unclean: and all drink that may be drunk in every such vessel shall be unclean." But the ceremonial law concerning eating and drinking was nailed to the cross of Christ.

Colossians 2:16 plainly says we are not to be judged concerning those dictary rules of meat and drink. Likewise, Christians are not to be judged "in respect to an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the Sabhath days." These ordinances were nailed to the cross. They are

taken out of the way! No Christian must allow himself to be judged by these ceremonial laws which were fulfilled completely when Jesus

Then verse 17 says plainly that all these ordinances "are a shadow of things to come." That is what ceremonial laws are—a shadow or symbol or picture or object lesson. But when Jesus died the body itself has come, of which the others were a shadow. Now we have Christ, and He has fulfilled those ceremonial laws, they are all nailed to the cross, and Christians must not be judged by the ceremonial Subbath of the Jews. So the Scripture plainly commands.

The second proof that the Jowish Sabbath, Saturday, is a part of the ceremonial law and never commanded to New Testament Christians is the fact that the Scriptures plainly say the Sabbath was a special sign between God and the children of Israel.

In Exodus 31:12, 13 is this plain statement: "And the Lord spake unto Moses, saying, Speak thou also unto the children of Israel, saying, Verily my Sabbaths ye shall keep: for it is a sign between me and you throughout your generations; that ye may know that I am the Lord that doth sanctify you."

In verse 13 God says, "Verily my Sabbaths ye shall keep: for it is a sign between me and you throughout your generations; that ye may know that I am the Lord that doth sanctify you." The word anctify means set apart. So Israel is set apart from other nations. A sign of this separation of the Jews from the Gentiles is the Sabath.

In verse 16, 17 the Lord said, "Wherefore the children of Israel hall keep the Sabbath. . . . It is a sign between me and the chilren of Israel for ever."

In Ezekiel 20:12 the Lord says, "Moreover also I gave them my Sabbaths, to be a sign between me and them, that they might now that I am the Lord that sanctify them." Thus again we are old that the Sabbath is a special sign between God and Israel, a ign that they are God's chosen people, set apart from other races.

Now all the ceremonial laws were just like that; a special comnand for Israel and not for other nations. Circumcision was likewise a sign between God and Israel. So were the Jewish dietary laws. So were the Jewish sacrifices. So were the Levitical priesthood. Ceremonal laws were laws for Jews only.

How different from moral law! "Thou shalt not kill"—That is for the whole world, "Thou shalt not commit adultery"—that is for the whole world, too, "Thou shalt not steal"—that, too, is for all man-kind. No nation or family of people in the whole world are exempt. We are the people God commanded not to lie and steal and kill, it is a special sign between our nation and God. Nobody could say that the moral law was given to any particular class of people. It is universal in its scope, and applies to all alike. But the ceremonial laws the Jews could well say: "We observe circumcision"—it is a sign between us and God that we are His separate people. We observe the sacrificies, the feasts, the Jewish dietary laws. They are signs between us and God, given us as a chosen people." And in exactly the same way the Israelites could say, "We are commanded to observe the Sabbath. It is a sign between us and God, a sign that God has set us apart as a separate people to keep ceremonial laws as a shadow or symbol of things to come." Thus, the Jewish Sabbath, Saturday, was clearly part of the ceremonial law.

3. The observance of the Jewish Sabbath, Saturday, is obviously only a ceremonial law since it is not a moral law written in the hear of mankind. The moral law is universal and God has written it in the hearts of mankind, both Jews and Gentiles. Rom. 2:14-16-"For when the Gentiles, which have not the law, do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto them selves: which show the work of the law written in their hearts, then conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts the meanwhile contains or else avanages are also bearing. accusing or else excusing one another; in the day when God sha judge the secrets of men by Jesus Christ according to my Gospel."

You see that the Gentiles, even if they never heard of the law, never heard the Scripture, never heard a Gospel sermon, yet have consciences which bear witness in them. A black man in Africa wh never heard the Gospel knows that it is wrong to kill, to lie, to steal, to commit adultery with another man's wife. He has an innate sense d right and wrong. That is one reason that heathen people everywhen know that they are sinners. God has written the moral law in their hearts, and though they do not we will heed this law, it will bem witness against them in the day of Judgment, the Scripture says.

Any heathen or savage in any part of the world who never heard the Gospel, would know it is wrong to murder, wrong to steal; but would such a heathen or savage know by something written in the universal heart of mankind that his boy baby must be circumcised! Would his conscience, which never heard the Scripture nor even heard such a matter mentioned as from God, tell him that it was right to eat beef or mutton but wrong to eat pork? Certainly not.

Ceremonial laws were for Jews only and are not written in the hearts of people as is the case of the moral law. And in exactly the same way is it obvious that the Sabbath is a ceremonial law. There is nothing in the conscience of people to tell them they must observe one day in seven as a Sabbath, and that this day of rest must be Saturday. No, no heathen ever feels impressed that he must keep the Jewish Sabbath or he has sinned in not doing so, unless some on has taught him that. Conscience certainly does not teach him that Therefore the Jewish Sabbath, is not the moral law written in the heart of mankind. It is ceremonial law, meant for Jews under ceremonial law, and for no one else.

4. The Jewish Subbath, Saturday was suitable for the Jews in Palestine, but not suitable for other lands specially lands of coll winters. In Exodus 35:3 is this plain command to the children d Israel-"Ye shall kindle no fire throughout your habitations, upon the Sabhath day."

A literal translation would be, "Ye shall burn no fire throughout your habitations upon the Sabhath day." For people to observe the Sabbath, they are simply to have no fire in their homes on the Sab bath day.

That was no hardship upon the Jews in the land of Palestine It would be a tremendous hardship in the Northern part of the United States, in Canada, and in other areas where the temperatur goes down to zero and below. The truth is that the Seventh Da Adventist and others who insist that we ought to keep the Jewis Sabbath full in this matter every week. Numbers 15: 32-36 tells he a man who picked up sticks on the Sabbath day was stoned at the command of God for breaking that ceremonial law. But if we are commanded to keep the same Sabbath, then Seventh Day Adventist who shovel coal in the furnace are just as guilty.

In fact, anyone who kindles a fire of any kind on Saturday breaks this ceremonial law. It is foolish to say there is any moral difference in lighting a fire in a stove and lighting a camp fire, or that there is any difference in God's sight between lighting a gas range by turning a knob and lighting a fire other ways when the Bible plainly comnands those who are keeping the Sabbath command, "Ye shall condition to burn on fire throughout your habitations upon the Sabbath day. Obviously that is ceremonial law and was intended for Jews in Palestine before the Saviour died. It was never commanded to unybody but Jews, nor in any country but in Palestine.

The fifth proof that Sabbath keeping was ceremonial law, and not for Christians, is that the Sabbath day does not come at the same time on a rotating world. Days are determined by the rotation of the earth. Every time a certain spot on the carth's surface rotates into the light of the Sun, it is another day. And whether we begin at midnight or at sunrise, the day begins at a different time on every spot of the earth's circumference. For example, when it is midnight in New York City, it is only 11:00 P.M. in Chicago, 10:00 P.M. at Denver, 9:00 P.M. at Los Angeles. And on the other side of the earth it is twelve ours later or carlier.

Every time a person goes around the earth to the West, the days e longer, but he loses an entire day, that is, he has one day less han the people who stayed at home. Every time a man goes around he world to the East, the days are shorter and he passes the sun ne more time, and has one more day than the people who stayed at ome, two days more than the man who went around the world to the Yest! The man who stayed home rotated by the sun the regular numer of times. The one who went around westward with the sun missed to time passing the adn, and the man who went eastward against the sun passed it one extra time.

If all three men were trying to keep every seventh day as a ibbath, then the man who stayed at home might observe Saturday, man who went westwards would observe Sunday, and the man be went eastwards would observe Friday! So you can see that peocould not possibly keep the same Sabbath, always observing the

venth day, around the whole world.

For convenience an international date line has been fixed on the ap of the Pacific Ocean. On a vessel going West, suppose it is Friday ight and just at midnight they come to the international date line. is time to begin observing the Sabbath. Or if you prefer, have ie time at sundown Friday, as the Jews began their Sabbath at indown. But as the ship comes to the international date line and osses it, going west, the time changes suddenly from Friday to unday! Saturday is eliminated altogether, how then, would you keep for a Sabbath?

Suppose the same ship comes back the next week, approaching the sternational date line just at the close of Friday, ready to begin the ewish Sabbath. As they cross the international date line coming ast, the time suddenly changes from Friday night to Thursday night, t is the beginning of Friday again instead of the beginning of Saturis the beginning of Friday again instead of the beginning of Satur-lay! So, people crossing the international date line eastwards have we days alike, by our weekly calendar. Going westwards they lose me day entirely. Now, shall our Seventh Day Adventist friends fail a observe a Sabhath going west? Coming cast shall they observe two sabbaths, two days in succession? If so, then they are not keeping he seventh day for the Jewish ceremonial command was, "Six days halt thou labor, and do all thy work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God"—Ex. 20:9, 10. If they follow the date line they miss a Sabbath. If not, their seventh day is always different thereafter.

Obviously God never intended this Jewish Sabbath Day of rest to be strictly by all the world. He did not command it to all the world! He commanded it to Jews in Palestine. Now can you imagine any circumstance of travel making it necessary, even for one time to worship idols, commit adultery or murder? Certainly not! Moral laws are universal, unchanged by climate, position on the earth or nationality of people involved. So the Sabbath command is ceremonial law, for Jews only, in the limited area of Palestine, under Judiasm.

Palestine is less than one hundred miles across. There is not over four minutes difference in suntime on the eastern and western edges of Palestine. The rotation of the earth could make no essential difference in the observance of that ceremonial law among the Jewa But it makes a strict observance of it impossible around the world. God knew exactly what He was doing.

law. I do not have words at my command to convey to the riends throughout the denomination, the Baptists of the world and the thousands of people of both races whom I ave worked with for fifty years, for their prayers sent up o a Heavenly Father, Who doeth all things well, making intercession with Him for me, Imploring, begging and partitioning Him to bring me back to health again. More han ten thousand letters, telegrams and messages reached my office in Nashville and the hospital in Cleveland. Ohio; more than two truck-loads of flowers were sent to

me,

I came back to Nashville in December, but under strict orders of eight doctors who looked after me in Cleveland, where my daughter, Mrs. Katheryn Boyd-Roach, the wife of Rev. A. L. Roach, resides. She and her husband were at the hospital every day. I kept in constant communication with the National Baptist Publishing Board's plant through the office secretary, with the Citizens Savings Bank & Trust Company through Mr. M. G. Ferguson, the executive vice-president and Miss H. L. Jordan the cashier, and with my wife, the late Georgia Bradford Boyd, who bore up under the ordeal of my absence and my illness until I returned to Nashville. She afterward went into the hospital at Nashville, was operated upon, but the Lord took her from us to be with Him in heaven.

Once more the nation and denomination were bowed in grief with me. They sent messages by mail, by wire, by long distance. I have, as far as is humanly possible, borne up under these two great strains and this irreparable loss, but, as I have said, and as you and others must say, "Thy will be done."

In spite of this illness and this severe loss, I present to you this Annual Report. One old sage said: "Brevity is the soul of wit," and I shall try to keep this report within that limitation.

Your Secretary has kept in touch with the denominational forces in America, in Africa, in the West Indies Islands, the Canal Zone and the Republic of Panama, not letting the interests of the Plant wane one bit. The strict diet that I was placed on by the doctors and the strict hours allowed me to work at the plant, the bank, and to do the traveling, have been observed as far as humanly possible; and yet I could not abstain from all the duties resting upon my shoulders, hence, I have done a great deal of work for the institution with which I am connected.

I traveled this year from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the Great Lakes to the Gulf and many points in between. The Lord has not only been with me, guiding and directing my every movement, but He has given me strength enough to carry on. He has answered my prayers, granted my petitions, and thus once more I am able to be with you at this session.

THE PERSONNEL OF THE BOARD

No changes in the personnel of the National Baptist Publishing Board have been made within the past convention year, or since we met in Cincinnati, Ohio last September.

Rev. J. B. Ridley, pastor of Mt. Olive Baptist Church, is the chairman; Rev. S. A. Pleasants, pastor of the St. John Baptist Church on Dowling Street in Houston Texas is vice-chairman; Rev. S. H. Simpson, pastor of the Greater St. John Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn., heads up the Executive Committee; Rev. Henry A. Boyd, Nashville, Tenn., is the secretary; Rev. E. M. Elmore, pastor of the Bates Memorial Baptist Church, Louisville, Ky., is a member; Rev. John W. Williams, pastor of the St. Stephen Baptist Church in Kansas City, Mo., is a member; Rev. A. A. Lucas, pastor of Good Hope Baptist Church in Houston, Texas is a member.

These members have cooperated beautifully with the secretary and chairman in carrying on the work of this Arm of the Convention. Each member of the Publishing Board named by the Convention at Cincinnati last year, coming one from each state in the General Conventions, has lent sympathetic support and guidance.

ASSOCIATIONS WITH WHICH YOUR BOARD IS COOPERATING

Your secretary has kept membership in many national organizations that have to do with the work of Religious Publishers. They are as follows: The Protestant Churchowned Publishers Association, made up of religious printing and publishing houses, with headquarters located in the Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, Pa., of which Mr. Gordon A. Grant is Executive Secretary, and which organization is responsible in the main for petitioning the last Congress, and was able to keep the postage on first, second and third class mail from being height to the point where it would have embarrassed all religious publishers. Another is the Publishers' Advisory Section of the Department of Religious Education of the National Council of Churches of Christ in America. This organization meets annually: the next meeting is to be held in Cincinnati, Ohio during the month of February. Another is the Associated Church Press, with head quarters at 152 Madison Avenue, New York. Last, but not least, your Board has been responsible for the payment of the annual assessment of \$4028.00 to the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., which provides that our Convention has membership in and becomes a part of one of the greatest Religious Movements,

INTERNATIONAL LESSON COMMITTEE

Membership in this Organization known as the International Lesson Committee, has been maintained by your

Publishing Board. It is one of the Arms of the Department of Religious Education and the International Council. The personnel of this committee from your Publishing Board is your secretary, Henry A. Boyd, your editorial secretary, Rev. E. H. Borden of Beaumont, Texas; the editor of Every Woman's Page" and "Hope" Magazine, Miss Mae E. Hunter, and Mrs. Katheryn Boyd-Roach of Cleveland, Ohio.

There is a vacancy on this committee which is being temporarily filled by the Rev. V. W. McLawler, a contributor and writer during the past year in the editorial department of the National Baptist Publishing Board.

Your secretary still believes that such representation, even though expensive, should be maintained, in order that he might keep well informed on the work of publishing the trends in editorial writings, and at the same time secure the help through this cooperation with all the big religious plants and the millions of denominational people in the United States and Canada.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Your Board maintains its membership in the Religious Educational Department of the National Council which was formerly the International Council of Religious Education. They maintain headquarters now in Chicago at 206 S. Michigan Avenue, and by keeping such membership in this phase of the National Council work it puts the Board in a position to get all the first-hand information on the work of religious education in the various communities, and while our National Baptist Convention of America has not seen fit to carry out the recommendations of the Executive Board several years ago in New Orleans. La., and again in Jacksonville. Fla., in having a full-time secretary of Religious Education, we are glad to report that the work is being done through your Board at the annual session of the Sunday School Congress which is a departmentalized movement, and which specializes and majors in training the youths in our denomination on the local church and convention level, giving them the advantages of the new trends as they are developed from year to year, without disturbing the work as our denominational people understand it, even in the one-room Sunday school clear through to the departmental lized church school.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN THE U. S. A.

I am reporting to you that the secretary of your Board was present, took part in and helped to formulate what is

now known as the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A., a movement of national and international importance, maintaining headquarters in New York City. The National Baptist Convention of America, by unanimous vote n Kansas City, Mo., last September authorized membership in this organization. Your secretary, along with Dr. P. S. Wilkinson of San Antonio, Texas, were in Cleveland, Ohio when the National Council was chartered, incorporated and launched. Your secretary was privileged to sign this charter as a representative of the National Baptist Convention of America.

There were forty-two denominations that gave official recognition to and became a part of this Council, which has various ramifications of religious activities, taking in the nter-denominations, but not committing them to any policy other than as they organize and carry on in their respective communions.

The President of the National Baptist Convention of Anerica, Dr. G. L. Prince, the First Vice-president, Dr. C. D. Pettiway, along with Dr. J. N. Byrd, Dr. P. S. Wilkinson, Dr. J. W. Williams and your humble servant were named on he National Council, and it was the privilege of your secreary to meet in the first call meeting that was held in hicago, Illinois in March of this year.

We met the financial requirement provided for a deomination in the Constitution, without calling upon the lational Baptist Convention of America to go into their mited exchequer to meet these assessments. We recomnend a continuation of this membership.

THE FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS

The Colored Baptist Ministers Association of Houston and larris County, Texas was host to the Forty-eighth session of he Sunday School Congress that was held in Houston June -8, 1952. The entertaining pastor was Rev. L. H. Simpson, astor of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, and president f this, one of the largest Ministerial Associations in our lational Convention. The secretary of this Association is lev. G. H. Guyton. Unstinted and whole-hearted support as given by this Texas group, so that the Congress which net this past June was one of the largest in the forty-eight ears of its existence.

We commend the friends throughout the nation for this imprecedented session, and this never-to-be-forgotten oc-

casion. A Story of the Congress, condensed, along with the Enrollment is contained in this Report.

THE PRINTING PAPER SITUATION

I am reporting to you, as I did in Cincinnati, Ohio, the following:

Nothing is definite at this writing as to where the cost of print paper will go, nor what the government will do with regard to rationing and restricting the use, even to religious publishers. The matter is in the hands of the most capable executives of the religious printing industry, and a committee from the Protestant Church-Owned Publishers Association is constantly on duty in the nation's capital, composed of three well informed religious leaders who are familiar with government machinery, who are personally acquainted with the leaders in both the House and Senate, to see that religious publishers and printers are given every possible consideration, in the light of the fact that they serve the armed forces, furnishing material to Chaplains and for religious services at the various camps.

The secretary of your Board has made the contributions annually, even to hospitals where soldiers are being cared for, and yet there has been three advances in prices in the cost of print paper, since we made our last annual report to you for the 1951 convention year.

THE LABOR SITUATION

Securing trained help, keeping a supply of journeymen printers, pressmen and men and women who are familiar with the work of the fourth estate in the art preservative is a daily problem. All of this is due to the fact that few young people now-adays, after they finish college and secure their degrees, are willing to come in as apprentices; in other words, they are not particular about starting at the bottom, learning the printing or publishing trade, and then wait their chance of advancement or promotion. There is a continuous turn over in labor, yet, in spite of this your Board has lived up to the Wage-Hour Law, and has not violated knowingly, any of the rules or regulations of the Labor Regulation Board of the U. S. Government.

Men and women who have organized themselves into various groups are constantly making demands for shorter hours, higher pay, vacation periods with pay, but religious publishers have found it difficult to grant these demands and to meet the requests that are constantly before us; yet your Board has kept a sufficient number of men and women

at work so that we have not missed the issuing of our periodicals regularly, nor any of our weekly publications. It has not been easy however, because when you are training help you must take well-trained people to train and guide the work of an apprentice; so you are paying two salaries and getting only a part of the regular production. But we are optimistic, and feel that we are making some headway along this particular line.

THE GRIM REAPER DEATH, HAS INVADED OUR RANKS THIS PAST YEAR

The grim reaper death, has invaded our ranks since I made my last report, and while we mourn our loss and grieve for them, it was God's will that they go. They are as follows: Mrs. Georgia Bradford Boyd, wife of the secretary, who was a contributor in the Editorial Department, and who produced our Christmas Program, our Children's Day Program and the Easter Greetings. She also headed the Primary Department of the Sunday School Congress; Miss Mary Love, who was a valued employee in the First-class Mailing Division and who was from Beaumont Texas; and Mrs. Charlotte McCain Sherren, who was in the Hope Magazine Department, associated with Miss Mae E. Hunter.

Your Board has thrown around these all the protection that could be given to them, namely: a Group Life Insurance Policy and two Hospitalization Policies, one of them from the Supreme Liberty Life Company with home office in Chicago, Illinois.

OUR EDITORIAL DEPARTMENT AND ITS WORKERS

One of the greatest problems before your Board is that of securing competent editorial writers who are well versed along theological lines, who understand the principles of our denomination, and who, in the language of my father, the late R. H. Boyd, who used to say, can be relied upon as strictly orthodox and purely baptistic. There is a crying need for editorial writers who are specializing in and trying to do something along the improvement line of building a periodical, getting our lessons, writing materials for the various grades in our Sunday schools, B. Y. P. U's and other church auxiliaries.

We have never been able to secure an editorial writer to give full time in the production of B. Y. P. U. literature and its various arms, such as the B. T. U., B. T. S., B. A. U. the Primary and the Intermediate. We have done very well in bringing out the Senior and Junior B. Y. P. U. Periodicals.

At present our editorial department is only partially staffed. The editor-in-chief or editorial secretary does not live in Nashville. This causes sometimes a delay in getting proofs back corrected and in the hands of the printer, but it has not been a serious threat, due to the fact that we work practically one year in advance.

We have been in correspondence with several minister who feel that they are interested in this phase of work, but we have not reached any definite conclusion or agreement

with them

HOPE MAGAZINE, A MONTHLY PUBLICATION

Without missing a single issue during the past year the Hope Magazine has appeared with clock-like regularity. It is the same high class periodical now that it has been in the past years, with much improvement. It is calculated to help Mission Circles, Women's Auxiliaries, Sewing Circles, Women's Church Clubs, and it carries many splendid recipes that can be used and are being used advantageously. The editorial work of this publication which your Board took over almost twenty years ago, is conducted by Miss Mae E. Hunter who does the editorial work on this publication, assists in the editorial department and conducts the Fireside School program in Nashville.

We are recommending that this periodical be continued. We have kept the price down in spite of the high cost of labor and material.

NATIONAL BAPTIST UNION-REVIEW

For fifty-two weeks during the past convention year your Board has put out, published, circulated and paid all operating expenses of the National Baptist Union-Review, the official organ of the National Baptist Convention of America. The publication is in volume 58, and will soon be fifty-nine years old. It was launched more than a half century ago by the late R. H. Boyd, your former secretary. It costs your board around \$550.00 every week to keep this paper going, pay the cost of printing, type setting, binding, postage, clerk hire and other incidental expenses that newspapers must bear if their publications continue to go. Rev. M. C. Allen, D. D., President of the Virginia Theological Seminary and College at Lynchburg, Virginia, has served as editor during the past convention year.

Your Board has felt and still feels that the National Baptist Convention of America should bear at least one-third of the operating cost rather than continue to pay just onehalf of the salary of an editor. The problem of bringing out religious newspaper every week is far greater than that of bringing out a secular paper, due to the fact that a secular newspaper can take any kind of advertising to help meet its operating cost, and then it can sell the paper on the streets each week at from ten to fifteen cents per copy, while this religious newspaper must keep in the narrow channel of possibility of circulation, made necessary because only certain matter should be put in the paper each week.

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL PERIODICALS

A complete line of Periodicals appearing quarterly and annually has been produced by your board in the plant situated at 523 2nd Avenue, North. The range of these periodicals and these publications carrying source material, begins with the Picture Lesson Card and goes clear through our Sunday school and church Auxiliaries set up until we reach the Sunday School Lesson Commentary, which is yet the premier publication in the whole line, published regularly.

While it is admitted that the improvements that we invisioned sometimes ago have not all been reached, the publications have kept abreast with the lesson trends without pitching their scope of reading matter beyond the masses. For many years the secretary of your board has recommended to you and the convention that a policy be invoked hrough our denomination whereby a piece of religious iterature can be placed into every Baptist home, so that a real ocular demonstration of that passage of scripture which ays: "Thy Word is a Lamp to my feet and a Light to my athway" can become a reality; because many homes have no Bibles, but these Sunday school periodicals carrying out the regular Cycle arranged by the Lesson Committee, with the Daily Home Readings and Reviews will enable the people who keep up with them to go through the Bible every five years.

THE BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION

This phase of our denominational work is in the hands of a Board created years ago when the Constitution of our convention was amended. This Board has a chairman, a secretary and members from each state convention or general association represented in the National Baptist Convention of America, but the printing and publishing of the material and magazines of that Board was delegated to the National Baptist Publishing Board by the Convention, which, at the

Muskogee, Oklahoma session some years ago voted that all the printing in the National Baptist Convention of Americ as a recognized body should be done by its own Publishin House, namely the National Baptist Publishing Board of Nashville. Tennessee.

In keeping therefore, with the work of the B. Y. P. U Board we have issued two Magazines every quarter, namely the Senior and the Junior. Along with these we have produced for circulation, and distribution B. Y. P. U. Pins, both celluloid and gold-filled, Pennants, Arm Bands, Constitutions, Manuals and various Cards such as Invitation and Membership, Object Charts and Wall Charts, and have offered to the B. Y. P. U. Board to carry a column in the Union-Review each week if some official of that board would edit the column. We have not attempted to bring out a Magazine for the B. T. U., which is the Baptist Training Union, or the B. A. U., Baptist Adult Union, the Primary or Intermediate Departments, but we have told many state leaden that when their local groups could assure this board that the bringing out of these three new publications would be justifiable by the circulation and distribution in the way of sales. and when we could find some one selected by this board or directed by this board to edit these three periodicals, the matter could be gone into, discussed and finally decided

THE NATIONAL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON COMMENTARY

There was brought out from your plant through its editorial department, its mechanical department and its printing presses a complete Commentary on the Sunday School lessons, using the International Lesson Series. Subjects, Texts, Daily Home Readings and other Outlines. We want to bring to the attention of your board the fact that has often been referred to that this was the first Sunday School Lesson Commentary published by any Baptists in the United States. It was fifty-four years ago last September while your convention was in session in Boston, Mass., that the first Commentary was presented to the Convention, and when such noted Baptists as Drs. Rowland, Morehouse and others who were present in Boston, told my father, the late R. H. Boyd, that a Baptist Sunday School Lesson Commentary could not be printed, could not be maintained, that it would be too expensive. My father listened to them, and his only remark to them at that time was: "Maybe it cannot," but I 'done done it'" and he produced the Commentary.

He further stated back there, more than a half century go, that "this board does not count dollars and cents when comes to making a Baptist," so since that time the Comentary has appeared with clock-like regularity. The editoral ecretary, Rev. E. H. Borden, D. D., and his able co-workers in that department have furnished the manuscript, your board has set the type, completed the press work and inding, and in New York City it will again distribute at last three hundred specimen copies to those leaders who ave discriminating taste, and who would like to look at it, riticize it, and then adopt it as one of their text books in heir Sunday school teachers' meeting and their state meetings, and then use it in their respective church schools.

MARCH AGAIN OBSERVED AS MEMORIAL MONTH

Through the cooperation of the R. H. Boyd Memorial ommission of which the Rev. A. A. Lucas, D. D., of Houson, Texas is the chairman, the month of March 1952 was gain observed by denominational forces of the United tates, Canada, Mexico, in fact throughout the confines of he territories of the National Baptist Convention of America, even down in Panama and in the Bahama Islands. Suggested Outline Program for observing this day or any ay, whether in March or later on, honoring the late R. H. loyd, who organized the National Baptist Publishing Board, and who built the magnificent plant housing this printing of publishing establishment in Nashville, Tenn., was printing in the National Baptist Union-Review and sent to thounds of schools and organizations requesting it.

While few donations were sent in the Commission and he National Baptist Publishing Board expressed their ratitude for the observance of this occasion, and were glad o print a report from those who sent them in. We recommend that your board continue to work with the R. H. Boyd femorial Commission, thus keeping alive the occasion, erpetuating his name and handing down to coming generations the life and work of one of the greatest leaders of our lay in Baptist circles.

THE BAHAMA ISLAND BAPTIST MISSION WORK

Your board has continued its cooperative work and its neouraging contributions to the seventy or more churches of the Bahamas of which Rev. Talmage Sands is the Superntendent of Missions, and which organization is one of the bjectives of the National Baptist Convention of America. Your board has contributed the literature to these Baptist

churches for their Sunday school, B. Y. P. U. and other church circles. We not only donated the literature for the past year as heretofore, but we advanced the money to pay the postage at the foreign postal rate. We also donated cash amounting to seventy dollars this past year to assist Rev. Mr. Sands in helping to furnish food and lodging for the representatives of these churches who met in Nassau for their 1952 Conference.

Your secretary recommends that we continue to give this literature each quarter to assist the Rev. Mr. Sands end his workers in having periodicals carrying source material and study courses for the Baptist young people as well as the grown ups in these Islands.

A CHURCH EDIFICE NEEDED DOWN IN PANAMA

I bring to you this request with regard to our work in Panama and on'the Canal Zone, which is conducted by Mrs. Bessie M. Thorbourne, the widow of the late Rev. R. H. Thorbourne, who, with her two helpers, continue to do an excellent piece of work.

I recommend that a nation-wide drive be continued to raise sufficient funds to build a new church edifice, the old one having been practically destroyed by termites. In my last report to you I made the following statement:

"Mrs. Thorbourne has been a painstaking, patient, determined Baptist leader. In succeeding to the work as superintendent left vacant by the death of her husband she has done a notable task. She is ably assisted by the Revs. S. N. Brown and A. W. Crooks, whom we designate on her recommendation as her helpers. They are maintaining four churches. They are sent their checks regularly every month from the National Baptist Publishing Board. While the amount is not large it serves to show these workers that the National Baptist Publishing Board of the National Baptist Convention of America appreciates the exceptional service that they are rendering.

In addition to the checks sent regularly the Board donates Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. literature to be used in their auxiliaries. The board also gives two extra donations raised at the National Model Sunday School in June and September of each year. A third donation was sent this year to Mrs. Thorbourne following the receipt of a letter from her saying the termites had attacked the parsonage that was built years ago, so that she would have some money to help make these needed repairs. Your board recommends again

that a nation-wide campaign be put on to raise at least twenty thousand dollars to repair the two churches that are badly in need of attention, and that if it is possible, additional money be raised to bring Mrs. Thorburne back to the states where she might spend at least three months to visit the homeland where she was born."

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

One of the perplexing problems of your board reported to you again this year by the secretary is the large amount of cash owing to the National Baptist Publishing Board by individuals, churches, associations and state conventions, which we call Accounts receivable. This amount represents credit extended in the form of printing, literature sales and other services, for which the board enters a charge. We are also still burdened with checks that are sent to us in payment of service, supplies, etc., which checks after being deposited in our bank are often returned marked "Insufficient Funds" or No Account in this Bank." Every time one of these checks is put in the bank and is not honored, it comes back to us through our bank with a minimum charge of from fifty cents to one dollar, so instead of collecting the money we have to pay the banks when the checks are not cleared or cashed.

We have tried in every way humanly possible to call the attention of the Baptist forces to this situation. For an example, if we extend one hundred thousand dollars worth of credit annually and do not collect one hundred thousand dollars, then that increases the indebtedness by six thousand, making the amount one hundred and six thousand dollars, because six percent interest is expected on all open accounts, known as carrying charge. Augmenting this burden is the expense of writing letters to these people, supplying the postage, paying the clerk hire, furnishing letterheads and envelopes.

Your Board therefore recommends that our denominational leaders, through our pastors, superintendents and church auxiliary heads, see that if a check is sent in payment of an account, that it be certified at the bank, or that they send an express money order, or some currency exchange, or the cash by registered mail.

GROUP LIFE INSURANCE PLAN AND HOSPITALIZATION POLICY

Your secretary wishes to report that we have in force what is called the Employees Benefit Plan, extended to those on the payroll of the National Baptist Publishing

Board's plant, and members of the National Baptist Publishing Board. The Plan is as follows: Every person on the payroll who has worked for at least three months is presented a two thousand dollar Group Insurance Policy, which policy is written in one of the largest insurance companies in the United States. The employee has the right to name the beneficiary, so that at his or her death the two thousand dollars will be paid to the person designated by them while they lived.

In addition to this they also receive two Hospitalization Policies in two large insurance companies. These Hospitalization Policies provide a minimum of five dollars per day during the time they are in the hospital, not exceeding a certain number of weeks. It further provides payment for doctor's fee, operations, surgical supplies, and where the employee is a woman it provides for maternity service.

We feel now, as we have always felt, that this protection and this service are appreciated by the people who are on the payroll of the National Baptist Publishing Board, and we recommend its continuance.

RELIGIOUS CENSUS IS ESSENTIAL IN OUR DENOMINATION

Your secretary, who is also secretary of the Sunday School Congress, has recommended, and we renew the recommendation, that a religious census be taken annually throughout the National Baptist Convention of America, because the Census Bureau in Washington has never been able to secure a correct census on Negro Baptists. It so happens that every Baptist church is its own boss or sovereign, they do not have to report to anybody except the Lord, and yet our government wants to know how many there are and where they are located. Our statistician of the National Baptist Convention of America, Rev. L. B. Tolson of Houston, Texas, has been embarrassed time and time again by the failure of churches, associations and state conventions to give him an accurate report.

Your board has names and addresses of every person who orders Sunday school literature, B. Y. P. U. supplies, Mission Guides, Brotherhood Union material, but ofttimes these orders do not carry the name of the church, its location the name and address of the pastor. Very often the superintendent's name is not carried.

We recommend that a convention-wide campaign be entered into so we can bring this census report up to date and be able to report to the Census Bureau our numerical strength when called upon by it.

NEW MACHINERY

Only one piece of new machinery has been added to the manufacturing department of your plant within the present year, and that was a book-rounding machine; that is, a machine that will round the corners of a book when it is sewed, trimmed, so that the casing fits perfectly on the book after it is placed into the pressing machine. The cost of this piece of machinery was \$6,950.00, but your secretary figures that it will pay for itself within two years, and while it is paying for itself, we will be keeping that much additional work in the plant, distributing the cost among the employees in the form of salaries.

Your secretary has reported to you for the past three or four years that ere long we must put in new, improved printing presses, especially a color press and a new offset press with greater speed, accuracy and perfection than some of the ones we now have. We have been slow to put these in because it has not been easy to find young men who are willing to start at the bottom and learn to be journeymen printers or pressmen, but we believe we will be able to overcome this situation or condition as the work tension

PLANT PROTECTED BY FIRE INSURANCE, FULL COVERAGE

Your secretary is reporting to you that we have continued to carry all kinds of insurance on the physical plant of your board which provide a protection and safeguard. For an example, few people realize that when you carry fire insurance it does not protect your property if a wind storm or tornado blows the building down, and this falling of the building causes electric wires to cross or something like that, and the building catches fire. In order to protect against this we carry fire insurance and fire and wind storm insurance. This is what you call full coverage.

We also maintain a watchman's clock, so that the night watchman during the night and holidays must go over the building in every department every hour, because there are eighteen or twenty stations to be punched. We also carry employee's liability and compensation insurance, so that if any one is hurt on the plant your board is protected by the insurance company. We carry insurance on the board's Chrysler truck against fire and collisions.

HENRY ALLEN BOYD, Secretary SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS Nashville 3, Tennessee Houston, the "Bayou City", Houston the "City Of hurches," Houston the "Metropolis of the Lone Star State" ad been marking time for several months waiting the arrival of June 4th when the Forty-eighth Annual Session of he Sunday School Congress was scheduled to convene within her gates. The Colored Baptist Ministers Association of Iouston and Harris County, the citizenry, the various committees, such as Housing, Program, Finance, had declared, in the language of the song, "All Things Are Ready." On the other hand, messengers, representatives, pastors, minisers, Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. workers from churches all over the United States were anxiously counting the days when they would converge upon this great metropolitanity to participate in this Summer School of Methods that thracts people in all walks of life, regardless of denomination.

Houston, Texas, June 4, 1952. WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

The Forty-eighth Annual Session of the Sunday School Congress was officially opened at ten o'clock in the main auditorium of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, after the auspicious parade which covered several blocks around the area of this church. It was a beautiful, attractive demonstration, and was composed of the Sunday School Congress Band from Nashville, Tenn., the Ebenezer Sunday School Band of Chicago, Illinois, the Bugle and Drum Corps of the St. Stephen Baptist Sunday school, Kansas City, Mo., the Cadets and Patrol of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, the Henry Allen Boyd, Band of Houston, the St. Mary Baptist Church Band of Houston, and there were Cadets, Majorettes with Color Guards from St. Stephen Baptist Church. These music organizations were interspersed between messengers, horus members, Congress officials, ministers, Sunday chool and B. Y. P. U. workers and others who joined with the marching, which the bands played "Onward Christian Soldiers," "Hail The Baptist Congress" and other religious airs. SUGGESTED FIVE POINT PROGRAM OF EVAGELISM

OF THE

NATIONAL EVANGELICAL BOARD

OF THE

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

Rev. H. H. Robinson, Chairman

We call attention to the fact that the forces of paganism are more aggressive in their attempts to crush Christianity and to dominate makind than at any time in many centuries. Some Governments are deliberately attempting to destroy all religion. Drinking, gambling and sensuality which a few years ago skulked in dark corners, now fount themselves before the eyes of men and spend uncounted millions for the best available publicity talent to make their own practices the common ways of men.

In the face of this situation the church is the one institution that is divinely commissioned to proclaim the gospel the Christ who slope can save men. Of all the organizations in this highly organized world, the church with the organizations growing out of it is the only one that can or will evangelize the world. If this is to be done, we must do it if we do not do it, it will not be done.

In the face of this situation our churches have too often ignored their responsibility, and our people have too commonly left the task to others. We have been content with lesser victories and have neglected thus fundamental task.

We have too little heeded the Great Commission. "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, haptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatever! have commanded you; and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:18-20).

We are cheered however by the fact that there is a rising tide of evangelism today. From countries all over the world come reports of renewed activity in this field and many report most gratifying results.

In view of these things we, the representatives of the Evangelical Board of the National Baptist Convention of America who are charged with the responsibility for evangelism in our respective fields, earnestly suggest the following program of evangelism.

This program might embody the following five undertakings: 1. A Call to Repentance

We call our people to repentance and a renewed dedication to the will of God. As individuals we have many sins of which to repent. As a hady we must repent of our sung self-satisfaction; of our readiness to condemn the sins of others and to ignore our own offences in the same matters; of the selfish carelesaness with which we have rejoiced in our blessings and have ignored the needs of men who know not God; of our greater readiness to spend money on our own pleasures than on the needs of the Kingdom enterprises.

That repentance must lead to us a dedication to a higher level of life. Every individual and every institution must in the end measure its standards by the standards of God. In nothing clee do we show our lack of the sense of the presence of God so much as we do in our readiness to accept the common standards of a social, professional, or business group and to disregard the standards of Christ. We would call our people to a more careful study of the Bible that they may know the will of God for their personal lives and to a more earnest observance of personal communion with Christ, the family alter and church worship, that they may draw from Christ the grace, courage and strength to live up to those standards. We call our people and churches to lives of deepened spiritual power.

2. An Enlistment of Personal Soul Winners

We must enlist our people in personal witnessing from Christ. This was the power of the early church. It is written: "And at that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem; and they were all sentered abroad throughout the regions of Judea and Samaria, except the apostles. * * * Therefore they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:1, 4.) This must be remembered before the church can come to the fullness of its power. Laymen must give their testimony whereever they go. Youth must witness to youth as only youth can. Ministers must not only preach in the pulpit but must also witness in their personal relations with men.

This will be done in part in organized ways by which individuals will be sent to talk with others. It will, however, come to its highest power only as people seize the apportunities that come in their common contacts with friends, with casual acquaintances and with strangers and bear their witness spontaneously and naturally. Our whole people must become conscious of the fact that witnessing is the usual, taken-for-granted activity of a Christian.

3. A Perennial Program for Local Churches

We challenge our churches to a perennial activity in evangelism. We have depended too much on campaigns, meetings and seasons, when evangelism should be the paramount interest and the perpetual enterprise of the church. Special campaigns are a good beginning but are not sufficient to meet the need. Thus evangelism is an inevitable part of the perpetual life of a New Testament church.

Each local church should build a program of evangelism that will run throughout the year and will have some suitable activity for every season. We call our churches to a perennial program of evangelism.

4. A Program for Culture of Converts

We call the attention of the constituent bodies and their churches to the extreme importance of the culture of those who are won to Christ. This has been our great weakness. This is why our net increase of membership is not at all commensurate with the number of baptisms. This is why the number of members in a church is no assurance of the number of workers, the number of givers, the number of attendants, or the number that can be rallied to the support of any great Christian cause. We have too much neglected all of the Great Commission, but we have grossly ignored the command, "Teaching them to observe all things, whatsoever! I have commanded you." We call upon our churches to follow a definite perennial program for the development of their converts in all Christian virtues and graces.

5. A Program for Each State Convention or State Association

We suggest that each State Convention adopt a program of evangelism. We recognize the fact that each organization will have it own peculiar needs, problems and opportunities. It is not possible to prepare any one program that will be of value to all. We believe, however, that each body should have a definite program with which to challenge its churches to their highest possible effectiveness in this field. We urge each constituent body to prepare such a program and to promote it with all possible earnestness.

THE SOCIAL, ECONOMIC, AND INDUSTRIAL LIFE OF THE NEGRO IN AMERICA

New York City September 13, 1952

To our distinguished President, honorable Vice Presidents, Officers, and Messengers here assembled in our 72nd Annual Session—in the words of the great missionary, the Apostle Paul, I greet you today, as he spoke to the church at Corinth in his first letter; thus: "I thank my tiod always on your behalf, for the grace of God which is given you by Jesus Christ, that in everything ye are enriched by Him, in all utterances, and in all knowledge; even as the testimony of Christ was confirmed in you; so that ye come behind in no gifts; waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Beginning fifteen years ago, in 1937, it has been my pleasant task to report on the above named subject. The report in former years has been presented for the most part in figures, statistics, and percentages. It is hoped at this time that deviation from such type of report will be accentable.

The task of world leadership placed on America by forces beyond tontrol has caused America to look inward and to a limited degree to listen to the prodding of its conscience. Therefore, since the inception of this report, subtle, but definite changes have taken place in the social, economic life of the Negro.

In the first report given at Birmingham, Alabama, it was stated that "in the life of the Negro there is industrial discrimination, for example, he may not be a money-changer in a subway, but as a measurger carry thousands of dollars daily; he may not sell goods over many a counter, yet he may deliver them; he may be a porter in charge of a pullman car without a conductor, but never a conductor." Today, none of these examples are true with as much certainty as they were lifteen years ago.

Since 1947, two states have enacted anti-lynching laws and six cities and four states have enacted laws against wearing masks in public in Columbus County, North Carolina, the Ku Klux Klan received the hardest legal flogging in its history, the leader was given four years in prison and fifteen others got sentences averaging three years each and 49 others were fined a total of \$18,250. Such harsh legal action meted out by a jury

of Illinois citizens and a Federal judge may serve as a rude awaken. ing to law enforcement officers throughout the nation.

In education-the Negro has gained admission to colleges and universities hitherto closed, through court decisions. In ten states, state universities and other schools have opened their doors to Negro students. A case in point is the Junior College of Corpus Christi. Texas which willingly opened its doors to Negroes.

In housing-the outlawing of restrictive covenants and the increase of public housing has done much toward the elimination of slum districts.

In the report for 1947, it was stated that the Negro has two potential weapons-his purchasing power and his voting strength. At this time the Negro is fully aware of these two facts and will use them both to his best advantage. At the same time this power is not being overlooked by the business man and the office seeker. The weight of the Negro voter is the strongest potential factor in the coming national elections. This is the finding of Elmo Roper, veteran public aginion analyst. His survey shows that the Negro vote in several Northern states has swung elections aiready this year.

In the Armed Services-the Air Force, and the Navy have eliminated segregated units, quotas and other racial distinctions. The Army is slower, but gradually moving in the direction of integration. General Ridgeway ordered progressive integration in the Far East when he assumed Command. Recently a similar order was issued to the European Command.

The acceptance of Negro passengers in Pullman cars travelling across state lines; the outlawing of restrictive covenants; the admission of Negroes to former all-white schools; the loss of white supremacy as a railying point for Southern politicians are all indices of a trend toward full citizenship for the Negro.

In conclusion, the following is quoted in part from an editorial written by Dr. M. C. Allen, in the Union-Review issue dated July 5,

"It so happens that the Negro lives in a society that has segregated him in everything that is fundamental in a culture. The nurnoss of segregation, in western culture was to brand the Negro with inferiority. The Negro Church is the only one in America that preaches and teaches universal brotherhood. The Negro knows that his philosophy and interpretation of Christ and democracy is superior to the race that has segregated him. The Negro preaches, teaches, and practices the universal principles of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man, that a profound respect for the sacredness of personality, wherever found, is the greatest moral, spiritual, and intellectual achievement of man. The Negro discovered that he could endure the hell heat of segregation and the degradation of 250 years of slavery without becoming embittered against those who per-petrated upon him atrocities not fit to print."

Quoting further, the editorial states "Sogregation was intended to discourage the Negro But, instead of discouraging him, segregation inspired him. It inspired him to build a home, rear a family, and when he was not admitted into the schools and churches of the segregating race, it inspired him to build and man a church of his own, a church dedicated to the saving of souls of men, irrespective of race. It inspired the Negro church to build and man schools that would admit anybody who had character and intellect sufficient to live in a school community and master the courses of study. Instead of discouraging the Negro, it inspired him to set a table of moral restraint and intellectual achievements right in the presence of enemies. Instand of segregation discouraging the Negro, it inspired him to buy farms, sink oil wells, build factories, insurance companies, newspapers, publishing houses. Instead of segregation discouraging the papers, publishing invoices. Insceed of segregation discontinging the Negro, it inspired him to become dectors who would treat anybody who had a pain, lawyers who would take the case of anybody who needed legal council and advice. It inspired him to establish banks that would handle, loan, and save the money of any race. Instead of segregation discouraging the Negro, it inspired him to give to the world the only original music of the Western Hemisphere. It inspired him to become eloquent preachers and the most dynamic leaders of the North American continent.

It may be that God in His All-Wise providence regarded our race





Doors

How many doors do you suppose there are in the United States! One large manufacturer has figured that there are nine doors for every man, woman and child in this country. Let's see, that would make about 1,350,000,000 doors.

There is something particularly significant about a church door. Usually it is heavy and strong-not in order to keep intruders out but to remind you of the strength which it offers to weak souls, I atill remember as if it were yesterday how impressed I was with the strong doors of the churches on a certain famous street in New York. I was young, and I faced a crisis decision which was too big for me to handle alone. So I sought the quiet of a church one afternoon. Door after door was firmly closed and locked. I needed the quiet and strength of God's house; but they were closed to me. Those door seemed to say, "Don't blame me or the God you seek to worship here. People who are responsible for such matters simply did not realize that anyone would need to come in at this hour. If they had known they would have left me unlocked. That afternoon I resolved that if I ever had any say over church doors, I would see that at least one was left open. When the architect was planning the lovely little one was server open. Since the asked me if there was any particular thing chapel at the church, he asked me if there was any particular thing wanted. The reply was es, we want no lock on the door of the chapel. Let it be open 24 hours a day." And it is,

Church doors invite us with a strong welcome to an experience with God. A little key stood in front of a church, looking through the door into the foyer that led to the sanctuary. There was a wistful look on his face, and the usher said, "Are you looking for someone, son?" The little fellow replied with a question. "Mister," he said.

"Who, son " Who do you mean ""

"God," replied the lad, "Is God in there? They say this is God's house. Is he really in there?"

FRIENDS WILL YOU OFEN THE DOOR AND LET HIM IN!

Do you remember the old-fashioned attic which was an indispensable part of every house? They were wonderful places, these attics were. You could no more think of a house without an attic

than you could think of a barn without a loft. On a rainy day it was wonderful place to play hide and seek. It was high adventure to explore the dark corners of this wierd and wonderful place. There were boxes with covers on them, and old trunks, and stacks and stacks of papers, furniture that was no longer used, hanging on rafters were coats and dresses and suits of an ancient vintage. It was lots of fun to go up there, get all dressed up in grown-up clothes and "play like" you were grown folks.

In the days of the attic nothing was thrown away. If it was no longer useful, it was stored in the attic. It was never discarded or destroyed. You might have use for it some day-maybe ten years from now-so store it in the attic.

The foundation of the house was under the first floor, but the foundations of the family were in the attic. It gave them rootage in the past. It bound their yesterdays with their todays and their Lomorrows.

Maybe one of the reasons why so many families break up these days and scatter to the far corners of the earth is because they have so attics where they are not dead. A family that is entirely contemporary, that does not have some place where memories are stored, is likely to lead a tumble weed existence-without any deep roots that keep them put. There is something all wrong about these little cottages and efficiency apartments. They are as handy as a pocket in a shirt, but they don't have an attic, and so when apything is no longer useful or needed, there is nothing to do but throw it away. And with it go the sentiments and the memories that tie the rears in one bundle.

Up in the attic you can hear voices. An old dress says, "Do you remember the first time you were me? My, you were charming then and quite silly, too." And off your mind goes to relive a thousand pleasant experiences which you had forgotten. "God gave us memory that we might have roses in December"-and there is a whole greenhouse full of these roses in the attic.

One thing I must underscore: don't let the waste basket take the place of the attic. Things that go in the waste basket are soon carted away and burned. No matter how much you may want them, you cannot recover them. At the turn of this century, Ernest Renau, a French Philosopher, said, "The Twentieth Century will spend a lot of its time picking out of the waste hasket things the Nineteenth Contury threw into it." That noise you hear sometimes is made by the hands of humanity, fumbling in the waste basket, trying to find some precious thing it had thrown into it. But a waste basket is no place to put anything valuable. If you do not find a need for it, put it in the attic. Some day you will need it, and then you will thank God that you did not throw it away.

In one sense, the Church is the spiritual attic of humanity. We discurd a lot of ideas and ways of living, and convictions, and we call them old-fashioned. If it were left to us we would just throw them in the waste basket and let them be hauled away. But the church puts them in the attic and keeps them safe. Then one day her poor, besten, impoverished children go fumbling around, crying for an old word which they have lost-that word is God. And the Church, which they had neglected and criticized as being antiquated and useless, says, "Here, my child. Don't throw it away, for I knew some day you would want it, want it more than anything in the world. Here it is. God and I have been waiting for you a long time. Now let us go on together."

They were two of the most energetic of the twelve disciples and were called "Sons of Thunder" because they were noisy and always in the midst of some kind of storm James and John had joined the ranks because they liked Jesus, but they had no definite idea what it was all about; and now they wanted to know where the enterprise was heading, and just what there would be in it for them.

"Master," they said. "We want to sak you what plans you have in mind for us. You're going to need BIG men around you when you establish your kingdom, our ambition is to sit on either side of you, one on your right hand and the other on your left."

self, certainly no one else will. If you want a big place go and ask for it and work toward that end. That's the way to get ahead.

Jesus answered James and John with a sentence which sounds almost abourd.

Whosever will be great among you, shall be your minister" he said, "and whosever of you will be the chieftest, shall be servant of all." A fine piece of advice, isn't it. Be a good servant and you will

be great; be the best possible servant and you will occupy the highest possible place. Now that is just what men thought for some hundred of years; and, then, quite suddenly business woke up to a great discovery You will hear that discovery proclaimed in every sales convention as something modern and up to date. It is crublazoned in the advertising pages of every magazine, newspaper, and over the radio and television.

Let us look at a few of these advertisements. Take the advertisement of an automobile company, one of the greatest in the world And why is the greatest? On what does it base its claim to leadership! On it thousands of workers and high salaried executives? They are never mentioned. On its huge factories and financial strength? No the company says, "We are great because of our services." We will crawl under your car oftener and get our backs dirtier than any of our competitors. Drive up to our service station and ask for anything all—it will be granted cheerfully." "We serve; therefore we grow."

A manufacturer of shoes makes the same boast in other terms. "We put ourselves at your feet and give you everything you can possibly demand." Manufacturers of building equipment, of clothing and of food—all of them tell the same story. "Service is what we are here for," they exclaim. They call it "service that wina." Jesu preached this idea more than nineteen hundred years ago.

One afternoon in a Pullman car the late George W. Perkins was

talking about why men succeed and fail.

Perkins said "I am amuzed by some men who ask me to use my influence to get them better positions or increase in salary. Such an attitude on their part shows an absolute failure to understand the fundamentals of success. In all the years that I was with the New York Life Insurance Company, I never once asked what my salary was to be or my title. None of us who made that company ever wasted time over such questions. We had a vision of expanding the Company's service throughout the world, of making it the finest most useful institution of its kind. We made it that and it made us

What Perkins said sounds sensible—doesn't it? Good business sense. But how does this sound? "If you are forever thinking about saving your life," Jesus said, "you'll lose; but the man or woman who loses his life shall find it."

Because Jesus said it and he was a religious teacher, because it is printed in the Bible, the world has dismissed it as high minded ethics but not hard headed sense. But look again. What did Perkins of the New York Life Insurance Company mean if it wasn't that he and his friends buried themselves in their great undertaking and literally lost their lives in it? And when they found themselves again, they were all of them bigger, richer than they had over supposed they would be Would success have come to them had they heen careful about themselves? We must not overdo this thing, they might have said. "This is a good company and deserves to grow, but every man must look after his interest. Just what is there woing to be in it for us?" With but never to an understanding success.

Here is another and the greatest principle: remember the words of the Lord Jesus how he said "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Mankind came very mear lesing these words. They are not recorded in any of the four Giospels. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John very nice talk about giving instead of receiving," thought Matthew perhaps. "It may work in religion, but it is no good

in the tax collecting business." A splendid thought John may have said to himself "Maybe the disciples imagined that the Master had nade a mistake, or that they had heard him incorrectly. At any rate they all passed over it. But the Apostle Paul did not. He who had given up a social position for the service of the Galilean, he who had given more than any of them. He heard the words and remembered. Reinderstood what the Master said and meant by a Service that Wins.

Friends, as officers and members of this great convention, let us render that wholehearted service for the Master, a Service that will win. Work with the president in putting over this great program for the Master, don't wait to be told to up everything. Put yourself in

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

A short History of the Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention of America

I thank God for the privilege to read this Report.

The brief history of the Woman's Convention is a grand and glorious affirmation of the claim of the ability of Women to accomplish Christian work. This Convention has attempted great things for God and expects great things from God. The work of the Christian leaders of the nation serves as an inspiration not only to us. but to the unborn generations. Since the day women conceived and developed this great Organization, it has become increasingly evident that there is work of value and strength to be done.

Since the history of this Convention has been in print from time to time, this resume will recall a few of the facts. Just a re-

view of some of the progress.

Raiance

It will be difficult to mention all the work achieved and the names of the dynamic leaders who together wielded or made outstanding contributions. I could not evaluate their great work if I tried. May I say in the outset, that it took and will continue to take Christian team-work of many thousands of faithful women. Prior to the year 1900, the women of the National Baptist Convention did their work through Boards of the Convention and a Woman's Board. The women continued to work, trusting that this day would come, and on September 15, 1900, the women met at Richmond, Virginia. This Convention was organized by the Parent Body's recommendation. This Auxiliary National Woman's Convention addressed itself to the task of enlisting, combining and directing the efforts of the women and children at home and abroad for the purpose of enlightening, enlisting, collecting and raising money for Education and Missions, both Home and Foreign.

Believing that men everywhere should know their God, their first Motto selected was "Woman Arise: He Calleth for Thee."

The first Annual Meeting was held in Cincinnati, Ohio, 1901. Strange as this may be, our last Annual Meeting in 1951 was held in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Up to the time of separation, 1915, we had only a small paper (The Worker) and a Pledge Chart. In 1916, our Corresponding Secretary Mrs. M. A. B. Fuller, set to the task of writing and publishing literature for the Convention, Guides for Home and Foreign Missian Societies, Y.W.A. and Star Light Bands. In 1922, she introduced a resolution asking the President to appoint a committee to name a Boy's Organization, which was named The Shepherd Boy's League. The next was a Girl's Auxiliary, Mother's Union and Junior Mission Guides, a Pledge Chart, Hand Books for all Organizations, Recitations and Dialogue Books. Edited a paper, Woman's Helper for seven years. This is the only Convention that publishes literature for all of its Missionary Organizations. This fact was very evident at the

Baptist World Alliance in Cleveland, Ohio, 1950.

When our President told them the literature we had, how we operated our work, and how well it was organized, they have been clamoring for literature and plans ever since. She has organized two organizations since she has been President: The Junior Woman's Auxiliary and the Youth's Conference. The Parent Body has taken both organizations over however, without our consent.

They are capably and efficiently directing their services to the Glory of God and the benefit of humanity in Home and Foreign Missions. Their reports warm our hearts

At the time Dr. Fuller was elected President, we were raising around \$1900.00. Now we have grown to \$35,000.00. We give to the Parent Body around \$2500.00 or \$3000.00 annually. Aside to Home and Foreign Missions, Education, Evangelism, Charity and help students in

We support financially eight (8) colleges, one Mission Station in Africa, seventeen (17) in the Bahamas and one (1) in Canal Zone Pays for all Missionary literature printed. \$500.00 annually on

Every Woman's Page.

She is the world's greatest Organizer to us. Mrs. Fuller indeed has so organized our National Woman's Convention until every woman is reached and is functioning in the promotion of the total program of Missionary Education. She arranges adequate time for each Committee to do their special work. There is no overlapping of

The Convention is making history in carrying out the Unified Plan of Work. The Spiritual life of our Convention is prayer and self-

The Second Annual Meeting made history that can never be erased from the minutes of our Organization. It was "That memorable Birmingham Meeting." Someone yelled out "fight or quiet" and the audience took the yell to be fire-Results were a panic and stampede followed and one hundred and nine persons lost their lives, just after the address of Dr. Booker T. Washington. Following this meeting. Miss E B Delaney of Florida, sailed for Africa and we supported her work. Annual meetings have been held each year sine and it was in 1915 a Division came.

The meeting was held in Chicago, Illinois, in the Regiment Armory. The women followed their Pastors, District and State Conventions. In 1916, we met in Kansas City, Missouri. They did not have self-pity, but they recognized their opportunity to serve. As a blessing, thus the officers elected were: Mrs. G. M. Ashburn, Illinois, President; Mrs. Anna Washington, Indiana, Vice-President; Mrs. Helm Adams Moore, Ohio, Recording Secretary; Mrs. G. E. Dennis, Arkan-Sas, Assistant Secretary; Mrs. M. A. B. Fuller, Texas, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Elia Wheeler Abner, Texas, Auditor; Mrs. E. W. Grimble, Louisiana, Treasurer: Mrs. Effie Bushell, Texas, Chorister; Mrs. E. O. Wood. Oklahoma, Statistician: Missionaries: Mrs. A. Rayford, South Carolina: Mrs. Ida Beck, Missouri.

The Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention of America held their first Annual Session in Liberty Baptist Church, Atlant,

Thus this Organization is a powerful factor in the religious life of our Baptist Women. We have grown by leaps and bounds, intellectually, numerically, Spiritually and financially,

We have twenty-nine (29) State Conventions representing in the National Convention with a membership of 2,600,000.

The President and Executive Board supplies a Calendar of Activities for the year and the Plan of Work.

The National Woman's Convention works harmoniously and the increase of delegates from 1916 to 1951 is now a host of faithful and logal wamen from all over this entire Continent, even from the isles of sea we gather in each Annual Session. In 1928, at Shreveport, Louisiana, the Convention overwhelmingly elected our president, Dr. M. A. B. Fuller, an authority on work of Christian Women as well as women professional and business

And now-We can easily estimate that we are here in New York more than anno in attendance. We have a larger program. Our emphases are on soul saving at home and around the world, teaching and preaching the Gospel. We are on higher grounds, for the Master, developing a better brand of Christians. Lifting the Banner of Christ in America, Saving Boys and Girls. Giving them a chance.

THE ANNUAL MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT Mrs. Hattie L. E. Williams

To our Charming Vice President, Our Beautiful and Efficient Secretaries, Our Most Worthy Treasurer, Our esteemed State Presidents, Our outstanding Chairladies of all the Committees, Our most wonderful Choristers, Pulpit Guest, To all our sweet Messengers here assembled, Christian Friends, Ladies and Gentlemen:

"O sing unto the Lord, a new song; for He hath done marvelous things for us, whereof we are glad. We are His people and the sheep of His pasture, for the Lord is good; His mercy is everlasting. We rejoice today in the God of our salvation, for permitting us

We rejoice today in the God of our salvation, for permitting us to greet each other face to face in another annual session. We can look around us and see that the chain has not been broken. Are you thankful?

And as you take a retrospective view, does it bring happy tears in your eyes, or sorrow in your heart? Just pause for a moment and think of His Goodness to you and me.

We are here from the beautiful waters of the Atlantic on the East, from the golden West on the Pacific, from the winter play-ground of America, Florida on the Bue Gulf, the Blue Ridge mountains of Virginia on the Chesapeake and the rolling plains of the middle West. We are thrilled to be holding our 9th Annual Session in the Metropolis City of America. As we entered this beautiful State we beheld the towering mountains and immediately gathered mountain top experiences of our Master who seeing the multitude went up into a mountain and there He began to teach His Disciples. As we watch beautiful Lakes we were reminded of the handiwork of God, and as we entered this beautiful City, we beheld the wonderful skyscrapers and the outstanding Institutions of learning and we then thought of the Scriptures that say, "Wisdom hath founded this City," a City of culture, glamour and where freedom bells ring the loudest.

We open the Book. In the beginning GOD: the Creator of the World, its peopling with the lower orders of life; and then how promptly the old Book answers. For here in the first two chapters is the very basis we need for all our thinking about people.

Have we not all one Father? Hath not one God created us? Why then do we deal Treacherously every man

As children of one heavenly Father, I must think of all men w brothers. This is not merely a matter of suntiment; it is a practical fact. The world of today is one great neighborhood, the human race one family Each is dependent upon thousands of others, and the welfare of each tied up with that of all.

Everyone is surely saying, "But what can women do? If our society goes heserk, women have more to lose and she has more to gain if she aids in saving it In any monstrous crisis, women are ways the heaviest losers. War takes their sons and husband, blights their future, rips their security to shreds.

The same Christ can free them, but first He must be preached, it is that simple. Our gifts to Missions hasten the day of freedom and salvation for all.

There are specific things women can do; SOUL COMMITMENT. Let us bow and worship with the Wise Men in Bethlehem, in sober self examination and aspiration. God will show us that we have powers and energies that have never been used. He can release power in all human atoms.

What could not several million Christian women do if all were sholly committed to the task of World salvation.

Juvenile Delinquency: Brother F. D. Dinkins, Chairman Brother President, Officers and members of the National Baptist Brotherhood

It is indeed a pleasure for this committee to make it's report, as to what we have done, what we have heard, what we have seen and what we expect to do. We left Cincinnati last year with the burden of our boys and girls on our hearts as to the problems of life which faces them as they climb the ladder of maturity. According to the thinking of some of our best authorities on this matter the picture grows darker and darker. May I quote Mr. Edgar A. Hoover, an authority on crime and disorder? Some years ago, he stated. "The many line attainments of American youngsters to assume adult responsibilities have been smeared by the dishonest anti-social behaviour of, boys and girls who seek happiness by illicit means. There must be an answer to their illegal un-American behavior. An analysis of the structure of society inevitably includes a survey of man's attitude and action with regards to his fellow man. The progress of society depends upon man. It's downfall is his responsibility.

"A nation's rise to a great height depends upon law and order. A nation's downfall therefore depends or is a result of laziness and disorder". Mr. Edgar A. Hoover also states that there can be no doubt that Juvenile Delinquency is one of our most serious social

problems

Dr. Martha Hill, chief of Uncle Sams Children Bureau, who held a meeting in this city during the month of July of this year states, That the statistics, taken from the files of the Children's Bureau. shows that the number of Children picked up as delinquents has increased 19 per-cent since 1948, reaching 1,000,000 a year and will go at least 50 per-cent higher in the next ten years unless this country wakes up and does more to help the Youth from going wrong.

We find that this problem of Juvenile Delinquency is local and must be defeated in the community. It is also found that the causative factors of delinquency are various and that these can be a serious enemy unless the cause is found. According to the Law of Generalization, the home is the root of good or evil. If there can be a strengthening of the spiritual structure of our homes, this evil problem will be well on the way of being solved. The parent generally is the child's first teacher. Since this is true, we recommend that God would be accepted as the teacher of the Parent. If this is done we know what the results will be: more honorable and blessed children, In Houston, Texas, the City-Wide Brotherhood has given this committee a space on each monthly program and we have listened to some of the best men and women of our city on Juvenile Delinquorey and the Home. The lectures have been inspirational, educational and beneficial. We also showed a splendid picture in some of our churches, titled, "The Bible In The Home". This picture was worth its weight in gold to the grown ups as well as the children. We are doing our very best to help eliminate this great evil which is destroying the reputation, character and lives of some of our splendid children.

As a committee we submit the following recommendations:

1. That every man who is a member of the Brotherhood will maintain and establish the family altar in his home.

2. That every man who is a member of the Brotherhood will strive to establish in his church and community a family altar in every home.

3. That men will read, atudy and meditate on God's Word at least once a day and encourage others to do so.

4. Where young people can be found and can be approached, do your best to help them out of this condition.

5. Encourage delinquents to attend church, Sunday School, and other religious activities. Invite them to your social features where they can see how good boys and girls enjoy themselves.
