





CONSTITUTION

THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We the members of the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America and the National Baptist Convention of America, do unite ourselves together for the purpose of doing Missionary, Educational and all Religious Work among ourselves, and throughout the world, therefore we adopt this Constitution.

ARTICLE 1.-Name

This Body shall be known and styled, "The National Baptist Convention of America."

ARTICLE II.—Membership

SECTION 1.—The membership shall be Annual, Orthodox Baptiss Churches, District and General Association and State Conventions, If there be a group of churches within a State which has no General Association; or State Convention connected with this Convention, this group of representatives from these churches shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that

SECTION II.—Any individual in good and regular standing with a Baptist Church may become a member with full privileges by paying the sum of ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

SECTION III.—Each church shall pay Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION IV—Each District Association shall pay fifty (\$50.00)
Dollars for representation and entitled to one messenger and Ten
(\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION V.—Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to five messengers and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

ARTICLE III.-Use of Finance

All linance received by the Convention shall be placed into the treasury for its expenses and appropriations, provided that designated money shall be paid as so designated.

ARTICLE IV .- Officers

The Officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries, Corresponding Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Tressurer, General Auditor, and His-

torian. These shall be elected annually, and bold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association cooperating with this Body shall be Associate Vice President.

ARTICLE V .- Duly of Officers

SECTION I.—The President:

He shall be the Presiding Officer; sign all Calls for regular or special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body. He may make any visit that will be profitable to the Convention. He is the Chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION II.-First Vice President: At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon him.

SECTION III.—Second Vice President:

He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice President when necessity demands.

SECTION IV -The Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session, compile and distribute the minutes. prepare and distribute the enrollment cards. draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are countersigned by the President, and make a report to this Body annually.

SECTION V-The First Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annual meeting and to do whatever the Body may require through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VI.—The Second Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do whatever is

required by the Body through the Recording Secretary. SECTION VII .- The Third Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention. He shall report to the Convention as required by the Convention, and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary

SECTION VIII -- The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Accounts and Business and do whatever the Body requires through the Recording Secretary,

SECTION IX.—The Corresponding Secretary:

This Secretary shall do all the correspondence of the Convention and Executive Board as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make his report annually to the Convention.

SECTION X .- The Statistical Secretary:

This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention report same annually, preparing it for distribution.

SECTION XI.-Treasurer:

He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or anpropriate it as required by the Convention. He shall keep his re-

ords so as to preserve them perpetually for reference and report annually all receipts and disbursements.

SECTION XII -General Auditor:

He shall receive and audit all reports of the Board as audited, also the report of the Treasurer of the Convention, each given to him thirty days prior to the annual sitting of the Convention.

SECTION XIII -- Reporter:

He shall give publicity to all the doing of the Convention necessary to be published.

SECTION XIV .- Historian:

He shall act for Il Boards and shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future

ARTICLE VI.-Boards

SECTION I.-This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Educational, Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, B.Y.P.U.

SECTION II .- Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, elected by the said State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, said election shall be annually.

SECTION III.-Officers:

The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION IV -Duty of officers:

The Chairman of Board shall preside at all Board Meetings.

The Recording Secretary of each Board shall keep a true record

of the doing of the Board.

The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Treasurer of each Board and shall do all the corresponding of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION V .- Management:

The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, Tressurer and three other members of the Board shall constitute the Board of Management Each Board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does at recess or during the meeting of the Convention.

SECTION VI.-Reports of Boards:

Each Board shall make its report annually.

SECTION VII.-Duties of Boards:

The Home Mission Board shall have charge of all the Home Mission and Church Extension work done by the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall have charge of all Foreign Missinn work

The Educational Board shall have charge of all the educational

work in the Convention. The Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publication

and publishing Work of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall have charge of all the evangelical work done by the Convention.

The Benevolent Board shall have charge of all the business pertaining to the relief of aged ministers and members of the Convention.

The B. Y. P. U. Board shall carry out the work of the B. Y. P. U. of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII.-Auxiliaries

SECTION I.—There shall be a National Brotherhood Convention, a Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, and a Junior National Baptist Convention, Youth National Baptist Convention, all of which shall be subject to the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION II.—All monies collected at the Annual Session of this Convention by all Auxiliaries, shall be reported and turned over to the Parent Body, along with their bills and expenses, to be voted out by the Parent Body before any disbursements of said auxiliaries shall take place at the Convention

ARTICLE VIII.-Railroad Commission

This Commission shall consist of five members, elected annually by the Convention. It shall have charge of all transportation, transit, and travel, and work harmoniously with the several States, as will best suit the interest of the Convention, and report annually to the Convention.

ARTICLE IX -Special Committees

There shall be three business committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the Convention. The regular Committee shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the Convention. The second Committee shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts and recommend the amount of all causes, and after being approved by the President, it shall bring the same to the General Body for adoption before execution. The third Committee aball investigate if required, all applying for membership into the Convention that the Constitution requirements may not be violated. There shall be a Standing Committee on Orthodoxy and one of Social and Economic Welfare.

ARTICLE X .- Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of all the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of each Board. It shall hold its meeting as the President sees it. It is the Board of Management

ARTICLE XI.-Annual Meetings

This Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday

night. The place shall be selected by the Convention in session. The Executive Board shall have power to change the time and place when the necessity demands, informing the Convention of the same.

ARTICLE XII.-Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Convention.

ARTICLE XIII.—Salaries

The Solaries of officers shall be as follows: President \$500.00: First Vice President, \$150.00: Second Vice President, \$125.00: Secretary, \$250.00: First Assistant, \$75.00: Second Assistant, \$50.00: Third Assistant, \$50.00: Fourth Assistant, \$50.00: Corresponding Secretary, \$75.00: Treasurer, \$275.00:

PROCEEDINGS

Chicago, Ill., September 7, 1955

The 75th Session of the National Baptist Convention of America was called to order at 9:30 a.m., by the President, Dr. G. L. Prince, Texas. Song: "Near the Cross," was led by the Chorister, Mrs. Virgie Dewitty, Texas. Devotions: Scripture, Ps. 46, was read by Rev. S. M. Mitchell, Texas. Song: "Old Time Religion," was lead by the Chorister. Prayer, Rev. N. C. Crain, Texas. Discussion of the Convention Theme: "The Christ of the Ages, and the World Today," Rev. H. R. Wilson, Florida. Remarks by the President, calling attention to all who are programmed that they must regard time. He also had the Secretary to read the article of the Constitution that referred to the enrollment.

Greetings were brought from the Southern Baptist Convention by Rev. Bellamy. Response was made by the President in a positive and eloquent manner.

Mrs. Artimese Lemons of Kansas City, Mo., read the poem from the Sunday School Quarterly, then the lesson was read alternately, Rev. John W. Williams leading. THE 1954-55 REPORT OF THE SECRETARY AND TREASURER OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

To the Members of the National Baptist Publishing Board, Incorporated Under the Laws of the State of Tennessee—Brother Chairman and Friends:

We are privileged to come before you today to give an account of another year's-work, as secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board, located at 523-2nd Avenue North, Nashville, Tennessee. After closing our fiscal year, we are pleased to report some of the highlights in our work.

The Lord has blessed the work of the National Baptist Publishing Board, both on home and foreign fields, and has allowed me, your secretary, to once again stand before you and give an account of my stewardship as head of this great Baptist organization. The work I have done as secretary of the Publishing Board, could not have been successfully carried on if I did not have the whole-hearted support of our entire organization, from the head of the various Departments to the janitor of the Plant. Since my health has not been too robust, much of my work has been assumed by various heads of the different Departments in the Plant. and they have conscientiously tried in every way possible to carry on the work of the Board; particularly the executive secretary of the Board, Miss S. B. Wilson; the assistant secretary, Mr. T. B. Boyd, Jr.; the general foreman of the Plant, Mr. F. J. Ewing; and the heads of the following Der partments-Mrs. Zula Campfield, Bookkeeping Department; Mrs. M. W. Tittle, chief of the Stenographic Department; Mr. L. I am grateful therefore, not only to the members of the Board, but to those who work in this Publishing Plant located in Nashville. I am commending all of them for their loyalty and devotion.

NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD'S PERSONNEL

The members of the National Baptist Publishing Board for this year which we are just closing, and who were selected since the National Baptist Convention of America convened in Jacksonville, Fla., last September, are Rev. E. M. Elmore, pastor of Bates Memorial Baptist Church of Louisville, Ky.; Rev. S. H. Simpson, pastor of the Greater St. John Baptist Church. Nashville, Temn.; Rev. J. B. Ridley, chairman, Nashville, Tenn.; Rev. Henry A. Boyd. Nashville, Tenn., secretary-treasurer; Rev. John W. Williams, pastor of St. Stephen Baptist Church, Kansee City, Mo.; Rev. A. A. Lucas, pastor of Good Hope Baptist Church, Houston, Texas; Rev. Robert L. Rowe. Ebenezer Baptist Church, Austin, Texas; Miss S. B. Wilson, Nashville, Tenn., executive secretary; Mr. T. B. Boyd, Jr. Nashville, Tenn., assistant secretary.

ORGANIZATIONS IN WHICH THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD HOLDS MEMBERSHIP

In keeping abreast with the trend of the times one realizes that the National Baptist Publishing Board must, along with other religious and denominational Publishing Houses, keep its membership in the various Organizations that furnish material and the information that is necessary to keep well informed and to be recognized not only by sectional but national organizations. Therefore, the National Baptist Publishing Board has maintained its membership in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States; in the Protestant Church-Owned Publishers Association and many other Organizations which we shall not take time to mention here.

As secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board I have always felt that we should become a part of any movement which is for the betterment of humanity in the spreading of the gospel, and for increasing the knowledge of our constituency in the study of the Bible, and the Helps furnished by various Publishers. We maintained our membership in the International Sunday School Convention which met in Cleveland, Ohio July 27th through the 31st, and along with other Publishing Houses and Organiza-

tions, we had a creditable exhibit of some of the Products of the National Baptist Publishing Board, including its church furniture and fixtures.

Your secretary has endeavored to keep enough members in these various organizations that will enable us to be represented in such meetings of national scope, wherever they are called.

THE FIFTY-FIRST SESSION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS

Kansas City, Mo., was host to the fifty-first annual session of the Sunday School Congress which convened June 8-12 with the St. Stephen Baptist Church of which Rev. John W. Williams is the pastor. This church, along with churches of Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas gave one of the most cordial welcomes to the Sunday School Congress in the history of the Organization. The committees that were appointed faithfully executed their duties, and St. Stephen and the entertaining pastor are still receiving encomiums from those who were in attendance.

The spiritual phase of the fifty-first session of the Congress was especially high this year throughout the week, and at the close of the Congress on Sunday two souls were saved, the persons united with St. Stephen Baptist Church and were baptized Sunday night, June 12, 1955. The music this year was especially inspiring, under the direction of Mrs. Edna H. Porter, and the six brass bands that furnished music throughout the week scemed to be at their best. They were the Sunday School Congress Band from Nashville, Tenn.; the Henry Allen Boyd Band of Houston, Texas; the Saint Mary Baptist Church Band of Corpus Christi, Texas; the St. John Baptist Church Band of Houston, Texas; the Cadets and Pairol from Houston, Texas, Pleasant Hill Baptist Church: the Drum and Bugle Corps of St. Stephen. and the Ebenezer Baptist Church Band of Chicago, Ill. The morning sessions were held in the main auditorium of the St. Stephen Baptist Church; the Departmental Meetings were held in the new edifice of St. Stephen and in other churches in close proximity to St. Stephen. The Sunday Mass Meeting was held at the Metropolitan Baptist Church of which Rev. E. H. Branch is the pastor. Rev. Mr. Branch also served as chairman of the housing committee for the Congress, and did a magnificent job in taking care of the delegates.

THE PAPER SITUATION

There have been several increases in the price of paper since we made our last report to you. While the increase has not been enormous or tremendous, it has nevertheless, created a problem for the secretary, because a publishing house and printing establishment cannot operate without paper, ink and other printing supplies. But we have been able, because of our membership in the Protestant Churchowned Publishers' Association, to share the consideration given to all members of this organization.

PRINTERS, OPERATORS AND OTHER WORKERS

From day to day, week to week, month to month, the National Baptist Publishing Board is faced with what all plants consider help situation. We have not had any organized or sit down strikes in the plant; in fact, it is not operated by Labor Unions; it is a Religious Institution, it gives employment to those members of churches and denominational organizations where they need the help, and yet it does not deny employment to any one because they are not church members. Of course we prefer this, but a man may be a good Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, and still not be a printer, a bookbinder or a mechanic; so we still go out looking for trained help wherever we can find it.

Believing that every consideration possible should be shown the employees of the National Baptist Publishing Board, the Institution has taken for those with dependent families, insurance coverage which entitles those with children, and husbands with wives, to provide protection for them through the Group Insurance Plan which is in force at the Plant. This additional coverage was done at a very little expense to the employee, the National Baptist Publishing Board paying the larger portion of the expense.

SICKNESS AND WORK STOPPAGE CONDITIONS

In any institution the size of the National Baptist Publishing Board there is always the problem of sickness, and those who are incapacitated by poor health, but those who have been forced to be away from their work have been covered by the Hospitalization Insurance furnished by the National Baptist Publishing Board. There have been a number of serious illnesses this year, but none have been fatal. I, among others, have been incapacitated this year, and have been benefited by the Hospitalization Insurance that we carry

EDITORIAL DEPARTMENT AND ITS WORKERS

One of the greatest problems facing the management of the National Baptist Publishing Board is the securing of competent editorial writers for the various Periodicals prepared in that Department. We are glad that Miss Mae E. Hunter who for some time was incapacitated, and who is the editor of Hope Magazine and Every Woman's Page, is able to be back full time now. Rev. N. Samuel Jones and Mrs. Julia C. Jones have done commendable work in keeping the material going for the various Periodicals.

material going for the various Periodicals.

Rev. W. G. Merriwether of San Antonio, Texas, because of ill health, and because the climate in Nashville did not agree with either him or his wife, was forced to return to his home in Texas, which created a vacancy in this Department. Rev. J. B. Ridley, the chairman of the Publishing Board, agreed to step in and complete the work on the Commentary which was being done by Rev. Merriwether, for which we are grateful.

HOPE: MAGAZINE

Our publication known as "HOPE" which is issued every month from this Plant for the home, the school, the fireside and many of the departments of church work, continues to prove not only a helpful and important Magazine, but a publication worthy of being placed in the home. The Fireside School, established many years ago by Miss Joanna P. Moore, issued this Publication, and it has continued since that time. The Magazine is written regularly by Miss Mae E. Hunter, with her assistant in that department.

THE NATIONAL BAPTIST UNION-REVIEW

The National Baptist Union-Review, the official organ of the National Baptist Convention of America, is published weekly by the National Baptist Publishing Board. Dr. M. C. Allen, the editor of this religious weekly newsaper, is still wielding his trenchant pen, bringing to the rublic forceful and dynamic messages in his Editorials. Dr. Allen is also the editor of the "Expected" Magazine. He is not only a scholar, but a writer of no mean ability, and his service is much in demand all over the country. He is President of the Virginia Theological Seminary and College in Lynchburg, Va. that is turning out young ministers who are a credit to the denomination.

Ministers and leaders of various organizations in the churches all over the country are solicited to send in the news from their churches that will prove informational and inspirational to other churches and workers; thus, the news in the Union-Review would be live and these churches and organizations would have the opportunity of presenting their work in a dignified and commendable way.

PERIODICALS FOR VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS

One of the greatest objectives of any Baptist church is its missionary features, and those who work in the Missionary Department must have sufficient literature to enable them to do a good job. Sensing this need, the National Baptist Publishing Board has prepared Guides for the Senior and Junior Women, the Shepherd Boys, and Starlight Bands, the Y.W.A. and Girls' Auxiliaries. They not only carry scriptural, references, but contributions from eminent writers, and especially those who are well prepared to furnish those Magazines with original and helpful suggestions for missionary programs for all ages.

We have in every way attempted to provide the best material possible, not only for the Sunday school students, but those who work in Baptist Young People's Departments, the Organized Classes and various other Departments of the Sunday school and church. Our literature is purely Baptistic and strictly orthodox; therefore, we contend that every member of every Baptist church should have the necessary information that will equip him or her to defend their position as a Baptist, and to be able to know at all times the facts about why he or she is a Baptist

THE COMMENTARY ON THE INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Many years ago the late R. H. Boyd saw the need for publishing annually a bound volume of the International Sunday School Lessons, so that the pastor, the superintendent of the Sunday school, and the heads of Departments in Baptist Sunday schools could have them at their finger tips. This past year the Sunday School Lesson Commentary has been prepared by your National Baptist Publishing Board. The book was off the press in time for those who like a Commentary to begin the study for 1955, and now the copy is well on the way to be offered to the reading forces of our denomination for 1956.

We predict that the Commentary for next year will be a piece of material that will meet the exacting demands of those who prefer having a bound volume for the entire year. We wish to continue the publication, by the consent of the Publishing Board.

WE SHALL CONTINUE TO HAVE BOYD MEMORIAL MONTH

March of each year has been observed as Boyd Memorial Month, in memory of the late Richard Henry Boyd, who was one of the tallest oaks in the Baptist forest, and who was the founder of the National Baptist Publishing Board. Eecause of the work done for the Baptists, this leader is remembered, not only by his immediate family and the employees of the National Baptist Publishing Board, but by hundreds of Sunday school workers all over the United States and in some foreign countries, with a memorial program held some time during the month of March.

It is hoped that this practice will be continued by the Baptist leaders everywhere, because we as a race are too prone to forget those leaders who have passed on, but who have laid the foundation for our religious and denominational life and work.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Mrs. Zula Campfield, the chief-bookkeeper of the National Baptist Publishing Board, has been and still is one of its most faithful employees. Her task has not been an easy one, because of the volume of business done by this, your National Baptist Publishing Board, and the work entailed to keep its accounts accurately. The greatest problem that the bookkeeping department faces is that of checks that are given by the senders of orders to the National Baptist Publishing Board, who have failed to ascertain if the money to protect such checks was in their account at the bank at the time the checks were sent.

These returned checks have proven most embarrassing to the National Baptist Publishing Board, because the banks have charged an extra fee for the handling of these "No good checks." The bookkeeping department has written hundreds of letters trying to collect money on checks for materials already received by those persons who have sent these unpaid checks to us. We have tried in every way possible to extend courteous, prompt service, but the manner in which many of our leaders, as well as workers in our various churches and Sunday schools handle their accounts places us in an awkward position, when no heed is paid to our letters asking that certified checks or money orders be sent rather than personal checks from organizations, where it is not

certain that the money is in the bank to protect the check that is sent to the Publishing House.

The National Baptist Publishing Board is also asking it customers not to ask for C.O.D. shipments, as this only increase the original cost of any order. We want to serve the public well, but we would like the public to serve us well also, in that when checks are sent to us, the sender will be sure that this check will be protected and paid. All check and money orders intended for literature and supplies from this Plant are requested to be made payable to the National Baptist Publishing Board.

MUCH NEW MACHINERY NEEDED

For several years now the secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board has reported the need of modern printing machinery. While we have been successful in replacing one of the folding machines in the Bookbinding Department we still need new, up-to-date printing presses. We hope in the future to be able from time to time to replace some of the machinery, which will enable us to give better and more prompt service to our constituents, but we realize that these machines are expensive, and we must see our way clear to pay for them when we place an order for them. Therefore we again ask all who are indebted to the National Baptist Publishing Board to pay their accounts, which will enable us to replace worn out machinery with new and more up-to-date equipments.

THE HOME MISSION BOARD NOTE

During the March Executive Board meeting of the National Baptist Convention of America that was held in Houston, Texas, your secretary brought to its attention the Home Mission Board's Note, as it is commonly called. The not had been carried by your Publishing Board since 1935, at which time it was renewed for one year, signed by J. H. L. Smith, chairman and I. M. Hendon, secretary. Several payments were made on the note; later on the Home Mission Board disclaimed its responsibility. The only thing the secretary of the Publishing Board could do therefore, was to bring the note before the Executive Board, which was done after some discussion, and after Dr. Hendon and Dr. Smith informed the Convention that they disclaimed responsibility for it, and Dr. Prince referred the matter to Committee of three. They went out, studied the objection presented by the Home Mission Board, and then the con-

tention made by the secretary of the Publishing Board, to the effect that the hour was too late for the Home Mission Board to disclaim the responsibility, but in order to get the matter cleared, the Committee brought back a report recommending that the National Baptist Convention of America assume the responsibility of this note with interest, claiming that is was a just obligation, and the Publishing Board should not be further embarrassed by its nonpayment. Hence, the Committee recommended that the National Baptist Convention of America assume this note with principal and interest.

KANSAS CITY AS HOST

The 51st Session of the Sunday School Congress which was held this year in Kansas City, Mo., was a memorable occasion in more ways than one. First, it was memorable because Kansas City is nationally known as a "Convention City," famous for its hospitality, noted for the spiritual fervor with which any religious meeting is fitled; and since Kansas City is the gateway to the Golden West, it is an ideal place for a convention's messengers to reach by train, plane or private car. It was a memorable occasion because the St. Stephen Baptist Church, of which the Rev. John W. Williams is the minister, is one of the greatest churches in the National Baptist Convention of America, and is noted for its cordial and friendly spirit of welcoming friends and strangers.

Kansas City, Mo., June 8, 1955 WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

Promptly at 10:30 o'clock the Fifty-first Annual Session of the Sunday School Congress was officially opened in the main auditorium of the St. Stephen Baptist Church, 1414 Truman Road, of which Rev. John W. Williams is the pastor. Preceding the opening however, was the brilliant parade and demonstration that had already let the citizentry of this great metropolitan city know that another Summer School of Methods, another Religious Institute known as the Sunday School Congress of the National Baptist Convention of America, was within its gates.

The parade consisted of six brass bands; the Sunday School Congress Band from Nashville; the St. Mary Baptist Band from Corpus Christi, Texas; the Henry Allen Boyd Band of Houston, Texas; the St. John Baptist Church Band of Houston, Texas, the Cadets and Patrol from the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, Houston, Texas; the Ebenezer Baptist Church Band from Chicago, Illinois, and the Drum and Bugle Corps of St. Stephen Baptist Church. Among the participants in this great demonstration were the Congress officials, the Congress chorus members, ministers, both visiting and local Sunday School superintendents and workers, B. Y. P. U. presidents, Organized Class members and workers from various departments, messengers and delegates, all stepping to the tune of religious music dispersed by these music organizations which were led by Mr. T. B. Boyd, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn., Rev. L. H. Simpson of Houston, Texas and others,

After the parade had traversed several blocks of the city, it was concluded at the St. Stephen Baptist Church, the bands and participants were escorted into the main auditorium of the church by Mr. T. B. Boyd, Jr., where the bands were seated in the various balconies, while the congregation filled the spacious auditorium, During the next fifteen minutes these bands entertained the audience with selections that were rendered alternately. At the conclusion of this period Rev. J. B. Ridley of Nashville, Tenn., the chairman of the Congress, called the session to order; the Congress chorus sang "Sing On" and "Bye And Bye" directed by Mrs. Edna H. Porter, Los Angeles, Calif., the national director, Mrs. C. Anna Lee Wright of St. Stephen Baptist Church presided at the organ, and Mrs. Evelyn Johnson of Metropolitan Baptist Church, presided at the piano. Rev. Robert H. Wilson, pastor of the Bethel

Institutional Baptist Church of Jacksonville, Fla., offered invocation; the Chorus sang "I Need Thee Every Hour". Rev. Ridley presented Rev. John W. Williams, the entertaining pastor, who made a few remarks, then presented Rev. Henry A. Boyd, the Congress Secretary, and Rev. R. B. Porter of Los Angeles, Calif., who brought greetings; Rev. Mr. Hoskins brought greetings from the Southern Baptist Convention, after which the chorus sang "Yes. God Is Real". Attorney Carl R. Johnson, the Municipal Judge of Kansas City, gave a welcome address; Greetings on Behalf of the Kansas City Council of Churches by Rev. Thomas P. Lindsay the president; selection by the Congress chorus, "Something Within Me." Hon, Mayor H. Roe Bartle was presented, and delivered an inspiring Welcome Address, after which he presented the Key to Kansas City to Secretary Henry A. Boyd; then the chorus sang "Thank You Jesus", directed by Mrs. Edna H. Porter.

The Sixty-first Annual Report of the Home Mission Board of National Baptist Convention of America, and the Thirty-second Annual Report of the present secretary.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 6, 1955

My dear President Prince:

It is with humble gratefulness, we come to you and our com stituency to submit to you our stewardship, as servants of this goreligious host, whose birth reaches back to 1880, and her beginning came in 1894, the Home Mission Board of the National Baptist Call vention and the Foreign Mission Board and the Educational Board

On page 15, the 1894 Journal of the New body National Bapti Convention of America, you will find that the following resolution

was offered by Dr. A. W. Pegues of North Carolina.

Whereas the interests and purposes of the three bodies, namely the Foreign Mission, National and Educationad Conventions, co he conserved and fostered under the auspices of one body; and

Whereas of the above named bodies will economize both time in money, therefore Resolved, that the Foreign Mission Convention point a committee of nine, who shall immediately enter into call sultation with the three bodies upon the following plan:

I. That there shall be one National organization of American Bee

2. Under this there shall be a Foreign Mission Board will authority to plan and execute foreign mission work according to is spirit set forth by the Foreign Mission Convention of the United State

3. There shall be a Board of Education, and also a Board Missions to carry into effect the Spirit and purpose of the National Educational Convention.

By the emerging of these bodies, three new boards were selected

by the National Baptist Convention as follows:

The Foreign Mission Board located at Louisville, Ky., Rev. Jan H. Frank, D. D., Chairman: Brother W. H. Stewart, Louisville, 1. Secretary; Rev. Daniel A. Gaddie, D. D., Treasurer; Rev. L. M. Luis D. D., Corresponding Secretary,

Home Mission Board, located at Little Rock, Ark., Rev. G. W. I Gaines, D. D., Chairman: Rev. J. A. Booker, A. M., D. D., Record Secretary; Rev. Richard Henry Boyd, D. D., LLD. Corresponding &

Educational Board, located Washington, D. C., Rev. A, Williams D. D., Chairman; Rev. W. Bishop Johnson, D. D., Corresponding Section

This is the kind of historical work of the beginning of the wal as this writer knows.

Dr. Richard Henry Boyd, during his alliance with the Ho-Mission Board gave rise to the idea of the need of Negro leaders poparing literature for Negro Baptists. The Home Mission Society New York, sent Dr. McViger to the South, especially to Terurging that Negro Baptists not attempt to publish Sunday School literature nor go beyond academical Schools, but foster them, feeders to colleges, such as the American Baptists were fostering several of the Southern States.

In 1893 in St. Louis, Mo., over the protest of Drs. Isaac Tollver, R. Griggs, F. G. Davis and others, Dr. Boyd, convinced our repreentatives at this session, whatever the worth of the givings of the American Baptists to our convention, it was worth the double to us, o have our own Publishing Board.

During the ministry of Dr. R. H. Boyd, as Secretary of the Home Mission Board, the National Baptist Publishing Board was born, at ts birth the country was thrilled by the services and direction of this erudite. He used Drs. William Beckham, D. D.; E. M. Griggs, of Texas; Dr. J. R. Wilson of North Carolina; the late Edmund H. Hubpard, D. D., of Mississippi (who was the founder of Morning Star Baptist Church) until our influence as Baptists aroused the attention of Baptists of both North and South.

Following Drs. Boyd's and Beckham's ministry the Board lost some of its touch under others, especially Mrs. Cora Jordan White. In 1923, Dr. John E. Wood, who was then President appointed the present incumbent, and for nearly thirty-three years, we have done our best in organizing the sections of the country most needed.

In 1927 there was not one established church under the Convention's influence between St. Paul Minn., to the Puget Sounds at Scattle. The four churches organized by Dr. R. H. Boyd, around sixty years ago, at Butte, Mont.: Spokane, Wash.; Tacoma, Wash.; Scattle, had been taken away from us. by the Northern Baptista. They had to represent through white Baptists.

The Home Mission Board with the late Dr. John W. Anderson, as Western Executive Secretary, organized the Shiloh Baptist Church and the General Baptist Convention of the West under a Brush Harbor in Portland, Ore., in July 1927, using Second Baptist Church, Ellingburg, Washington. The New Organized Shilloh, Second Baptist Church, Toppenish, Second Baptist Church, Butte, Mont, Now we have from Montana, Idaho, The Dakotas, Oregon, Washington and Utah, wherever there is around fifteen or more of our people, we have a church or mission in operation. Rev. Stallsworth, Mrs. Simpson, Dr. Wilson, Rev Donaldson, Mrs. Ida Thompson, Mother Martin were mighty forces in helping the Secretary to mold sentiment for the onward going of the kingdom work.

24 years ago, the Lord sent us Rev. and Mrs. D. D. Banks, to fill the places of the departed ones mentioned above. From the very day of their arrival on the Northwest soil, our work begun its progress. We have none better. It is through them, we have reached our

Fortunately Rev. and Mrs. Banks are present in this session. It is a pleasure to state to this convention that, Dr. Banks keeps up as minister, three of our best churches in Washington and Oregon, completely out of debt, well furnished and modernly constructed. He (Dr. Banks) hold the position as our Western Executive Secretary of our Home Mission work, and one of the moderators of our District Associations, known as the Faith and Work District Association. He is strongly assisted by Drs. W. P. Long, of Boise, Idaho, and T. D. West, who is the President of the General Baptist State Convention of the Northwest; together wih the erudite pastor of the Vancouver First Baptist Church, Portland, Oregon and President Oregon State Convention; Rev. O. B. Williams, where we have in Portland at least eleven Baptist churches, Just sent Dr. D. D. Banks from the 1 \$500.00 as down payment on the purchase of a church built He needed \$1000.00 of which he will get following this semion.

It has been the policy of your Board to purchase or seek gifts of properties for our convention for the past twenty-seven majority of our holdings out West are owned by the Home Missian Board, even the church at Phoenix, Arizona, or at least we less Trustee holdings.

Before closing our preface to this report, we must state work in Minot North Dakota: We held Trustee Title to the Se-Baptist Church in the city and state, where it is the law that churthat allow solicitation for its upkeep, the rule is, that one or more the Trustees must not be a member of that church. This proper was given to the Colored peoples by a Judge of the City. The mabers failed to pay the taxes in keeping with the laws of North Daket and it was sold from under them. Northern Baptist under the rul bought it in, look possession, but in 1929 your Board sent Dr. J. Anderson to Minot in company with your Secretary, and redeemed the property of which we have legal records and from 1929 used the property, paid the upkeep and when not in our use allowed other to use it for religious purposes, to keep from paying taxes prescribed by their law. We paid the insurance.

Some two years ago, it was moved by the authorities of the city of Minot to condemn the property owned by the Second Bantis Church, and a search was made to secure the proper owners, letter were sent to the City of Portland, without success, finally the Serretary was notified by the Rev. R. A. Danaldson, through Dr. D. D. Banks, of the possibility of the City condemning the property, and the Board losing values, we set out to find out the truthfulness of the statements, during our search a letter came from both the atmi who desired to purchase the property and the City authorities, some thereafter came a letter from Mr. Thomas Harris, with the name of four other persons who claim membership, that never did units with the church.

Only Mrs. Gust Butler, who had not attended the church in twenty years, Mrs. Della Marsh, Mrs. Rena Tuepke, who attended regularly but never united with the church as a member. On November 4. 1953, wrote a letters asking that I give the authority Founders to sell the property outright. We agreed to exchange, or give them the privelege of purchasing new location. This our attorney agreed, and that we did after the sale Sent them a check, which appears in our report for September 22, 1954

All of the transactions can be enterviewed if so desired. We have papers to verify, that to Butler and others given through our load attorney, for \$1936.75 was sent them as per the agreement of attorney on both sides.

Only 75 of our people live in the state of North Dakote, at nearly all have left Minot. We have only one member there. We also have a condition in Ellensburg, our Second Baptist there, we have only one member, Sister Kirk Martin, the property has run down, the Fire Chief has written to us either sell or build. We have the matter in the hands of our Western Secretary to study, you will find in his report, statement concerning it. Other than that, you will find our field in quite a fine standing.

In Colorado, we have the Rev. Jordau, we pay ball of his salary Phoenix, Arizons; we have title to that property, and learn that is in fair condition. We have helped two of our churches in Texas ad two in Louisians, several in Illinois, especially in Chicago, nancially, by gifts and loans. Our health has been a set back for e past two years.

Now comes our report:

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION AND BY LAWS OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA ORGANIZED 1894

On page 15, 1894 Journal of the New body National Baptist Convention of America.

Dr. A. W Pegues, of North Carolina offered the following resolution:

Whereas, the interests and purposes of the three bodies, namely, the Foreign Mission, National and Educational Conventions can be conserved and fostered under the auspices of one body; and

Whereas, the consolidation of the above named bodies will economize both time and money therefore

Resolved, that the Foreign Mission Convention appoint a committee of nine, who shall enter immediately into consultation of the three bodies upon the following plan:

1. That there shall be one National organization of American Baptists.

- 2. Under this there shall be a Foreign Mission Board with authority to plan and execute Foreign Mission work according to the Spirit set forth by the Foreign Mission Convention of the United
- 3. There shall be a Board of Education, and also a Board of Missions to carry into effect the spirit and purpose of the National and Educational Convention.

By the merging of these bodies three new Boards were selected by the National Baptist Convention, as follows:

The Foreign Mission Board, located at Louisville, Ky. Rev. J. H. Frank, D. D.; Chairman: Bro. W. H. Stewart, Recording Secretary, Rev. Daniel A. Gaddie, D. D. Treasurer; Rev. L. M. Luke, D. D., Corresponding Secretary.

Home Mission Board, located at Little Rock, Ark, Rev. G. W. D. Games, D. D., Chairman, Rev. J. A. Booker, A. M., D. D., Recording Secretary: Rev Richard Henry Boyd, D. D., LL. D., Corresponding Secretary.

Educational Board, located at Washington, D. C., Rev. A. Wilbank, D. D., Chairman: Rev. W. Bishop Johnson, D. D., Corresponding Seerelary.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

BE IT REMEMBERED, That pursuant to an article of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, known as the Act of 1855, page 187 and as amended in Act 1864, page 180 and as further amended in Ad 1891, page 297, regulating the incorporations of Missionary Boards and other organizations of like manner, the undersigned do hereby subscribe their names to the foregoing articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE 1.

This Association shall forever be known, named and styled the HOME MISSION BOARD OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVEN-TION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

ARTICLE 11.

There shall be no capital stock and that the purpose of this Association is not for pecuniary gain or profit.

ARTICLE III.

This association shall be and is an auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America. The said National Baptist Convention U. S. A., shall at its regular annual session upon the recommendation of the State bodies elect the Board members constituting this Association, who shall be known and referred to as the Home Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America. BY LAWS AS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

PREAMBLE

This corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Indiana and other States comprising the territory of the National Baptist Convention. U. S. A., for the purpose of diffusing the knowledge of the religion of Jesus Christ by means of missiona throughout the United States and the world, purchasing, maintaining property and other holdings, pursuant to the power bestowed on it by the National Baptist Convention of America, in its annual session, adopted the following By-Laws:

ARTICLE I -Membership

The membership of this body shall be composed of: Annual members appointed by Baptist State bodies affiliating with the National Baptist Convention of America, who are accredited messengers to the Annual session and Baptist Churches in States where there is not a State body representing.

ARTICLE IL-Officers

Section 1. The Officers of this Board shall be: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Recording Secretary, and one or more administrative Secretaries; Corresponding of Field Secretary; Treasurer; Transportation Manager All of whom shall be elected annually by the Home Mission Board and approved by the Convention. The administrative Secretaries to be elected by the Board of Managers

Section 2. The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Board, in case of his absence, his duties shall be performed by the Vice Chairman.

Section 3. The Secretaries, the Treasurer and such officers as the Board may appoint, shall be subjected to the directions of the Board, and shall discharge such duties as may be defined by its regulations and rules of order.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall give such security for faithful

Section Each officer elected at the annual meeting shall serve from the close of the annual meeting at which he is elected to the lose of the next annual meeting, and until his successor is elected.

ARTICLE III -Board of Managers

Section 1. The Board of Managers shall consist of the Chairman of the Board and eight others elected at its annual meeting. At the meeting at which these By-Laws shall be adopted, one-third for three years, to the end that thereafter, as nearly as practicable, one-third of the whole number of managers shall be elected at each subsequent annual meeting to fill the vacancies caused by the expiration of term of office.

Section 2. The Board of Managers shall meet annually at the time and place of the National Baptist Convention of America. Local Board may meet monthly or such other times that the body may direct, at its Headquarters.

Section 3. The Board of Managers shall have the management of the affairs of the Home Mission Board; shall have the power to elect its own Chairman and Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, to appoint upon the recommendation of the Carresponding Secretary the administrative secretaries of the Board and such additional officers and agents, field workers and missionaries as it may seem proper, and to define duties of each; to appoint its own meetings; to adopt such regulations and rules as to it may seem proper. including those for control and disposition of the real and personal property of the Board, the sale, leasing or mortgaging thereof, provided they are not inconsistent with the act of incorporation or its by-laws; to fill all vacancies in the Board of Management and in any office of the Board until the next meeting of the Board; to establish such agencies as may be necessary and to appoint missionaries and remove same when condition warrants or may seem proper by a threefifth vote of all members present and voting at the meeting when said vote is taken; it being understood however, that in case of missionaries of the Board, an absolute majority of the Board shall be necessary for suspension and two-thirds of the whole Board for dismissal; to fix the compensation of officers, agents and missionaries: to secure courtesies from railroads and other carriers, such as passes. clergy certificates, annuals through the agency of the Corresponding Secretary, who shall hereafter be the Transportation Manager for the Home Field, to direct and instruct them concerning their respective duties; to make all appropriations of money; and at the annual meetings of the Board, and at the annual meetings of the National Beptist Convention, to present a printed or written full and detail report of the proceedings of the Board and its work during the year,

ARTICLE IV.-Eligibility and Appointment

All officers, all members of the Board of Managers and all missionaries must be members of Baptist Churches in good and regular standing cooperating with the National Baptist Convention of America.

ARTICLE V.-Annual and Other Meetings

The Board shall meet annually on Wednesday afternoon in September during the session of the National Baptist Convention unless for some special reason another time shall be fixed by the Board of Managers in conference with the Executive Managers of the National Baptist Convention. All annual meetings shall be beld where the annual meeting may be held at any time and place upon the call of the Board of Managers or Chairman.

ARTICLE VI.-Relation With National Baptist Convention

Section 1. With a view to unification in general denominational matters, the National Baptist Convention at each session in the election may present in its selection the members of the Home Mission Board as recommended from the various State Bodies and churches cooperating with the Convention. If in any state there be no state convention, any church may represent and have one member or vole.

Section 2. The National Baptist Convention upon the agreement of the President and Executives of the Convention, may arrange suitable quarters on the first day or the opening of the Convention for the collection of missionary funds, disseminating or information, annual subscription and final report of agents and missionaries.

Section 3. The annual report of the Board, as soon as it shall be prepared, shall be forwarded to the President of the National Baptist Convention and others authorized to receive it.

ARTICLE VII.-Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any annual meeting of the Board, provided written notice of the proposed amendment shall have been given at the proceeding annual meeting of the Board or such amendments be recommended by the National Baptist Convention.

Brother President, Officers and Members of the Seventy-fifth Annual Session of the National Baptist Convention of America, Chairman P. S. Wilkinson, Officers and members of the Educational Board of the National Baptist Convention, Brethren and Sisters, Greetings;

The old year has possed, it was one of the uncertainties and surprises in international life and the stress of conflicting domestic issues have kept men of the world off balance. The passing of great leaders and the falling by the wayside of others has placed an inherited responsibility upon the leaders all over the world.

Our Convention has been affected as well as other great organizations. I am especially thinking of Dr. H. B. P. Johnson, former Corresponding Secretary of this board for a quarter of a century. Dr. Johnson fell on the battlefield and became inactive. Your humble servant was made choice of by the board to assist the Chairman, Dr. P. S. Wilkinson, in this work which he dtd.

At the Denver Convention, your humble servant was recommended by the board and confirmed by the Convention as your Corresponding Secretary. In November, 1954, Dr. Johnson passed on to his reward, may peace be to his ashes.

We are phased to announce that today we have nine (9) schools that received linancial assistance from this board last year, and will receive linancial and from the Educational contribution that we receive from you today. We are urging our pastors, moderators, presidents of conventions and associations, to set aside or designate on your letter blank a reasonable amount for the Educational Board.

If our work is to be a success, there must be unity of efforts and action on the part of all the Baptist family of our Convention. We must redeem the times, the hour of opportunity is here. We must not fail our young men and women in our Baptist colleges throughout the territory of our National Baptist Convention of America. Not only are their minds being trained, but their spirits also.

I have visited most of those schools or their State Convention since we left Jacksonville, last year, they are all in operation. Therefore, we must not fail to give our support. We know that Paul may plant. Apollos may water, but the increase comes from God, for we are laborers together with God.

Now Brethren, if we are to make a Daptist world, we must have Baptist schools. Your gifts and offerings will help us to answer the challengy in the great commission. Matthew 28:20, our Master included teaching which is Christian education, and our Master only promised to be with us as we carry out the whole commission. We have no scriptural rights to expect our Master's presence and power if we fall to carry out the whole commission in this day of integration, when our people will be accepted into all of our state colleges and universities which colleges and universities accept teachers or professors primarily on their scadenic standing without much regard for their religious convictions.

It is common knowledge that many of our institutions of higher learning have communists on their faculties, therefore, we cannot truit these institutions to train our Baptist young people and leaders. For the Master has commanded us to teach them. There are those who advocate the idea that it doesn't matter who teaches our children mathematics science, Sécology, psychology, English, etc., as long at they know their subject matter. But we believe it does make a diff-

ference for the student imbibes what the teacher is as well as what he says.

The Scientist who leaches about the rocks should know the Rock of Ages. The teacher who teaches English which deals with words, ought to know the word made flesh. We turther believe and aftirm that the teachers who teach in these Christian schools should believe in the blessed book. For I hear the Master saying, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you and lo I am with you always; even unto the end of the world"

RAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

HIGHLIGHTS OF TWENTY FIVE YEARS-FROM 1930 TO 1955

Mr. President and members of the National Baptist Convention of America. I have been scheduled to give some historical highlights of the Convention, beginning with September, 1930 to September, 1955. With the brief time alloted me to speak, we will be compelled to omit a great deal of important comments which have been gathered from the minutes of previous years.

In 1930, the Convention was called to order by Rev. J. W. Hurse, in New York City. At that time, quite a deal of aspiration for the presidency appeared among the brotherhood, following the death of the late. Dr. J. E. Woods.

In the final count of the election, the late Dr. J. W. Hurse was announced President of our National Baptist Convention of America for the following year. It was at this convention that plans were discussed, and much concern given to our future success

The Convention agreed to hold its 52nd annual session in Cincinnati, Ohio. September, 1931. The first day's session was marked with much concern as to the proper setting of the Convention and its mattheries as prepared by the entertaining committee.

With Dr. J. W. Hurse presiding, the discussion followed as to whether or not the Women's Auxiliary should hold its assembly at the Southern Baptist Church (Dr. J. W. Haywood, pastor), or with the church of the entertaining pastor, Dr. Williams.

It was following this discussion that our attention was called to the sudden death of Dr. J. W. Haywood. This brought sadness to all hearts, a man well beloved by the brotherhood of the Convention.

The Convention marked time and moved to meet in Houston, Texas, in 1932, for its 53rd session, Rev S A. Pleasants, entertaining pastor

The interest for progress was on the minds of the leaders; and a desire for a president to meet the demands of the Convention was discussed at length. Our attention was called to the low-ebb in which our mission and educational work was being carried on.

The Committee on Adjustment was appointed to recommend plans of operation by which the National Baptist Convention of America's Foreign Mission Board, and the Lott-Carey Foreign Mission Board, and the Lott-Carey Foreign Mission Board could carry on their compact. This entailed eliminating Dr. A. A. Gilnim as Corresponding Secretary, and selecting Dr. J. H. Randolph the then Secretary of Lott Cary Foreign Mission Board, to fill the office between both conventions.

At this same convention a motion was affered to suspend the rule of the constitution, and each delegate register with \$3.00 and each church with \$5.00. This was carried, and thereby the Convention remained at a standstill for the ensuing year.

Due notice was given by the present speaker (J. P. Reeder), emphasized by an address of Dr G. L. Prince, that in the 1933 session changes would take place, and the standard of the National Baptis leadership of America would be raised.

Chicago for its 54th session

The attempt was made to suspend the rules and have the Convention register in part, and allow the presidents of the states give promise for the remainder of the Convention. This effort was voted down 3 to 1. Thus, the Convention continued to register according to the constitution.

After the registration, the introductory sermon was preached by Rev. S. A. Pleasants who spoke from the 34th Psalms: "Oh magnite the Lord." His subject was to magnify and exalt the Man. Chris Jesus. He urged that all at the Convention, from the President down

would magnify the Man, Christ Jesus.

After the introduction of several distinguished visitors, including Dr. C F Brown, President of the Lott Carey Convention; Dr. J. R. Randolph, Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board there was a recess. In the first day's afternoon session, following board reports, we then had the welcome speeches of the evening. Following this was the President's Address, the much desired session of the Convention.

It was moved that the address be received and the recommendations be referred to the proper committees. Then a motion was made to suspend the rule, and elect the president to his 4th year. A motion was made to table the motion to suspend. It was tabled 110 to 80. The Committee on Permanent Organization made its report.

It was moved to adopt the committee's report. A substitute motion was made that the name of Dr. G. L. Prince be substituted to that of Dr. J. W. Hurse.

A motion was made to elect all the officers represented by the committee and elect the president by nomination. The latter motion prevailed, and all, save the president, were elected through the adoption of the committee's report. Then Dr. J. W. Hurse and Dr. G. L. Prince were nominated. The nomination closed. Dr. G. L. Prince was elected 133 to 36. Dr. J. W. Hurse moved that the election be unanimous. The Convention was led in prayer by Dr. J. W. Hurse.

Immediately upon receiving the gaves, order was restored to the Convention. Respect was given, and progress ensued.

The merits of this administration can be shown better by one observing the depths from which we came, and the heights which we

In 1933 the financial obligations of the Convention, including boards and auxiliaries ran into over \$35,000 By the time we had gone from Chicago in 1933 to San Antonio, Texas in 1943, this entire debt had been wiped out. The standard of education had been raised by way of support to more than five of our Church related Colleges. Foreign Mission had been given support from \$600 in to ceipts in 3 support through Secretary's office to make than \$20,000 yearly

BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

The Hame Manion Board had expanded its program of an increase of over \$10,000 yearly. This was brought about by the constant raise of the constitution from \$5.00 registration to \$25.00 per church; from \$50 to \$100 per state convention and general association. From \$25 to \$50 per association; with a yearly appeal of class A. B. and C. churches, reporting from \$25 to as high as \$700 yearly.

This distinction is to be observed. From the orderly way in which the leadership of the Convention and especially its president, Dr. G. L. Prince, who with dignity and pride, as well as humility and love, have led the followers of the National Baptist Convention

of America in giving their support through the years.

Time will not allow us to make mention of the worthy changes in the program, but only to give rise and congratulations to the various cities and states which have augmented our efforts. They are as follows: Chicago, Illinois (1933); Muskogee, Oklahoma, (1934); Washington, D. C., (1935); Columbia, S. C., (1936); Birmingham, Ala., (1937); Fort Worth, Texas. (1938) Los Angeles. Calif., (1939) Louisville, Kentucky, (1940); Shreveport, La. (1941); Chicago, Illinois, (1942); San Antonio, Texas, (1943); Memphis, Tenn., (1944) Kansas City Mo. (1945) Columbia, S. C. (1946) Little Rock, Arkansas, (1947), Oakland, Calif., (1948) Houston, Texas, (1949); Kansas City. Mo., (1950); Cincinnati, Ohio, (1951); New York City, (1952) Denver, Colorado, (1953); Jacksonville, Florida, (1954) and the Lord has allowed us to meet again in Chicago in 1955 We can truthfully say that more than \$50,000 has been reported in cash receipts yearly, as compared with less than \$10,000 twenty-three years ago.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMISSION ON THE DEPARTMENT OF CHAPLAINS

Brother President, Officers, Members and friends, Greetings:

I am very glad to have this opportunity to bring this report

to you today. I deeply appreciate the fact that it is through the good. ness of God that I have this privilege.

My purpose here is to give you a brief report of what we have been able to accomplish this year. We have been present at each of the business meetings namely. October and April, 1954 and 1955 We have also answered the roll call at the committee meetings which have been held in the Headquarters of the General Commission on Chaplains, at 122 Maryland Avenue, Washington, D. C. Dr. Fred S. Buschmeyer, is Chairman of the Executive Committee, Dr. Marion J. Creeger, is the Executive Secretary, Mrs. Elsie C. Gardner the Administrative Assistant, with the efficient cooperation of Mr. Joe Dana, the very able Editor of the Chaplain and the Link and others of the office force.

We accepted the amount asked by the Executive Committee and the Budget Committee to the sum of (\$464.00) Four hundred and sixtyfour dollars, which was paid promptly. We have as of July 31st, 1985 seven men on Active duty in the various departments of the U.S.A. Government as Chaplains From time to time the category of a Chaplain may be changed for one reason or another.

We recommend to the ministers throughout our Brotherhood for good wholesome and informative reading, the Chaplain and the Link Both are suited to keep you well informed in regards to the work being accomplished by the men who are keeping the soldiers reminded of their obligation to God, the church and to their fellowmen and sworn to serve their country in the various ranks.

Some of the Chaplains are sending some very interesting reports of their work with their fellow soldiers. For instance, Chaplain (1st LL) Walter N. McDuffy, sends a very encouraging report of his activities in his Spiritual work.

Quote: While you are making out your report for the convention, you might like to know that since last September, from our Baptist Service, we have sent three hundred dollars to our convention in agencies, one hundred to the Home Mission Board, one hundred to the Evangelical Board, and one hundred to our B.Y.P.U. Board.

During this same period of time I have haptized two hundred and sixty-two (262) men. This makes a total of three hundred and eightynine (389) men I have baptized during my two years service here. I give you these figures not to boast, but rather as information that you might point out to others when emphasizing the importance of the spiritual work of the Chaplain in the service of his country.

Enclosed, find some pictures of a group of seventy-three (73) men I baptized on the third Sunday in July this year. This was the largest single group I have ever baptized. This young man was with me when I made my report last September, he and one other. The seven men mentioned above are as follows:

THE VIRGIN BIRTH OF JESUS CHRIST E. M. Elmore, Committee On Orthodoxy

"Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call

his name Immanuel." Isa. 7:14. The Greatest fact of all facts is the fact of Jesus Christ. Where did He come from? How can we explain the wondrous, sinless person of Jesus of Nazareth? No other life ever lived, nor words spoken nor deeds done approach in glory and grandeur the ministry of this man of Galilee. Who is He? Where did He come from?

The birth of Jesus, the manner of His entrance into this world has been a battle ground from the beginning. In His own lifetime there seemed to have been dark and degrading words whispered concerning His mother and her child.

In John 8:19, the Jews in Jerusalem asked the cypical and suggestive question, "Where is thy Father" Again in verse 41 of the same chapter 8, they say, "We be not born of fornication."

There seems to be a hidden reference to the gossip that they heard about Jesus of Nazareth. This much is certain, that in Talmudic literature there are unclean stories of the unlawful conception of Jesus. The Jews said that Mary became pregnant by a Romag Milltary officer whom they named Panihera. These current in the time of Christ, have been passed down from generation to generation not only among Jewish people, but among others.

Celsus the bitter opponent of the Christian faith in the second century, used with telling effect this story. Voltaire, the caustic critic of Christianity in the eighteenth century repeated them with much the same finality as if he was citing documented history.

The Apostle John during his pastorate at Ephesus, met the same captious criticism of the miraculous birth of Jesus. The implacable enemy of John at Ephesus was gnostic named Cerinthus Cerinthus said that Jesus was born of Joseph and Mary by natural generation. His system of Gnosticism taught that the Spirit of Messiahship came upon Jesus at His Baptism and left Him at the Cross

It has been thus through all the years. The Virgin birth of our blessed Saviour has been vigorously and bitterly assailed. Matthew Arnold said. "I do not believe in the Virgin Birth, for that would imply miracle and miracles do not happen."

Reginald T. Campbell says in the new Theology: The doctrine of the Virgin Birth tends to put a barrier between Jesus and the race it operates as a hindrance to spiritual religion. The simple and natural conclusion is that Jesus was the child of Joseph and Mary and had an uneventful childhood

In a book called "The Birth of Jesus Christ." Saltau says: Who makes further demands that a Christlan should believe in the words "Conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary." unwittingly constitutes himself a sharer in the sin against the Holy Spirit of the true Gospel as transmitted to us by the apostles. This Theologian makes belief in the Virgin Birth an actual sin against the Spirit of God.

In seeking to explain away the marvelous stories of Jesus' birth in the New Testament, some of the skeptical and materialistic writers suggest a phenomenon that many algae fungt, plantlice and other low levels in the animal kingdom propagate from unfertilized spore and eggs.

They suggest that there is a possibility that such a thing might have happened in the case of Mary and Jesus. But some how the whole thing, the whole idea, is grossly distasteful. To class Mary and unthinkable.

All ancient history was a preparation for the coming of our glorious Lord. God's Son. There is a great stream of Messianle

prophecy running through the ages. like the Gulf Stream running through the vast Atlantic Warming, healing, saving, these blessed Messianic promises never fail to give hope to the people of God.

The oldest of the Evangelical promises-prophecies is Gen. 3:15, "And I will put entmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed: it shall bruise thy head and thou shalt bruise his heel."

The seed of the woman is to bruise the serpent's head. The abcient prophets and seers pondered that Scripture and wondered what it meant. Seed belongs to the man and not the woman. And yet the Scripture said the seed of the woman should bruise the serpent's head. When finally we come to know what it meant, it was the first prophecy of the virgin birth.

Next the promise was confirmed to Abraham that in his seed, singular, as of one, all of the families of the earth should be blessed in Genesis. Chapter 49, Jacob speaking in his dying message to his sons, points out Judah as the family and tribe through which the great prophecy should come to pass. The scepter shall not depart from Judah, nor a lawgiver from between his feet, until Shilocome; and unto him shall the gathering of the people be. Gen. 49:10.

The prophecy means that the family and tribe of Judah would be held in tact in the earth and would as a nation possess a government until the coming of the Messiah.

The Great Prophecy was confirmed to David that he should have a Son who should sit upon his throne forever. So great is this Son that David in the Spirit calls Him Lord Ps. 110:1.

Isa 7.14 prophecies that a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son and the Child is to be God with us, Immanuel, Micah in chapter 5:2 points out the very town and place where the Promised Prince is to be born.

Not only do we find this marvelous Messianic Hope running through all the sacred Scriptures of the Old Testament, but the whole earth itself, during these wonderful days at the beginning of the first Christian contury, seems to be great with expectancy concerning the birth of a Glorious King that should arise out of the Fact.

There was one government, there was one language and the rulers of the earth seem to have a premonition that a worthy universal Lord and King was to be born. The ancient historiens, Tacitus and Suetonius, wrote of this world's expectancy that a Messiah was coming out of the East.

When the Magi came from Persia Inquiring, "Where is He that is both King of the Jews, for we have seen His star in the East and have come to worship Him?" the inquiry was not unusual or incongruous. It but reflected the great Hope and spirit of the times

The story of the birth of Jesus is one with the story of His character and incomparable glorious ministry. His sinless life. His purity. His beauty, His revelation of God, His sacrificial death, His resurrection from the dead, the power He poured out upon the earth, the Churches that bear witness to Him today—these things are unique in history. How could you ever explain them?

After the scrutiny of the centuries, Jesus today is still the Holy one of God: perfect, separate from sinners, undefiled. It has been said that the moral character of every product leads up to and onto. the producer. The product here is the Spotless Christ. How and who produced Him?

He lived the beatitudes, He spoke. He was the Lord of all nature. He was first among oil teachers and leaders. There has never been one like Him on earth Joseph said, "I am not His Father," and he proposed to put Mary away. Mary said, "Joseph is not the father of the child," and she confided to Elisabeth, her kinswoman, The Angel Gabriei said, "Joseph is not His father," Jesus said, that "Joseph was not His father," Jesus said, "God was His Father," and the Jews put Jesus to death because He said that God was His Father. No one but God ever claimed the Fatherhood of Jesus. God owned Him and said, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased.

Who is this Jesus, horn in Bothlehem, preaching in Galilee, dying in Jerusalem? There is an answer from the Holy Prophets, from the blessed Apostles and from the sacred Scriptures. With one according all tostify that He is God manifest in the flesh.

"For unlo us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upen his shoulder and his name shall be called Wonderful. Counsellor. The Mighty God. The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Pence 1 lsa 9 6

"And without controversity—great is the mystery of godlines: God was manifested in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of Angels preached unto the Genthes, Believed on the world, received up into glory," 1 Tun 3:16.

"And the word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we be held his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father) full of grace and truth." John 1:14. His entrance into the world, God incarnale was the most stupendous miracle of all time. Without such a miracle on such person could ever have existed. The whole of Jesus is one piece. The miracle of His birth is as natural at the beginning of His life as the miracle of His resurrection and ascension, is all the end of it.

The life of Christ is not piecemeal and fragmentary. The Gopel story is not a modern ship built in Waterproof compartment. The whole stand or fall together. The denial of the Virgin Birth is but an attempt to rule on the seperatural; and if we do it in this instance we supli so in find ourselves doing it in other instances. We shall soon be denying His sinless life. His miracles, resurrection, ascention, and every other glorious thing about Jesus.

This is what happened that right while the shepherds watched beir flock: God in infinite mercy, in the fulness of time, came down from above, and took upon Himself our nature. Pure, holy, and undefiled. He inherited no guilt and needed no sanctification, yet He became sin for us

He gave Himself, infinitely good, and infinitely worthy, as our Redeemer, our Sanctifier and our Saviour. All of this was made possible through His entrance into our life and into our nature by the virgin birth. It was God in human flesh who was born that night in Bethlehem.

This is a great biological mystery and miracle. God coming from Heaven, entering into the womb of the Virgin Mary by a creatin act of God, by which God broke through the chain of human generation and brought into the world a supernatural Being.

How the Child is born from the union of two cells, and how those cells are guided by little genes attached to an invariable and constant number of chromosomes, the number fixed in each species with no variance from species to species is a profound miracle that occurs every day before our eyes. Huxley said, "The mysteries of the Church are child's play compared to the mysteries of nature."

This miracle of the birth of Jesus is in keeping with the work and order of God. Out of the dust of the ground was brought forth man: out of the man brought forth woman; out of the woman was brought forth the seed that should bruise the seepent's head; out of the promised seed; out of the work of the Son of God, our Saviour was brought forth the Church. His Body, the glory of His ministry and His praise forever. Great is the mystery of goddiness.

With what awe and with what wonder and with what adoration we look upon Jesus and the holy family. Joseph is true and loyal yet finding himself unable to marry a girl who has proven unfaithful, he thinks to put her away quietly and without public fantare. It seems that all of us are born to misunderstand the great and noble things of life. We are so easily blinded to the workings of God. But God helped Joseph to understand and Joseph responded nobly generously and faithfully to his appointed task in protecting and earing for the mother and the Child.

Mary the Virgin Mother of our Lord, first of all, was not Immaculate. She herself confessed the need for salvation when she sang in the Magnificat: "My soul doth magnify. And my sprit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour." Luke 1:48-54. She was not without sin

Even the mother of our Lord had need of an interest in Him, as her Saviour, and would have been undone without it; and she glories more in the happiness which she had in common with all believers than in being his mother which was an honor peculiar to herseit, and this agrees with the preference Christ gave to obedient believers above his mother and brethren. Mary was not the mother of God. She was only the mother of our Lord's humanity. Jesus was God before His incarnation. John 1:1

Many is surely and undoubtedly one of the noblest women in all human history. But, she is no mythical Many or female god. The story we rend in literal history about her, says that she lived an humble life. Enough is said about her to show us that she had a pure human nature. Little is said about her not to magnify her into a half god by a perverted theology.

She is here long enough to be seen, to be understood, to be attested to be spoken about, to be loved and appreciated; then she is gone. She was a real woman, the mother of other children, Ps. 68:9, 10, Mark 63; Matt. 13:55, 56. She was buried without (probably) a funeral, without a grave, without any known epitaph.

The eye cannot follow the swift movement of her passing. It was not meant that we should worship the beautiful and pure Virgin Mother of Jesus. Her honor alone comes because she was the chosen of God to be the mother of His Son. In no sense is she our Saviour, our mediator or our interessor. She is the mother of our Lord and

It is the Son of God, God incornate in the flesh whom we love and adore, and worship. Isa. 11:1-5. I think that the most of the

people who looked upon Jesus in Nazareth thought of Him as the natural son of Joseph and Mary. There were doubtless some whe carried on the gossip of the Talmud, but I think the great rail and file of the people of His day knew nothing of these things. The secret of the birth of Jesus was known to Joseph and Mary and Zacharias and Elisabeth, but justisde of this little family circle was not at first revealed.

Two of those who under the guidance of the Holy Spirit wrote the story of Joseph and Mary were Matthew and Luke. Matthew lell the story from the viewpoint of Joseph, perhaps, and Luke we be

heve tells the story from the viewpoint of Mary.

By emphasizing the silence and secrecy in which Mary treasured up the facts of the birth of Jesus. Luke gives the reader the impression that she is the author. "But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart... And He went down with, them, and came to Nazareth, and was subject unto them: but His mother kept all these sayings in her heart. Luke 2:19, 51.

Being a doctor, Luke had an opportunity to learn from Mary man things that the casual visitor might never have opportunity to know. A trained scientist in the learning of his day, he carefully inquired into the matter of the birth of Jesus. He must have visited and Mary many times during the two years that he waited at Caesare

upon the Apostle Paul.

It was during this time of research that Luke finished his inquiries and so wrote the history of the life of Jesus that we know

as the third Gospel. See Luke 1:1-4.

There is nothing to compare with the rich message and pageantr of the story of the birth of Jesos. That story possesses a never failing appeal Where in all literature is there anything like the elemal, sweeping homan appeal of the Manger? Its pervading spin remakes the very character of the world. The star is ever the star of hope. Over the shocke of battle fields beyond the teats of our day of sorrow the star remains in the sky, an eternal sign of hope and goodwill, the promise of a heavenly blessing. It shall never disappear.

The Angel chorus reminds us how close to earth is Heaven. God sees. God knows. God cares and the Angels sing ever above us. The search of the shepherds is an invitation to all the simple, humble folk of earth to come and bow down before the Great God of Heaven our Glorious Saviour, the Holy Infant Child Jesus.

The Mag roman from the East remark that some of the nobles intellects and most learned scholars of all times have brought their gifts and hon age to the manger where this Holy Child Jesus we laid. The earthly Trinity of father, mother and child has become a subject of endless art and poetry and song and thanksgiving.

The Holy Chird who grew up in the flesh to be our Lord and Saiour is the One who reveals us the character of God. If we are evert know God, we must know Him through human personality. We might look at the stars forever but through them alone we could neve know the power who made them We might look at the headiful rainbows and the glorious robes of the flowers, and conclude that their Creator cheushed beauty.

In awe and wonder, we might see the sunset and blushing of the dawns and the colornes of the majestic mountains, but who is the God who made and loved them? We might look on the inside of our souls and know that our Creator has a deeply sensitive moral conscience. but what is He like? Who is He? and what is His name? Someone human must show us God, and reveal to us what He is like. What shall we do and to whom the bill we go? The Star of Bethlehem leads the way. The Prophet Micah points out the road. God in Heaven answers from the skies.

The Virgin Born Babe in the Manger, God with us in the flesh, Prince Immanuel, He is our ultimate answer to every problem and

Anthropology comes from the Greek word Anthropos meaning man." Anthropology is the doctrine of man. There are many definitions of man, some comical, some tropical. In this study of anthropology we shall go to the true source—the Scripture.

I. MAN IN HIS STATE OF INTEGRITY

By this we mean in his original state of purity, his uprightness, his origin. 1. Negative. (a) Not by abiogenesis or spontaneous generation. This theory holds to the belief that there was no Creator of man, but that man simply came into being without a cause and began to exist. This argument needs no answer, if such a thing as abiusenesis were possible, there would be no power to keep it from happening again.

There is no record of a second occurrence happening and of course the never happened in the first place (b). Not by Evolution or Natural Development. A shorl definition of evolution is: That process by which through some kind of aggregation of matter through many years and species, by chance or by law man appears. This concept has held sway for many years: but its adherents are on the decline. Modem science, such as anthropology is refuting all of its claims.

The Bible declares that man is a separate Creation of God, and that the animals were created at a different time, completely apart from man. Evolution teaches that man and animal have a common origin which branches out into different species. In refuting this we use the Scripture and human reason of This theory is opposed to Scripture. The Scripture states "After its kind." Gen. 1:24. This pins the species down to themselves forbidding them to evolve into a completely new species.

There is no record of animal becoming man. Surely in 6000 or more years if evolution were true, there would be a living example of it today. There is proof that human blood is one blood. Acts 17.28. World War II has proved this. The blood of a white man can be placed into the veins of the black man and vice versa, and give life. The soul and spirit can be separated, the Word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." Hebrews 4:12. However, there is no scriptural proof that they are ever separated.

The rich man of Luke 16, goes to Hades upon death, and he has both soul and spirit with him. The Spirit of man is the seat of his intelligence. What man knoweth, the things of man, save the spirit of man which is in him? Even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God. 1 Cor. 2:11. Animals do not possess intelligence. "He ye not as the horse, or as the mule, which have no understanding whose mouth must be held in with bit and bridle, lest they come nor the corrunt of the Psalms 32:9.

The word spirit both in the Hebrew (ruah) and the Greek (pueuma) is senetimes translated as "breath" and "wind." The context determines the translation. The material is to say that the Word for Spirit should be "breath," and that when man dies he is gone forever. Some people say that man lost his spirit at the Foll and regains his spirit at conversion. This would make him a dual being however and this conception has no Striptural grounds.

(4) Heart. When we speak of the heart, we do not mean the muscle in the body. but rather the seat of conscience. "Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water." Hebrews 10:22. There is a warning that there may be a profession without a possession, a hear knowledge without a heart trust. Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of the Father which is in heaven. Matt. 7:22:23.

HIS CONDITION By this we mean man's condition in his state of integrity before he fell. (a) His knowledge, intuitive knowledge, He was not an adult inlant. He named all the animals that came from the hand of God. It would take an intelligent man to do this. "Adam gave names to all cattle, and to the fowl of the air, and to every beast of the field; but for Adam there was not found a help meet for him! Genesis 2:20 (b) His Fellowship. He was able to commune with God The Lord commanded the man saying. "Of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat." Genesis 2:16. God said, "Behold I have gives you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of all the earth and every tree, in the which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat " Genesis 1:29. (c) His Home. It was located in a garden. The Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden, and there he put the man whom He had formed " Genesis 2:8. This garden is not called Eden "Eden" means plains or plateau. Armenia, no doubt, is the place where man begun id. His Companion, For Adam there was not found an help meet for him-and the rib, which the Lord God had taken from man, made he a woman and brought her unto the man. Genesis 2:20-22.

The words "help meet" are not a compound word, but two separate ones, meaning "fit for" Eve was fit for Adam. Some who laugh at this "rib story" cannot tell us where woman did come from Why do you suppose God did not make woman from the dust? For the simple ceason that God did not want to have two origins of man.

God can make a human being in four (4) ways: [1] By conception. (2) Without the aid of woman As Eve (3) Without a man or a woman As Adam. (4) Without a man by a Woman—As Christ.

this Work. "God blessed them, and God said unto them. Genesis 1:28, The Lord God took the man, and put him into the garden of Eden to garden, but no tol. There was work, but not the kind that wears one out. The word "keep" in Gen. 2:15 is best translated "guard" Against whom was Adam to guard the garden? Against wild animals? No. there were none Against wild men? No. for Adam was the only man. He was put on his guard against the possible appearance of the Devil whenever man is placed in a position of trust, God always gives

the His Food, "God said, Behold I have given you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of all the Earth, and every tree, in the which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat (Genesis 1:29). The first man and heast of the field were vegetations. Their fields included no hand. Man was not carniverous, as evolutionists claim.

HIS RESPONSIBILITY (a) To replenish the earth with a new order—Man. "God blessed them and God said unto them be fruitful and multiply and replecish the earth, and subdue it" Genesis 1:28).

Adam was the first man: The first man Adam was made a living soul. If Cor. 15:45. Eve is the mother of all human beings. Adam called his wife's name Eve, because she was the mother of all living (Gen. 3:20).

2nd Responsibility— To abstain from eating of the fruit. This fruit was of the tree of the knowledge of Good and Evil. "The Lord God commanded the man saying, of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat: but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it, for in the day that thou eatest thereof, thou shalt surely die. (Genesis 2:16-17).

They were allowed to sat freely as there was plenty. There was one tree forbidden them. We do not know what kind of fruit it was. Nothing was wrong with the fruit; there was just God's prohibition behind it. God wanted Adam and Eve to have knowledge, but He did not want them to gain it by disobedience. Remember man had been placed on his guard; he had been warned of the enemy; Salan did not come in unawares. This being true, why did God allow Adam and Eve to be subjected to the attack of the Devil? Testings always come before a blessing. Man always has to be tried before he is promoted. The entire human race came from that one man, Adam. As is the head so are the descendants.

MAN IN HIS STATE OF SIN

(A) The Fall. Some may say that the fall of man is an old ballydman fable, but we have only to look upon man and see him toil for his bread, weaken in his diseases and die in his misery, to realize that he has had a fall. "By one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men for that hill have sinned." (Romans 5:12).

THE SOURCE OF SIN

"Now the serpent was more subtle than any beast of the field which God had made. And he said unto the woman, yes, bath God said, ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden? (Genesis 3:1). "I tear, lest by any means, as the Serpent beguiled Eve through his subtlety so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ" (2 Cor. 11:3). God is not speaking about a beast when He mentions the serpent, but a person. Notice the Scripture does not say "more subtle than any other heast of the field," but leaves out the word other; stating only that he is more subtle than any beast This is inscripture does it state that the Devil was in the serpent, but it does say that the serpent was the Devil. "He laid hold on the dragon, that old Serpent which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him one thousand years." (Rev. 20:2).

THE NATURE OF SIN

The sevpent said unto the woman, ye shall not surely die; for God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be upened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil. And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eye, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her, and he did eat. (Genesis 3:4-6)

Now the fruit was all right; it was good fruit, with only the "for-

bidden" of God behind it. Some may contend that it was a small thing to bring about man's downfall, but we ask the question. "How many steps does it take to fall off a binff?" Adam took three steps to complete his downfall. (1) He doubted God's Love. In doubting God's love. Adam deciled God's goodness, and acted apart from God and become a sinner. There is a way which seemeth right unto a man but the end thereof are the ways of death (Proverbs 14:12; Isa, 55:61.

Second Step. He doubted God's Word. In doubting God's Word, Adam dented God's Truth denying His truth, Adam acted in spite of God and became a criminal. "Whosoever committeth sin transgresses also the law for sin is the transgression of the law, (I John 3.4).

Third Slep: He doubted God's Authority. In doubting God's Authority, Adam denied God's Dealy, denying His deity, Adam became conflicting to God Thus he became God's enemy and a rebel in God's universe. "The carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God." (Romans \$2:7-8).

The testing was given to see if man would stay true to God. He falled because he wanted to be a god. The Devil himself fell that Ch. 141, because he wanted to be like the most High God. This brought his downfall so he planted the same seed of false ambition in Adam and Eve to see if it would bring about their downfall, and it did.

THE EFFECTS OF SIN

(a) Shame They both were naked, the man and his wife and were not ashamed. Genesis 2:25. And the eyes of them both were opened and they knew that they were naked, and they sewed fig leaves together, and made themselves oprons Gen 3.7. God Himself is clothed with a garment of light (Ps. 104.2); and when He made man. He made him in his own image and likeness. Thus, we believe that man also was clothed with a garment of light. When man signed that clothing of light was lost, and he made thimself a fig leaf covering to take the piace of that which was lost. Ever since, man has tags.

the fear "He said. I heard thy Voice in the garden, and I was afraid because I was naked, and I hid myself" (Gen. 2:10) Man still tries to hide from God.

rel Separation from God. There is no doubt that man lost his perfect nature, and ended his fellowship with God. There is no such thing as the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, the natural man, the unsaved mon.

(d) Expulsion from the garden. The Lord sent him forth from the Garden of Eden to till the ground from which he was taken. So he drove out the man, and he placed at the end of the Garden cherabians, and a (tammin, sward which turned in every way to keep the way of the tree of life." (Gen. 3 23-24). Man was driven out.

(c) Lost Lordship, over Creation In the beginning Adam was Indeed ruler of all earthly creatures:

Thou modest him to have dominion over the works of lhy hands: Thou has put all things under his feet; all sheep and oven, we and the beast of the field; the fowl of the air, and the fish of lie sea and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the sea." (Ps. 8.6.8). This is not true of man today. He

has lost that lordship. Christ will return it to man when He comes again. (Hebrows 2 and Isa 11 chapters).

THE FALLEN SONS OF ADAM-FIRST THEIR STANDING

(a) In Adam. Since by man came death, by man came also the resorrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. (I Cor. 15:21-22): (Romans 5:12-21). There are only two representative men in the world; the first man, and the second man; the first Adam, and the last Adam. All men are horn in Adam: all born again men are in Christ.

(b) Of sin and guilt. What then, are ye better than they? No in no wise; for we have before proved both Jews and Gentiles that they are all under sin as it is written: There is none righteous, no not one (Rom. 3-9-10) (Rom. 3-19).

Second, their State. By their state we mean their spiritual condition, that is, the absence of rightcouness in their spiritual life.

(2) Sintul in Nature, "Behold I was shapen in iniquity; and in

Second of Perfection According as He has chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love—to the praise of the glory of his grace, wherein He has made us accepted in the beloved. (Eph. 1:46). There are no charges against the Head, and, as that is so, there can be no charges against the Body.

His State. By this we mean his spiritual condition. This differs from the life of the unbeliever In the believers life righteousness is present—in the righteousness of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Christianity could not stand. There is no way of getting rid of the incarnation without getting rid of Christianity. Mere man did not reveal this to us, but God Rimself did, through the revelation of His Word (Col. 2:1-3). The word "incarnation" comes from the Latin word meaning "enfleshment", thus, when we speak of the incarnation of Christ Jesus, the Son of God, we mean the enfleshment of God-God manifest in the flesh.

THE DEATH OF CHRIST

The cross is the fundamental truth of the revealed Word of God. by the cross we do not mean the tree but the sacrifice upon that tree. "He was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our impatties; the chastisement of our peace was upon Him and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray, we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." (Isa. 53:5-6).

I The manifestation of Divine Character. Now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested, being witnessed by the law and the prophets-To declare, I say, at this time His righteousness that He might be just, and the justifier of him which believes in Jesus. Romans 3:21, 26).

If The Vindication of Divine Lew. The law is unto death, Then is no mercy in law, only justice. The law condemns the sinner to death, Christ look the sinner's place, therefore Christ paid the law's demand.

Iil The Foundation of Divine Pardon. This statement will go unchallenged in the N.T. There is one essential feature of forgivenes, and that is, the one who forgives must take upon himself all wrong for loss; that has been committed. For example, if a person is robbed of ten dollors, and the culprity is found but is forgiven who they stands the loss? It is he who forgave.

HOLINESS

The holiness of God is of ten assigned a place among the moral attributes of the divine nature: yet strictly speaking, holiness is not a single attribute, but rather a combination of all the moral attributes of God. In 1 Peter 1.16, God says be ye holy, for I as holy. God could not ask us to be less seeing we are made in His image and "holiness" is inclusive of the moral excellences of the divine character. The words sanctification, holiness and saints all copies from the same "Root."

1. Holliness is not a betterment of the flesh. The scriptures no where says that the work of the Holy Spirit is to improve the old nature. The natural man cannot understand the Holy Spirit This is hard to say but nevertheless it is true, that the flesh of the believer is no better than the flesh of the sinner. The scriptures say,

Mortify the deeds of the flesh."

Il Holiness is not the evadication of the sinful nature. There are those who contend that a believer may have a purifying erperience that will burn out all carnality. thus rendering him sinles. incapable of committing sin. We do not deny such an experience, but we caution the believer to prove his experience by the Word, rather than trying to prove the Word by his experience. To those who bold that holiness or sanctification is an experience by which the sinful nature is eradicated, let us turn to the word and see how sanctification is used: Thou shall anoint the alter of the burnt offering and all his vessels, and sangtify the altar; and it shall be an altar med holy" (Ex 40:10). Where is the eradication here? Did the alta have a sintul nature? Another example, Moses said unto the Lord the people cannot come up to Mt. Small for thou chargest us, saying Set bounds about the mount and sanctify it" (Ex. 19:23). Did Mi Sinal have a sinful nature? If holiness means eradication from the sinful nature, explain the following. Sanctify the Lord God in your hearts, and be ready always to give an answer to every man that you may give a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and feet (1 Peter 3:15) Carnal Christians are sanctified; this does not speak of the cradication of the sinfin main of 1 Cor. 1.1-2, 3.13.

3) Holiness is not sanctin on ourness. It is not an affected of hypocritical devoutness. Neither is it false saintliness. Holines is not marked by wearing of a heard, in black stocking, and the like

You can lell whether saintliness is talse or real.

(4) Holiness is not a second blessing. In 2 Cor. 1:15 Paul speak of wanting to give the church a second benefit, not a second blessing. The epistle was written to people who were already sauch fleed. (1 Cor. 1:2, 63).

(5) Holiness is to be set apart. The root idea always means to be set apart, or separation. It always means to set apart for a purpose. Whether in respect to saint or sinner. Unsaved men can separate or sanctify, themselves unto sin. They that sanctify themselves in the gardens behind the tree in the midst, eating swines flesh and the abornination, and the mouse shall be consumed to gether, saith the Lord. (Isa. 66:17). Jesus sanctified Himself; to say H_0 made Himself sinless is blasphemous. The Saibbath was sanctified, and we know that the Sabbath had no sinful nature.

We are sanctified the very moment we believe. "We are bound to give thanks always to God for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, because God has from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the spirit and belief of truth." (2 Thess. 2:13)

(a) Having therefore these promises dearly beloved, let us cleanse surselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holi-

ness in the fear of God." (2 Cor. 7:1).

Grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord, and Saviour Jesus Christ. To Him be glory both now and forever. Amen." 2 Peter 3:18. This is our present state of sanctification or holiness. A saint never grows up to sanctification but grow in sanctification. Every believer is a saint, however, some believers do not act like saints. The living Christian still has the flesh in him and obeys it at times. Then God, by Jesus Christ, through the Holy Spirit meets our chastisement. John 17:17; 1 Thess. 4:3; Hebrews 12:10; 2 Cor. 3:18.

Perfect holiness will occur in the future et Christ's second comling. The Lord make you to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, even as we do toward you; to the end He may establish your hearts unblameable in holiness before God, even our Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ with all His saints. 1 Thess. 3:12-13.

SCRIPTURAL BAPTISM

There are three commands in the greet co-mission, and baptism is one of them. Jesus asserted that his supreme authority over all things had been given unto him: and then said in Matthew 28:19:20. "Go ye therefore and teach (Make disciples of) all nations, baptizing them in the name of the father, of the son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whitsoever I have commanded you: and lo. I am with you alway even unto the end of the world." The church to whom this command was given was to get people saved, baptize them, and teach them to observe all things Jesus commanded. The only thing that should come before baptism is salvation. Everything else should follow.

BAPTISM IS OF DIVINE ORIGIN

Listen to the words of Jesus "Baptizing them in the name of the father, and of the son, and of the Holy Spiril" (Matt. 28: 19). "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16). "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins." (Words of Peter in Acts 2:38). The whole mission of John of which baptism formed a very important part, was divinely inspired. John was sent from God (John 1:1). John was sent to baptize with water. (John 1:33). Jesus in being baptized put his approval on the ministry of John, identified himself with the men whom he had come to save; and set an example to believers for all times

Baptism is an ordinance of the church. The word "ordinance" is derived from the latin "ordo," a row or order, and so ordinance meant "to put in the right place in the row, or set in order," and then consequently to establish, to command: so that "ordinance" comes to mean something established, commanded, enforced by proper authority, and the term has been applied to the sacred rites of baptism and the Lord's Supper as institutions, or commandements of the Lord.

An ordinance should not be looked upon as sacrament in the Roman Catholic sense of conferring divine grace, but a symbolic rite which sets forth the central truth of the Christian faith. Jesu delivered the ordinance of baptism to a specific body to be administered. With this administrator Jesus promised to be to the end of the world. There are several views held relative to this must important question. "To whom was the ordinance of baptism committed?" We shall give three of these views:

The first view is that the clergy is responsible for the ordinance and has the authority to administer it. Another view is that as Individual Christian can baptize. The other view is that the responsibility for the administration of the ordinance rests with the church. The author believes the last view is the correct one. To administration is not an individual act. It is not a ministerial act. It is church act. This ordinance was committed to the disciples in church capacity. The church as an organization is not expected to baptize. Hence the proper administrator is one which has a commission from Jesus Christ to go, to teach, to baptize who has been ordained by the church, working under orders of the church. The official was administers the ordinance is only acting as a representative of the church.

To qualify as being the Lord's church to which the ordinance of baptism was committed, a church must have three things true concerning it's beginning. It must have the right founder—Christ (Matt 16:18): the right place—Palestine (Where Christ lived); and the right time—during the personal ministry of Christ. An organization that can not meet these conditions can not qualify as the church the Lord organized. It is not his church and has no authority to administrative act of baptism. The specification of any one thing in a law command or contract is the prohibition of every other thing.

Let us take a look at the following table showing the founder, place and time of the various denominations:

Since all of these denominations fail to meet the three basic requirements none of them can qualify as being the church that was set up by our Lord, and to whom was committed the ordinance of banism.

Baptists alone have no founder but Christ, no place outside of Palostine. no date this side of the personal ministry of Christ, Baptists alone can justify claim to be the New Testament Church and offer unequivocal testimony of an unbroken existence from the days of Jesus Christ until the present time. There never has been a time since the days of Jesus when there were not people holding and preaching the same faith that was taught by Jesus Christ and advocated by the apostles.

The Baptist church being the only church that was built by Jesus Christ, which he called "My Church" is the only church Christ, who had supreme authority, authorized to administer the ordinance of buntism.

Immersion by any other source than a Baptist church is alien immersion, and not baptism at all. When members of other churches apply to a Baptist church for membership, they are not re-baptized they are merely baptized. The proper act in baptism may be nullified, by an improper administrator.

SUBJECTS OF BAPTISM

In determine the proper subjects for baptism we shall look to the command and example of Christ and his apostles. Christ stated in the great commission (Matt. 28:19) "Go ye therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them into the name of the father and of the son, and of the Holy Spirit." The language of this commission is plain. To make disciples is to precede baptism Mark 16 15.16): "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved: but he that believeth not shall be dammed." Acts 2:41 They that gladly received the word were baptized." Acts 10:47 Can any forbid water that these should not be baptized, who have received the Holy Spirit as well as we?" Acts 8:37-Philip said to the Eunuch "If thou believeth with all thy heart thou mayest (Be baptized. Baptism then is to be administered only to those who make a creditable confession of faith in Christ. There is no record in the Bible where baptism was ever administered to any one but a believer. To attempt to baptize any one who does not profes to have a heart numbed by faith is to proclaim a falsehood. There is a maxim of law to the effect that "The expression of one thing is the exclusion of another." Therefore the expression of believers as Scriptural subjects for baptism is the exclusion of unbelievers.

INFANT BAPTISM UNTHINKABLE

According to the Scripture which is our guide in all matters of faith and practice, we are first to make disciples, then to baptize them. This is impossible with a new born habe. So-called "Infant Baptism," originated in those years during which paganism and Christianity were being amalgamated into what is called the Roman Catholic Church The first cardinal error of the church was baptismal regeneration; from this error arose the practice of baptizing the sick and the dying, who were believed to be lost if they died unbaptized.

In a few years, this supposed henefit was extended to infants who were sick, and had no appetite for their mother's milk Finally it was decided that infants as well as adults must be baptized, or condemned to an eternal held. According to the Scripture there is no precept or example for the practice of infant/baptism. Infant haplism is the perversion of the Seripture the chief corner stone of the papacy, and the nullification of evangelical Christianity, Infant baptim violates the fundamental religious rights of the individual, deciding for him, when he is helpless, that which he has the god-given right to decide for himself.

Infant baptism fills the churches with unregenerated members and is a root to more religious corruption than nearly any other heresy. It is a practice which tends neither to glorify God. our to profit the child and pervents the design and falsifies the prefession of the church. On- of the distinguishing marks of Baptists has always been their emphasis upon the competency of the individual soul to God. This rules out intant baptism. Motthew speaks of baptizing disciples, and Mark of baptizing believers, but infant are neither of these. As we should not bury a person before his death, so we should not symbolically bury a person by baptism until he has in sparn died to sin-

FORM OF BAPTISM

BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

It is not our purpose to dwell long on this element, not because it is not important, but because so much has been said and written on this subject that it is not necessary. The form of baptism is immersion and immersion only. Greek lexicons give "immerse" "dio" or "plunge" as the primary meaning of haptism. "Baptize" and "baptism" are not translations, but transliterations, of the Greek words baptize and baptism. In baptize the final letter o, was changed into e; and in baptism the last letter was dropped altogether. These two words were anglicised upon the orders of King James I, when the Bible was being translated in 1611. Some writers have expressed themselves that King James gave this order because he was a member of the church of England and was opposed to immersion.

The description of baptism given in the New Testament requires immersion. Matt. 3:16-"And Jesus when he was baptized went up straightway out of the water." Acts 8:38-"And they went down into the water both Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him." Romans 6.4, 5-"Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the father, even so we also should walk in the newness of life. "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection."

We find no authority in the New Testament which contains all the law for the church that was established by our Lord and Master. to use sprinkling or pouring as a form for haptism. The first instance of pouring as a form of baptism that can be found recorded in church history is that of Novation which occurred about 250 A. D. Novation was thought to be sick unto death, desiring salvation which he thought could only be procured by baptism. Being so ill they thought he was not able to be immersed, the ministers surrounded his bed and simultaneously thrust water upon him from above, below and the sides endeavoring to symbolize immersion. In the year 811 A.D., Pope Steven the second granted the French clergy the right to sprinkle the infirm and infants, saying if such was the case of necessity, and if sprinkling was done in the name of the Trinity it should be held valid. Such was called clinic or couch baptism: sometimes called a compend, or an abridgement. Eventually sprinkling and pouring were recognized as forms for baptism. Popes may issue decrees, men may tamper with the ordinance but according to the teaching of the New Testament immersion was, is, and will forever be the only form of baptism. Baptismal regeneration and infant baptism according to well-established history bave caused the shedding of more Christian blood as the centuries have gone by, than all other errors combined. Over fifty million Christians died martyr deaths mainly because of their rejection of these two errors, during the period of the cark ages.

THE DESIGN OF BAPTISM

Baptism properly administered, and understood, preaches by symbol the great underlying principles of the gospel of Christ; the burial and resurrection of Christ and the resurrection of our bodies when Jesus comes. It further symbolizes the remission of

sin, the burial of the old life, the cleansing from unrighteousness, and the resolve to wark in a new life of fellowship with Christ Baptism should be looked upon as a symbol, which is a sign, or visible representation of an invisible truth or idea; as, for example, the lion is the symbol of strength, the lamb is the symbol of gentleness and the olive branch the symbol of peace. Baptism is a symbolic act, which expresses by vivid actions essential Christian truth in an outwardly observed rite, inwardly accepted and fundamental Christian doctrine. Baptism is: "The answer of a good conscience toward God." (1 Peter 3-21) It is a public and obedient response on the part of a child of God who has been given a good conscience through remission of sin, by the grace of our Lord.

Baptists hold that the subject, the form, and the design must be preserved in order to have valid baptism. To change either one


will destroy the validity of baptism.


Baptism is important because Christ ordained it. Christ submitted to it in order to institute it in his example. His disciples were baptized and they baptized others. Christ included baptism in the great commission. Every Christian should be baptized, not in order to save him, but because he IS saved.


We change the design and invalidate the ordinance when baptism which is a declarative act is performed in order to procure salvation. Grace is the source, and faith the instrument of salvation. Eph 2.8. "For by grace are we saved through faith, and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God." 1 John 1:7—"The blood of Jesu Christ cleanseth us from all sins." 1 John 5:1—"Whosoever believeth Jesus is the Christ is born of God." When Paul told the Philippian jailer what he must do to be saved, he said, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." [Acts 16:31). Since Cornellus and his household received the Holy Ghost before they were baptized it is absolutely certain that they were born into the family of God.



As to Acts 2:38. "Report and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." The preposition "eis" translated "for" does not mean in order to, or to secure, according to Prof A T Reberson of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. A recognized Greek scholar he said, "It is perfectly good Greek to translate "eis" because of, in Acts 2:38. It is also permissible to translate "eis" at, upon referring to. In Matthew 12:41 the preposition "eis" is translated "at" the preaching of Jonah, which means because of the preaching of Jonah. In Acts 2.38 translatae "eil" "because of" "referring to" or "picturing" the remission of sins and you will have the Scriptural meaning of that verse, and it will conform to all the other preaching of Peter about salvation. Peter said 27 years later that, baptism is not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God. (1 Peter 3:2). In 1 Peter 3:20, 21, the only thing the water had to do with Noah will to hold up the ark which saved. In like figure or manner baptim saves; that is it holds up, portrays the triumph of Jesus over the grave. Noah and his family were in the ark saved, seven days before the water came to bear up the instrument of salvation (Gen. 7:1, 10). so in like figure one is led into Jesus Christ before baptism. The fact of being saved must exist before it can be set forth in symbol.

"Where there is no vision the people perish" Prov. 29:18. Vision its meaning-Distinguish from dreams. Visions in the narrow sense and the broader sense.

1. All men who do great things have visions. The men who shape

history and direct the alfalrs and the destiny of nations have visions Men are prophets in proportion to their visionary power. Long before the great conflict of nations statesmen like Roosevelt

and others saw dimly the conflict in its greatest fury.

2 Vision is essential to real education

Books, travel, etc., are means of education, but except one can see with the mind's eye, except he can see beyond the real to the imaginary he cannot require much real education.

3 Vision is essential to the accomplishment of any great task

or work. No man can do any great work and build what has not been built or do what has not already been wrought, except he has the vision to see that work constructed in his mind before a single blow is struck.

4. Vision is even essential to faith, for where is there any faith to do what we cannot see how it can be done. We say faith goes in the dark and the very fact that that faith is evidence that faith is not in the dark.

5. Our vision is in proportion to our conception of God, of humanity and self and the relationship to each. (Isaiah 6:1-8)

have accomplished what we have. We had a vision in 1922 to Edit a paper "The Woman's Helper" for six (6) years—Then you recommend to discontinue the publication and

take a page in the Union-Review. We had a vision in 1928, Shreveport, Louisiana to organize the Junior Woman's Convention and elected Miss Hattie L. Evans nee

Williams as the President and she is still the President. In 1933, Chicago, Illinois, the Ministers wives formed themselves

into a council for the purpose of enlarging our Foreign Mission work by their financial gifts. Since then they have enlarged their gifts in the Annual Session each year.

You had a vision in 1940. Louisville, Kentucky, to organize the Ushers Council in order that the Convention would not have to depend upon the local churches to render this service. In Memphis, Tennessee, 1944, we organized the Youth's Department because Youth's do not have Youth Conventions anywhere in the world, they have Youth Depart-

ment or Youth Conference. So, my dear women, we were in line with the world

We further organized the different Councils so that every woman who desires to work may select the Council that she wishes to work

Now we are putting great stress on the development of our children from the CRADLE UP. We have over this department trained workers who have given time to study how to develop children religiously.

I am appealing religiously to the Senior Women to turn your attention to the Children's Department and give them the financial support and encouragement which they need

We edit and publish Missionary literature for every organization to our Convention - namely: Guides for each organization, Secretary Books, Pledge Charts, Hand-Books on organizations, and Buttons.

This literature can be ordered from the National Baptist Publishing Board, Nashville, Tennessee, or can be purchased from any Baptist Bank store

HUMAN RELATIONS

The teaching of Human Relations or relations of one to another first step is in the home.

Speaking at Gustavus Adulphiis College Commencement and Bersidotte Memorial Dedication. Sunday, June 4, 1950, on the topic of "Human Relations and World Peace," states that the fundamental cause of the crisis in the world affairs today is not really the "cold war", not really the conflict between West and East, grave as this may be, not the destructive threat of "A" and "H" bombs, of biological warfare, or supersonic air speeds—ine fundamental cause of the deep crisis confronting us all is the problem of human relations Most of the international problems which bedevil the contemporary world and give rise to deep anxiety regarding the future, are due in large measure to a lack of understanding among peoples, and to the supplicions and fears which are the inevitable by-products of misundirstanding. The world indeed, suffers from a shocking illiteracy in human relations

To further emphasize education's responsibility, Dr. R. O'Han Lanier, In his inaugural address on "Education and Human Relations," challenged the educators of the nation with six point core curriculum in human relations adaptable on all levels from the cradle to the grave and from pre-school to university.

We believe it is fitting to restate his six points for your con-

A study, continuous study of man, What makes him tick?
 The Hiedelberg or the Neanderthal man.

2. A re-study and unitary understanding of democracy as an ideal form of government and a way of life. Democracy is a growth, not a sudden happening with the writing of the Declaration of Independence or development of a written constitution, it is a long history antedating the Magna Chorta and at present culminating in the declaration of human rights of the United Nations.

3 A re-examination of the great cultures, great religions, and great civilizations to understand the contribution that each has made and finally, to agree with Wells. "The history of civilization is a race between education and catastrophe."

4. A unitary study of our own rullural developments in America or what is called the unitary course or courses in and out of school with emphasis not on battles and military heroes but on the economics, art, culture, science, and technocracy and the steady development of that which is America.

5. The development of the will for peace and the attitude to understand. "Understanding and attitudes formed in childhood continue to old age: opinions and attitudes of most literate adults are the results of what they read and heard in youth."

 The development of the world-mindedness which may lead to belief that there can be peace and human happiness for all. The is the challenge of education and human relations.

CHRIST'S PRINCIPLES OF RIGHT RELATIONS

Jesus sought to teach the right relation between man and mu He was a proponent of the dignity and worth of man, the priceles value of freedom, and the equality of the children of God.

The Bible does not confine itself to exhartations about brotherhood, it proceeds to portray the life of one who "came not to ke ministered unto, but to minister." (Matt. 20:28)

God has insistently enjoined upon His sons and daughters aumiversal and clernal fellowship. The Biblical record repeatedly afterms the brotherhood of man, I John 2.10; 3:10

Social history, perhaps in this day, with the unleashing of atomic energy, comity among men has become the spiritual imperative of survival. To the Christian's sutisfaction in serving the interests of society is added the satisfaction of demonstrating a joyous acceptance of God's commandments.

"All men regardless of differences in race, language or customs, which often times make it difficult for them to understand one another, have something in common. They are all children of God, they all have God's Spirit in them. There is a Spirit in every man that inspires him to seek that which is just and right." When he is denied these rights he feels that those who deny them are less that what God intended them to be, just and right within themselves.

Again the doctrine of the Fatherhod of God and the brotherhood of mon demands confidence and comradeship in the household of faith. To deny this signifies a contradiction of these great doctrines.

"God made of one blood all nations of men." (Acts 17:28-The unity of the race is a great solemnizing truth. Men cannot be classified by the color of their skin. It is impossible to tell the difference between the blood of a Chinese from an Anglo-American or a National Chinese from an Anglo-American or

In an address to teachers, the late Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune said. When they ask you do you want integration, run, bury yourselves and die before you say no."



To President Clark, Officers and members of the Brotherhood Union of the National Baptist Convention of America, greetings:

We the members of your Committee on State and Country beg leave to make the following report;

One year has passed into history since we held the Thirteenth Annual Session of our National Brotherhood Convention, in connection with and under the jurisdiction of the National Baptist Convention of America. It is fitting and proper, therefore, that again we take thought of what has happened in our nation as a whole and in our several states from which we have come as messengers to this great convention of God-fearing men and women.

It would not be inaccurate we believe, to say that when we adjourned in our thirteenth annual meeting in Jacksonville, Fla. one year ago, the sentiment if not the song that emanated from each individual heart was:

"And am I born to die To lay this body down."

But when we convened here in Chicago, on September 7, to most of us was given the privilege by an all-wise Providence to say or sing:

"And are we yet alive, To see each other's face."

We, your committee, believe that it is safe to say that our nation, in the year that has transpired since our 1954 convention has been one of the most momentous from several standpoints. First, in importance because of its electrifying effect upon the Christian people, without regard to denominational lies, was the United Supreme Courts decision handed down on May 31. It was the decision which "spelled out directly the courts decision in which the 14th Amendment was upheld as outlawing racial segregation in public education.

In 1955, the court ordered all school districts of all states to begin as soon as practicable to set up the machinery for an orderly process of racial desegregation.

Eminent attorneys tell us that whereas it may be found practicable in some states to maintain schools that very generally may house colored pupils in one instance and white pupils in another, this policy will not operate by compulsion on any individual student.

We point, with pride, to the fact that the two decisions of the Supreme Court very definitely forecast the abolition of racial aegregation in every segment of our national life. But, nevertheless, we need to be forewarned that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. In other words our hope of enjoying liberties guaranteed by law will rest upon what we do to make us worthy of the heritage of religious and civil liberty.

Our nation is now enjoying the greatest measure of economic prosperity in any peace time period of its history. This prosperity is reaching the man farthest down as well as individuals in the highest levels of our nation. It is quite significant and a matter for which Christians can be proud, that our present prosperity has not come as a result of the deaths and destruction brought on by a cruel war.

Verily, it seems that the warning of the Holy Writ that "Except the Lord build a house, they labor in vain that build it," is making an impression upon those in high places of our states, our nation and our world. Mighty leaders everywhere are frankly edmitting that the "Prince of Peace and His teachings" alone offer any sound solution to the problems of our day and generation.

Now, while we are privileged to point out the picture of our time, which shows religious, educational and economic abundance, only recently from the backward hills of Mississippi has come the news of a brutal and unprovoked lynching of a teen-age colored boy. Of course there is nothing that we can say that can assuage the grief of the parents of the youth. Even the act of which the youngster was accused wax one which, if true, would not have merited barsh punishment by a court of law.

It is deplorable that any communities whether down south or up north are indifferent with regard to the bad advertisement our nation gets all over the world when lynchings and similar acts of violence occur. It is doubly represensible when officials fail to find and punish the offenders which is something not difficult for officials who have sworn to preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States.

We, your committee, in this brief review of happenings in the nation, are aware that in most states the record

for the convention year which is ending here in Chicago this week is like that in the nation itself; a record which exhibits more assets than liabilities.

Therefore, we commend to us all as Christian citizens of a great nation, more loyal and conscientious service in the cause of the Master in the future than in the past.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY COMMITTEE REPORT

Chicago, Ill., Sept., 1955.

Brother President, Officers and Members of the National Baptist Brotherhood Convention, Assembled:

We, your Committee on Juvenile Delinquency stand here today, to give an account of our stewardship. We are happy to say that our Heavenly Father has been exceptionally good to us. He has brought us through dangers seen and unseen. As an appreciation of being selected in this capacity, we have striven hard to live up to our responsibility.

Our problem of Juvenile Delinquency still exists, and the sailing is not easy. The Americanu people sense the danger and are rising, like a mighty tide, to combat this great evil: According to the testimony of experts and specialists the exact causes of juvenile delinquency have been discovered. The only thing to do is to work on these causes until desired results will be achieved.

Seemingly, there are two main causes out of which are hatched many secondary causes. These two main causes are: The forsaking of God's guidance and the misconception of the value of home training. There can be no juvenile delinquency if God's guidance is accepted by the adult world. . . There can be no juvenile delinquency if the parents have the proper conception of home training. They will understand that the home is the foundation of civilization. For God established the home before churches and schools were brought into existence. . . The Lord God created Adam and Eve and placed them in the garden of Eden which was their home.

The child looks into the face of its parents before he knows anything about the church, the preacher, the school or the teacher. The parents have the first chance as the child's guidance.

In our research and attempt to find out just how others are thinking, who are interested in our youth problem. we have selected a few ideas which have been given by some of our best minds. President Eisenhower in a message to a group in Toledo, Ohio, urged the Nation's parents to help solve the crime problem b ya more careful upbringing of their children. A Mr. Paul Friedman states that one out of every six youngsters handled by crime prevention officers is a repeater and the reason is that they do not get the proper guidance. Some one else states that good homes do not breed delinquents. Bishop Sheen in an article in one of our local papers states that: "nondiscipline produces evil." Mrs. Elizabeth Logan Davis, a New Jersey Minister's wife states that: "Today's mothers are too prone to depend on the school to teach discipline, the Sunday school to teach religion and the community to supply recreation."

Jersey Joe Walcott gives a formula to reduce delinquency: Love and Discipline. Jersey Joe said: "The answer to juvenile delinquency is a lot of loving attention on the part of the parent and judicial doses of old fashion "strap oil." Walcott has six children and grew up in a large family himself.

Mr. R. C. Hendrickson, former chalrman of the Senate Sub-committee on Juvenile Delinquency in an article: "Strength For Our Times" states that: "Better Adulta means Better Juveniles." he further states that juvenile delinquency is a challenge to the very sinews of our future existence. Not even the Communist conspiracy could devise a more effective way to demoralize and destroy our future citizens than the scourge of Juvenile Delinquency. Mr. Hendrickson also states that, the adult concept of Law and Order is another important factor in Juvenile Delinquency.

The morality of a community cannot be divided into two parts; children get their ideas from their parents and "grown ups". The adult altitude toward evading Income Taxes, "fixing" traffic tickets, and instructing a child to tell the Bill collector, "mama is out," all breeds in the child a disrespect for law and order.

There are many other ideas, thoughts and suggestions which could be mentioned but space will not permit.

As a committee, we stand pat on the principles which are found in the Holy Writ, Prov. 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

Eph 6:1-4 reads thus: "Children obey your parents in the Lord" for this is right

Honour thy lather and mother; which is the first commandment with promise:

That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth.

And, we fathers, proveke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord"

We believe as a committee, if these above principles are carried out, Juvenile Delinquency will disappear out of our American homes.

As a committee, we recommend the following:

- 1. That every man who is a member of the Brotherhood Union will maintain and establish a family altar in his home.
- 2. That every man who is a member of the Brotherhood Union will strive to have established in his Church and community, a family alter is every home.
- 3 That men will read study and meditate on God's word at least once a day and encourage others.
- Where ever young people are found and can be approached do your best to help them out of this condition.
- 5. Publish the good things young people are doing.
- 6. Encourage delinquents to attend church, Sunday school and other religious activities. Invite them to your

social features where they can see how good boys and girls enjoy themselves.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 10, 1955,

As we assemble here the nations of earth are setting up plans to establish a regular schedule of visitation to outer space, circumventing the globe in a matter of minutes As we contemplate these advances, we naturally associate our religious work as it relates to comparable progress in world affairs. How is the comparison as you see it as it relates to the matter set forth above? Doubtless, you have already arrived at your answer, but we may not have the benefit of same as we deliberate here.

FELLOWSHIP AND FOLLOWSHIP

In our great field of service, we find that fellowship and followship are very important considerations, and we conclude that no organization can make the progress necessary to measure up to natural expectations without them.

No one was happier to see President Clark given the unanimous vote and support to attend the World Baptist All'ance, held in London, than yours truly, a life long fellow worker of President Clark. As a matter of fact, many others should have made the European trip, thus showing to the world the fact that men are leaders in their own right, and that where men of our aggregation are by the slightest manner invited, they should turn out en masse to such a call, etc.

OUR WORK IS BEING BETTER UNDERSTOOD

All over the country, we can see healthy signs of a definite better understanding on the part of our ministerial and church leadership as it relates to the work of the Brotherhood. We are certainly proud of these signs, they give definite indications that our work may naturally expect greater growth in the immediate future than that which we've experienced in the past. The more we do for the program and leadership of our church, the greater our opportunities will be for a place in the sun, as it were. It is certainly refreshing to note so definite a growth on all sides of our denominational demarcation. We suggest that all our efforts be made to bring into our State where so many of our healthy Brotherhood organizations and Annual Meetings greater numbers from the churches are identified, but do not assemble in such meetings as this. In this connection, if we hope to secure the best and most certainly those things, which we as laymen would appreciate having in our possession, we must make whatever sacrified we find necessary. Our churches may not feel themselves able to send five or aix laymen to these meetings, in such cases, we as laymen, must cultivate ourselves to spend some of our own money to such expense.

If this work is to continue to grow and expand, we individually, and collectively must underwrite the financial expense necessary to accomplish such glorious ends.


