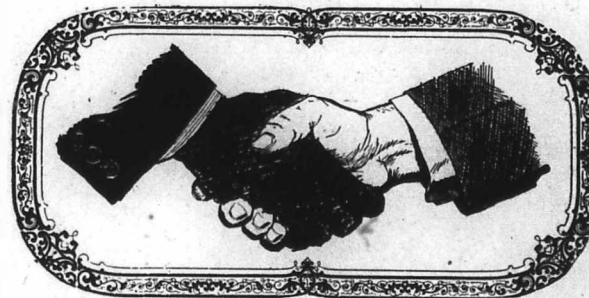

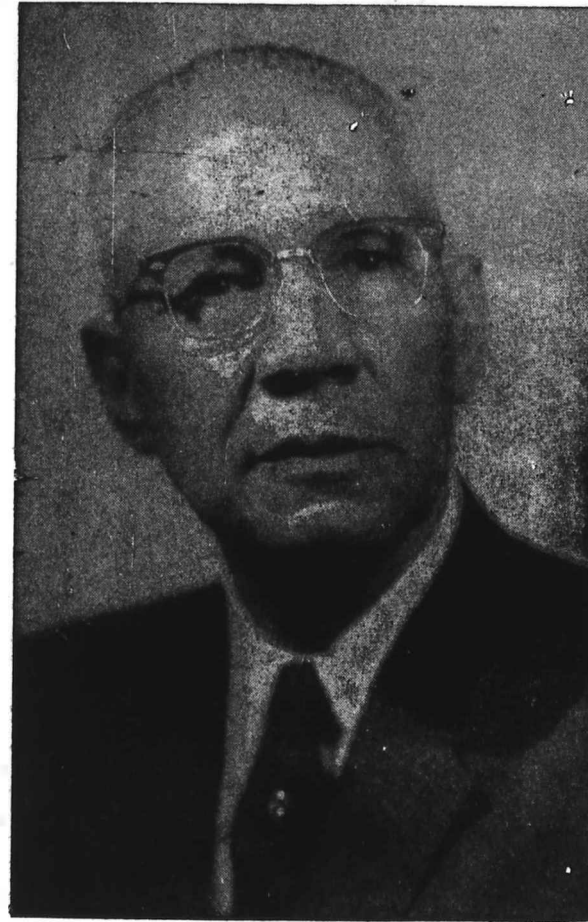

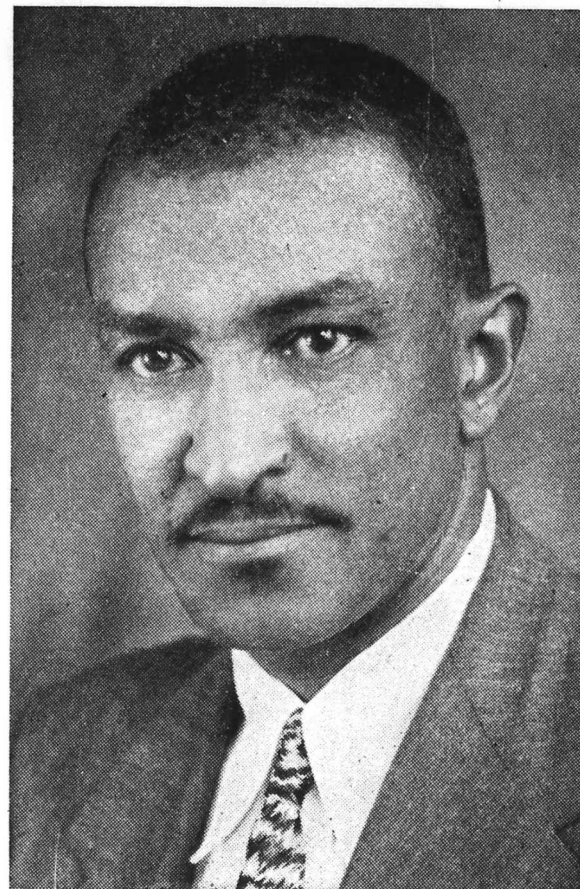

HISTORICAL REFERENCE

April 5, 1888, an open letter to the Baptist Clergy and laymen was issued by the Rev Wm. J. Simmons in the American Baptist, asking if we should have a National Baptist Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denomination. At that time the following reasons were given.

1. To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of each other.
2. To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the Denomination.
3. To encourage our literary men and women, and to promote the interest of Baptist literature.
4. To discuss questions pertaining to especially the religious, educational, industrial and social interest of our people.
5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard.
6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the Denomination.

Having been solicited to write the Call by many whose names and endorsement are hereunto affixed, the Call is hereby made by

their advice and solicitations for said Convention to meet in St. Louis, Mo., August 25, 1886, 10 o'clock a.m., in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangement with power to select his associates. Wm. H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. R. H. Cole, 2800 Goode Avenue, St. Louis are hereby requested to serve as a committee on transportation.

"The National Baptist Convention of America was organized in Montgomery, Ala., in 1880, Rev. W. H. McAlpine was our first President. His successors were: Rev. W. A. Brinkley, 1885; Rev. W. J. Simmons, 1886; Rev. E. M. Brawley, 1891; Rev. M. Vann, 1892; Rev. E. C. Morris, 1894; Rev. E. P. Jones, 1915. Rev. J. E. Woods, 1923; Rev. J. W. Hulse, 1930; Rev. G. L. Prince, 1933."

CONSTITUTION

THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America and the National Baptist Convention of America, do unite ourselves together for the purpose of doing Missionary, Educational and all Religious Work among ourselves, and throughout the world, therefore we adopt this Constitution.

ARTICLE I.—Name

This Body shall be known and styled, "The National Baptist Convention of America."

ARTICLE II.—Membership

SECTION I.—The membership shall be Annual, Orthodox Baptist Churches, District and General Association and State Conventions. If there be a group of churches within a State which has no General Association; or State Convention connected with this Convention, this group of representatives from these churches shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that State.

SECTION II.—Any individual in good and regular standing with a Baptist Church may become a member with full privileges by paying the sum of ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

SECTION III.—Each church shall pay Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION IV.—Each District Association shall pay fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for representation and entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION V.—Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to five messengers and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

ARTICLE III.—Use of Finance

All finance received by the Convention shall be placed into the treasury for its expenses and appropriations, provided that designated money shall be paid as so designated.

ARTICLE IV.—Officers

The Officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries, Corresponding Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, General Auditor, and His-

torian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association cooperating with this Body shall be Associate Vice President.

ARTICLE V.—Duty of Officers

SECTION I.—The President:

He shall be the Presiding Officer; sign all Calls for regular or special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body. He may make any visit that will be profitable to the Convention. He is the Chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION II.—First Vice President:

At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon him.

SECTION III.—Second Vice President:

He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice President when necessity demands.

SECTION IV.—The Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session, compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are countersigned by the President, and make a report to this Body annually.

SECTION V.—The First Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annual meeting and to do whatever the Body may require through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VI.—The Second Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VII.—The Third Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention. He shall report to the Convention as required by the Convention, and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VIII.—The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Accounts and Business and do whatever the Body requires through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION IX.—The Corresponding Secretary:

This Secretary shall do all the correspondence of the Convention and Executive Board as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make his report annually to the Convention.

SECTION X.—The Statistical Secretary:

This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and report same annually, preparing it for distribution.

SECTION XI.—Treasurer:

He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention. He shall keep his rec-

ords so as to preserve them perpetually for reference and report annually all receipts and disbursements.

SECTION XII.—General Auditor:

He shall receive and audit all reports of the Board as audited, also the report of the Treasurer of the Convention, each given to him thirty days prior to the annual sitting of the Convention.

SECTION XIII.—Reporter:

He shall give publicity to all the doing of the Convention necessary to be published.

SECTION XIV.—Historian:

He shall act for all Boards and shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference.

ARTICLE VI.—Boards

SECTION I.—This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Educational, Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, B.Y.P.U.

SECTION II.—Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, elected by the said State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, said election shall be annually.

SECTION III.—Officers:

The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION IV.—Duty of officers:

The Chairman of Board shall preside at all Board Meetings. The Recording Secretary of each Board shall keep a true record of the doing of the Board.

The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Treasurer of each Board and shall do all the corresponding of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION V.—Management:

The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and three other members of the Board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each Board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does at recess or during the meeting of the Convention.

SECTION VI.—Reports of Boards:

Each Board shall make its report annually.

SECTION VII.—Duties of Boards:

The Home Mission Board shall have charge of all the Home Mission and Church Extension work done by the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall have charge of all Foreign Mission work.

The Educational Board shall have charge of all the educational work in the Convention.

The Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publication and publishing Work of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall have charge of all the evangelical work done by the Convention.

The Benevolent Board shall have charge of all the business pertaining to the relief of aged ministers and members of the Convention.

The B. Y. P. U. Board shall carry out the work of the B. Y. P. U. of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII.—Auxiliaries

SECTION I.—There shall be a National Brotherhood Convention, a Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, and a Junior National Baptist Convention, Youth National Baptist Convention, all of which, shall be subject to the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION II.—All monies collected at the Annual Session of this Convention by all Auxiliaries, shall be reported and turned over to the Parent Body, along with their bills and expenses, to be voted out by the Parent Body before any disbursements of said auxiliaries shall take place at the Convention.

ARTICLE VIII.—Railroad Commission

This Commission shall consist of five members, elected annually by the Convention. It shall have charge of all transportation, transit, and travel, and work harmoniously with the several States, as will best suit the interest of the Convention, and report annually to the Convention.

ARTICLE IX.—Special Committees

There shall be three business committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the Convention. The regular Committee shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the Convention. The second Committee shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts and recommend the amount of all causes, and after being approved by the President, it shall bring the same to the General Body for adoption before execution. The third Committee shall investigate, if required, all applying for membership into the Convention that the Constitution requirements may not be violated. There shall be a Standing Committee on Orthodoxy and one of Social and Economic Welfare.

ARTICLE X.—Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of all the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of each Board. It shall hold its meeting as the President sees it. It is the Board of Management.

ARTICLE XI.—Annual Meetings

This Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday

night. The place shall be selected by the Convention in session. The Executive Board shall have power to change the time and place when the necessity demands, informing the Convention of the same.

ARTICLE XII.—Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Convention.

ARTICLE XIII.—Salaries

The Salaries of officers shall be as follows: President \$2,500.00; First Vice President, \$150.00; Second Vice President, \$125.00; Secretary, \$250.00; First Assistant, \$75.00; Second Assistant, \$50.00; Third Assistant, \$50.00; Fourth Assistant, \$50.00; Corresponding Secretary, \$75.00; Treasurer, \$275.00.

PROCEEDINGS

Proceedings Of The 77th Session Of The National Baptist Convention Of America. Los Angeles, California September 4-8, 1957.

WEDNESDAY—September 4, 1957

Morning Session—The 77th Session of the National Baptist Convention was opened at 10:00 a.m. in the Embassy Auditorium, Los Angeles, California, under the auspices of the New Hope Baptist Church, Rev. B. O. Byrd, Pastor. The devotions were opened with the singing of *Leaning on the Everlasting Arms*, led by the Convention Chorister, Mrs. Virgie Dewitty, Mrs. R. B. Porter at the Console. Blessed Be the Name was sung. Pres. C. D. Pettaway instructed the acting secretary to read the names of the brethren who were scheduled to lead the devotions. The 91st Psalm was read by the Rev. Robert Wesley. Prayer was offered by Rev. L. W. Mingo. *Lift Him Up*, was led by Rev. H. W. D. Stewart, S. C., *The Child of the King* was sung by Rev. W. M. Downs, Ohio. The discussion of the theme, *The Responsibility of the Christian in a Disturbed World*, was led by Rev. W. N. Daniels, Ill. *Yes, There's One, Only One*, was sung by Rev. Downs. Remarks by President Pettaway. Time was allotted for the registration by states. The following Committees were appointed. Enrollment: Rev. B. A. Roberson, Mich. Rev. N. S. Jones, Tenn., Rev. W. B. Walker, Va., Rev. W. R. Vaughn, Ark., Rev. B. W. Noble, Okla., Rev. A. T. Williams, N. Y., Rev. N. C. Crain, Texas, Rev. V. T. Lemmons, Mo., Rev. P. H. Hinton, Tex. Finance Committee: Rev. B. O. Byrd, Calif., Rev. J. N. Byrd, Tex., Rev. A. A. Lucas, Tex., Rev. W. E. Hausey, La., Rev. A. E. Williams, Calif., Rev. J. D. Thomas, La., Rev. N. T. Burks, Tex., Rev. A. Flemming, Fla. A motion by Rev. A. L. Roach, Ohio, that Article 2, Section 2 be stricken from the Constitution was carried. Rev. P. S. Wilkerson, Tex., led the Convention in Prayer for the speedy recovery of Rev. G. G. Daniels, Secretary of the Convention.

Accepting the suggestion of the President registration and enrollment were curtailed so that the Introductory

sermon could be preached. Sis. Dewitty led the Convention in singing, Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross. Solo, Sis. Clarice Tobin, Va. President Pettaway presented Rev. S. M. Thompson, Va. to preach the sermon. Rev. Thompson selected for a text, Matt. 20:20; Mark 10:35. The theme of the message was The Dangers of False Ambitions. A wonderful message was preached. Solo, Sis. Clarice Tobin. I Love The Name Of Jesus. The Convention was led in prayer by Rev. W. M. Downs, Ohio. Closing selection by the Rev. Wesley Grant, of N. C.

WEDNESDAY—Afternoon Session

The session was called to order by President Pettaway at 3:10 p.m. Song service, I Shall Not Be Moved, and Glory To His Name were sung. The Forty-sixth Psalm was read by the Reverend John W. Williams, Missouri. Prayer, Rev. R. F. Harrison, Ohio. Song, Lord I Want To Be A Christian, was sung. The remainder of the session was given to registration and enrollment.

Benediction by Rev. W. M. Thompson.

WEDNESDAY—Evening Session

The session was called to order by Vice President, Reverend J. C. Sams, Florida. Reverend T. C. Huey, Texas led the Convention in singing "Amazing Grace." Romans 2 was read by Rev. E. H. Hill, Okla. Prayer, Rev. R. J. English, Mich. Several selections were rendered by the Convention Choir. The host pastor, Rev. B. O. Byrd was presented to direct the Welcome Program. Greetings to the Convention were as follows: In behalf of the New Hope Baptist Church, Los Angeles, Sis. Hazel G. Nixon; In behalf of the California Baptist Convention, Rev. A. E. Williams; In behalf of the Ministers Union of Southern California; In behalf of the State Of California, The Honorable Governor Goodwin J. Knight of the State of California. The response to the greetings was made by Rev. H. H. Branch, Texas.

President Pettaway made remarks concerning the welcome program. Rev. F. P. Piper led the Convention in singing, Jesus, Thou Art the Sinner's Friend. Rev. J. L. Spears, La., was presented by Rev. Piper. Rev. Spears selected for a text, Galatians 5:14. A noble message was preached and enjoyed by the Convention. An opportunity was given for church membership. The Convention was led in prayer by Rev. Smith. Benediction, Rev. J. L. Spears.

THURSDAY—Morning Session

The Convention was called to order at 9:20 a.m., by vice President J. C. Sams. The Convention was led in a song service by Sister Dewitty. The scripture was read from Colossians 1:15-19 by the Rev. S. W. Jackson, La. Prayer, Rev. C. N. Hall, Ariz. Ring It Out, was sung by Rev. Wesley Grant, N. C. The discussion of the theme was led by Rev. T. T. Bradford, Tex. Registration and enrollment were continued. A discussion was held on personal memberships. Song, Leaning On The Everlasting Arms, was sung. Because of the crowded condition of the Auditorium, the Convention was dismissed by the President to reassemble at 3:30 p.m.

THURSDAY—Afternoon Session

The session was called to order by the President at three-thirty p.m. Remarks were made by the President and a discussion was held on the validity of badges being issued around and in the various departments of the Convention. The discussion was brought to a close when the convention was made that Convention had not been officially organized. Song: Yield Not To Temptation. Prayer, Rev. T. C. Collier, Fla. Song, Jesus, The Light Of The World. Solo, Rev. Garritt Prince. Vice President Sams presented Dr. Pettaway to the Convention for delivery of the President's Annual Message. The President delivered a message full of inspiration, logic and spiritual fervor. Rev. H. W. D. Steward, of S. C., made the motion that Dr. Pettaway be unanimously elected as President of the Convention. The motion was seconded by the Rev. B. O. Byrd, Calif. The motion was amended by the Rev. A. L. Roach, Ohio that Rev. J. C. Sams be elected first Vice President, and Rev. B. O. Byrd as second vice President. The Amendment was unanimously carried. The original was unanimously carried. The motion was put by Rev. J. W. Williams, Mo. Benediction

THURSDAY—Evening Session

The session was called to order by Vice President Sams at eight p.m. A short song service was held. The 113th Psalm was read. The Convention was led in singing by Rev. Wesley Grant, N. C. Selections were rendered by the choir of the Greater First Baptist Church of Los Angeles. Prayer, Rev. N. T. Burks, Texas. Solo, Sis. R. H. Wilson, Fla. Rev. R. H. Wilson, Fla.,

was presented by Rev. Burks to deliver the evening message. He selected for a text, 1 Cor. 1:17-18. A message full of the spirit and power of God was preached and enjoyed by the Convention. An invitation to Church membership was extended by Rev. Burks. Selections were rendered by the Choirs of the Greater First Baptist Church and the Ebenezer Baptist Church of Los Angeles. The special message by Dr. M. C. Allen, Va., was postponed until Friday. Benediction, Rev. R. H. Wilson.

FRIDAY—Morning Session

The session was called to order by Vice President Sams. Song, Near The Cross. Prayer, Reverend A. B. Herrington, Ohio. Song, I'll Be Somewhere. Scripture, 133rd Psalm by Rev. D. S. Dancy, Texas. Song, I'm Going Through. The discussion of the theme was led by Rev. J. W. Adams, Ky. Selection, Have A Little Talk With Jesus. The report of the Benevolent Board was made by Rev. J. W. Williams. The report was adopted on the motion of Rev. W. B. Woods. The report of the B. Y. P. U. Board was made by Rev. W. A. Joshua. The report was adopted. The report of the Evangelical Board was made by Rev. E. H. Branch. The report was adopted on the motion of Rev. O. S. Stevenson. The report of the Home Mission Board was made by Rev. J. H. L. Smith. The report was adopted on the motion of Rev. L. L. Lilliard. The report of the Foreign Mission Board was made by Rev. E. S. Branch. The report was adopted on the motion of Rev. Ira M. Hendon. In adopting the report, the Convention accepted and agreed to the recommendation of the Cor. Secretary that the Foreign Mission Board be incorporated under the authority and direction of the Convention. President Pettaway presented Mr. Albright, Meharry Medical College, Nashville, Tenn. He informed the Convention of the Plans of the College to develop the R. H. Boyd Memorial Foundation in the new Research Center at the College. Remarks by the President. Dismissal by the President.

FRIDAY—Afternoon Session

Walker, Penn., on the Publicity of the Convention. A motion by Rev. R. H. Wilson, Fla., that the resolution be referred by the proper committee was carried. A motion by Rev. J. W. Williams that a Memorial Service be held during the session was carried. It was agreed that the service be held during the time and place period. A motion by Rev. G. A. Long that greetings be sent to the National Baptist Convention, Inc., in Louisville, was carried. Sis. G. L. Prince widow of the late President Prince was presented to the Convention. Song, I Am Thine O Lord. Rev. W. R. Walker, Penn. Presented Rev. E. M. Percetti, Penn., to deliver the morning message. Rev. Percetti used for a text Romans 8:18, and preached a fine sermon. A motion was made by Rev. J. S. Ousley, seconded by Rev. F. M. Young, S. C., was carried that all officers reelected. The Foreign Mission Board made a report through Rev. J. T. Ridley whose motion for adoption was carried. The recommendation of Rev. Ira Hendon that the same officers be elected to the Home Mission Board was carried. A motion by Rev. M. C. Allen, Va., that a committee on revision of Constitution be appointed was carried. Rev. P. S. Wilkinson and that the Convention continue its membership in the Alliance. Dismission by the President.

Branch and adopted on the motion of Rev. L. W. Mingo, Ill. The recommendations of the Educational Board were made and adopted on the motion of Rev. E. H. Branch. The Memorial service for the departed saints of the Convention was conducted by Rev. H. H. Robinson, Fla. Rev. G. A. Long, Mich, extended an invitation to the Convention to hold its next session in the City of Detroit, Mich. The invitation was unanimously accepted. Rev. A. A. Lucas made the treasurer's report and moved that the report be adopted. The motion was carried. The report of the Corresponding secretary was made by Rev. J. D. Thomas, La. The report was adopted. The reports of the Auxiliary bodies were made. The report of the Committee on Claims and Accounts was made and adopted by the Convention with the stipulation that \$100.00 be added to the expense and salary of Dr. Woullard. A motion was carried that the report on designated monies be adopted as read from the report of Dr. Woullard.

Brother President of this great Convention, to my many and tried official leaders of the seventy seven annual session of the National Baptist Convention of America, chairman P. S. Wilkinson, officers, and members of the Educational Board of the National Baptist Convention: Brethren and Sisters, greetings: Truly I feel humble today and feel very deficient and unworthy of the trust you have already imposed upon me, truly and humbly, I have done my best. I want to look in your eyes and talk to you as Christians talk to Christians, over the task the Convention has bid me to do. I want to talk about this business of Christian Education; the Education has always been safe in the hands of the church, it is by this method we have been able to get our church leaders, race leaders and world leaders and education from any other source is not safe, we must support our Christian Col-

leges in this age of integration the Bulwark of our present civilization is our Christian Colleges. our institution must prepare for an integrated society in the future, we will have to compete against members not only of our own race, while we may have disturbances. At the present time integration is on the march and no man can stop it since God almighty has decreed that all men are one. It is quite natural that we should glory in the great expansion of our State Institutions but we must always bear in mind that he who pays the piper will always call the tune and hence we cannot have free and independent thinking in our State Colleges today in the light of what is going on, they depend for their support entirely upon others and in order to get that support they must color their thinking and adjust their ways according to the desires of others.

In view of the present crisis through which we are now passing in Education it is absolutely necessary for us to support our Christian Colleges, because they are the only institutions that are free and unfettered and thus able to lead us out of our present day of chaos in Education, it is our job. Therefore, to support our Christian Colleges because they represent the great citadels of Independence.

Because they are ours, let us be proud of what we have and support our own like men. Some has said that the Negro will spend money for what he wants but will beg for what he needs. Places of amusement are always crowded with Negroes etc. for the future of our Church and for the future of race, we must support our Christian Colleges during these days of stress and turmoil. A crying need of our world today is for Christian Education; men and women who are not only trained but are imbued with the Christian spirit of love and service things that make the Christian religion stand out above the other religions of the world today is the fact that it is an Educational religion, for the master has commanded us to teach them. The teacher who teaches about the rocks should know the rock of ages, the teacher who teaches English which deals with words ought to know the word made flesh. We further believe and affirm that the teachers who teach in these Christian schools should believe in the blessed book for I hear the master saying go ye therefore teach all Nations etc.

We organize a drive for money raising, etc. These things are needful but must not take the place of the gospel. We need to organize a drive for souls. We are materially rich and spiritually poor. What doth it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his soul? Or, what can a man give in exchange for his soul, Jesus said: "I am come that they might have life, and that more abundantly." There is a great spiritual challenge. There used to be a very favorite song our choir sang, "Let's Go Back To Our Father's Praying Ground." There is some truth in those lines.

While we are laboring and investing our gifts in the material; souls of men are dying with out Christ. Let us arise and go back to our Father's Praying Ground.

The spiritual level of our Father's consisted of effective soul saving revivals and protracted meetings, that were not crowded out with the drive for money first and soul-saving afterwards. Church life of yesterday was developed by preaching. They went from place to place preaching the word. From those seeds that were planted, we have the rich spiritual heritage today.

We can and must have greater revivals today; because there are more souls to be saved. The challenge is greater than ever before. This challenge will be met with a united front that will keep the fires of Evangelism burning from church to church the year round Amen.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ORTHODOXY

GRACE IN SALVATION THE IMPUTATION - IMPARTATION

Grace is taken for the free and eternal love and favor of God which is the spring and source of all the benefits which we receive from Him. Romans 11:6. "And if by grace then, it is no more works." 2 Timothy 1:3 "Who hath saved us, and called us with a holy calling, according to His own purpose and grace." The words of salvation imply the ideas of deliverance, safety, preservation, health and soundness. Salvation is the great inclusive word of the Gospel, gathering into itself all the redemptive acts and processes: as justification, redemption, grace, propitiation, imputation, forgiveness, sanctification, and glorification.

Salvation is in three tenses: (1) The believer has been saved from the guilt and penalty of sin, Luke 7:50; 1 Cor. 1:8; 2 Cor. 2:15; Ephesians 2:5, 8; 2 Timothy 1:9 and is safe (2) The believer is being saved from the habit and dominion of sin Romans 6:14; Phil. 1:10; 2:12, 13, 2 Thess. 2:13; Rom. 8:2; Gal. 2:19, 20; 2 Cor. 3:18. (3) The believer is to be saved in the sense of entire conformity to Christ, Rom. 13:11; Hebrew 10:36; 1 Peter 1:5; 1 John 3:2. Salvation is by grace through faith, is a free gift, and wholly without works, Romans 3:27, 28; 4:1-8; 6:23; Ephesians 2:8. The Divine order is: first, salvation, and then works, Ephesians 2:9, 10; Titus 3:5-8.

The free and unmerited love of God is the original mover in our salvation, hath no cause above to exercise or draw it forth, but merely arise from His own will. It was this mercy or love of God that brought forth redemption for mankind. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to die for mankind, John 3:16." And what could His love give more than the life of His Son? The law makes it binding upon anyone who would redeem a slave, that he must be kin or next of kin to the slave, he must be willing to redeem the slave and set him free. The slave is unable to get word to anyone to redeem him, because the cruel master will not permit the slave to communicate with anyone. The redeemer must have the above qualities and with the proper documents, which have been kept posted in a public place, stating the terms of redemption, and pay the redemption price, and then go into the slave pen, and bring the captive slave out and set him free, without charge to the slave, forever. Thus through grace, Christ being our next of kin, having this relationship via the Virgin-birth, and willing and fully able, armed Himself likewise, and came into the slave-pen, and paid all that man-kind owned, and brought him forth to freedom, and did not take a mortgage, but let him go free.

God, who is rich in mercy, for His great love wherewith He loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us (made us alive) together with Christ, (for by grace are ye saved); and hath raised us up together, and made us to sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus: that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness towards us through Christ Jesus. For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God. Eph. 2:4-8. By this process of grace we became sons of God, or children of God, having been adopted into the family of God, thereby making us heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ. There is no process of law by which this adoption can be undone. Once a son always a son. There is a new creation, and by no process can that which is created be un-created, (there is no falling away from this creative act of God, no falling away from this act of Grace.

Grace is (taken for) the free imputation of Christ's righteousness, by the merit thereof true believers become righteous in the sight of God, Rom. 5:20 "Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound." Grace is (taken for) the work of the Spirit, renewing the soul after the image of God, and continually guiding and strengthening the believer to obey His will, to resist and mortify sin, and to overthrow Roman 6:14; 2 Corinthians 12:8. Grace is (taken for) the excellent and blessed state of reconciliation, friendship and favor with God, which God graciously bestows upon His people, Roman 5:2. Grace is (taken for) the free love, favour and harmony of Christ, 2 Cor. 13:14. Grace is (taken for) the doctrine of the Gospel which proceeds

from the grace of God, and wherewith (wherein) His grace is afforded and bestowed upon all penitent believers, 1 Peter 5:12 Grace is (taken for) a liberal and charitable disposition wrought in the heart, by the grace of God, 2 Cor. 8:7. Grace is (taken for) spiritual instruction and edification, Ephesians 4:29, that it may be the means of some spiritual advantage to the believers. Grace, is (taken for) the office of Apostleship which was given of grace, together with ability and other qualifications necessary for the faithful discharge of that office, Romans 15:15. Grace is (taken for) the free and undeserved love and favour of God, and a life in the soul. This the Apostle Paul wishes to be continued with an increased interest, Rom. 1:7. Grace is (taken for) patience and faith, and other graces that enable the believers to bear and stand up under suffering, 2 Peter 3:18; Phil. 1:7. Grace is (taken for) eternal life, and final salvation, which God will graciously bestow upon His people at the appearing of Christ, at the rapture, 1 Peter 1:13. Grace is (taken for) something acceptable, beautiful, and graceful, Prov. 4:9.

Through grace, God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. God's Son came into the world, and though the world came into existence through Him, the world did not recognize Him. He came to His home, and His own family did not welcome Him. But to all who did receive Him, and believe in Him, He gave the right to become children of God, owing their birth not to nature, nor to any human or physical impulse, but to God. And from God's abundance of grace, we have all had a share, and received blessing after blessing. For it is by grace that the believer has been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves. It is God's gift, and not on the grounds of merit, so that it may be impossible for anyone to boast. To all who were dead in trespasses and sins, even every believer who was dead in sins, hath He quickened, and imputed His grace for our sin and unworthiness, and this imputation of His grace He hath ascribed to us, the righteousness of God, through Christ, having created us in Christ Jesus unto good works, and hath imparted unto us grace to perform the good works. Grace imputed is without repentance. It will never be taken away from the believer, but we may fall from grace imparted, and lose our share of His blessing in our failure to work the works of Him that called us with a holy calling. All God's grace is amazing, in that love prompted Him to raise us alive from the dead, imputing grace for our shame, and imparting grace for our service. So, then, whatever the endowment God hath given should be used in service one to another like good dispensers of God's varied mercy. If one preaches, let him do it as one who utters the word of God; if one does some other service, let him do it with strength which God supplies, so that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ, for to Him belong the glory and dominion forever and ever.

Grace is so amazing and sweet. With John Newton we begin forth and sing:

"Amazing Grace! how sweet the sound, That saved a wretch like me,
I once was lost, but now am found, was blind but now I see.

"Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved;
How precious did that grace appear, The hour I first believed!

Through many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come;
'Tis grace that brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.

When we've been there ten thousand years, Bright shining as the sun,
We've no less days to sing God's praise, Than when we first begun.

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GOD'S IMAGE IN MAN. WHAT IS IT?

Genesis 1:26 and God said let us make man in our own image. After our likeness: and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. Verse 27 So God created man in His own image, in the image of God created He him. Gen. 2:7 And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul.

Anthropology is the doctrine of man. There are many different definitions of man, some comical, some tragic. In this study of Anthropology we shall go to the true source—the scriptures. Man has always wanted to know who he is, where he came from, and where he is going. God's Holy Word gives the only complete account. The Bible declares that man is a separate creation of God and that the animals were created at a different time, completely apart from man.

BODY

His body was made from the earth. This was the first part of man that was formed. Gen. 2:7. The body is set forth in Scripture as the house of the inner man. "How much less in them that dwell in houses of clay, whose foundation is the dust, which are crushed before the moth? Job 4:19". The process by which God made man is not known; we leave that up to God. Men give their opinions and speculations but they remain as such. The word "dust" does not mean clay or old dirty dirt, but the finest materials of earth. Modern chemical analysis detects in the body the same elements that are in the earth beneath man's feet; such elements as sodium, carbon, iron etc.

The body is sustained by that which grows out of the earth. It is man's body and not his spirit that is sustained. Famine in our modern day has proved that, if vegetation is taken away, life is taken away. Kill vegetation and you kill man. At death corruption sets in, and man's body soon returns unto the dust from which it was formed. Gen. 3:19 In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, till thou return unto the ground, for out of it wast thou taken for dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return.

THE SOUL

Gen. 2:7 The Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living soul. Gen. 2:7 Also 1 Cor. 15:45 And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last Adam was made

a quickening spirit. The soul is the seat of the emotions and appetites plants, animals and man have bodies; only animals and man have a soul. Job 12:10, In whose hand is the soul of everything living, and the breath of all man kind. The soul is that conscious life which is in man and animal. Plants have life but it is unconscious life. There is a difference between the souls of men and the souls of animals. The soul of the animal dies with the animal, but man's soul never dies, for he was made a "living soul"—a soul that would never die.

SPIRIT

Here is where man differs from all creatures. In Heb. 12:9 God is said to be "Father of Spirits." This does not mean the Father of Angels, but of the Spirit of men made perfect. God is never said to be the Father of souls. James 2:26 As the body without the Spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also. When a body dies the soul departs with the spirit of man. The soul and spirit can be separated. Hebrews 4:12. No Scriptural proof that they are ever separated. The Spirit of man is the seat of his intelligence. 1 Cor. 2:11. Animals do not possess intelligence. Ps. 32:9.

MAN'S CONDITION BEFORE THE FALL

1. Knowledge. He had immediate knowledge—intuitive knowledge. He was not an adult infant. Named all animals that came from the hand of God. It took an intelligent man to do that.
2. His Fellowship. He was able to commune with God. God told him to eat of fruit of trees one exception.
3. His home. Located in a garden. Eden a plain or plateau.
4. Companion. God made a help meet.—Counter part or "fit for." Eve was fit for Adam. Why do you suppose God did not make woman from the dust? He did not want to have two origins of man. God can make a human being in four ways: (a) by conception (b) without the aid of a woman, as Eve, (c) without a man or woman, as Adam (d) without a man by a woman as Christ.
5. His work. Gen. 1:26 God Blessed them, and God said unto them. Be fruitful, and multiply and replenish the earth, and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth. Put man in a garden to dress it and keep it. Gen. 2:15 Word "Keep" is best translated "guard". Against whom was Adam to guard the garden? Against wild animals, no, there were none. Against wild man? Adam was the only man. He was put on his guard against the possible appearance of the Devil. Whenever man is placed in a position of trust God always gives ample warning.

HIS RESPONSIBILITY

- (a) To replenish the earth with a new order—man. First Adam a living soul. Eve is the mother of all human beings. Gen. 3:20 Adam called his wife's name Eve, because she was the mother of all living.
- (b) To abstain from eating of the fruit. This fruit was of the tree of the knowledge of Good and Evil. They were allowed to eat freely, as there was plenty. There was only one tree forbidden them. We do not know what kind of fruit it was. Nothing was wrong with the fruit, there was just God's prohibition behind it. God wanted Adam

and Eve to have knowledge, but He did not want them to get it by disobedience. Remember Adam had been placed on his guard, he had been warned of the enemy. Satan did not come in unawares. This being true why did God allow Adam and Eve to be subjected to the attack of the Devil? Testing always comes before a blessing. Man always has to be tried before he is promoted.

Why the Fall came

- 1) Adam doubted God's Love.

In doubting God love, he denied God's goodness, and acted apart from God and became a sinner. Isa. 55:4 and Prov. 14:12—There is a way which seemeth right unto a man but the end thereof are the ways of death.

- 2) Adam Doubted God's Word.

In doubting God's Word he denied His Truth; denying His truth, he acted in spite of God and became a criminal. 1 John 3:4 Who ever committeth sin transgresseth also the law; for sin is the transgression of the law.

- 3) Adam Doubted God's Authority.

In doubting God's authority he denied God's Deity; denying His deity he became contrary to God. Thus he became God's enemy and rebel in God's universe. Rom. 8:7-8. The carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God.

The testing was given to see if man would remain true to God. He failed, because he wanted to be a god. The Devil—the originator of sin in this world fell (Isa. 14) because he wanted to be like the Most High God.

This brought about his downfall, so he planted the same seed of false ambition in Adam and Eve to see if it would bring about their downfall and it did.

SONSHIP

Man, God's companion, Image and Likeness finds himself in a deplorable condition, a sinner, a criminal and a rebel and enemy in God's Universe. What must he do? What can he do? The image must be restored if there is to be a reconciliation. "Image," suggests a resemblance based on a fixed content or structure; it suggests something already possessed rather than a future achievement; hence the N.T. use of sonship seems a more adequate expression of man's nature. Sonship suggests growth and points to the future for its complete realization.

In a physical or metaphysical sense sonship might, to be sure, be regarded as involved in man's creation. The very fact that man was created by God might be regarded as constituting him a Son of God. The Divine creatorship in other words might be interested as the equivalent of the Divine Fatherhood. God as Creator is Father of all men, and all men are His Sons by virtue of the Divine origin. But in the N.T. sonship is a spiritual attainment. It is not a native endowment. We are not born Sons of God, we are reborn such. The new birth introduces us to Divine Sonship. We had at the outset the capacity for sonship, otherwise we could not have attained to it. But we actually become sons of God by becoming new creatures. This is not only the case of an individual but of the race. The first Adam was of the flesh "psychic", in nature, an animate being. The second or last

Adam was from heaven not a mere soul or animate being but a life giving Spirit. 1 Cor. 15:45.

True Divine sonship or restoration of the defaced image was first realized in Christ and later in us through Him. He inaugurated a new race of men and thus prepared the way for that revelation of the Son of God for which the whole creation had been groaning and travelling in pain. Roman 8:19-22. Such is the N.T. and Pauline teaching. Gal. 3:26, 4:1-7. Romans 8:14-17. I John 3:1-8. Luke 20:35 According to the true nature of man is to be found not in Adam, but in Christ, not in what man originally was, but what he is destined to become.

In so far as the figure of sonship thus identifies the ideal human life with Christ and implies that it consists in a spiritual achievement rather than a passive inheritance it is a more satisfactory figure than that of a Divine Image. It has also the further advantage of suggesting a closer and more intimate relation to God. A son may be like his father, but he is more than that. He shares in the father's nature, is of the same substance with him and is the special object of his affection. In N.T. usage he is distinguished from the servant and the minor. Gal. 4:7. They represent a lower and less privileged status than they are in bondage. He on the other hand has attained freedom. He is an heir; and so it is said of us as sons of God, that we are heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ. Rom. 8:17. Sonship thus expresses the highest and most privileged relation to God. It takes up into itself all that is involved in the idea of man's being made in the image of God and adds to it a new sense of moral freedom of personal timacy and of spiritual attainment.

SIN

Some may say that the "Fall of Man" is an old Babylonian fable, but we have only to look upon man and see him toil for his bread, weakened by disease, and die in his misery to realize that something is radically wrong. It is evident to the most superficial that something is basically wrong. Man's life at the best is stressed by storm, conflict embittered by disappointment and sorrow, and obscured by apparently ended by disease and death. Something is wrong. But losing their natural fear and dread of the superior human and abnormal with rage become formidable enemies of life to both man and beast. The ground cursed and poisoned produces weeds and thorns and thistles, unfit for use, stubborn of destruction and hideous to see, where only food and clothing and beauty should grow. My brethren something is wrong. Yea the whole creation groaning and travelling in pain has lost its equilibrium. And here, as whenever it speaks, the voice of the Bible is authoritative and supreme because it is the highest and the best and the most satisfactory account for this universal distress by one little word of three letters S-I-N. Sin. Everything that God made was "very good". But the Lord made man bad, cursed the soil, poisoned the atmosphere, filled the environment of life with disease and death and disturbed the whole creation so that only God is good now. Satan as busy now as he ever was and with many other fallen spirits under him and wicked men following after him, he keeps his forced organized to cripple progress, defeat justice, curse the people, overthrow law and dethrone God. He is confused, and humiliated and defeated and mortally wounded by the Lord Jesus Christ, the first man whose supremacy he was expelled to acknowledge, and he-the devil is in the last stage of power.

THE SPECIFIC CURE FOR THE DISEASE OF SIN

Sin is leprosy of the soul, the universal disease. When this local disorder developed in heaven the infected angels were cast down to earth with their chief, the Devil and their presence brought woe to the whole world. Revelation 12:7-12. The race was contaminated in its infancy and the atmosphere of life was filled with the miasma of this awful disease. Animals were slain and offered by divine command until Jesus came and laid down His own life that the sinner might be healed and live. John 10:18. But even with this absolute remedy, this perfect specific for guilt none can be cured unless they take the medicine and the kind of medicine to take which must be such as to contract the poison of the infection, is determined by the nature of the disease. Man contracted sin by hearing and believing and obeying a lie preached by the Devil. Gen. 3:1-8, the father of lies John 8:44, himself a living lie; and the only hope for the sinner is to undo this monumental mistake and expel this virus out of his soul by hearing and believing and obeying the truth revealed in Jesus Christ, Himself the Living Truth, proclaimed by His Apostles written in His testament and preached the word around by His messengers.

THE GOSPEL

It was inevitable that the love of God should devise a plan to protect man from the Devil and create an adequate remedy for sin that would save the soul from death, purify the atmosphere and make the environment of life clean and perfect. But this could be done only if man understood in some degree the purpose of the Lord and cooperated with him. Hence, years and centuries and millenniums of education and training were unavoidable. Sin has the germ of certain death in it. It sears the conscience, intoxicates the mind and inflates the heart. And only after repeated failure in his own way has man been willing to walk in the way of Jehovah. Only the great Physician has the wisdom and the skill and the sympathy to diagnose the human heart and prescribe a remedy for sin, and He performed this delicate operation with such consummate genius and Divine power that all are saved who follow the directions of His glorious gospel. The gospel is no new thing. It has existed from all eternity. I Peter 1:17-21. God laid the foundation of the world and did every subsequent thing with the gospel in view. It seems that evil began before the creation of man. And perhaps the purpose of Jehovah in bringing the earth into existence was to furnish a theater in which the problem of sin should be worked out and settled forever for the benefit of the whole universe. In any case the Devil was cast down to earth, as we have already seen and the Lord foreseeing that man would fall and go down forever without help, made man in His own image so that in due time, He might make Himself in the image of man and save him from eternal death. Yea the gospel is "Good News". There is no better news for a sick man than to tell him there is a remedy for his disease. Man is smitten with the loathsome fatal malady-sin; the gospel is the specific cure. Sin has effected the image, the gospel can restore it. It never fails to cure. Death has reigned supreme over every past generation, and it stares us in the face. But the Gospel makes the dead, equal with the living. I Thess. 4:13-18. Death has torn our beloved from us, but the gospel has bound up our hearts in hope. I would give all I have and lay down my life for my Sister's

fellowship, father's benediction, the touch of mother's hand, the music of her voice, the smile of her recognition, the communion of the redeemed, and the glory of the Lord. The gospel says I shall have the desire of my heart. Oh blessed evangel! Speed on the way to save every creature, make the nations rejoice, and fill the earth with His praise.

It works now, the restore damage manifested itself yesterday. Things were dark for a while yesterday.

GOD'S IMAGE IN MAN

ORTHODOXY (Christian Theology) UNION WITH CHRIST

Grace In Salvation (Imputation--Impartation)

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UNION WITH CHRIST

The Scriptures declare that, through the operation of God, there is constituted a union of the soul with Christ different in kind from God's natural and providential dealings with all spirits, as well as from all unions of mere association or sympathy, moral likeness, or moral influence. - a union of life, in which the human spirit, while then most possessing its own individuality and personal distinctness, is interpreted and energized by the Spirit of Christ, is made inscrutably but indissolubly one with him, and so becomes a member and partaker of that regenerated, believing, and justified humanity of which he is the head. Union with Christ is not union with a system of doctrine, nor with external religious influences, nor with an organized Church, nor with an ideal man. - but rather, with a personal, risen, living, omnipresent Lord. This fact is the central truth of all Christian Theology and is presented to impress that vast majority of Christians that frequently think of Christ as a Saviour outside of them rather than a Saviour who dwells within.

I. Scripture Representations of this Union.

A-The Bible illustrates our Union with Christ in figures such as

(a) The union of a building and its foundation. Eph. 2:20-22-"Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the chief cornerstone; in whom each several building is fitted together, groweth into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom ye are also builded together for a habitation of God in the Spirit." Col 2:7 "builded up in him." (i. e. we are grounded in Christ as our foundation). 1 Peter 2:4-5 "Unto whom coming, a living stone, rejected indeed of men, but with God elect, precious, ye also, as living stones, are built up a spiritual house. (i. e. Each living stone in the Christian temple is kept in proper relation to every other, and is made to do its part in furnishing a habitation for God, only by being built upon and permanently connected with Christ, the Chief Cornerstone.

(B) The figure from the union between husband and wife. Rom.

7:4 "Ye also were made dead to the law through the body of Christ; that ye should be joined to another, even to him who was raised from the dead, that we might bring forth fruit unto God." Here union with Christ is illustrated by the indissoluble bond that connects husband and wife, and makes them legally and organically one. Eph. 5:31-32. "For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife; and the two shall become one flesh. This mystery is great; but I speak in regard of Christ and of the Church. "Departure from God is spiritual adultery, the Song of Solomon is an allegorical poem describing under figure of marriage, the union between Jehovah and his people: Paul only adopts the old Testament figure, and applies it more precisely to the union of God with the Church in Jesus Christ.

(c) From the union between the vine and its branches.

John 15:1-10 "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same beareth much fruit, for apart from me, ye can do nothing." As God's natural life is in the vine that it may give life to its natural branches, so God's spiritual life is in the vine, Christ, that he may give life to his spiritual branches. The roots of this new vine are planted in heaven, not on earth, and into it the half-withered branches of the old humanity are to be grafted, that they might have life divine. The branch is not something outside, but it is rather a part of the vine and this union with Christ is consistent with individuality for the grafted branch brings forth fruit after its kind being modified by the vine into which it is grafted. This union brings intimacy, likeness of nature, continuous impartation of life, and fruit.

(d) From the union between the members and head of the body.

1 Cor. 6:15-19. "Know ye not that your bodies are members of Christ? Know ye not that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you, which ye have from God? 1 Cor. 12:12. "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all members of the body being many, are one body; so also is Christ." Here Christ is identified with the Church of which he is the head. Eph. 1:22-23. "He put all things in subjection under his feet and gave him to be head over all things to the Church, which is his body, the fulness of him that filleth all in all." Here we see that as the members of the human body are united to the head, the source of their activity and the power that controls their movements, so all believers are members of an invisible body whose head is Christ. (Would we tie a string around the finger to keep far it its own blood? No-for all the blood of the body is needed to nourish one finger - So Christ is head over all things to the Church - The Church is the fulness of Christ and we grow up in all things into him who is the head-even Christ-from whom all the body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth. . . maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love.

(e) From the union of the race with the source of its life in Adam

As the whole race is one with the first man Adam, in whom it all and from whom it has derived a corrupted and guilty nature, so the whole race of believers constitutes a new and restored humanity, whose justified and purified nature is derived from Christ, the second Adam. In the original creation, man is first created and then woman is viewed in and formed out of him--So it is with Christ and the church. "We are members of Christ's body because in Christ we have the principle of our origin; from him our life arose, just as

the life of Eve was derived from Adam - - The Church is Christ's helpmeet formed out of Christ in his deep sleep of death-as Eve out of Adam-Just as Eve was in union with Adam to bring forth physical seed-So the Church is in union with Christ to bring forth spiritual seed, because Christ is the source of all spiritual life for his people and is called by Isaiah-"The Everlasting Father" and it is said that he shall see his seed-Isaiah 8:6; 53:10.

B-Direct Statements on our Union with Christ

(a) The believer is said to be in Christ. Rom. 8:1 "There is therefore now no condemnation to them that are in Christ Jesus." 2 Cor. 5:12-"If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature" Eph. 1:4-"He choose us in him before the foundation of the world" Eph. 2:13 "Now in Christ Jesus, ye that were once far off are made nigh in the blood of Christ" Even our union with Christ is symbolized in baptism as the act teaches that we are baptized into Christ, Gal. 3:27. The phrase, in Christ, always means, in union with Christ and is the very key to Paul's epistles and to the whole New Testament.

(b) Christ is said to be in the believer. Rom. 8:9-"Ye are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you. But if any man hath not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his." That this Spirit of Christ is Christ himself is shown in verse 10 - "And if Christ be in you, the body is dead because of sin; but the spirit is life because of righteousness." Gal. 2:20-"I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I that live, but Christ liveth in me." Here Christ is said to be in the believer, and so to live his life within the believer that the latter can point to this as the dominating fact of his experience, it is not so much he that lives, as it is Christ that lives in him.

(c) The Father and the Son dwell in the believer. John 14:23-"If a man love me, he will keep my Word; and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him. The Father and the Son dwell in the believer; for where the Son is, there always the Father must be also.

(d) All believers are one in Christ. John 17:21-25. "That they may all be one; even as thou, Father art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be in us; that the world may believe that thou didst send me. And the glory which thou hast given me, I have given unto them; that they may be one, even as we are one; I in them, and thou in me, that they may be perfected into one." Thus all believers are one in Christ to whom they are severally and collectively united, as Christ himself is one with God.

II. The Nature of this Union.

Union with Christ has not only to do with a fact of life, but with a unique relation between the finite and infinite. Our descriptions must therefore be inadequate for in many respects we know what this union is not and yet in certain respects we can positively state what it is.

A. Negatively - It is not:

(a) A merely natural union, like that of God with all human spirits, - as held by rationalists.

(b) It is not a mere moral union, or union of love and sympathy, like that of teacher and scholar or friend and friend as held by Socinians and Arminians.

(c) It is not a union of essence, which destroys the distinct per-

sonality and subsistence of either Christ or the human spirit, as held by many of the mystics.

(d) It is not a union mediated and conditioned by participation of Church sacraments, - as held by Romanists, Lutherans, and High - Church Episcopalians.

B. Positively. It is:

(a) An organic union-one in which we become members of Christ and partakers of his humanity. The body is an organism-thus each member of Christ's body lives for him who is the head, and Christ the head equally lives for his members.

(b) It is a vital union-one in which Christ's life becomes the dominating principle within us. Christ does not work on us from without, as one separated from us, but from within, as the very heart from which all spiritual life flows. Gal. 2:20. "It is no longer I that live, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh, I live in faith, the faith which is in the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me. Christ's life is not corrupted by the corruption of his members any more than the ray of light is defiled by that with which it comes in contact. We may be unconscious of this union with Christ, as we often are of the circulation of the blood-yet it is the very source and condition of our life.

(c) It is a spiritual Union-That is, a union whose source and author is the Holy Spirit. By a spiritual union, we mean a union not of body but of spirit-a union therefore which only the Holy Spirit originates and maintains.

(d) It is an indissoluble union, that is, a union which, consistently with Christ's promise and grace can never be dissolved, it endures forever. Matt. 28:20-"Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world" once formed the union is indissoluble, though all other ties be broken, the union with Christ holds-It is this and this only which constitutes a Christian and makes possible a Christian Church.

III. Consequences of this Union as respects the Believer.

We understand that Christ's union with humanity, at the incarnation, involved him in all the legal liabilities of the race and enabled him so to assume the penalty of its sin so as to make for all men a full satisfaction to the divine justice, and to remove all external obstacles to man's return to God. An internal obstacle, however still remains-the evil affections and will, and the consequent guilt of the individual soul. This last obstacle also Christ removes, in the case of all his people, by uniting himself to them in a closer and more perfect way than that in which he is united to humanity at large. As Christ's union with the race secures the objective reconciliation of the race to God, so Christ's union with the believers secures the subjective reconciliation of believers to God.

A. The Consequences of Union with Christ may be summarily stated as follows:

(a) This union with Christ involves a change in the dominant affection of the soul. Christ's entrance into the soul makes it a new creature, in the sense that the ruling disposition, which before was sinful, now becomes holy. This change we call Regeneration.

(b) Union with Christ involves a new exercise of the soul's powers in repentance and faith; faith, then, is the act of the soul by which under the operation of God, Christ is received. This exercise of the soul's powers we call conversion. This is the obverse or human side of regeneration.

(c) This Union with Christ gives to the believer the legal standing and rights of Christ. As Christ's union with the race involves atonement so the believer's union with Christ involves justification. The believer is entitled to take for his own all that Christ is, and all that Christ has done; and this because he has within him that new life of humanity which suffered in Christ's death and rose from the grave in Christ's resurrection. Union makes the believer virtually one person with the Redeemer and in Christ he becomes prophet, priest and king. Acts 13:38; Rom. 8:7-8; 7:4; 8:1, 17; 1 Cor. 6:11.

(d) This Union with Christ secures to the believer the continuous transforming, assimilating power of Christ's life. First, for the soul; secondly, for the body, consecrating it in the present, and in the future raising it up in the likeness of Christ's glorified body. This continuous influence in the present life is called Sanctification—the human side or aspect of which Perseverance. John 1:18; Rom. 8:16; 1 Cor. 15:45 Phil. 2:5.

(e) This Union with Christ brings about a fellowship of Christ with the believer. Christ takes part in all the labors, temptations and sufferings of his people; a fellowship of the believer with Christ so that Christ's whole experience on earth is in some measure reproduced in him; a fellowship of all believers with one another, furnishing a basis for the spiritual unity of Christians on earth, and for the eternal communion of heaven. Phil. 4:13; Heb. 4:15; Isaiah 63:9; Heb. 2:18.

Scripture testimony of our Union with Christ shows that it is perfect and eternal. For:

1. We are crucified together with Christ. Gal. 2:20.
2. We have died together with Christ. Col. 2:20.
3. We were buried together with Christ. Rom. 6:4.
4. We are quickened together with Christ. Eph. 2:5.
5. We are raised together with Christ. Col. 3:1.
6. We are sufferers together with Christ. Rom. 8:17.
7. We will be glorified together with Christ. Rom. 8:17.

This Union with Christ results in common sonship, relation to God, Character, influence, and destiny.

1 John 3:2, "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is."

COMMISSION ON SOCIAL JUSTICE:

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

The Members of your Committee Offer The Following Recommendations:

1. We appeal to the National Baptist Convention to encourage the appointment of Commissions on Social Justice in our State Conventions that will work with the National Commission on Social Justice in order that we might bring about more unity on the National level.
2. We recommend that the Commission on Social Justice of the National Baptist Convention of America be authorized to hold Regional Institutes designed to enlighten and to inspire the membership of the National Baptist Convention in Christian Social Action.
3. We recommend that the Commission on Social Justice be authorized to recommend materials that might be used for Training in Social Action in the local churches of the National Baptist Convention.
4. We recommend a campaign designed to achieve a 10% increase in qualified voters in those areas served by the Churches of the National Baptist Convention of America.
5. We recommend that the months of November through January be set aside for the Campaign as well as Training Programs in the local Churches of the National Baptist Convention.
6. We recommend cooperation with those organizations whose objectives and methods are consistent with the teachings of Christ and

who recognize his teachings as the supreme guide for faith and conduct.

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THE 1956-1957 REPORT OF THE SECRETARY AND TREASURER OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

To the Member of the National Baptist Publishing Board,
Incorporated Under the Laws of the State of Tennessee
Brother Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am profoundly grateful to a kind, loving, Heavenly Father for His manifold blessings, and for the privilege of once again addressing you, my friends, to make to you a report and to give an account of another year's work as secretary of your Board, the National Baptist Publishing Board.

Since last I reported to you we have been deprived of the Chairman of our Board, in the person of Rev. J. B. Ridley, who was called from labor to reward by our Heavenly Father several months ago. At the meeting of the Board in June, Rev. S. M. Simpson, pastor of the Greater St. John Baptist Church, Nashville, was elected by the Board to succeed the late Rev. Ridley. The members of the Board cordially welcomed the Rev. Mr. Simpson as Chairman of the Board, and he has cheerfully assumed the responsibilities of this position.

While I am preparing this Report, it will be read to you by my nephew, Rev. T. B. Boyd, Jr., the Assistant Secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board, who is assuming many of the responsibilities of the National Baptist Publishing Board's plant, and is doing a fine job in the mechanical department as well as in the executive department of the Publishing Board.

I ask your continued prayers in his behalf in order that he may become cognizant of the responsibilities resting upon his shoulder, and may acquit himself in a genteel, Christian-like manner on all occasions.

While many of my activities have been curtailed, I have had the whole-hearted support of the entire personnel of the National Baptist Publishing Board, from the Executive Secretary, Miss S. B. Wilson, down to the janitor of the building.

BOARD'S PERSONNEL

I have stated from time to time that the personnel of the National Baptist Publishing Board consists of the finest group of Christians we have ever known. They are all hard-working, conscientious Christian men and women who are dedicating themselves to the service of the Master. They are: Rev. S. H. Simpson, Chairman, pastor of the Greater St. John Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn.; Rev. E. M. Elmore, pastor of Bates Memorial Baptist Church, Louisville, Ky.; Rev. J. W. Williams, pastor of St. Stephen Baptist Church, Kansas City, Mo.; Rev. A. A. Lucas, pastor of Good Hope Baptist Church, Houston, Texas; Rev. Robert Rowe, pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church, Austin, Texas; Rev. N. S. Jones, pastor Ebenezer Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn.; Miss S. B. Wilson, executive secretary and Rev. T. B. Boyd, Jr., assistant secretary.

Rev. Mr. Jones, who is a new member added to the Publishing Board, has for several years been one of our editorial secretaries, and has a working knowledge of the Institution, and we felt that adding him to the Board members not only strengthened our Board personnel, but added another working active Board member.

KEEPING ABREAST WITH THE TIMES

Because the National Baptist Publishing Board has always wanted to keep abreast with the times, and give to the Denomination the best in literature, information and inspiration, we have maintained membership in sectional and national organizations. The cost of maintaining such memberships has been oftentimes expensive, but we have felt that nothing is too expensive for the National Baptist Publishing Board, if it would enable your Board to better serve your needs, thus we have kept our membership in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States Of America; in the Protestant Church-owned Publishers Association and in other organizations too numerous to mention.

Wherever meetings of these various organizations were held, we have sent representatives who would bring back to us the information that would enable us to keep abreast with the trend of the times. We feel that it is very necessary

to know what other organizations, state and national are doing in a religious way.

RISING COSTS OF PRODUCTION

All of us are aware of the fact that the cost of living, as well as the cost of producing anything, is constantly advancing. One of the big problems confronting a religious Publishing Board such as ours, is the steady rise in the cost of material necessary to produce the literature, books, publications, etc., that must be used to supply the demands of the public. Paper, ink, postage, and almost every commodity used in the production of literature has steadily gone upward. For the last several years we have been forced to increase the price of various publications in order to compete with other publishers of similar periodicals. We have only raised the price on these articles when it was absolutely necessary, for the continuance of the publication.

YOUR COOPERATION SOLICITED

The National Baptist Publishing Board must depend upon you, our friends, for the support it gets. Because of your interest in the work of the denomination we feel free to call upon you to aid us in solving some of the problems that face us daily. We would like to solicit your help in passing the information on to your church, your school and your state organizations.

More and more the demand is made upon us to sell literature on credit. We try in these instances, to comply with these requests, but many of the schools take advantage of us because we are not where we can see them face to face and collect the money for these credit accounts that we have allowed them to open. Therefore, it is necessary for us to write innumerable letters oftentimes before we can collect the money that is owing us. We must pay for the paper, the ink and other supplies necessary to print the literature, and wait on our customers to pay us.

We do not want to discontinue extending credit to these customers, but something will have to be done to see that these accounts are paid. Therefore, we are appealing to you, the ministers of these churches, the workers in these churches, and in many instances, the senders of the orders.

asking that you see to it that when we extend credit to your school or to some school that you know of, when a statement is sent for the amount due, that it is paid.

We have always had trouble with churches, organizations and schools of various sizes, sending us checks which are oftentimes turned down at the bank, and they remain on our hands unpaid. We are also faced with churches asking for C.O.D. shipments of literature and book. While we ship orders C.O.D., it only increases the cost of the order greatly to serve you in this manner, and yet we try to serve our customers; but at the same time we want to save them as much as possible from making their accounts burdensome to them and to us. Many times business firms will not accept personal checks unless they are certified. We cannot resort to this, because we are religious publishers, and we believe every person to be honest, sincere and fair and we believe every request that is made of us for credit will be taken care of. However, we find ourselves with many accounts unpaid, and we have had to charge off and lose hundreds of thousands of dollars because our friends, the Baptist churches, would not keep faith with us and pay their obligation made with us.

THE CONTINUATION OF BOYD MEMORIAL MONTH

The National Baptist Publishing Board hopes always to keep in the minds of the denominational leaders and followers, the work done by the late R. H. Boyd, the founder of the National Baptist Publishing Board; therefore, we hope the schools of the denomination will continue to co-operate with us in having some type of Boyd Memorial Exercise or Program in the month of March to keep in the minds of the children who are coming along many years after the death of Dr. R. H. Boyd, the great work started by him, and continued by the present set up of the Board.

OUR APPRECIATION

We, the National Baptist Publishing Board, wish to express to each of you present, and to all who have in any way contributed toward the support of the Board this year, our sincere thanks for the loyal support, and to assure you

that your Board will make every effort to serve you in every possible way during this next fiscal year.

We ask an interest in your prayers for health and strength to continue the job of secretary of your Board. We ask your prayers not only for the personnel of the Board, but for the employees of the Publishing Board, that they may be imbued with the Spirit of Christ, and a desire to serve well in the capacity in which they work from day to day. We assure you that we will make every effort to supply all of your demands made of us.

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

Cleveland, Ohio, June 5, 1937

The curtain was lifted here by the citizens and members of the Local Committee of Cleveland, on the opening of the fifty-third annual session of the Sunday School Congress, in the Shiloh Baptist Church, of which Rev. E. Henderson Jarmon, D. D., is the pastor.

A parade was the first signal that this Summer School of Methods was being held in this city. It was formed at 8:00 o'clock, and was participated in by the St. John Baptist Church Band of Houston, Texas; the Metropolitan Baptist Church Band of Chicago, Ill.; the Sunday School Congress Band, Nashville, Tenn. The Ebenezer Baptist Church Band of Chicago, Ill.; the New Salem Baptist Church Band of Birmingham, Ala.; The Henry Allen Boyd Band of Houston, Texas; the St. John Baptist Church Band of Corpus Christi, Texas The Drum and Bugle Corps and Majorettes from the St. Stephen Baptist Church, Kansas City, Mo.; The Cadet Patrol from the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church of Houston, Texas.

The parade was spectacular, in that the participants in the Bands not only wore their beautiful uniforms, but they rendered religious airs such as "Onward, Christian Soldiers," "Hail The Baptist Congress," "On, On, Metoka and Galedas," together with march music for the occasion.

REPORT OF THE HISTORIAN

Los Angeles, California
September 4, 1957

Brother President, Officers and members of the National Baptist Brotherhood Union, here assembled, I hereby submit for your consideration, my report for the year 1956-57.

Since last we assembled in Richmond, Virginia in September, 1956 there have been many changes made and decisions rendered affecting our lives and economic stability in this country and throughout the world. A great deal of progress has been made in the various economic fields of endeavor, thereby benefitting our physical lives. Great men of nobility and scholars of social and political phases of life have met throughout the world to offer and receive suggestions in order to strengthen and stabilize countries throughout the world.

As Baptist Laymen, men whose hearts, God has touched, we have but to look about us and see that great works have been wrought by this body of consecrated men during the past year. One of the most glaring achievements has been the monthly publication of the "VOICE" which has served as a media through which men of our Convention have been able to express themselves with what talent God has given them. The Voice has served well, our Convention in publishing the feats and accomplishments

of laymen throughout this nation and also as a stimulus for greater service to God, His Church and to our fellow-man.

We should not be so optimistic as to believe that our fondest dreams and desires for this body have been achieved or accomplished. There have been times, no doubt, when the cooperation and support received have bordered on the planes of discouragement and mental exhaustion but we should not and must not allow ourselves to shut our eyes to the painful truth and listen to the song of the pessimist until we are transformed into doubters and dissenters, for "they that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength."

An examination of records of enrollment in our last session, as recorded in our Manual reveals that there was a slight decrease in numbers of personal, Union, City-wide and District Enrollments as compared to the same enrollments of the previous year's session in Chicago. We do not proclaim knowledge as to the above-mentioned decline but we feel that in spite of same there has been and is a greater manifestation of interest throughout the land as the duties and responsibilities of the laity are being imbedded in the hearts of men. We realize that more might have been accomplished with greater participation on the part of our members but we are also cognizant of the fact that great numbers are not essential to great success for we find in Matthew 18:20 the words of Christ as He said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

We must continue to strive to harness the manpower of the local churches, teach the laity that God wants a man to do His work. Instill within their hearts the principles upon which this body was founded and presently stands, and create within them a desire to launch out into the depth of Christian endeavor. Man must realize that God holds him responsible for being the head of the home and as such he is responsible for the teaching that goes on in the home and unless he himself has first received God's word, he is in no position to teach his family. Acceptance or rejection of this fact does by no means change its verity for we find through out the Bible that God chose men to take the lead in doing His work.

Let us leave this session with determination to do a

greater work through the Brotherhood for God for there is much to be done and the time is now that we must be about our Father's business for if this great work is to expand as it should, we must unify our efforts and run with patience the race that is set before us.

THE MESSAGE OF PRESIDENT FULLER

Before the 57th Session
Woman's Convention Auxiliary
Of The

National Baptist Convention of America
Los Angeles, California

Sister Vice President, Officers, Delegates and Friends:

We are profoundly grateful to the great head of the Church, through

whose tender mercies we are permitted to reach another milestone in our journey toward our heavenly home. The Master has graciously led us through another year full of anxious toil. We have striven as best we knew to do His will and to promote the on-coming of His kingdom.

The year has been a trying and laborious one; when you hear the many reports that will be delivered from this platform, you will have in concrete form the facts and figures that go to make up the story of the year's work.

We have assembled to review the accomplishments of another year as co-workers, to share the knowledge of Kingdom progress around the world and to plan the work for the next year. This is for us a happily anticipated experience.

WHY GO FORWARD?

The purpose for which a church exists is missions. Take out of a church the missionary idea and you have a ship without a port, an athlete without a goal, a soldier without an order, a life without an object. You have a barren tree that cumber the ground, an empty house over whose door is written "Ichabod." Limit the gospel in its scope or power, and you cut its heart out. Charles Wesley was right: "Take back my interest in thy blood unless it flows for all the races."

Christ lived and died for all men. The business of the church is to make Him known to all men. Our Christian religion revolves around two focal points, "Come" and "Go." Every one who accepts the invitation "Come," must hear immediately the imperative command, "Go." It was our Lord's most frequent, His perpetual command. It is the key to the parables. It is the beginning and the end of the model prayer, "thy kingdom come, for thine is the kingdom." It is the driving wheel of the machinery of a church or a denomination. Stop that wheel and the machinery is motionless and useless.

It is the authority for Christian education. College and seminaries were founded to fit men to "go." When they cease to so function, they ought to be revitalized or buried. It was none other than President Harper who said, a short time before his death, when he appeared to have made a revaluation of the verities and vitalities of our holy religion: "It would be calamity if the educational institutions founded by our fathers to foster the Christian faith should come in time to destroy the very faith they were founded to foster."

The Church at Ephesus grew by giving out. A religion not worth giving away, is not fit to keep at home. The charter of the American Board of Foreign Missions was under consideration by the Massachusetts legislature. A member spoke: "I am opposed to it; we haven't enough religion for home use, much less to give to the world, to export to foreign lands." A wise man rose and replied: "Sir I have this to say, when our religion is of this character, the more we export of it the more we have left of it; and the more we believe in this Gospel and give it to all the world, the more we do believe in it, and receive it as the bread of life at home."

The same principle is in the couplet:

"There was a man they called him mad;
The more he gave away, the more he had."
"The Son of God goes forth to war
A kingly crown to gain:

His blood-red banner streams afar,
Who follows in His train?
Who best can drink His cup of woe.
Triumphant over pain,
Who patiently bears His cross below;
He follows in His train."

EFFICIENT, COOPERATIVE, SACRIFICIAL LIVING

Some words are in themselves sermons. Cooperation is one of them. It is one of the greatest words in the English language. Every loyal worker will ask, "How much can I put into this enlistment program?" What have I to give?" "What is the level of my best?"

The historic motto of the coast-guard, "Always ready," denotes efficiency. We will all need to put our shoulders to the wheel. Some one has said, "God will not look over you for medals, degrees and diplomas but for scars."

Each of us has some talent to give. We may have only one, but surely we have one. God can bless that one talent and broaden its scope of usefulness. One life with its small talent seems futile in God's great plan, yet He can bless it until that life can "alter the sweep of the infinite whole."

What have we to give? It is amazing to see how many contributions can we make. They multiply like magic. Efficiency plus enthusiasm plus talent plus love is invincible. These foretell victory.

The field is the world. As we strive day by day to follow the conquering vision, Christ Himself will be our ally, for through all ages He has ever been the contemporary of the reapers in the field white unto harvest. Marshal Foch said, "Victory is an inclined plane." I am confident that you will live earnestly, climbing this inclined plane to a transcendent victory. Who dares fail to try?

WEARING OUT AND RUSTING OUT

It is very much better to wear out than to rust out, if the wearing out process consists of constructive effort. The negative man is always a failure. Although he may not pull back, those who pull forward must carry him along.

He is a useless burden unworthy the energy that is required to carry him a mile. He is a consumer, but not a producer. He uses light, but creates none.

He slakes his thirst, but refuses to go to the well for water—some one must bring it to him. He lends no help in the cultivation of the soil, but consumes his proportion of the fruits of other men's toil.

He would not aid in repelling the enemy from his native land, but would enjoy the peace and tranquility and all other blessings earned by the courage and effort of his compatriots.

Positive energy on the side of right means much. It builds, it lifts, it pulls, it purifies, it ennobles and inspires.

There can be no real service without genuine active effort. Passive goodness is not far removed from active sinfulness. Goodness that consists only in refraining from evil is not helpful, even as an example.

In the marathon of life the genius is the hare and the "average man" is the tortoise.

The greatest genius is he who can organize, coordinate and apply genius to the affairs of life with the same degree of continuity that the "average man" gives to his less sensational gifts.

He who can bring together the combined power of many geniuses is a genius greater than those whom he directs.

He who had omnipotent and omniscience, all power and all intelligence, occupied His time and devoted His energies to the needs of humanity. Everything He did was constructive to the last degrees. He "came to seek and to save that which was lost," and that was of necessity a constructive work.

He proved beyond all doubt that the greatest genius, the finest talent, the most marvelous of all gifts, is that which reaches and comforts the hearts of the people. No other talent is to be compared with it, because it is most promotive of happiness.

The crucial vital question persists—are we willing today to pay the price for spiritual power? Everything worthwhile costs. Cost and value are indissolubly linked in Christian service. Ease is the undoing of Christian life. Paul gladly paid the price for spiritual power, as did the other early Christians, whose triumphs were always preceded by mighty crusades. Such Christians shook the Roman Empire to its foundations, in one brief generation. There is no easy way to win this lost world to Christ. If Christians insist on finding an easy way, they are inviting certain defeat and disaster. The disciple is not above his Master, nor the servant above his Lord.

OF WHAT USE ARE WE TO THE WORLD?

"Better active blundering in the effort to do good than harmless stupidity in idleness."

The life that is called harmless because it is idle is not harmless. Its influence is necessarily harmful.

The purpose of life should be accomplishment. The idle man does not accomplish, therefore so far as usefulness goes he is a dead one. Indeed he is less useful than a dead man, for an idle man not only creates nothing, but he consumes as much as a busy, useful man.

It is not the evil things one refrains from doing, but the good things which he does that count in time and eternity.

More valuable is the life in which there are many mistakes made in righteous activity than the idle life wherein nothing is accomplished. The idle life is one long -drawn-out mistake.

What is now needed, and always has been, is aggressive righteous activity.

For one to sit idly by and see the consummation of wicked designs without putting forth the least effort to circumvent their accomplishment is simply another way of holding the coats of men while they stone Stephen.

Activity, work, constructive effort, well-directed energy, are of Divine command.

This is evident for one reason because there is so much to be done. Passive indifference to the workings of evil in its many and varied forms is equivalent to approval of its movements and the results flowing therefrom.

The devil himself is little concerned about one who had determined to live an idle life.

He knows that idleness is itself sin, and he knows that he who had decided to live an idle life will soon be leading a more or less active wicked one. So it is not difficult to understand why the prince of darkness is satisfied to leave such a one to his own devices.

It is impressively apparent that one's life history need not be so much a record of things sensational and dramatic as of things useful and helpful.

More and more apparent it becomes to all who think upon it that only the life of service can be a happy life. The principle of righteous activity is included in the economy of life. It is in the entire created universe, in all nature. "My Father worketh hitherto, and I work," said the Master.

The fact that man is given the ability and the capacity to work, knows its necessity, knows what is destructive and what is constructive, carries with it the implied command for him to exercise the talents and intellect with which he has been endowed.

One who lives the inactive life of a jellyfish, will have about as much happiness as a jellyfish. One thing can be said in excuse of the real jellyfish—he knows no better, while the human prototype does. The jellyfish may be happy, but does not know it; the human jellyfish is miserable and does not know it.

Helpful, useful activity can be lovingly and beautifully devoted to the bearing of burdens for those who have too many to bear; for we are thus admonished. "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

ABILITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

Always must we realize when meditating upon these things that the noblest and most wonderful achievements of either genius or mediocrity are those having for their object the amelioration of suffering, encouraging the despondent and reviving hope in the hearts of the hopeless.

The spasmodic efforts of genius, often times not well planned or executed, weigh far less in the scale of true usefulness than do the faithful and constant endeavor of what we are pleased to call the "average man."

It must not be forgotten by those who possess the magic flame of genius those who have been endowed with talent beyond that of their brethren that their responsibilities are greater in proportion.

To whom much has been given, much shall be required. This causes us to reflect upon the need of continuous activity upon the part of those who realize the need, beauty and usefulness of the righteous life.

Righteousness is not only a spiritual prerequisite, but it is also an economic principle.

Influence is not so much in proportion to one's years as to his deeds. Unless one's years are filled with constructive effort, the fewer the better so far as the world is concerned.

Thus it is when we serve God we serve man, and when we serve man we serve God.

TWO WONDROUS COMPANIONS

Truth is the companion of Love, and Love energizes the use of the virtues and faculties, and makes them pour out their benefactions upon the needy.

Truth never despairs nor surrenders. There is nothing nor any one to whom Truth can surrender. It is all inclusive of itself. It is the principle that underlies and overlies all that is. It reinforces and undergirds every righteous enterprise.

To disregard Truth means to invite chaos and disaster.

This is why it is that "Where there is no vision the people perish."

To this might be added the further fact that it is usually the case that where some one has had the vision and undertook to give it to others he also had perished, or at least had to undergo persecution, for his foresight at the hands of those whom he would benefit. In the natural economy of things, the life useful is the Life Beautiful. It is beautiful because it possesses and responds to the God-given virtues.

Love holds the torch that lights the way to the Land of Hope and Faith.

The deed of Love is the useful deed. It is therefore necessarily economic as well as helpful and comforting. It is happiness-producing, for the exercise of Love in any direction is productive of tranquility and peace.

Love beautifies, ennobles, elevates and makes charming. Hate deforms, sacrifices darkens and makes hideous.

Love of necessity impels to humility and the beauty of character this resplendent virtue promotes.

We must go down before we can go up. We must get on our knees before we are ready to try our wings.

The true life must be real. It may be imitated by a rouged and powdered corpse, but such life is only an imitation.

The dead hand can not execute the will of the absent mind and spirit. Its lifeless feet can not take the body anywhere.

Men need light, and they should not care whose lamp furnishes it. Love is necessarily destructive of hate. It is Love's way to overcome it in one way or another.

"He called me traitor, rebel, a thing to flout;

He drew a circle that left me out.

But Love and I had the wit to win—

We drew a circle that took him in."

Love disintegrates the granite of hate into dust. It destroys the steel of the sword of envy and jealousy with the rust of their own creation. It transforms anger into patience, intolerance into sweet consideration.

It is love that makes the heart sing, that converts poverty into riches—the "riches of His grace." It opens the blind eyes of materiality by giving the eye of Faith and courage of "him that hath his quarrel just."

It causes us not to pray in vain, but to believe on Him of whom we ask, and who is the possessor of all things. We should not so much pray that trial and temptations do not come to us, but we may have the fortitude and strength to withstand them when they do come.

It is a righteous prayer when we pray that we shall be able to help physically, mentally, spiritually or financially those about us—if we really mean to do it.

Don't be a tightwad in goodness. It is not necessary to conserve Love. It multiplies itself the more it is expended. Faster than it is applied does it increase itself.

It only needs to be applied to grow in quantity, and quality. In order that we may have more of Love, both from God and men it is only necessary to use what we have. And we know that all are constantly in need of it, and the joy and blessings it bestows.

There is never a moment or an occasion when hate is required, and there is never a moment when Love is not required, and desired.

Love and its fruitage—sympathy, compassion, tenderness, kindness and patience—always are soothing and comforting, even healing and fear-dispelling. "A tree is known by its fruit."

"To him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is a sin."

OUR CHILDREN

The time should pass for us to urge upon women the importance of the work of training our children; you should accept it as absolutely true. If only our churches could be brought to fully realize the resources God has placed at their command in the children they have in their congregations. The churches should give themselves with enthusiasm and determination hitherto unknown to the development of the children. Then the churches could turn again to the great world tasks with new assurance of the ultimate triumph of the Kingdom of God on earth. The sprouting of a seed is but the beginning of the plant's life, but we cannot develop the plant unless it is alive. We cannot cultivate a grain of sand, but the child is like a little seed who

"Holds a thousand green leaves folded tight,
Holds a thousand flowers pink and white,
Holds a tree with its branches all complete,
And the fruit that is juicy, golden and sweet."

RELIGIOUS PAPER

This is the golden age of education. Every mother's son and daughter are expected to equip themselves for effective and efficient service. Current publications of the proper kind are a vital factor in thus equipping the present generation. A man's reading determines largely his outlook on life and his outlook greatly influences both his inclination and ability to accomplish certain results. Therefore, from the standpoint of Christianity, it is imperative that Christian leaders press the claims of Religious reading; particularly our own Baptist host will do well and wise to get our own denominational periodicals into the homes of our constituency.

SOME OPINIONS ON INTEGRATION

1. Integration will raise the level of intelligence among Negroes.
2. Integration will provide better facilities and greater opportuni-

ties for the Negro Elementary and High School Student thereby increasing his efficiency as a worker on his chosen profession.

3. Integration will help America approach more early the Democratic Ideal as visualized by our Founding Fathers in the Constitution and Bill of Rights, and consequently serve as a factor against Foreign propaganda machines.
4. Integration in Education will serve as a potent factor in finally bringing about Integration in residential areas.

This is an excerpt from a special message by Governor Frank G. Clement to the General Assembly of Tennessee on January 9, 1957, on integration of the schools.

"The relations of the races have been termed the greatest problem confronting responsible officials and citizens of Tennessee today."

"We have been blessed by God, respected by our fellowman and have become prosperous because we have, in the broadest sense of the word, proclaimed our desire to be right with 'one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all'."

The victory of Northern Arms abolished the institution of slavery but it did not solve the problem of race relation.

We must face the problems of today in the light of the past.

We must accept the fact that no law, no judicial decree can erase three hundred (300) years of history. But in our recognition of the existence of different grounds for white and Negro, we must not overlook the fact that the Negro is equal the White man in the eyes of the law and in the sight of God. He is an American citizen, even as the White. He pays taxes, even as the White. He serves in our armed forces in defense of our country, even as the White.

He is entitled to equality of opportunity.

When the Negro reads the Declaration of Independence, when he hears our leaders speak of the rights of man, he knows that he is a man. He knows that he is an American, and he will never be content to be treated as anything else. Whether we like it or not, the Negro will never willingly keep an assigned place in society if that place is set in shame and degradation.

I read this part of this address because it expresses so vividly the thoughts and feelings of us. And we must so fight in a Christ-like manner so that we will be recognized by all as a person equal in the sight of the law and God to any other person.

We must not grow bitter, nor careless but we must hold fast to our dignity and express ourselves in every walk as children of God determined to prove ourselves as worthy of all opportunities and privileges as any other people.

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

Mrs. Iva Prince

The Woman's Auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention of
America:

I bring you Christian Greetings and I thank God and you for this
privilege of serving you as your Historian.

Today as I review the History of our Convention, I look back some
years and see its background. We recall the organizers who blazed
the way. All of their names we can not mention, but their deeds live
on. It was in Chicago, Illinois in the year 1915, our history records,
that a division brought about this present-day convention and gave
the women of this body an opportunity to develop spiritual and in-
tellectual experiences for the enlistment of others and for the enrich-
ment of their spiritual life. Many who had not studied the life and
suffering and death of our thorn-crowned crucified Saviour and Re-
deemer, as told in the four Gospels, have now a better understanding
of the deeper meaning of service and we can better sacrifice with a
new appreciation. Some of us with good will can forgive as we go
through life with heartaches as His followers. Our missionary task
is helping to build the worthwhile character as we minister to the
sick and the needy, offering our help, though small, to those in trou-
ble. We recognize that we need more quietness of soul, more private

devotions if we would endure, die and triumph as our Master did. The calling of our conventions to meet together should mean the offering, first of ourselves in consecrated service to meet the challenge of these times; secondly, we should prove to those who know not our Christ that there is joy in Christian fellowship; and thirdly, the measure of our blessings depends upon how much we can give to this sinful world of Christ's life teachings.

In the beginning, as now, we were blessed with men and women of vision. We can never forget their contribution to this cause. As we look in Nashville, Tennessee, at 523 2nd Avenue North and Locust Street, in the window of the Administration Building "looking East," there we find a six-foot, three-inch bronze statue of The Late Honorable Dr. Richard Henry Boyd. He shall be remembered as long as Baptists live. When Dr. Richard H. Boyd passed, his mantle fell on the shoulders of his illustrious son, Dr. Henry Allen Boyd, and he has carried high the banner of service in his own right. History of the Baptists cannot be written correctly and his name left out. He is known for his work as a Baptist stalwart, the tallest tree of the Baptist Forest, the globe trotter. He is the Secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board, the President of the first Negro bank in Nashville, Tennessee, Secretary of the National Baptist Sunday School Congress, and he is the head of many organizations that are uplifting that were born from his fertile brain and inspiration. He is our greatest known leader of his day.

We turn our view, now, to the "Woman of the Hour", our President, Dr. M. A. B. Fuller, who has so wonderfully led us in denominational work the world over. In the Baptist World's Alliance her name is indelibly written with love. At Home she is honored. She is known as the best organizer and supervisor of constructive Christian work in this nation; she has few equals and no superiors of women leaders. In 1916 she was elected Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's National Baptist Convention of America; in 1928 the President of this Convention; in 1938 she represented us in Atlanta, Georgia, at the World's Baptist Alliance; in 1947 in Copenhagen, Denmark; and she still attends every meeting of importance of the World's Baptist Alliance. She expects to attend one this November (1957) in Canada.

Our Convention is organized into workshops and councils for the instruction of "The How for All Occasions in Missions." Some of the councils are as follows: Official Staff, Field Missionaries, State Presidents, Vice Presidents, Home Mission President, Foreign Mission Presidents, District Presidents, Sub-District Presidents, Deacons' Wives, Ushers, Education, Bible Bands, Nurse Aides, Ministers' Wives, Mothers' Union, Baptist Congress Union, Art Booth, Business Women, Temperance, Executive Board, Personal Service, Gleaners, Tracts, Courtesy, Music, Bible Teachers, Tithers Annual Members, Matrons, President's Night Council. For the young women and the children we also have graded workshops.

Each missionary organization should have a library. Are you building one?

The spiritual work of this group of Christian leaders stands out with their contribution to our many efforts. This Convention helps to support the colleges that are endorsed by the parent body. We are going forward with the help of God in doing our Home and Foreign Mission work. There is still a vast need of finance to support our

work. Will you send to the headquarters the offerings lifted each Sunday for our missionaries for Home and Foreign work? Those pennies make dollars.

We should order our Missionary Helps and books of all kinds for religious services at once from 523 2nd Avenue North, Nashville, Tennessee.

If you would write us about your convention work, we would make a greater History. Will you do that, please?

When we supply all of our churches with a library with books from our own publishing board, we will prepare our young people with the proper tools to work with and they can go forward with much enthusiasms.

There have been thousands of dollars raised by these women all over this nation. Souls have been saved; women and men have been educated; the Boards—Educational, Home and Foreign Mission Evangelical—have received financial support. The Gospel has been sent abroad as well as helped a crying need at Home. Women have dedicated their lives and sacrificed to attend these conventions to the fullest measure. Food and clothes have been given in our flooded districts; doors have been opened to shelter the homeless; the blind have always received needed help. Yet, there is room to do more. We must do more as God makes it possible for us to prosper.

And, now, may I close by saying that even though I suffered a stroke last year, God is good. I am better and out and around. I praise Him and Love Him because he first Loved me. Continue to pray for me. Let there be none idly saying, "There is nothing I can do", while the souls of men are dying and the Master calls for you.

26TH ANNUAL MESSAGE OF MRS. HATTIE L. E. WILLIAMS, PRESIDENT, LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA, 1957

To Mrs. Josephine Randolph, first Vice President, Mrs. Alice Adams, Second Vice President and Mrs. Sarah Adams, third Vice President, to all the Secretaries and the entire official family and to all delegates and friends:

Thanks be to God for this golden opportunity to be here and attempt to bring this message.

Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity.

It is like precious ointment upon the head, that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard, that went down to the skirts of his garments; as the dew of Hermon, and as the dew that descended upon the mountains of Zion: for there the Lord commanded the blessing even life for evermore.

As I gaze upon this gathering and ponder the significance of our convention, how true indeed is the simple declaration: "In unity there is strength." We are thrilled to be your guests again. This makes our third session in the "West", hence we are here to do our best.

These days in which we live are momentous and changing times, fraught with decisive matters of world-wide proportions. I do not believe there is any other time in history whereupon the young women are called upon to exert a more active roll than now.

It is doubtful if there ever was a time propitious for the Christian faith as the present. Against the dark background of the world tragedy, humanity's crucial need for a wiser faith is so obvious and compelling that soberminded persons today can mistake it. Multitudes of humanity appaled at the present potentialities for world disaster that have logically followed nearly half a century of materialism, are today looking earnestly for a way out and longing for a nobler destiny.

Millions of men and women are beginning to suspect that contemporary paganism is little more than a ghastly fraud which begins by offering people everything they want and ends by taking from them everything they need to live creatively. The result is that vast numbers of men and women are turning again toward the great moral and spiritual heritage which in the past their fathers held to be of supreme worth. Many eager people long to have for their lives the dynamic of the Christian life, the certainties and objectives of the Christian faith, and the vitality and unconquerability of the Christian spirit.

As we see it, all this constitutes a magnificent opportunity for the Christian people of this generation. If they have what is needed to be light that shines "unto all that are in the house," now is a strategic light that shines "unto all that are in the house," now is a strategic time to show it.

It is well worth pondering deeply that Jesus had a strong appeal for a class of people who are conspicuously absent from many churches today—the irreligious. Jesus seems to have been attracted to a group that the churches of His day were not reaching, and oddly, they seem to be the same class which the churches of our day are not reaching either.

Jesus did not go out to the world with any preconceived prejudices. He thought of all individuals as objects of His personal interest and as being worthy of his confidence. He made no distinctions between people because of their class, position, or creed. He recognized and appreciated human preoccupations and talents. He delighted in the discovery of people who elected to spend their lives in the work of His Kingdom.

Jesus disregarded all petty legalism and formalities. He simply asked every man to embrace a great Christian destiny for himself and go out into everyday life of the world to get the feel of what it means to help others. He welcomed into fellowship of His company all who affirmed a sincere desire to do that.

Humanity's need for the Christian faith was never more apparent.

The Christian church is the only institution in modern society prepared to satisfy that need. Christ has unmistakably indicated the strategy we ought to adopt and the tactics which we ought to employ.

OUR NEED FOR MEN

As an indication of our mastery over nature we have created the colossal metropolis. We have built cities largely through the facilities of steam and electricity, but steam and electricity cannot control them. We have built our corporation greater and greater, and now they are so vast that we cannot curb them. We have mountains of gold, but few men strong enough to be trusted near the mountains. We have elaborated our machinery in the most cunning ways, but the whole fabric threatens to break down because we have not men strong enough to sit at the control.

Little by little it is becoming clear that one thing essential in civilization is the power of character. It is a startling achievement for a man to lift a receiver and talk to people on the other side of the world, but the matter of first importance is what kind of man is doing the talking! It is inspiring to see jet planes crashing through space at 1200 miles an hour; but of greater importance is, what kind of pilots are sitting in the cockpits? What matters it how intricate the inventions if eventually they are going to grind us to powder.

We have tried an alliance with science, we have tried an alliance with technology, the time is coming for us to try an alliance with God. Science has brought out her million of neon lights giving us the best substitute for the light of the sun the world has ever had. The immediate effect, perhaps, is to show us that all cosmic forces and the forces of institutions and the forces of ideas are nothing unless along with these we have tall-statured, stout-hearted sons of God, who can direct us to hiding place from the wind, and recover from the tempest. Electricity cannot dispel our moral darkness; we must have the Candle of the Lord, and by the illumination of His Word we shall walk unafraid.

The difficulty in the business world is not with the principle but with men. The competitive principle is explained as a beneficent objective if it is made use of by Christ-like men, but in the hands of selfish men and men without sympathy, it works consequences which are disastrous. What is needed in the commercial world? Christian character. In every crisis of the world's history the church has been saved by a man. The apostolic church was in possession of none of the ordinary instruments of power. It had no property, little wealth, and no prestige. Its members were for the most part from the lower classes. Its leaders were obscure. It had neither temples nor learning, nor social influence, and not yet it turned the world upside down. It did this because it had men. They were men who had been with Jesus.

Junior women, do you know the Man of Galilee? Have you had his touch of power? Do you walk with him? I mean the living Christ!

Here is a substance of a message for our day. We lift in this crisis of our times the cry that was raised on the day when Christ rode into Jerusalem as King. "Hosanna to the Son of David. Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. He is the rightful owner of the world, the rightful sovereign of all human hearts. Without His disposition we are impotent; without His character we are lost. But with His heart and mind with us, the wind will not make us afraid and the tempest will not beat us down.

DEDICATION

Y. W. A. and Junior Mission workers should dedicate themselves to give thought, time, and means to hasten the day when all men shall know Christ. To consideration, gentleness, and Christian responsibility for the other young women with whom we come in contact in our home, our community, and to the ends of the earth, and to make personal appearance, speech, and manner such as becomes the purity and beauty of the Christlike character, living a radiant and convincing life in all social relationship.

Every young woman should consider the needs of the world in which we live as we plan the life we live, a speaker was heard to say. A Colombian young woman expressed to her pastor sometime ago, "I cannot think of the needs of my people, for to think about them is to serve them. Another recently baptized. I am not satisfied with just being a church member, or just doing the ordinary things in church life. I want to do something special for the Lord."

Robert Browning in his "One Word More", a gift to Elizabeth, his wife, says that while Raphael was a painter by vocation, he once made a symphony of sonnets for the eyes of the one he loved. Robert Browning was a poet, yet he would fain have found some other art to express his love for Elizabeth, for poetry could not fully do it. "Once and only once and for only once."

God be thanked, the meanness of his creatures boast of a two soul-side, one to face the world with, one to show a woman he loves her.

I like to think that a young woman's attractiveness, charm and grace are her "one Word More" to the Lord of her life. Do you know what to do with your attractiveness and charm, your grace and beauty, your personality and power of life? Where and to whom are you giving your "One Word More?" How one does covet these for the Lord Christ and his church. How does he need them? How he could and would use them, multiply them if given a chance.

So often young women bring to him, not their attractiveness and charm, but their dullness and satiety. Instead of grace and beauty they bring awkwardness and inelegance; instead of joy and enthusiasm their direness and lethargy; instead of strength, weakness; instead of sharp intellect, dull indifference, instead of purity of heart, soiledness of soul.

What poor advertisements! The amazing thing is not that with so much effort so few are attracted, but that with such poor life and spirit so many people seek the Lord's way. People fall in love with Jesus in spite of this. Young women sometimes bring him the leftovers of the gay and charming attractive and dynamic and beautiful and powerful, and then try to put the lure into the leftovers. It is like warmed-over biscuits, or reheated coffee.

Epictetus once said, "I cannot give credence to a philosopher who professes to have found the secret of high living and the power to conquer evil if he speaks without animation in the hangdog fashion with a face of a condemned man on his way to execution, and with a mustache drooping in such a melancholy fashion that comes to reach to his knees; he does not look like a conqueror to me."

It is easy to get excited over a football game, over circuses and parades, nylons and furs, diamonds and orange blossoms, but to get excited over the good news of the gospel of the Lord Christ, that is something else again. One can be charming and gay for the theatre and

opera, for the house party and the date, fun and leisure, but the service of God in the beauty of his sanctuary often finds a different mood.

With apology to Joyce Kilmer I think I shall never see a poem as lovely as a fine noble youth, pouring out the beauty and garcifulness of life at the feet of Jesus. Did you ever see it on a high school or college campus? The author of Valley Forge says that there are some men who so lift the way of life until all men walk on a higher plane in their generation. I have seen that occur on high school and college campuses because of the poured beauty and devotion of a life. As one thinks of the terrifically important fields of entertainment and sports, names of young women whose lives are a living example of beautiful devotion to and inspiring living for Christ also comes to mind. There are young business women whose dedication is inspiring beyond words.

So you are hoarding your contribution of personality, purity, influence, and enthusiasm, why not throw caution to the wind and let the Lord Christ have it all. Bring your treasure to Christ, his church, his kingdom.

The best argument for Christianity is not to be found in words, but in a Christian life. Mere words cannot lead others to Christ if our lives are going in the opposite direction. When William Carey was a shoemaker's apprentice, he worked next to a boy who was a genuine Christian. William Carey was not yet a Christian himself. He used to ask the boy questions about his faith which the boy could not answer because he did not share young Carey's brilliance of mind. But if he could not answer Carey's questions, neither could he be tempted to lose his temper, nor be dishonest, nor stop going to church. As William Carey himself later put it, "He could not answer my questions, but I could not answer his life." So Carey went to the boy's church where he found the joy of complete commitment to Christ.

The word Christian is both a noun and an adjective. We know its meaning as a noun when we become a Christian. We know its meaning as an adjective when we try to be a Christian in our thoughts and deeds.

The Y. W. A. and Junior Mission Dedication suggests several Christian actions and attitudes. Among other things it suggests that every young woman should practice consideration, gentleness, and Christian responsibility toward other young women at home, in the community, and in the world. This comes close to Paul's instructions to Titus to teach people to be ready to every good work. To speak evil of no man but gentle, shewing all meekness unto all men.

Considerations for others is a wonderful quality. It helps us to overcome a "me first attitude." It helps to conquer the selfishness to which we are all prone. A wedding was recently held in Washington, D. C. During the reception which followed, the people missed the bride. She was found helping an old woman down the church steps. On one of the greatest days of her life, she was thinking of others.

Perhaps there is an extreme example of thoughtfulness of others. But that is what consideration means. It means thoughtfulness of others. Often one sees in an office a sign bearing the word THINK. An equally valuable sign would be THINK-OF-OTHERS. If people spent as much time thinking how they could help others as they do thinking about themselves, what a different world, this would be. E. Jones in one of his books suggests this slogan: "Gentle with others; severe with self, honest with all."

Being gentle with others does not mean closing our eyes to their faults, or winking at their sins. It means treating them in love even

as Christ dealt gently with the woman taken in sin. Jesus did not condone her sin—he was careful to tell not to repeat it—but in tenderness he helped her to start again to make a beautiful life. Being gentle in speech, sharing quiet tastefulness in dress and manners, and being humble in the face of success. And when we do all this we have a responsibility not only to others but to God. He is the source of our life. He is the final judge of our actions.

One of the tests of character is how we measure up to our responsibilities. As Christians we have a responsibility to love others, and try to lead them closer to Christ. We have a responsibility to read our Bibles, and pray, and help others, and grow in Christian love and conduct.

Consideration-gentleness-responsibility—what wonderful arrows on the sign post of the Y. W. A. and Junior Mission DEDICATION to point you to the highway that leads to greater Christian character, influence, and service.

CONSIDER THE CHRISTIAN

Christian educators realize that Christian education begins in the home and in the church. Baptists want to see every young woman who is capable and talented given the best possible training, that of Christian college.

For the Baptist young woman the decision as where she will attend college will be one of the most important in her life. Woman's leadership in almost every phase of American life today is rapidly advancing. Her achievements in politics, education, medicine, religion, art, literature, and law is one of the outstanding accomplishments of this century. But of far greater importance than this is the part which the woman must play in building a Christian home. The Christian college believes it can make no greater contribution than that of filling its graduates with a sense of their responsibility for creating a Christian home.

Some one has said that the primary objective of the Christian college is not to fit a young person to make a living but to make a young person fit to live. For the Christian the matter of a "calling" is no idle cliché. It is a paramount fact that must be faced. The Christian college asks three questions of every young woman whom it seeks to lead into the proper vocation. Will you be happy doing this work? Are you capable of doing it? Will it advance the kingdom of God?

Our missionary organizations should plan a banquet for high school students in the local church with a program demonstrating the urgency for training our young people in the church college.

The cause of mission can be better served by well-educated, trained Christian young women who work here at home and to the ends of the earth.

Christian education is a matter of urgency. God wants it. The times demand it. Youth must have it or lose the way in bringing the lost multitudes to Christ as Saviour; in advancing our home and foreign mission programs.

OUR CONVENTION

We have a great convention; a convention that is outstanding from three points: Religiously, morally and educational.

We are being severely criticized because of our name that given

us by our lamented leader, Dr. G. L. Prince. At this point, I would like to tell you what is meant about youth.

Youth is not a time of life; it is a state of mind. It is not a matter of rosy cheeks, red lips and supple knees; it is a temper of the will, a quality of the imagination, a vigor of the emotions. It is the freshness of the deep springs of life.

Youth means a temperamental predominance of courage over timidity of the appetite for adventure over love of ease.

Nobody grows old merely by living a number of years. People grow old by deserting their ideals. Years wrinkle the skin, but the giving up of enthusiasm wrinkles the soul. Worry, doubt, self-interest, fear and despair—these bow the heart and turn the spirit back to dust.

Whether sixty or sixteen, every human being may experience wonder, the sweet amazement of the stars, the undaunted challenge of events, the unfailing, childlike appetite for the future, the joy in living. For you are as young as your self-confidence, and as old as your despair.

As long as your heart receives messages of beauty, hope, cheer, courage and power from God and from your fellowmen, you are young.

Jesus propounded a question one day to a group of people standing on the streets. "Why stand ye idle all day?" They replied for no one has hired us. He said to them go into the vineyard and work and whatsoever is right I will pay thee. He didn't question them, about age. He said go to work in the vineyard, which means a field of labor with no strings attached. That is the reason so many young women in various sections are reluctant about working in the church because they are constantly pushed around because of age.

Our convention has really grown and that means we must pray that much the more in order to keep Satan in the background for we must continue to soar on to higher heights. Remember what Napoleon said to the Italian army: He said climb men though the mountains are rugged, for beyond the Alps lies Italy. We must work the works of him that sent us for when night cometh no man can work.

I visited the United Educational Missionary Baptist Association the second week in August. I was guest speaker for the Junior Women's department. They had a grand session. The third week in August I was invited to Oklahoma. I was guest of the North Eastern District Junior Women Convention. This meeting was held in Enid, Oklahoma. I addressed the group on Tuesday night. They gave me a royal welcome and my stay was lovely. They have an enthusiastic group of young women. This is the field where Mrs. Bayliss has been laboring so long. She has done a marvelous job with God's help. The barriers have been broken down sure enough in that section. Their moderator is a grand person. He has given them green lights hence they have no fear of age-limit. I was invited to speak in Houston, Texas in Nov., but due to the serious illness of my husband it was impossible for me to go. I am proud of our work and when we view this beautiful audience today in sunny California, it tells us that somebody is working at home.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. As we know the NEWSLETTER is our mouth-piece we would like to see it take on a "New Look." We recommend that a committee be appointed to meet with our Corresponding Secretary to work this out.
2. Recommend that Regional Conferences be set up for the western and Northeastern sections.
3. Recommend that the Book that was presented to the convention by the Illinois group when we met in Chicago be brought to the convention each year that the new workers might see the history of our convention. And that outstanding doings of our convention be placed in this book so that we may know from year to year what happened in our convention.

CLOSING

ARE YOU BUILDING ON SAND

One thing is certain, judging from the building boom that has broken all records in America, and also in Europe where men who have lived for generations in houses frequently eight or nine hundred years old are now breaking free and building new and modern homes—every man is at heart a builder.

If a man isn't building a house today, at least he's dreaming about it.

Many a man who has already built his house still is a dreamer. One looks sometimes at the houses men have built and are building and wonders whether the builder had a dream or a nightmare. Even so, every man is a builder. This truth has wider implications when the object of man's building is not house but life.

All men are architects of fate,
Working in these walls of time;
Some with massive deeds and great
Some with ornament of rhyme.

None of us get far in the business of living before and until he realizes that the most important job of life is what Edwin Markham called "Man-making."

"We are all blind, until we see
That in the human plan
Nothing is worth the making if
It does not make the man.

"Why build these cities glorious
If man unbuilt goes?
In vain we build the work, unless
The builder also grows."

No truth bulked larger in the concern and thinking of Jesus. Of all the great teachers and prophets He alone possessed the best qualifications as a builder, and as the Son of man. As the Nazarene Carpenter He had learned the know-how of a master builder, and as the Son of man He went everywhere with but one desire: namely, to

transfer the secrets of building houses to the building of the temple of the soul.

His sermon on the Mount was, in fact, the plans and specifications for this soul.

Just to make certain that no one misunderstood, He concluded these blueprints with another of His Matchless parables, the parable of the builders.

Before turning to the details and fine print of this parable, it may be well to ponder what we may aptly describe as the major premises of "Operation Building."

There are briefly four:

First, that every man is a builder; second, that the plans for every man's temple have been approved; third, that the solid rock on which to build it has been provided; and fourth, that there is a storm coming that will try every man's work.

The next step would be the conclusion that each of us is building well, strong and true, but such a conclusion is false. The fact is, some among us are wise builders, choosing to take the master plans and follow them to the last detail; whereas others are foolish, thinking that there are short cuts and bypaths, and only learning the hard way that rejecting the master plans is like building on the sand.

The tragedy of the man who built on sand is not that he lacked the plans and specifications for a stately mansion, nor that he found no solid rock left in his search for a building site but that he heard the plans set forth by the Master Builder and rejected them, that he despised the location offered him as too difficult to blast out and make ready, and that he chose instead an easy spot down on the sand.

But the end of the story is not when the house was finished; the end is when it is tested by the sudden storm and the flash flood. Jesus' description of the end is graphic: Great was the fall of it. By these simple words He indicates what always happens "in the end" to the man who decides to live any old way.

Old fashioned or not, the law of gravitation still works; and in turn, let a man build his life out of alignment with God, and he is visited with swift destruction.

Let me not center our attention now, not on the other builder, the man who built on solid rock, but on the Master Builder Himself. He has been epitomized by many superlatives and ascriptions.

His disciples looked upon Him as Teacher, Master, Healer and Saviour, but He Himself seemed to feel His most effective role was that of master Builder and Architect. When he preached His great sermon He plainly said, "Every one who comes to Me and hears my words and does them, I will show you what he is like: he is like a man building a house, who dug deep, and laid the foundation upon rock. He stands among us pre-eminent in character, in word, and in deed, and if any man would build the temple of his soul aright there are three things Christ insists he must do.

First, he must hear Christ words, the divine plans and specifications for the house not made with hands. Second, he must dig deep into their significance until he uncovers the solid foundation of truth, beauty and goodness. Third, he must carry them out in everyday life, carefully, meticulously, and unflinchingly.

No one works very long with the divine Architect before discovering that His materials are the best available, both time-tested and fire-refined. They are often materials underestimated in tensile strength

and lasting durability. Like the newest alloys among us they seem too light to endure the strain, too intangible to resist corrosion, but they have been refined and tested and not found wanting.

In this workaday world, this world is too prone to waste itself "getting and spending" too quickly subdued by the tyranny of things and the deceitfulness of riches, we have the joy and privilege of living true, of building strong, of remaining loyal after the blueprints of the Master Builder so that when the rains come, the floods rise, and the winds blow and beat upon our house, it will not fall because it has been built upon the rock.
