HISTORICAL REFERENCE

April 5, 1886, an open letter to the Baptist Clergy and laymen was issued by the Rev. Wm. J. Simmons in the American Baptist asking if we should have a National Baptist Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denomination. At that time the following reasons were given.

1. To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of each other.

on transportation.

2. To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the Denomination.

3. To encourage our literary men and women and to promote the interest of Baptist literature.

4. To discuss questions pertaining to especially the religious educational, industrial and social interest of our people. 5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to

be heard. 6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the Denomination.

Having been solicited to write the call by many whose names and endorsement are hereunto affixed, the Call is herby made by their advice and solicitations for said Convention to meet in St. Louis, Missouri, August 25, 1886, 10 O'clock a.m. in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangement with power to select his associates Wm. H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. A. H. Cole, 2066 Goode Avenue, St. Louis, are hereby requested to serve as a committee

Wm. J. SIMMONS

CONSTITUTIO

OF THE

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Foreign Mission Baptist Convention of the United States of America, The American National Baptist Convention and the Baptist National Educational Convention; in order to form a more perfect United National Baptist Organization. to secure the blessings of unity for capable and efficient Foreign Mission. Home Mission and Educational work among ourselves and throughout the world; do ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE 1. NAME. This Body shall be known as "The National

Baptist Convention of America."

ARTICLE 2. NATURE And FUNCTION:

SECTION 1. The National Baptist Convention of America shall serve as an Agency of Christian Education, Missionary and Church Extension; and combine the efforts of Baptist Churches and Organizations in extending the gospel both at home and to the Foreign fields; and propagate Baptist Doctrines of faith and distinctive principles throughout the world.

SECTION 2. It shall give its influence in maintaining and safeguarding full religious liberty and spiritual independence on both

the home and the foreign fields.

ARTICLE 3. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The membership of this Convention shall be annual, Orthodox Baptist Churches, District Associations, General Associations and State Conventions.

SECTION 2. Each Church shall register with One Dollar (\$1.00) per member, (minimum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) representation fee in this Convention), and be entitled to one messenger. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

SECTION 3. Each District Association shall pay Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for representation and be entitled to two (2) messengers Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger

SECTION 4. Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for representation and the entitled to five (5) messengers. Ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

ARTICLE 4. OFFICERS

The officers of this Convention shall be President; First Vice 14

President; Second Vice President; Recording Secretary; First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries; Corresponding Secretary; Statistical Secretary; Treasurer; Auditor; Director of Public Relations; Historian; and Secretary of Youth Activities. Each officer shall be elected annually.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association holding membership in this Convention shall

be Associate Vice-Presidents.

ARTICLE 5. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The committee on the nomination of Officers shall be appointed by the President; and make its report following the report of Officers not later than the Friday afternoon session.

SECTION 2. The election of Officers shall be made by roll call

SECTION 3. The time for election in each annual session shall he set by the Executive Board and listed in the printed program.

SECTION 4. Only registered messengers shall have the privilege of voting in the election of officers in the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 5. In no case shall an officer be eligible for reelection prior to his submission of an annual report from his office

ARTICLE 6. EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and Corresponding Secretaries of the Board, and the Presidents of the State Conventions. SECTION 2. The elected Officers of the Convention shall be

reimbursed for their travel expense to the Executive Board Meetings.

ARTICLE 7. FUNCTION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall transact the unfinished business of the Convention in the interims.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall arrange regional meet-

ings and conferences as may be deemed necessary

SECTION 3. If any chosen site for the annual session is found to be unsatisfactory, the Executive Board under the direction of the President shall select the place for the next annual session of the Convention to meet elsewhere.

ARTICLE 8. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The President: He shall be the presiding officer: authorize the calling of all regular and special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body: and he shall be the chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION 2. The First Vice President: At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said officer, the Vice-President shall fill the office of the President.

SECTION 3. Second Vice-President: He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice-President as needs require.

SECTION 4. The Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall keep

a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session: compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the en-rollment cards; draw all drafts on the treasurer; (all drafts must be signed by the President) He shall make an annual report to the

SECTION 5. The First Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the Annual meetings and do whatever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 6. The Second Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do what ever is required

Ihrough the Recording Secretary.
SECTION 7. The Third Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention and do whatever else required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 8. The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Claims and Accounts and do whatever is required through the Recording Sec-

SECTION 9. The Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secretary shall do all the Convention and Executive Board conrespondance, as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make an annual report to the Convention

SECTION 10. The Statistical Secretary: This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and Baptist generally and report the same Annually.

SECTION: 11. The Treasurer: He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention or the President. He shall keep his records so as to preserve perpetually for reference and report annually receipts and dis-

SECTION 12. Auditor: He shall audit all records of the Board and the Treasurer of the Convention; each of which shall be examined at least Thirty Days (30) prior to the Annual session.

SECTION 13. Director of Public Relations: The Director of Public Relations shall give publicity to all of the aims and objectives of the National Convention and its Auxiliaries.

SECTION 14. Historian: He shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference. The Historian shall also publish documented records of the Negro in the Baptist Churches.

SECTION 15. Secretary of Youth Activities: Secretary of Youth Activities shall serve as coordinator between the Parent Convention and the Youth Auxiliary Convention. The Convention holds him responsible for the full compliance of the Youth Auxiliary with its objectives and procedures.

ARTICLE 9. CONVENTION BOARDS AND THEIR DUTIES

SECTION 1. This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, B.T.U., National Baptist Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, Educational.

SECTION 2. Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, Said election shall be annually

SECTION 3. Officers: The Boards shall have a Chairman, Record ing Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The offices

of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined. SECTION 4. Duties of Officers: The Chairman of Boards shall

preside at all board meetings. The Recording Secretary of each board shall keep a true record of the proceedings of the board. SECTION 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary. Treasurer of each Board and to all the correspondence of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary. Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION 6. Management: The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary and three (3) other members of the board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does during the meeting of the Convention and during the interims.

SECTION 7. Reports of Boards: Each Board shall make an an-

nual report to the Convention.

SECTION 8. The compensation of each officer and employee of the Boards shall be fixed by each Board. Compensations shall be limited to the Chairman, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary.

SECTION 9. The compensation of each board is subject to the approval of the convention, and thus must be presented to the con-

vention for proper authorization.

SECTION 10. Duties of Boards: The Home Mission Board shall seek to keep alive struggling Churches, maintain a Baptist Christian Witness, and seek to extend the work of the Kingdom in newly settled or densely populated areas in the domains of the Conven-

The Foreign Mission Board shall seek extended fields of the Great Commission in saving the lost wherever approved by the Convention.

The Educational Board shall give encouragement to those institutions endorsed by the convention and shall attempt to build an influence that the pulpit and leadership of the church will be more efficient.

The National Baptist Publibshing Board shall have charge of all the publications of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall carry the program of Evangelism approved by the Convention.

ARTICLE 10. AUXILIARIES

SECTION 1. There shall be a Senior Women's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, Junior Women's Auxiliary, National Baptist Convention, National Baptist Brotherhood Auxiliary Convention and Nurse Corp National Baptist Convention.

SECTION 2. All messengers to the Auxiliary Convention shall he appointed and certified on the official letter of the Convention by the Churches of the Convention.

SECTION 3. All Auxiliary Conventions are subject to the action of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 4. Each Auxiliary Convention shall elect a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as may be required.

SECTION 5. All officers elected by the auxiliary conventions must be submitted to the National Baptist Convention for approval.

SECTION 6. All auxiliary conventions shall report all of their receipts and disbursements for the conventional year at the annual session to the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 7. All monies collected by auxiliary conventions at the annual session must be reported and turned over to the Finance Committee of the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America daily.

SECTION 8. The auxiliary conventions will report their bills and expense to the National Baptist Convention of America for approval, which shall, under no circumstances, exceed 40% of the total raised.

SECTION 9. The auxiliary conventions may accept representation fees from any and all auxiliaries of the local church, included in their work, subject to their approved constitutional regulations

ARTICLE 11. COMMITTIES

SECTION 1. The Registration Committees of the National Baptist Convention of America and its Auxiliaries, working jointly with the Finance Committee shall open the office of registration the Tuesday.

12:00 Noon prior to the opening of the Convention.

SECTION 2. There shall be three (3) committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the convention.

(a) Finance Committee: Shall receive and be responsible for

all finance coming into the convention, and report the same to the convention daily.

(b) Committee on Bills and Accounts: Shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts, and recommend the amount to be paid by

the Convention. (c) Credentials Committee: In keeing with SECTION 3. There shall be a standing Budget Committee; Responsible for preparation and current revision of a working budget for the National Baptist Convention and all its Auxiliaries.

ARTICLE 2. MEETINGS

The Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the Second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday Night. The place shall be selected by the convention in annual meeting with places chosen two years in advance of next current session.

ARTICLE 13. Representation in other organizations: The National Baptist Convention of America shall hold membership in the Baptist World Alliance and may hold membership in such other organiza tions as it from time to time elects.

ARTICLE 14. Commissions: There shall be a Commission on Transportation; Christian Education, Social Justice and Army and Navy Chaplains.

(1) The Railroad Commission shall consist of (5) members. elected annually and shall have charge of all transportation.

(2) The Commission on Christian Education shall consist of nine members, elected annually and shall plan and promote the Educational program of the Convention.

(3) The Commission on Social Justice shall consist of five (5) members and shall plan and promote such programs as will provide Christian concern for the welfare of oppressed peoples.

(4) The Commission of Army and Navy Chaplains shall have charge of recommending Chaplains for the Army and Navy and shall consist of three (3) members.

ARTICLE 15. This Constitution may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the Convention in the annual session provided written notice is given on the first day of the session.

2. Officers of the convention and all auxiliaries, officers and members of all boards shall be members of a Baptist Church holding membership in the Convention.

3. Messengers enrolled upon presenting proper credentials from the churches, state conventions and general associations shall constitute the convention. The enrollment of messengers may begin 10 days prior to the conventions annual meeting.

4. Finance: (a) An approved book keeping system of receipts and disburse. ments shall be kept by the treasurer of the Convention, the treasurer of all auxiliary conventions, and secretary-treasurer of each board

(b) The following system shall be used in the handlink of convention funds:

(a) All funds received by the Finance Committee of the Convention and the executive board shall be receipted with three (3) carbon stubs; one for the secretary of the committee and one for the auditor of the convention.

(b) The finance committee shall issue a daily report signed by the chairman and secretary of the committee and the treasurer of the convention.

(c) All funds shall be deposited each day in a convention depository through a local bank where the convention is session

(d) During the annual session, the Auditor of the Convention shall check and compare the receipts with the funds each day

(e) All funds shall be paid out by check. (f) The treasurer of the convention, the chairman, secretary

and treasurer of the Finance Committee shall be bonded (g) The auxiliary treasurers shall deposit daily with the finance

committee and take its receipt. (h) The auxiliaries of the convention shall not use more than forty percent of funds collected for operating expenses.

(i) The convention shall have the right to designate only un-

designated funds. All designated funds must be turned over to the causes for which designated.

(i) The salaries of the officers of the Convention shall be senarated from the expenses and all expense itemized.

The Railroad Commission will be paid \$100.00 Annually The Committee on Orthodox will be paid \$50.00 each not to exceed two members.

The Committee on Social Justice \$150.00

The Musical Directress and Organist are to be paid \$25.00 per day during the session of the Convention, plus \$5.00 per day for board and lodging.

The Enrollment Committee is not to exceed six members, and shall be paid \$10.00 per day total sum for the committee not to

exceed \$300.00.

The Chairman to be paid \$15.00 per day not to exceed \$75.00. The Finance Committee is not to exceed six (6) members, to be paid \$10.00 per day not to exceed \$300.00.

The Chairman of said board to be paid \$15.00 not to exceed \$75.00. A total for the committee \$375.00.

The Committee on Accounts is not to exceed five members (5) with two working days of the convention. Same are to be paid at the rate of ten (\$10.00) per member per day and \$15.00 per day for the chairman.

All claims will be filed with the 4th assistant secretary who will report to the General Secretary. Said general secretary will be responsible for filing all claims with the committee and to write vouchers therefore. As directed by the President

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Foreign Mission Baptist Convention of the United States of America, The American National Baptist Convention and the Baptist National Educational Convention: :in order to form a more perfect United National Baptist Organization, to secure the blessings of unity for capable and efficient Foreign Mission. Home Mission and Educational work among ourselves and throughout the world; do ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE 1. NAME: This Body will be known as "The National

Baptist Convention of America."

ARTICLE 2. NATURE And FUNCTION

SECTION 1. The National Baptist Convention of America shall serve as an Agency of Christian Education, Missionary and Church Extension; and combine the efforts of Baptist Churches and Organiextension; and combine the errors of sapure thurches and organizations in extending the gospel both at home and to the Foreign fields; and propagate Baptist Doctrines of faith and distinctive principles throughout the world.

SECTION 2. It shall give its influence in maintaining and safeguarding full religious liberty and spiritual independence on both the home and the foreign fields.

ARTICLE 9. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The membership of this Convention shall be annual. Orthodox Baptist Churches, District Associations, General Associations and State Conventions.

SECTION 2. Each Church shall register with One Dollar (\$1.00)

SECTION 2. Each Church shall register with One Dollar (\$1.00) per member, (minimum of twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) representation fee in this Convention), and he entitled to one messenger. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger SECTION 3. Each District Association shall pay fifty dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger. SECTION 4. Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred Dollars. Ten (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

additional messenger.

ARTICLE 4 OFFICERS

The officers of this convention shall be President; First Vice President; Second Vice President; Recording Secretary; First, Second. Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries; Corresponding

Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Director of Public Relations; Historian; and Secretary of Youth Activities. Each officer shall be elected annually.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association holding membership in this Convention shall be Associate Vice-Presidents.

ARTICLE 5. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The committee on the nomination of Officers shall be appointed by the President; and make its report following the report of Officers not later than the Friday afternoon session.

SECTION 2. The election of Officers shall be made by roll call

states

SECTION 3. The time for election in each annual session shall be set by the Executive Board and listed in the printed program. SECTION 4. Only registered messengers shall have the privilege of voting in the election of officers in the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 5. In no case shall an officer be eligible for reelection prior to his submission of an annual report from his office.

ARTICLE 6. EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and Corresponding Secretaries of the Board, and the Presidents of the State Conventions.

SECTION 2. The elected Officers of the Convention shall be reimbursed for their travel expense to the Executive Board Meetings.

ARTICLE 7. FUNCTION OF THE EXECUTIVE ROARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall transact the unifinished business of the Convention in the interims.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall arrange regional meet-

ings and conferences as may be deemed necessary.

SECTION 3. If any chosen site for the annual session is found to be unsatisfactory the Executive Board under the direction of the President shall select the place for the next annual session of the Convetnion to meet elsewhere.

ARTICLE 8. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SEUTION 1. The President: He shall be the presiding officer: authorized the calling of all regular and special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body and he shall be the chairman of the Executive Board

SECTION 2. The First Vice President: At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said officer, the Vice President shall fill the office of the President

SECTION 3. Second Vice-President: He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice-President as needs require.

SECTION 4. The Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in assistant compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards: draw all drafts on the treasurer; (all drafts must be signed by the Pesident) He shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 5. The First Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the Annual meetings and do whatever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 6. The Second Assistant Recording Secretary. This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do what ever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 7. The Third Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention and do what ever else required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 8. The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Claims and Accounts and do whatever is required through the Recording Sec-

SECTION 9. The Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secreteary shall do all the Convention and Executive Board correspondance, as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 10. The Statistical Secretary: This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and Baptist generally and report the same Annually.

SECTION 11. The Treasurer: He shall receive all f iannolec SECTION 11. The Treasurer: He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention or the President. He shall keep his records so as to preserve perpetually for reference and report annually receipts and disbursements.

SECTION 12. Auditor: He shall audit all records of the Board and the Treasurer of the Convention; each of which shall be examined at least Thirty Days (30) prior to the Annual session SECTION 13. Director of Public Relations: The Director of Pub-

lic Relations shall give publicity to all of the aims and objectives of the National Convention and its Auxiliaries.

SECTION 14. Historian: He shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference. The Historian shall also publish documented records of

the Negro in the Baptist Churches.

SECTION 15. Secretary of Youth Activities: Secretary of Youth Activities shall serve as coordinator between the Parent Convention and the Youth Auxiliary Convention. The Convention holds him responsible for the full compliance of the Youth Auxiliary with its objective and procedures.

ARTICLE 9. CONVENTION BOARDS AND THEIR DUTIES

SECTION 1. This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, BTU, National Baptist Publishing Evangelical, Benevolent, Educational,

SECTION 2. Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention. Said election shall be annually,

SECTION 3. Officers: The Boards shall have a Chairman, Record ing Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Freasurer. The offices or Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION 4 Duties of Officers: The Chairman of Boards shall preside at all board meetings. The Recording Secretary of each poard shall keep a true record of the proceedings of the board.

SECTION 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary. Treasurer of each Board and do all the correspondence of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer or each Boadr shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds rules and regulations of the Board

SECTION 6. Management: The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary and three (3) other members of the board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does during the meeting of the Convention and during the interims.

SECTION 7. Reports of Boards: Each Board shall make an an-

nual report to the Convention.

SECTION 8. The compensation of each officer and employee of the Boards shall be fixed by each Board. Compensations shall be limited to the Chairman, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary.

SECTION 9. The compensation of each board is subject to the approval of the convention, and thus must be presented to the con-

vention for proper authorization.

SECTION 10. Duties of Boards: The Home Mission Board shall seek to keep alive struggling Churches, maintain a Baptist Christian Witness, and seek to extend the work of the Kingdom in newly settled or densely populated areas in the domains of the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall seek extended fields of the Great Commission in saving the lost wherever approved by the

Convention.

The Educational Board shall give encouragement to those institutions endorsed by the convention and shall attempt to build an influence that the pulpit and leadership of the church will be more efficient.

The National Baptist Publishing Board shall have charge of

all the publications of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall carry the program of evangelism approved by the Convention.

ARTICLE 10. AUXILIARIES

SECTION 1. There shall be a Senior Women's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, Junior Women's Auxiliary, National Baptist Convention, National Baptist Brotherhood Auxiliary Convention and Nurse Corp National Baptist Convention.

SECTION 2. All messengers to the Auxiliary Convention shall be appointed and certified on the official letter of the Convention

by the Churches of the Conventions.

SECTION 3. All Auxiliary Conventions are subject to the action

of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 4. Each Auxiliary Convention shall elect a President Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and such other of ficers as may be required.

SECTION 5. All officers elected by the auxiliary convention

must be submitted to the National Baptist Convention for approval. SECTION 6. All auxiliary conventions shall report all of their receiputs and disbursements for the conventional year at the annual session to the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 7. All monies collected by auxiliary conventions at the annual session must be reported and turned over to the finance committee of the General Body of the National Baptist Convention

America daily.

SECTION 8. The auxiliary conventions will report their bills and expense to the National Baptist Convention of America for approval, which shall, under no circumstances, exceed 40 per cent of the total raised.

SECTION 9. The auxiliary conventions may accept representation fees from any and all auxiliaries of the local church, includin their work, subject to their approval constitutional regulations.

ARTICLE 11. COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Registration Committees of the National Baptist Convention of America and its Auxiliaries, working jointly with the Finance Committee shall open the office of registration the Tuesday 12:00 Noon prior to the opening of the convention.

SECTION 2. There shall be three (3) committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the convention.

(A) Finance Committee: Shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the convention, and report the same to the

(B) Committee on Bills and Accounts: Shall receive and investitate all bills, accounts, and recommend the amount to be paid by

be Convention.

(C) Credentials Committee: In keeping with SECTION 3. There hall be a standing Budget Committee; Responsible for preparation and current revision of a working budget for the National Baptist onvention and all its auxiliaries.

ARTICLE 12. MEETINGS

The Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the Second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday Night. The place shall be selected by the convention in annual meeting with places chosen two years in advance of next current

ARTICLE 13. Representation in Other Organizations: The National Baptist Convention of America shall hold membership in the Baptist World Alliance and may hold membership in such other organizations as it from time to time elects.

ARTICLE 14. Commissions: There shall be a Commission on Transportation, Christian Education, Social Justice and Army and

Navy Chaplains.

(1) The Railroad Commission shall consist of (5) members

elected annually and shall have charge of all transportation,

(2) The Commission on Christian Education shall consist of nine members, elected annually and shall plan and promote the Educational program of the Convention.

(3) The Commission on Social Justice shall consist of five (5) nicembers and shall plan and promote such programs as will provide Christian concern for the welfare of oppressed peoples (4) The Commission of Army and Navy Chaplains shall have charge of recommending Chaplains for the Army and Navy and shall

consist of three (8) members.

ARTICLE 15. This Constitution may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the Convention in the annual session provided written notice is given on the first day of the session.



SAVED

(Gospel Salvation) Rev. H. R. Bradley

TEXT: Acts 4:5-12 (12)

Salvation is presented to men in the gospel and the appeal stems from the great commission of our Lord, who commanded that the message should go out into all the world and make Him known to every creature. Many who hear go on to believe and are saved while many others fail to exercise faith and continue in a loststate. Thousands question the ability of Christ to save and rule even as they see the working of sin and ruin all around. They say that our Lord knew nothing about any of the great religions with which we are dealing today—that He may have known something of the Greek and Roman religion but nothing of the others. It is true that Christ in the flesh was born in the Greek Roman and Jewish world, but it is also true that He was the incarnate Son of God, and Son of man who was born for all mankind. Jesus came into a world where every great religion that now exist was already founded except Muhammadanism and in coming He was born in Judaism, the highest moral power of the time. Those who say that Christianity is not to displace and conouer the non-Christian religions must reckon, not with us but with God, for it was Christ who said-without me ye can do nothing-I am the true vine-I am the way, the truth, and the life. Once and for all time God set His estimate on religions the insufficiency of all that was in the world when He sent His Son to bring what we did not have and to give what the world is dead withoutthat is-a living faith in a living Lord-for there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved.

JESUS CHRIST IS INDISPENSABLE TO HUMAN LIFE

Christ is indispensable to us and just as we cannot get along withou Him, it is vain of others to reject Him. Just as He is our all-sufficient Saviour from whom all our needs are supplied according to His riches in glory-so also is He the supreme need of every soul here and all over the world. At this point Christianity meets head on with strong opposition from the religious world. Re-ligionists say that our Christian soul-satisfying experience in Christ is met by the experience of men and women of other religious. They believe they have had just as real experience as Buddhists or Muhammandans as we ever had as Christians. Their point is lost here because we do not preach Christian experience-we preach Christ, the hope of the world. A Christian experience can only he known by one who is in Christ. Experience belps one to express what he is but does not make him anything else than what he is in nature. (illus-tree) The founders of religious may impart their teachings to others and gain a following but only Christ can implant His nature in the heart and grow a Christian.

Then the opposition argues another point saying that there is much good and truths to live by in all religions. No one will deny that there is a number of good svaings and admonitions given in all religious systems but we do say that there is no life in any or all of them together. All religions of the world can be traced to earnest men in the dawn of human history who made efforts to deal with the great problems of life, but they were men in life-themselves a part of the problem-but it was left for Christ to bring the answer. No religion founded by man has any saving power even though it be the expositor of some truths. Hinduism exalts the immanence of God in human life-teaching that God is never far away, even closer to us than our breathing-Buddhism declares the transitoriness of human life, that all seen things are but for the moment, that the unseen things are eternal. Confucianism asserts the sacredness of all human relations, the unity of that bond which relates us to the life of the past and all the life that is to be Munhammadanism came later to teach the soverignty of God but it has no conception of God's Fatherhood. In fact the men who founded the early systems did not even succeed in establishing a good religion for three great elements are necessary to guide life-namely-dependence upon a power-fellow lowship with a person-a progress in a work. The so-called religions never get beyond the first element. They all believe and teach the existence of a supreme being but they know nothing of fellowship with a divine person and growth in divine grace. Their religious heads are not able to supply their needs like Christ is able to supply ours. (I believe that if the founders of religions could speak from the dead-they would declare that except for Christ-there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.)

CHRISTIANITY IS DIFFERENT

Christianity is different from the religions of the world. Some think that Christianity is just another religion in the world for men to choose from among the many that exist. The big difference

is that religion is man searching and looking for God but Christian ity is God looking for men-I am come-says our Christ-to save that which was lost-Behold I stand at the door and knock-I am come that you might have life and life more abundantly. In religion man is blind and evanuot even recognize God when he sees Him but Christ gives light in a faith that is able to overcome the world. Men may compare religions but Christianity is separate and distinct. Muhammdanism is the religion of a book-Buddism is the religion of a method-Hinduism is the religion of a social system-Confucianism is the religion of a political philosophyyet Christinity includes all of these and more, not to make it Christianity, but because it is Christianity. Jesus never used the word religion in His ministry. He used the word faith and showed it to be living, personal relationship with God whereby men left off conforming to something to be transformed by something. The difference is that man makes and shapes religion but Christianity makes and shapes man. Christianity has a book-moral methods. social ideals—there is a Christian philosophy but we have these because we have Christ. A student asked an early Church Father what new thing did the Lord bring by His coming? The teacher answered-Know that He brought all newness in bringing us Himself. For Christianity is Christ and Christ is Christianity. It is the quest of God after human hearts-the love of God come down to seek men-the Father's own Son in the world as Shepherd seeking the sheep to bring them all home. Religion cannot do this but Christianity can. We have more than a book that teaches a message that proclaims and we only have these because we have a Christ who saves. He may not be seen outwardly ruling the whole world in righteousness today but His is the only name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved,

Christinaity's great work is the saving of the soul from death. The gospel is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth. Many good souls misunderstand gospel salvation and fall in the joy which salvation brings. A new Christian said that since he became a Christian things seemed to go wrong and he was somewhat discouraged. Christianity was pressing upon this man to adjust his life to the cross but he thought that something was going wrong. Nothing is wrong with Christinaity and great joy floods the soul when one knows that he is save to eternal life. We desire health-but it is not salvation from disease. We want wealthbut it is not salvation from poverty. We love friends, but it is not salvation from loneliness. We wish for every good thing-but it is not salvation unto ease and comfort. The only comfort in the cross we bear in salvation is in knowing whom we have believed and being confident that He is able to secure our souls against the day of judgment. When we know that then we can endure whatever comes; for the foundation of it all is a firm faith in God-

That kind of faith that will not shrink—thou pressed by every foe—That will not tremble on the brink—of any earthly woe—That will not murmur nor complain—Beneath the chastening rod—But in the hour of greif or pain—will lean upon its God. A faith that shines more bright and clear—When tempest rage without—That when in danger knows no fear—In darkness feels no doubt. Lord, give me such a faith as this; and then what-

e'er may come—I'll know while here hallowed bliss—Of my eternal home.

HISTORY OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION 1895-1905

Marvin C, Griffin, Historian

A new day dawned for Negro Baptists in America, when leaders from several National Baptist bodies, namely, the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, the American National Convention and the National Baptist Educational Convention, met in Montgomery, Alabama, the cradle of the confederacy in 1894. One year later, these three national groups merged and formed a new organization known as, the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America.

So it was, that during one of the darkest hours of our history that a new light began to shine, a light that has continued to shine more brightly with the coming of the years, penetrating the dense darkness of doubt and despair and ushering in the glorious glow of faith and hope. It is interesting to note the specifice features of the constitution adopted by he Convention in 1895.

PREAMBLE

Whereas, it is the consensus of the Colored Baptists of the United States of America, convened in the city of Atlanta, Georgia, September 28, 1895 in several organizations as the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of the United States of America, hitherto engaged in mission work on the West Coast of Africa and the American National Baptist Convention which has been engaged in mission work in the United States of America; and the National Baptist Educational Convention which has sought to look after the educational interest in the way that the Kingdom of God requires, ha he several bodies above named should, and do now, unite in one body. Therefore, we do now agree to and adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This body shall become known and styled, the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II

The object of this convention shall be to do mission work in the United States of America, in Africa, and elsewhere, and to foster education.

ARTICLE VI

Management

The Convention shall elect at each annual meeting a Foreign Mission, a Home Mission, and an Educational Board, consisting of fifteen members each. Each board shall have a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Corresponding Secretary with powers of general managers subject to rules and regulations of the Board. These officers and two others elected by the Board shall constitute the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II

All agents, missionaries, and corresponding secretaries employed by the Board of this Convention must be members of some regular Baptist church in union with the churches composing this convention. They must previous to their appointment, furnish satisfactory evidence of genuine piety, fervent zeal in the Master's cause, and talents which fit them for service for which they are to be employed.

There were three types of memberships: Representative — organizations; life — payment of 20.00; annual — payment of 1.00.

1 LAUNCHING OUT

The newly formed convention from the beginning was deeply concerned about the publication of religious literature. Some of the brethren felt so keenly about this matter, that they contended that the preamble of he Constitution should state that one of the purposes of the Convention was to provide literature for the Negro Baptist Churches.

It was not long before the new born babe was confronted with a serious sickness. The first controversy which threatened to disrupt the unity of the Convention occurred in 1896 when the Foreign Mission refused to obey the orders of the Convention

Headquarters of the Foreign Mission were established in Richmond, Virginia, having been located there through the missionary endeavors of the Foreign Mission Convention of the United States of America in 1880. Richmond remained the base for the foreign mission operation for fourteen years from 1880 to September 25, 1895 when the decision was made to move to Louisville, Kentucky in the annual

session of the National Baptist Convention at Friendship Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia.

At this time a new board was elected to promote the foreign mission program in its new location. Circumstances connected with the change of the Foreign Mission Board's headquarters from Richmond to Louisville gave rise to considerable dissatisfaction. The

new Board issued the following statement:

"We think it can be said truly that the change from Richmond to Louisville and election of a new board was without solicitation and against the desire of at least a majority of the new members, and should any of the old members of the Board or Convention feel aggrieved, the cause must be sought elsewhere than at our door . Your Board makes this statement because it came to them that the Richmond brethren were offended which appears to be true in their refusing to respond to either our letters or telegrams, or in turning over records, effects or anything in custody. To this date our Board has not received a singel communication from the brethren at Richmond, Va. . . Without deeds contracts, books or anything to guide except what most of the Convention knew, your Board entered upon its work . . Your Board recommends that the Convention authorize the incorporation of the Foreign Mission Board."

The Richmond group attempted to justify their action on the grounds of their relation to the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention which was dissolved in 1880, contending that this body was chartered and though the body was changed, they claimed that this did not modify the position of the Foreign Mission Board. This was the first major conflict which the National Baptist Convention faced Intense efforts were made to prevent these differences from hampering the cooperative venture of Negro Baptists in foreign missions and strenuous efforts were exerted to pre-

serve the unity of the Convention.

The first attempt to reconcile the dissident elements was made in 1896 in St. Louis, Missouri. At this session of the National Bap-

tist Convention, the following resolution was adopted:

"We, the members of the National Baptist Convention of the U.S.A., have been put in a very bad light before the Virginia Baptist State Convention, District Associations and Sunday School Convention, — so as to cause the brethren of the said organizations to feel that Virginia has not been fairly treated as co-laborers in Foreign Mission work.

Therefore, Resolve, that the Convention disavow any purpose or intention to separate that state in the Foreign Mission work of this Convention; and that this body solicit the aid of the brethren of the state of Virginia, as heretofore enjoyed by this body."

(Minutes 1896)

The air of controversy continued to mount and tensions increased between Virginia and the National Baptist Convention, until the breaking point occurred in 1897. That year the National Convention met in Boston. After the annual session the former members of the Foreign Mission Board (when it was located in Richmond) became the prime movers in organizing the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention.

Dr. E. C. Morris said in his annual message in 1898: "It was thought that the apparent differencies which existed be-

tween the ex-members of the Richmond Board had been satisfactorily settled when the chairman of the Louisville Board agreed at Boston to yield every point and accept whatever plan the Richmond brethren might suggest; and it was not known that a portion of the brethren were bent on splitting this Convention until after the meeting.

(Minutes, page 17, 1898)

"The two groups differed on their position on this relation of white and Negro Baptists. The Richmond group welcomed cooperation with Northern white Baptists on their own terms and became considered as the traditional opposers of Negro Sunday Schooliterature. The Richmond group accused the National Baptist Convention of intending to draw the color line and thereby create
prejudice among Negro Christians against white Christians." Dr
E. C. Morris emphatically stated in his annual address in 1898
that the charge of the Richmond brethren was without foundation.

Nevertheless, the Kingdom was divided. Brethren came to the parting of the ways. Abraham went one way, and Lot another—Only two years after its organization, the National Baptist Convention (1895-1897), this young body was tormented by differences

and torn by division which threatened its existence.

In 1899 the Virginia Baptist State Convention was organized through the leadership of the dissatisfied board members of the old Foreign Missiona Board, who organized the Lott Carey Convention. They proceeded further by organizing the General Association of Virginia which together with conventions in North Carolina and Maryland, became the main supporter of the Lott Carey Missionary Convention, and subsequelty the supporters of the Northern Baptist Home Mission Society of New York and the American Baptist Publication Society of Philadelphia, Penn. In spite of this division, the overwhelming majority of Negro Baptists remained with the National Baptist Convention, and persistent efforts were made to heal the wounds.

The Lott Carey Returned to the National in 1905
When it became clearly evident that the loyal friends and gradates of the Home Mission schools, and patrons of the American

uates of the Home Mission schools, and patrons of the American Baptist Publication Society could not be made to forsake the National Baptist Convention, the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention which was organized in 1897 came back and reunited with the National Baptist Convention at Chicago, III., in September, 1905.

Nearly all the states in the country were with the National Bapist Convention during the entire controversy. In 1903 Dr. R. H.

Boyd said in his Home Mission Board report:

"We have the hearty cooperation of every Negro Baptist State convention in the union, with two exceptions. One of the State Conventions of North Carolina and the General Association of Virginia have not yet seen their way clear to cooperate with us in Home Mission Work." (Minutes 1903. page 94)

Compact Belween National Baptist Convention and the Lott Carey
The leaders on both sides had been endeavoring to have the
Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention return to the National Convention ever since it went out. The Lott Carey made its first attempt
to return in 1903 and repeated it in 1904 and 1905. In 1905 at the
Chicago meeting of the National Baptist Convention "Dr. P. F. Mor-

ris was recognized to read the report of the Commission of the Lott Carey Convention and the National Baptist Convention of the U.S.A. Report as follows:

"Compact between the National Baptist Convention of the U.S.A..

and the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention.

"For a more perfect unification of Negro Baptist forces of the United States of America and for better promotion of Missions at home and abroad the following agreement was entered into:

1. For the present fiscal year, we favor the Lott Carey Convention maintaining its organic identiy in the capacity of a District Convention of the National Baptist Convention, under the following provisions, to which your Foreign Board and the Commissioners of the Lott Carey Convention have agreed, viz.:

(a) The Lott Carey Missionaries are to be enrolled as Missionaries of the National Baptist Convention for the present fiscal

(b) All present obligations, and such as may arise in this fiscal year within its jurisdiction, shall be such by the Lott Carey Convention.

(c) The receipts and expenditures of monies by its officers shall be reported regularly to the Foreign Board of the National Bap-

tist Convention.

(d) While we do not interfere with the local organizations in the several states, yet we venture to express the hope that the day will soon come when there will be only one state organization in each state, and it working in harmony with the National Baptist Convention.

(e) "And as the territory now occupied by the recently organized First District Convention or Lott Carey Convention, as district territory, we leave any matter of difficulty to be adjusted by them, and resepectfully suggest and recommend that all Baptist churches cordially and generously receive representatives of our national and district organizations who come with a view of advancing the denominational growth both at home and abroad.

(f) If at any time during the present Conventional year, representatives of either the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention or the Lott Carey District Convenion shall be in need of immediate funds for the maintenance of their respective financial obligations, mutual helpfulness shall obtain, and so far as possible the wishes of both organizations shall be respected.

(g) Upon the adoption of this preamble and agreement between the National Baptist Convention of the U.S.A., and the Lott Carey Convention herein affected, a consolidation between the two bodies is formed, and we pray that the Great Head of the Church may bless them both in this happy consummation."

Ours is a story of concord and confusion, conflict and cooperation-It is the story of marching blacks, fresh from the dark dungeons of despair, who left Egypt. in a hurry, bound for the Promised Land. It is the story of our struggle for survival in the midst of stress and strain, strife and schism. It is a story of a people who received a taste of freedom and could not rest until they shared it with their black brethren in Africa. These seeds of self determination sown at the dawn of the twentieth century, are bearing fruit today. We are determined to be free. Though we have been conceived and contained in slavery and segregation-we are determined to be free-free as a wandering breeze-free to worship as we please-We must be free. This our destiny in history. History decrees that we must be free. This is the focus of history. This is the fulfilment of the ages. History's God led us from 1840-1830-1895-1905 and to this present hour. He will lead us on. God has a goal for His people. We look to the end of history when the day of the Lord will come. In that day the last trumpet will sound. The angel of the Lord will place one foot on land, and the other on sea and declare time no longer to be. In that day the goal of our striving will be realized. Now our history is broken and scattered in countless fragments but in that day the God of history will gather the fragments together into one harmonious whole. In that day the great and the small, the strong and the weak shall come together. The wolf shall dwell with the lamb; the leopard will lie down with the kid and shall be made lom, every man shall sit under his wond vine and fiy tree. Every knee shall bow, In that day the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sae.

In that day Negro Baptists will march shoulder to shoulder with all the ransomed church of God. Looking forward to that day let us march with the prayer in our hearts and a song on our lips:

God of our weary years, God of our silent tears, Thou who hast brought us thus far on the way, Thou who has by thy might, led us into the light, Keep us forever in the path, we pray."

THE CHURCH

I WHY THE OLD TESTAMENT HAD NO CHURCH

The word church, meaning in the Greek origin an assembly called out by the magistrate or by the legitimate authority, is peculiar to the New Testament and is used to describe the inattution created by the Lord Jesus Christ. Of course Jehovah has had faithful servants from the beginning. But as we have seen, the only establishment in the Patriarchal Age was the home, and later the nation developed. While the Jewish economy was rebgious and renforced the family against apostasy, it was a state rather than a church It was the development or the fulfillment of the first promise of Abraham (Gen. 12:13), which was the earthly and temporal (Gal. 4:21:31); and though it had many types of what was to follow and rang with the prophesy of something better, it was of itself of this world. The church is not Jewish, but Christian, and therefore it is beyond the Old Testament. The Jews understood the symbolical meaning of the law of Moses nor the scriptural mes sage of their prophets And they expected their Messiah, by genius of organization and ability of leadership, and power of conquest to thruw off the Roman yoke that galled their necks and make their

IN WHY THE CHURCH COULD NOT EXIST UNTIL PENTECOST
The church is the actual beginning of the kingdom of heaven

on earth. The individual member is the unit fundamental to any institution, and it was impossible to establish the church till the perfect model for the members had been given. And nothing short of the sinless life of Jesus could serve as this pattern. Unlike other books, the Bible records the imperfections of its heroes, and only in Jesus Christ was its ideal reached. All its other characters are so set in their time that to follow them would mean to go back ward, which is impossible. But to respond to the leadership of Christ is to go forward in knowledge and life and to climb upward in hope and aspiration. Neither will it suffice merely to describe the divine standard by rules and commandments, as is seen in the failure of the law of Moses. Men must have the demonstration of the truth and the application of the law and the inspiration of the life to guide them. Moreover, there can be no kingdom without a king. Jesus had pre-eminence, but it was impossible for him to be a king in the flesh because the genius of his kingdom is spiritual. The only regalia He ever wore consisted of a scarlet robe and a crown of thorns and a reed forced upon Him in mockery. (Matt. 27:27:31) But after he had realized the very acme of human life and had conquered death, He set His throne in heaven and created His church on earth by sending His spirit into the hearts of the Twelve on the first Pentecost that followed His resurrection. Before that great and memorable day on which His church was born, neither the prophets (I Peter 1:10-11), nor the apostles (Acts 1:6), nor any other human being understood the real character of His kingdom. The church is the climax of God's plan for this world. It blesses and hallows the home (Eph. 6:1-9) and safeguards and glorifies the pation. It harks backward to primal instinct and forward to holy aspiration, rises above the prejudical or artificial, or the accidental in society, and gives the heart saneness and sweetness and breath for a great common brotherhood (Gal. 3:28).

III. THE COST OF THE IDEAL OF THE CHURCH.

But this glorious ideal, our most valuable heritage, came through awful sacrifice, the prophets who gave visions of it lost their lives, the Lord who illustrated its perfection was murdered, the apostles and many others who followed closely in the steps of the Master were slain by the perverse generations in the midst of whom they lived. But the Lord based His church so deeply in the eternal realm that the storms of time, can neither move nor shade it. He foreshadowed His foundation in the Old Testament and made His own personal ministry fundamental to His reign in the world. With John the Baptist, and the Twelve and the Seventy He cred out: "Repent for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." And He has purchased for us at the price of His own life that which is infinitely worthy of any sacrifice on our part.

The New Testament guides the church both by precept and by example. It is fortunate that we do not have to look forward to some imaginary congregation for our model, but back to the first church in Jerusalem. The apostles themselves were the nucleus of the first assembly of the saints; and it was perfect spiritually, as the first man was perfect physically. Here we find the things in which to continue—the abostles' teaching, fellowship, breaking of bread and prayer (Acts 2:42), the enthusiasm of love that puts earth-ty treasure at the call of the needy, the power of discipline, and the grace that transforms calamity into missionary endeavor, and secri-

fices life to extend the kingdom into new places. This church also had mighty power to save the lost in its own community. It won three thousand souls on the first day of its life, and the saved were added to it day by day (Acts 2:47). It had the unity for which the Lord prayed, and it reaped the harvest of His patient sowing.

The church is the mystical body of Christ (Eph. 1:22-23). Having shown men how to live, He gives His spirit to all that accept Him, that they may reproduce His life in the world. And everyone who has not His Spirit is alien to His kingdom, whatever His profession may be (Rom. 8:9).

IV. THE CHURCH IS FOR THE UNIVERSAL MANIFESTATION OF CHRIST

Surely humanity needs His personal touch, but He could not live always, nor again in the flesh. And when He was a man among men, He was limited by time to about thirty-three years and by space to the land of Canaan. But now that He is in heaven, He can manifest Himself whenever and where ever He has faithful disciples. And this is the primary purpose of the church. It is the duty of those who believe in Him, in every community, however small in number, to band themselves together, to create an atmosphere in which they can grow in His grace and knowledge (II Peter 3:18), and to develop power by the union of their strength, under the blessing of the Holy Spirit, to save the lost.

V. THE CHURCH PARALYZED BY NEGLECT AND SCHISM

Many a congregation is powerless because its members neglect the study of the word of God, the earnestness of prayer, the grace of giving, the culture of worship and the ministration of the gospel. They make no serious attempt to live like the Lord Jesus Christ. The spirit of the world dominates them. Besides, false doctrines have crept in, and the church has been rent assunder. Not satisfied with the simple faith of the New Testament, ambitious leaders have written their own formulation as creed. And the Lord Jesus Christ has been displaced in the name of His church that a method of an ordinance or a polity or a man might be honored. Thus confusion and strife are engendered in every place and the church is well nigh paralyzed.

VI THE ONLY CURE FOR THIS PARALYSIS

The only remedy for this deplorable condition is to burn the creed that men have written (they would give more light in conflagration" then they ever gave in "propagation"), or let them drop out of sight as relics of the troubled past, avoid sunscriptural teaching as the poison of Satan, let the New Testament interpret uself, have no test of church fellowship but the divine creed that Jesus the Christ, the Son of the living God, and obedience to him, and honor Him only in the name of His body. When primitive Christianity is restored in doctrine and in practice, the church will be efficient in the Lord's work where ever it exists, as it was originally in Jerusalem. It seems that the devil is trying to destroy the people of Christ according to His own principle that no kingdom can stand divided against itself. And that the church has survived the stagmand he shame of division is proof of its divinity. Only the great physician can save the paralyzed from death.

If the church will honor the Lord above all men, she shall yet recover her strength and vanish every enemy.

VII THE CHURCH ORGANIZED FOR CARE AND CONQUEST

The church is simply organized. Indeed it may exist without any organization at all. But the care of the members and the conquest of its territory require certain functions. The first church had the direct counsel of the apostles till its members acted on the legions surrounded Jerusalem and threatened to destroy all its in advice of the Master and fled to save their lives when the Roman habitants. The twelve themselves served this church "in prayer" and in the ministry of the Word. (Acts 6:1-6) And when the neces sity arose for a different kind of service, disposing the bounty of the church to those in need, the apostles refused to neglect their peculiar work and the most important service of the church for which nobody else was qualified at that time, called the congregation together and advised that seven competent brethren be se lected whom they might appoint over that business. And the brethren who serve the church in this, or similar capacity, are commonly called deacons (Phil. 1:1, 1 Tim. 3:8-13); while those who look after the spiritual interests of the church are designated as elders I Tim. 5:17, I Peter 5:14), bishops (Acts 20:28), pastors (Eph. 4:11), teachers (I Cor. 12:28, I Tim. 5:17) or ministers (I Cor. 3:5); and those who like Timothy and Titus, "set in order the things that are wanting," and preach the gospel to sinners, are termed evangelists (Eph. 4:1) and this plain organization is purely congregational and articulates with the simple needs of the church, which are to develop the (?) and save the lost. The New Testament knows no ecclesiastical authority aside from Christ and His apostles, under whom each church is supreme in its own affairs. But office is not at all essential to service. Every member of the church should be the servant of his brethren, and the savior of sinners. All must help in the finances of the church, visit the sick, encourage the weak, stir up the negligent, bless the faithful, attend the regular sessions and preach the gospel both by word of mouth and act of life. There is much that the good women can do, and they are quick to do it in every congregation. In these modern days we have the Bible School, in which every teacher is a pastor of the class.

VIII. THE PROPER DIVISION OF LABOR

The chief function of him who is called pastor or minister is to "labor in the Word and in teaching" (I Tim. 5:17); and no church can make its preacher "serve tables" or load him down with all the business affairs of the congregation, or deprive him of sufficient time for study, meditation and prayer, without working irreparable injury to its own life. The congestion in one man of responsibility for the work of the officers and the members of the church has made many a poor preacher and many a sorry congregation. There is one standard of life for all Christians, which is detailed for bish ops and deacons to make them models for the other members of the church (I Tim. 3:1-12). And it is obligatory on every one who accepts Christ to serve Him with his best gifts, whether they be to preach, or to minister, or to teach, or to exhort, or to give, or to rule, or to show mercy (Rom. 12:38).

IX. THE SAVED ARE BORN, NOT JOINED INTO THE CHURCH

The church is the Mother of all living. Christ reaches sinners with the gospel through the church. And every one that hears and believes and obeys the gospel is saved, and the Lord adds him to the church (Acts 2:47). The terms of pardon—faith in Jesus as the Son of God (Acts 16:31-33), repentance of sin (Acts 2:38), confession of the Christ (Matt. 20:32-33; Rom. 10:9-10), and baptism (Acts 2:38; 22:16 - are also the conditions of admission into the church. The process by which he becomes a member of the Church of Christ is one and the same (Rom. 15:7). People do not join the church. They obey the gospel and the Lord sets them in the body (I Cor. 12:18). We "join the church" only in the sense of identifying ourselves with an organized body of believers, and this every Christian should be glad to do. The Church, therefore, includes all Christians, or penitent believers, in Jesus Christ. But the church is changed with the responsibility of the Great Commission, which passes from generation to generation (II Tim. 2:2), and is love sinners as Jesus did and bring them to Him and to say that any can be saved without the church is to say one can be born without a mother. Yet no church can bring forth spiritual children save by travail of soul on the part of its members (Isa. 66:7-8).

X THE GLORIOUS SERVICE OF THE CHURCH

The church also protects nations, preserves society, creates civilization and makes communities fit places in which to live. He is an unworthy citizen who withholds support, or gives meagerly or niggardly to the church, and more as if he is wealthy or owns property; and it might open his eyes and break his heart if the good influences of the church could be withdrawn long enough for his possessions to deteriorate in value. The church is the Army of God. But like her great Captain, she fights only sin and the devil and sacrifices herself to save the world. To the church Jesus bequeathed His fountain of Benevolence for distribution to all men. without money and without price. And the fraternal orders that have grown up in her shadow, or thrived in her atmosphere, or symptoms of a confused age, and that limit their beneficence, to their own narrow circles, shall cease to be. But the church shall continue forever. The church is the only organization that has the virility to live and to grow by freewill offerings. And like her Lord, she is no respector of persons, but ready to bless and to serve all. The church is the most wonderful of institutions. It reaches back in its foundation, to the prophets, and to the spostles and Jesus Christ is its cornerstone (Eph 2.19-22; Luke 20:17), and it is built upon the solid rock of eternal truth,

XI. THE DOCTRINE AND THE OPERATIONS OF THE CHURCH

Anxious to conserve its doctrine, which is neither old nor new, but timeless, and not always able to disengage its authoritative teaching from the circumstances in which it originated, the church has not been equal to the world in the wisdom of its operations.

Yet the church has succeeded marvelously in spite of the dull instruments and clumsy apparatus with which it has done its work. The reluctance to allow splendid musical instruments in the public worship because the world used then has been overcome.

It cannot but deepen the impression and heighten the effect to reach the mind and heart through both the eye and ear. With up-to-date methods and adequate publicity such as Jesus used to get the attention of the people (Luke 10:1), the church can greatly multiply. What we need is not more machinery but more life. Jesus was an inspirer rather than an organizer. Let the church publish His Glory and Joy, and conquer the world in His name.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION OF SOCIAL JUSTICE

Bro. President, messengers of the National Baptist Convention of America, since we met a year ago we have observed the growing impact of the civil right revolution that is in process throughout our nation. In some sections of our nation the explosive and violent nature of this civil rights revolution has brought suffering and death to both black and whit ectitizens. No section of our nation has remained unaffected by the moral impact of this civil rights revolution. Our nation is giving birth to new patterns in race relations. We are in the process of creating a new image of American democracy. Although the civil rights revolution has uncovered enemies of the Negro who occupy high places, we have also observed on the front lines of this civil rights battle, new friends. The centennial of the emancipation of the Negro has recorded events that are signs of the beginning of a new day, not only for Negro Americans, but for all Americans.

The urgent demands of this hour call for the most prayerful consideration on the part of men and women who are committed to the Christian faith and the leadership of Baptist churches throughout this nation. We are required to reflect in our leadership the ability to guide the social forces now expressed in a variety of ways toward the fulfillment of that objective that has been, from the beginning, the concern of the mission and message of the church. The events that have taken place in the civil rights revolution are not secondary, but are of primary significance. We are beholding a "new thing" that could not have been predicted nor started by the most capable leadership As the account of Jeremiah tells us, God is doing a new thing. We cannot but declare that God is at work in our nation. God has heard the cries of his children and has come down to deliver them.

The central issue in this civil rights revolution is justice. In a recent speech by President Kennedy, he made it clear how the Negro is compelled to live in America. "The Negro haby born in America today, regardless of the section or the state in which he is born, has about one-half as much chance of completing high school as a white baby, born in the same place, on the same day; one-third as much chance of becoming a professional man; twice as much chance of becoming unemployed; about one-seventh as much chance of earning \$10,000 a year; a life expectancy which is seven years shorter and the prospects of earning only half as much." The label of a Negro is the label of a condition as well as a race. This condition can not, and must not continue to erist in our nation. We are called in the name of justice to assume responsibility for the elimination of these conditions in our nation.

Let every man understand that the civil rights revolution is dealing with issues that can be identified in the daily life of the Negro citizen. Here are the hard facts. It is reported that in 1947 the unemployment rate for whites was 3.3 per cent, for non-whites 55.4 per cent. In 1963 the relative rates are 5.8 for whites, 11.7 for non-whites. In 1948, the median family income for non-whites was \$1,788, or 53.4 per cent of the median income for non-white was which was \$3,310. In 1961, the median income for non-white families was \$3,191, and remains at 53.4 per cent of the median income for white families, which the families, \$5,981. Should we examine the employment and earning pattern of white and non-whites we would discover that non-whites are concentrated in the low paid occupations; non-whites earn less than whites with the same schooling, non-whites are paid less when they do the same work as whites. These are the hard tangible facts of our nation that serves to feed the unrest of the Negro. Apart from these tangibles are the many intangibles that can be associated with the civil rights revolution.

In consideration of the events associated with the "tragic fact of racial prejudice, discrimination and segregation in our society," the National Council of Churches, the Synagogue Council of America, and the National Catholic Welfare Conference served as conveners of the National Conference on Religion and Race." The Na tional Conference on Religion and Race represents, for the first time in the United States, the formal cooperation of our major faith bodies on a common moral and social problem. This meeting which was called January 14-17, 1963 for Chicago, Illinois was a historic meeting. The meeting in session was composed of 657 delegates with 500 observers. The purpose of the conference was to "examine the role of religious institutions in race relations, and then move on to propose and inspire renewed action, and interreligious projects to increase the leadership of religion in ending racial discrimination in the United States." It is the opinion of your chairman that this meeting has provided a national climate in which there is being ex pressed a more militant concern on the part of religious leadership in the problem of race in our nation. We were happy to have had the opportunity as chairman of the Commission on Social Justice to participate in this meeting. Let us pray for the religious organiza-

There is a great need to recognize the theological implications of race relations. There has been a reluctance on the part of churches throughout this nation to regard the oppressive measures of segregation, as sin. Many church laymen as well as ministers have taken public positions as segregationist without understanding their position as being in conflict with the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. Many prominent leaders in the church have maintained their positions and prestige while advocating the violation of human rights so clearly reflected in the pattern of race segregation as practiced in our nation.

In response to the urgent demand for a remedy to the "rising tide of discontent" President Kennedy has proposed Federal legislative action it is reported that the program set forth by President Kenn dy has the e man provide.

(1) A guarantee of equal access to all public facilities—hotels,

rectaurants, retail stores and the like.

(2) Authority for the Attorney General to sue against school segregation when those affected make written complaint and cannot afford the expense of suing or fear reprisals. President law al-

lows such intervention only in cases involving voting rights.

(3) A broad attack on job discrimination, including \$400,000,000 in new money for vocational and literacy training and intensified

effort to eliminate discrimination by Federal contractors. It is apparent to all who have followed the action of our Congress, in issues of civil rights, that the proposals of the President will be met by a Southern Filibuster. Those who have achieved their positions in the Congress as the product of segregation will do all in their power to maintain segregation and the injustice that accompany it. There must be an awareness on the part of every friend of freedom, that the welfare of our country is being threatened by the irresponsible action of Southern congressmen to kill or weaken civil rights legislation proposed by President Kennedy. We must not

be caught in the trap of voluntary integration programs at the expense of legal action.

It is apparent to any observer of the events taking place in our nation in response to the issues of civil rights that we are engaged in an effort that will require tireless devotion to the cause of justice and human rights. The mass march on Washington, D.C. that occured on August 28th cannot be regarded as the climax of a long journey, but must be viewed as a point of renewal, as a fellowship of witnesses, as a sign of commitment and dedication. We must be prepared, in the future, to reflect in our actions, new demensions of thought and courage, for the nearer we get to our goal of freedom-the greater the resistance. We cannot compromise the future of our children with the acceptance of minor changes that fail to open the door to full and first class citizenship in our nation. Our cause is a just cause. We are simply calling upon America to be America. Our action affirms the fact that the American Negro has embraced the American dream.

The events that engage our interest are calling us to specific tasks. We recognized that one of the important jobs that we must perform is that of increased voter registration on the part of Negro citizens. Special consideration for voter registration must be given to the South. It can be noted that the per cent of registered Negroes

of voting age in eleven Southern states is as follows:

Effective work in the area of voter registration is being carried out by the Voter Education project. The Voter Education Project carries on its work in the eleven southern states, and serves primarily as a research program designed to develop educational programs which will be most effective in providing voters with the knowledge and will to register. The progress that has been made by those who are active in this work has met, in some areas, stubborn resistance. This task must be performed and the experience of the past teaches us that full time leadership is especially needed in this area.

We would like at this point to make the following recommendations in reference to the issues presented:

(1) We recommend that the members of the National Baptist Convention of America address their senators and representatives with the interest of their community in the passage of civil rights legislation and of our concern for job opportunities for all Ameri-

(2) We further recommend that a telegram carring the signa ture of the President of the National Baptist Convention of America be addressed to President Kennedy commending him for his leader

ship in the area of civil rights.

(3) We urge the support of the Voter Education Project and recommend that the members of the National Baptist Convention of America observe the month of January in raising funds to assist in work of voter registration, in cooperation with the leadership of fered by the Commission on Social Justice of the National Baptist Convention.

(4) May we further recommend that the National Baptist Convention of America assembled in the 83rd Annual Session in Dallas. Texas go on record, commending the efforts of Negroes and whites. both in the North and the South, who have exposed both life and property to violent attacks for their courageous effort in behalf of freedom and first class citizenship for the American Negro.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dallas, Texas

September 4, 1963

To the Official Staff and entire Personnel of our Convention, Delegates, Friends and Visitors.

As I look shout you, I get a retrospective view of our beginning and it should be significant to those of you who have come across the years, and witnessed all the ups and downs. I thank God for all of you who helped in make this an autstanding organization. It is now serving as a Beacon Light in every hamlet, village and

Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great could of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, let run with patience the race that is sel before us, looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith. who for the joy that was set before Him, endured the cross, de spising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of

I thank God, whom I serve from my forefathers with pure conscience that without ceasing. I have remembered of thee in my

prayers night and day.

The world's imagination is gripped today by the frontiers of outer space, the new physical realm opening before our scientists and astronauts. However, each of us individually faces another from tier, the unchartered realm of our explored and undeveloped spirit ual faculties. Long ago Abram stood at the frontier of Canaan, the Promised Land and God said to him; Get thee out of thy country From this we will speak to you briefly on "CHRIST CALLS US

unto the land that I will show thee and I will bless thee.

TO SERVE OUTSIDE THE WALLS." That means from the door steps of the church, wherever the Spirit directs, for He is the Lord

of all life.

God's act of salvation is wrought by Christ and He finished His work outside the walls. The servant is not above His master. In order to receive redemption, we must go where He went outside the

walls. Men build all kinds of walls hoping to guarantee security, and every one of them can bring destruction. A man builds the good walls of his home to shelter tender human love, to shield his child from the wounds of cruelty. But if a youth never breaks out of these walls, love turns to bitterness his home becomes his prison. Him builds good walls to safeguard his standard of living; Tariff walls exclusive-market walls, immigration walls, and these become the hattle lines of history

The invisible walls of a racially exclusive neighborhood door our children to one class life, sectional hatred, and finally, together conflict. The walls of the church which shelter some, tragically shut out others. Most good walls that men build for protection be come evil walls, sealing destruction. This the impass of sin. Man's instinct for self preservation is twisted until it becomes self-de struction. Not only do our "good walls" become evil; once they are built, we cannot break out.

Even Paul was trapped within this wall. For the good that I would, I do not . . and that evil that I would not, that I do. "O wretched man that I am, who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" But Paul had a Savior-I thank God through Jesus brought near in the blood of Christ, reconciling the world mut Christ, our Lord. And now, we, who were once afar off, have been Himself. The essence of reconcilation is to break the walls.

Here is the picture: A home becomes a prison (a woman look ing out of the window), children peeping out the door, immigrants going hither and thither, trying to find some place to live: the ghet to conflict, a group seeking the constitutional rights as a cities: then the church has closed its doors, a man sitting outside and no body says enter.

Christ made reconciliation real. Christ broke through the walls of narrow family exclusiveness. The message came to Him that your kindreds are in search of Thee. He said discreetly: "My mother and brothers are those who hear the word of God and act. Christ breached the wall of religious exclusiveness for He was a friends of ax-gathers and sinners.

Christ destroyed those impersonal walls created by the societies of man and the circumstances of life . . . the walls of hunger and want. "As ye did it to the least of my brethren you did it to me. Christ tore down the walls of personal sin and moral break

down, our sins are forgiven you,

RAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We must take the message outside the walls of the churches to the people on the door-steps. We urge you to moblize and organize yourselves for the work outside. Build on the man in the pew. not on the man in the pulpit. One minister said, that the church where Charles Spurgeon, one of the greatest preachers of his age, addressed 10,000 people every 75 years ago, but when this man visited this same church sometime ago they only had 20 members at service. A church can die, Christian witness can die and a Christian civilization can die declared the preacher.

Women. I admonish you in the name of the Christ to go outside the walls of the church and render service for the master. Don't think in terms of dollars and cents, but the saving of souls is

our supreme task.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IS COSTLY

Nine billion dollars will be spent annually in the United States 1970 on college education. In the future everyone who expects

to amount to anything will need more education.

What does education cost? Very few schools will enroll students for \$1,000.00 a year; the average cost \$1,600.00. Of course by 1965 this will be doubled. But you must quit your employment in order to take advantage of the opportunity. The trick seems to be, quit your work and increase your indebtedness by going to college. If you missed your education when you were young, this problem of expensive education becomes great.

Many feel they are called into Christian work, but Christian work requires specialized education. Some answer the call without education and God is a wonderful belper, but only a few of these succeeds. More often they are unable to cope with the problems, and begin to blame God for their own failure and cannot stick out. They do not produce souls. Any Christian worker who can pass the su preme test of producing converts to Jesus Christ will be outstanding on any field. He will be very obvious. He will stand out like a sore thumb.

Those of you who are aspiring to work at Home or on Foreign Field prepare yourself spiritually, intellectually with spectalization that you will be able to cope with today's needs.

INTO TOMORROW

One beautiful afternoon seated on the shore of Green Lake watching the turbelent waves on the rippling waters, I tried to envision the future of our great convention. I ran every wom n worshipping, working and witnessing. Our mendous, but we must not become complacent, thinking our job is finished, for I am here to tell you that it has just begun.

I made several visits this year and made a close observation of the work. The fields are really ripe and ready for harvest, but the laborers are few. There was nothing to be seen that we could point to with pride of what we are doing. Nothing concrete. We are majoring in fine programs and all that goes with it. We are missing the

We are in the fields of Missions, Christian Education and Juvenile Delinquency. Why can't we broaden our horizon in these three

I envision Mission Centers, Homes for delinquent boys and girls and the skidrow, convelancent homes for the aged and the building completed in Panama, Christian Education Classes. All of this being done under the auspicies of the Junior Women's Convention.

The future beckons us to reach out and go forward. This ensuing year can be the greatest if we would only see the purpose for which we were organized. Let us stop joyfully, with hope and high courage with a deeper dedication to the cause of world's mis-

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend that the Regional Conference would set up Evangelistic Services outside of the walls. Appoint efficient work. ers to conduct work shops. Encourage participation, good singing and good teaching.

In view of the fact, we are embracing a new look, I further, recommend a committee be appointed to work out a new system of finance in our convention

Our Field Workers' set up have become out molded. I recomn end a change.

CLOSING

Behind the face of a clock are the WORKS, the mechanics, or WORKS, and the wheels cannot do the job alone, the structure of the wheels that make it run. Behind the FACE of our organization we also, find the mechanics or WORKS, and the wheels that make them run. You are here today because you are a "wheel" in some women's society. You are a 'wheel' not to RUN the society, but to help make it run. Because a wheel cannot do the job alone, the structure of our societies includes five divisions, and requires the dedicated cooperative work of the wheels in each division to keep the mechanics in good running order. We need the best efforts in every area of work to keep us 'ticking.' One little part not doing its job, can slow us down and keep us from fulfilling our purpose.

The parts of a clock must be kept clean, well offed, unbroken

and in good repair. This is largely the responsibility of the President. Christ is our MAIN SPRING and Prayer, our BALANCE WHEEL. This is something that we as Presidents and Circle Chairmen must keep uppermost in our minds and hearts. In order to do our best in leading other women, we must grow in personal devotion to Him. Last year we had LOVE as our theme. I wonder what we really did with Love. It is not something we can turn off and on from one year to the next as we change our themes. We need more love this year if were to "Crown Him Lord of All," in all areas of our lives. As leaders in our women's work, we need most of all to Love, to experience Christ's love in our lives, to live close

Some of the early clock makers were much more interested in to Him, and only thencan we lead others to Him. making complicated clocks that moved figures and performed other tasks than TELLING TIME. Is this ever true in our women's Societies? What are some of the other tasks that may steal into a well piled Women's Society? Just as a clock needs regular and thorough cleaning, so do we, in our societies need to take a new look, make a re-evaluation of our motives as they relate to our purpose, and we

as presidents are responsible for this.

Another 'weighty' concern of many presidents is that we spare too much time in our division and committee meeting. We are overburdened with plans and details to carry out these plans. Many of us can't find time to put our plans into action. How many of us have said, "I spend most of my time at church?" We must not be guilty of keeping Christ inside the walls of our churches. Christ in His Great-Commission, did not say, "Go down to the corner of State and Main St. and preach to the people inside of the First Baptist Church." He said, "Go ye into all the world"—into all areas of tife. We do need organization to carry out this commission, but we must avoid being over-organized, being too busy with business. We must not be in such a haste to get to a publicity committee meeting at Jane's house that we haven't time to show Love to our neighbor who is ill, or the rejected child on the street corner. Our "Works" are important only as they led us to ACTION.

What time is it? We live in a world of tension and greed, of bate and fear, a world of satelites, of atomic and nuclear experiment Christ came into this world to set us free to LOVE. His coming changed the balance of power between love and hate. Love and

Power to change lives.

What time is it? It is time for the Junior Women to awaken, to remind themselves that their "Priceless Heirloom" will remain a precious treasure only to the degree that dedicated officers and chairmen work together to make it TICK, to fulfill its purpose to TELL God's Love.

Perhaps you have noticed by now that something is wrong with our clock (Clock should not be running) it looks good,—its face. its work, its hands are all apparently in good running order—BUT IT JUST STANDS THERE, PROUDLY ON ITS OWN, and that's just the trouble.

No clock can stand proudly on its own, Every clock is dependent on something or something bigger and beyond itself to wind

it up, or plug it in, to start it going, and keep it running.

In these times of changes, many leaders are instinctively sens ing something is wrong. That something is missing in our women's work. We are concerned deeply concerned, While we've been persueing and persued by the job—encouraged and discouraged, overwhelmed with machinery and disheartened with results, always analyzing and reanalyzing, we've concluded that our set-up is just about perfect, our organization, methods and helps from the Nation al leave nothing to be desired. Our methods and Mechanics are

But just as Philosophy, intelligence, and Liberal Culture could not save Greece and Rome from a downward plunge. Methods and

Mechanics cannot save our Women's work.

Yet it is in this realm that we live too much of the time. We are striving outward growth and perfection in organization, often overlooking the fact that what we really need is simplicity, calm-

ness and warmth of bearing that stem from being close to Jesus. We are like the clock-standing proudly on our own-forgetting that we are wholly dependent on another, and that we just can't run without Him.

Samuel Shoemaker says, 'What we are feeling for, imagining, longing for, really praying for is a world wide awakening under the power of the Holy Spirit. This alone would be great enough to meet our needs, to use our resources and incorporate our little personal store of faith in a movement greater than anything the world has ever seen. I can not but believe that this is what God would like to send upon us. The lack must lie, not in his intentions but in our vision, dedication and passion. If more of us really cared

and prayed, This just might happen.
Once China built a wall. She lived behind it laughing at her cnemies. She felt secure. But soon an invader came from the north, and three times China found the enemy within her walls. The enemy did not storm the walls, nor encompass them, nor break them down The enemy just bribed the Gatekeepers:

We women are the gatekeepers of spiritual values, and we know it. There is no decline in the ethics, integrity and morals of a na-tion as long as the women keep the gates; and just so there is no decline in the content, and effectiveness of service within the Chris tian Church as long as its women keep the gates, and are then selves dedicated Channels of the HOLY SPIRIT. Have we leaders been bribed by the Infinitestimal? ARE WE TRYING TO STAND PROUDLY ON OUR OWN? WE KNOW THAT WE ARE UTTERLY DEPENDENT ON HIM. We know that the need for our women's work is an awakening under the power of the Holy Spirit.

We know that there must be full surrender, and obedience to his word Sacrificial Giving and Forgiving.

What we DON'T know, is that we've got to talk about these hings, emphasize them, and share them as did the early church. in our meetings with counterparts, at conferences, Sharing our Great Need of Him Together, confessing our sins and weaknesses one to another-sharing problems, anxieties, seeking His solution.

In groups together, convenating renewed Dedication to Him. Silently praying each in her own heart, but united in our plea for a visitation of the Holy Spirit upon our women and our work.

This was the secret of the early church—and there is no other

way out of the stalemate that exists.

This could be our secret also. If more of us really cared and prayed, things will happen. Our clock must be kept running by the Creator.

The president, Dr. M. A. B. Fuller of Austin, Texas was present

The president, Dr. M. A. B. Fuller of Austin, Texas was present and called the session to order promptly at 9:00 o'clock. Vice President Anna Washington of Indianapolis, indiana, presiding. The music department led the devotion, Sisters Emma Glover of Chicago. Illinois and Lettie G. Erby of Texas. The missionary study course teacher, Sister P. M. Thomas of Birmingham, Alabama, presented the closing chapter of the book, "The Larger Stewardship by Charles A Cochi

A. Cook. The general theme of the convention "New Frontiers with Christ The general theme of the convention "New Frontiers with Christ Front" was presented by Sister Helen Martin of Louisville, Kentucky. She used for the scripture basis Hebrews 7:25. This was followed by a Symposium: "The Mission of the Church: In the District, State and Nation." Sister Emma Glover, Chicago, Hilinois, T. G. Slaughter, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; J. L. Brædley, Birmingham. Alabama. Presented these answers, What the Mission of the Church is; How it is to be carried out; and by whom. The speakers reminded us of the Urgency of the mission, the weight of it's responsibility, and the extended field of operation. The closing thought, Man's importance in the promotion of world mission. Erby directing, Gladys White Davis of Baitimore, Md. at the organ, hymns used: "Glory to His name," "Blessed be the name of the Lord," "Steal away to Jesus." This being host night, President Fuller presented the presidents of the Texas conventions. Sisters P. S. Wilkerson, president of American Baptist state convention of Texas and O. S. Barnes, president of General Baptist Convention of Texas Women's Auxiliary President of General

Baptist Convention of Texas Woman's Auxiliary.

"God has the Key," was read by Sister P. S. Wilkerson, following this a musical reading, "A sinner like me," a trio, "The love of God." Sister O. S. Barnes presented Sister Agnes Foster, who read "Texas on the March"; solo "Sunrise Tomorrow" was sung by Sister Taylor of San Antonio, Texas. These numbers were dedicated to President Fuller. The welcome march was led by the two Texas state presidents.

President called for reports of all groups and committees: The Bible Bands, District, and Foreign Mission Councils reported. The committee on permanent organization was appointed; Sister Edna Heatly of Louislana spoke to the convention, subject "The Key to Christianity." Following this, the Art department reported. First award for finance, Kentucky. Second award for greatest number of pieces, California. This award for neatest sewing. California. Fourth award for neatest Crochet, California.

CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST NURSES AUXILIARY CORPS CONVETION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the National Baptist Convention of America Nurses Corps do unite ourselves together for the purpose of attend-ing the sick at the Convention and wherever we are needed regard-less to mankind, color, or creed. And shall to the best of our ability prove worthy to our Profession, therefore we adopt this Constitu-

ARTICLE I-NAME This body shall be known as the National Baptist Nurses Corps Convention of America.

ARTICLE II—OUR MOTTO

A Good Nurse Is God's Love on Display.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Membership shall consist of Individuals, District, General Associations and State Conventions. If there's an Order of Nurses Organizations within a State which has no General Association or State Convention neonnected with this Convention, this Order of Representives from this Organization shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that

Section 2. The following qualified persons may become members: namely RN, LPN, LVN, PN, Nurses Aides and Red Cross

* Section 3. Any nurse in good and regular standing with their church may become a member by enrolling with the sum of one (II.00) dollar.

Section 4. Each local church shall pay ten (\$10.00) dollars for representation and entitled to five (5) messengers,

Section 5. Each District Association shall pay twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars and entitled to five (5) messengers. Section 6. Each State Convention and General Association

shall pay fifty \$50.00) dollars and entitled to ten (10) messengers, and five (\$5.00) dollars for each additional messenger.

Section 7. All officers shall pay five (\$5.00) dollars annually. Section 8. Annually Individual Membership shall be one (\$1.00)

ARTICLE IV-FINANCE

All finances received by the Nurses Corps shall be turned over to the Parent Body along with their expense sheet. ARTICLE V-OFFICERS

The Officers of the Auxiliary Corps shall be President, First Vice; Second Vice; Third Vice Presidents; Recording Secretary; Assistance Recorder; Treasurer; Chaptain; National Instructor; Na. tional Chorister, National Historian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified

ARTICLE VI-DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS Section 1. The President. She shall be the presiding officer. Appoint, or cause to be Appointed all committees and commis-

sions not elected by the body

Section 2. First Vice President. At the request of the President, or in case of resignation; death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the First Vice President shall fill that position.

Section 3. The Second Vice President. She shall perform the duties that are carried out by the President or First Vice Presi

dent when necessary.

Section 4. The Third Vice President. She shall perform the duties that are carried out by the President, First Vice President,

Second Vice President when necessity demands.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary, This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all proceedings of the Auxiliary in Session, compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are counter signed by the President and make a report to this Body annually.

Section 6. The Assistance Recording Secretary. This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annually meetings and do whatever the Body may require through

the Recording Secretary.

the Auxiliary. Being carefully to give correct data of to whom events and ideas derived. Keep record of same for the benefit of said Auxiliary. And be able to issue any information when re-
