HISTORICAL REFERENCE

April 5, 1886, an open letter to the Baptist Clergy and laymen was issued by the Rev. Wm. J. Simmons in the American Baptist asking if we should have a National Baptist Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denomination. At that time the following reasons were given

1. To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of

2. To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the Denomination

3. To encourage our literary men and women and to promote the interest of Baptist literature.

4. To discuss questions pertaining to especially the religious educational industrial and social interest of our people

5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard.

6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the Denomination.

Having been solicited to write the call by many whose names and endorsement are hereunto affixed, the Call is hereby made by their advice and solicitations for said Convention to meet in St. Louis, Missouri, August 25, 1886, 10 o'clock a.m. in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangement with power to select his associates. Wm H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. A. H. Cole, 2066 Goode Avenue. St. Louis, are hereby requested to serve as a committee on transportation

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Foreign Mission Baptist Convention of the United States of America, The American National Baptist Convention and the Baptist National Educational Convention; in order to form a more perfect United National Baptist Organization, to secure the blessings of unity for capable and efficient Foreign Mission. Home Mission and Educational work among ourselves and throughout of the world; do ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE 1. NAME: This Body shall be known as "The National Baptist Convention of America

ARTICLE 2-NATURE AND FUNCTION

SECTION 1. The National Baptist Convention of America shall serve as an Agency of Christian Education, Missionary and Church Extension; and combine the efforts of Baptist Churches and Organi zations in extending the gospel both at home and to the Foreign fields; and propagate Baptist Doctrines of faith and distinctive principles throughout the world.

SECTION 2. It shall give its influence in maintaining and safeguarding full religious liberty and spiritual independence on hoth

the home and the foreign fields

ARTICLE 3-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The membership of this Convention small be annual Orthodox Baptist Churches, District Associations, General Associations and State Conventions.

SECTION 2. Each Church shall register with One Dollar (\$1.00) per member, (minimum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) representation fee in this Convention), and be entitled to one messenger. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional mess nger

SECTION 3. Each District Association shall pay Fifty Dollars (50.00) for representation and be entitled to two (2) messengers Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

SECTION 4. Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for representation and the enlitled to five (5) messengers. Ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger

ARTICLE 4-OFFICERS

The officers of this Convention shall be President First Vice (14)

President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries; Corresponding Secretary: Statistical Secretary; Treasurer: Auditor; Director of Public Relations; Historian; and Secretary of Youth Activities. Each officer shall be elected annually.

The President of each State Conventon and Moderator of each General Association holding membership in this Convention shall

be Associate Vice-Presidents.

ARTICLE 5-ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The committee on the nomination of Officers shall be appointed by the President, and make its report following the report of Officers not later than the Friday afternoon session. SECTION 2. The election of Officers shall be made by roll call

SECTION 3. The time for election in each annual session shall be set by the Executive Board and listed in the printed program. SECTION 4. Only registered messengers shall have the privilege of voting in the election of officers in the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 5. In no case shall an officer be eligible for reelection

prior to his submission of an annual report from his office

ARTICLE 6-EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and Corresponding Secretaries of the Board, and the Presidents of the State Conventions.

SECTION 2. The elected Officers of the Convention shall be reimbursed for their travel expense to the Executive Board Meetings.

ARTICLE 7—FUNCTION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall transact the unfinished business of the Convention in the interims.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall arrange regional meet-

ings and conferences as may be deemed necessary

SECTION 3. If any chosen site for the annual session is found to be unsatisfactory, the Executive Board under the direction of the President shall select the place for the next annual session of the Convention to meet elsewhere.

ARTICLE 8-DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The President: He shall be the presiding officer; authorize the calling of all regular and special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the treasurer; appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body; and he shall be the chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION 2. The First Vice President: At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said officer, the Vice

President shall fill the office of the President.

SECTION 3. Second Vice President: He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice President as needs require.

SECTION 4. The Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session: compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards; draw all drafts on the treasurer; (all drafts must be signed by the President) He shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 5. The First Assistant Recording Secretary: The Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the Annual meetings and do whatever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 6. The Second Assistant Recording Secretary. This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do what ever is required through the Recording Secretary.

through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 7. The Third Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention and do whatever else required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 8. The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Claims and Accounts and do whatever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 9. The Corresponding Secretary The Corresponding Secretary shall do all the Convention and Executive Board correspondance, as directed by the Convention through its President He shall make an annual report to the Convention

shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 10. The Statistical Secretary: This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and Baptist generally and report the same Annually.

SECTION 11. The Treasurer: He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention or the President. He shall keep his records so as to preserve perpetually for reference and report annually regists and disburser ans

SECTION 12. Auditor: He shall audit all records of the Board and the Treasurer of the Convention; each of which shall be examined at least Thirty Days (30) prior to the Annual session.

SECTION 13. Director of Public Relations: The Director of Public Relations shall give publicity to all of the aims and objectives of the National Convention and its Auxiliaries.

SECTION 14. Historian: He shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference. The Historian shall also publish documented records of the Negro in the Baptist Churches.

SECTION 19. Secretary of Youth Activities: Secretary of Youth Activities shall serve as cordinator between the Parent Convention and the Youth Auxiliary Convention. The Convention holds him responsible for the full compliance of the Youth Auxiliary with its objectives and procedures

ARTICLE 9 CONVENTION BOARDS AND THEIR DUTIES

SECTION 1. This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, B.T.U., National Baptist Publishing, Evangelical. Benevolent, Educational.

SECTION 2. Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, Said election shall be annually.

SECTION 3. Officers: The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The officers of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION 4. Duties of Officers: The Chairman of Boards shall preside at all board meetings. The Recording Secretary of each board shall keep a true record of the proceedings of the board.

SECTION 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary. Treasurer of each Board and do all the correspondence of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary. Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION 6. Management: The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary and three (3) other members of the board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does during the meeting of the Convention and during the interims.

SECTION 7. Reports of Boards: Each Board shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 8. The compensation of each officer and employee of the Boards shall be fixed by each Board. Compensations shall be limited to the Chairman, Recording Secretary and Corresponding

SECTION 9. The compensation of each board is subject to the approval of the convention, and thus must be presented to the construction for proper authorization.

vention for proper authorization.

SECTION 10. Duties of Boards: The Home Mission Board shall seek to keep alive struggling Churches, maintain a Baptist Christian Witness, and seek to extend the work of the Kingdom in newly settled or densely populated areas in the domains of the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall seek extended fields of the Great Commission in saving the lost wherever approved by the Convention.

The Educational Board shall give encouragement to those institutions endorsed by the convention and shall attempt to build an influence that the pulpit and leadership of the church will be more efficient.

The National Baptist Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publications of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall carry the program of Evangelism approved by the Convention.

ARTICLE 10-AUXILIARIES

SECTION 1. There shall be a Senior Women's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, Junior Women's Auxiliary, National Baptist Convention, National Baptist Brotherhood Auxiliary Convention and Nurse Corp National Baptist Convention.

SECTION 2. All messengers to the Auxiliary Convention shall be appointed and certified on the official letter of the Convention by the Churches of the Convention.

SECTION 3. All Auxiliary Conventions are subject to the action of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 4. Each Auxiliary Convention shall elect a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary. Treasurer, and such other officers as may be required.

SECTION 5. All officers elected by the auxiliary conventions must be submitted to the National Baptist Convention for approval SECTION 6. All auxiliary conventions shall report all of their

receipts and disbursements for the conventional year at the annual session to the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 7. All monies collected by auxiliary conventions at the annual session must be reported and turned over to the Finance Committee of the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America daily.

SECTION 8. The auxiliar conventions will report their bills and expense to the National Baptist Convention of America for approval, which shall, under no circumstances, exceed 40 per cent of the total

SECTION 9. The auxiliary conventions may accept representation fees from any and all auxiliaries of the local church, included in their work, subject to their approved constitutional regulations,

ARTICLE 11-COMMITTIES

SECTION 1. The Registration Committees of the National Baptist Convention of America and its Auxiliaries, working jointly with the Finance Committee shall open the office of registration the Tuesday, 12:00 Noon prior to the opening of the Convention.

SECTION 2. There shall be three (3) committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the convention.

- (a) Finance Committee: Shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the convention, and report the same to the convention daily.
- (b) Committee on Bills and Accounts: Shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts, and recommend the amount to be paid by the Convention.
- (c) Credentials Committee: In keeping with SECTION 3. There shall be a standing Budget Committee; Responsible for preparation and current revision of a working budget for the National Baptist Convention and all its Auxiliaries.

ARTICLE 2-MEETINGS

The Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the Second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday Night The place shall be selected by the convention in annual meeting with places chosen two years in advance of next current session.

ARTICLE 13. Representation in other organizations: The National Baptist Convention of America shall hold membership in the Baptist World Alliance and may hold membership in such other organizations as it from time to time elects.

ARTICLE 14. Commissions: There shall be a Commission on Transportation, Christian Education, Social Justice and Army and Navy Chaplains.

(1) The Railroad Commission shall consist of (5) members, elected annually and shall have charge of all transportation.

(2) The Commission on Christian Education shall consist of nine members, elected annually and shall plan and promote the Educational program of the Convention.

(3) The Commission on Social Justice shall consist of five (5) members and shall plan and promote such programs as will provide Christian concern for the welfare of oppressed peoples.

(4) The Commission of Army and Navy Chaplains shall have charge of recommending Chaplains for the Army and Navy and shall consist of three (3) members.

ARTICLE 15. This Constitution may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the Convention in the annual session provided written notice is given on the first day of the session.

(b) The following system shall be used in the handling of con-

vention funds:

(a) All funds received by the Finance Committee of the Convention and the executive board shall be receipted with three (3) carbon stubs; one for the secretary of the committee and one for the auditor of the convention.

(b) The finance committee shall issue a daily report signed by the chairman and secretary of the committee and the treasurer of

the convention.

(c) All funds shall be deposited each day in a convention de pository through a local bank where the convention is in session

(d) During the annual session, the Auditor of the Convention shall check and compare the receipts with the funds each day.

(e) All funds shall be paid out by check.

(f) The treasurer of the convention, the chairman, secretary and treasurer of the Finance Committee shall be bonded.

(g) The auxiliary treasurers shall deposit daily with the finance committee and take its receipt

(b) The auxiliaries of the convention shall not use more than forty percent of funds collected for operating expenses.
(i) The convention shall have the right to designate only un-

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON SOCIAL JUSTICE

Brother President, messengers of the National Baptist Convention of America, we are assembled in this annual session to examine both our witness and our world. The obligation we have to our witness and our world defines the purpose of our gathering. It is the task of the Commission on Social Justice to present to the messengers of this annual session a point of view that might be shared by the Convention of the nature of our obligation to our witness and our world. The foremost claim on the attention of the Commission is the struggle of the Negro for equality of opportunity in a social climate that is hostile to his efforts. Our report will seek to examine the progress that we have made and the challenge we face. Because we are leaders in the Baptit Churches our attention is given to the issue church-state separation as the issue bas brought National attention by recent hearings held by members of Congress.

The Commission on Social Justice of the National Baptist Con vention of America does not limit its examination of the racial struggle to measurements of our democratic ideal. We entertain a higher calling. We have before us the measurement of God's Word. and in that light we examine the racial struggle that marks our day. We have understood and do acknowledge that God has made man in Hts own image. This man that God has made in his image is every man. Because we are men made in God's image we have no apology to make for our efforts to achieve that freedom that belongs to all God's children. Our claim on freedom is not laid before any political power structure, bent on offering us a gift of freedom from their hand. Our claim on freedom is not a deed before the white majority. Our claim on freedom is a deed before God, who is the source of all freedom. Long before social structures were formulated and political doctrines proclaimed, there was in every man the claim of freedom. It is this image we will not deny, and so our efforts to achieve greater freedom is but our witness that we are all God's children.

REVIEW OF CIVIL RIGHTS PROGRESS

Although individual communities in the South have made substantial progress in the desegregation of their public schools in a large measure school desegregation has been unimpressive. In an editorial, the New York Times (Sunday, April 5, 1964) it was stated, "as the tenth anniversary of the Supreme Court's great decision nears, the Department of Justice points out that in the eleven Southern states only about one per cent of the Negro public school children are in desegrated schools." The need for acceleration in the pace of desegregation in the South's public schools was recognized by the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice. It is recognized by civil rights advocates that there is now and has heen for some time a need for acceleration in place of desegregation in every area affecting the Negro citizen.

In response to this need for action on the part of responsible National leadership and in opposition to stubborn Southern resistance to civil rights legislation, a civil rights measure was passed. The civil rights measure, as reported by the New York Times (June 14, 1964), offers a remedy as follows:

1. Forbids racial discrimination in most hotels, restaurants, theaters, and the like.

Authorizes the Attorney General to initiate suits or to intervene on behalf of aggrieved persons in school desegregation and other discrimination cases.

 Creates a Federal equal employment opportunities commission to investigate and counter discriminatory practices in hiring, and in union membership.

4. Allow Federal officials to cut off U. S. funds to "any recipient" who persists in racial discrimination (state and local work projects would be among those affected.)

 Prescribes factics used by some Southern registrars to keep Negroes off the voting rolls (such as disqualification for immaterial errors on records of application).

In addition to the action of our government this summer provided the time and condition for almost a thousand Negro and white students, to work in the interest of a voter-registration in Mississippi. The students entered Mississippi and participated in this effort in the face of great personal danger. Three students lost their lives, while many others met with courage the abuse of white men in places of authority. An atmosphere of violence is the daily companion for many just and free men who work for human (tignity in Mississippi, both white and black. There, is no doubt that this concerted effort of youth in the voter-registration program will be regarded as one of the most significant programs for human rights performed by brave and committed young Americans.

It is to be noted that as we moved closer to our goals of freedom, the greater the resistance. Resistance will test our will to be free and our wisdom to mark the way of freedom. Increased resistance must not produce in our leadership the recklesness of anger nor thoughtlessness of dispair. It is to be noted that the progress made in civil rights offers no remedy to conditions long neglected by a nation and community without compassion. Many of our major cities have become the centers in which desperate and dispairing men have selected to make the civil rights revolution pay personal dividends, now. They have used the pattern of civil rights demonstrations to reap the fruit of revenge and loot. It would be well for the leadership of the National Baptist Convention of America to leave this annual session with an awareness—that the violence and looting that has characterized the demonstrations of many major cities need no more critics, but men and women who stand as companions to the desperate and dispairing with messages and deeds of hope. We do not assemble in this meeting to intone the warnings of the enemies of the oppressed, but we are here to establish the presence of new found friends for the oppressed. One of the critical issues confronting the Negro is that he has been deserted by many and most of his "privileged" brothers. Many church people regard the civil rights struggle as "dirty and dangerous business" and therefore should not be the concern of the Christian. The "talented tenth" have become the burden of the "common man." It would be well for us to seek to engage in this struggle for freedom a greater segment of the informed in our community. It is imperative that the informed realize that their future rests with the progress of the Negro community. The informed Negro has no identity apart from his identity with the

total Negro community. Let the church bring this message to the Negro community, for it is the message of brotherhood. This message lays claim on the fatherhood of God, and renews our awareness that we are all God's children.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE NATIONAL

THE NEGRO VOTE IN THE SOUTH

It can be noted in an article written by Mr. Claude Sitton for the New York Times (August 23, 1964) that the Negro voter-regis-tration has made considerable gains. "From 1960 through last March according to Southern Voter Education projects, the number of Negroes on the voting rolls in the South rose to 1,937,982, an increase of 527,934. Much of this increase has come in key states. It has been greatest in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Texas, which accounts for 72 electoral votes, or 56 percent of the 128 to be cast by the 11 (eleven) Southern states.

The percent of Negroes of voting age that have registered in the South are as follows:

The fact that an increase in voter registration has been re-corded does not satisfy the demand laid on the Negro voter. He must weight carefully the issues involved in the coming elections and use his ballot as an instrument of freedom. No Negro can afford to vote for any candidate for public office who refuses to support the rights of Negroes for equality of opportunity in this Nation. the elimination of racial oppression is long overdue in this Nation and the structure of the world will not and cannot contain such a pattern of human activity. The Negro who supports candidates who seek to sustain outmoded patterns of race relations does a disservice to himself as well as to his nation. It is imperative that every qualified Negro voter put forth every effort to properly use his vote. The issue confronting the Negro in the South is simple and clear—Civil Rights,

THE NEGRO AND JOBS

Fred M. Heckinger states, in his report of June 7, 1964, that a New York Times spot check indicates that the most dramatic areas about this year's graduating class is the improving job n t f. Negro graduates and an unusual on campus recruiting offert by in unity, bus ness, and government." "Morehouse College for men in Atlanta calls the job situation improving and expandin with more than 60 (sixty) representatives of large companies go ernment agencies having sent recruiters to the campus North Carolina College at Durham reports about 300 recruiters from government and industry, with more jobs offered than the

placement office can fill, and salaries running along the national average. Fisk University in Nashville, confirms the trend. It appears that this effort to recruit Negro graduates has inspired Negro students to believe that if they qualify they have an equal

This development in the field of higher education should be explored and encouraged by church leaderhip. The resources of the church should be used to help capable students to qualify in training for the new opportunities that are being opened to them. We should seek to demonstrate our concern with scholarships and financial support of our educational institution.

Although the picture for employment of Negro college graduates is greatly improved we are aware that the need of the ma-

pates is greatly improved we are aware that the need of the majority of Negro youth cannot be met at this point. The great majority of Negro youth will not go to college. The picture at this point is worthy of our attention. Government statistics show that "25 per cent of the male Negro teenager who are in the labor force are out of work." This jobless figure refers to male Negroes between the ages of 14 to 19, who count themselves as in the labor force, and looking for work. The jobless rate among Negro teen age boys, which was rate distribution that the that among their white contemparts 10 years. only slightly higher than that among Negro teen age poys, which was only slightly higher than that among their white conterparts 10 years ago, is now nearly twice as high. We can see clearly the problem that confronts the Negro community when many Negro youth are jobless, and have little hope for employment. President Johnson's program dealing with the problems of poverty should attract our interest and support. Communities represented in this annual session should establish citizen committees setting forth proposals to take full advantage of the President's poverty program. This program is designed to help the unemployed and the unemployable Education and training will be the key.

RESOLUTIONS

We recognize that it is the task of this Convention to express its views on matters of Christian concern, we therefore recommend for consideration the following:

1. We recommend that the National Baptist Convention of America, assembled in the 84th Annual Session in Los Angeles. California, go on record commending the efforts of white and Negro students in their voter registration program in Mississippi during the summer months. We commend the organizations that provided help in the promotion of this project. We further encourage our churches to provide, for future projects, such assistance as their ability permits.

2. Although we have received the legal support of our Federal povernment in matters having to do with our civil rights, we do recommend that our churches will support every effort to see that the legal guarantees will be properly administered.

3 Because of the confusion that is often associated with the position of political candidates who on the one hand declare their support of integration, while supporting the doctrine of states' rights we do recommend to the Convention now assembled de clare that states' rights is in conflict with the efforts of the Newro for equal rights in the South, If the Nerro must look to the Southern states for a solution to the problem of his appression. his cause faces difficult and almost impossible barriers. The Neuro

citizen in the South must look to the Federal government for reme-

dy to his oppression.

4. We do reaffirm the historic Baptist position of separation of church and state. We reaffirm our belief in the separation of church and state, as written in the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

THE TEACHING ROLE OF THE PASTOR

F. Benjamin Davis, M.A., Th.D., D.D.

We stand today at the threshold of a new and daring decade that will witness profound change in population growth, economic status, rapidity of travel, moral foundations, and spiritual outlook. Men in every walk of life are evaluating and re-examining the meaning, purposes and pursuits of their particular calling or filed of endeavor. It is fitting and proper that as Pastors, ministers and Christians, we take a new look at the role of the Pastor in the fluid and dynamic society. We must be helped to recapture a singleness of purpose that is proclaimed in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We must feel a renewed sense within us of the recreating vigor of the Good News' that God was in Christ reconciling the world into himself." that Christ lived and died for us, that He arose from the grave and is now our personal Saviour. Our vision, our purpose, our vigor will lose its cutting edge unless we constantly receive inspiration and guidance from God through His word.

inspiration and guidance from God through His word.

Naturally, the starting point for any valid evaluation of the role of the Christian minister is the revelation of the nature and will of God that has come to men through Christ and his Apostles. Thus, we turn to the Bible, the Revealed Word of God, as the source book, not the textbook, in our search for guidance. We look to the Bible, and not to extra Biblical literature, as the chief source of theology and teaching. We believe that the Sacred Scriptures contain all things necessary for salvation and that the church does not or should not teach anything contrary to the Revealed Canon.

There is no doubt that the Bible teaches us that the central it is so of the church and its ministry is the communication of the Gospel of Christ, and the effective and vital exemplification of that Gospel in individual lives. Please observe, that, I said the communication of the Gospel, for there are more ways of communicating the Gospel than through what is traditionally referred to as "preaching the Gospel." In fact, a careful reading of the New Testament, with proper regard for its historical setting, reveals the centrality of the teaching function of the church and its ministry.

The Biblical centrality of the teaching function is relevant to the needs and problems of both the ministry and the failty today. Oliver DeWolf Cummings wisely refers to the church as "the source of moral and spiritual vitality, the creator of ideals of decency and integrity, the custodian of man's most priceless assets faith, hope and love." The Christian movement is a teaching enterprise, for pends upon teaching for its propagation and maintenance I leave to you to differentiate between teaching and preaching out affirm from solid biblical authority that there is no activity of the church evangelism, preaching, money-raising, missions, fellowship—that does not respond to the teaching ministry of the church; therefore, Christian education belongs, not upon the fringe, but at the very heart of the church.

It must be admitted that the ministry to individuals, as individuals, and the ministry to the entire congregation as a group through other ministerial roles should also be regarded as aspects of the educational function of the pastor; for meverything he ministerial roles should also be regarded as aspects of the educational function of the pastor; for meverything he minister is to seek to communicate the word of God to man in his need so that "the church may be served by the word in order that it may become corporately the servant of the word. It is our hope that this emphasis upon the importance and potentialities of the small study groups will necess tate the re-evaluation of the educational content, methods and programs of our people. It is a biblical fact that the pastor is responsible for seeing to it that all the members, all the lay leaders and workers receive adequate training in the doctrine, work, and out-reach of the church.

cally 14 an entermined and the church of calculation within the local churches; for today's complex culture tends toward an even more professionalized theology and a more highly organized church fe in fact, we are almost organizing and clubing our churches out of existence in this maze of auxiliaries and clubs, one has to look long and hard to find the church of Christ.

The church has the difficult task of nurturing Christian life in a setting that is in many ways hostile to it. Also, the sterotyped forms of program and organization so often stand in the way of significant Christian educational work in our churches—work which is truly grounded upon the "Gospel of God's redeeming activity in least Christ

Educational activities have a legitimate place in leading a person to know and to accept what God has done for him. They have a legitimate place in helping him to see things as they truly are and to come to grips with life. They have a legitimate place in helping a person to find and lead a life of fulfillment in Christ.

This address is seeking to emphasize a Biblical view of the church and its ministry which seems not to have been too clearly granted by us, namely the centrality of the teaching function of the church and the correlative truth of the teaching ministry. Therefore any ministry is defective if it is not, in a very large measure, a teaching ministry, and a teaching ministry is defective if it does not bear fruit in a teaching church.

Let us consider the role of the pastor in the local church. I need not remind you that in the past fifty years, we have witnessed

the gradual emergence of several new tasks which the pastor is expected to perform. In addition to the traditional responsibilities, the average pastor is now increasingly expected to function as organizer of an ever growing number of congregational activities, as administrator of the consequently more complex church life, and as a counselor in personal problems.

The average pastor spends most of his time with or preparing for contacts with individuals in counselling and guidance or with the congregation as a whole in preaching or worship. Little or no time is spent with the small groups which are the ideal unites for instructional situations. Because he spends the largest portion of his time with the individual or the total group some unfortunate consequences have resulted.

One unfortunate consequence or difficulty has evolved, however, by the fact that the average pastor has tended to respond passively by merely attempting to add these new and time-consuming role emphasis to the older roles without integrating them theologically into a self-conscious and systematic doctrine of the ministry.

In every aspect of his work, the pastor needs to face the problem of determining who he is and what he is primarily trying to
achieve The average pastor regards the preaching role as being of
first importance, following in order by the roles of pastor, priest,
organizer, administrator, and last of all, teacher. The average pastor
spends his time in the following order, from the most time-consuming to least time-consuming, as administrator, pastor, preacher and
priest, organizer, and teacher. This is determined by the demands
that others make upon his time, rather than in accordance with his
personal scale of values and preferences. The teaching role of the
pastor receives less average time than any of the other five major
ministerial roles. Most pastors seem to regard this role as least im
portant and least satisfying. This tendency to minimize the teaching
role of the pastorate is very harmful and produces no good.

Of all the major roles, only the organizational and teaching roles involve the pastor in work with small primary groups in the church. The work of the pastor as administrator, as pastor-counselor, as preacher, and as leader in public worship does not consist in working with small face-to-face groups.

The paster must recognize the importance of his teaching role as an organizer. When he fails to take his proper place, one frequently finds a laissez-faire, "Hands-off" attitude toward the program-planning of the various adult organizations. It is not surprising, therefore, that program committees, lacking the advice and assistance of the paster, often plan programs that are wholly secular and quite unrelated to the central purpose for which the church exists. How often in the churches we see couples' clubs whose programs are purely social and recreational; men's clubs whose monthly supper meetings are almost indistinguishable in program content from meetings of some secular service club; women's groups which, after opening with a brief "devotional," as it is often called, spend the rest of their time planning and working on money-raising projects.

Another factor that tends to minimize the importance of work with small groups and the amount of time devoted to it is the inclination of both laymen and many pastors to measure "success" in church programming largely by numerical standards, by the number of people who participate. One of the first questions we ask us: "How many people have been turning out?" Is it any wonder that many

pastors are therefore tempted to regard the "Book of Numbers" as a supreme authority and guide in their work, and hence shy away from work with small groups?

We have briefly surveyed how the neglect of small groups has had unfortunate consequences for the work of the pastor as counselor, his ministry to the family unit, and his role as organizer and co-ordinator of the total program of the congregation, and especially in the area of education.

We come to four very fundamental questions: First, are the proportions of time given to the different functions (or jobs) of the ministry to be determined solely by the role expectations projected upon the ministry? Second, can we find some "Determinative standards" for a doctrine of the ministry that will transcend the demands of the laity, the expectations of the large community, and the promotional pressures exerted by the denominational agencies? Question three, are we to minister to our people only as they want or expect to be ministered to? Question four, shall we saek to smulate Christ's ministry, which went far beyond the peoples' expectations and altered them?

There is little doubt, that without some coherent doctrine of the ministry that provides a transcendent standard for ordering and coordinating the various roles the minister is to perform, the nature of our ministry will be determined solely by the ideologies and demands of our culture.

Yet, both our traditional Protestant theology and the modern doctrine of the ministry strongly emphasize the role of the pastor as educator. However, rather than being leader and educator many are follower and conformer: It would be a great day when our pastors place their teaching role alongside the preaching role.

Preaching and teaching could not be so radically separated in such a persons mind, either in regard to their mutual implications for each other. The pastor's teaching and preaching roles should mutually re-inforce and support each other.

For us to regard the church as primarily a teacher is not minimizing the importance of its functions as an evangelistic, witnessing, worshipping, and reconciling community, any more than regarding the pastor as primarily an educator minimizes the importance of his other functions; rather, it means subsuming all other functions of the church under the unifying category of the communication of the cosses.

The irony of this situation is that the average paster spends the greatest block of his time performing a role for which many of his lay people would be as well or even better qualified than he. In short, a part of the pastor's responsibility is to see that the church officers in work of church administration are actually trained to assist. It is utterly absurd to assume that these men can intelligently participate in their sacred responsibilities without specific preparation for them. This includes your deacons, trustees, teachers in the Church School, etc. These all must receive adequate training. Seemingly, we have forgotten that Christian education has as its purpose the changing of lives. The world may say that men cannot be changed, but this is the business of the Christian religion. In this basic concept of preacher as teacher we have the example of Jesus, Our Master, Jesus saw in teaching the supreme opportunity for shaping the ideals, attitudes, and conduct of people. He was not primarily an orator, a reformer, or a ruler, but rather a feacher.

To be sure he did not belong to the professional class of scribes and rabbis who gave minute interpretations of the law, but he taught. He was in no sense a "rabble rouser." He did not trust his cause to mass meeting appeals, ritualistic procedure, or political maneuvering, but rather, to the long-drawn-out processes of teaching and training. Teaching was his chief business. He was often a healer, sometimes a worker of miracles, frequently a preacher, but always a teacher.

Jesus' emphasis on teaching is evidenced by the fact that he was generally recognized as a teacher. He was called Teacher, Master, or Rabbi; all of which carry the same general idea as when Nicodemus said: "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher come from

God" (John 3:2).

At least forty-five times in the Four Gospels he was called teacher, but never preacher, L. J. Sherril says that by including all the terms equivalent to teacher we have a total of sixty-one." 4

Norman Richardson points out that "Master" is used stxty-six times in the King James Version, fifty-four of which are from the Greek word meaning teacher or schoolmaster. Forty-five times he was referred to as teaching, and eleven times as preaching, often coupled with teaching, as when he is spoken of as "teaching in their synagogues and preaching the gospel of the kingdom" (Matthew 4:23). Not only the twelve, but also other disciples, and even his enemies, called him teacher. 5

Likewise Jesus called himself, teacher, saying: "You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am" (John 13:13). Also he called himself "light" which carries the idea of instructor. In this connection it is interesting to note that John the Baptist

was 2) .ays called preacher, rather than teacher.

Another indication of his stress on teaching is the terminology

used to describe his followers and his message. They were nutcalled subjects, retainers or comrades. The expression "Christian" is used only three times in the New Testament to characterize them, and one of these in derision. Over against this is the fact that the term "disciple," which means "pupil" or "learner," is used 243 times to describe his followers, and his message is spoken of as "teaching" (thirty-nine times) and as "wisdom" (six times), rather than as address or sermon. The term "Sermon on the Mount" is not used by the New Testament writer but instead Matthew says: "He opened his mouth and taught them" (Matthew 5:2). So, it should be called the "Teaching on the Mount," or we should change our ideas about a sermon.

Also the Master's emphasis on teaching is indicated by the enthusiastic and aggressive way in which he carried on a teaching activity. He taught every where and at all times—in the Temple, in the synagogues, in the mountain, by the seaside, by the road, by a well, in the homes, at social gatherings, and in private. His work carried a didactic atmosphere, rather than that of impassioned address, for people felt free to ask him questions, and be in turn asked them questions.

He trained a group of feachers to carry on his work; and he

commanded these disciples who gathered about him to go to the ends of the earth, make disciples (enlist in the school of Christ), baptize them (a teaching ordinance), and then teach them all the things he had commanded (Matthew 28:19, 20). Jesus thoroughly believed in teaching, an indispensable prerequisite for any teacher. He gave himself it it and forever dignified the calling. The Pastor in following the Master, working with and teaching small study groups, can enhance and make his ministry much more effective and valuable, both to himself and his members.

"Vitality Of The New Testament"

The teaching of the New Testament is vital. In these modern

days there is a looseness as to doctrine. It is often heard that "one church is as good as another" and the adherents to the faith and order of the Scriptures are tabooed by the devotees of modernity. The precepts of Jesus and His Apostles are slurred if not rejected as old doctrines. The truth of the New Testament, like its author, is the same yesterday and today yea and forever. (Heb. 13:8), and it is applicable to every generation whatever their circumstances. stage of development or degree of culture. As long as men live and die, and long as the sun shines above their heads, as long as the earth exists and bring forth her fruit, the New Testament of Jesus Christ will be in demand and up to date. It answers affirmatively and convincingly and gloriously the question-"If a man die, shall he live again? as fresh and as irrepressible now as when Job asked it. (Job 14:1), and we shall never exceed its knowledge until we are ushered into immortality. Higher than circumstances, deeper than environments and broader than society it always makes expedience and common sense tributary to its purpose. In matters incidental or impossible of revelation—as the state of the deadit tolerates any opinion compatible with its spirit. But perfectly articulated with the permanent need of humanity, it withholds its joy and peace and hope from all who ignore or disobey its law of pardon for the sinner and of life for the Christian. It is not plain here, it is discredited, and, if it is not true let every man go his own way.

"Doctrine and Life"

Doctrine and life are as closely related as cause and effect, though this association may not be apparent immediately. The ruin of Jeroboams idolatry, the first King of Israel of the division who taught his people to sin, is seen in Ahab the seventh King, and if America had accepted the mouthings of Bob Ingersoll we would be in the throes of barbarism or savagery. The life of Jesus is glorious above that of all men because of the perfection of His principles. If we ever approach him, we must follow the fundamental-teaching of His Testament. By the gift and inspiration of His Spirit we shall at last become like unto Him.

"Sin As An Obstacle"

But sin made the ideals of Christ impossible of achievement. Christianity was established at the earliest possible moment. Surely God would not withhold the ultimate religion from any race or generation or man. But not until the education of the law of Moses and the inspiration of the prophets were there even a few people on the earth who would accept the model of Jesus, and not till the gospel had been created as "The power of God unto salvation" was there any who could approach the excellency of His life. The Jews were so beclouded in mind that they knew not Hum who was their glory and so hardened in heart that they resisted His appeal and killed Him. The Gentiles were so ungodly that Paul's ministry among them looked like a failure, and even now only a small portion of humanity makes any serious attempt to walk in the perfect way.

"How Overcome"

And those who do follow Jesus must bind themselves together in the Church to create an atmosphere in which to live and battle successfully against a wicked world. The volunteer in the army of the Lord embodies his faith and penitence by baptism; and the Christian soldier looking backward to the Incarnation, upward to the Celestial Throne, and forward to the Second Advent, realizes the presence of his captain by the celebration of the Lord's Supper, while the Holy Spirit dwells in his heart to comfort him by the Word of God, form his character and glorify his life. Christianity is the only religion that actually saves men, and it must eventually supplant all false systems. The Christian perfected in life by faith and hope and love is destined through death to eternal glory.

"The Triangles of Life"

And thus we see that Christianity is constructed on the broad lines everlasting truth. At bottom life is a triangle; and christianity describes its sides by "soberly and righteously and godly." To be sober is to be true to oneself, to be righteous is to be true to others, and to be godly is to be true to God. Christ demands His followers to give up no good thing; they must deny only ungodliness and worldly lusts. (Titus 2:11-14) Life is also a triangle in relation to time, the past, present and future. And the divine religion, instructing us how to live in the present, sees only one event in the past—the appearance of the grace of God, and only one event in the future—the blessed hope and appearing of the glory of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ.

"The Authority Of Truth"

The New Testament is authoritative because it is true. The man who knows can always speak with authority. Jesus is chief on earth and in heaven because He knows everything. And the Apostles knew, because Jesus told them and the Holy Spirit inspired them; and to them we must go for the fundamentals of Christianity. Where is the man who, save as he studied the Word of God and practiced its precepts, can speak with authority, or even with edification in religion! The authority of the New Testament is not arbitrary or mechanical or legalistic, for it is as deep as the foundation of the universe and to reject it is to be lost forever.

"The First Need of Men"

The primary need of men is to be saved from sin. Preachers make a mistake by taking it for granted that sinners know what to do to be saved. Every Bible School should be drilled on the steps into the Church, which are also the conditions of the salvation of the alien sinner-faith in Jesus as the Son of God, repentance of sin confession of Jesus before men, and baptism as the likeness of His death, burial and resurrection. And every sermon should throw the searchlight of revelation on the door into the kingdom of heaven.

Of course to come into the church is merely to begin, but sinners will not start unless the way is made plain and urgent And let all who thus accept the true religion keep themselves in Bible study and prayer and worship and Christian endeavor.

"STORY OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD"

Rev. Marvin C. Griffin, Historian. Waco, Texas
Education and missions were foremost in the minds and hearts
of the founding fathers of our convention. The desire for education
helped to unify Negro Baptists. Before the organization of the National Baptist Convention, Negro leaders had been urging the American Baptist Publication Society to accept Negro churchmen as contributors to Sunday School literature and other religious publications. At that time, the Society's publications were used through out
the Negro Baptist Churches. Dr. B. Griffith, the Publication Society's
director, invited a number of Negro leaders to prepare articles for

forthcoming issues of the publication, "Sunday School Teacher." Unfortunately, certain members of the Society did not share Dr. Griffith's views of accepting Negro writers for the society's publications. Particularly, the southern church and others strongly opposed the venture and maintained that unless the invitations were withdrawn, the society's publications would no longer be used in areas where they were circulating in large quantities.

Capitulating to the opposition, Dr. Griffith wrote the Negro leaders and cancelled the invitations they were given to serve as contributions to the magazine. This action created wounds that remained for years to come. Negro leaders reacted by resolving to establish their own institution in which they could write and publish religious literature. They were determined to produce materials that would be used by Negro Baptist churches and Sunday Schools.

1. Organization of the Publishing Board

in the afternoon of the second day's session of the National Baptist Convention being held in the First Colored Baptist Church, of St. Louis, Mo., September, 1896, while Rev. A. N. McEwen of Mobile, Ala., was in the chair, Rev. R. H. Boyd offered a resolution.

This resolution immediately received a motion and a second for adoption. Dr. Boyd, by special request, was allowed twenty minutes to discuss it. The resolution, together with Dr. Boyd's discussion showing the needs, the plausibility, the final possibility of such an institution operated among Negro Baptists, if capable men with a determination and a will could be found and appointed the way could be found to operate it, brought atmost a consternation among some of the delegates, especially the zealous friends and employees of the American Baptist Publication Society and these were both numerous, intelligent and influential in the convention Dr. Boyd, in closing his speech, suggested that the resolution be referred to a large committee who should take it under consideration and report their findings at the next morning session. The suggestion was carried and the chair appointed the committee Members of the committee included Dr. E. K. Love of Georgia.

Dr. C. H. Parrish, of Kentucky; R. H. Boyd, of Texas and others. This large committee met and referred the matter to a sub-committee consisting of R. H. Boyd, E. K. Love and C. H. Parrish. At the next session the committee reported, recommending that the ideas set out in the resolution offered by R. H. Boyd, were, in their judgment, feasible, possible and profitable, and recommended its adoption. Able discussions were offered against the adoption by Rev S. N. Vass, of North Carolina; Dr. Brawley, Ga.; Dr. Isaac, of Texas; Prof. R. J. Temple, of Mississippi, and others. The resolution was favored by a number of other brethren. It was feared that if the agitation was kept up pro and con, this would be the wedge to sever the delegation. Rev. I. Toliver, of Texas, obtained the floor, called the attention of the brethren to the danger of this wedge dividing the brethren and offered a motion that the whole matter be referred to the Home Mission Board, which was carried. This seemed to calm the troubled waters and peace and harmony seemed to reign among the delegation throughout the remainder of the session.

On Saturday morning at 8:00 o'clock, the Home Mission Board consisting of one delegate from each regular state convention and seven members from or near Little Rock, Ark, the chairman, to

meet in a room of the First Baptist Church. The Texas delegation of the General Baptist Convention handed in the name of R. H. Boyd, of San Antonio, Texas, to serve as a member of the Home Mission Board. Dr. Boyd had never served n this capacity before, but had become very familiarly known to all the brethren. Rev. G. W. D. Gaines was re-elected chairman Rev. J. P. Robinson, of Little Rock, Ark., was elected treasurer of the Board Prof. Jos. A. Booker, the former corresponding secretary of the Board, was elected recording secretary of the Board. When the organization was completed, Dr. Robinson suggested that the Home Mission Board elect a regular corresponding secretary, nominated Dr. R. H. Boyd, of San Antonio, Texas. This nomination was seconded in a very strong speech by Miss Fannie Dodd, Minn. who said that although being colored herself, this was the first meeting or convention of colored Baptists that she had ever attended in all her life; that she was impressed with the numerical strength of the colored Baptists of the South and their apparent ability and insight to religious work; that she had never seen nor heard of R. H. Boyd until during the sitting of this convention, but had watched him, who seemed to be the leader of a great faction in the delegation, and believed that he would be an instrument in the hands of God in starting up a centralized mis sionary institution to operate missionary work throughout all the states of the Union where colored people were numerous. The motion was unanimously carried. At this juncture the convention had been called to order and the Board adjourned or took recess. After the adjournment of the session of the convention, the thand was again called together. Dr. Boyd arose and said that he had consulted some of his brethren in Texas where he served as Superintendent of Missions or as Missionary Secretary of the Gen gral Baptist Convention, and they did not feel willing to dispense with his services, that the convention was allowing him a living with his services, that the convention was anowing min a living sirry of \$1.800 a year and office and traveling expenses, but that his heart was in the work. Here he presented his resignation in ting Dr J M Møore, of Georgetown, Ky., reached to the table. pocketed the resignation and moved to lay Dr. Boyd's resignation on the table, which was carried unanimously. The matter of beginning the operation of missionary work was discussed at some length. Dr. Boyd was allowed until November 1st to wind up his affairs as Superintendent of Missions of the General Baptiat Convention of Texas and enter upon the work. It was agreed that the meeting of the Home Mission Board should be called to meet in Little Rock, Ark. November 4th. Secretary Boyd then called the attention of the Board to the resolution concerning the appointment of a Printing Committee of five, whose duty it should be to prepare and publish a series of Sunday, school literature for the Neero Baptists.

Dr. Vass, who was also a member of this Board, offered a motion that this series of literature should be published not later than January 1, 1897, which motion was carried. Rev. G. M. Moore, of Georgetown, Ky., offered a motion, which was seconded by Rev. E. R. Carter, of Atlanta, Ga., that Secretary Boyd should appoint this Printing Committee of five and an editor-in-chief and call this committee to meet in Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 5, 1896, in the office of the Baptist Vanguard.

The motion was carried, whereupon Secretary Boyd appointed Rev. G. W. D. Gaines, the chairman of the Home Mission Board, of Little Rock, Ark.; Rev. J. Geter, of Little Rock, Ark.; Rev. J. M. Moore, of Georgetown, Ky.; Rev. E. R. Carter, of Atlanta, Ga., and Rev. E. C. Morris, editor-in-chief, while Secretary Boyd should be one of the five members of the committee.

Some member of the Board raised the question of two members being appointed at Little Rock, whereupon Secretary Boyd explained that there was no money and the available means for traveling expenses of either the Board members or the members of the Printing Committee, and that as he was a member of the committee of five and Chairman Gaines was a member, if there was one more member at Little Rock, there would be sure to be a quorum present. At this juncture Miss Fannie Dodd arose and said to the brethren, I told you I was not mistaken in the man, you can see from this suggestion that this man has an eagle's eye for business.

After the adjournment of the Board, Secretary Boyd held a conference with Rev. B. D. Ray, D.D., (white) manager of the National Baptist Publishing Company of St. Louis, and editor of the Bantist Argus, looked over their office and was informed by him that he had attended the meeting of the colored Baptists and had heard the discussion concerning the beginning of the colored Baptists and had heard the discussion concerning the beginning of the publication of a series of Sunday school literature. He informed Secretary Boyd that a number of white Baptists of the west had banded themselves together and organized the National Baptist Publishing Company of St. Louis, Mo., with a view of furnishing a series of literature for the western white Baptists, but that the publication had not been a financial success, owing to the fact that they had strong competitors in the East and in the West by the American Baptist Publication Society, and in the South by the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board. He presented copies of each of the publications, told of the circulation, offered to sell out to this committee if it would incorporate itself, and for the same consideration of sale, if sufficient cash was paid, he would serve the

oard six months assisting them in preparing and publishing eriodicals for two quarters.

Secretary Boyd partially agreed with him on the price for the ood-will of the plant and his six months' service, agreeing to pay im \$3 000 cash, but that this deal could not be consummated or losed earlier than November 15th, as the Printing Committee had een called to meet November 5th, 1896. In the latter part of Ocher Secretary Boyd received a communication from the Nation Baptist Publishing Company, of St. Louis, Mo., stating that they id reconsidered their proposition to him and had considered their oposition to him and had considered their oposition to him and had sold out to the American Baptist Publiation Society, of Philadelphia, Pa., who would not only take of the Printing Committee, but had agreed to establish a Branch ouse in St. Louis, Mo.

This of course, greatly thwarted Secretary Boyd's plan, but id not dampen his ambition. He at once began to open correspondnce with various publishing concerns engaged in the publication Sunday school literature. His first communication was with the merican Baptist Publication Society, endeavoring to have them eith or reprint 10,000 copies each of the following Sunday school tagazines: Primary Quarterly, Advanced Quarterly, Intermediate uarterly, Teachers' Monthly. Br. A. J. Rowland, the general securary cut off the correspondence abruptly, informing Secretary by that he desired no communication with him.

Again things looked dark. Secretary Boyd then communicated ath each member of the Printing Committee, and told them of the wo attempts and the bright outlook at first seen, but of the dark hadow that had spread over the work. He then opened corresponence with Dr. J. M. Frost, of Nashville, Tenn., the Maverett Printing Company, of San Antonio, Texas; Brandon Printing Company, of Nashville, Tenn., Messrs. Barbee and Smith, agents of the Souhern Methodist House, of Nashville, Tenn., and a few other printing.

On the 14th day of October, 1896, Superintendent Boyd tenered his resignation to the General Baptist Convention of Texas n session at Fort Worth, Texas, returned to his home in San Annio, where he made preparation for his family, and on the third November, 1896, he left on the early morning train over the I. G. N. and the Iron Mountain Railroad for Little Rock, Ark., ariving there on the morning of November the 4th, where he stopped the home of Dr. J. P. Robinson. At noon on the 5th he appeared the Vanguard's office with an assurance that the Printing Comnittee would have a quorum, but to his surprise, he met only Rev. W. D. Gaines, to be informed that Rev. Geter had turned Holiess, he and his church had withdrawn from the Baptists, hence inother disappointment.

On November 5, 1896, he boarded the Iron Mountain train at 1 o'clock p.m., and arrived in Memphis, Tenn., on the morning if November 6th, inquired his way to the home of Dr. T. J. Searcy, where he was given a welcome and a much-desired breakfast. At welve o'clock noon on the 6th of November he boarded the N. C. St. L. Railroad train for Nashville, Tenn. Arriving in Nashville between 8:30 and 9:00 o'clock at night, he inquired his way to the home of Dr. C. H. Clark, who then lived at 1013 N. High street. He was informed by Mrs. Clark that Dr. Clark had been called to Ken-

tucky for some religious matters, but she expected him in on the late train, and offered a bed. He fell asleep and woke up the near morning to find Dr. C. H. Clark in command of the home.

On the morning of the 7th of November, 1896, Secretary Boyl found himself in the home of the Rev. Dr. C. H. Clark, pastor of the Mt. Olive Baptist Church. They (Boyd and Clark) spent most a the day in discussing all phases of this new project of publishes a series of Sunday school literature. Secretary Boyd inquired a Pastor Clark if he held as close relation with Dr. J. M. Frost as he held with Dr. T. P. Bell during his administration, reminding his that in 1895 he had conducted a delegation from Texas, on their way to Atlanta, Ga., Bell's office, where Secretary Boyd had his first opportunity to have a personal Interview with Dr. T. P. Bel upon this all absorbing topic of Sunday school publishing business

Pastor Clark informed Secretary Boyd that he held the warn est relation with Dr. Frost and with Mr. S. W. Meeks, of the Uni versity Printing Press Company. On the night of November 7th Secretary Boyd spent late hours in his room writing letters to various friends. He conceived the idea of corresponding with Rev. J. M. Moore, of Georgetown, Ky., and Dr. E. R. Carter, of Atlanta Ga., knowing each of them to be great friends of his personally and in sympathy with the project. He wrote a brief letter with a indelible pencil with a view of sending a copy to both Dr. Moore and Dr. Carter

A copy of this letter and this blank were forwarded to Rev J. M. Moore at Georgetown, Ky., but Secretary Boyd decided to await results of that letter, and possibly to go and see Dr. Carter in person Secretary Boyd spent a week in Nashville in the home of Dr. C. H. Clark, looking for a boarding place for himself, conferring with printers and business men. He held several conferences with Rem C. S. Smith. D.D., Secretary of the A.M.E. Sunday School Union, who later became Bishop Smith, of the A.M.E. Church, with whom he had been acquainted for some years. Rev. Smith was unusually kind to Secretary Boyd, and took great pains in giving him the benefit of his seventeen or eighteen years' experience, as Secretary-Treasure and founder of the A.M.E. Sunday School Union. He told him the whole history of his struggles. When Secretary Boyd told him of the failure of the Printing Committee to meet; he urged Secretary Boyd to go forward, committee or no committee, that the time was ripe and the project could not fail. At the close of the third inter view with Secretary, Rev. Smith, he handed Secretary Boyd the fol lowing brief note, which he wrote with his hands at his desk:

'Rev R. H. Boyd, Secretary Home Mission Board, National Bap tist Convention:

My Dear Brother:

"We have no printing plant. If we had, I would proceed at once and print up for you a series of Sunday school literature for I know with the great body of Negro Baptists of this country who are awaiting eagerly for just such literature, you cannot fail. I will go in person with you to the M E. Publishing House and see Messrs, Barbee and Smith and go your security. I further tender you free of rent the entire fourth floor of our building and place it at your disposal The elevator is a little out of repair. It will cost possibly \$50 to put this elevator in running order. With this fixed, you will have no further expenses until such time as you may volunteer to vacate it, or until my term of office expires.

Secretary Boyd had several interviews with Dr. J. M. Frost, who died his Board of Managers together and laid the matter of alwing Secretary Boyd the use of the electrotype plates and inted matter of the Board. The Board voted unanimously that Dr. ost might use any and all of the means at his disposal to enurage and help Dr. Boyd in lostering and establishing this pub-hing institution. After this, Dr. Frost called Mr. S. W. Meeks, esident of the University Printing Company, who was then doing majority of the printing for the Southern Baptist Sunday School ard, to meet him and Dr. Boyd in his (Dr. Frost's) office. At this nference Board had consented that Dr. Boyd could have their usent to use the electrotype they had. Mr. S. W. Meeks then inted Dr. Boyd to come to his office the next day. On going to Mr. eek's office, Mr. Meeks accompanied him in person to the office Mr. C. H. Brandon, president of the Brandon Printing Company. here the three held a lengthy conference. The Brandon Printing mpany was printing the Advanced Quarterly and the "Teachers' onthly for the Sunday School Board. In this conference, it was rreed that the Brandon Printing Company would reprint from ese plates with certain changes, 10,000 or more copies of the Adinced Quarterly, 3,000 or more of the Teachers' Monthly. Dr. Boyd as to furnish the engravings and such advertising matter as he esired for the covers.

WORSHIP

GOD' PEOPLE TAUGHT TO WORSHIP

Exedus 25:1-8: 35:20-22; 40:12-15, 34-38

WHAT IT IS-WHERE DONE-RESULTS-HOW

"And the Lord spake unto Moses, saying, Speak unto the chilren of Israel, that they bring me an offering; of every man that with it willingly with his heart ye shall take my offering. Exod. i:1, 2. "And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among iem. Ex. 25:8, "And they came every one whose heart stirred him p, and every one whom his spirit made willing, and they brought Lord's offering to the work of the tabernacie of the congregan, and for all his service, and for the holy garments. "And they ime, both men and women, as many as were willing hearted, Ex. 5:20-22, "And thou shalf bring Aaron and his sons unto the door the tabernacle of the congregation, and wash them with water. And thou shalt anoint them . . . that they may minister unto me the priest's office: for their analyting shall surely be an eversting priesthood, throughout their generations, Ex. 40:12-15, "Then cloud covered the tent of the congregation, and the glory of the ord filled the tabernacle. And Moses was not able to enter into the

tent of the congregation, because the cloud abode thereon, and the glory of the Lord filled the tabernacle." Ex. 40:34-38.

worship here means: "To pay divine honours to: to reverence with supreme respect and veneration: to perform religious exercises in honour of; to adore; venerate. To honour with extravagant love

and supreme submission."

This is God's first ordered regulation of divine worship, Hither to God had been worshipped in an unorganized manner. Every man the head of a family, was his own priest, and his family worship ped as per his directions, if there were sons in the family, the elder took up where his father let down. In these Scriptures, God has chosen a tamily to perpetuate the priesthood throughout Israel's generation, until the coming of Christ from the tribe of Judah lleretofore, per God's order, the tribe of Judah. Heretofore, per God's order, the tribe of Levi furnished the order of priests. God cave no notice to Moses concerning the change of tribes, in the choosing of one to be priest forever. See Heb. 7:11-20.

In this, the first school of religion, there are five things of impartance to observe. I. Giving in Wership, Ex. 25:1, 2. II The Sanctuary (Tabernacle) of Wership. Ex. 25:8. III. Voluntariness in Wership. Ex 35:20-22. IV. The Leaders of Worhip, Ex. 40:12-15. V. The

Presence of God. Ex. 40:34-38.

I. Giving in Worship, God's command through Moses to the chil dren of Israel to bring an offering was to make possible the build ing of the tabernacle. The offering was to be a gift to God, and it was to be given willingly on the part of each person. This teacher by implication one of the first lessons the Israelites needed to learn about worship. Worship involves awareness of the reality and presence of God as the Holy One, as the Lord of heaven and earth, a Creator, and as Redeemer. God is recognized as the true and Liv ing God, who is to be the object of man's supreme devotion, adoration, and trust. Worship, therefore, calls for self-giving.

We here observe the emphasis on voluntary offerings from the people. While God alone can and must prescribe the manner of the sanctuary, the people must provide Itim a dwelling place, and that of their own free will. The people must furnish the materials by voluntary contribution; it must be a "heart" offering. Enforced tall plion and labour was not acceptable to Jehovah for this offering. He had been their Redeemer out of Egyptian bondage that they might serve llim, and that service must be a "heart" service, a free and voluntary service. God always delights in and desires freewill offer ings. (I Chron. 29:9, 14; Prov. 11:25; Rom. 12:8; 2 Chron. 9:12 1 was only reasonable and right that the people of Israel should free tv give of their substance for the public service of Jehovah, since He had enriched them with the spoils of the Egyptians (Ex 12

The Sanctuary to be erected was to be for their own benefit. and so it was only reasonable that they should bear the expense of it. They could well aford to give liberally and generously, since the honour and glory of Jehovah was involved in the erection of the Sanctuary as well as in their giving,

It was an offering to Jehovah, given and devoted to Him for His service and honour and glory. Hence it must be a voluntary of foring. The Lord is not honoured and glorified by any service or offering no matter how splendid and great, if it is not freely given The best use we can make of our lives and possessions as God's eople, is to give to the service and cause of Christ. Our blessed edeemer expects of us that we might freely serve Him. Since we we by the Lord, we should also live for Him. (Rom. 12:1; 2 Cor. 5:

II. The Place of Worship. And let them make me a sanctuary; hat I may dwell among them. (v. 8) The Tabernacle was to be a anctuary of worship. God was proposing to "tabernacle" in the nidst of its people. This did not mean that He would live in the abernacie in the sense of being restricted to it. God cannot be retricted to one place; He dwells every where. But in a very real way it symbolized God's presence and called the children of Israel come before Him in worship. They were thus reminded of His presence in their midst.

The word translated "sanctuary" denotes a holy habitation for Jehovah's immediate residence. He directed that a royal palace be t up among them for Himself, in which He, their God and Rebemer might dwell among them. He had been with them all along ntil now, but from henceforth they were to have a visible token

His presence in their midst, so they might never again ask, "Is shovah among us, or not?" (Ex. 17:7, A.S.V.).

We may observe that Jehovah Himself would furnish the model this sanctuary, (Ex. 25:9). They were to make it "according to all at I showed thee, after the pattern of the tabernacle, and the patern of all the instruments thereof" (Ex. 25:9). It was to be made ecording to the divine plan, and not according to human ingenuity. Thatsoever is done in God's service must be done by His direction of otherwise; and here Moses is commanded to build the tabernacle ecording to the divine pattern. The pattern for the Church of the ord Jesus is given us in the program of God for the present disensation; it is to witness for Christ and to minister according to be ministry divinely bestowed, to the calling and completion of the hurch (Luke 24:4648; Acts 1:8; 15:14; Eph. 4:7-12). When we labor ccording to God's program and plan we may expect God's presence and blessing, but when we depart from God's program and plan are will be barrenness and failure. Service for the Lord must be reformed by His direction, if it is to have His seal of approval in a service because of the control essing bestowed.

Let us observe that the tabernacle is typical in several ways (1) is a figure of things in the heavens (Heb. 9:23); (2) It is a type God incarnate in Jesus Christ the Son (John 1:1-14; I Timothy 16; (3) It is type of the church as a habitation of God through the pirit (Eph 2:19-22); (4) It is a type of the believer as being God ad Christ-indwelled (2 Cor. 6:16; 1 Cor. 6:19, 20; Col. 1:27). Throughut, every detail in the Tabernacle speaks of Jesus Christ

III. Voluntariness in Worship. (Ex. 35:20-22). The Children of rael responded to the instruction to bring their gifts with glad and ull obedience. Now that they had again secured the favour of Jeovah their God, they were glad to do what He commanded them brough Moses. How splendid it would be if the congregation of very true servant of the Lord would always do what God told them in he name of the Lord! And what blessing they would receive from the ord, and also, would be made to others by so doing! The spirit of bedience is the spirit of humility and grateful appreciation of God's coodness, love and grace.

A few things stand out in bold relief concerning the offering he people of Israel brought.

1. Their generousity was inspiring. All who gave, gave willingly, each one according to what he had. Much emphasis was placed on the spirit of the voluntariness. And this was a lesson about wor. ship which the children of Israel needed to learn. God does not force His people to worship. He does not force gifts of substance or of service. Those whose hearts were stirred up gave willingly and cheerfully, out of love to Jehovah and His service, and as the expression of gratitude to Jehovah for his past favours to them. The Lord's thought for our giving is exactly the same: He loves the "cheerful giver," 2 Cor. 9:7.

2. Their response was immediate. They did not beg Moses for time to consider and to pray about the matter, neither did they hesitate nor loiter. When they were informed about the matter of giving, they responded at once. This is the right way to do in matters pertaining to the clearly-revealed will of God. Quite frequently when the time is taken for further consideration, the zeal is cooled by the delay. We should promply perform every duty of which we are convinced of God, and we should speedily embrace every privilege that comes to us of service for the Lord.

3. The offering was "the Lord's." Ex. 35:21. Every person whose heart stirred him up" and every one "whom his spirit made willing" bought the Lord's offering. This is what God wants, a freewill offering from hearts that are stirred by love for Him. There is here a lesson for us: the true motive for our giving is love for God.

4. "As many as were willing" brought their offering to Jehovah. There are always some who love their gold more than their God, and would not part with it for even so great a purpose as to build a sanctuary for Jehovah.

Both men and women shared in the giving. The women gave up the things they had (or personal adornment, "broaches, and earrings, and signet-rings and armlets, all jewels of gold" (Ex. 35:22 A.S.V.). They were more occupied with the honour and glory of Jehovah than with personal decoration and pride. The men made an offering of gold.

Israel's offering was not only freely given, it was also large and liberal. When we realy love the Lord we will be liberal in our gifts to support His cause. It is most likely that all the things the children of Israel offered to Jehovah, they had obtained as spoils from the Egyptains. We may think of the Israelites as having been kept very poor while in Egypt, but when they left they asked many things from the Egyptians, who were glad to give them what they asked, if only they would leave their land (Cf. Ex. 12:35, 36). Thus the wealth of Egypt was employed to build a sanctuary for Jehovah, as well as for the service of Jehovah

IV Leaders of Worship, Ex. 40:12-15. The people had done their part in building and furnishing the place of worship. To inaugurate, and maintain a program of worhip, it was necessary to have leaders. God chose Aaron and his sons to direct the worship services in the new tabernacle. Therefore, God gave to Moses full instructions for the fulfillment of their duties and of their conduct. They were to minister for God and for the people. In keeping with this Moses was to consecrate them, symbolically, by washing them, putting on their holy garments, and anointing them for their priestly ministeries The fuller accounts of the setting apart on the santification of the priest are found in Ex. 28: and 29 and Leviticus 8 and 9.

In the present dispensation of Grace, all believers on the Lord

lesus Christ are "priest unto God," Rev. 1:6). Through the blood of thrist we have direct access to God, and the high responsibility and privilege of interceding for God's blessing upon "all men." 2 Tim. 2.1, 2. We live in a day when far too much significance is attached o estments in certain ceremonies in the church. What God requires of those who would minister His truth to others is "clean hands, and a pure heart" Ps. 24:4, and a soul free from vanity and leceit.

The Aaronic priesthood was to be perpetual (Ex. 40:15) in the sense that it would not cease in the age of the Mosiac law. In conrast our Lord Jesus Christ is a priest "for ever" Heb. 7:17, 23-25, in the sense that His ministrations for believers do not cease in any ige, but are eternal. The writer of Hebrews emphasized the eternal haracter of Christ's priesthood, saying, "He ever liveth to make ntercession for them" (Heb. 7:25). Because He continueth ever, (He)

nath an unchangeable priesthood" (vs. 24).

The Aaronic priesthood was a shadow, but Jesus Christ is a reality (10:1). The Aaronic priest ministered daily, and in addition the high priest entered the holy of holies once a year to make atonement for national sins. The repetition revealed the inability of their animal sacrifices to permanently blot sin from God's sight (vv. 14). Only the vicarious blood of the Lord Jesus, our Great High riest, could do that. He was both the Priest who offered the sacrifice and also the sacrifice itself. By His perfect sacrifice on the cross. Christ the lamb of God once for all made full atonement "for, the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:2). The believer rejoices that "one offering, He hath perfected forever them that are sanctified" (Heb 10:14).

The presence of God, Ex. 40:34-38. God's glory in the cloud. After God's instruction had been followed, "a cloud covered the tent of the congregation, and the glory of the Lord filled the Tabernacle" Ex 40:34. The cloud so often spoken of the symbol of God's presence, came and covered the tent of meeting, and the glory of Jehovah filled the tabernacle, as a sign to the people that their

labour was accepted.

The cloud covered it on the outside, and the glory of Jehovah filled it within. Jehovah took such complete possession of the Tabernacle, that not even Moses could enter it. By taking possession of he Tabernacle, Jehovah witnessed both to the return of His favour, which they had forfeited by the golden-call (Ex. 32:7), and His acceptance of the labour and expense of the people. Jehovah's taking possession of the Tabernacle was the occasion of the actual conseeration of the Sanctuary; it made it a holy place (Lev. 16:2; Num. 9:15; 1 Kings 8:10, 11; Flag. 2:79; Zech. 2:5; Rev. 15:8). The glory of Jehovah was now more brightly revealed than it had been displayed on the mount (Ex. 24:16).

The cloud of glory is a beautiful type of the Holy Spirit, What the Shekinah glory was to the Tabernacle, and later the Temple, that the Holy Spirit is to the Church, the Holy Temple (Eph. 2:22), and to the temple which is the believer's body (1 Cor. 6:19). The cloud in its movements made known Jehovah's will to Israel; and directed and guided them. We have no such external sign to make known the Lord's will to us, but we have the internal presence of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit guldes and directs God's people through the ward. This lays upon us the responsibility of dillgently studying the WORD in order that we may know what it teaches, and also that we reverently and humbly submit to the Word,

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

September 6, 1963

President Pettaway, Officers and Members of the National Convention of America: I am happy to submit my first Statistical Report.

This is a critical time for the religious life of America. Ac-

This is a critical time for the religious life of America. According to the Yearbook of American Churches published a few months ago indicated that for the first time in one hundred years "the percentage of Church members in the Nation's population has registered a decrease."

According to an estimate published in the Baptist World, publication of the Baptist World Alliance, the membership of Baptist Churches now totals 25,198.025 in 115 countries. This is an increase of 88,487 over a year ago. Most of the gains (800,000) were in North America. Evidently Baptist grow more where religious freedom really prevails. By Continents the 1963 totals are:

Africa—401,844
Asia—860,063 (not counting those in Communist China)
Central America—119,884
Europe—1,126,453
Middle East—695
South America—226,970
South west Pacific—91,014
North America—22,371,102

I am sure you are eagerly waiting to hear the statistics of our $_{GWn}$ Convention. I wish to thank Dr. D. C. Cooksey, the Recording

Secretary of the Convention for his invaluable help in making available to me the Mailing List of the Convention. My thanks also go to Rev T. B. Boyd of the Publishers Board for his cooperation in helping to put me in touch with the Constituency.

You may be surprised to know that many of our members do not know the value of giving their proper address and reporting address changes. As a result, our Mailing List is not much help in reaching Pastors, Churches and etc. Letters were sent to the Presidents of each State Convention that make up our National Convention, requesting the most recent Statistical Report of tha Convention. Business reply envelopes (self addressed envelopes requiring no postage) were sent for their convience. Received the following

Courteous and encouraging letters were received from Dr. John W. Williams, President of the Missouri Baptist State Convention and Dr. Andrew C. Brown of Baltimore, Maryland. Three letters returned because of improper addresses. There was no reply from any of the others

They think it irrelevant and undignified to talk in statistical terms about the Church. They claim they are concerned about the quality and not quantity. I notice they do not hesitate to speak of how much money is raised in anniversaries and etc.



BY-LAWS AND CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST NURSES AUXILIARY COMPS CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the National Baptist Convention of America Nurses Corps do unne ourselves together for the purpose of attending the sick at the Convention and wherever we are needed regardless to mankind, color, or creed. And shall to the best of our ability prove worthy to our Profession, therefore we adopt this Consti-ARTICLE 1-Name-

this body shall be known as the National Baptist Nurses Corps Convention of America.

ARTICLE II-Our Motto-

A Good Nurse is God's Love on Display ARTICLE II-Membership-

Section 1. The Membership shall consist of Individuals, Districts, General Associations, and State Conventions. If there's an Order of Nurses Organizations within a state which has no General Association are State Convention connected with this Convention, this order of Representatives from this Organization shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that State.

Section 2: The following qualified persons may become members, namely: RN, LPN, LVN, PN, Nurses Aides, and Red Cross First

Aides.

Section 3: Any Nurse in good and regular standing with their church may become a member by enrolling with the sum of one

Section 4: Each local church sha'l pay ten (\$10.00) dollars for representation and entitled to five (5) messengers

Section 5: Each District Association shall pay twennty-five (\$25.00) dollars and entitled to five (5) messengers

Section 6: Each State Convention and General Association shall pay fifty (\$50.00) dollars and entitled to ten (10) messengers, and five (\$5.00) dollars for each additional messenger.

Section 7: All Officers shall pay fifteen (\$15.00) dollars Annual-

Section 8: Annual Individual membership shall be one (\$1.00) dollar ARTICLE IV-Finance-

All finances received by the Nurses Corps shall be turned over to the Parent-Body along with their expense sheet.

ARTICLE V-OFFICERS-

The Officers of the Auxiliary Corps shall consist of a President, First Vice, Second Vice, and Third Vice President, Recording Secretary; Assistance Recorder, Treasurer, Chaplain, National Instructor. National Chorister, National Historian, and National Parliamentarian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their office until their Successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VI-Duties of the Officers-

Section 1: The President, She shall be the presiding officer, Appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not clected by the Body

Section 2: First Vice President. At the request of the President, or in case of resignation; death; or inability of the President shall fill that position.

Section 3: The Second Vice President: She shall perform the duties that are carried out by the President or First Vice President when necessary

Section 4: The Third Vice President. She shall perform the duties that are carried out by the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President when necessity demands.

Section 5: The Recording Secretary This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all proceedings of the Auxiliary in Session, compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are counter signed by the President and make a report to this body annually.

Section 6: The Assistant Recording Secretary. This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the the Recording Secretary.

Being carefully to give correct data as from events and ideas derived. Keep record of same for the benefit of said Auxiliary. And he able to issue any information when required.

ARTICLE VII-Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Parent Body or the Nurses Corps.

After representation payment and request for nurses to become an auxiliary was made to the Parent Body, Mrs. Brown was then in formed that the decision of the board would be given at the new setting of the Convention which was to be held in New Orleans Louisiana in 1960.

It was a glorious feeling in New Orleans when we were told that the purses had been accepted as an auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention of America.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 9, 1964-MORNING SESSION

NURSES ADORNING THEMSELVES FOR SERVICE

Address Given by Sister Nellie Simon

To "adorn" might be defined in this: "To make more pleasing or attractive; to beautify or decorate; to improve upon or to embellish." When we speak of adorning one's self, we usually refer to that type of adornment with which we as Nurses should concern ourselves is the type which appeals to the spirit of man and not to the eye and physical sense. This type of adornment has been beautifully and concisely described by Paul in one of his letters to Timothy in which he says. "It is my wish that women should modestly and wisely adorn themselves in Seemly Dress. This adornment should not consist in braided hair and ornaments of gold and poarle but as women who prefer to revere God, they should adorn themselves in GOOD WORKS."

Of course we want to be neat and clean and look our best at all times keeping in mind that the qualities which made a nurse truly professional are not those which meet the eye, let us take Paul's suggestion that our dress be modest, wise and appropriate

to women who profess to offer service to God by caring for the sick and disabled. They are depending on the sympathetic and helpful spirit of a guardian of mercy and have little or no use for a glamor girl.

How then should a model nurse adorn herself for service? She might begin the day by arriving with a large handbag full of love, cheery good mornings and sincere how-do-you do's which she will find use for all during the day. She arrives on time. Everything about her from her clean, well-brushed hair to her beautifully buffed shoes bespeaks of cleanliness without ostentatious self-adoration. She walks as one with a will to serve and not to be seen. Our model nurse is not a model because of heavy make-up or the measurements of her waistline, but as one who professes to revere God she is a model of mercy and good will. Our beautifully adorned nurse wears a uniform cut along simple lines of a meek and humble spirit for she knows that arrogance has no place in her field of work. It is best described as the Good Samaritan type which, according to leading fashion designers, is classic. It will never go out of style. She is capped with clean thoughts. Her face is powdered with restraint and self-control. Her lips glow with good conversation and kind words of encouragement. She is often seen touching them up with a smile which she will give to those she finds in need. She considers a nice manicure essential to her good looks but her manners more than her naits. Her manners are always polished to a high lustre. Her favorite shade is common courtesy. She seals it with respect for the rights, property and feelings of others. From her fingers she has already removed the unwanted cuticles of bigotry, selfishness, coveteousness, inconsiderate and boisterous behavior which would spoil the effect.

See her as she walks briskly about her duties. She is a woman well-clothed in efficiency, respect and good will. Doing her job to the best of her ability she gives a day's work for a day's pay.

She is a smart buyer who detests the cheap attire of slander, brownosing, deceit, taking advantage of others or common behavior which is sometimes offered for a sale in the career shop. She seeks to advance herself on her merits knowing this is the best buy.

In conclusion I say to you a nurse who is properly adorned will be loved, appreciated and long-remembered by all who have the pleasure of knowing her and most of all by the Master who so beautifully adorned her.
