- To encourage our literary men and women and to promote the interest of Baptist literature.
- 4 To discuss questions pertaining to especially the religious educational, industrial and social interest of our people.
- 5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard
- That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the Denomination.

Having been solicited to write the call by many whose names and endorsement are hereunto affixed, the call is hereby made by their advice and solicitations for said Convention to meet in St. Louis. # CONSTITUTION

OF THE

# NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Foreign Mission Baptist Convention of the United States of America, The American National Baptist Convention and the Baptist National Educational Convention; in order to form a more perfect United National Baptist Organization, to secure the blessings of unity for capable and efficient Foreign Mission, tiome Mission and Educational work among ourselves and throughout of the world; do ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I. NAME: This Body shall be known as "The National Baptist Convention of America."

### ARTICLE 2-NATURE AND FUNCTION

SECTION I. The National Baptist Convention of America shall serve as an Agency of Christian Education, Missionary and Church Extension; and combine the efforts of Baptist Churches and Organizations in extending the gospel both at home and to the Foreign fields; and propagate Baptist Doctrines of faith and distinctive principles throughout the world.

Section 2. It shall give its influence in maintaining and safeguarding full religious liberty and spiritual independence on both the home and the foreign fields

# ARTICLE 3-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The membership of this Convention shall be annual Orthodox Baptist Churches, District Associations. General Associations and State Conventions.

SECTION 2. Each Church shall register with One Dollar (\$1.00) per member, (minimum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) representation fee in this Convention), and be entitled 50 one messenger. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

SECTION 3. Each District Association shall pay Fifty Dollars (50.00) for representation and be entitled to two (2) messengers. Ten Dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

SECTION 4. Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for representation and the entitled to five (5) messengers. Ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid for each additional messenger.

# ARTICLE 4-OFFICERS

The officers of this Convention shall be President; First Vice (24)

President; Second Vice President; Recording Secretary; First, Second, Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries; Corresponding Secretary; Statistical Secretary; Treasurer; Auditor; Director of Public Relations; Historian; and Secretary of Youth Activities. Each officer shall be elected annually.

The President of each State Conventon and Moderator of each General Association holding membership in this Convention shall be Associate Vice-Presidents.

# ARTICLE 5-ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The committee on the nomination of Officers shall be appointed by the President; and make its report following the report of Officers not later than the Friday afternoon session.

SECTION 2. The election of Officers shall be made by roll call

of states.

SECTION 3. The time for election in each annual session shall be set by the Executive Board and listed in the printed program.

SECTION 4. Only registered messengers shall have the privilege of voting in the election of officers in the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 5. In no case shall an officer be eligible for reelection orior to his submission of an annual report from his office.

# ARTICLE 6-EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and Corresponding Secretaries of the Board, and the Presidents of the State Conventions.

SECTION 2. The elected Officers of the Convention shall be

reimbursed for their travel expense to the Executive Board Meetings.

ARTICLE 7—FUNCTION OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall transact the unfinished business of the Convention in the interims.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall arrange regional meetings and conferences as may be deemed necessary.

SECTION 3. If any chosen site for the annual session is found to be unsatisfactory, the Executive Board under the direction of the President shall select the place for the next annual session of the Convention to meet elsewhere.

# ARTICLE 8-DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The President: He shall be the presiding officer; authorize the calling of all regular and special meetings; sign all orders drawn on the treasurer: appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body; and he shall be the chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION 2. The First Vice President: At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President in discharge the power and duties of said officer, the Vice President shall fill the office of the President.

SECTION 3. Second Vice President: He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President and First Vice President as needs

require.

SECTION 4. The Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in mession: compile and distribute the minutes, prepare and distribute the en-

rollment cards; draw all drafts on the treasurer; (all drafts must be signed by the President) He shall make an annual report to the

SECTION 5. The First Assistant Recording Secretary: The Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the Annual meetings and do whatever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 6. The Second Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials. prepare his records for the minutes and do what ever is required through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION 7. The Third Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention and do whatever else required through the Recording Secretary

SECTION 8. The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Claims and Accounts and do whatever is required through the Recording Sec-

SECTION 9. The Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secretary shall do all the Convention and Executive Board correspondance, as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make an annual report to the Convention.

SECTION 10. The Statistical Secretary: This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and Baptist generally and report the same Annually.

SECTION 11. The Treasurer: He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention or the President. He shall keep his records so as to preserve per-

perually for reference and report annually receipts and disbursements. SECTION 12. Auditor: He shall audit all records of the Board and the Treasurer of the Convention; each of which shall be ex amined at least Thirty Days (30) prior to the Annual session.

SECTION 13. Director of Public Relations: The Director of Pub

lic Relations shall give publicity to all of the aims and objectives of the National Convention and its Auxiliaries.

SECTION 14. Historian: He shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for furu reference. The Historian shall also publish documented records of the Negro in the Baptist Churches.

SECTION 15. Secretary of Youth Activities: Secretary of Yout's Activities shall serve as cordinator between the Parent Convention and the Youth Auxiliary Convention. The Convention holds him responsible for the full compliance of the Youth Auxiliary with its objectives and procedures.

# ARTICLE 9. CONVENTION BOARDS AND THEIR DUTIES

SECTION 1. This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, B.T.U., National Baptist Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, Educational.

SECTION 2. Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, Said election shall be annually,

SECTION 3. Officers: The Boards shall have a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The officers of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION 4. Duties of Officers: The Chairman of Boards shall preside at all board meetings. The Recording Secretary of each board shall keep a true record of the proceedings of the board.

SECTION 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Treasurer of each Board and do all the correspondence of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION 6. Management: The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary and three (3) other members of the board shall constitute the Board of Management. Each board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does during the meeting of the Convention and during

SECTION 7. Reports of Boards: Each Board shall make an an-

nual report to the Convention.

SECTION 8. The compensation of each officer and employee of the Boards shall be fixed by each Board. Compensations shall be limited to the Chairman, Recording Secretary and Corresponding

SECTION 9. The compensation of each board is subject to the approval of the convention, and thus must be presented to the con-

vention for proper authorization.

SECTION 10. Duties of Boards: The Home Mission Board shall seek to keep alive struggling Churches, maintain a Baptist Christian Witness, and seek to extend the work of the Kingdom in newly settled or densely populated areas in the domains of the Convention.

The Foreign Mission Board shall seek extended fields of the Great Commission in saving the lost wherever approved by the Con-

The Educational Board shall give encouragement to those initutions endorsed by the convention and shall attempt to build an influence that the pulpit and leadership of the church will be more

The National Baptist Publishing Board shall have charge of

the publications of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall carry the program of Evangelism approved by the Convention.

# ARTICLE 10-AUXILIARIES

SECTION 1. There shall be a Senior Women's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, Junior Women's Auxiliary, National Baptist Convention, National Baptist Brotherhood Auxiliary Convention and Nurse Corp National Baptist Convention.

SECTION 2. All messengers to the Auxiliary Convention shall be appointed and certified on the official letter of the Convention

by the Churches of the Convention.

SECTION 3. All Auxiliary Conventions are subject to the action

of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 4. Each Auxiliary Convention shall elect a President. Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as may be required.

SECTION 5. All officers elected by the auxiliary conventions must be submitted to the National Baptist Convention for approval. SECTION 6. All auxiliary conventions shall report all of their receipts and disbursements for the conventional year at the annual session to the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION 7. All monies collected by auxiliary conventions at the annual session must be reported and turned over to the Finance Committee of the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America daily,

SECTION 8. The auxiliary conventions will report their bills and expense to the National Baptist Convention of America for approval. which shall, under no circumstances, exceed 40 per cent of the total

SECTION 9. The auxiliary conventions may accept representation fees from any and all aux haries of the local church, included in their work, subject to their approved constitutional regulations.

# ARTICLE 11-COMMITTIES

SECTION 1. The Registration Committees of the National Baptist Convention of America and its Auxiliaries, working jointly with the Finance Committee shall open the office of registration the Tuesday, 12:00 Noon prior to the opening of the Convention.

SECTION 2. There shall be three (3) committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the convention,

(a) Finance Commutee: Shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the convention, and report the same to the convention daily.

(b) Committee on Bills and Accounts: Shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts, and recommend the amount to be paid by the Convention.

(c) Credentials Committee: In keeping with SECTION 3. There shall be a standing Budget Committee; Responsible for preparation and current revision of a working budget for the National Baptist Convention and all its Auxiliaries

# ARTICLE 2-MEETINGS

The Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the Second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday Night. The place shall be selected by the convention in annual meet ing with places chosen two years in advance of next current session

ARTICLE 13. Representation in other organizations: The Nation al Baptist Convention of America shall hold membership in the Bap tist World Alliance and may hold membership in such other organi zations as it from time to time elects.

ARTICLE 14. Commissions: There shall be a Commission on Transportation, Christian Education, Social Justice and Army and Navy Chaplains.

(1) The Railroad Commission shall consist of (5) members elected annually and shall have charge of all transportation.

(2) The Commission on Christian Education shall consist of nine members, elected annually and shall plan and promote the Educa tional program of the Convention.

(3) The Commission on Social Justice shall consist of five (5) members and shall plan and promote such programs as will provide Christian concern for the welfare of oppress 1 peoples.

(4) The Commission of Army and Navy Chaplains shall have charge of recommending Chaplains for the Army and Navy and shall consist of three (3) members

ARTICLE 15. This Constitution may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the Convention in the annual session provided written notice is given on the first day of the session.

2. Officers of the convention and all auxiliaries, officers and members of all boards shall be members of a Baptist Church holding membership in the Convention.

3. Messengers enrolled upon presenting proper credentials from the churches, state conventions and general associations shall constitute the convention. The enrollment of messengers may begin 10 days prior to the conventions annual meeting.

4. Finance:

(a) An approved book keeping system of receipts and disbursements shall be kept by the treasurer of the Convention, the treasurer of all auxiliary conventions, and secretary treasurer of each board

(b) The following system shall be used in the handling of con-

vention funds: (a) All funds received by the Finance Committee of the Convention and the executive board shall be receipted with three (3) carbon stubs; one for the secretary of the committee and one for the auditor of the convention.

(b) The finance committee shall issue a daily report signed by the chairman and secretary of the committee and the treasurer of

the convention. (c) All funds shall be deposited each day in a convention de-

pository through a local bank where the convention is in session. (d) During the annual session, the Auditor of the Convention shall check and compare the receipts with the funds each day.

(e) All funds shall be paid out by check,

(f) The treasurer of the convention, the chairman, secretary and tressurer of the Finance Committee shall be bonded.

(g) The auxiliary treasurers shall deposit daily with the finance committee and take its receipt.

(h) The auxiliaries of the convention shall not use more than forty percent of funds collected for operating expenses.

(i) The convention shall have the right to designate only un-

designated funds. All designated funds must be turned over to the causes for which designated.

(j) The salaries of the officers of the Convention shall be sep-

arated from the expenses and all expense itemized.

The Railroad Commission will be paid \$100.00 Annually,
The Committee on Orthodox will be paid \$50.00 each not to exceed two members.

The Committee on Social Justice \$150.00

The Musical Directress and Organist are to be paid \$25.00 per day during the session of the Convention, plus \$5.00 per day for board and lodging.

bers of our great Convention, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I want you first to know how happy I am to be here in your midst today. During these last few months, I have been brought very low by the Lord, but He has seen fit to bring me back thus far and has enabled me to assemble in another annual Convention. Out of the depths of my ui I cried unto Him like this: Lord, you know I've tried to make u a good servant since 1902. I've been right sometimes; and Vice Presidents—Doctor Sams and Doctor Byrd, Officers and Mem. consequence of our great Convention Ladies and Gentlemen. ur spirit in my heart. If my work here is finished, I'm ready to me home; but if you have something yet for me to do, I'll keep toiling until my day is done.

But tohy by God's Amazing Grace, I can move this hand about; I can tratch my head, touch my ear (and you really have no idea how that it is to be able to do any the control of t reat it is to be able to do even these little things for yourself); nd I can walk-a little cripple yet, but I can walk. At first I buldn't even bow down on my knees to pray. And so from my ck bed, lying prostrate and helpless, out of the depths I cried nto the Lord,-"Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have, live I thee; In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and alk." How infinitely better was that gift—the gift of God—than the mere alms the lame man asked, and expected to receive.

How infinitely better is the gift of God's love, His Grace, His ercy, His Power, to us than many things we ask and pray for. ometimes when people ask us how we feel, we say we're "down the dumps." Have you ever said that? What we really mean that we're down in the depths of some problem, whether physal, mental or spiritual or financial and we just don't feel happy.

It I would tell you today, and hear me if you will, whatever your ight, whatever your circumstance, be not dismayed, God will ke care of you. All you need He will provide—Nothing you sk will be denied. So cast all your cares upon Him for He careth w's cruse of oil from being empty, who watched over the Israelites n the wilderness, who clothed the lily of the field and sees every parrow that falls; and bless your soul, He who heard my cry and brought ME-C. D. Pettaway up out of the depths, will not

But you can't cast your cares upon Him unless you submit ourselves wholly to Him through prayer, through meditation,

thing is going along smoothly, we can't cry unto God like we cut rought well. Shall we, who have even greater opportunities for when we face great danger and grave situations in life. God is vice, do less than they? able, ready and willing to hear our cries. "I know in whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I

have committed to Him against that day."

Our nation needs to cry unto God out of the depths of prejudice, of evil and hatred, of riots and rioting, of injustice and ignorance, and of sin. We are the most powerful nation in the world (so we say) but our power must not be our wealth, our ed. ucation, our missiles, our space program, our race to the moon, but our power must be in the words of the Prophet Micah: "to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God." The "Big Three" is not Russia, Great Britain and the United States, but God the Father. God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. If we would have peace in the world, these must be the reigning powers. In these days when despair and futility threaten to overcome us when we are tempted to believe that the threat of bombs and missiles is the symbol of ultimate conquest, let us remember that good must triumph over evil, life over death, hope over despair. Life's victories do not come on the battlefield-on earth, on sea or in the air-but God's love and His power in the hearts of men.

Our Convention greatly needs to cry to God out of the depths. We are God's ministers; we are God's spokesmen; we are God's watchmen on the wall. As free me, we must proclaim the gospel of peace throughout the world. Godw's Word is truth and if we know the truth, it will make us free. At such a time in the history of the affairs of men, we must proclaim onew our faith in God, in our fellowman and in ourselves. We must denounce evil in all of its forms. We must not compromise, We must not be afraid.

" e meet here and there in Annual Session year after year for a simple purpose—to enrich our souls with the preaching and teaching of the gospel; to promote fellowship and associational and conventional ties between our ministers, our sisters, our bro'hers, our youth, and our churches; and to espose and promulgate the causes which we represent through our various Boards and Commissions. We must continue to uphold the traditions of our Convention by supporting financially and spiritually our work; and those who are placed in responsible positions should take care that they fill well their offices. The Eye of God is upon us; the eye of man is upon us; and we must not fail either of them. Those of long

In the words of Booker T. Washington, I am determined that e, as the National Baptist Convention of America, be able to ay: "Tell them the sacrifice was not in vain. Often through ppression, unjust discrimination and prejudice, but through them we are coming up, and with proper habits, intelligence and prop rty, there is no power on earth that can permanently stay our rogress . . . We are to be tested in our patience, our forbearnce, our perserverance, our power to endure wrong, to withstand emptations, to economize, to acquire and use skill, our ability to ompele to disregard the superficial for the real, the appearnce for the substance, to be great and yet small, learned and ret simple, high and yet the servant of all."

In a recent issue of TIME Magazine. I found these vital statisics: "There are eight Negro federal judges, 100 county and state udges, four U. S. ambassadors. Thurgood Marshall, who recently esigned from the federal bench at the urging of President Johnon to become United States Solicitor General, represents the United tates in the most important ligigations before the Supreme Court. arl Rowan, onetime Ambassador to Finland, only recently resigned s director of the USIA where he was chiefly responsible for proecting the U. S. image abroad. Edward W. Brooke, attorney gen ral of Massachusetts, is the highest elected Negro state officer in the United States. Leroy Johnson, two years ago became Georia's first Negro state legislator since Reconstruction. Episcopalian ohn M. Burgess, son of a dining-car waiter, is Suffragan Bishop of Massachusetts; Dr. Middleton H. Lambright, Jr., grandson of a lave, is president of the Cleveland Acadamy of Medicine. Leslie Shaw is the first Negro postmaster of Los Angeles. Historian ohn Hope Franklin is a professor at the University of Chicago.

Individual Negro incomes went up 54 % from 1950 to 1963. and family incomes soared by 73%. The number of Negroes living in standard housing compared with census-defined substandard ousing, doubled in the same period. Negro-controlled insurance ompanies have doubled their assets since 1951; Negro commercial anks have increased their assets from \$5 millon to 53 million ince 1949.

I thought the above statistics might be interesting for you to ote. In the light of these facts, you can see that our Convention needs to take its stride and gain momentum with each passing year. We need to expand our horizons. Let us enter another year of our work with a new sense of our responsibility to God, of its its ability, under God, to hasten in some tangible way the coming on earth of the Kingdom of God.

I thank you for the many prayers which you offered in my behalf. And believe me, I felt the power and the efficacy of those prayers. They sustained me through the long hours of the night The letters, telegrams, telephone calls, and those who came to see me, I shall ever remember those golden moments which cheered my waning spirits and provided warmth and cheer for me.

I have talked with some of the brethren from time to time with regard to the continued leadership of our Convention white is a very important matter in our equation today. What I said to them, I say to you today. And that is, whatever you feel is the best thing to do today with regard to that continued leadership and progress of our Convention, feel free to do so. And I shall be happy to abide by your decision. The choice is yours.

# HISTORIAN REPORT

# Of Commission on Social Justice Orthodoxy—Doctrine

SOTERIOLOGY, OR THE DOCTRINES OF SALVATION AS IT RELATES TO ELECTION—POSITIVE

Rev. J. O. Stephen, Denver, Colo.

ELECTION is that eternal act of God, by which in His sovereign pleasure, and on account of no foreseen merit in them. He choses certain out of the number of sinful men to be the recipients of the special grace of His Spirit, and to be made voluntary partakers

Of Chirist's salvation.

SCRIPTURAL PROOF OF THE DOCTRINE OF ELECTION: Dr. hovey, says: "The Scriptures forbid us to find the reasons for election in the moral action of man before the 'New Birth,' and refer us merely to the sovereign will and mercy of God; that is, they teach the doctrine of personal election." From a preliminary point of view, Dr. Hovey says. First, that "God has a sovereign right to bestow more grace upon one subject than upon another—grace being unmerited tayour to sinners." Secondly, that "God has been pleased to exercise this right in dealing with men." Psa. 147:20—1. hach not dealth so with any mation; and as for his ordinances, they have not known them." First, that "God has a sovereign right to bestow more grace upon one subject than upon another,—grace being unmerited favour to sinners," Matt. 20:12.15—"These last have briend, I do thee no wrong. ... Is it not lawful for me to do what I will with mine own?" Rom. 9:20, 21 ... "Shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, Why didst thou make me thus? Or hath not the potter a right over the clay, from the same lump to make one part a vessel unto honour, and another unto dishonour?" Rom. 3:1-2—"What advantage then hath the Jew? or what is the profit of circumcision? Much every way: first of all, that they were incrumcision? Much every way: first of all, that they were fire for incrumcision? Much every way: first of all, that they were me, but I have chosen you, and appointed you, that ye should go and bear fruit". Acts 9:15—"he is a chosen vessel unto me, to bear my name before the Gentiles and kings, and the children of Israel."

Thirdly, that "God has some other reason than that of saving as many as possible for the way in which He distributes His grace." Matt. 11:21—Tyre and Sidon "Would have repented," if they had had the grace bestowed upon Chorazin and Bethsaida; Rom. 9:22-25—"What if God, willing to show his wrath, and to make his power known, endured with much long suffering vessels of wrath fited unto destruction: and that he might make known the riches of his glory upon vessels of mercy, which he afore prepared unto glory."

DIRECT STATEMENTS OF GOD'S PURPOSE TO SAVE

# CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS

Jesus speaks of God's elect, as for example in Mark 13:27-

"then shall he send forth his angels, and shall gather together his elect Luke 18:7-shall not God avenge his elect, that cry unto him day and night? Acts 13:46-"As many as were ordained (tetagmenoi) to eternal life believed." Rom. 9:11-16-for the children being not yet born, neither having done anything good or bad, that the purpose of God according to election might stand, not of works, but him that calleth. . I will have mercy upon whom I have mercy, So then it is not him that willeth, nor of him that runneth, but of God that hath mercy"; Eph. 1:4, 5, 9, 11-"chose us in him before the foundation of the world, (not because we were, or were to be, holy, but) that we should be holy and without blemish before him in love; having foreordained us unto adoption as some through Jesus Christ unto himself, according to the good pleasure of his will . . . the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure ... in whom also we were made a heritage, having been foreordained according to the purpose of him who worketh all things after the counsel of his will"; Col. 3:12-"God's elect"; 2 Thess. 2:13-"God chose you from the beginning unto salvation in sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.

IN CONNECTION WITH THE DECLARATION OF GOD'S FOREKNOWLEDGE OF THOSE PERSONS, OR CHOICE TO MAKE THEM OBJECTS OF HIS SPECIAL ATTENTION AN CARE

Rom. 8:27:30—"called according to his purpose. For whom he foreknew, he also foreordained to be conformed to the image of his Son"; I Pet. 1:1, 2—elect . . . according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, in sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ."

The word "knew" in Scripture, frequently means not merely to "apprehend intellectually," but to "regard with favor," to "make an object of care," is evident from Gen. 18:19-1 have known him. to the end that he may command his children and his household after him, that they may keep the way of Jehovah, to do righteousness and justice"; Exod. 2:25-"And God saw the children of Israel, and God took knowledge of them" cf. verse 24-"God heard their greaning, and God remembered his covenant with Abraham, with Isaac, and with Jacob": Psa. 1:6-"for Jehovah knoweth the way of the righteous; but the way of the wicked shall perish"; marg .- "I will know no evil person"; Hosea 13:5-"I did know thee in the wilderness, in the land of great drought. According to their pasture, so were they willed"; Nahum 1.7-"He knoweth them that taketh refuge in him"; Amos 3.2-"You ony have I known of all the families of the earth"; Matt. 7:23-"then I will profess unto them, I never knew you"; Rom, 7:15-"For that which I do I know not'; I Cor. 8:3-"if any man loveth God, the same is known by him;" Gal. 4:9 "now that ye have come to know God or rather, to be known by God"; I Thess. 5:12:13- We beseech you brethren, to know them that labour among you, and are over you in the Lord; and admonish you: and to esteem them highly in love for the work's sake." In Rom 8.28-30quoted above, "foreknow"-elected-this is, made certain individuals, in the future, the objects of his love and care; "foreordained" describes God's designation of these same individuals to receive the special gift of salvation. In other words, "foreknowledge" is of perams: formulaation is of blessings to be bestowed upon them. WITH ASSERTIONS THAT THIS CHOICE IS A MATTER OF GRACE,

What God does, He has eternally purposed to do Since He be stows special regenerating grace on some, He must have eternally purposed to bestow it.—in other words, must have chosen them to

This purpose cannot be conditioned upon any merit or faith of those who are chosen, since there is no such merit—faith itself being Got's gift and foreordained by Him. Since man's faith is foreseen only as the result of God's work of grace, election proceeds rather upon foreseen unbelief. Faith, as the effect of election, cannot at the same time be the cause of election. Augustine: "He chooses, not because we believe, but that we may believe; lest we should say that we first chose Him." (John 15:16—"Ye did not chose me, but I chose you."

The depravity of the human will is such that, without this decree to bestow special Divine influences upon some, all, without exception, would have rejected Christ's salvation after it was offered to them; and so all without exception, must have perished. Election, therefore, may be viewed as a necessary consequence of God's decree to provide an objective redemption, if that redemption is to have any subjective result in human salvation. Election is simply God's determination that the sufferings of Christ shall not be in van; that all men shall not be lost; that some shall be led to accept Christ; that to this end special influences of his Spirit shall

The doctrine of election becomes more acceptable to reason when we remember First, that God's decree is eternal, and in a certain sense is contemporaneous with man's belief in Christ; Secondly, that God's decree to create involves the decree of all that in the exercise of man's freedom will follow; Thirdly, that God's decree is the decree of him who is all in all, so that our willing and doing is at the same time the working of Him who decrees our willing and doing. The whole question turns upon the initiative in human solvation; if this belongs to God, then in spite of the difficulties we must accept the doctrine of election. The timeless existence of God may be the source of many of our difficulties with regard to election, and with a proper view of God's eternity these difficulties might be removed.

# SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

# "CLOUDS OF CONTROVERSY"

Through the prodigious efforts of Dr. R. H. Boyd, the National Baptist Publishing Board was organized. Although it encountered seemingly insurmountable obstacles at the outset, the Publishing Board grew and prospered. During this period the Publishing Board and the Home Mission Board correlated their activities with Dr. R. Il Boyd serving as secretary of both boards. This arrangement was considered a strategic advantage for the promotion of the missionary and educational endeavors of the Baptist constituency. Representatives of the Home Mission Board were in a position to promote the sale of literature produced by the Publishing Board. Sunday Schools and churches organized through the work of the Home Mission Board provided a ready market for the materials produced by the Publishing Board. Hence this cooperative venture contributed to the rapid success of the publication and desemination of religious literature by Negro Baptists.

The charter of the Publishing Board which was issued in 1898 was also approved by the Home Mission Board. The following conditions governing the correlation were agreed upon by the two

boards:

(1) That the Publishing Board would, during the life of this correlation, elect and retain on its board three members of the Home Mission Board; that these three members would be the chairman treasurer, and recording secretary; and if four members from the Home Mission Board, the corresponding secretary would be included.

121 That all missionary work, both church and Sunday School would be credited to the Home Mission Board; all dividends accurang from the sale of Sunday School literature and books that were applied to missions would be applied through the Home Mission Board; that in case a field secretary or district secretary became a necessity, their salaries should be credited to the Home Mission Board and that the Home Mission Board should have the right to nominate the editor-in-chief who should have the oversight of the preparation of all exegesis and contributions to the Sunday School Interature.

In as much as we are here concerned with the most outstanding work of Negro Baptists during this particular epoch, let us give attention to the charter underwhich the National Baptist Publishing Board was organized and operated. Because this came in later years the basis for considerable discussion and disagreement which has remained through the years in the annals of Negro Baptist history.

### CHARTER OF INCORPORATION

National Baptist Publishing Board, Granted by the State of Tennessee, August 15, 1898)

Be it known that we, R. H. Boyd, E. C. Morris, C. H. Clark, J. P.

Robinson G. M. Moore, E. J. Fisher, J. E. Knox, and G. W. D. Gaines, and their successors chosen under the rules and regulations of the National Baptist Convention of the United States, and holding office under the rules, usages and regulations of the said Convention, are thereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name and style of the National Baptist Publishing Board of said conventions of the Baptist Churches or denomination. This corporation is organized for the purpose of establishment, support, and maintenance of Sunday School undertakings on the part of said church, and to print or purchase and disseminate by gift or sale religious literature. Said corporation shall have power to establish and support religious Sunday Schools, purchase, own, or lease land on which to build houses in which to conduct the business of the board, to borrow money when necessary for conduct of business of the corperation, to employ all necessary agents, to solicit, collect, or receive subscriptions in money or otherwise, legacies, or devices to be used in forwarding any or all of the proposed set out or herein provided for, to purchase, have printed, edit, conduct, and carry on for Sunday School purposes, and uses, a magazine or magazines, paper or papers, books, tracts, Sunday school periodicals, together with other religious and denominational paper or papers, and doing a general missionary and charitable work, etc., to rent or purchase a room or rooms or buildings for office and work of the corporation, and all necessary, appliances, fixtures, and material for conducting business of the corporation, to rent or purchase all necessary printing presses, type, material and stationery and to disseminate by sale or give all literature deemed necessary for carrying on the work of the corporation. But in all things to be governed by the rules and regulations of the conventions of the Baptist Churches or denomination, so far as same are consistent with the constitution and laws of State of Tennessee and of these United States.

The general powers of the said corporators shall be to sue and be sued by the corporate name; to have and use a common seal, which it may altar at pleasure, if no common seal, then the signature of the corporation by any duly authorized officer shall be legal and binding; to purchase and hold or receive by gift, device, or bequest, in addition to the personal property owned by the corporation, real estate necessary for the transaction of the corporate business; and also to purchase and to accept any real estate in payment or part payment of any debt due the corporation, and to sell the same; to make by laws and all rules and regulations not inconsistent with the constitution of the United States of America and the State of Tennessee and not contrary to the constitution, rules, and regulations of said conventions, churches or denomination, deemed expedient for the management of the corporate affairs, to appoint such subordinate officers in addition, and to designate the names of the officers and governing body of said conventions, churches, or denomination, as the business of the corporation may require and as are not forbidden by the rules and regulations of said convention, church or denomination, and to designate the names of the officers and their compensation.

The said five or more incorporators shall within a convenient time after the registration of this charter in the office of the Secretary of State, elect from their number a President, Secretary, and Treasurer, or the two last offices may be combined into one, seld

officers and the other incorporators to constitute the first Board of

Directors; in all elections each member to be entitled to one vote, either in person or by proxy, and the result to be determined by the majority of the votes cast.

Due notice of any election must be given by advertisement in a newspaper, personal notice to the members, or a day stated\_on the minutes of the Board six months preceding the election. The Board of Directors shall keep a record of all their proceedings which shall be at all times subject to the inspection of any member. The corporation may establish branches in any other county in the state.

The Board of Directors may have the power to increase the number of directors to seven or ten if they deem the interest of the corporation requires such increase; and they are any subsequent Board of Directors may have the power to elect other members, who on acceptance of membership, shall become corporators equally with the original corporators.

The Board of Directors shall have the right to determine what amount or money paid into the treasury shall be a prerequisite for membership or, if necessary, what amount shall be thus annually paid, and a failure thus to pay shall in the discretion of the directors justity the expulsion of said defaulting member. The term of all officers may be fixed by the by-laws, the said term not, however, to exceed three years. All officers shall hold over until their successors are duly elected and qualitied.

We, the undersigned, apply to the state of Tennessee by virtue of the laws of the land for a Charter of Incorporation the purposes and with the power, etc., declared in the foregoing instrument. This 13th day of August, 1898.

GOVERNING THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD,
ADOPTED AT THE REGULAR ANNUAL MEETING
THE SECOND TUESDAY, IN OCTOBER, 1898

Section 1

NAME, ORGANIC LAWS AND REGULATIONS
This body or corporation shall be known by the name of the
NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD. The charter granted
by the State of Tennessee, August 15, 1898 and recorded in the
Corporation Record Book 60, Page 276, in the capitol of the state
of Tennessee shall be the organic law governing this body, in all
matters so far as it relates to business transactions, electing of officers and other legal and financial matters.

Section II
RELIGIOUS AND PARLIAMENTARY REGULATIONS

The religious, parliamentary and other regulations shall be such as are used by regular Baptist bodies, and shall conform as far as is practicable, to the general custom and regulations of the National Baptist Convention except in the election of members, the election of officers and the length of time they shall hold office. These shall be governed by the charter granted by the State of Tennessee.

Section II OFFICERS AND THEIR TERM OF OFFICE

The officers of this body shall be a chairman, a recording secretary, and general secretary and treasurer. The office of recording secretary and assistant secretary may be one and the same. The office of a general secretary and treasurer may be one and the same, or filled by the same person. These shall hold their office three years, or until their successor is elected and qualified.

Section IV MEMBERSHIP

The members of this corporation shall be nine; five of whom shall constitute a quorum to do business. These nine members shall hold their membership each for three years; three of whom shall be elected each year. Any member failing to attend three consecutive meetings without reporting to the Board, or being excused by the same, shall be notified by the secretary, and if failing to answer, their names shall be dropped from the roll and a successor elected. Five of these nine members shall be resident citizens of the state of Tennessee

Section VI

EMPLOYEES AND AGENTS

All employees or contracts with employees shall be made by the general secretary, freasurer and manager. All agents, missionaries or colporters shall be employed by the general secretary; but in the case of editorial secretary, field secretary, district secretaries and other such important secretaries shall be nominated by the general secretary, but such nomination must be confirmed by the Board.

The National Baptist Publishing Board was organized in a cloud of controversy. The weeds of doubt and scepticism sought to prevent this tiny seed from sprouting forth. There were those who said that the Negro did not have the ability to organize and operate his own religious publishing concern. Instead, they chose to continue using the resources of the powerful and patronizing American Baptist Publication Society. Dr. R. H. Boyd had the faith to venture where many others feared to tread. Using his personal financial resources, with letters of credit amounting to six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) and securing the cooperation of Southern Baptists, he began this momentous venture on the small and winding thread of

It was not long before this tiny seed began to produce abundant truit. In 1897 the Publishing Board spent approximately \$5,664.29, and in 1914, seventeen years later, the Publishing Board spent \$204,632.40. During the corresponding period the Home Mission Board reported a total of 622 missionaries and colporters; 738 Missionary Baptist Sunday Schooots and churches were organized and 64.890.40 was expended in the work of the Home Mission Board.

The startling success, of the Home Mission Board and the Publishing Board was portrayed in a moving address by Rev. W. H. Moses, D.D., President of Guadalupe College in Texas, entitled, Fifty Years of Freedom and One Hundred and Thirty-nine Years of Negro Baptist History," which was delivered before the National Baptist Convention at its annual session in Nashville in the Fiftieth Jubilee Celebration of Emancipation. This address which highly praised the herculean achievements of Dr. Boyd as the man most responsible for the signal success of Negro Baptists in the publication and propagation of the gospel seemed to have given rise to jealousy and strife in the views entertained by many of the brethren loward the work of the Publishing Board and particularly Dr. R. H.

As the controversy grew, Dr. Boyd offered his resignation as Secretary of the Home Mission Board. The idea was widely circulated that Dr. Boyd should not be permitted to serve as secretary of both the Publishing Board and the Home Mission Board. The nembers of the Home Mission Board urged Dr. Boyd to reconsider his resignation. Chairman Robinson of the Home Mission Board wowed that if conditions were of such that Dr. Boyd could not serve honorable after eighteen years of faithful and successful work, he would not remain as chairman any longer. Dr. Boyd agreed to reconsider his resignation and subsequently decided to remain as secretary of the Home Mission Board and go up or down with the Board.

The clouds of controversy continued to gather. Those who said that the Publishing Board would not succeed did not cease their opposition when the success of the Publishing Board was firmly established. When the income of the Publishing Board began to run into the tens of thousands of dollars, then they brought to the battle front the issue of "Who owns the Publishing Board?"

At first there was the attempt to separate the Home Mission Board from the Pubishing Board. This occured in 1913 when the

Convention session was held in New Orleans and met with success. Separation of the two boards from a historical standpoint may well be viewed as a forward step in the development of the convention. Two boards who found it necessary to lean heavily on each other for strength during their infancy were strong enough to stand alone. The controversy did not end with the separation of these boards, it seems to have gained momentum. Forces in the convention were seeking ammunition for a formidable attack on the National Baptist Publishing Board. It was contended that the National Baptist Publishing Board plant was bought and was being paid for by the donations, patronage and loyal support of the churches, district associations and state conventions comprising the National Baptist Convention. Those who held this position pointed out that at St. Louis in 1896 by vote of the parent body, the publishing committee was created and the secretary elected; that the convention for nineteen years had adopted reports received from the secretary. They were determined that the Convention would control the publishing plant or secure one that they could control.

On the other hand were those who contended that the Publishing Board began its operation on the private capital of Dr. Boyd and to that day all its operation and its resources were dependent upon the earnings and income of this wisely managed first investment If Dr. Boyd made the whole of the initial investment; if that investment was at no subsequent time augmented by increase from any other source; if the development and operation of the business was due wholly to the expenditure of his superabundant energies; if he alone bore the whole risk of loss by failure; if there were no obligation upon the National Baptist Convention or any other Baptist organization to guarantee such possible loss; then by every conceivable right, moral, legal or otherwise, the entire plant was certainly in the title and the personal property of Dr. Boyd. Now it may be insisted that because it was operated as a Baptist institution, that a large portion of its patrons were Baptists and constituents of the National Baptist Convention and that its profits and its increase were mostly due to the patronage of these Baptist people; that morally it was the property of the patronizing Baptist organization and the leaders of the National Baptist Convention had some moral if not legal rights to the management of its operations. While such is about the only argument that has any basis in reason or logic, yet it is going quite beyond the limits of fundamental equity, as when the proposition is examined it has about as much consistency as the claim that the corner grocery is the property of the community because the patronage of the families about it have operated to make it a commercial possibility. Every Baptist church or Sunday School who put any money in the Publishing Board received a return of one hundred cents worth of literature for each dollar thus invested. Therefore, the institution and all its property were in the certain and rightful title of Dr. R. II. Boyd

But it is just here that the grandeur and beauty of this man's character reaches a magnitude and a loftiness which to the ordinary mortal is beyond comprehension, for though Dr Boyd could make moral and legal claim to the property of the Publishing Roard; yet such was the high conception of his moral obligation to his denomination and race that in generosity of spirit and concern for the future; he without compuls on, coercion or persuasion from any quarter, did make the organization a Baptist institution in legality

and in fact, by deeding the huge enterprise, its property and rights of operation, to the incorporated National Baptist Publishing Board to be held in perpetuity and in trust for the Negro Baptists of the

The two positions represent the camps who fought against each other forces in the convention set on gaining legal control of the Publishing Board found their path fraught with many difficulties. Since the Publishing Board was incorporated, they were able to control its affairs with an incorporated convention, not to mention the facts which have been presented earlier regarding ownership. It was decided that the best way to gain control over the incorporated National Publishing Board was to incorporate the convention and that once the convention was incorporated, its incorporated boards would legally be subordinate to the convention. This agitation, first appearing in Houston in 1912, became acute in Philadelphia in 1914.

Many heated debates occured in the convention over having the convention chartered. This matter was considered by the convention in Houston and defeated. Two years later, however, following the Philadelphia meeting, incorporation papers were taken out in Washington, D.C. it was in Chicago in 1915 that the clouds of controversy burst and led to a mighty flood and the parting of the waves, the great division of Negro Baptists in the United States on the National

Some contended that the charter had not been properly authorized by the convention. Some of the details of this separation we shall consider in a later chapter. There came into existence two separate and distinct Negro National Baptist bodies, the National Baptist Convention of America, known as the "unincorporated convention" and the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A. Incorporated, known as the "incorporated convention."

Far be it from me to romanticize history, but history affords us certain lessons regarding the eternal presence of God with his people, in our unity and in our divisions.

God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform He plants his footsteps on the sea And rides upon the storm.

In the storm of controversy, God did not forsake his people. As the dark clouds of controversy gave rise to a flood of chaos and controversy the storm, the Spirit of God was at work brooding over the troubled waters

# REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON SOCIAL JUSTICE

# C. William Black, Jr., Chairman

Brother President, messengers of the National Baptist Convention of America, we are assembled as witnesses of the "way of life" that compells us to examine the events in which that "way of life" is being challenged. Our witness cannot be circumscribed by race or class, for it is the witness of all persons who are committed to Christ. We are aware that as we address this body of Christins we are expressing the commitment of many who are not identified with the National Baptist Convention. In a very real way we are surrounded by a host of witnesses. While acknowledging the broad-

ness of our witness, we must recognize that we are a body of Negro Baptist, Our limits impose on us significant responsibilities and opportunities. As Negro Baptist, we are responsible to influence the decisions of the larger white community, and also minister to the needs of the Negro community. It is apparent to your Commission that the changes taking place in our Nation have placed on the leadership of our churhches an urgent responsibility. We have been presented with a new day. As the social structures of yesterday give way to demonstrations and more democratic legislation, the Negro leadership of our churches cannot remain captives of yesterday's structures. New wine cannot be contained in old wine skins. We must perform our task within the demensions of our new day. This calls for a re-examination of the structure of the church serving the Negro community, as well as the Association of Churches on the District, State and National level. This re-examination demands that we confront the issue of segregation and discrimination in its affect upon the structure of our organizations as well as its affect on our "way of looking at the world around us." In a nation that is moving toward the integration of its political, social and economic structures, we must seek out more avenues designed to break any tendency to be isolated from the main stream of national life This is an imperative responsibility of Negro leadership,

#### REVIEW OF PAST EVENTS

The last several years have been years of dramatic encounters with the issues of human rights, both political and economic. In the Editorial section of the New York Times, March 14, 1965 is a summary. In 1957, it was little Rock, Ark., and the issue was public school integration. Federal and state power collided and Federal power won.

In 1962, it — Oxford, Miss., and the issue was integration on the college level. Federal power in the form of troops on the Uniof Mississippi campus breached another racial barrier in the Deep South

In 1963, it was Birmingham. Alabama, and the issue was integration of hotels, restaurants and other public places. The long battle it engendered between Negroes and police helped create national sentiment for the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

tn 1964, it was Philadelphia. Mississippi and the issue was mur were slain;

In 1965, it was Los Angeles California, warfare of Watts and the issue was the violent response of a neglected Negro getto In 1965, we are participants in the plementation of the President's War on Poverty and the Civil Rights Acts of 1964.

In the midst of these event; death he had present, lives have been given, and sacrifices have been made. This struggle for freedom in our Nation has required of its participants, the deepest devotion. Even as we enjoy here in his animal session of the National Baptist Convention opportunities that have in he defined us, let us not forget that the opportunities we enjoy

been made possible by those who made their own security secondary. In this climate of conflict and opportunity, the churches of the National Baptist Convention of America are called upon to engage the conflict and opportunity in the spirit of the Christ, who said on one occasion, "if any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." The committed witnesses of Christ must be at work, "where the action is."

# DESEGREGATION IN SOUTHERN SCHOOLS

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits racial discrimination in any Federally aided program. The penalty for not complying to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act is the loss of Federal Aid. It is apparent to many observers, that Title VI is responsible for a new influx of Negroes into previously white or predominantly white schools. Of the 5,045 school districts in the seventeen Southern and Border States, all but approximately 170 have indicated that they intend to comply with the requirements for Federal assistance. The United States office of Education has the responsibility for approving plens for compliance and have issued school districts that have maintained separate schools for whites and Negroes, guidelines for plans that must be made if approval is to be granted. These guidelines usually call for the desegregation of four grades this fall, and complete desegregation all grades by the fall of 1967.

It is the reported opinion of Mr. David Sealey, director of the United States office of Equal Education Opportunity, "that Negro entoltment in predominantly white schools will at least double last year's enrollment." Last year, 66,135 Negroes or about 2.3 per cent of the total Negro enrollment attended schools with white students in the eleven Southern States. Even with the acceleration of the integration of Negro students in the South it appears that not more than 8 per cent will attend schools with whites this fall.

Desegregation of schools in the South even at the slow pace revealed in the figues given, will bring about changes in the South that should have the attention of all responsible persons.

### VOTING RIGHTS ACT

Nan Robertson reports in the New York Times that the White House announced on August 21, 1965 that Federal examiners had registered 19.178 new Negro voters in thritteen Southern counties in ten days of operation under the Voting Rights Act. The thirteen counties in which this results have been accomplished are located in Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi. The results in these thirteen counties indicate that there will be available to the Negro in the South a new source of power. The growth and use of this rew power must be encouraged by the leadership of the churches. No responsible leader can in our day ignore what is happy in the rolitical structures.

# THE ISSUE OF VIOLENCE

Resentment to the injustices of our society has existed in Negro community from the days of slavery. We have a history marked by events of rebellions against those who impose conditions that made life difficult and hopeless. In the recent violent response of Negroes in Los Angeles, California we observed an event that can

happen in other areas of our nation and cannot be restricted to Watts We must face the fact that we are confronted with a climate that is charged with racial hostility to which the Negro nor white church has addressed itself. While in the Civil Rights struggle love and non-violence have been used as tactical weapons, many of the participants of this struggle are not convinced that this doctrine can be trusted as a "way of life." There are in addition to the "uncommitted participants" large numbers of despairing and hopeless Negroes who stand outside the influence of non-violent organizations that will increasingly seek ways and means of expressing their resentment of those they believe responsible for their condition. In a highly structured urban society, it is not difficult for resentments to take the form of organized violence. It is apparent to your Committee on Social Justice that a new and broader aggressiveness must be the concern of the Negro churches. The gospet must be heard, not only by the supporters of the institutional churches, but the gospel must be heard in the market places. If we are committed to the teachings of our Lord, that love is more powerful than hate, we are faced with a climate of hostility in which our faith in the Lord's teaching must be tested. "Let judgment begin in the house of the Lord." The Civil Rights revolution is imposing upon the leadership of our churches a revolution in faith. This is not an age in which the power of God's love on Calvary can be preached as history, for Calvary has come to meet us in the Negro gettoes of the despairing, the sick, the hungry and the hopeless. The most radical claim that the civil-rights revolution is making on the faith of the church is that-love is more powerful than hate and hostility can be overcome in the midst of injustices. History will record its verdict and no man can erase a line of it.

In a recent article written by C. Vann Woodward for the New York Times Magazine, August 29, 1965, it is reported "that Negroes constituted 20.6 per cent of the unemployed last year . . . and he faces the social and economic problems produced by automation urban decay, family deterioration, entrapment in slums and defacto segregation in schools. These are problems that are not resolved in civil-rights legislation and yet they wear in a large measure the color of the Negro. These are the problems that produce despair and hopelessness. Hopelessness is the birthplace of violence. In too many instances our churches have no message nor contact with this segment of our society. The message that made the common people hear Jesus gladly is strangely absent from our ministry. We are challenged to once again speak the word of hope and to perform the deed of hope in the presence of hopelessness. Let the messengers of the National Baptist Convention of America know the dispossessed are not here today, the impoverished and despairing are not here, the dying, whose will to live is dying faster than their bodies are not here today, but they await your return-to tell them if there is any word from the Lord

### RESOLUTIONS

We are aware that it is the responsibility of this Convention to express its views in matters of Christian concern we therefore recommend for your consideration the following:

1 We recommend that the National Baptist Convention of America, assembled in the 85th Annual Session in Houston, accept


the view that this body supports the idea of its autonomy but recognizes that the witness of this body can more fully fulfill the aims of Christ in cooperation with National bodies with like aims and objectives, and therefore are desirious of seeking ways and means of cooperation with both their Negro and white brothers and sisters of other National Christian bodies.

As a means to a greater voice in the affairs of our government we recommend that our churches will give full support to voter registration.

 As a means of greater voice in the affairs of our government we appeal to those present to use their influence in encouraging capable Negroes to run for public office.

4 In as much as the issue of poverty is a major issue in Negro communities throughout this Nation, we do recommend that the messengers present will seek ways and means of talling full advantage of the Economic Opportunities Act—War on Poverty.

We are constantly studying and planning how we may best serve you, so from time to time we add the machinery which enables us to do this.

We submit our report with the hope that you will be interested enough to read it, study it and if we can serve you in any way, at any time, we are yours to command. We thank God for His guidance and goodness to us. Our employees have been faithful and willing to extend themselves at all times in order to give YOU the service you as our most valued customers deserve.

The 1966 Sunday School Congress will meet in New Orleans, La., with Dr John Francis as Host, and the St. John Institutional Baptist Church as Headquarters. It has been a long time since the Congress met in New Orleans. and we feel this will be a great session.

Houston, Texas September 8, 1965

President Petraway, Rev. Bowie, Chairman of the Benevolent Department, Officers and members of the National Baptist Convention of America—Greetings! When this report is read to you! will be approximately 10,000 miles away. It is not because I hold lightly the importance of my being with you that I am away, but it is due to my heeding the call of God to render service in a distant land. I trust you will understand and be considerate of the great cause

that I represent in Auckland, New Zealand.

During the iiscal year 1964-65, the Benevolent Department has striven to put before the constituency of the National Baptist Convention its program as adopted by the Convention. Some of the members have grasped it and have taken out memberships and have encouraged others to do the same. Others have not awakened to the need of giving their support to it. Yet, this department has been able to carry on and help eleven (11) families during the fiscal year. Each family has been sent the \$100.00 Immediate Relief payment. We are prepared, during this session of the Convention, to divide the balance we have in the Mortuary Fund among the beneficiaries of the deceased members. The department believes that there is a great opportunity for the Convention to spread further the interest and concern for its members through this medium. However, the full cooperation of the membership must be had for this to be done.

We enrolled 220 members last year. Many of them came through the special effort put on through the office of the secretary. Letters were sent to previously enrolled members who had not renewed their membership for one or two years. An announcement of this part of our program was made through the Union Review. The response was rewarding. Your attention is now being cailed by the Department for the need of the official staff of the Parent Body and all Auxiliary Bodies to enroll in this Department in order that the import of its program will be loud and clear. We can then officially encourage the other members to "follow the lead" of their officers. We should enroll not less than five hundred (500) persons in this department this year. We are meeting in Houston, Teas, which is almost the center of our National Baptist Convention of America work, NEARLY EVERYTHING THAT IS BIG AND WORTB-WHILE COMES OUT OF OR HAPPENS IN TEXAS. I see no reason why we shouldn't have the largest enrollment ever in the Department of Benevolence here in this session in Texas, Therefore, we call upon you now to make your enrollment.

Many have asked questions about the operation of the depart-

ment The following sets forth its plan of operation:

"Any person who is a member of a Baptist Church, in good and regular standing, and a member of our Convention, shall be eligible for membership in this Commission, providing such a member pays the sum of \$10.00 per year, is in good health and of sound mind at time of application. Benefits applied for do not become effective until membership fee of \$10.00 is paid in full. Membership will terminate at the close of each Convention year, and must be renewed every year thereafter to remain in benefit.

Benefits of the Benevolent Commission are those paid to the named or authorized beneficiary of a deceased member. They are

paid in this wise:

1. \$100.00 Immediate Relief upon notice of death, accompanied by a death certificate.

At the close of the Convention year, money left in the Mortuary Fund is divided equally among the beneficiaries.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST YOUTH CONVENTION FOR 1965-66

#### PREAMBLE

The National Baptist Youth Convention of America, operating in the continental United States of America, exists in order to encourage an essential oneness of young Baptist people in the Lord Jesus Christ, to imprint inspiration to its constituents and to promote a fellowship among its members in extending the Kingdom of Heaven.

#### I. NAME

The name shall be the National Baptist Youth Convention, auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention of America.

#### II. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the National Baptist Youth Convention shall be the same as the parent body; Education, Mission, Benevolence and Evangelism. It shall also serve as an agency for propogating Baptist principles and tenets of faith throughout its domain.

#### III. MEMBERSHIP

The National Baptist Youth Convention shall be composed of representatives, and individuals of Baptist youth organization in the area of, and officially recognized by any church, district or general sociation, or state convention which is a member of the National Baptist Convention of America. The age limit of this convention shall be fourteen (14) twenty four (24).

### IV. REPRESENTATION

Youth departments of any regular Baptist church with membership in the National Baptist Convention of America may register with \$10.00 and granted two (2) badges; district youth conventions with \$15.00 and granted three (3) badges; state conventions with \$25.00 and granted five (5) badges. Individual enrollment shall be

#### V. OFFICERS

The officers of the National Baptist Youth Convention may be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First Assistant Secretary, Second Assistant Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer.

#### VI. TERM OF OFFICE

The offices of president, first vice president, second vice president may not be filled by the same persons for more than two consecutive years.

## VIII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECRETARY: The recording secretary shall record and compile a true record of all proceedings of the convention; the assistant secretary shall serve as directed by the recording secretary. The corresponding secretary shall do the corresponding with youth organizations, keeping them informed of constitutional requirements and objectives of the convention, or as directed.

#### IX. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

TREASURER: The treasurer shall receive all monies, keep an accurate record and report same to the Youth Convention and finally to the parent body daily.

#### X. SPONSORS

All sponsors of youth groups will work under the advice and direction of elected secretary of youth activities of the convention.

#### XI. MEETINGS

The National Baptist Youth Convention of America shall hold its annual meetings at the time and place designated by the parent body and regional meetings must be approved by the parent body.

#### XII. FINANCE

All major issues involving expenditures shall not be operative until authorized by the parent body. All officers of youth convention are non-salaried and shall be given honorarium for service.

#### XIII. AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be changed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any authorized meeting, notice of such proposal must be filed in writing the first (1st) day of meeting with the secretary, all proposals must be confirmed by the parent body before becoming effective.
