THE ORIGIN OF THE PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Progressive National Baptist Convention is largely an outgrowth of dissatisfaction over "TENURE" and the office of Executive Secretary in the National Baptist Convention, Inc. The meeting which culminated in a new organization, was called at Cincinnati, after several previous meetings had been held by outstanding ministers in the National Baptist Convention, Inc. over a period of years.

The first of these meetings was held in St. Louis, Mo., in the Washington Avenue Tabernacle Church of which Dr. John E. Nance is pastor. At this meeting, several prominent ministers met for the purpose of bringing about a solution to the problems that were confronting our Convention at the time. We pledged ourselves to work within the framework of our Convention without any suggestion of withdrawing ourselves from the Convention. We only expressed ourselves as to how we felt about the existing conditions of the Convention. Expressions were made and published about this meeting which created much dissatisfaction in the Convention's official ranks. Instead of the meeting improving conditions, greater opposition became apparent.

The following meetings of the National Baptist Convention, Inc. were destined to widen the breach. In Denver, Colorado, we spent a whole session seeking to prevent the election of officers by vote of state delegations. The following year in 1957, when we convened at Louisville, Ky., a chair throwing session brought great disgrace to our Baptist Family. The two succeeding sessions marked a repeat in Baptist confusion in both Philadelphia, Pa. and Kansas City. By this time, more than 50% of the convention had pledged itself to support Dr. Gardner C. Taylor, distinguished pastor from Brooklyn, N. Y. as President. Dr. Taylor was defeated after a decision which resulted to the advantage of his opponent, Dr. J. H. Jackson.

The Reverend L. V. Booth of Zion Baptist Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, left the convention at Kansas City, determined to call a meeting and allow the opposition to make a clear choice between tyranny and freedom, and confusion and peace. Before many of the messengers had reached their homes, a letter went out calling for all interested in Peace, Fellowship and Progress to attend a meeting in November. This was followed by a second letter in October, urging fellow pastors to come to Cincinnati. His invitation met with opposition from some of the strongest pastors in the nation. Among these were men who were trusted, revered and respected. Very few could see then the wisdom and divine inspiration and unselfishness of his call.

The Cincinnati Meeting drew representatives from 14 States with a total of 33 delegates. After a formal opening, it was decided that Dr. J. Raymond Henderson, of Los Angeles, California, would preside over the business session. Dr. Henderson requested that we withdraw from the Sanctuary of Zion Baptist Church to its Chapel where only registered messengers would participate. This request was unanimously accepted. After serious deliberations, two spokesmen were allowed to close the discussion. Dr. Marvin T. Robinson, of Pasadena, California, spoke against organizing at this time, and Rev. L. V. Booth of Cincinnati, Ohio, spoke for organizing. When the vote was taken by ballot and counted the group to organize had won by "one" vote. Every member, every church and convention that registered in the Cincinnati Meeting were committed to "Tenure."

THE PROGRESSIVE CONCEPT

Someone has said wisely that when God has a job to be done he always gives the contract to one of faith. The Progressive Concept is basically an idea and movement of faith. Faith understood by only a few people, was deeply imbedded in the hearts of the less than fifty persons who gathered at Zion Baptist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio, in November, 1961, and started the movement which is now the Progressive Baptist Convention.

The onward march of time, the historical forwardness and the continuous renewal in time and history of God's revelations, cause the sensitive and alert souls to shake off the old forms and welcome new opportunities and new avenues of Christian service. The first motivation struck fire in 1961, was fanned in 1962, came to a blaze in 1963, began to burn seriously in 1964.

The early Christian Church faced a hostile community but inside the church was a spirit that kept her alive and caused her to overcome all oppositions. This spirit can be summed up in the word FELLOWSHIP. It was more than common interest -- It was more than mutual interest -- It was more than "Hail fellow, glad to see you." It was more than a type of comradeship. It was *koinonia* -- fellowship in love and concern. Those of us who follow the gleam of the Progressive Concept are happy to be free to participate in a true Christian fellowship. The wholesomeness of this interchange will continue to develop a convention that is at heart Christian.

Inherent in the Progressive Concept is PROGRESS. We are going somewhere in the Progressive National Convention. We are done with the "cult of personalities." We are through with "play prayers" and "circus sermons." True worship has meaning for us. Orderly sessions mark our business deliberations. Tenure in office is our way of life. And, a unified budget determines our expenditures. We are on our way in developing a valid and responsible convention. PROGRESS is our theme word.

PEACE is inherent in the Progressive Concept. By peace we do not mean docile inarticulation. We do not mean everyone agrees with every other one. But we do mean that we dwell together as brothers and sisters, that we can differ without confusion and that we can pool points of view and reach compromises based on principle. Our PEACE is no a soft, flabby one, but rather a virile, positive and creative force.

The Progressive Concept . . . FELLOWSHIP, PROGRESS, PEACE. We will keep these before us and go forward. We welcome all Baptists who want to travel this road of valid responsibility.

A Volunteer Committee for the Formation of a New National Baptist Convention announces this week through its Chairman, Rev. L. V. Booth, Pastor of Zion Baptist Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, that a meeting will be held November 14 and 15, 1961, at Zion Baptist Church, 630 Glenwood Avenue, Cincinnati 29, Ohio.

The two-day session will be devoted to discussion on **How to Build a Democratic Convention Dedicated to Christian Objectives?**

The keynote speaker will be Dr. William H. Borders, Pastor of Wheat Street Baptist Church, Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Borders is one of the ten outstanding pastors expelled from the National Baptist Convention, Inc., following its notorious session at Louisville, Kentucky, in 1957, when President Joseph H. Jackson ruled Tenure unconstitutional. There has been great dissatisfaction since.

All freedom-loving, independent and peace-loving Baptists are invited. Those who do not wish to form a new convention are requested not to attend.

Both men and women are invited. Persons who are interested in attending this meeting are urged to write in for reservations to Rev. L. V. Booth at the above address and indicate whether a Hotel or Home is desired. This movement is in no way connected with the past effort of "The Taylor Team." It is an entirely new movement under new leadership. Persons who are concerned with redeeming the Baptist initiative and restoring a democratic thrust are invited.

Editor's Note: This is the announcement that rocked the nation. Leaders on both sides of the fence were skeptical and afraid of this new venture. It was fought with great vigor by the greatest leaders of our time.

**THE CONSTITUTION
and
BY-LAWS
of
THE PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL
BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.**

PREAMBLE

The people called Baptists have always believed in the principles, tenets and doctrines as are proclaimed and advocated in the New Testament with reference to the rule of the people, by the people and for the people and the vestment, of the authority and power to act in the majority and not in an individually designated board, or official cabinet. Therefore, we the members of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated do now federate ourselves together in the name of and under the direction and guidance of the triune God for the purpose of giving wider range, deeper significance, loftier heights and a glowing realization of the practices of Christian brotherhood; and do establish this instrument, the Constitution and By-Laws of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, of the United States of America, Incorporated, as follows:

ARTICLE I

Name and Headquarters

1. The name of the organization shall be the Progressive National Baptist Convention Incorporated, hereinafter referred to as the Convention
2. The Headquarters of the Convention shall be at Washington, D.C., U.S.A.

ARTICLE II

Objectives

1. The objectives of the Progressive National Baptist Convention are: to encourage, promote and support Evangelism; Foreign and Home Missions; Christian Education; Christian Stewardship; Human Freedom; the Necessary Publication and Literature; Benevolence and other Christian work as the Convention may hereafter decide.
2. For reasons of efficiency and effectiveness, the Convention shall function through Auxiliaries: Departments, Boards, Commissions and Committees hereinafter described:
 - (a) The main Body of the Convention itself in sessions;
 - (b) The Departments of Women's Work; Congress of Christian Education; Men's Work; Foreign Missions; Home Missions; Church Extension; Evangelism; Stewardship; Publication and Literature, and the Department of Human Relations for Liberty, Freedom, and Righteousness; and other auxiliaries.
 - (c) The church Extension work shall be done through the Home Mission Board.

ARTICLE III

Membership

1. The membership of the Convention shall be Representative, Individual, Life and Honorary.
2. Representative membership shall consist of Messengers chosen and delegated to the annual sessions of the Convention from Baptist churches, and church auxiliaries; District associations; State conventions; District and State Laymen bodies.
3. **Membership Classifications and Clarification**
 - (1) Any regular Baptist church; or eligible Auxiliary in a Baptist church; District Association; or State Convention in harmony with and/or supporting the causes, or desiring to support the program of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, shall be eligible for representative membership in the Convention upon the following bases and in the following classes:
 - (1) Churches Associations and Conventions contributing to the adopted unified

budget (causes or programs sponsored by the Convention), through the office of the Executive Secretary during any conventional year (designated or undesignated funds), as listed below may register in the annual session of the Convention with two messengers (preferably Pastor and one layman), and enjoy the full rights of franchise; and for each additional messenger contribute to the Convention Registrar the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00), providing the total number of voting messengers shall not exceed ten (10).

3a. Classifications:

- (a) Churches with one thousand (1,000) or more members, contributing three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) or more;
- (b) Churches with 750 to 1,000 members contributing three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or more;
- (c) Churches with 500 to 750 members contributing two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) or more;
- (d) Churches with 200 to 500 members contributing two hundred dollars (\$200.00) or more;
- (e) Churches with less than 200 members contributing one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or more;
- (f) State Conventions contributing three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) or more;
- (g) State Conventions with less than 100 churches contributing one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) or more;
- (h) Associations contributing one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or more.

4. Churches, Associations and Conventions failing to contribute the amounts listed in the above classifications through the Office of the Executive Secretary during a conventional year, may represent in the annual session and have two messengers by contributing to the Convention Registrar or through the Office of the Executive Secretary as follows:

Classes Above:

- (a) Fifty dollars (\$50.00)
- (b) Thirty-five dollars (\$35.00)
- (c) Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00)
- (d) Fifteen dollars (\$15.00)
- (e) Ten dollars (\$10.00)
- (f) State conventions two hundred dollars (\$200.00)
- (g) State conventions with less than one hundred churches one hundred dollars (\$100.00)

5. No member-organization shall have more than ten votes in the Convention on any single issue.

6. Individual membership in the Convention may be obtained by any member of a regular Baptist church, by the contribution of ten dollars (\$10.00) to the Convention Registrar, with all Convention privileges, providing the Baptist Church of which he is a member is not a member of the Convention. Any such church shall be limited to not more than three members.

7. Life membership shall consist of those individuals who are members of a regular Baptist church who contribute the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) at one time to the Convention Registrar. Life-members shall have full membership rights and privileges.

8. Honorary membership may be conferred upon any person whom the Convention may wish to so honor for service of distinction to the public weal, and for a single session, or for life-tenure by resolution offered and adopted by the Convention. Honorary membership shall carry no financial responsibility to the person thus honored, nor grant any other privileges, except the courtesies of the Convention.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, First and Second Vice Presidents; Executive Secretary; Recording Secretary with one or more Assistant Recording Secretaries (as the need may demand); Treasurer; Auditor; Historian; Attorney; Director of Publicity; and a Board of Directors consisting of the elective officers of the Convention, the Presidents of the Auxiliaries and one member nominated by each State Convention, or State Delegation.

(a) All officers of the Convention and the regional presidents shall be elected annually, but shall not succeed themselves in office more than one consecutive time (the Executive Secretary excepted). Two consecutive years shall be the limit for all officers.

(b) The Executive Secretary shall be nominated by the Board of Directors of the Convention annually and shall be elected by the Convention, but shall not succeed himself in office after eight (8) consecutive years.

(c) The offices of the Convention may be integrated with clergy and laymen.

(d) The office of Vice President, or Assistant Secretary status shall not be interpreted to mean automatic rotation in office.

ARTICLE V

Nominating Committee

1. There shall be named on the first day of each conventional session a committee on nomination of officers, of eleven (11) members; ten of whom shall be nominated by State Conventions, and/or State Delegations and given to the Executive Secretary who shall announce them to the Convention. The eleven member and chairman of the committee shall be named by the President of the Convention.

(a) The State Convention, or State Delegation, naming the nominating committee shall rotate alphabetically. A State Delegation shall not have representation on the nominating committee two consecutive years.

(b) The Executive Secretary shall notify the State Convention, or Delegations selecting the Nominating Committee members at least thirty days in advance of the Convention session through its member of the Board of Directors.

(c) Only bona fide messengers (elected and delegated messengers), Individual and Life Members shall be eligible to hold office in the Convention.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

1. The President shall preside, guide and inspire the Convention in its deliberations and programs. He shall be chairman of the Board of Directors; and official representative of the Convention. He shall be the Executive and Administrative Officer of the Convention. He shall counter-sign requisitions to the treasurer and shall appoint all committees unless the By-Laws of the Convention suggest otherwise.

2. The Vice Presidents shall serve the President in the execution of the Convention Program in whatever manner the President may direct and in case of the absence, disability or death of the President they shall automatically succeed in order until the Convention chooses to act.

3. The President with the approval of the Board of Directors shall have the power to call the Convention in session at any time with due notice to the messengers of the last Convention session.

4. The Recording Secretaries shall keep an accurate record of the doings of the Convention in its regular, or called sessions and shall compile them in accurate and acceptable form for publication. They shall see that all money passed to the Treasurer of the Convention is receipted for and shall make a record of the same as part of the minutes.

5a. The Treasurer shall receive and sign receipts for all money turned over to him; and shall pay out same on order of requisitions, only, signed by the President and the Executive Secretary. (The Executive Secretary shall countersign all checks with the Treasurer.) He shall make reports to the Convention and to the Board of Directors upon request.

5b. The Treasurer shall be bonded by a reputable bonding firm chosen by the Board of Directors at the expense of the Convention for an amount fixed by the Board of Directors.

6. The Auditor shall examine the books of the Convention and those of its Auxiliaries and/or boards and officers handling the money of the Convention and report his findings to the Convention and/or Board of Directors.

7. The Historian shall gather, publish and disseminate data bearing upon the progress of the Convention and individuals serving the Convention. All materials thus gathered and published shall be the property of the Convention unless otherwise agreed upon.

8. The Attorney shall be the legal advisor of the Convention in all matters involving the affairs of the Convention where legal advice is needed.

9. The Executive Secretary shall carry out the policies and programs of the Convention during the interim of the Convention sessions subject to the Board of Directors as follows:

- (a) He shall be the keeper of all important records and legal papers of the Convention.
- (b) He shall be the supervisor of all Secretaries, correspondence and secretarial work of the Convention.
- (c) He shall have the oversight of all field work and when necessary make field visits in the interest of the Convention.
- (d) He shall initiate all requisitions for the payment of the bills of the Convention, and counter-sign all checks with the Treasurer.
- (e) He shall be consultant and mediator in matters involving differences between individual members of the office, or Convention staff, Boards, Commissions and/or Committees and shall resolve them if possible.
- (f) He shall be ex-officio member of all Boards, Commissions and Committees, and direct the office of the Convention with thrift and honesty.
- (g) With the advice of the President, he shall prepare an agenda for all meetings of the Board of Directors, and send out notices for the same.
- (h) The Executive Secretary shall gather and publish conventional statistics, publish convention minutes, organize and print the Convention Programs, letter forms, badges, ballots, registration blanks and set up the machinery for each annual session in readiness for doing business. For these duties he shall with the advice of the President choose an efficient staff.
- (i) The Executive Secretary shall be responsible to the Convention for his stewardship and through the President to the Board of Directors during the interim. He shall report to the Convention in its annual sessions and to the Board upon request.

ARTICLE VII

Voting

1. Except in cases elsewhere stated, issues in the Convention shall be decided by a majority of the votes cast at the time the issue is before the Convention. A vote may be rescinded in harmony with parliamentary usage.
2. In event that the Nominating Committee shall present the name of more than one person to contend for a single office, or in case there be presented to the Convention a minority report on any issue brought before the Convention; or if there is a substitute name offered from the floor for the name of a person already before the house, the presiding officer may, after each side of the question at issue has been already stated, declare the vote shall be taken forthwith by secret ballot.
3. When doubt is expressed about the decision on any issue voted on by the house, a majority of a standing counted vote of the delegates may demand a secret ballot.
4. At least five (5) prepared ballots shall be included in each kit given out to messengers at the time of registration. Scraps of paper may be used if the voting messenger signs his name. Names on votes thus signed shall not be given out, or announced, unless said voter is challenged as to his right to vote.
5. Whenever a contest develops on the floor of the Convention and tellers are needed, the presiding officer shall appoint the number necessary to protect the interest of the contending groups. The messengers shall have the right to challenge what may appear in improper choice of tellers.
6. The Presiding Officer of the Convention shall also have the right to appeal to the house for support of his action, or decision. The majority of a standing vote shall sustain the chair.
7. If the right and/or qualification of any person whose name is before the Convention for office is challenged by three or more messengers from the floor of the Convention, the presiding officer may forthwith stop the discussion and call for investigation and proof of said charges by an appointed committee for immediate action and report.
8. Membership in the Convention shall neither grant voting privileges in an Auxiliary, nor membership in an Auxiliary give voting privilege in the Convention.

ARTICLE VIII

Parliamentary Committee

1. The President shall name a Parliamentary Committee of seven (7) so that two groups of two each and one group of three shall ultimately serve a tenure of two years. The chairman shall be designated by the President.
2. When the Parliamentary Committee has been approved by the Convention it shall have plenipotentiary (full powers) to pass upon any and all parliamentary questions involving the Convention and its Auxiliaries and to interpret the By-Laws and/or Constitutions of the Convention and its Auxiliaries, which may be referred to it by the President or the Convention.
3. Decisions shall be reached by a majority vote of the committee. Four members shall constitute a quorum and the committee's decision shall be final on that issue at that time.
4. "Robert's Rules of Order" shall be the Parliamentary Guide of the deliberations of the Convention.

ARTICLE IX

Auxiliaries

1. There shall be organized the following Departments and/or Auxiliaries:
 - Women's Work
 - Men's Work
 - Church Ushers
 - Church Nurses
 - Church Music
 - Youth Work
 - Moderator's Council
 - A Congress of Christian Education
2. All Auxiliaries to the Progressive National Baptist Convention shall recognize two years limitation of all officers.
3. All Auxiliaries shall accept supervision of the Convention through the Board of Directors, relative to By-Laws, officers, programs, objectives and administration of finances.
4. The presidents of all Auxiliaries to the Convention shall be members of the Board of Directors of the Convention with franchise.
5. All Auxiliaries shall strive through consultation not to permit their By-Laws and/or programs of procedure to conflict with the spirit and letter of the Convention.
6. If either of the Auxiliaries or Boards of the Convention shall ever desire, or if necessity demands that it should own property, the Board of Directors of the Convention is herein authorized to work-out with said Auxiliary or a plan within the legal framework of the Convention so that property ownership may be attained; said plan shall be presented to the Convention for consideration and action.

ARTICLE X

Boards

1. The Foreign Mission Board

(1) The Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau, Incorporated, with headquarters in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, shall be the cooperating agency of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, through which the Convention shall sponsor and support the Convention's Foreign Mission endeavors; based upon the following mutual agreements:

- (a) The Board of Directors of the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau shall consist of fifty-four (54) members: one-third (1/3) of whom shall be nominated by the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau; and two-thirds (2/3) shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Progressive National Baptist Convention; eighteen (18) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; provided that all members shall have been notified of the time and place of said meeting.
- (b) All candidates for membership on the Board of Directors shall be named because of their demonstrated interest in Foreign Missions and may be clergy or layman without regard for sex (male or female).

(c) All Board members shall be elected by the Progressive National Baptist Convention in its annual sessions in groups of eighteen (18) each year, so that each group shall serve a term of three years after the first two years.

(d) There shall be elected during the September session of the Progressive National Baptist Convention 1965 (fifty-four (54) members of the Board of Directors of the Bureau as follows:

A. Nominated by the Bureau:

Six (6) persons to serve one year.

Six (6) persons to serve two years.

Six (6) persons to serve three years.

B. Nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Convention:

Twelve (12) persons to serve one year.

Twelve (12) persons to serve two years.

Twelve (12) persons to serve three years.

(2) The Board of Directors thus elected shall organize among themselves by choosing the necessary officers: the election of a Secretary of Missions; his staff and all employees and agents and shall have complete control and management of the affairs of Foreign Missions including the raising and expenditures of the finances received by the Bureau; but the Board must submit an annual report of its transactions, with a certified accountant's audit attached, to the annual session of the Convention and to its Board of Directors upon request; and shall file a copy of its annual report with the Executive Secretary of the Convention by August the first each year to become a part of his summary report to the Convention.

(3) The fiscal year of the Bureau shall begin and end with the fiscal year of the Convention July first through June 30th of the next year.

(4) The Convention in its annual sessions shall have the right of free discussion of the reported actions of the Bureau, and the majority vote of the Convention shall take precedence over the actions of the Board of Directors of the Bureau.

2. The Home Mission Board

(1) The Home Mission Board shall consist of fifteen (15) members divided into three classes of five (5) each, selected for terms of three years each so that after the first two years the term of five (5) members shall expire each year.

(2) After the first year the Board itself shall nominate to the Convention candidates for election. No member of this Board shall serve more than one three (3) year term consecutively.

(3) The Home Mission Board shall sponsor missionary work within the borders of the United States and its protectorates together with Evangelistic Conferences, Institutes, Surveys, Programs, Campaigns, etc.

(4) The Home Mission Board shall organize among its members, set up its objectives and programs, name its agents and representatives and shall set salaries of workers subject to the approval of the Board of Directors and the Convention.

3. The Board of Christian Education

(1) The Board of Christian Education shall consist of fifteen (15) members divided in classes of five (5) each, and shall be elected so that after the second year of its existence each group shall serve a term of three years. No member of the Board shall serve two consecutive terms.

(2) After the first year the Board shall nominate to the Convention candidates to be elected to its membership.

(3) This Board shall elect its officers, appoint its agents and representatives, set salaries and outline its programs, and functions, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

(4) The Board of Christian Education shall work in close relationship with the Congress of Christian Education and as far as possible coordinate the educational phases of its work with that of the Congress of Christian Education.

4. The Publication Board

(1) The Publication Board shall consist of fifteen (15) members elected in groups of five (5) each, so that after the second year, each group shall serve a term of three

years. No single person shall succeed himself, consecutively as a member of this Board, after serving three consecutive years.

(2) This Board shall have charge of such publications as the Convention, or Board of Directors, shall assign to it, and shall be responsible to the Convention and the Board of Directors between the annual sessions of the Convention for the Performance of its duties.

(3) After the first year of its operation the Board shall nominate to the Convention candidates for membership.

(4) The Board shall elect its officers, appoint its agents and representatives, set salaries and outline its programs and functions, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors and the Convention.

ARTICLE XI

Commissions and Committees

There shall be established the following Commissions and Committees:

A. Commissions:

1. The Commission on Freedom and Human Relations of nine (9) members.

2. The Commission on Christian Stewardship of fifteen (15) members.

3. The Commission on United States Army and Navy Chaplaincy of nine (9) members.

4. The Commission on Home and Family Life of twelve (12) members.

5. The Commission on Youth and Child care of fifteen (15) members.

6. The National Radio and Television Commission of nine (9) members.

7. The President of the Convention shall name a special Committee on Commissions with the Executive Secretary as Chairman. The function of this committee shall be to work out in detail the functions and objectives of these Commissions and to nominate to the Convention the membership of each commission; and to report their functions to the 1966 session of the Convention for approval.

8. After the Commissions shall have been set up and functioning, membership on the Commissions shall be so staggered that an equal number of members shall serve a term of three years. No member of any of the Commissions shall serve more than three consecutive years.

B. Committees:

1. Program Committee

(a) The President of the Convention shall appoint a committee of one member each from fifteen State Conventions, or State Delegations of which the Executive Secretary shall be a member to build a program for the annual sessions of the Convention and to select and assign the participants thereon.

(b) The members of the Program Committee shall rotate alphabetically among State Conventions and State Delegations. No state delegation shall have a representative on this Committee for two consecutive years.

(c) A state delegation shall not be simultaneously represented on the nominating and program building committees.

2. The Convention and/or the Board of Directors shall choose and delegate the work of the Convention to as many committees of whatever number of members it may think best for the execution of the work of the Convention, and assign to said committee or committees portions of the Convention work with instructions.

3. Budget Committee

(1) There shall be appointed by the President of the Convention, during each annual session of the Convention, a Budget Committee consisting of seven (7) members at large, including the Executive Secretary; and the heads of all the Auxiliaries to the Convention.

(2) The duties of the Budget Committee shall be to examine the needs for the overall operation of the Convention, its Boards, Committees, and Auxiliaries, by holding hearings with the heads of each agency; it shall estimate as nearly as possible the normal annual income of each agency over against the entire needs for operating the proposed programs and fulfilling the proposed objectives; it shall pull together these financial

needs and apportion them; it shall suggest ways and means of meeting the proposed budget, and present same to the Convention with recommendations through the Board of Directors.

4. Trustees:

- (1) The Convention shall elect six (6) trustees in groups of two (2) each, so that each group of two shall serve a term of three years after the first two years.
- (2) The Trustees shall be the legal holders of the properties of the Convention; and the signers of legal papers on behalf of the Convention; but only by authority of the Convention and/or the Board of Directors during the interim of the Convention.
- (3) In no case shall the Trustees act on behalf of the Convention, except by Corpus Instructions (facts in writing on the subject for action), signed by the President and Executive Secretary of the Convention.

ARTICLE XII

Regional Meetings

1. There shall be five (5) Regional Sections in which Regional sessions of the Convention may be held during the interim of its annual session.
2. The Nominating Committee shall present to the Convention five (5) candidates to be elected as Regional Presidents.
3. The Board of Directors shall have the power to allocate the sectional areas, the number of regional sessions to be held the time and place of meetings and the Regional President presiding.
4. The regional sessions shall be conducted in the interest of the Convention and the presidents shall be subject to the Convention via the Board of Directors, who shall outline the purpose and function of the presidents and the sessions.
5. The Executive Secretary shall be the Director-coordinator over the regional sessions with the President of the Convention and the Regional Presidents and shall be in charge of the records and the recipient of the minutes and financial statements, all of which shall become a part of his records and reports to the Convention and a part of the printed yearly minutes.

ARTICLE XIII

The Board of Directors

1. The Board of Directors shall have charge of the affairs of the Convention during the interim of its annual sessions and shall have the authority to act in the interest of the Convention, but it shall not have the authority to change the By-Laws, nor the procedures of the Convention without first having the approval of the Convention.
2. All salaries or honorariums shall be fixed or approved by the Board of Directors and or approved by the Convention.

ARTICLE XIV

Annual Meetings

1. The Convention shall hold an annual session each year during the week leading up to the Second Lord's day in September.
 - (a) The annual meetings shall open at 10:00 A.M., Wednesday, and close the following Sunday.
 - (b) The place of meeting shall be chosen by the Convention during its annual sessions from one to four years in advance.
 - (c) If for any reason the Convention fails to select a meeting place for the next session, or if some unforeseen event should necessitate a change from the place chosen by the Convention and/or the date provided in these By-Laws, the Board of Directors are herein authorized to choose the place and/or time for the sitting of the Convention in annual session.

ARTICLE XV

Amendments

1. These By-Laws may be amended at any annual session of the Convention by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all the votes cast by the messengers present and voting; provided that said amendment, or amendments, shall have been proposed, read and/or distributed to the messengers during one of the first day's sessions of the Convention and the time set when it shall be offered, discussed and voted upon. In no instance shall an amendment be passed on the same day it is presented for the first time.
2. Any amendment adopted which shall alter, change, or benefit the position of the President of the Convention shall not become effective during the tenure of the incumbent president at the time of its adoption.

Mr. President, Mr. Executive Secretary, Officers and Messengers of the Convention and its several auxiliaries, greeting in His name

Your Congress President is desirous to bring to you a report of the stewardship and behavior of the 8th Congress of Christian Education which Session was held in the beautiful "All American City"—Alexandria, Virginia, hosted by a great group of dedicated Baptists, headed by an imminent and resourceful pastor, preacher, teacher, Dr. A. A. Booker, and we do give God thanks for the opportunity. I have been quite ill since we last met in Miami Beach, Florida.

May I first thank you for the foresight you had and the courage you manifested in bringing into existence this great Congress. There is without any shadow of a doubt her tremendous need. We do give thanks also for Dr. G. K. Offutt, her first president, Dr. W. C. Upshaw, her first dean and second president, and the many others who labored in pain and sacrifice to give her birth; and the many from across the country, clergy and lay—who nourished her growth with true parental love. Among some of them are the Reverends Charles W. Green of Washington, D. C.; Benjamin Robertson of Virginia; J. H. Pierce of California; C. E. Houston of New York; J. O. Rich, South Carolina; J. E. Lloyd, Kansas City, Mo.; J. M. Burrell, Ohio; T. Robert Washington, Pennsylvania; Mrs. Lena Price, Washington, D. C.; Charles Davis of Illinois, and many, many others.

Thanks for giving me the fine staff of officers with which to work: W. J. Bishop, First Vice President, Michigan; Charles Davis (layman), Second Vice President, Illinois; J. O. Rich, Secretary, South Carolina; E. K. Foster, Assistant Secretary, Washington, D. C.; S. H. James, Director General, Texas; L. J. Alford, Assistant Director General, Florida; W. J. Hodge, Dean, Kentucky; Charles Houston, Assistant Dean, New York; Mrs. Merdean Fielding, Music Director, St. Louis, Missouri; Jessie Lewis (layman), Treasurer, California; Miss Thelma Johnson, National Youth Director, Illinois.

Our meeting place was the First Baptist Church of Alexandria, whose facilities were adequate for all classrooms, workshops, offices and assemblies. Adequate for serving us meals and other restful exploits. This church was without a pastor and the layleaders of the church lavished us with a kindness and congeniality exceeding in great distant and far beyond the tradition and the practice we are so inured to in the southland. They were truly Christian all the way; in fact they went the second mile for our comfort and spiritual needs. Our illustrious Director General, Dr. S. H. James was the guest preacher during the Sunday services preceding our opening.

Those who drove to the Congress found no parking problems. The First Baptist church was circled by a 500-car paved parking area. Sleeping and eating were arranged at moderate prices in modern hotels and motels which gave luxury comparable to anywhere in the world. We have received no complaints which would contradict this appraisal.

The Congress format 1970 was somewhat different from the previous years. This was the result of a hard-working "Think-and-do" workshop we had in Philadelphia last November 20-21, 1969.

Prayers and thought were given for the revelation of the kind of Congress of purpose and meaning for the members of your churches. The classes were moved to all morning periods, the dean's and president's messages to the evenings and the afternoons utilized in "Interest-groups" discussions. These groups—A, B and C were conducted by some of the great minds of our Congress, Dr. Henry Mitchell, Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, New York; Dr. W. A. Jones, pastor, Bethany Baptist church of Brooklyn and Rev. M. I. Jefferson, pastor of Sixth Mt. Zion, Hampton, Virginia. Sixty-five (65%) percent of the student body attended these sessions. We

also gave more time for the full participation of our young people in our regular assemblies. It was not until they "turned on" in a "Rap-for-Christ" session did we get glimpses of the kind of service and Convention of which we are so genuinely traditionalized. Dr. O. R. Reuben, President of Morris College of South Carolina, was the seminar preacher.

The attendance of that 8th Annual Session was 939 coming from 244 churches in 26 states and was instructed by 59 teachers. This was a decrease of 137 from the past year. Many attributed several reasons for this. Predominant among them are two: 1, the extreme end of the country, and 2, the World Baptist Alliance in Japan which was to convene a few weeks hence and to which a great number of Progressives were to attend. But our progress was not determined by numbers or amount raised, but the instruction given and the quality of that instruction.

Our most erudite dean, with the help of the November group, master-minded a model curriculum that had no prototype and is destined to be the sample for other Congresses in years to come. We had under his guidance one of the finest and most dedicated faculties to be found anywhere. The Dean strove for excellence in this area objectively and with much criticism. For those changes of which he was criticized, I share the responsibility.

We all can see the great wisdom of your establishing limited tenure for the officers of the Congress. This is good and should be followed, but with one exception—the office of dean of the Congress. If our Congress is to truly grow in its curriculum and give quality and relevant courses, the dean should have longer than two (2) years. I, therefore respectfully request that the Convention waive the rules or change the Constitution to allow the dean to be appointed or limit his tenure to four (4) years. I also suggest that if you deem it wise to make this change, that it will affect the present dean.

We have been invited to hold our 1971 Session with our Baptist Churches in Los Angeles, California. Roger Williams True Love Baptist Church, Dr. T. M. Chambers, Sr., Pastor, will be Host Church. The Executive committee informed us of a voted change of the Annual Congress by the Congress Board from the Monday after the third (3rd) Sunday to the Monday after the fourth (4th) Sunday in June. The Executive Secretary suggested we meet at our regular time in 1971 until this change is affected by the Convention. We await your directions in this matter. The time for the 1971 Session is June 21st through June 26th, 1971. The Theme "The Unity Beyond All Divisions" John 17:11 . . . "Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are."

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The itemized income and expenses are listed in the general report to the Executive Secretary who suggests that we do not print the report for distribution until it is adopted by you.

In order to operate effectively we recommend a budget of \$12,500.00 for the Congress 1970-71. Although last year's budget was adopted by the Budget Committee by you in Miami Beach, Florida, September, 1969, it was not until February, 1970 we received the first fifteen hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars; and, April, 1970, another fifteen hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars. The balance of the budget was raised at the Congress in registrations and offerings. We have been informed by the Executive Secretary that his office will handle all registrations at the 1971 Session. We are in complete concurrence with this procedure for it is the right one. However, we do suggest that if you approve our 1970-71 budget, you will remit the same to the President or Treasurer of the Congress at your earliest possible moment after this Annual Session.

May I state my pledge for devotion and dedication to the task you have so graciously tendered me and further pledge myself to give of my best to the Master, give of the strength of my youth and to throw my soul's fresh glowing ardor into the battle of truth. Give of my best to the Master, give Him first place in my heart; Give Him first place in my service, consecrating every part; Give of my best to the Master. He gave Himself for my ransom, Laid down His life without murmur, Me from sin's ruin to save; Give Him my heart's adoration, give Him the best that I have.

MONDAY, JUNE 22, 1970 — 4:00 P.M.

The Welcome Program of the eighth session of the Progressive National Baptist Congress of Christian Education was held in the First Baptist Church of Alexandria, Virginia, with the Reverend Autin A. Booker as the host pastor, and the Reverend James Price, Assistant Pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church, serving as the Master of Ceremonies.

Congregational and Special music was led by the Ebenezer Baptist Church Gospel Chorus. Greetings were brought by the following persons: Mrs. Ella O. Lewis and Miss Toni Taylor representing the Ebenezer Baptist Church and Church School. The Reverend Charles Green brought greetings from the Northern Virginia Progressive Fellowship.

Other greetings were delivered to the Congress by the chairman of the Board of Deacons, First Baptist Church, Mr. Jack Embrey, the Reverend E. K. Foster, the Reverend John Bussey, the Reverend J. O. The major educational address of the congress was delivered by its dean, the Reverend W. J. Hodge. Dean Hodge spoke from the subject, "Wilderness Crying For A Voice."

A special offering was given for the dean and the offertory prayer was offered by the Reverend Mr. Criss. Tuesday's Session was concluded with the singing of "He's Sweet I Know."

Our Mission Outlook period was very informative and inspirational with the Executive Director of the Foreign Mission Bureau, the Reverend J. H. Beatty making a report on the work of the Bureau.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT, JUNE 24, 1970 — 7:30 P.M.

Devotional Hymns of the evening were, "Pass Me Not," and "I Am Thine, O Lord."

The Reverend John Burrell of Akron, Ohio, presented the speaker and president of the congress, Dr. William H. Anderson. Before the president spoke, Mr. William H. Anderson, Jr., son of the president, sang "Wash Me And I Shall Be Whiter Than Snow."

Some major thoughts from President Anderson's Address:

Subject: "The Didache Of The Great Commission."

1. The major emphasis was the Didache, the teaching aspect of the gospel.
2. The home must join together with the church and school in a redemptive service.
3. What is the Didache of the Bible? It is Teach Them.
4. What Shall We Teach Them?
 - a. Teach us to number our days; even though life goes on.
 - b. Teach us that we may fall in love with the highest and the best.
 - c. Teach our minds that we may have right thoughts.
5. The Black Church has believed in Black Power a long time.
 - a. The church built men.
 - b. The church teaches that God is a Spirit; and who can paint a spirit white or Black?
6. Master teach us to pray because we have false views of prayer.
7. Our praying changes us and we change things.

The children's choir of the president's church in Philadelphia did a rousing rendition of the song, "No Condemnation" and also, "Walk Together Children."

THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 25, 1970 — 11:30 A.M.

Thursday was Youth Day and their theme for Worship, Thought and Meditation was "WHAT GOOD IS CHRIST?" The service opened with the singing of the hymns, "Living For Jesus," and "Saved, Saved."

Each person attending the morning assembly was given a mirror that was somewhat cloudy. The worshippers were asked to reflect for a moment by looking into the mirror and seeing self as they were. The challenge was to look at one's life daily in the mirror. It was hoped that as the day went by the experiences of Learning and

Worship would clear up the reflections in the mirror. At the Night Session a clear mirror was given each worshipper denoting the New Reflections.

Funds for the Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial were received, and also new pastors and churches were introduced to the Congress.

THURSDAY NIGHT, JUNE 25, 1970—7:30 P.M.

Thursday Night was Youth Night. The services were directed by Miss Thelma Johnson, National Youth Director.

The services included: Meditative Moments, and Psychodelic Reflections on the caption, "Can The World See Jesus In You?"

The Youth of the congress had a Rap Session on the Theme: "What Good Is Christ?" Many Youths made their personal witness for Christ during this period.

FRIDAY MORNING, JUNE 26, 1970—11:30 A.M.

Inspirational Music by the congress choir and the congregation under the direction of Mrs. M. Fieldings, set the tone of worship and offered inspiration to those worshippers who would witness the Annual Commencement Services of the Congress.

The order of service for the commencement program included: The procession, the invocation by the Reverend K. L. Brazell, Statements of purpose, The Reverend F. D. Edwards, Director of Christian Education, and the Reverend Charles Huston, Assistant Dean of the Congress. Miss Jean Warren and Miss Gloria Smith, both of the Pilgrim Baptist Church, Chicago, sang a duet, and the Reverend W. J. Hodge, dean of the congress presented the Commencement Speaker, the Reverend Curtis J. Jackson of Ohio, who addressed the congress from scripture found in Jeremiah 29:13.

Observations were made by President Anderson and certificates were awarded those persons having completed the required courses of study.

FRIDAY NIGHT, JUNE 26, 1970—7:30 P.M.

The Reverend Mr. Miles gave the closing meditation using a scriptural reference Psalm 103. Hymns and Special Music by Pilgrim Baptist Church Choir added to the worship service.

Speaker for the closing was the Reverend Henry Payton of Cleveland, Ohio. Reverend Payton spoke from the subject, "Jesus The Great Disturber." Mrs. Payton, wife of the speaker gave honor to the spiritual team as she sang, "It Is Well."

The eighth annual session of the congress held at Alexandria, Virginia closed with an Altar Call and prayer by President Anderson.

REPORTS

Time and Place

The Reverend William A. Lucas, chairman of the committee on Place, recommended that the session convene in Los Angeles, California, for the 1971 session. After discussion as to other meeting places and the distance of the congress and the convention, the president ruled that the report be reconsidered for other invitations. (See second and adopted report.)

SECOND REPORT

In a meeting called on the above date (6:25-7:0) we the committee on Place received and considered two invitations for the 1971 congress, The Roger Williams True Love Baptist Church, Dr. T. M. Chambers, Sr., Pastor, Los Angeles, California, and the Antioch Baptist Church, the Rev. W. C. Upshaw, Pastor, Akron, Ohio.

In view of the fact that we received information that the 1970 Congress record showed that the congress voted to meet in Alexandria, Virginia in 1970, and in Los Angeles, California in 1971, we take no action but recommend that the body govern itself by its 1969 action.

RESOLUTION FOR CONSIDERATION

PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.
MEETING WITH BAPTIST CHURCHES OF KANSAS
CITY, MISSOURI—SEPTEMBER 8-13, 1970**

Opening Session—September 9, 1970—9:00 A.M.

President Searcy, by the authority vested in him, called the Ninth Annual Session to order. Following words of welcome, he called Reverend C. E. Hatcher to conduct the Inspirational Singing.

Reverend J. H. Pierce, of California, came forward to bring "Moments of Meditation," his theme being based on Psalms 139:8-10. Following his inspiring message the devotional period was ended with the singing of "Saviour More Than Life to Me."

Dr. Searcy, in the absence of any objection from the body, declared the adoption of the program. He then appointed, with assistance from the floor the members of the Nominating Committee. This Committee was later adjusted to comply with requirements as to states eligible to furnish members, and the appointed committee was as follows:

The morning lecturer, Dr. Melvin Watson, of Georgia, was called to give his presentation on "Christian Doctrine," following the singing of the congregational hymn, "All the Way My Saviour Leads Me." Speaking from the subject, "The Everwhere, or Omnipresence of God," Dr. Watson led our hearts to theological heights. A provocative period of questioning followed this address.

A proposal from the Publishing Board was read for our information, but not action, by Reverend Charles Adams, of Detroit. It was as follows:

"A Proposal to the Progressive National Baptist Convention from the Publishing Board . . .

"At its meeting on June 23, 1970, in Alexandria, Virginia, the Publishing Board agreed upon the proposal stated below. This proposal was considered and recon-

firmed by the Publishing Board at its meeting on September 8, 1970, in Kansas City, Missouri. We propose the following:

(A) That the Publishing Board be granted permission to implement the expressed desire of this Convention to select and hire a general or executive editor.

(B) That such hired professional worker shall be responsible for the publication of our regular educational and devotional literature including the quarterly newspaper.

(C) That such editor shall work under the management of the Publishing Board.

(D) That such proposals as detailed in parts A, B, C, be understood to involve a constitutional revision which would remove the office of "Editor" from the list of elected officers of the Convention. Such a listing appears in Article IV, Section 1, of the Constitution.

(E) That the Constitutional Revision be approved by this Convention, and that the revision take effect on the day that such 'Editor' be employed.

(F) That this proposal be offered, discussed, and voted upon, Thursday, September 10, during the period designated for Convention Business.

As we prepared for the morning worship hour, Director Hatcher sang "When I've Gone the Last Mile of the Way." Reverend P. S. Brown of Florida introduced our morning speaker, Dr. E. T. Graham, host pastor of the 1969 Convention, of Florida. His subject was "The Unfinished Task of the Church," and his texts were Ps. 139:7 and Cor. 4:7. Dr. Graham with eloquence reminded us that we were to work, preach, and wait on a king who is here and will yet come in his fullness. His message was followed by a congregational song.

Dr. Searcy then called upon Dr. Hodges for any comments and announcements. Following this period, the benediction was given by Reverend McPhee, of the Bahamas.

Wednesday Afternoon—September 9, 1970

The afternoon session, with Vice-President Louis Johnson presiding, began with inspirational singing, led by Director Hatcher. Following this, the Reverend Morris A. Curry of Oklahoma gave the story of the Hymn, "I Must Tell Jesus," which presentation was informative and inspiring. It was followed by congregational singing of the same hymn. Presiding Officer Johnson then yielded the floor to President Searcy for the conducting of business.

The reports of the auxiliaries were called for. Mr. John D. Hunter, President of the Laymen, gave the report for the Laymen (which see).

Mrs. A. Ross Brent gave the report, as its President, of the Women's Auxiliary.

Dr. William Anderson, President of the Congress of Christian Education, gave the report for the Congress (which see). Dr. Anderson moved, and it was seconded, that his report would be adopted. Motion carried.

Recording Secretary Moore read a letter, addressed to President Searcy, from the Fellowship of Progressive Baptist Churches of California, concerning the 1971 session of the Congress. It was read for information. Following this reading, Dr. Anderson moved, and it was seconded, that this letter would become a part of the minutes. Motion carried.

President Searcy then presented President Emeritus, Dr. T. M. Chambers, to speak regarding the Congress Session in California.

Dr. Bishop of Michigan, moved that the President of the Congress should be given the opportunity to raise any monies needed for the operating of the Congress, and that his hands should be unloosed. The motion was seconded. The motion was ruled out of order.

Executive secretary Hodges came forward to speak on matters relating to the Washington headquarters. Following these remarks the Secretary addressed himself to our relations with the American Baptist Convention by reading a letter from Dr. Fuller of the American Baptist Convention (which see). It was moved by Dr. Hodges that we send a letter to the American Baptist Convention making known our willingness to assume an association relationship with their Convention in keeping with the received letter from them. Motion was seconded. Motion carried.

The Chairman of the Transportation Committee, Reverend D. Clay, was called upon to give his report. (which see).

Dr. Adams, of the Publishing Board came forward to report for that Board. A motion for adoption was made by Adams. Motion seconded. Motion carried. (Report yet to be received.)

Reverend W. A. Jones gave the report for the Eastern Region, and introduced its new President, Reverend H. A. Carter, of Maryland. A motion to receive and adopt was made. Seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend J. J. Johnson gave the report for Southern Region No. 1. Motion to adopt. Seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend H. Joseph Franklin, President of Southern Region No. 2, reported on his region. Moved to adopt. Seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend H. B. Hicks then came forward to report for the Mid-Western Region. Motion made to adopt. Seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend O. D. Lowe, of the South-Western Region gave the report of his region. Motion to adopt. Seconded. Motion carried.

Executive Secretary Hodges then made certain observations in relationship to the Regions. He stated: 1) that the regions are not conventions; 2) the regions do not elect officers, but rather recommend officers; and 3) the regions cannot legislate, nor raise any monies without proper authorization by the Convention.

Reverend R. W. English was then presented to bring greetings from the ITC School Group of Atlanta. These greetings were received.

The Benediction was then given by Dr. R. W. English.

Letter from the American Baptist Convention in Regard to Association

The letter from the American Baptist Convention of June 12, 1970, to Dr. S. S. Hodges, Executive Secretary of P.N.B.C. as read to the Convention:

"In order that you might have this in writing let me share with you that which you already know, namely, that the American Baptist Convention took two official actions with respect to cooperation with the P.N.B.C. First, we unanimously went on record with respect to a positive response to the 'Resolution on Cooperation with the A.B.C.' which you adopted on September 3, 1969, at Miami Beach, Florida, and transmitted to me in a letter at a later time.

"Second, in accordance with our by-laws, Article VIII, entitled 'Associated Organizations' we voted to invite the P.N.B.C. to become associated with us in keeping with that Article which reads as follows:

Article VIII Associated Organizations

'Section 1. Upon recommendation by the General Council and invitation of the A.B.C., any National Baptist body in the territory of the A.B.C. may become an Associated Organization by voting to accept such invitation, such acceptance to be given in writing to the General Secretary of the Convention.

'Section 2. An Associated Organization must be a National Baptist organization and one which indicates its willingness to cooperate wholeheartedly in the purpose and objects of the A.B.C., to wit:

'To give expression to the opinion of its constituency upon moral, religious, and denominational matters; and to promote denominational unity and efficiency in efforts for the evangelization of the world.'

'Section 3. The relationship between the A.B.C. and any Associated Organization may be terminated by either party, as of the thirty-first day of December in any year, by giving at least six months written notice to the other party of its election so to do.

"I trust it would be possible for you to bring this second matter before your next Convention in order that you might at an appropriate time send me a statement with respect to the desire of the P.N.B.C. to become associated with us as we are now associated with you.

"I look forward to many happy years of fruitful association with you as we seek together to know and to do the will of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Wednesday Evening, September 9, 1970

The evening services were started with inspirational singing by Director Hatcher. Following this exercise, Mrs. Esther Smith of Georgia discussed the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

Dr. Homer Nutter then came forward to pay tribute to our fallen comrades. With deep sincerity he saluted them, and the memorial services were concluded by the singing of "Jesus, Lover of My Soul."

President Searcy called upon Dr. Gardner Taylor for remarks, after wishing him well on his upcoming trip to Africa.

Reverend E. R. Williams, of Chicago, presented a proposed amendment to the Constitution. This amendment was distributed, but not discussed.

The program was then turned into the hands of the Foreign Mission Bureau, under the presiding of Mrs. Esther Smith of Georgia. A Processional of all the regions was a dramatic highlight. Music was rendered by the choir of the Constitutional State Convention of California, followed by the presentation of greetings by Dr. E. E. Chappelle of Kansas City, Missouri.

Reverend Joseph I. Dale, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, gave a brief report on Haiti, as part of the report from the Mission Stations. He was followed by Dr. H. H. Trapp, who reported on Africa.

Dr. E. T. Lewis, the Bureau's Treasurer, made the financial appeal.

Making ready for the evening message, the congregation sang "Amazing Grace." Mrs. Harold Mathew of Atlanta, Georgia, sang "Hark the Voice of Jesus Calling." Reverend H. D. Cockerham, of Louisville, then introduced the evening speaker, Dr. A. P. Jackson, of Chicago. His text was Acts 8:30, and his subject "The Urgency of the Gospel." He lifted the hearts of all present, and the services were concluded with the singing of "Bless Be the Tie That Binds" and the benediction by Dr. Jackson.

Thursday Morning—September 10, 1970

Following an inspired seminar on worship, conducted by Dr. D. E. King, of Chicago, the music director led the congregation in the singing of a medley of hymns.

Reverend M. I. Jefferson, of Virginia, then came before the body to bring "Moments of Meditation," that was inspiring.

President Searcy then came forward and named the Time and Place Committee. It was as follows:

The President called Regional Vice-President E. B. Phillips to preside. Officer Phillips called for Executive Secretary Hodges to make the Executive Secretary's Report. (Which see). A motion was made to adopt the report with necessary corrections. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was made by Dr. Patterson of Washington, D. C., that the report would be adopted with the understanding that the recommendations would be referred to the Executive Board. Substitute seconded. The substitute motion was carried.

The Historian, M. I. Jefferson came forward to give the Historian's Report. A motion to adopt, with reference of recommendations to the Executive Board was made. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. A. R. Downey, President of the Nannie Burroughs School in Washington, was presented to bring greetings.

Dr. C. V. Johnson, the Treasurer, came forward to give the Treasurer's Report. A motion to receive and adopt was made. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was made that the report would be turned over to the auditor. Substitute seconded. Substitute motion was carried.

The Budget Committee was called for. Chairman W. W. Taylor of the Committee presented Reverend George Dudley to read the report. A motion by Dudley was made to adopt. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. E. C. Smith was presented by President Searcy to speak on "Modern Trends in Christian Theology." He spoke upliftingly on "The Church Facing the Seventies—in Church Administration."

Reverend G. W. Criss, of New York, led in singing "I Am On the Battle Field."

Reverend J. R. Austin of New Jersey, presented the speaker of the morning, Reverend M. L. Shepard, Jr., of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. For his sermon, Reverend Shepard took his texts, Ps. 24:1 and Gen. 1:26. His subject was "Image, Injury, and Investment." Following an inspired delivery, the motion was made by a delegate of the Pennsylvania delegates that thanks be given to the speaker. The motion was seconded. Motion carried.

The benediction was given by Reverend Shepard.

Thursday Afternoon—September 10, 1970

The singing of "Draw Me Nearer" opened the afternoon session. Reverend J. M. Douglas, of Virginia, led "I'm Going Through." Reverend B. T. Hughes of Maryland, gave the story of the hymn, "Have Thine Own Way."

President Searcy expressed thanks to the devotional leaders. He then called upon Dr. J. H. Nichols, of New York to preside. Reverend G. F. Rayburn then presented Reverend Mitchell, the Pastor of Christ the King Baptist Church, of St. Louis, Missouri. The moderators were then presented, there being nine of them present. Reverend J. M. Douglas then spoke on behalf of the Moderators. He gave echoes of the work of the Council, and his remarks were followed by singing "Where Could I Go."

A report of the Publications Board was then made. A motion to adopt was made. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was made by Bishop of Detroit that the report be mimeographed and the part of the report that is related to the Constitution be acted upon at Mid-Winter session. A substitute for the whole was then made by K. L. Moore of Kentucky, that the report of the Board would be adopted with the exception of those items that are related to the Constitution, which items will be mimeographed and presented for consideration on the following day, September 11, 1970. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

The Presiding Officer then permitted the presentation of a proposed amendment to the Constitution, by Dr. E. R. Williams of Chicago. A motion to adopt Resolution No. 1 was made by Reverend Williams. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was then made that Section 1 be tabled indefinitely. Seconded. Motion carried. It was then moved that all other resolutions in this proposal be tabled. Motion seconded. Motion carried, and so ordered.

A motion was then made to recess until the next scheduled part of the program. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Thursday Evening Session—September 10, 1970

The evening session was started with congregational singing. Deacon A. L. Lindsey, of the District of Columbia, then presented the story of the hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

Reverend J. O. Rich was then presented to give a presentation on the theme "Black Theology," which he did impressively.

The podium was then turned over to the Youth Director, Mrs. Mattie Cross, who introduced the youth as they made ready for the Youth Talent Hour. Their presentation was an inspiration to all, and at its conclusion, the entire group was given a standing ovation.

Reverend Criss, of New York, assisted by Reverend B. W. Smith of Ohio, and H. W. Creech, of Georgia, came forward to lift the offering for the Martin Luther King Memorial Fund Drive.

Reverend Charles Adams was then called forward to introduce the Honorable George W. Crockett, of Detroit, Michigan, who was to give the Civil Rights Address. His subject was, "A Black Judge Speaks." Judge Crockett recounted incidents surrounding the New Bethel Baptist Church incident in the City of Detroit, and used it as an example of the racism we must contend with as we seek the justice due us.

Iniquities abound, he said, in our application of the law, and these hinder us mightily. But a judge is instructed to teach, and power will come from our knowing. Black preachers must assist black lawyers and black judges as they seek, and as we all seek, the justice that must prevail. When this is done we will achieve the power that protects.

The benediction was given by Reverend Charles Adams.

Friday Morning—September 11, 1970

Vice President, Louis Johnson called the Friday session to order, and the morning began with a Seminar on Worship by Dr. D. E. King.

Reverend J. L. Goolsby, of Missouri, conducted the devotions.

Reverend Dr. T. Y. Rogers, of Alabama, came forward to discuss the Church facing social issues in the seventies as an aspect of "Modern Trends in Christian Theology." His message was inspiring.

Reverend W. M. Fair then called upon the audience to join him in singing "I Will Trust in the Lord."

Reverend William McKinley Bowman of South Carolina came forward to deliver the morning sermon. His texts were found in Eccl. 1:9 and Matt. 28:19. He talked about "God and Space Flight." When he finished we had reached spiritual orbit, and we were landed by the singing of Reverend James Williams of New York.

Reverend Beatty, of the Foreign Mission Bureau, was presented to make certain observations on behalf of the Foreign Mission Bureau, with special emphasis on the upcoming 10th year anniversary.

Reverend C. C. Suggs gave the report of the Time and Place Committee. He presented the invitations that had been received. A motion was made that the Convention would go to Greenville, Mississippi in 1973. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was then made by Dr. E. L. Harrison that all other invitations received will be registered and turned over to the Executive Board for its later attention. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend Charles Adams was then given time to present to the Convention in mimeographed form, the changes in regards to the Constitution that had been proposed by the Publishing Board.

The newly enrolled ministers of the Convention were then presented to the Assembly.

Reverend Ivory Jefferson, of Virginia, was called upon to give the report of the nominating committee, following the presentation of Dr. Thomas Kilgore, of California, who was assigned the task of presiding over the election.

A motion was then made, by K. L. Moore, that all bona fide messengers would be granted voting privilege. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Reverend Jefferson then introduced the Secretary of the Nominating Committee, Reverend J. B. Williams of Washington, who read the names of the nominees. From the floor was introduced the names of Dr. L. V. Booth of Ohio, and Dr. Louis Johnson, of Michigan, as candidates for the office of 1st Vice-President to companion the name of Dr. Talley, the candidate nominated by the Nominating Committee. A motion was made to close the nominations for the office of 1st Vice-President. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Following a voice vote from the house, the Presiding Officer, Dr. Kilgore, ruled all officers nominated by the Nominating Committee as elected, excepting the office of 1st Vice-President, for which office there were alternative candidates. The Chairman also ruled that the office of Editor was exempted.

A motion was made that a person shall be elected by majority vote. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Ballots were then passed among the delegates to vote by secret ballot for their candidate for 1st Vice-President, and following their collection, turned over to counters to count.

A motion was made that all nominees for the Board of Christian Education should be elected. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion that all nominees of the Foreign Mission Bureau would be elected was made. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was then made that all nominees of the Publishing Board would be elected. Motion seconded. An amendment to the motion was made to the effect that instead of a blanket period of five years applying to the members tenure, membership periods would be designated by years, such as "to 1971," or "1972," or "1973," to fit with the Constitutional requirements. The amendment was accepted. The motion with the amendment passed.

A motion was made that all nominees to the Home Mission Board would be elected. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. L. V. Booth, the Convention's representative to the American Bible Society was presented by Officer Kilgore to give his report. Following this informative report, Mrs. A. Rimer, of Chicago came forward to render a solo. She was followed by Reverend W. P. Pierson of Greenville, South Carolina who also sang.

Reverend W. A. Jones of New York then informed the Chairman that the tellers were ready to make their report of the count for the office of 1st Vice President. The report was as follows:

L. V. Booth, of Ohio 280 votes; C. Talley, of Michigan, 123 votes; L. Johnson, of Michigan, 136 votes.

Dr. L. V. Booth was then declared the elected 1st Vice President. A motion was made that the election for Booth would be unanimous. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

The benediction was then given.

Friday Afternoon—September 11, 1970

The afternoon session was called to order by President Searcy. He presented Mrs. C. C. Mann, of the District of Columbia, who related the story behind the hymn "Just As I Am." Following her presentation, we were led in the singing of this hymn. Miss Violet Ankrum, 1st Vice-President of the Women's Auxiliary then took charge. The Youth Choir sang "Love Lifted Me." President Brent of the Women's Auxiliary was then escorted to the platform by her fellow officers, and the Women's Auxiliary Choir then sang "Make Me a Blessing."

Miss Ankrum presented President Brent of New Jersey, to deliver her first annual report. She spoke from the Convention Theme, "Space for Man, or Space for God." With charm, elegance, and depth, President Brent stirred the hearts of all messengers present.

The Tompson sisters from New Jersey and Bermuda further inspired the assembly by singing a duet, "No, No, It Is Not An Easy Road."

The period of acceptance and commitment was then accompanied by the singing of Vice-President Ankrum, who sang "I Surrender All."

The services were then turned back into the hands of Dr. Searcy, our President. He expressed the thanks of the entire Convention to the women for a job well done. President Emeritus, Dr. Chambers, then brought commendatory remarks, and was followed by remarks by Dr. Aubourin and Dr. Bruce, former Presidents of the Women's Auxiliary.

Dr. E. L. Harrison, the new President-Elect, was called upon for remarks, and noted the great progress that had been made by the Convention in its nine short years. His remarks were well received.

Mrs. Monroe Byrd, Treasurer of the Women's Convention, then moved that President Brent's message would become the property of the Convention. The motion was seconded, and carried.

The Convention then sang "Bless Be the Tie That Binds." The benediction was given by President-Elect Harrison.

Following the benediction, Dr. Harrison requested that only those messengers who had other meetings would leave, and that those without meetings would please remain for the offering for the Monthly Support Plan, the appeal for which would be made by Dr. Thomas Kilgore, of California.

Following the offering, Dr. Harrison requested that all Boards would meet, and leave their reports with the Secretary.

Dr. Harrison then presented Dr. D. E. King, of Illinois, the Editor of the Baptist Progress, to make his report (which see). Dr. King moved its adoption. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. Johnson, of Illinois, then gave the second benediction.

Friday Evening—September 11, 1970

The services began with a spirited song session led by song leader Hatcher. President-Elect Harrison then called upon Executive Secretary Hodges to introduce the guests who would bring fraternal greetings. The first was Reverend Walter Hoard, the Associate General Secretary of the American Baptist Convention. He was followed by Dr. Porter Ruth, the Executive Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention. Both guests were well received, and their words were hope-filled for our future Baptist relations.

Dr. Harrison then called upon Vice-President-Elect Booth and Vice-President Johnson to lift the love offering for President Searcy.

Mrs. Zeta Byrd, of President Searcy's home church, the Second Mt. Zion Baptist Church, of Atlanta, then made a presentation to Dr. Searcy. She announced that "As long as the vines grow around the stump, Dr. Searcy was their sugar lump."

The Progressive Youth Choir then presented "Certainly Lord" and "When Peace Attendeth My Way."

Reverend C. S. Hamilton, of Georgia, then came forward to present President Searcy for the President's message. Following this introduction the Convention was led in the singing of "Amazing Grace." Dr. Searcy then came forward. He began with a review of our history. He spoke of the increase of our numerical strength by over three-hundred churches in the past two years, and of newly added state conventions, with the latest being founded in Texas. He spoke of the establishment of our unified budget, of our having employed the first Executive Secretary of any Negro convention. He reminisced regarding the founding work of Doctors L. V. Booth and T. M. Chambers. He spoke of our Convention forming an associational relation with the American Baptist Convention. He commended the membership of our Convention, reminded us that much work yet remained to be done, but said we must keep moving on, believing in a God who is good. Lift every voice, he said, and sing, and as you sing, move forward under a God who is good.

Dr. Bishop, of Michigan, then made a motion that this fine message of our President would be come the property of our Convention, and that its admittance into our records would be accompanied by the love we hold for him. Motion seconded and carried.

Dr. Ralph Abernathy, the esteemed leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, then brought remarks that were heart-stirring. The benediction was then given.

Saturday Morning—September 12, 1970

The morning service began with a song session led by song leader Hatcher. President Searcy then greeted the brethren and presented Vice-President-Elect L. V. Booth to give the meditation for the morning. Dr. Booth read passages from John 14 and 15, and talked from the subject "The Christian Dilemma." He reminded us that Christ can take dilemmas and make them delights. We then sang "Jesus Is All the World to Me."

Dr. Stamps, of New York, was called to make the report on the Home Mission Board. This he gave, and an offering in the amount of \$56.50, was raised.

Dr. Beatty was then called for any remarks he might have regarding the Foreign Mission Bureau.

Dr. C. A. Cherry, of South Carolina, then made an appeal urging the support of our brethren for Benedict College.

Dr. T. M. Chambers was then called upon to officially install the newly elected officers of our Convention, which he did impressively.

Executive Secretary Hodges then made a partial report, informing us that we had thus far raised \$37,039.54. We were represented with 963 messengers. He then gave a partial report on the cooperative work being done by the committee for our joint endeavor with the American Baptist Convention.

Brother Beatty then reported that the Foreign Mission rally had resulted in \$10,337.75 being raised.

Dr. Searcy presented Dr. E. L. Harrison, his successor. Following a round of applause, Dr. Harrison expressed his appreciation at his elevation by the brethren to their highest office. He stated his hopes for our Convention, and in the following acceptance speech, made known both these hopes and his specific requests:

"My Brethren and My Sisters:
"I am overwhelmed by your expression of confidence in me, and the honor be-

stowed upon me by your vote for me to take the lead in our Convention work for the year ahead.

"I am not so awed with the trust and honor as to forget the responsibility involved. It was this responsibility that prevented me from being an anxious seeker for the office of President of this body.

"Even now, I feel a wee sense of fear and inability to measure up to the demands, but I said, 'SOMEBODY MUST DO IT, THEN WHY NOT I IF IT IS OFFERED?' I accept somewhat reluctantly. And so upon what I hope is a mutual faith between us, I pledge my honor and determination, to give to the opportunities and the duties of the office of President of our Convention, the best I have and the best that comes to me for the year ahead, and I ask as much of you.

"However, I wish you to remember that I am not a 'perfect saint,' but just another one of the Sons of Adam. Therefore, I will greatly need, and I solicit your prayers, good will, and full support.

"As President, I expect to fulfill the functions listed in your Constitution, namely, **'TO PRESIDE, GUIDE AND INSPIRE THE CONVENTION** in its deliberations and programs.

"As Presiding Chairman, I will strive to be the ruling victim of your legislation, and to enforce the rules you put into my hands, and I shall expect you to abide by and uphold them until they are deleted, or changed.

"I will preside with courtesy and respect to all, and I shall expect the same from you. I intend to be visible and responsive.

"I will do my best to protect the right of the majority; the right of the minority; the right of the absentee and to protect the Convention against itself.

"I hope to be an inspiration among you with bright new progressive ideas and noble goals to lead you in the pursuit of the same.

"I do not expect that you shall accept all I present to you, or agree with all the projects I may present to you without questions. I expect that we may strive vigorously with each other; in debate, when necessary, the issue before us; but once an issue is decided, I promise to lead on and follow through with the majority, and I shall expect the same of you.

"Thus, I here and now make three requests of you:

"1. That each state delegation shall put into the hands of the Executive Secretary, immediately, the name, address and zip code of the selected Board of Directors members of your group, so that he may be approved by the Convention before the Convention Session closes.

"2. That all Boards, Commissions and standing committees appointed, or elected, shall organize and hand in for approval the name of the Chairman with address and zip code.

"3. That instead of adjourning this Ninth Session of the Convention 'Sine die,' or until the 1971 session, we adjourn, when we do adjourn, to reassemble in the Mid-Winter Session, so that the Mid-Winter Session shall be a continuation of this Ninth Session of the Convention. This, I ask in order that we may legally transact business; and that all delegates may be notified now to attend and participate who will.

"I believe the proper motion should be:—

"I move that when we adjourn, we adjourn (or stand adjourned) to continue this session in the Mid-Winter Meeting in Memphis, Tennessee."

"Time is short. There is much to be done. Presidents Chambers, Taylor and Searcy have wrought well. It is right now time to utilize and follow through to the goals set under their leadership.

"Finally, if we are to build a worthwhile Convention, we cannot go forward in fear. We must do it in faith with courage.

"If we do not build a Convention, and build a better one than we have had before, we shall prove to be 'shadow boxers' or 'wind jammers' who cannot do ourselves and are unwilling to let others do it for us.

"We have very little time left to prove our ability, our sincerity and our constructive will power.

"We must not have to wait in the wilderness for the complainers to die before we can enter the 'Promised Land,' we must keep going.

"In self defense we must believe in somebody; we must listen to somebody; we must follow somebody, or perish on our way to NOWHERE

"It is not ours to know what is ahead. What should concern us most is who is with us, and if HE that is with us is Jehovah, we need not fear what is ahead, for HE that is with us is more than they that are against us.

"I thank you again for your confidence, and again I promise that under God, I will go forward, if you will go with me, in pursuit of PROGRESS.

"My charge to you is ARISE! and let us be going to possess the land which God has promised us, if we will put our feet upon it.

/s/ Earl L. Harrison"

Following this acceptance speech, a motion was made that the speech would be accepted, and that the specific requests therein made known would be acceded to. The motion was seconded and carried.

Brother C. D. T. Tucker, of the American Anti-Prejudice Society was then granted the floor to make known certain situations. This he did. A motion was made to receive his remarks as information. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. Stamps, of New York, was then granted the floor.

The matter of our representation on the Executive Board of the World Baptist Alliance was presented. A motion was made that Drs E. R. Searcy, E. L. Harrison, and S. S. Hodges would be our representatives on this Board. The motion was seconded. The motion was carried.

An offering was then raised for Mr. J. H. Francis, our organist, and the sum of \$26.00 was turned over to him. The same was done for our music leader, Dr. C. E. Hatcher, and the sum of \$11.50 was turned over to him.

The benediction was then offered by Dr. Searcy.

Saturday Morning—The Executive Board Meeting—September 12, 1970

The Executive Board meeting was called to order by President Harrison, and the meeting was opened by prayer led by Dr. C. S. Stamps, of New York. Dr. Harrison then inquired of Dr. Searcy as to whether there was any unfinished work which he desired to call to our attention. Dr. Searcy then called for Dr. Hodges, following which he made remarks. He raised the question regarding the disposition made concerning remuneration for our organist, Mr. Francis. A motion was made that we would give Mr. Francis the sum of one-hundred and fifty dollars. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. Hodges then read a listing of all bills that had been presented at the present session. A motion was made that all bills submitted by Secretary Hodges would be authorized to be paid. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A list of bills to be paid was submitted by President Brent in connection with the Women's Auxiliary. Action was taken on these bills by the Board. A motion was made that President Brent would be donated five-hundred dollars. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was made that the love offering already given President Searcy would be supplemented to the extent that the combined gift would total five-hundred dollars. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was made to give President Searcy the sum of four hundred dollars. Substitute seconded. Substitute motion carried.

A motion was made to pay Mrs. R. O. Harris, secretary of the Women's Auxiliary, an annual salary of three-hundred dollars a year. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was then made that we accept the responsibility involved in our associational relationship with the American Baptist, and that we will be accountable for twelve thousand five hundred (\$12,500) dollars involved in the feasibility study to be jointly conducted by them and us for a financial campaign. This motion was seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. J. Barry Williams, of the State of Washington, then presented a problem stemming from matters having to do with the Home Mission Board. He was granted organizing power by President Harrison, there being no objection. There was none.

A motion was made to send the money raised at the Memorial Fund Drive for the Martin Luther King Foundation directly to Mrs. Martin Luther King. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

A motion to adjourn, and continue this session in the Mid-Winter meeting in Memphis, Tennessee, was made. The motion prevailed.

Sunday—September 13, 1970

The Emmanuel Baptist Church . . . Reverend W. H. White, Pastor

The concluding service of this session was held with splendor in the midst of the welcoming congregation of the Emmanuel Baptist Church. Pastor White turned the meeting over to Presiding Officer R. H. Milner. Officer Milner brought greetings to the congregation on behalf of the Convention. He asked Dr. White, the Pastor, to introduce the officers of the Convention, and following this introduction had all messengers of the Convention to stand. Chairman Milner then called upon the Recording Secretary, K. L. Moore, to read the Resolution of thanks from our Convention to the host church and its Pastor, Dr. White, the cooperating churches and their pastors, the city and its citizens for the kindness and courtesies that had been extended us while in their city. This he did.

Following a hymn, presented by the combined choirs of the Emmanuel Baptist Church, Dr. E. R. Searcy preached a message that shall long live in the memories of all who were there. Following this glorious service, the members and delegates went their several ways, to meet at another place in some future time.

THE CHALLENGE OF THE 70'S

Vice Presidents, and Officers of the Parent-body, President Brent of the Women's Auxiliary Convention, President Anderson of our Congress of Christian Education, and President of the Laymen Convention, State Presidents, State Fellowships, Moderators, brethren and sisters of the Progressive National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc., assembled in its Ninth Annual Session here in the city of Kansas City, Missouri. It was exactly nine years ago that we met in this city in the midst of National Baptist turbulence. The first crack from the skies darkened by the gathering clouds of controversy came in Louisville, Kentucky, when the question tenure of office of Presidency (1957) came to the surface, from the smoldering fires of the various differences about the constitution's adoption. (1952).

The storm struck in full force in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1960, and with hurricane velocity, it continued in this city. Dr. Gardner Taylor was as fairly and squarely elected President of the National Baptist Convention as any man in its history, and certainly any man since I have been actively engaged in the work of our denomination on National scales. C. V. Johnson of Chicago, was presiding and he stood tall with fairness and orderly procedure in the election. That was an important hour in Baptist history, because our National Organization had reached a crisis.

In this city (Kansas City, Missouri), the rallying cry was, "Fair Vote" in the election. There was a determined effort to keep those who were committed to support of Dr. Taylor out of the city auditorium. That was so wrong and unbrotherly, until it fell by its own weight. We told the city authorities that we were going into the auditorium and unless they have enough jails to put 2,000 preachers—then get ready for we were going in the auditorium. They backed down and said, we were free to go in and would not be hindered.

A committee from the Taylor team, (so-called) Dr. Harrison serving as chairman proposed a conference with Dr. Jackson to talk things over with the view of handling our own affairs without any outside participation. I felt mighty little—when a judge of this city had to appoint a monitor to conduct our election, when the other side turned down our proposal.

BAPTIST DEMOCRACY ON TRIAL

I saw Baptist Democracy on trial in this city when the Convention voted the voting rights of the Convention body to a Board of Directors and that the Board of Directors have the power to approve or disapprove any action of the Convention body as such. That is a gross violation of Baptist democratic principles and individual liberties. This is the first time a separation in the National Baptist ranks over a doctrinal question. White Baptists have had their separations from time to time in history, but usually it is on theological grounds. Black Baptist separation is usually on political grounds. But the disruption that gave rise to the organization of the Progressive National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc. is unique, in that this time it was due to the irreconcilable controversy over the sovereign rights and liberties of the central body of the Convention itself and a subsidiary group called the "Board of Directors." Of course, the question of tenure of office has its roots in the deep soil of these principles.

LAST YEAR IN MIAMI BEACH

We are deeply grateful to Dr. Edward T. Graham and the brethren of Florida for their Christian hospitality demonstrated in our Eighth Annual Session held in Miami Beach, Florida. That session made its impact on that state which has resulted in more brethren from that state in attendance at this session. Progressive Baptists and their friends came from all quarters of the United States and islands around. Our agenda was unique, in that it stretched out to include some topics and panel discussions on Civil Rights and Theological issues under the theme, "THE CHURCH IN A REVOLUTIONARY AGE." This agenda was chaired by Thomas Kilgore of California. Three hundred new churches joined us.

Our theme this year was prepared by the Agenda Committee, which was chaired by R. P. Randal of Michigan. It is: "SPACE FOR MAN OR SPACE FOR GOD?" You will notice that this theme is designed to couple the church with Christ its Founder and call it to active duty on the moral and spiritual battle fronts of the world. The decision as to how God and Man can work together is ours.

OUR SAINTED DEAD

Our Lord seemed to have walked about in the forest of His Gospeliers and cut down some heavy timber. E. R. Williams, Pastor of the Christ Pilgrim Baptist Church, Saint Louis, Missouri; H. H. Coleman, Pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church, Detroit, Michigan; Charles Hill, Hartford Avenue Baptist Church, Detroit, Michigan, D. R. Bell, President of the Progressive Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention of Alabama. These all died in the Faith and in the front ranks of the Progressive National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc.

DURING THESE TWO YEARS

1. This convention has seen some growth during these two years. Our registration committee reported to me in Miami Beach, Florida, that three hundred (300) new churches enrolled with us during that session.

2. At our Adjourned Session in Memphis, Tennessee, a new State Convention joined us, The Progressive Baptist State Convention of Wisconsin. The Dr. E. B. Phillips, President.

3. In May, 1970, a new State Convention was organized in Houston, Texas. It was the Progressive State Baptist Convention of Texas. The Rev. Rufus Wilson was President of the new Convention. He is also Moderator of the Old Land Mark Missionary Baptist Association of Texas. That Association joined the new State Convention and it is another Association that has joined other Progressive National Baptist Conventions, and the Moderators Conference of our Convention. S. M. Weaver and Providence Baptist Church hosted the Western Regional Progressive Baptist Convention, Ohio Lowe, President, and the Organization of the convention took place there with S. M. Weaver, who is a moving figure in it.

4. These two years saw division number two (2) of the Southern Progressive National Baptist Regional Convention organized with H. J. Franklin as President. Starting from zero in November, 1969, Franklin went to work on the President's appointment and a successful session with large numbers and all states in the Region represented—Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi, and Louisiana held at the Pearl Grove Baptist Church. The Jackson, Mississippi Session was held May 11-13, 1970, and the Dr. Al Jones with host Pastor.

We are deeply grateful to Rev. Franklin and Mrs. Blanton who headed up this determined effort, to bring to active force the potentials of these states for our Convention. It has a bright and promising future!

UNIFIED BUDGET

5. For the first time in Negro Baptist History in the United States, an Unified Budget has been attempted. The constitution provides that there be and during the last two years, serious efforts expended by both the Parent-body and all its auxiliaries, have brought all activities in line with this concept of financing our cause in this nation. At this session, we have set up a combined registration committee, operating under the Executive Secretary, in order that the terms of the plan be put into effect. This is the first time this has been attempted in a Baptist—National Baptist body, since, "The Morning Stars Sang Together." Now this operation may be far from perfection, it is a

far cry from the old traditional method of operation at our annual session. I am deeply grateful to the Budget Committee chaired by Dr. W. W. Taylor of Chicago, for their laborious work to achieve this goal. This is the first time, a method of this kind has ever been tried at an annual session of a National Baptist body in this country. "We can if we think we can." As a man thinketh in his heart so is he. As a National Baptist Convention thinketh in its heart so is it! We can, if we think we can!

\$1,500,000,000

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE

6 Your President recommended to the Board of Directors in session in Atlanta, Georgia, (December 4-5-1968) a capital Fund Drive for one million-five hundred thousand dollars, (\$1,500,000,000) to finance our program of Missions, Education, and Social Action for five years. The Board readily saw the point, and approved the recommendation. At the mid-winter session of our Convention, held in Memphis, Tennessee, at the Greater White Stone Baptist Church, Dr. A. R. Williams, host pastor, January, 1969, the President called for the ratification of the Board Action, and it was unanimously adopted by the Convention. So it became the law of the land for 1400 churches operating in 35 states, all Progressive States Conventions, Associations, and Fellowships, Friends and Neighbors of our Convention under God.

The amount this year was set at \$362,000,000 in round figures from all sources. We ought to get it. We can, if we think we can! The causes we have adopted to support on National Scales, need this fund—Missions, Education, and Social Action. This is the goal for the next five years. The challenge of the seventies (70's), will call us from the mediocre to major action. God and Angels will settle for no less!

FULL-TIME EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

7 During these two years, a full time Executive-Secretary was employed. Dr. S. S. Hodges of Cleveland, Ohio, former pastor of the Sardis Baptist Church in that city was elected in Miami Beach, Florida, during our Eighth Session there, and took office following the close of the Miami Session. L. V. Booth broke the ice in this field and showed us what a part-time Executive-Secretary can do. We saw wonderful things done for our young organization. S. S. Hodges will show us what a full-time secretary can do. The Andrews Committee, after considerable searching for a temporary location of our Headquarters accepted the offer of our Washington, D.C., brethren, who offered the Eton Tower Room, 204-1739 Vermont Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20005. The Convention in its Adjourned Session in Memphis, Tennessee, January, 1970, adopted this recommendation. Now this is the law of the land for our temporary Headquarters.

At present, this operation is costing us about \$2,000.00 per month. This calls for a significant increase in administrative expenditures, which means there must be a significant increased number of churches to our column of voluntary monthly givers. We have been talking about a full-time Executive-Secretary for some time. Now, we got one. What next? What Now?

JOINT COMMITTEES FROM PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL BAPTIST AND AMERICAN BAPTIST CONVENTIONS U.S.A.

8 For the first time in American History, two National Baptist Conventions, one black and the other white, proposed and appointed a committee each to examine the possibilities of working cooperatively together in constructive moments for the good of all, and this without any encroachment on the autonomy of either Convention. The two committees met in Washington, D.C., May 29, 1970, at the Shiloh Baptist Church, Dr. Harrison, Host Pastor.

An interesting and significant thing about this event was—there were two Conventions—one white and the other Black. The Negroes weighing the destiny of the two conventions, one Black and one White for the 70's. Thomas Kilgore, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Los Angeles, California, was President of the American Baptist Convention, U. S. A., the first Negro ever to be elected to the presidency of the American Baptist Convention U. S. A. You will hear from this meeting in this session. Can we say then, Christ is about to get a new break among Baptists in this country?

There is no sensible reason under the sun, why Progressive National Baptists,

American Baptists, and Southern Baptists should not find common ground upon which the three might work together for the common good of humanity in terms of education, mission and social action, and world peace. There is something we can do together, while at the same time maintaining our autonomy. I don't think Jesus is concerned about mergers and phasing out one religious body to build up the other, as He is whether or not these groups are dedicated to a constructive cause fully committed to the redemption of a sin-sick society.

As far as my race is concerned, in the Baptist Church, I take my stand on my mother, Matilda's philosophy. She says, "Never forget the bridge that brought you over, nor be foolish enough to destroy it, because you might need that same bridge to cross over on your way back." Let each pursue its distinctive role wherever the Spirit leads it. There can be unity in diversity!

1st Corinthians 12th Chapter: Verses 4-6

Now, there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of operations, (The Greek means works) but it is the same God which worketh all in all."

Notice it is the phraseologies—"same Spirit" and "same God" that gives unity to the various Workings and Workers of the Church. It is the Spirit of God that gives the unity, not the organizational form as such. Form may give structure, but not necessarily unity.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

I was the guest of the Southern Baptist Convention in its 125th annual session held in Denver, Colorado, June 1-4, 1970. This was my first time to attend, although I had read of it more than thirty years. I was received warmly among them as an invited guest. I am deeply impressed by the enthusiasm they have for their work. I am convinced that they are concerned about world outlook and are struggling against the old enemy of racism that tends to dog the heel of the mightiest religious aggregation in the world. They are winning that battle.

I also saw them vote time out of a very tight schedule to hear a statement read to them by a group of black students of Denver, who accused them of being racists and religious hypocrites. They listened and applauded them after they had finished their presentation. This is a sign that they can take it and can overcome the things whereof they are accused.

CONGRESS OF THE BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE

For the first time in Baptist history, this organization took the Baptist witness to the Far East. This time it was held in Tokyo, Japan, the largest city in the world. We were there well represented. There are teeming millions in the Far East, yet unclaimed for Christ. We saw the challenge. We must meet it. Black Christians can do more about this than whites.

United States Baptists had a special stake in this session, because their military armies took the war to the gates of Japan's cities and unleashed atomic bombs on her towns. People were destroyed by the hundreds of thousands. The Japanese had no answer for such weapons as this and put down her armies and sued for peace. But our mission was different this time. Instead of bombs of destruction, we carried the gospel of Christ which is the power of God unto Salvation through Jesus Christ. "God was in Christ reconciling the World unto Himself." I am proud I was your President at this time! It takes the Gospel of Jesus Christ to cure the ills of the Far East and the whole World!

There have always been those who attempted to find other remedies for the ills of humanity. Israel reorganized her theological system and adopted Baal as an on-the-scene God, whom they were told could get to the point of their needs, while Yahweh was making up his mind as whether to respond or not. Nebuchadnezzar had his God of gold sparkling against the eastern sun and lighting up the planes of Dura, and commanded all men at the penalty of death to bow their knees to his God. But there were three men in the Kingdom that defied his religious unification scheme and declared to him—"We are not careful to answer you in this matter and will not bow to worship your God." They were sentenced to death by fire in the furnace, but they trusted

Yahweh, survived the flames of the furnace and lived to see Nebuchadnezzar toppled from his throne by Yahweh. The Almighty God to serve a sentence of seven years on the farm, eating grass with the oxen. That King was convinced that there was in the universe a power greater than his power. He declared: "Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego who sent his angels to deliver his servants who trusted him." (Daniel 3:24-30) America and the nations of the world would be wise to come to the verdict of the ancient King.

THE DECADE OF THE SIXTIES AND A PROGNOSTICATION OF THE SEVENTIES

The decade of the sixties changed all of us. No matter who we were or where we lived, the world events of the past ten (10) years created a different world—and if I might enter a mild venture of prognostication, they promise a vastly different future.

Standing at the gates of the Sixties, we heard of "Black Power." But who could have foreseen that scores of cities in the United States were destined to become charred battlegrounds of riots, burnings, lootings, killing, and racial fratricide. To speak of political assassinations, we look back in American History to 1865 to Lincoln and John Wilkes Booth. Well, the Sixties showed us something. John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Jr., Medgar Evers and others were struck down. These were examples of the brutal mood of the times. Pante raids turned into campus rebellion on nearly 2400 Colleges and Universities. Three Negro students killed at Orangeburg, South Carolina State College, went unnoticed, but, when six White students were killed at Kent State, the whole world took notice. Political leaders and other citizens rose to their feet and declared it is time to bring this sort of behavior pattern on these college campuses to an end!

These two bloody events are sufficient to show the pale horse of racism is boldly prancing in open society in this country, and has a deep footing in the intellectual centers of the nation. Loud talk about brotherhood to replace racism is one thing, but to drive out that Satanic spirit that has grown so deep into the body politic and religion in this country is another.

There will be an increased assault on the ramparts of the status-quo during the 70's. The citadels of power in education, government, trade, commerce, and organized religion, and politics, will be challenged in no uncertain terms. However, the challengers are the outs and the challenged are the ins. Reinhold Niebuhr said that, "History has not yet proved that the outs would not be as vicious and unmerciful as the ins." An historic illustration of this thesis, is the brutality of the Marxists forced by Lenin, Trotsky, Stalin against the Czarist government in Moscow. It boils down to the nitty-gritty that the man who is mad with the establishment and yelling all over the place for change, is no guarantee that his ethics toward his fellowman will contain any more grace than those whom he opposes now. As long as he is down, he can have a soft heart toward others, but as soon as he gets up, that softness of heart can fly out of the window, and he becomes an insensitive hard-hearted neighbor like the unmerciful steward in Matthew's Gospel (18 chapter: 21-35 verses). It takes nothing short of the grace of God to hold a man in check when he comes in possession of power! Political hearts are no guarantee of merciful rule. Redeemed hearts are!

DEMOCRACY ON TRIAL!

The sixties were a decade of disillusionment for those having faith in the democratic process as a stabilizing political force in the world. Look at the vast number of dictatorships and military governments driven out of power by coups d'etat around the world. Look at the bloody conflicts of the black governments in Africa!

Great Britain had a powerful colonial system of government all over the world and boasted that the sun never sets on the British flag. Now, there is no British Empire for the sun to set on. They worked hard to maintain it as long as there was money in it. Cheap labor kept it in economic power.

When the Indians in India and the Blacks in Africa began to cry for freedom and a greater voice in decision making, the colonial system under democratic rule became increasingly costly. Great Britain was forced to give up these colonies, one by one, until today, the sun can set anywhere on the British Flag. Democracy is rocking

in Africa, and the Latin American States. In our own country, there is now, and will increasingly be throughout the 70's, a restlessness under the democratic rule.

It is becoming increasingly a question whether or not we can manage ourselves constructively under the democratic rule of law!

THE NEGRO BALLOT POWER

The seventies is time for the Negro to re-think his political status as a voting power in this country. The present trend is back toward a philosophy of conservatism in matters pertaining to politics. With the election of Mr. Heath and his conservative party to power in England, this philosophy of politics in this country got a strong boost. Strange as it seems, our white neighbors may hassle over personality in political campaigns, but that is all to it. They know their welfare is reasonably safe, regardless to whoever is elected to office, whether it is on the local, state, or national level. They are not concerned about their Civil Rights. They already have their rights. This is not exactly true where Negro citizens in the U.S.A. are concerned. They must not only be concerned about getting Civil Rights laws on the books, but whether or not the elected officials are going to carry out the spirit of these laws to his benefits.

Therefore, it is important to him, who is elected, and whether or not a substantial number of Black ballots supported the winning officials. For if you are on the losing side, then the politician owes you nothing as such. He is slow about listening to your pleas for certain favors. Now when it comes to party lines, we got to be wise enough to be in on all parties in such strong numbers, so that our voices will be heard and respected. Don't let a single party escape by all of us getting into any one party. Get in all of them—Democrat, Republican, and even Mr. George Wallace's American Independent Party. I was shocked and astonished when he polled more than ten million votes in this last election. Who would have thought the country would pay that much attention to Mr. Wallace? Mind you sirs, most of those votes came from the North and the West, not from the South! We got to watch that party. It might just come to power one day. Remember the Whig Party? Who knows if this new party, the American Independent Party, didn't come to the kingdom for such a time as this.

I believe there is definitely a scheme on foot to maneuver all Black voters into one party. I saw signs of it in the campaign of Senator Goldwater. He and his colleagues did not want to be bothered with the Negro at all. They tried to get the country to elect them to power without the Negro vote. The liberal forces in the country being in full swing, turned them down. I see a more dogged move in order to nullify its effectiveness in local, state, and national elections. As a result, the present national administration came to power without much help from the Negro. That is why it is moving slow on Negro demands. If you are going to play the game of politics, you got to play it by the rules. Andrew Jackson and his followers, adopted a rule that stated "To the victor goes the spoils." In substance that rule still holds.

The only answer to this political scheme is to get in on all the political parties in such substantial strength that the party must give notice to our role in it. Now, we got to see to it that every Negro in the United States, 18 years old and above is registered to vote and is actively engaged in the political life of the nation all the way from the local town to the White House. For the only thing a politician will really respect is that ballot. Curse all you please, demonstrate all you please, nothing has more appeal to a politician than a ballot. We must either stand up and vote in all these party elections or sit down and cry!

The Progressive National Baptist Convention can be an effective force in organizing and leading our people in this direction.

FAITH, THE MAIN-STAY

Faith now is and ever shall be the MAIN STAY of Progressive Baptists throughout the decade of the 70's. Whatever Progressive Baptists are going to be, will be determined during this decade. Whatever struggle lies ahead or whatever way Progressive Baptists decide to go, they must not ever lose faith.

When science and technology break down and theologies and philosophies are driven from the field, Progressive Baptists must still believe God! When politics fail, and political ideologies crumble, Progressive Baptists must still declare to the world

what Paul said to that trembling crew on that trembling ship when the Mediterranean winds had blown against it for fourteen days and nights.

Acts 27th Chapter Verses 23-25

"Sirs, be of good cheer, for I believe God, that it will be as it was told me: For there stood by me the angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve, saying, Fear not, Paul; thou must be brought before Caesar and, lo, God hath given thee all them that sail with thee."

Progressive Baptists must, under the most excruciating circumstances, believe God.

FAITH ENDANGERED

Faith never has, is not now, and never shall walk alone, unhindered, unmolested, and unchallenged. There are always perils, and pitfalls along the wayside of faith.

On the one side, faith is imperilled by **DESPAIR** and on the other side, by **OPTIMISM**. Of these two hands that dog the necks of **FAITH**, **OPTIMISM** is the most dangerous. Not many men live forever in a state of **PERMANENT DESPAIR**. They may run into it and even bog down in it for a long time, but somehow they will come out of it, some singing and some shouting. Before they will stay in it, they will construct some kind of a little **COSMOS** in the seeing **CHAOS** of existence in order to give meaning to their lives. The great danger is that no **COSMOS** from which they derive their sense of meaning, maybe too tentative and tenuous to support the idea of meaning in a great crisis of existence. This was at least in part the philosophy of the Prophet Jeremiah when he spoke to the Exiles in Babylon:

"Build ye houses and dwell in them and plant trees and eat the fruit of them. Take wives and beget sons and daughters—that ye may be increased and not diminished."

The old prophet was saying, since you are going to be down there in Babylon for ten (10) years, build for yourself a little **Cosmos** from which you might derive a sense of meaning to your lives while there.

The Negro in America has had the same experiences in many ways. Snatched from his native land and enslaved in America, he too had to build for himself a little **Cosmos** in the new world of America in order to give meaning to his existence, while he struggled through the dark night of bondage for two-hundred and forty-six (246) years. With his song of both **HOPE** and **DESPAIR**, he built his little world within the U.S.A. When freedom came (1863), he strengthened his little **COSMOS** with his own church. His church became this little **COSMOS**. It gave him the arena, a small stage of action where he could exercise his freedom in terms of leadership and ability. That is why, there are so many Negroes in the Baptist church. When freedom came, they wanted to be in the first church they could find. The Baptist church suited their taste. Even now, it is the first **COSMOS** that the Negro has. From the church, he got his inspiration to, "stand the storm, it won't be long, we'll anchor by and by!"

Faith in God then was his **MAIN-STAY**. Faith in God now is his **MAIN-STAY**. Faith in God is America's **MAIN-STAY** today if she wants to win against the storms of domestic and international conflicts.

We had better learn here and now, that our ultimate salvation is not found in race, tribe, kindred and tongues. No, none of these can save you from the judgment of God upon our sins. Jeremiah declared:

"Cursed be the man who trusteth in collective man And imagines that the immorality of his race or nation compensates for the insecurity of his existence."

Not race, but **Grace of God** that saves from hell!

No nation under the sun, knows this better than Judah. The Politicians and Ecclesiastic state craft ignored Jeremiah and his warning of the impending doom hanging over the nation, because of its sins against God. They thought they had it made on all fronts and under all circumstances because they were descendants of Abraham.

When Jerusalem fell under the Nebuchadnezzar's battering-rams and Samaria toppled under the dogged siege of Shalmanezar and Sargon's armies (724 B.C.) from Ninevah and the governments were broken up and the citizens enslaved in Babylon and Ninevah, woke up too late to learn that kinship to Abraham was no bar to the judgment of God upon their sins. When your kingdoms, and all you trusted in fall, then what?

When the process of nature and history and the judgment of God overtake you, as surely it will, life will be meaningless if it has not already discovered a source of meaning, untouched by, "the destruction that falls at noonday!" It is the Almighty God that gives us permanence in American history and not over race as such. It is not America ipso-facto that gives this nation permanence as such. It is God, and God alone that gives it ultimate permanence.

As a race, however, though 20 million strong, we might have to hang on to our little **COSMOS**. We are not ready to put it down yet. There is still more land to be possessed in the U.S.A.'s big world.

Although we have paid in blood and sacrifice to build up the U.S.A.'s big world, we still have not come into full noonday of our liberties under the flag. We marched against Great Britain and King George III under Washington in the Revolutionary War. We marched against the matchless strategy of Lee and the daring bravery of Pickett under Lincoln, Grant, and Sherman, in the Civil War. We marched against Von Hindenburg's lines in World War I. We marched against Hitler's lines on the Beaches of Normandy and the Battle of the Bulge. We saw the wheels of his armies bog down at the gates of Stalingrad under the leadership of Eisenhower.

After the debacle at Pearl Harbor, we marched against Yamashita's navy in the Pacific and brought Togo tumbling from his throne of military power in Tokyo under MacArthur. We marched against Asian history in the Korean War. We are now marching against Russian tanks and Viet-Cong guerillas in South Vietnam. We marched against their sanctuaries in Cambodia and broke up their hiding places. All these things and more. There is still more land to be possessed in full citizenship in this country, and yet this is our country, to have and to hold. Let us not stop marching. . . . We are not ashamed of our record! James Weldon Johnson gives a note of hope.

Lift every voice and sing,
Till earth and heaven ring,
Ring with the harmonies of liberty;

Let our rejoicing rise
High as the listening skies,
Let it resound loud as the rolling sea.

Sing a song full of the faith that the dark past has taught us;
Sing a song full of the hope that the present has brought us;
Facing the rising sun of our new day begun,
Let us march on till victory is won

Stony the road we trod,
Bitter the chast'ning rod,
Felt in the days when hope unborn had died;
Yet with a steady beat,
Have not our weary feet,
Come to the place for which our fathers sighed?
We have come over a way that with tears has been watered,
We have come treading our path through the blood of
the slaughtered,
Out from the gloomy past,
Till now we stand at last
Where the white gleam of our bright star is cast.

God of our weary years,
 God of our silent tears,
 Thou who has brought us thus far on the way;
 Thou who hast by the might
 Led us into the light,
 Keep us forever in the path, we pray,
 Lest our feet stray from the places our God where
 we met Thee;
 Lest our hearts, drunk with the wine of the world,
 we forget Thee;
 Shadowed beneath Thy hand
 May we forever stand,
 True to our God,
 True to our native land.

INTRODUCTION

It is with profound pleasure that I come before you to make my First Annual Report. This is a great time to be alive. We are living in the last third of the twentieth century, the first year of the decade of the seventies, and the ninth anniversary of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, Inc.

We have returned to Kansas City, Missouri, where the idea for this convention was definitely conceived in the fertile mind of Dr. L. Venchael Booth. Out of the small assembly of dissatisfied Baptists, who answered Dr. Booth's call to come to Zion Baptist Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, November 14-16, 1961, this convention was born. As in physical births, there is a great struggle and much pain, so it was in the birth of this convention. It was the providence of God which led me, your humble servant, to that meeting; and it was His Spirit who inspired me to vote "yes" on the question, should we organize at that time. If all that I have done or will do in this world is forgotten, I would like to be remembered as one of the organizers of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, Inc.

In the nine years since the organization of our convention, history has recorded many notable events, some great and some disgraceful. We have witnessed the assassination of a young vigorous and visionary President—John F. Kennedy—and we have seen the assassination of his assassin. The war in South Viet-Nam has been escalated to its peak; and is now declining. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. won victories in Birmingham and Selma; and the Congress of the United States of America has passed the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act. The Black Revolution has come in the wake of non-violent demonstrations and violent rioting throughout the nation.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a member of this convention, was one of the first to raise his voice against the war in South Viet-Nam, proving that he was a true prophet. An assassin's bullet snuffed out his life while he was crusading in behalf of the poor. America has sent a man to the moon. We heard the first words spoken on the moon when astronaut Neil A. Armstrong said, "Here's one small step for man and one giant leap for mankind." Astronaut Armstrong was not just speaking as a representative of America, but of mankind in his insatiable determination to have dominion over space as he has it over the space ship earth.

THE PROGRESSIVE STANCE

Now, where has the Progressive National Baptist Convention stood in the midst of all of this history making? It has stood solidly and four-square behind and beside

the Civil Rights Movement. The majority of the Civil Rights leaders have been and are members of this convention, and in many of our pulpits the voices of Pastors, not recognized as Civil Rights leaders have been raised in defense of human rights and human dignity. We have contributed funds to the various Civil Rights Organizations.

In the field of education, we have distinguished ourselves by our contributions to many different educational institutions, among which are Bishop College, Morehouse College, I.T.C., Shaw University, Benedict College, Selma University, Morris College, the Chicago Baptist Institute, the Institute For Training in Urban Ministries, and others.

In foreign missions, we have shown our dedication to fulfilling the Great Commission by our support of the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau, U.S.A., Inc. Not only have our churches contributed to the Bureau, but the convention itself has given from its treasury sums of \$7,000.00 and \$5,000.00 at one time. This has never been done by any other National Baptist Convention.

STEWARDSHIP IN OFFICE

Brethren, you were kind enough to elect me as your first full-time Executive Secretary a year ago in Miami Beach, Florida. Before going further, let me pause to say, "Thank you for your confidence and for the opportunity to serve in this office." It was my duty and privilege to follow Dr. L. Venchael Booth, who, although he had served on a part-time basis, had distinguished himself as a very capable Secretary and Christian Statesman. The longer I serve in the Office, the more I appreciate the Herculean efforts which he put forth to establish the office and perform the duties of the office for six years.

On October 10, 1970, the Office of Executive Secretary was transferred from Dr. Booth to S. S. Hodges in the presence of President E. R. Searcy, Drs. R. T. Andrews, Wm. C. Upshaw and W. J. Bishop. According to the vote of the Executive Board of the Convention the new Executive Secretary was to serve on a part-time basis until the adjourned session in Memphis in January, 1971. During the Adjourned Session, it was voted that the Executive Secretary go on full time and move his office from Cleveland, Ohio, to Washington, D.C., within 90 days. The Headquarters Office was set up in Washington, D.C., at 1239 Vermont Ave., N.W., on April 1, 1971.

The Executive Secretary has attended the annual meetings of all the Regions, plus the organizational meeting of the Southern Region Division No. 2. The meetings were as follows: Organizational meeting of Southern Region No. 2, November 12-13, 1969, at Washington Street Baptist Church, Paducah, Kentucky; Southern Region No. 1, February 24-26, 1970, at Mt. Zion First Baptist Church, Griffin, Georgia; Eastern Region March 17-19, 1970, at Baptist Temple, Pittsburgh, Pa.; Midwestern Region, April 22-24, 1970, at Greater Galilee Baptist Church Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Southwestern Region, May 5-7, 1970, at Providence Baptist Church, Houston, Texas; Southern Region No. 2 May 12-14, 1970, at Pearl Grove Baptist Church, Jackson, Mississippi. All of the Regions are doing good work and should be continued and should receive support from all Progressive churches in the Region. All the Regions turned over all receipts to the Executive Secretary along with their bills for expenses.

The Congress of Christian Education met June 22-26, 1970, in First Baptist Church, Alexandria, Virginia. A very successful and impressive session was held, so far as the program was concerned. There was not complete agreement however, between the Executive Secretary and the administration of the Congress in regards to handling the finances. A compromise agreement was reached to the effect that the Congress officials would receive and disburse congress finances this year, but in the future all finances would be received and disbursed by the Executive Secretary's Office. Meetings attended outside PNBC: There have been numerous committee meetings with various officials of the American Baptist Convention leading up to the formulation of the Joint Committee of American Baptists and Progressive Baptists to conduct a Financial Campaign. Last fall, I attended the Briefing Sessions for Staff members at American Baptist Convention Headquarters, Valley Forge, Pa. January 7-16, The Church Executive Development Board's Seminar at Mo-Ranch Assembly, Hunt, Texas. February 1—the Installation of the President of the United Church of Christ, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. May 15 — the American Baptist Convention, Cincinnati, Ohio. June 20—Executive Board of National Council of Churches, Washington, D.C. July 12-15—Baptist World Alliance, Tokyo, Japan. August 4—Religious Liberty Conference, where I served as a panel member. August 27—the Mt. Bethel District Association, Washington, D.C. I also attended the funerals of the late Dr. H. B.

Coleman and Dr. Charles A. Hill, both of Detroit, Michigan, where I represented the Convention.

The Executive Secretary holds memberships in the following organizations: The Executive Board of the Baptist World Alliance and a member of its Finance, Budget and Personnel Committee. The Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, and serves on the Personnel Committee and an "observed" member of the Nominating Committee. A member of the Joint Committee of ABC and PNBC Financial Campaign. He has been invited to serve on the Board of Directors of the Morehouse School of Religion.

THE FINANCIAL REPORT

The Financial Report is in two parts. First, the receipts, disbursements and balances of all Convention Funds; and second, the receipts from churches, associations, conventions and persons. As you read the report, please remember two things:

1. The fiscal year runs from July 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970.
2. The present Executive Secretary began in the middle of the fiscal year. So far as the first part of the report is concerned, he began January 20, 1970. So far as the second part of the report is concerned, he began October 10, 1969. In regards to contributions from churches, associations, conventions and persons, we have added all records of contributions to what we have received since October 10, 1969. The column headed "Unified Budget" includes all monies given that was not designated for a definite objective. The amounts in the other columns are for the objective at the head of the column. Contributions are listed under the name of the church, instead of the Pastor, because the church is the contributor.

THE NINTH ANNUAL SESSION

In obedience to directives of the Convention, we are endeavoring, during this Ninth Annual Session, to achieve a greater degree of unity among the auxiliaries and the Parent Body. In order to strengthen the Unified Budget and to create a more widespread understanding and support of the Unified Budget, we are experiencing for the first time Unified Registration, Unified badges, a unified printed program, and unified night sessions.

The Foreign Mission Rally has been shifted from Sunday afternoon, when everybody has gone home except the participants on the program, to Wednesday night. President Brent of the Women's Auxiliary will speak to a unified session on Friday afternoon. Our youth will be given recognition on Thursday night and Friday night.

SOME TASKS BEFORE US

After nine years of operation, we still have not organized and activated all of the boards, committees, and commissions, which the Constitution provides for. Two boards and one committee which should be organized and activated in this session are the Home Missions board, the Board of Christian Education and the Parliamentary Committee.

1. The Home Mission Board has had a partial organization since the beginning of the Convention, but it has never had its full strength of 15 members, and the Board has never presented a challenging program worthy of a National Convention.
1. I recommend that the Nominating Committee bring in a complete list of nominees for the Home Mission Board and that Board organize itself and present its program to the Adjourned Session of the Convention in January 1971.
2. There has not even been a partial organization of the Board of Christian Education. Dr. S. D. Edwards has worked as a lone representative of the Convention in matters pertaining to accreditation and certification; and we have not dignified his office by holding regular elections nor listing his name among the officers of the Convention.
1. I recommend that the Nominating Committee bring in a complete list of nominees for the Board of Christian Education and that Board organize itself and make its report to the Adjourned Session of the Convention in January, 1971.
3. The need for a Parliamentary Committee is obvious. Therefore, I recommend that the President name 7 persons to form a Parliamentary Committee in this session.

We have found that holding our Annual Sessions in hotels are very convenient and saves taxi fares. Why not hold our Adjourned Session in a hotel? The weather is usually inclement that time of year and everybody would appreciate not having to go out in the weather to attend the sessions.

I recommended that the Executive Board take this matter up for consideration in this session.

Year after year, we have had the problem of getting the recording secretaries of the Parent Body and the Auxiliaries to send in their minutes in ample time to compile and send to the printer. This year the delay was so great that the printer would not give us a price, because he foresaw the need for overtime work to get the minutes out in time for our Ninth Annual Session.

I recommend that all recording secretaries be required to type their minutes and send to the Executive Secretary 30 days after a given session is over.

This First Annual Report of the Executive Secretary of the Convention does not include a complete report of monies received from Progressive churches by the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau. This is true because the Bureau, the Foreign Mission Board of the Convention has not seen fit to submit a report to the Executive Secretary's Office, as the Constitution requires. We are optimistic however, that this situation will be soon corrected.

There is still some difference of opinion as to where the Headquarters of the Convention should be located. Let us not become bogged down with this side issue and allow it to hinder our work. Let it not become divisive in its import. It is far more important to be concerned about our stewardship and determine to support liberally the causes which we have espoused than to wrangle over the location of the Headquarters. Is the Headquarters desired for St. Louis, or Memphis, or Cincinnati, or Atlanta because its location in either of these cities will increase the budget and the enrollment and cause the program of the Convention to be more effective; or are there other reasons, which are less noble?

The Executive Secretary has stated repeatedly that he is a servant of the Convention and will serve wherever the Convention decides he should serve. However, we should be objective and mature enough to acknowledge that Washington has some advantages not to be found in any other city in America or in the world. It is the nation's capital and, since the United States of America is the world's greatest and most powerful nation on earth, it is in a sense a world capital. It is one of the crossroads of the world. There is always some important action in Washington.

It is only a few minutes by plane and only a few hours by rail or highway from New York, where the Church Center houses the National Council of Churches and the Headquarters of several denominations. New York is also the chief port of embarkation for overseas travel. It is nearer still to Philadelphia, the home of our Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau; and to Valley Forge, the Headquarters for American Baptists. Let us forget Washington is also reasonably near to the Southeastern States, where the majority of Negroes live in America.

The following religious organizations have been influenced by the strategic importance of Washington to establish their Headquarters or an important office of their organization in the City:

The Baptist World Alliance representing Baptists in 131 countries; Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs including American Baptist Convention, Baptist Federation of Canada, Baptist General Conference, National Baptist Convention, North American Baptist General Conference, Seventh Day Baptist General Conference, and Southern Baptist Convention; the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention; National Council of Churches; Progressive National Baptist Convention, Inc.; United Church of Christ; Christian Church (Disciples); Union of American Hebrew Congregations and Synagogue Council of America; United Methodist Church; Finance Department of A.M.E. Church; Church of the Brethren; Episcopal Church; Mennonite Central Committee; Friends Committee on National Legislation; U. S. Catholic Conference; Unitarian-Universalist Association; Presbyterian Church U. S.; United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., and Lutheran Council in the U.S.A.

The Executive Secretary has experienced some inconvenience, difficulty, and embarrassment, because there has not been any funds available to him except the monthly checks from the Convention Treasurer. All or a considerable portion of the Executive Secretary's budget should be deposited in a bank in the city where his office

is located. This is not meant to be a criticism of the Treasurer, but this is a plea to the Convention, especially the Executive Board to do something about this awkward situation.

The urgent need of the Convention now is that every church become a monthly contributor to the Unified Budget of the Convention. This is the only way we can achieve true greatness as a Convention. In these early years of our existence as a Convention, we have won the respect and admiration of the Nation; because of the direction of our thrust. We have made people believe that we were going to do great things. Now it is time to really produce. Working and praying and giving together, we can achieve true greatness. I believe we can build a great Convention. I am determined to go all the way with my Lord.

"I've seen the lightning flashing,
And heard the thunder roll,
I've felt sin's breakers dashing,
Trying to conquer my soul:
I've heard the voice of Jesus
Telling me still to fight on.
He promised never to leave me,
Never to leave me alone."

Agreeable to the established tradition of this Convention, the president is expected to make an annual report. The hour has come.

I wish for words to adequately express my gratitude to God for bringing me to this hour in this place. How can I ever thank all of you for your confidence, encouragement, prayers, and enthusiastic support. Special thanks to my husband, who has encouraged me every day that he has seen me since last September. I have prayed that I would not let him down.

SPACE FOR MAN OR SPACE FOR GOD

Except for the ocean, there are few unexplored regions remaining on earth. Man is now turning his face toward the vast and seemingly limitless universe above him. We are all aware, after what happened on the moon last year, that we have seen humanity take a giant step forward on the road toward destiny. And on this road we are advancing more rapidly than any generation has ever moved before. The pace is so rapid it is frightening!

Patterns of living have changed more in the past two hundred and fifty years than in the past two thousand. By patterns of living we mean the modes of transportation, methods of communication, types of family relationships, etc. Many of you here today can remember when the basic method of transportation was the horse, a method employed for countless previous centuries. Thus in a matter of 50 or 60 years we have made obsolete a mode of travel that had stood ever since man captured the first wild horse.

In the face of this rapid, radical change many cry out for the "good old days." There is a longing for something "old fashioned," the "old fashioned cooking," "old fashioned loving," and the "old fashioned Gospel!"

We might well wish that we could get back to the normal, to sanity, to the "good old days." But life is a forward-moving experience. There is no going back. The years ahead will be characterized more than ever before by rapid and accelerating change. It is futile to hope for years without change. The real need is for a faith that is shockproof, and will not shrink!

If we are to survive, we must adapt to the new social milieu. Suddenly we are like the old woman who, upon hearing the grandfather clock in the hall strike thirteen, awakened her husband to say in great alarm, "Wake up, Pa, it's later than its ever been before!"

In Memphis last January, the women took a retrospective look at the decade of the 60's. They were years of remarkable, awesome and tragic changes. There were world-shaking events for which we were not ready. Children were born into a world not prepared for their arrival and men died but we were not ready to give up. Ideas arrived whose time had come and traditions crumbled. We had to turn to Ecclesiastes for an explanation: "To every thing there is a season and a time to every purpose under the heaven, a time to be born, and a time to die."

Isn't it strange that the people of God, who have always been warned by the prophets, preachers, the Bible and the Holy Spirit, are usually the last ones to face up to the inevitable? I shall never forget the words of Dr. Kenneth Maxwell, speaking to a group of Church Women United one day. He said that God had always had to take the church by the nape of the neck and literally drag her through history! Selah.

Seeing the vision delayed because of the reluctance of the people to accept change, Progressive Women decided to adopt the theme: "Progressive Women, Mobilizing for Change in the Decade of the 70's."

To mobilize means to bring into readiness for immediate active service or use in any emergency.

Whatever change is necessary to make this Convention worthy of the name "PROGRESSIVE" and to do a more effective job in the advancement of the Kingdom of God, the Women are ready!

Immediately upon receiving the directives in black and white from Executive Secretary Hodges last October, like Paul Revere, I began spreading the word! Not on horseback, but by Jet!

Since then, according to Carol Travel in Plainfield, I have flown nearly fifty thousand miles. In addition to the flying, more than thirty-seven hundred miles have been covered by car. (Leaving the driving to me).

Joined over six hundred well wishers and friends in paying tribute to our own L. Venechal Booth in the Netherland Hilton Hotel. We were happy to present a love gift from the women in appreciation for his great contribution to humanity. The father of Progressive Baptists!

NOV. 11-13. PADUCAH, KENTUCKY

The organization of the Southern Region No. 2. The Rev. L. Joseph Franklin and Mrs. Vergie Blanton were elected presidents and commissioned to raise the Progressive flag over the territories of Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana. When they met in Jackson, Miss. in May, they reported, "Mission Accomplished!"

JAN. 19-22. MEMPHIS, TENN. EXTRA SESSION

The Budget Committee met a day earlier to work out a plan for immediate implementation of the Unified budget. This committee worked twelve long hours, leaving no stone unturned, prayerfully seeking a way by which we can move from the voting stage to the action stage! Because something has been voted it does not mean that it has been done. It is most obvious that a lot of our "hang-overs" in the New Convention are "hang-overs" from the Old Convention. Could it be truthfully said that it is easier to get Israel out of Egypt than it is to get Egypt out of Israel?

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

The women met and held an Inventorial Session. Being a part of the "NOW" generation, we for sometime had been impatient with the rate of speed we were traveling toward our objectives. Like oxen, we had been on our knees to keep from losing ground. Like the horse, we had been champing on the bit; like the car, racing our motor or like the jet, we had been warming up the engines, but no signal from the control tower to take off!

We decided to go back to the assembly plant for a check-up. After they listened to us for a while, we were put back in operation and we went Right On to have a successful session. Spiritually, financially and numerically. The sum of one thousand twenty-seven dollars and fifty-four cents was turned over to the Executive Secretary.

FEB. 11-12. LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

Here the newly appointed President Obie Lowe and the dynamic president of the women, Mrs. Delores Nehemiah performed a miracle! They had regional choir of seventy-five voices. I witnessed scores of young people standing and giving their Christian testimony and challenging the adults to lead the way.

President Nehemiah has gone into Nevada and other states uninvaded by Progressive to get women to sign pink sheets. Among the last recruits she sent me was the name of a woman from the Church of God, whose pastor is an Elder Johnson. Are we ready to accept them?

Let me pause to say that we have had women with us from the beginning whose churches do not belong. Mrs. Thelma Walton is chairman of the Associate Members Unit. She is a charter member of the Convention.

One of the first life members was Mrs. Lola Abernathy, sister-in-law of our Ralph. She had made reservations for this session. Almost in front of her church the first Sunday in July she was killed by a car.

The voice at noon day came

She started up to hear,

A mortal arrow pierced her frame

She fell, but knew no fear.

FEB. 24-27. GRIFFIN, GEORGIA

Southern Region No. 1 held a very successful session. President Johnson and President Heard had a well planned integrated program. Mrs. Zda Byrd was elected to succeed Mrs. Heard.

Living in the home of pastor and Mrs. O. H. Stinson, learning how the imposing Mt. Zion, a modern brick structure was built and operates without an offering lifted in the church, would take an hour to tell! Hearing a woman who is now serving as a president, living off fourteen pills a day talk about courage and then the pastor from a town in Alabama, quietly tell of how his life had been threatened because of his stand for righteousness, I left that meeting feeling like I had been in the company of all the people mentioned in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews!

We are truly blessed with some great souls in this convention. Take time to listen to some of the quiet ones. You will feel so humble in their presence.

MARCH 24-27. PITTSBURG, PENN. EASTERN REGION

We had a challenging session. We are not integrated yet but we are moving on up. Elected another dynamic President, the Rev. Harold Carter of Baltimore to succeed Rev. Jones of Brooklyn. Mrs. Leola Bowick of Pittsburgh succeed Mrs. Willie Percetti of Philadelphia.

APRIL 22-25. MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN

The Midwest Region was the first to have an integrated program under Presidents Louis Johnson and Lannie Lambert. They did what they promised. Raised more money than the Eastern. The Rev. E. B. Phillips and Mrs. Naomi Hogan succeeded the Rev. Beecher Hicks and Mrs. W. W. Taylor as presidents.

MAY 5-7. HOUSTON, TEXAS

Here the Southwest Region added a Texas State Convention to their rapidly growing region. While there, we inspected the facilities of the elegant Shamrock-Hilton Hotel, site of the 1971 annual session.

MAY 12-14. JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI

Mrs. L. C. Armstrong welcomed me into her home to remain for the Region No. 2 assembly. It was a rewarding experience. The Pearl Grove church is really progressive.

President Blanton delivered a dynamic message.

Miss. Edwina Robinson, Executive Secretary of the W.M.U. was invited to speak to the women of the region. She in turn invited me for a two-week workshop that covers the state of Mississippi, meetings every night. I immediately accepted the challenge for next March.

That same night the students were killed at Jackson State. I shall never forget the pall that immediately settled over the city, the dazed, drawn look on the faces of the Black and white people as I drove through the cordoned off area the next morning.

JUNE 22-26. ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA

The Congress of Christian Education was one of the best! All ministers! Wives should have been in the class I attended.

JULY 4. OFF TO TOKYO, JAPAN

My husband and I traveled with a small party of the Executive Committee, all Southern Baptists. The Japanese women had the Red Carpet out when we arrived at the New Otani Hotel!

There were 125 women from 78 countries who spent four days sharing Christian concern through dialogue. The theme was "Facing the Future." In Christ all things hold together. Col. 1:17. We learned of the suffering of many in other countries, how people are tortured, starved and thrown in prison for their Christian witness.

I wished for some of the people in this country who feel there is nothing worth saving here. Granted there is a lot of house-cleaning we should do but never throw the baby out with the bath water.

I was asked by president Levy to write a report for The Tie, our official newsletter. I began by saying, "We took the wings of the morning and flew to the other side of the Earth, and God was there! It was a pleasure to speak for Progressive women when the spot-light was turned on North America during the 'Continental Look-ins.'"

After attending every session of every Regional meeting except the Saturday session of the Midwest, twenty-four sessions and two rehearsals in Tokyo, arriving in time for every devotion and remaining for every benediction, I have come to this conclusion, from all I have seen, heard and felt, "OUR Assignment is Earth!"

Until we are faithful in the things that are at hand, there will not be "greater things" for us. The universe lies before us with its mystery and its majesty, but it will not be revealed to us in all its fullness until our doorstep is swept clean. We are being allowed a peep at the world to come, but the greater things must wait. Our greatest efforts at this point are the earth problems.

We may have the Apollo 10 to 20, but the stagnation of earth will pollute the effort of man's mind and hand. Man may go out and return and go and return, but they are only trial runs. Man has not accomplished his part. There is God's part and man's part. Every scripture is written with this clause in it. If we are meek, we inherit the earth. If we can believe all things are possible. According to our faith it is done unto us.

Sixty-five years ago an open-air meeting was held in London's Hyde Park. It was the day before the Baptist World Alliance was born. The most dynamic message of the day was delivered by a young black woman from the U.S.A. Her subject, "The Triumph of Truth." Her name, Nannie Helen Burroughs, a prophetess with a dream.

Returning to the states, she saw the need for her people to unite. She was under thirty and advocated Black Power, not to hate, kill and burn, but to Love, Build and Learn. She listed ten things blacks had to do for themselves and ten things whites had to stop doing to blacks. I urge you to read a documentary account of how black Baptists turned their backs on the chance of a lifetime. It's recorded in the "Dream and the Dreamer," by Dr. E. L. Harrison.

Someone has said "Truth never yet fell dead in the streets; it has such affinity with the soul of man, the seed, however broadcast, will catch somewhere and produce itself a hundredfold."

The seed has caught today and many are singing what they think is a New Song, but it is lyric poetry, written and set to music by Nannie Helen Burroughs sixty years ago!

I had the honor of delivering an address at the inauguration of Mrs. A. Richie Downey as third President of the Nannie Helen Burroughs School. Mrs. Downey is an active member of this convention and she is depending on us to help make a delayed dream come true on Lincoln Heights in the Nation's Capitol. You don't have to own it to invest in it for we can't lose!

OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

We are proud of our young people! They have as their objective a year's salary for a nurse in our Hospital in Africa.

Our profound gratitude to Mrs. Marie Cross whose tenure is up this year for her excellent service. She, like the former National Youth Director, Mrs. Nelson, is a public school teacher. The conflict in our meeting date and the opening of public schools makes a situation to recruit teachers and young people who can attend our sessions. We urge the Convention to consider a change in dates.

OUR PARENTS

Too many hard working parents trying to be sure that their children do not go through the hardships they experienced have tried to erase the challenges in life. Little do they know that life without challenges is the life without meaning.

It is significant that a large percentage of the dropped-out and turned-on generation of young people, those who are taking the chemical route to self-realization, are from the upper class and middle-class homes, where the child has been underprivileged with "too much," rather than too little. Emphasis has been on giving the child things rather than love. Without love all the creature comforts cannot enable him to survive as a whole person.

The late Dr. King warned America, black and white who advocate violence and hate that we either love and live together as brothers or hate and die like fools. Every day we read and hear how we are dying like fools because we insist on hating our fellowman and teaching our children to do the same!

This convention is being challenged on many issues to take a stand. Issues that the people who are called by the name of Christian should humble themselves and pray about, seek God's face and turn from our wicked way so that He will hear and forgive our sins and heal our land.

We need to choose this day whom we will serve. Many Christians are confused as to where their first allegiance belongs, to Christ or to black people whether they are right or wrong. Who is leading whom? Which road will we take as a convention for our people to follow? Arrows are pointing in three directions . . . SEPARATION? INTEGRATION? LIBERATION?

In our confusion many have joined the Silent Majority, neither hot nor cold, just fiddling while Rome is being burned!

Many are praying, calling out for mercy like the blind man and He is asking us the same question, "What would you have me do for you?" If we really want to see, I am sure we will see that "collaboration" is still the pattern of God. There are things man must do and things that God must do and there is No Failure in God!

To the leaders he is saying, "speak to the people that they go forward!" Leaders, which way is forward on the race issue?

THE CONVENTION

A decade ago many prayed for deliverance from a convention they felt held them in slavery. Nine years ago in this City after toiling all night, they were asked to make brick out of straw.

While they were asking the way to Zion a call came from Cincinnati. The brave ones who went after much travail brought forth a new Convention with a new dimension, Progressive. With great joy we sang a new song and set out for the Promised Land! The world noted and History recorded it.

Even Free people need rules to go by. We received the decalogue (the constitution). Some were willing to abide by it, others were not. We murmured against our leaders.

We wanted tenure. Four years? Too long. Two years? Too short. Part-time Executive Secretary and there were murmurings against him. Full time executive secretary, I hear murmurings again against him.

The women were ready in Philadelphia for Unified Program, we were told to work separately. We were in orbit and were brought down and told to work unitedly. So we are putting it all together, standing at attention for the marching orders!

Although the pages of history turn and turn in and through their movement we see a glorious form.

Often obscured by the smoke of war, partially hidden by the dust of fallen civilizations, this shining figure has been seen by clear-eyed men of all ages, who, perceiving His presence, have turned to push out the walls of the little world in which men have imprisoned themselves.

Behind the Kaleidoscopic tapestry of human experience, undisturbed by praise or condemnation, patient beyond comprehension, certain of victory, stands the Son of God, at once the inspiration and goal of mankind. Much talked about, He is dimly perceived by the multitudes, yet He lives in the very midst of us.

We ask, "How far are we from Canaan?" The women challenge the convention to

let's live up to our potential as a Progressive Convention. Let's begin now to make the Voluntary Monthly Support Plan work! Let's raise our budget!

With your cooperation the women will register every woman in every church of the convention. We'll get a million women to give a dollar each in the decade of the 70's. There is no excuse for a Financial Wilderness! All things are possible if we can only Believe!

It's not an easy road we are traveling
For many are the thorns on the way.
It's not an easy road, but the Saviour is
with us.
His presence gives us joy every day.

No! No! It's not an easy road.

PRESIDENT HUNTER'S ADDRESS

Ninth Annual Session, Progressive National Baptist Convention, Inc.
In Session at the Hotel Muchlebach, Kansas City, Missouri

September, 1970

Mr. Presiding Officer of the Laymen's Movement, Officers of the Parent Body,
Officers and Members of other Auxiliaries, other Guests and Friends—

I am indeed happy to be here with you as we meet in the Ninth Annual Session of the Progressive Baptist Convention, Inc., here in Kansas City, Missouri. Our reception here has been wonderful. Over the past nine years the Convention has experienced considerable growth. The laymen are beginning to share in that growth. This growth manifests itself not only in expanded membership, as important as expanded membership is, but also in expanded efforts on the part of the laymen. During the past year, the laymen have been involved in practically every phase of the activities of the Parent Body, from the mid-winter Session at Memphis, Tennessee, to the meeting of the Congress, in Alexandria, Virginia, during the week of June 22-26, 1970. Hopefully, this growth will not only continue, but will accelerate.

One year ago, the laymen selected me as their president. I felt deeply honored by the honor they conferred on me by selecting me as their leader. During the year many things have occurred in this fast-moving world of ours. For example: the national guard moved onto the campus of Kent State University, resulting in the death of four students; the five-story dormitory of Jackson State College, a predominately Negro institution of more than 3,000 students, was riddled with gunfire after a clash with police—all the dead were Negroes, six black men were shot in Georgia; and American troops invaded Cambodia. The list, of course, is much longer, but I think it well serves to point up that we are living in a critical age. It is an age characterized by unrest, tumult, despair, distress, conflict, uncertainty, inner and outer tensions, and maladjustments. It is an age of jet propulsion, a space age and the age of over-kill. In spite of the tremendous technological advances man has made, he has not yet learned to live with his fellowman. Indeed, we are in the midst of a social revolution and one of the major contributing factors is the failure to share the results of this technological growth with the masses. Many of the black brethren are threatening to burn the system unless they get justice.

Having called attention to some of the ills of the world and being churchmen, I think we should try to see where the church stands in the midst of this revolution. What is its message? What do we have to tell the millions who feel left out of the mainstream of American society by being ill-fed, ill-clothed, undereducated and who are under the poverty level?

You know, there is a striking parallel between the church of today and the early church. The early church grew up in a time of revolution. The Jews were being exploited by the Romans. Certain elements of the Jews were saying that the only way to get rid of the Romans was to burn them. Their reactions were similar to the reactions of some of our frustrated brethren. Man hasn't changed much in 2,000 years. Of course, the founders of the early church had had an experience with Jesus. They were aware of his crucifixion and resurrection and his ascension to Heaven. This was very assuring to them. However, as we have moved across the years men are questioning whether or not the twentieth century church reflects the principles of Jesus as he would have them to.

To convince men that today's church does reflect the principles of Jesus Christ during this period of revolution, we must let God take you and me as the church and make us his instruments through which he can express himself. We have no responsibility for taking sides, but to do God's bidding. The Church must go to the people who are economically deprived, politically denied, socially estranged, robbed of opportunities and tell them the messages of the riches in Jesus Christ. The church must take stands which are unpopular and may bring on much criticism. Remember, he challenged the world with the positions he took. Romans 8:28 tells us that we are conformed to the image of God's son in order that He might be the firstborn among many brethren.

Laymen, I call upon you to rededicate yourselves to the cause of Christ and go about the world trying to build a kingdom here on earth. Let us join with our pastor in expanding the work of the church into our communities.

Morning Session—Wednesday, January 20, 1971

The meeting was called to order by President E. L. Harrison. He then called upon Reverend L. W. White to conduct the devotional exercises, assisted by the musical leader, the Reverend Mr. Hatcher.

Following devotions, President Harrison, by the authority of the powers vested in him, declared the Ninth Session reconvened and in session. He made known certain changes that must be made in the program. A motion was made that the program be adopted with the necessary changes being made. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. D. E. King then led the congregation in the singing of "Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah." Reverend L. W. White then came forward to present the speaker of the hour, the Reverend Benjamin Robertson, of Richmond, Virginia. He took as his subject, "Amidst Thanksgiving, Have We Forgotten to Say Thanks?" The message, delivered under circumstances that included illness, was heart inspiring and gave us cause for thanks.

Reverend Booker, the Convention Auditor, was then called forth to make a report of our books as made by a C. P. A. firm. This was done. Dr. D. E. King then made a motion to approve the report. Motion seconded. Following a brief discussion, a substitute motion was made to turn the report over to an adjustment committee. This motion was withdrawn. The original motion to approve was then carried.

President Harrison then called to the rostrum President Brent of the Women's Auxiliary, President William Anderson, of the Congress, President Hunter of the Laymen, President Williams of the Youth Group, and former President Searcy, Taylor and Chambers. He then, following sundry well received remarks, called upon Vice-President L. V. Booth to take over the presiding officer's chair. Dr. Booth then presented Dr. Harrison, to bring, not an address, but a statement and listing of certain suggestions (which see). These were read by him, and he then requested that they be acted on in the afternoon session. A motion expressing thanks to our President was made by Reverend Charles Green, of Washington, D. C. Motion seconded by Reverend Norsworthy, of Tennessee. Motion carried. Dr. Booth then requested that we make known our thanks to Mr. Garner T. Branch, of the Sheraton Peabody Hotel for the use of our microphones.

Following the singing of a hymn, Reverend O. B. Lowe of California, then introduced Dr. F. F. Holly of Oklahoma to bring us the Convention Sermon. His subject was "God's Lead Man." His texts were found in Acts 27:9 and 10, and 21-27. Then Reverend Holly set our hearts on fire. Following the sermon the assembly then sang "I Will Trust in the Lord."

Dr. Harrison then reminded the delegates to return after lunch. He named the committee to check behind him regarding his suggestions. The men named were:

The benediction was then given by Reverend O. B. Lowe, of California.

Afternoon Session—Wednesday, January 20, 1971

To conduct the afternoon devotions, Dr. Harrison then called to the platform, Dr. D. E. King. Following a hymn, Dr. King took his message from Psalm 139, and his subject was "Fleeing from the Spirit of God."

Dr. Trapp was then called forth to introduce Reverend J. H. Beatty, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Bureau. Dr. Beatty then made known the work being done by the Bureau as it undertakes the observance of the tenth anniversary celebration of its work and of its existence. Dr. Beatty said this Tenth Anniversary Campaign, called TAC, was not simply for money, but for money and the dissemination of information, both of what we do, and of what is needed to be done in Nigeria, Liberia, and Haiti. Dr. Beatty urged the brotherhood to respond during the coming year, doubling up in our giving if this is possible.

President Harrison then asked Dr. Trapp to make the appeal for Foreign Missions. This offering totaled \$212.00.

All new pastors and preachers present were then introduced by Reverend Criss of New York. They were extended a welcome, and President John W. Brent spoke for the entire group, after remarks by Dr. Weaver, of Houston, Texas.

Dr. Harrison then turned the rostrum over to Dr. Booth for the consideration of the President's "Statement and Suggestions." Following the introduction of this statement, a motion by Reverend William Anderson of Philadelphia, was made that all items in the "Statement" by the President not having to do with Constitutional items would be adopted, and all items related to the Constitution would be presented in the manner prescribed by the Constitution. Motion seconded. A substitute motion was then made by Patterson, of Washington, D. C., that the document presented by Dr. Harrison, entitled a Statement and Suggestion would be received as an action program, and all items having to do with the Constitution would be handled and implemented according to the Constitution. The substitute was seconded. The motion was carried.

Dr. C. S. Stamps then came forward to report for the Home Mission Board. Upon its completion, the Rev. J. Williams, of Tacoma, Washington, made known his desire for certain adjustments within the Home Mission Board. He was advised by President Harrison to convene his Board, and then present to the body any matter related to the Home Mission Board.

Announcements were then made.

Dr. Harrison then named a committee on the Implications of Matters contained in his "Statement and Suggestions." They were:

Vice-President Booth then presented Mrs. Nehemiah of California, from the Women's Auxiliary, to speak on our Denominational Fellowships and Commitments. Her report was well received.

Dr. Booth then spoke on the same subject as Mrs. Nehemiah. He urged our participation in all denominational fellowships, and informed us that our Convention had produced a Vice-President of the World Baptist Alliance. Modesty forbade him saying that this conventional representative was himself.

Dr. Harrison then requested and urged that we use for our theme in Houston the subject, "Christian Stewardship."

Reverend Franklin of Paducah, Kentucky, then came forward to introduce three new pastors of the Southern Region No. 2. All were from Mississippi. They were then welcomed and introduced as Reverend E. Heard, Reverend Leroy Harrison, and Reverend A. Boyd.

Reverend W. K. Jackson, of Oklahoma, was then called upon for greetings. Following these words, he gave the benediction.

Wednesday Evening—January 20, 1971

The evening services were opened by President Harrison. Following a song, Rev. J. W. Wilson, of Nevada, then came forward to bring the topic of the evening, "Our Convention and Christian Education." This was an inspired presentation.

There being no objection Dr. Harrison appointed Rev. Hatcher as our Music Leader for this session.

Reverend Charles Adams was then called forth to introduce Dr. G. K. Offutt, who spoke from the subject, "Our Publishing Board, What More Can We Do?" Dr. Offutt told of the work that had been done by the Board, and spoke of what yet remained to be done.

The President then called for Rev. J. Williams, of Washington State, to lift the Home Mission Board offering. The results were \$100.00.

Dr. Nelson Smith then presented the choir of Bethel Baptist Church, Dr. Holmes, Pastor, and Mt. Moriah, pastored by Rev. Norsworthy.

Reverend C. S. Hamilton of Georgia, then came forward to introduce the speaker of the evening, Dr. R. A. Milner, of Georgia. His subject was "What Christians Ought to Be Like." His text was the 1st Psalm, "He shall be like a tree." Standing like an old seasoned tree he preached till our hearts were set on fire. The choir sang, "It Is Well With My Soul."

Following the announcements, the benediction was given by Dr. Milner.

Thursday Morning—January 21, 1971

The services were opened by President Officer Booth. Song services were conducted, and the members present quoted favorite scriptural passages. Prayer was offered by Dr. R. T. Andrews of Indianapolis. A duet was then rendered by two guests, Mrs. Betty Manns and Mrs. Christine Watson, of Texas. Dr. Booth then called for a moment of silence in honor of our deceased comrades fallen during the past year.

Dr. Booth then presented Reverend E. B. Philip, of Wisconsin, to discuss the topic of the morning, "Our Convention and Christ's Salvation." His message was regarded as a blessing.

President Harrison then named a Committee on Transfer of Property with the following named members:

The Executive Secretary, Dr. S. S. Hodges was then presented to give his address. This he did. A motion to refer the report to the Board of Directors was then made. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. W. H. Anderson, of the Educational Congress then came forward to give the report for the Congress. This he did and then called for a Mr. Armstrong, of the Appollo Travel Agency of Chicago to make known travel procedures for our convenience to the Congress meeting in Los Angeles, California.

President Harrison then called for Mr. L. E. Bachelor of Miami, Florida, to bring information to our body. Mr. Bachelor, we were informed, was the coordinator of travel and accommodations in Miami Beach, Florida.

Reverend S. D. Edwards, of Michigan, then came forward to report for the Board of Christian Education, which report was impressive indeed. (See report.)

Reverend Shaper of New Jersey, then came forward to report for the Board the hour, the Reverend Matthew Neil, of Atlantic City, New Jersey. His text was I

Pet. 2:9, and his subject was "God's Command or Challenge." It was a challenging and provocative message.

Reverend Weaver and Reverend Brent, of Texas, then came forward to make known their preparations for the entertainment and accommodation of our Convention in Houston, Texas, in September of 1971.

Dr. Harrison then called for Dr. W. W. Taylor, of Chicago, as Chairman of the Budget Committee to make that Committee's Report. He in turn presented the Reverend John Burrell, of Akron, Ohio, to read the report. He read the proposed Budget and the recommendations accompanying this report. A motion was made that the report would be referred to the Board of Directors, by Shepherd, of Pennsylvania. Motion seconded. Motion carried.

Miss Violet Arkum, First Vice President of the Women's Auxiliary was the Presiding Officer for the afternoon. The topic for the afternoon was "Our Convention and Christ's Promise," and was delivered by Dr. Uvee Arbouin, of New York. It was well received.

Mrs. A. Ross Brent, of the Women's Auxiliary, then made brief remarks and then presented Mrs. Chita Williams, Director of the Youth, who spoke on "Youth and Christ's Message."

Mr. John Hunter, President of the Layman's Department, then appealed to the Pastors to send forth Laymen that their work might be done.

Mrs. Serrano of the Usher's Department then pledged her services and the services of the Usher's Convention to the Convention and its progress.

President Harrison then presented the Rev. J. B. Williams of the Home Mission Board. He gave a far-ranging report that was informative. A motion was made that report would become a working paper. Motion seconded and motion carried.

Dr. S. S. Hodges then reported that as of this time \$6,974.44 had been reported, 96 churches had registered, 10 missionary societies were enrolled, 4 state conventions, 3 district associations, and 86 personal representation reported.

Dr. L. V. Booth called the evening session to order, and the opening prayer was given by Dr. Homer Nutter, of Lexington, Ky. Following the prayer the Youth Ensemble of the Metropolitan Baptist Church brought a period of music.

Reverend W. B. Costner, of Falls Church, Virginia, then came for the evening topic. He was accompanied by Rev. J. I. Smith of Harrodsburg, Ky., alternate. Dr. Costner's subject was excellent and well received.

President Harrison came forward and read a telegram from the Birmingham Baptist College. The amount of \$57.00 was raised and the President requested permission to supplement it to the amount of \$100.00. At the President's request, Dr. D. E. King moved that the Convention give the Entertaining Committee a vote of thanks. It was seconded and carried.

Vice President Booth presented Mrs. Vance and her choir from First Baptist Church of Bownville, Tennessee and the choir of the Monumental Baptist Church of Memphis, Tennessee, Reverend Kyles pastor.

Dr. Nutter, pastor of First Baptist Church Lexington, Kentucky, presented Reverend George H. Childs, of Kentucky, who brought the closing sermon. After the selections from the choir, Dr. Booth asked Mrs. Vance to lead the audience in singing "Amazing Grace."

The Rev. Childs selected his text and "God Speaking to this Age" as his subject. After the sermon which was very eloquently delivered and filled with inspiration, the Convention sang "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross"

We have examined the records of cash receipts and disbursements of the PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION for the period January through June, 1970, and present herewith statements of receipts and disbursements for the General Fund and the Literature Fund resulting from the examination. A balance sheet, as of June 30, 1970, has also been prepared and is a part of this report.

Bank balances in the General and Literature Funds have been adjusted to allow for outstanding checks and deposits in transit as of the cut off date. Petty Cash allows for a General Fund check in transit. Savings Certificate at Drexel National Bank was examined. However, Reserve Fund certificates at Home Federal Savings and Loan were not available. January and June book figures would indicate some activity in this fund in that an increase of \$228.54 for that period is less than ordinary interest on \$40,000.00.

General Fund receipts have been adjusted for unacceptable checks and for unrecorded deposits, as well as for items run through the Literature Fund. Properly classifiable office expenses have been included in the executive secretary classification and unidentified bank debit memos shown as such. (Debit memos are more than offset by unrecorded deposits and could have been redeposited.)

Literature Fund receipts have been adjusted for unacceptable checks and erroneous deposits of general fund receipts, as well as borrowed monies. Those expenditures for the general fund which offset the deposit were transferred to general fund and the \$4.55 still due for transfer shown as such.

Since the Furniture Fund evolved from Literature Fund, and was used in full, that account has not been shown. The resulting investments in Furniture and phone deposit, being assets, are picked up on the balance sheet.

The Reserve Fund, being a major item of the Convention's assets, was not available for examination. We cannot, therefore, render an accountant's opinion as to the fairness of the representations in these statements. There was nothing that came to our attention to indicate that these funds were being handled in other than an ordinary manner, but in the absence of verification of such an item we must, and have, stamp our statements as "incomplete."

Department of Christian Education

Mr. President, vice presidencies, all other officers and fellow-constituents of this convention I am here before you to give an account of my stewardship of the Department of Christian Education. I do not have a complete report of the work promoted by the Dept. of Christian Education since I last made my report, but I have the complete and accurate report in my office. Why I don't have a complete report is due to the lack of secretarial help. Since we met here in the city of Memphis, 1970, we have issued over 3,900 "b" credits, over 75 1st Certificates, over 52 2nd Certificates, over 45 3rd Certificates, over 30 Advance Certificates and Over 50 First Diplomas. We have certified eleven states for state Congress, over 14 district congresses, and over 35 local churches for institutes. We have certified more churches for institutes in Michigan who belong to the National Baptist Convention, Inc. than we have Progressive National Baptist churches during the last year.

THE PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

—TO—

THE PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION

January 20, 1971

Memphis, Tennessee

To the Vice Presidents, Presidents of the Departments, of the Convention, Delegates and Friends:

OUR CONVENTION

In intent and pursuit is an extension of the Christian Church.

The title of our convention is contained in the preamble of our constitution, which was penned by Dr. T. S. Boone of Detroit, Michigan. I quote:

"The people called Baptists have always believed in the principles, tenets and doctrines as proclaimed and advocated in the New Testament, with reference to the rule of the people, by the people, and for the people; and the vestment of the authority and power to act in the majority and not in an individually designated board, or official cabinet. Therefore, we the members of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, do now federate ourselves together in the name of, and under the direction and guidance of the triune God for the purpose of giving range, deeper significance, loftier heights and a glowing realization of the practices of Christian Brotherhood."

This is a gem in thought; a beauty in phraseology and super-excellence in ideal. It also implies the story of why we exist, and for what purpose. We must keep faith with this title.

In the language of Associate Justice Harlan, of the Supreme Court, dissenting the majority opinion in the matter of 18 year-old voting, quote:

"Every constitution embodies the principles of its framers it is a transcript of their minds."

On the other hand, the genius of our convention is in Article 11, the statement of purpose which clearly proclaims its character and goals in six native attributes, namely:

"To encourage, promote and support Evangelism, Missions, Christian Education, Christian Stewardship, Human Freedom and (charity) Benevolence". These goals are the native characteristics of the New Testament Church, to which our convention must ever be loyal.

However, our loyalty to the title and genius of our convention does not preclude the task of changing our constitution in changing circumstances and conditions. There is much in the world about that is controversial and which we might spend our energies attacking. However, I propose that we spend the two days we are here attacking the controversies within our own togetherness.

Our convention is an expression of "Togetherness" by many Baptist Churches, which with a sense of loyalty to Christ, and fully conscious of the "Great Commission" and their obligation to the world; and searching for ways and means to fulfill that obligation, they have discovered that in "Togetherness" we can do what we cannot do apart.

Therefore, our convention lives and moves and has its being in the churches, which themselves live in Christ, the founder and still the great head of the church. The very existence of the Christian Church, as well as its purpose in the world is contingent upon Christ's Teachings; his promised security and his ever presence.

"Upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

"Go ye therefore, into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. lo, I am with thee always, even to the end of the world, Amen."

The only legitimate justification for the existence of the Progressive National Baptist Convention is that in our "Togetherness" we can extend the arm and influence of the Christian Church and deliver the gospel message to the world in a better fashion and with more haste and more effectively fulfill Christ's command.

"Brotherhood" is the ultimate consequences of the gospel. St. Paul refers to Christ as:

"The first born among many brethren," (Rom. 8:29) and of us as "Heirs of God and joint heirs of Jesus Christ." Rom. 8:17-

"The spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit that we are children of God: And if children, then heirs: Heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ."

This is why I have requested that we emphasize foreign missions in this extended session, plus the fact that this is the tenth year we have been engaged in this world venture with Christ; But as I have already inferred there are other important matters to claim our attention while here.

If our "Togetherness" is to accomplish our goals and our brotherhood is to stand the tests, we must frequently re-examine our organizational structure and adjust our procedure machinery to meet the needs of changing circumstances. Friction can disrupt and mar the quality and quantity of our output and defeat our goals.

The policy and freedom of Baptists across the centuries suggest that we make haste slowly, but that we make haste. Now that ten years of our "Togetherness in Brotherhood" is upon us, we should show signs of maturity and progress.

I have not come to the presidency of our convention with any Membership complex. I do not have all the answers to our problems; I do not accept the philosophy of an indispensable man among us. I am opposed to any shade or shadow of one man rule, or dictatorship. I believe firmly in tenure for the president, and that two years is long enough. I started a campaign nearly fifty years ago among Texas Baptists for tenure, but I believe we can push tenure too far for the good of the cause. The office of president of any group is the seat of power, and if the wrong man gets his hands on Power for too long a time you just may have to cut his fingers off to release him from his throne.

Our Constitution — Is a good document, but needs some structural changes and additions. I am therefore making some suggestions to which I hope you will listen carefully and weigh without prejudice.

1. That wherever the term "Auxiliary or Auxiliaries" appear in the constitution it be changed to "Department or Departments."

2. That the word "Adopted" in line 1 section 3. (2) article III shall read "Approved," and that section "5" shall be deleted.

3. That section (12) article III, line 4 beginning with "As listed below" shall be revised to read, — "May register in the annual session with two delegates up to and including 200 members, and one additional delegate for each additional 100 members, or fraction thereof above 50 reported in the letter form to the convention; by the payment of \$5.00 each at the time the church is registered." The delegates to include those of all departments of the convention.

I hope this does not excite your fear nor upset your nerves. My reasons are:

(1) We need people, especially lay-people, to participate in our convention.

(2) We need quantity as well as quality. We will never build a strong, moving, challenging, effective convention, capable of fulfilling our established goals, so long as we resent and prevent full and equal participation of our laymen, and that without regard to sex. In Christ we are "neither male or female."

(3) We have certain safe-guards written into our constitution, if guarded with zeal and resistance, which can prevent a stampede in a two-year presidential tenure.

4. That Section (a) Article IV shall be amended to read:

"The president, vice presidents, regional presidents, and presidents of the departments shall be elected annually; but shall not succeed themselves in office more than one time consecutively.

5. That Section (b) Article IV shall be amended beginning in line 2 with the words— "Elected by the convention." And continue "The executive secretary must not have passed his 46th birthday at the beginning of his first year in the position, and shall be eligible for retirement at the age of 65, except by a unanimous vote of the board of directors and a two-thirds vote of the convention, voting at the time of the decision. The Convention shall provide Retirement Insurance for the Executive Secretary who meets the age requirements, only, during his time in the Convention's employment. (This would not apply to the present secretary).

6. That section (c) shall be added to article IV: "(c) That officers of the convention shall be elected and installed not later than the third day during the annual session.

7. That the number "(11) eleven" Section 1, line 2 of Article V shall be changed to read: "sixteen (16) members, nine of whom shall be named by state conventions and/or state delegates, two by the women's department; two by the congress of Christian

Education and one each, by the departments of laymen and ushers . . . the sixteenth" member and chairman shall be named by the president of the convention."

8. That section "5b" line "1" article VI, shall be amended by inserting: "The treasurer, and executive secretary shall be bonded."

9. That the term "Messenger" in article VI section 3, line 3, shall be changed to "Churches."

10. That (f) in Section 10, Article VI be revised to read: "He shall be ex-officio member of all boards, commissions and permanent committees." Without Franchise," and shall direct the office of the convention with thrift and honesty."

11. Article VII was tested and its value vindicated last September in Kansas City during the contest for 1st Vice President. However, I suggest that the term "votes" in line 3, section 4, be changed to "ballots", and that section 8 shall be amended to read: "Membership in the departments of the convention shall grant full franchise in the affairs of the convention proper."

12. That sections 2 and 6, Article IX, shall be deleted.

13. Our best accomplishments have been in the areas of foreign missions and brotherly fellowship. The mutual agreement between our convention and the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, has worked well, but there are still controversial edges over ownership of the assets of the Bureau, that need trimming.

The experiences of Negro Baptists in the area of property rights may justify the contentions afloat. A burnt child is fearful about fire.

I am convinced that there is no reason for suspicion or dishonesty, yet, we will not have the same team forever. Wisdom dictates, "Thou shalt not tempt thy brother in the hour of his weakness."

I have discussed this matter with certain leaders in Philadelphia, including Dr. C. C. Adams, the founder of the Bureau. Some who now support the Bureau might withdraw their support if the property is transferred to the convention, and others may refuse to support it wholeheartedly if it is not transferred to the convention. Either way we take a chance.

My suggestion is that we insert into section (2), Article X, line 6, between the words "transaction" and "with", the phrase:

"Including an inventory of the assets and liabilities of the Bureau" . . . with a certified accountant's audit," etc.

I would also add to the last line of section (2) Article X after "convention," this sentence:

"It is also mutually agreed that after five years of experiment in this mutual relationship, the bureau will consider transferring all properties, real and otherwise, purchased with money received for foreign missions to the Progressive National Convention, U. S. A., Inc., or to a joint ownership between the two corporations; provided that in either case legal safe-guards can be invoked to secure the property from sale, misuse or misappropriation, and if sale is compelled, the price received shall be used only for the promotion of foreign missions."

14. That if one or the other or a better formula can be agreed upon during this session, I suggest that the convention attorney and a joint committee of two from each corporation shall be named and authorized to transfer the properties to the legal status by our meeting in Houston, Texas, next September.

15. I further suggest that we add section (5) to Article II, The Home Mission Board.

(5) "The salaries of all employees of all boards or commissions; all honorariums, or donations for services rendered to the convention and/or its departments, shall be approved by the Board of Directors, or its appointed committee before it is allowed," and that the term "programs" section (3), line 3 shall be changed to "Retreats and Campaigns."

If this is accepted a committee should be named to work out a statement of fulfillment.

I do not agree that certain officers with confining responsibilities in executing the programs of our convention should not be given an honorarium, however small.

16. I am proud of our Washington, D. C. Headquarters, both the office of the Executive Secretary and his living quarters border on the luxurious.

I would not take from Dr. and Mrs. Hodges the comfort they deserve; but when

I consider the facts involved, I am reminded of a welfare client driving his own Cadillac automobile.

Dr. Hodges deserves the reward our convention offers. He is an able preacher and a representative figure of our convention; conscientious, hard worker, courageous, and will go his limit to promote the Progressive Convention. I dare charge that we are not spending \$6,000.00 a year for office and apartment rent wisely. This money should be invested in property that is to be our future location, or home for our secretary.

I am opposed to spending large sums of money on a building, fifty or sixty years old, that will take a fortune to get an occupational permit and then cannot be rented. Experience in purchasing property suggests the finding of a desirable location, with small residential or business units in a community where rental property is in demand, and on which small expenditures in repairs will keep it rentable for five to ten years, while it pays for itself. This can be done in D. C., and our secretary can be comfortably situated both in living quarters and office. If not this course, then let us spend the \$6,000.00 on a home for our secretary. Let our receipts be for equity and not for luxury.

We have voted three times on a location for headquarters. Each time it has been Washington, D. C. all of us cannot have our way. Let us now be men and do business. Progressive Convention needs an anchor to hold us afloat in the storms ahead. We must have it, so we can float in rough seas or we will not be able to sail in quiet waters.

I have spotted a desirable location in Washington of the above type. We are in a position to purchase it now. Arise and let us buy a home for our convention. Ten years is long enough for us to flounder. We must anchor and float or perish. D. C. is the best place for our headquarters. This is not personal; we need economic roots if we are to grow a tree that will bear fruit. I suggest that you give authority to buy property in D. C.

17. I am fascinated with holding our conventions in hotels and under one roof. The advantages are numerous. It is much safer for us all, and especially for our women. Standing on the streets waiting for a taxi or a bus is hazardous, but we are spending more money for housing and transportation than we should.

I suggest that we select a coordinator, or transportation agent, to work with our host committees and transportation chairmen. One who knows the "ins" and "outs" of the business. It will cost the convention nothing, nor will it take anything from the entertaining hosts, but assist in getting cheaper rates and better accommodations. Let us try it by naming someone for this responsibility.

18. **Some Irregularities**—After a decade we are still indulging in irregularities.

- (1) Coasting with the clutch in neutral. It is easy gliding but unsafe. We may find ourselves in a ditch on the roadside.
- (2) We do not yet have a constitutionally organized Board of Directors.
- (3) Our money is not being handled according to rule.
- (4) Salaries and donations are being paid without approval of the Board of Directors, or the Convention.
- (5) We voted for a unified treasury without inaugurating a system of procedure.
- (6) Our departments are ready to cooperate, but we have not told them how. Some of them are becoming confused and discouraged.

We may not have a Chambers, or a Taylor, or a Searcy; an Arbouin, a Bruce, or a Brent; a Booth, a Banks, or a Johnson, every time.

"A stitch in time, saves nine."

19. I request that you permit the president, executive secretary, treasurer, auditor and attorney to work out a system of handling our moneys, and that you permit the current expense money to be deposited in a Washington Bank. This will save time, face and money, as well as the reputation of the convention. The practice of the Executive Secretary receiving the money in Washington, transferring it to Chicago, sending back to Chicago to get it; using his personal checks to pay bills, then depositing convention money to his personal account, is awkward, time consuming, unwise, and has in it a threat.

Then, the Executive Secretary, in my judgement should not have control of the intake of the moneys from the departments. The treasurer in his presence, if possible, should receive and receipt the departments for their money. Each department should

keep its own records. It should know what it is accomplishing, and what it gives, and to whom.

"We must not kill the goose that lays the golden egg." Our departments must still have some freedom of action. They must still be privileged to gather designated funds, although deposited in the common treasury.

They should also have the privilege of knowing and assuming some responsibility for disbursements. I recommend such arrangements.

20. I have appointed the following committees for your approval:

"THINGS WE OUGHT TO DO NOW"

An Address
by

Downtown Motor Inn, Memphis, Tennessee
January 21, 1971

President Harrison, Vice President Booth and Smith, Regional Presidents, other Officers and messengers: It affords me a great pleasure to have the opportunity to come before this Adjourned Session of the Ninth Annual Session of the Progressive National Baptist Convention to give a statement from the point of view of the business side of the Convention. It has been one year since we met in this city, at Greater White Stone Baptist Church, when you gave me orders to become a full time Executive Secretary and to move the Convention Headquarters from Cleveland, Ohio to Washington, D. C. As you know, the move has been consummated and your Convention Headquarters is now located in Eton Towers, Suite 204, 1239 Vermont Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C.

In the past year, many lessons have been learned and your Executive Secretary has made such observations and recommendations to you, which he thought would be helpful for the Convention. As we enjoy the conveniences and comforts of this Downtown Motor Inn, we are grateful to the Memphis Progressive Baptist Fellowship, led by Rev. W. C. Holmes and Rev. Samuel B. Kyles, Arrangements Chairman, for arranging for this session to be held here. This is in keeping with one of the recommendations made in Kansas City for the progress of our Convention.

Annual Meeting Places

The first thing that I should like to call to your attention is the selection of meeting places for the annual meeting of both the Convention and the Congress of Christian Education. The Executive Board of the Convention should select the cities where the meetings are to be held and recommend the same to the Convention for approval.

The annual meeting places of the Convention and Congress should be selected for five years in advance. This year, 1971, the Congress has voted to meet in Los Angeles, California and the Convention has voted to meet in Houston, Texas. In 1972, the Convention will meet in Chicago, Illinois and in 1973, it will meet in Jackson, Mississippi. We should select places for the Congress to meet in the years 1972, 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1976. Likewise, we should select places for the Convention to meet in the years 1974, 1975 and 1976. A Committee on Place, representing the five regions with the Executive Secretary ex officio member, should be appointed now to study this matter and bring a report to the Executive Board Meeting in June and the Executive Board report to the Convention in September.

The Convention should make it clear and plain to all local committees that court-rooms and suites in hotels, where we meet, must be under the control of the Convention to make assignments to its officers and guests. Local committees should not expect to occupy free rooms and assign them to their friends, while the officers of the Convention are paying for their rooms and sometimes must accept less desirable accommodations.

We need and we want the cooperation and assistance of local committees, but we would like to remind one and all that the Convention receives letters and long distance telephone calls at the Headquarters from hotels across the nation inviting us to meet with them. All of the details can be arranged through the Headquarters.

Areas of Varied Interpretations

I. The Unified Budget

The first to claim our attention under this category is the Unified Budget. There are different opinions about the Unified Budget. Let me hasten to say that the Executive

Secretary has no intention to criticize or "knock" any officer of the Convention, Region or Auxiliary. All of our officers are men and women of intelligence and high integrity. They are all striving to do a good job as they see their duties. But the point is, all of us do not see the same thing in the same way. Our fiscal policies should be firmly established and clearly defined so that everyone will know what to expect in any given situation. Changes in the office of President or Treasurer should not change our fiscal policies.

On recommendation of the Budget Committee, the Convention adopted a Unified Budget and went further to adopt the recommendation that all auxiliary treasuries be closed and the funds turned over to the Convention Treasurer. The Women's Auxiliary, the Laymen, the Ushers and the Congress turned in their funds to the Executive Secretary and he to the Convention Treasurer.

2. The Regions

All of the Regions turn in receipts from churches in their annual sessions, but one of the Regions has a Scholarship Fund and a Current Expense Fund which it holds to disburse from as it sees fit. As we see it, the Regions are not autonomous bodies. They exist to help carry out the program of the Convention. We must restate the relationship of the Regions and Auxiliaries to the Convention. We must answer the question now, Shall the Regions and Auxiliaries have treasuries and hold funds? If this is the will of the Convention, let us say so. If it is not the will of the Convention then let us say that also.

3. The Congress

How shall we finance the Congress of Christian Education? Shall we leave it alone to run itself, as was done under the old system, or shall we consider it a child of the Convention to be supported by the Convention with the Congress conforming to the directives of the Convention? Let us decide now who is to receive the registration fees at the Congress — the Executive Secretary or the Director General. Either way is workable, but we need to decide which one we want.

4. Reimbursing Officers

The question of who shall be paid for service rendered and reimbursed for travel and lodging expenses and how much has not been clearly defined. The Executive Secretary has found himself in a dilemma on this question many times. Every auxiliary and every Board should prepare its own budget, including allocations for its Officers' expenses, and submit the same to the Budget Committee of the Convention. If the expense items are approved by the Budget Committee and adopted by the Convention, then the Executive Secretary will have guide lines to go by.

We must set up a system whereby the Regional Officers can be reimbursed for expenses at the Regional meeting, rather than have the Executive Secretary send a voucher to the Treasurer and the Treasurer send a check to the Regional Officer.

5. Badges and Letter Blanks

At Kansas City, in our 9th Annual Session, there was general approval of our unified badge. However, this year we propose to leave off the inserts which distinguished the Convention messengers from the various auxiliary messengers. This is in keeping with the Convention's decision to allow all messengers to vote in the Convention's election of officers.

We in the Executive Secretary's office found the different letter blanks advantageous in compiling reports on the Convention and its auxiliaries. However, we will design and use one letter blank for all registrations if you direct us to do so.

PNBC Witnessing for Christ

1971 marks the Tenth Anniversary of the Baptist Foreign Mission Bureau and the Tenth Anniversary of the Progressive National Baptist Convention. The Bureau was organized two months before the Convention was organized. Dr. C. C. Adams, then the Executive Secretary of BFMB was present at the organizational meeting of PNBC. I remember distinctly that Dr. T. M. Chambers, President of the fledgling convention, stated that we needed the Bureau and they needed us. He urged the Convention to adopt the Bureau as our Foreign Mission Board, which the Convention did. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Bureau and proud of the fact that this Convention has done more for BFMB than any Black Baptist Convention has done for

any other Foreign Mission Board. We urge our churches and our Budget Committee to take cognizance of the Tenth Anniversary Celebration and respond accordingly.

We call upon our reactivated Home Mission Board and Board of Christian Education to begin witnessing for Christ on the home front with your respective programs as soon as possible.

There are two Commissions which we are urgently in need of now. One is the Stewardship Commission and the other is the Commission on U. S. Army and Navy Chaplaincy. If we are going to finance our Convention the Bible way and do great things for God, we must teach our people to be good stewards. The General Commission on Chaplains and Armed Forces Personnel has allowed our Convention a representation of three members. We need a commission set up in our Convention.

PNBC Working with Other Bodies

1. American Baptist Conventions

According to your vote, we are cooperating with the American Baptist Convention in a Joint Fact Finding Committee looking toward a Financial Campaign among ABC and PNBC churches. The idea for the campaign grew out of an ad hoc committee of ABC and PNBC leaders seeking areas where the two conventions could work cooperatively together. Originally, the campaign was to benefit Black Colleges, ABC and/or PNBC related; national socio-economic civil rights organizations, such as S. C. L. C., O. I. C. and I. F. C. O.; PNBC Headquarters and special projects of PNBC Churches.

Black churches in ABC not in PNBC and the Hispanic caucus in ABC protested that they were left out. The scope of the proposed campaign was widened to include all-minority groups, including American Indians. This has necessitated surveying all churches in ABC and PNBC. The earliest possible date for the campaign is 1973. The situation is further complicated because ABC is committed to participate in Key 73, a national evangelistic crusade to be conducted in 1973. All the needs are expected to be in by May of 1971 when the ABC meets in Minneapolis and a final vote will be taken in 1972. PNBC will also have the right to vote for or against the campaign. We urge you to vote for the campaign and contribute to the campaign when it begins.

2. Baptist World Alliance and North American Baptist Fellowship

Your Executive Secretary is a member of the BWA Executive Committee, and because our Headquarters is in Washington, he serves on the Budget, Finance and Personnel Committee. He is constantly in the BWA Headquarters meeting with various committees.

In Tokyo, Japan the Alliance voted that the member conventions and unions would conduct united evangelistic campaigns under the title "Reconciliation Through Christ." There has been one committee meeting in regards to the proposed "Reconciliation Through Christ" campaigns. Our Convention and all the others in BWA are called upon to begin making plans for such campaigns to be held in 1973 or later, but before 1975 when the next Congress of BWA will meet.

The North American Baptist Fellowship, remembering the Baptist Jubilee and the Crusade of the Americas, has recommended that there be simultaneous meeting of the General Boards of NABF Member Bodies. The year 1976 has been suggested and the place, Philadelphia, Pa., during the bicentennial celebration of the American Republic, since Baptists have contributed greatly to the ideals of liberty and democracy as expressed in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. Does PNBC wish to participate? If so, to what extent? The Executive Secretaries of the Member Bodies will meet in March for a discussion.

Our Greatest Need

The greatest need of PNBC is for more churches to join the Voluntary Monthly Support Plan. In fact, every church should be a monthly contributor or give substantial sums periodically during the year. The monthly plan is the most convenient for most churches. PNBC churches must get away from the habit of "representing" once a year and forgetting the Convention the remainder of the year. The Convention needs you all the year round and it is striving to serve you all the year round. Join the real Progressives and send a check every month.

Delinquent Accounts

The Publishing Board has several delinquent accounts, which they feel they cannot collect and propose to turn them over to the Executive Secretary to collect. This is a shame. The Scriptures admonish believers to "owe no man." The churches which owe for Sunday School literature should remember that the Convention has paid for the literature which they have used. It is unfair to expect sister churches to pay your bills.

The Executive Secretary pleads for direction from the Executive Board or the Convention on what to do about delinquent accounts.

It is time to wake up, pray up, pay up, and stay up. Then you will be truly Progressive.
