# SOCIETY ACT

- 1. The name of the Society is the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION.
- 2. The purposes of the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION are:
  - (a) to provide an entity for cooperating churches to work together to carry out Christ's mission of preaching, teaching, healing and ministering to all persons throughout the world;
  - (b) to receive bequests, trusts, funds and property, and to hold, invest, administer and distribute funds and property for the purposes of the Society as presently set out and for such other organizations as are "qualified donees" under the provisions of the Income Tax Act and for such other purposes and activities which are authorized for registered charities under the provisions of the Income Tax Act; and
  - (c) to do all such other things as are incidental and ancillary to the attainment of the purposes and the exercise of the powers of the Society.
- 3. The Statement of Faith of the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION is:

#### THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

- I. THE SCRIPTURES
  - The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true centre of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.
- II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

- A. GOD THE FATHER
  - God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

#### B. GOD THE SON

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ he was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jesus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself the demands and necessities of human nature and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His death on the cross He made provision for the redemption of men from sin. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

#### C. GOD THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts of sin, of righteousness and of judgement. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the assurance of God to bring the believer into the fullness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

### III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence; whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin, and as soon as they are capable of moral action become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

#### IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, sanctification, and glorification.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace. Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and favour with God

- B. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.
- C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

#### V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

#### VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the Earth.

This church is an autonomous body, operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

#### VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

#### VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observances. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, work of necessity and mercy only being expected.

#### IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labour that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

#### X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrection and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

#### XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSION

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavour to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

#### XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

#### XIII.STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians

should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

#### XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

#### XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in his own life and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus. The Christian should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice. He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

#### XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

#### XVII.RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to

impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

- 4. The Society shall have perpetual succession and has power to acquire by purchase, gift, devise, bequest, trust agreement, contract or otherwise, real and personal property within and without the province, and may hold, sell, dispose of, exchange, mortgage, lease, let, improve and develop any such property, and without restricting the generality of the foregoing, may acquire in any way or ways real and personal property for the purpose of funding the purposes of the Society and deal with any and all such property as empowered by this Section.
- 5. The activities of the Society shall be carried on without purpose of gain for its members and any income, profits or other accretions to the Society shall be used in promoting the purposes of the Society.
- 6. Upon winding-up or dissolution of the Society, the assets remaining after the payment of all costs, charges and expenses properly incurred in the winding-up, including the remuneration of a liquidator, and after payment to employees of the Society of any arrears of salaries, or wages, and after the payment of any debts of the Society, shall be distributed among and to such registered Canadian charities as are affiliated with or involved with the ministry of the Southern Baptists as shall be designated by the directors. If that shall not be possible the assets shall be distributed to such charities, registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act, as shall be designated by the directors. Any of such assets remaining which had originally been provided for specific purposes, shall, wherever possible, be distributed to charities registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act carrying on work with similar nature to such specific purposes.
- 7. Paragraphs 3 and 7 are alterable.
- 8. Paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 8 are unalterable.

# CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION BYLAWS

## PART I - INTERPRETATION

- 1. In these bylaws and the Constitution of the Society, unless the context otherwise requires:
  - (a) "agency" means an organization, whether or not incorporated, set up or a relationship entered into with an organization or person which

- requires accountability to the Convention and the purpose of which is to facilitate the carrying out of specific activities and programs of the Convention:
- (b) "board" means the directors acting as authorized by the constitution and bylaws of the Society in managing or supervising the management of the affairs of the Society and exercising the powers of the Society;
- (c) "bylaws" means the bylaws of the Society as filed in the Office of the Registrar of Companies in Victoria;
- (d) "Convention" means the meeting of messengers held in accordance with these bylaws;
- (e) "Cooperating Baptist Church" means a church determined at that particular point in time by the Convention in accordance with Part III of the bylaws to be a Cooperating Baptist Church;
- (f) "directors" means the directors of the Society for the time being elected or appointed in accordance with Part VII of these bylaws;
- (g) "Executive Board" means the Executive Board of the Convention as elected in accordance with the provisions of Part IV of these bylaws;
- (h) "institution" means an organization with its own constitution and bylaws set up by and accountable to the Convention and the purpose of which is to facilitate the carrying out of the specific activities and programs of the Convention;
- (i) "members" means the Applicants for incorporation and those persons who subsequently have become members in accordance with these bylaws, and, in either case, have not ceased to be members;
- (j) "messengers" means the persons accepted by the Convention as messengers in accordance with these bylaws;
- (k) "registered address" of a member means his address as recorded in the register of members;
- (l) "Society" means the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION;
- (m) "Society Act" means the Society Act of the Province of British Columbia from time to time in force and all amendments to it;
- (n) "Statement of Faith" means the Doctrinal Statement of the Society as set out in the Constitution.
- 2. Except where they conflict with the definition contained in these bylaws, the definitions in the Society Act on the date these bylaws become effective apply to these bylaws.

## PART II - MEMBERSHIP

- 3. Membership in the Society shall be restricted to the applicants for incorporation and those persons who are then elected as messengers to the Convention by Cooperating Baptist Churches. Between meetings of the Convention membership in the Society shall be restricted to those persons who are elected to the Executive Board of the Convention and the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention. All such persons shall be admitted as members of the Society immediately upon their application for membership being received by the Society. All such persons shall be member only by virtue of his or her office as a current messenger or as a current member of the Executive Board of the Convention or as the current Executive Director-Treasurer and shall remain members only so long as he or she holds such office.
- 4. There shall be no annual membership dues.

- 5. Any member may withdraw from the Society by delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or by mailing or delivering it to the address of the Society.
- 6. A person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Society:
  - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or upon delivering it to the address of the Society; or
  - (b) upon his death.
- 7. There is no manner in which a member may be expelled.
- 8. The membership of a person in the Society is not transferable.
- 9. All members shall be in good standing as long as such member is a member in good standing of a Cooperating Baptist Church.

# PART III - CONVENTION

- 10. The Society shall hold a Convention at least annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Society.
- 11. The Convention shall consist of messengers who are members of Cooperating Baptist Churches who are elected and certified by Cooperating Baptist Churches.
- 12. Each Cooperating Baptist Church with up to 50 resident members shall be entitled to a minimum of four messengers with the right to send one additional messenger for each additional fifty resident members or major portion thereof to a maximum of twelve messengers.
- 13. Messengers from new Cooperating Baptist Churches may be seated at an annual Convention session by a two-thirds vote.
- 14. As an autonomous Baptist entity the Convention reserves the right to determine what constitutes a Cooperating Baptist Church. Cooperating Baptist Churches will be those churches which are in sympathy with the purposes of the Society, and are cooperating with and contributing financially to its work and have not adopted a statement of faith in conflict with the Statement of Faith of the Society.
- 15. The Convention shall be the final judge of its messengers' qualifications and whether a church is a Cooperating Baptist Church. Cooperating is voluntary and any church may withdraw at its discretion.
- 16. Should a church cease to cooperate with the Convention or become corrupt in doctrine or practice, as determined by the Convention, it shall no longer be a Cooperating Baptist Church and its messengers shall be refused seating. Such church will be considered no longer in fellowship with the Convention until it reapplies and is accepted again by the Convention as a Cooperating Baptist Church.
- 17. The Convention shall respect the autonomy of each Baptist body and shall not exercise ecclesiastical authority or control over any Cooperating Baptist Church.

- 18. Except as otherwise provided in the Constitution and Bylaws, <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u>, <u>Newly Revised</u> shall be the parliamentary guide in conducting the business of the Convention.
- 19. Visitors to the Convention may be granted the privilege of speaking, but not voting. Only duly elected messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches may vote at a Convention.
- 20. Messengers must register with the Credentials Committee and provide certification from their Churches that they are duly elected messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches before voting in the Convention Business Sessions.
- 21. In addition to messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches, an invitation shall be extended to Churches from outside Canada which are sponsoring missions in Canada, to elect two messengers from each of their missions in Canada. Upon registering and being accepted by the Credentials Committee such messengers shall have full voting rights in the Convention business sessions.
- 22. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.
- 23. The Convention shall express its official position only by vote of the messengers and the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society. The receiving, acceptance or adoption of a report shall not, in the absence of specific implementing motions be construed as authorizing action by the Convention's or the Society's Committee's, employees, boards, agencies or institutions.
- 24. Special meetings of the Convention may be called or a change of time and place for the annual meeting of the Convention may be made by the President or Executive Director-Treasurer, with the consent of the Executive Board, provided at least 30 days' written notice is given to all messengers attending the last Convention and to Cooperating Baptist Churches listed in the most recent annual. A printed agenda shall accompany such notice.

# PART IV - CONVENTION MANAGEMENT

- 25. The officers of the Convention shall be the President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President and Executive Director-Treasurer.
- 26. The President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the annual Convention after nominations from the floor for a term of office of one year and shall be full voting members of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 27. No person is eligible for election to the office of President for more than two consecutive one year terms. After a person has been elected to serve two full one year terms as President he shall not be eligible to be elected President again.
- 28. The messengers shall also elect a minimum of twelve persons who shall as nearly as possible be persons equally distributed from the Cooperating Baptist Churches with not more than three persons elected belonging to Cooperating Baptist Churches in the same association as full voting members of the Executive Board of the Convention.

- 29. A person shall have been a member of the Cooperating Baptist Church for at least one year prior to election to be eligible to be elected as a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 30. No person (or their spouse) employed by the Executive Board, agencies or institutions of the Convention or Society shall be eligible for election to the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 31. The Executive Board shall consist of both ministers and lay persons of not more than two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board shall be drawn from either category.
- 32. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice annually.
- 33. Elected members of the Executive Board of the Convention may be nominated and elected to four consecutive one year terms. No person having served on the Executive Board for four consecutive one year terms shall be eligible for reelection to the Executive Board until one year has passed. One-fourth of the Executive Board positions shall be rotated annually.
- 34. In elections where there are more candidates than there are vacant positions, an election shall be by secret ballot with the name of each duly nominated candidate appearing individually on the ballot. Candidates shall be deemed to be elected when they receive a majority of votes cast.
- 35. Each messenger shall not vote for more officers or members of the Executive Board than there are vacant positions. If more names are selected on any one ballot than there are such vacant positions, that ballot shall be deemed to be void.
- 36. Each member of the Executive Board shall retire from office at the close of the Convention in the year in which his or her term expires.
- 37. The President or in his absence or at his request, the First Vice-President, or in his absence or at his request, the Second Vice-President, shall preside as the chairman of the meetings of the Convention.

# PART V - MEETING OF MEMBERS

- 38. The general meetings of the Society shall be held at such time and place, in accordance with Society Act, as the board shall decide.
- 39. Every general meeting of the Society other than an annual general meeting is an extraordinary general meeting.
- 40. The board may, whenever it thinks fit, convene an extraordinary general meeting of the Society.
- 41. The Society shall give not less than 14 days written notice of a general meeting of the Society to its members entitled to receive notice of a general meeting; but those members may waive or reduce the period of notice for a particular meeting by unanimous consent in writing.
- 42. Notice of a general meeting of the Society shall specify the place, the day and the hour of the meeting.
- 43. The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting of the Society to, or the non-receipt of notice by, any of the members entitled to receive notice does not invalidate proceeding at that meeting.
- 44. The first annual general meeting of the Society shall be held not more than fifteen months after the date of incorporation and thereafter an annual general meeting of the Society shall be held at least once in every calendar year and not more that fifteen months after the holding of the last preceding annual general meeting.

## PART VI - PROCEEDINGS AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- 45. All proceedings at a general meeting of the Society shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, except that, should there be any conflict between any section of these bylaws and Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised these bylaws shall prevail. All business at an extraordinary general meeting shall be "special business" and all business that is transacted at an annual general meeting shall be "special business" except:
  - (a) consideration of the financial statement;
  - (b) the report of the directors, if any;
  - (c) the report of the auditor, if any;
  - (d) the election of directors;
  - (e) the appointment of the auditor, if required;
  - (f) such other business that, under these bylaws or any governing statutes, ought to be transacted at an annual general meeting, or business as brought under consideration by the report of the directors issued with the notice of the meeting.
- 46. No business, other than the election of a chairman and the adjournment or termination of the meeting, shall be conducted at a general meeting of the Society at a time when the quorum is not present.
- 47. If any time during a general meeting of the Society there ceases to be a quorum present, business then in progress shall be suspended until there is a quorum present, or until the meeting is adjourned or terminated.

- 48. A quorum is the greater of one-half of the members then in good standing or three members.
- 49. If within thirty minutes from the time appointed for a general meeting of the Society a quorum is not present, the meeting, if convened on the requisition of members, shall be terminated; but in any other case, it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week, at the same time and place, and if, at the adjourned meeting, a quorum is not present within thirty minutes from the time appointed for the meeting, the members present constitute a quorum.
- 50. The President of the Society or in his absence, the First Vice-President, or in his absence the Second Vice-President, or in the absence of any of the foregoing, one of the other Directors present shall preside as chairman of a general meeting of the Society; but if at any general meeting the President, or the First Vice-President or the Second Vice-President is not present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the general meeting, or requests that he not chair that general meeting, and there is no other director present willing to act as chairman, the members present may choose one of their number to be chairman of that general meeting.
- 51. A general meeting of the Society may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at an adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
- 52. It is not necessary to give notice of a adjournment or of the business to be transacted at an adjourned meeting except where a meeting is adjourned for ten days or more, in which case notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given as in the case of the original meeting.
- 53. All resolutions proposed at a general meeting of the Society must be seconded and the chairman of such a meeting may not move or propose a resolution.
- 54. Any issue at a general meeting of the Society which is not required by these bylaws or the Society Act to be decided by a special resolution shall be decided by an ordinary resolution unless the bylaws dictate otherwise.
- 55. A resolution consented to in writing by every member of the Society who would have been entitled to vote on it in person shall be deemed to be a special resolution passed at a general meeting of the Society.
- 56. A member in good standing present at a meeting of members is entitled to one vote.
- 57. The chairman may vote, but if he does so and the result is a tie, he shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie and the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 58. Voting shall be by a show of hands or a voice vote and the secretary of such meeting shall record the vote, provided always that the majority of the persons present and eligible to vote may determine that a secret vote by a written ballot is required.

59. Voting by proxy is not permitted.

#### PART VII - DIRECTORS

- 60. The board may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Society may exercise and do, and which are not by these bylaws or by statute or otherwise lawfully directed or required to be exercised or done by the members in general meeting, but subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of:
  - (a) all laws affecting the Society;
  - (b) these bylaws; and
  - (c) rules, not being inconsistent with these Bylaws, which are made from time to time by the Convention.
- 61. No rule made by the Convention invalidates a prior act of the board that would have been valid if that rule had not been made.
- 62. The property and the affairs of the Society shall be managed by the board.
- 63. The number of directors shall be fifteen or such other number, not being less than three, as may be determined from time to time by an ordinary resolution.
- 64. Directors shall be those persons elected by the messengers at the Convention to the Executive Board of the Convention and shall hold office commencing at the close of the Convention at which such person was elected to the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 65. Directors may serve for four consecutive one year terms. Notwithstanding Bylaw 68, no person served on the board for four consecutive one year terms shall be eligible for re-election to the board until one year has passed. At least one-fourth of the board shall be rotated annually.
- 66. Notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws, the persons whose names are listed in the List of First Directors filed with the Registrar at the time of incorporation shall be the first directors and the first year of their term shall be deemed to terminate at the close of the first annual general meeting of the Society.
- 67. A person must be a member of a Cooperating Baptist Church in order to be eligible to be a director of the Society.
- 68. Every director shall retire from office at the close of the Convention in the year in which his or her term expires; but if no successor is elected or appointed the person previously elected or appointed as director continues to hold office.
- 69. No act or proceeding of the board is invalid by reason only of there being less than the prescribed number of directors in office.

- 70. The members may, by special resolution, remove an elected director of the Society before the expiration of such director's term of office.
- 71. A person shall immediately cease to be a director of the Society:
  - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or upon delivering it to the address of the Society; or
  - (b) upon ceasing to be a member in good standing or of a Cooperating Baptist Church;
  - (c) upon his death; or
  - (d) upon failing to attend or participate in two consecutive meetings of the board of which he had notice, unless the board passes a resolution, evidenced in writing, specifically waiving this condition with respect to a named member.
- 72. No director shall be remunerated for being or acting as a director, but a director may be reimbursed for all expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by him while engaged in the affairs of the Society.
- 73. The board shall have the power to make expenditures for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Society. The board shall have the power to enter into trust arrangements or contracts on behalf of the Society for the purpose of discharging obligations or conditions either imposed by a person donating, bequesting, advancing or lending money to the Society, or assumed by the Society in expectation of such donations, bequests, advances or loans. Such arrangements or contracts shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions that the board may prescribe.
- 74. The board shall take such steps as it deems necessary to enable the Society to be the beneficiary of such donations, bequests, trusts, contracts, advances or loans for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Society. The board in its sole and absolute discretion may refuse to accept any bequests, trusts, funds or property.
- 75. In investing the funds of the Society, the board shall not be limited to securities and investments in which trustees are authorized by law to invest, but may make any investments which are prudent. Subject to the provisions of the Society Act, the directors as a body shall not be liable for any loss that does not arise from any fault on their behalf, but which may result in connection with any such investments made by them.

#### PART VIII - PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD

- 76. The meetings of the board may be held at any time and place to be determined by the board, provided that 3 days notice of such meeting shall be sent in writing to each director. However, no formal notice shall be necessary if all directors are present at the preceding meeting or waive notice thereof in writing or give a verbal waiver to the Secretary of the Society.
- 77. The board may from time to time fix the quorum necessary to transact business, and unless so fixed, the quorum shall be a simple majority of the directors in office at the time when the meeting convenes.

- 78. The President shall be chairman of all meetings of the board; save that if at any meeting the President is not present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the meeting to commence, or the President requests that he or she not chair that meeting, the directors present may choose one of their number to be chairman of that meeting.
- 79. The President and the Executive Director-Treasurer or any three directors may convene a meeting of the board.
- 80. For the purposes of the first meeting of board held immediately following the appointment or election of a director or directors at an annual or other general meeting of members, or for the purposes of a meeting of the board at which a director is appointed to fill a vacancy in the board of directors, it is not necessary to give notice of the meeting to the newly elected or appointed director or directors for the meeting to be properly constituted.
- 81. All resolutions proposed at a meeting of the board must be seconded and the chairman of a meeting may not move or propose a resolution.
- 82. A simple majority of votes cast at a meeting of the board shall be required to pass a resolution of the board.
- 83. The chairman may vote, but if he does so vote and the result is a tie, he shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie. In those circumstances the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 84. Voting shall be by a show of hands except as otherwise provided. At the request of any one director, a secret vote by written ballot shall be required.
- 85. A resolution in writing, signed by all the directors and deposited with the Secretary, is as valid and effective as a resolution of the directors passed at a meeting of the board.

#### PART IX - COMMITTEES

- 86. The President and the First and Second Vice-Presidents shall serve as a committee on committees and shall nominate to the Convention at its first session necessary committees to serve the following year. One alternate for each committee shall be elected to fill any occurring vacancy.
- 87. It shall be the responsibility of the Nominating Committee to bring to the Convention nominees to serve on the Executive Board of the Convention and any trustees of institutions and agencies.
- 88. The board may delegate any, but not all, of its powers to committees as it thinks fit.
- 89. A committee so formed, and in the exercise of the powers so delegated, shall conform to any rules that may from time to time be imposed on it by the board, and shall report every act or thing done in exercise of those powers at the earliest meeting of the board to be held next after it has been done, or at such time or times as the board directs.
- 90. The members of a committee may meet and adjourn as they think proper and the meetings of committees shall be governed by the rules set out in Part VII of

these bylaws, which rules govern the meetings of the board.

- 91. There may be an Executive Committee consisting of directors of which there must be at least three, elected annually by the board at the first meeting of the board held after the annual general meeting of each year.
- 92. Subject to the control of the board the Executive Committee shall have power to transact all business of the Society in the interim between the meetings of the board. Three members shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the chairman of the Committee or of any two members thereof.
- 93. The board may create such standing and special committees as may from time to time be required. Such a committee shall limit its activities to the purpose or purposes for which it is appointed, and shall have no powers except those specifically conferred by a resolution of the directors. Unless specifically designated as a standing committee, any special committee so created must be created for a specified time period only. Upon completion of the earlier of the specified time period or the task for which it was appointed a special committee, the committee in question shall automatically be dissolved.

#### PART X - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 94. The persons elected to the office of President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President of the Convention shall concurrently be elected to the office of President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President of the Society for a term of office of one year.
- 95. The President shall be an ex officio member of all boards and committees of the Convention and the Society.
- 96. A person may be removed from the office of President or First Vice-President or Second Vice-President by a resolution passed at a meeting of the board by a majority of not less than 75% of all the directors.
- 97. The First or Second Vice-President shall succeed to the office of President in the order of their election in the event that the office of President is vacated between annual sessions of the Convention.
- 98. The board may appoint and remove such other officers of the Society as they deem necessary and determine the responsibilities, term and remuneration, if any, of all officers.
- 99. The Secretary shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements for:
  - (a) the issuance of notices of meetings of the Society and directors;
  - (b) the keeping of minutes of all meetings of the Society and the board;
  - (c) the custody of all records and documents of the Society except those required to be kept by the Treasurer;
  - (d) the custody of the common seal of the Society;
  - (e) the maintenance of the register of members; and
  - (f) the conduct of the correspondence of the Society.
- 100. The Treasurer shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements

for:

- (a) the keeping of such financial records, including books of account, as are necessary to comply with the Society Act; and
- (b) the rendering of financial statements to the directors, members and others when required.
- 101. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one person who shall be known as the Executive Director-Treasurer.
- 102. In the absence of the Secretary from any meeting, the directors shall appoint another person to act as secretary at that meeting.

### PART XI - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

103. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall be elected by the messengers at the Convention for an indefinite tenure of office after nomination by the Executive Board. When the position of Executive Director-Treasurer is vacated, a search committee shall be elected by the Executive Board from members of Cooperating Baptist Churches.

104. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall plan, coordinate, and promote the activities of the Convention through its boards, departments, committees, agencies and trustees. He shall receive and disburse all funds coming under the direction of the Convention and/or the Executive Board of the Convention. He shall give to the annual session of the Convention and at least twice annually to the Executive Board complete and accurate reports of all funds received and disbursed. He shall receive and disburse designated funds accepted by the Board as directed by the donor, and shall be bonded in sufficient amount as to insure faithful handling of all funds. He shall submit to the Executive Board an annual audit of all funds handled and disbursed.

The Executive Director-Treasurer shall serve ex officio as secretary of the Convention and its Executive Board. He shall faithfully keep accurate minutes of all sessions of the Convention and the Executive Board. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the annual of the Convention, together with the Constitution and Bylaws and such other information as the Convention or its Executive Board deems necessary and proper. He shall be an ex officio member without voting privileges of all boards and committees of the Convention.

### PART XII - SEAL

105. The board may provide a common seal for the Society and it shall have power from time to time to destroy such seal and substitute a new seal in the place of the seal destroyed.

106. The common seal shall be affixed only when authorized by a resolution of the board, and then only in the presence of the persons prescribed in the resolution, or, if no persons are prescribed, in the presence of the Executive Director-Treasurer and the President. In the absence of the Executive Director-Treasurer or the President, the First Vice-President and/or the Second Vice-President may substitute for them.

# PART XIII - BORROWING

107. In order to carry out the purposes of the Society the board may, on behalf

- of and in the name of the Society, raise or secure the payment or repayment of money in the manner it decides, and in particular, but without limiting the foregoing, by the issue of debentures.
- 108. No debenture shall be issued without the previous passing of a special resolution.
- 109. The members by special resolution may restrict the borrowing powers of the board, but such a restriction imposed shall expire at the next following annual general meeting.

### PART XIV - AUDITOR

- 110. The Society shall have an auditor.
- 111. The first auditor shall be appointed by the board which shall also make appointments to fill all vacancies occurring in the office of auditor.
- 112. At each annual general meeting thereafter the Society shall appoint an auditor to hold office until he is re-elected or his successor is elected, at the next following annual general meeting.
- 113. An auditor may be removed by an ordinary resolution.
- 114. An auditor shall be promptly informed in writing of his or her appointment or removal.
- 115. No director and no employee of the Society, nor the spouse of such person, shall be auditor.
- 116. The auditor may attend general meetings.

### PART XV - AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

- 117. The Society shall control all institutions and agencies it deems necessary to fulfill its purposes.
- 118. The Convention alone shall authorize new institutions and agencies and these only after a study by the Executive Board and favorable action by two successive Conventions, one of which shall be an annual meeting.
- 119. The trustees of institutions and agencies shall report to and be accountable to the Convention through the Executive Board.
- 120. The executive officers of institutions and agencies shall be nominated by the trustees of those institutions and agencies and serve at the pleasure of the Executive Board.
- 121. The trustees of institutions and agencies shall present to the Executive Board a policies and procedures manual which shall be used in the development and operation of the institution or agency.
- 122. The financial affairs of the Convention and its agencies and institutions shall be planned on a calendar year basis, January 1 to December 31.

- 123. Convention Boards, committees and trustees shall present budget recommendations to the Executive Board at least ninety (90) days before the annual session of the Convention.
- 124. All persons who handle funds or securities of the Convention or Society shall be adequately bonded or insured. The securities of all Society agencies and institutions shall be placed in a safety deposit vault in a bank, trust company or credit union for safe keeping.
- 125. Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit a semi-annual report to the Executive Board which includes total receipts, total expenditures and financial position. The annual audit of each agency and institution shall be printed in the Convention annual.
- 126. As normal operating policy, each agency and institution of the Convention shall refrain from entering into any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or any business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made by the Executive Board.
- 127. Each agency and institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and designated gifts sacred to the trust and designation. Trust funds and designated gifts shall be kept separate from all other funds and are not to be used, even temporarily, for any other purpose than the purpose specified.
- 128. Total debt or liability in excess of \$20,000.00 or involving more than one year repayment shall not be incurred without approval of the Convention.
- 129. The chief administrative officer of any agency, institution, or board of the Convention whose funds are falling below anticipated budget income by as much as 20% at the end of any quarter shall immediately notify the Chairman of the Executive Board and the officers of the Convention.

# PART XVI - NOTICES TO MEMBERS

- 130. Notice of a general meeting shall be given to:
  - (a) every person shown on the register of members on the day notice is given;
- (b) the auditor, if appointed or required by the Society Act; No other person is entitled to receive a notice of a general meeting.
- 131. A notice may be given to a member either personally or by mail to a member at such member's registered address fourteen days prior to the commencement of a meeting.
- 132. A notice sent by mail shall be deemed to have been given on the second day following that on which the notice is posted, and in proving that notice has been given it is sufficient to prove the notice was properly addressed and put in a Canadian post office receptacle.

## PART XVII - GENERAL

133. The board shall from time to time determine whether and to what extent and

at what times and places and under what conditions or regulations the documents, including accounting records, of the Society or the Convention shall be open to the inspection of members of the Society, not being directors. In the absence of such determination by the board, the documents, including accounting records, of the Society shall not be open to inspection of any member of the Society or the Convention, not being a director.

134. Any meeting of the Society, the members, the board or any committee, institution, or agency may also be held or any member or director or committee, institution or agency person may participate in any meeting of the Society, the members, the board, or any committee, institution or agency by conference call or similar communication equipment or device so long as all the members, directors or other persons participating in the meeting can hear and respond to one another. All such members, directors or other persons so participating in any such meeting shall be deemed to be present in person at the stated location of such meeting, and notwithstanding the foregoing by-laws, shall be entitled to vote by a voice vote recorded by the secretary of such meeting.

135. The Society shall have the right to subscribe to, become a member of and cooperate with any other society, foundation, corporation or association whether incorporated or not, whose purposes or objectives are in whole or in part similar to the Society's purposes.

136. The Society may purchase and maintain insurance for the benefit of any or all directors, officers, employees or agents against personal liability incurred by any such person as a director, officer, employee or agent.

#### PART XVIII - BYLAWS

137. This Constitution and these bylaws shall not be altered or added to except by special resolution. Such special resolution cannot be voted on until the proposed alterations and additions have been presented in writing to the Convention, debated by the messengers and approved by a majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the Convention. The proposed alterations and additions as amended by that Convention shall be held over to the next annual Convention and after further debate the proposed alterations and additions may be changed in form but not in character and if passed by a two-third's vote of the messengers present and voting at the Convention shall be able to be voted on by the members by special resolution.

#### PROCEEDINGS

The Convention general sessions were preceded by a Missions Conference. The theme of the conference was "Holding The Ropes" and speakers included Rev. Bill Fowler, Rev. Mike McElroy, Andrea Ashley, and Rev. Allen Schmidt.

#### TUESDAY EVENING, MAY 10, 1988 - PAUL JOHNSON PRESIDING

- 1. Mark Blankenship, Music Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, led in congregational singing and worship in music. Dr. Blankenship served as music director for all sessions.
- 2. Paul Johnson, President, called to order the Fourth Annual Meeting of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and welcomed all present to the sessions. He recognized the other officers of the Convention, Larry Spencer, First Vice President, unable to attend the meetings, and Jim Graham, Second Vice President.
- 3. Kim Norwood, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, moved that Bow Valley Baptist Church, Cochrane, Alberta be seated. Carried.
- 4. Kim Norwood, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, moved that those messengers duly elected by their churches, presently registered and those yet to register be seated and compose these sessions of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists. Carried.
- 5. Anthony Laird presented the report for the Order of Business Committee. Bill Blackmon moved that the program for this year's meeting be adopted as presented. Second Bob Shelton. Carried.
- 6. Anthony Laird introduced Rev. John Capps, pastor Friendship Baptist Church, Winnipeg, who brought greetings and welcome from the host church.
- 7. Anthony Laird introduced Rev. Mike McElroy, pastor Portage Chapel, Winnipeg, who brought greetings on behalf of the Keystone Association.
- 8. Mike McElroy introduced the Honorable Bill Norrie, Mayor of the city of Winnipeg. Mr. Norrie welcomed messengers to the Convention and brought greetings from the city of Winnipeg.
- 9. Anthony and Dara Laird brought special music.
- 10. Jim Graham led in prayer.
- 11. President, Paul Johnson, shared that it was a privilege to serve as President this past year and acknowledged the true leadership of the Lord. He challenged the Convention "not to be weary in well doing" and shared thoughts based on John 17:19 "For their sakes I sanctify myself...".

#### NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### DECEMBER 31, 1987

#### 1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

The Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists (the Convention) commenced operations on January 1, 1985 as an unincorporated, non-profit organization. The Convention incorporated on April 8, 1987 as the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination under the Society Act of the Province of British Columbia.

The purpose of the Convention is to provide a channel for co-operating churches to work together to carry out Christ's mission of preaching, teaching, healing and ministering to all persons throughout the world.

The Convention consists of messengers who are members elected and certified by Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing financially to its work. The Executive Board, elected by the Convention, handles the Convention's affairs and functions as the Convention between its annual meetings.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and reflect the following policies:

#### Basis of statement presentation

These financial statements include the accounts of the Convention and the accounts of the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary, an educational institution controlled by the Convention.

#### Fund accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Convention, the financial statements are presented in accordance with the principles of fund accounting.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Convention are grouped into four funds which are classified according to nature and purpose as follows:

#### General Fund

Undesignated general funds are used by the Executive Board to carry on the general operations of the Convention. The general fund consists primarily of Convention-approved budget items for programs and administration. The principal sources of revenue are from member churches and the Home and Foreign Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Seminary Fund

Undesignated general funds are used by the Seminary Board of Trustees to carry on the general operations of the Seminary.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Fund accounting (continued)

#### Property and Equipment Fund

The property and equipment fund accounts for general funds expended for the Convention's facilities and depreciation thereof. This fund also accounts for the financing of the facilities with debt service costs being funded by general revenue.

#### Designated Funds

Designated funds account for amounts given by donors for specific purposes.

#### Accrual basis of accounting

The accounting records of the Convention are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting summarized as follows:

#### Revenue

Unpledged contributions from member churches are recognized when received. Home Mission Board revenues relating primarily to the reimbursement of budgeted expenses are recognized in the year of the expenditure.

#### Expenses

Administrative, program and other expenses are recorded in the year incurred.

#### Income taxes

The Convention is a registered charity as defined in Section 49 of the Income Tax Act of Canada and is exempt from Federal and Provincial income taxes.

#### Translation of foreign currencies

- U.S. dollar accounts in these financial statements are translated into Canadian dollars on the following basis:
- (a) Assets and liabilities at the rate of exchange prevailing at the year-end.
- (b) Support, contributions and expenses at a rate approximating the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions.
- (c) Gains and losses on translation of foreign currencies are included in net income.

#### Land and property development

Land and property development are stated at their original cost.

#### 3. WORLD MISSIONS

It is the Convention's policy to give 20% (1986 - 25%) of its undesignated receipts from Canadian churches to world missions via the Cooperative Program administered by the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). The Executive Board of the Convention has elected to retain a portion of its Cooperative Program gift for use within Canada. Therefore, 20% (1986 - 25%) of undesignated receipts from Canadian Churches has been used as follows:

#### 4. BANK INDEBTEDNESS

Bank indebtedness consists of an overdraft allowed by Convention's bank due to a delay in transferring funds from the Home Mission Board.

#### 5. BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Furniture and equipment in use by the Convention are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. These assets are depreciated on the straight-line method at rates calculated to amortize the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Buildings and equipment in use by the Seminary are stated at their original cost. No depreciation expense has been recognized on fixed assets in 1987. Depreciation expense will be recognized commencing in 1988.

#### CHURCH GROWTH DIVISION REPORT - DAVID WYMAN

This has been a remarkable year of progress in the different areas of Church Growth. God has blessed our Convention with some talented and gifted people to help provide leadership. Recognition came to Canadian Southern Baptists in the area of Church Study Course awards. Our Convention led all 40 Conventions and Fellowships related to the SBC in 1987 in the percentage of Study Course awards per church member. An average of one out of every three Canadian Southern Baptists received an award. So far this year we are ahead of 12 of the other conventions in the total number of awards even though we are the third smallest group numerically.

The addition of new volunteer leaders in Church Growth has allowed us to begin serving our churches and associations more effectively in the area of conferences, workshops, and consultations. Having a team that provides a growing expertise in all areas of Church Growth greatly extends the availability of knowledge and resources for all our churches.

SUNDAY SCHOOL - The key to sucessful advance in Sunday School growth and quality across our Convention rests in effective teaching and witnessing. Our Associational Sunday School Improvement Teams (ASSISTeams) are rapidly becoming one of the most vital elements in each church attaining those goals. In the past year we grew from 39 to 65 in active ASSISTeam leaders and teachers. About 75 are expected to be participating by next year. The system is well organized. The Track 1 team trained in October in Phoenix, Arizona. They then led training procedures for 65 ASSISTeam members in a three day retreat near Cochrane, Alberta in March of this year. All of the teams are committed to providing workshops, conferences, and consultations in their associations during the coming months.

Alongside the ASSIST program, our VBS Teaching Team has also led a large and growing effort in equipping our churches to lead effective VBS ministries this year. After receiving their 1988 VBS update at Glorieta in January, the team led approximately 51 people in training on March 26 to teach Associational VBS Clinics. George Knight is the capable director of the VBS Teaching Team.

Ridgecrest North provides a unique opportunity for Canadian Southern Baptists to receive "Glorieta quality" Sunday School training. A first rate lodge has been reserved for Canadians on the grounds of the beautiful Green Lake Conference Center, Green Lake, Wisconsin. Thus, the cost of Ridgecrest North will be less than half that of Glorieta and the program is especially designed to meet our needs along with the northern new work state conventions. Dates are July 5-9, 1988. See David Wyman for details.

CHURCH TRAINING - The most rapidly developing area of Church Growth continues to be Church Training. The LIFE system of materials and resources offers some of the finest in-depth study opportunities available for Christians from any source. Our churches are already involved in teaching Parenting by Grace, Covenant Marriage, PrayerLife, MasterDesign, and Commitment Counseling. Leadership workshops in these and new releases will be offered in the coming months.

Eight pastors and key laypersons in Northern Lights Association received certification in MasterLife in a week-long Workshop in Regina in February. Pastor Lindsey Nimmons graciously hosted the event.

Summer Youth Celebration marks a new era in youth ministries for our Convention. Previously offered only at Ridgecrest and Glorieta where over 6,000 youth a year take part, the Church Training Department of the BSSB will offer this wonderful youth and youth worker experience to Canadian Southern Baptists and their friends August 8-12, 1988. Some 140 reservations have been made at this point. It will be held near Red Deer, Alberta.

Barbara Wyman, Church Training Director for our Convention continues to provide capable leadership in this growing area of work while pursuing a Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology at the University of Calgary. We look forward to the added expertise which this additional study will bring to Church Training and Family Ministries.

CHURCH MUSIC - The Canadian Convention established a direct relationship with the BSSB Music Department for the first time in December, 1987. This new working partnership with the BSSB will allow us to offer better field servicing and consultations with associations and churches in music ministries. Genevox and the Music Department together provide the finest all-age curriculum and church music materials and resources available in the world. We are excited about involving all of our churches in the rich experience of quality worship and training through music. We hope to soon have a new volunteer director for our Convention Church Music Department. Mark Blankenship, Director of Music for the Convention Meeting this year can provide messengers with information in regard to music possibilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - Marybelle Cruikshank has been approved by the Baptist Sunday School Board as the Special Education Consultant for our Canadian Convention after being named last Fall to that position. Although she serves as a volunteer, she will have access to training, materials, and field servicing through the BSSB. This will help enable our churches to develop quality ministries to those who are visually handicapped, learning disabled, mentally handicapped, gifted, physically handicapped, or otherwise have special needs. We encourage our churches and associations to call on Mrs. Cruikshank for consultation in these important ministry areas.

CHURCH MISSIONS ORGANIZATIONS AND WMU - This is the 100th anniversary of WMU. A number of our associations celebrated the fact through special presentations last Fall in their annual meetings. Bonna Conner led an inspiring Missions Conference for the annual CCSB meeting in November. This Spring, Mrs. Conner will represent Canadian Southern Baptists and our WMU program in Richmond, Virginia at the WMU Centennial Celebration.

Many of our churches participated in the annual Foreign and Home Mission studies as well as the Weeks of Prayer for Missions. Materials for both missions studies were excellent this year. Mrs. Conner looks forward to a growing interest in missions as Canadian Southern Baptists become more involved year by year in missionary participation around the world.

At least three new Baptist Men's organizations have begun since our last Convention meeting. A number of Royal Ambassador, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends groups have also begun. We are grateful that Mrs. Conner is serving as both Director of our Church Mission Organizations Department and as the CCSB National WMU Director.

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT - ALLEN SCHMIDT

The six months since our last Convention Meeting last November have been a busy year. While we are never totally free of challenges, opportunities/problems, our churches are being planted, established churches are growing and people are being reached for Christ. A number of our churches are planning buildings this year; Garden Park, Winnipeg; New Life, Grande Prairie; and Watrous Baptist, Watrous, Saskatchewan.

#### CANADIAN COOPERATIVE PROGRAM GROWING

Each year since 1985, when we began handling our cooperative program funds in Canada, our churches have set new records in mission giving. In 1985, we gave a total of \$163,000; 1986, \$167,000; 1987, \$183,000. Through April this year we have given a total of \$63875, which is an increase of 12.7% over the \$56,676 given to this date last year. We have been careful and faithful in managing these funds as they come through your convention office. Our convention budget for 1988 shows that only 14.6% will be used for administration. 82.7% will be used directly in missions and work among our churches. The balance goes to convention operation, e.g. Executive Board meetings, Annual Meetings, printing minutes, etc.

According to the preliminary draft of our audit for 1987, our Fund Balance grew from \$51,313 to \$101,955. Against this figure we carry an original advance from the Home Mission Board of \$41,207. Hence, even though our cooperative program receipts have been under budget, through careful management and the generous sharing of the Home Mission Board, the Sunday School Board and the Foreign Mission Board our convention is in good shape. The fund balance is not excessive but it does allow us to operate without drawing on a line of credit at the bank. Should the convention vote to go to al all Canadian Dollar budget for 1989, this allows us a small cushion to cover the fluctuation possible in the Canadian Dollar viz-a-viz the U.S. Dollar.

Since our budget has been based on U.S. Dollars and we did not give an salary increase for 1988, our staff is receiving 8% less salary than a year ago because of the rise of the Canadian Dollar. I trust we will make some adjustment to that at this meeting.

## OFFICE BUILDING PLANS IN HAND

Frank Orr, an architect from Nashville, Tennessee, and a member of Woodmont Baptist Church, has drawn up a set of plans for a convention office building. He did this for us at no cost.

When we can clear up the indebtedness at the Seminary for the water line and finishing the building we will be able to raise funds and build the convention office building.

I would urge that every member of each of our churches seriously pray about what God would have you do to "Share the Dream" and eliminate the debt at the Seminary. We could do it in one great offering if we would  $\underline{all}$  participate. Our Seminary is

off to a good start. It has a tremendous future and ministry ahead of it.

GOOD GROWTH BEHIND US: MORE NEEDED

Our convention has experienced much better than expected growth in the three years since we began operations in 1985. Churches and missions have been added, Student Ministries has expanded, convention staff is in place and serving. God is so good, so faithful. Our two greatest needs of the moment are: that we grow our churches through effective outreach/evangelism; and that we plant more churches. Let's do it!

#### SOCIETY ACT

## CONSTITUTION

- 1. The name of the Society is CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS FOUNDATION.
- The purposes of the Society are:
  - (a) to fund, facilitate and promote the carrying out of Christ's mission of preaching, teaching, healing and ministering to all persons throughout the world;
  - (b) to receive, hold and invest bequests, donations, gifts, funds and property and to administer and distribute funds, property, endowments, trusts and financial programs for the funding and support of programs and activities of The Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Foundation;
  - (c) to receive bequests, trusts, funds and property, and to hold, invest, administer and distribute funds and property for the purposes of the Foundation as presently set out and for such other organizations as are "qualified donees" under the provisions of the Income Tax Act and for such other purposes and activities which are authorized for registered charities under the provisions of the Income Tax Act; and
  - (d) to do all such other things as are incidental and ancillary to the attainment of the purposes and the exercise of the powers of the Foundation.
- The Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Foundation was incorporated at the behest of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists with the primary objective of soliciting, holding and administering funds in the Foundation for the benefit of the charitable activities of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists. This provision is unalterable.
- The Foundation shall create a fund to be known as the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund to hold funds and property transferred to the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund from the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and bequests, donations, gifts, funds and property received by the Foundation which are received subject to a designation, trust or direction from the donor that such transfers, bequests, donations, gifts, funds or property be held for real property projects and bequests, donations, gifts, income and property received by the Foundation which are not received subject to such a designation, trust or direction but which the board of the Foundation designates or directs shall be placed in the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund. The capital of the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund shall only be utilized at the discretion of the board of the Foundation as evidenced by a resolution of the directors in writing passed by a minimum of two-thirds of the members of the

entire board of directors of the Foundation at that time for the purchase or acquisition of real property and fixtures and furnishings to be used by or for the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists. The income of any portion thereof from the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund in any fiscal year may be paid to The Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination in that fiscal year or within 120 days thereafter for its operating or capital costs by any income not so paid to the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists shall be added to and become part of the capital of the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund. This provision is unalterable.

- 5. The Foundation shall create a fund to be known as the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund to hold funds and property transferred to the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund from the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and bequests, donations, gifts, funds and property received by the Foundation which are received subject to a designation, trust or direction from the donor that such transfers, bequests, donations, gifts, funds or property be held as an endowment and bequests, donations, gifts, income and property received by the Foundation which are not received subject to such a designation, trust or direction but which the board of the Foundation designates or directs shall be held as an endowment and to hold, invest and administer the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund and pay the income or any portion thereof from the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund in any fiscal year for the purposes set forth in paragraph 2 hereof; but any income not paid in any fiscal year or within 120 days thereafter shall be added to and become part of the capital of the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund. The capital value of the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund and all capital accretions thereto shall not in any circumstances, other than those set out in paragraph 11 hereof, be encroached upon or distributed; provided, however, that nothing in this paragraph shall prevent the board from selling or otherwise disposing of such bequests, donations, gifts, income, funds or property if the net proceeds of such disposition or other property of similar value is substituted therefor. This provision is alterable.
- The Foundation shall create a Fund to be known as the Southern Baptists Capital Fund to hold funds and property transferred to the Southern Baptists Capital Fund from the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and bequests, donations, gifts, funds and property received by the Foundation which are received subject to a designation, trust or direction from the donor that such transfers, bequests, donations, gifts, funds or property be held for capital projects and bequests, donations, gifts, income and property received by the Foundation which are not received subject to such a designation, trust or direction but which the board of the Foundation designates or directs shall placed in the Southern Baptists Capital Fund and held, invested and administered by the Foundation. The capital of the Southern Baptist Capital Fund shall only be utilized at the discretion of the board of the Foundation as evidenced by a resolution of the directors in writing passed by a minimum of two-thirds of the members of the entire board of directors of the Foundation at that time for the purchase or acquisition of capital equipment, including opera sets, theatrical equipment and

musical instruments, or real estate to be used by or for the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists or for the purposes set forth in paragraph 2 hereof. The income of the Southern Baptists Capital Fund in any fiscal year may be paid for the purposes for which capital of the Southern Baptists Capital Fund may be utilized or for operating costs of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists. Any income not paid in any fiscal year or within 120 days thereafter shall be added to the capital of the Southern Baptists Capital Fund. This provision is alterable.

- 7. The Foundation may create such other named Funds and set the terms and conditions which shall govern such funds as the board in its discretion considers prudent. This provision is alterable.
- 8. Unless specific written directions are given to the Foundation by a donor or the Board that property included in a bequest, donation, transfer, trust or loan shall not be included in a Consolidated Trust Fund, all property and funds in any named Fund or held by the Foundation may be combined in a Consolidated Trust Fund for the purpose of facilitating investment. This provision is alterable.
- 9. Income from funds and property of the Foundation and the capital of the Southern Baptists Real Property Fund but not the Southern Baptists Endowment Fund and the Southern Baptists Capital Fund may be assigned as collateral security to a bank, trust company, credit union or other lender where, in the opinion of the board, such assignment is for the purpose of enabling the Foundation to continue to pursue its purposes. This provision is alterable.
- 10. The activities of the Foundation shall be carried on without purposes of gain for its members and any income, profits or other accretions to the Foundation shall be used in promoting the purposes of the Foundation. This provision is unalterable.
- Upon the winding-up or dissolution of the Foundation, the funds and property remaining after the payment of all costs, charges and expenses properly incurred in the winding-up or dissolution, including the remuneration of a liquidator, and after payment to employees of the Foundation of any arrears of salaries, or wages, and after the payments of any debts of the Foundation, shall be distributed to the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination, provided that is at that time a registered Canadian charity. If that shall not be possible any funds and property shall be distributed to such charities, registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act, or such qualified donees allowed under the Income Tax Act, as shall be designated by the members. Any of such funds or property remaining which had originally been provided for specific purposes, shall, wherever possible, be distributed to qualified donees or charities registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act carrying on work with similar nature to such specific purposes. This provision is unalterable.

# CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS FOUNDATION

## PART I - INTERPRETATION

1. In these bylaws and the constitution of the Foundation, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (a) "board" means the directors acting as authorized by the constitution and bylaws of the Foundation in managing or supervising the management of the affairs of the Foundation and exercising the powers of the Foundation;
- (b) "bylaws" means the bylaws of the Foundation as filed in the office of the Registrar of Companies in Victoria;
- (c) "constitution" means the constitution of the Foundation as filed in the office of the Registrar of Companies in Victoria;
- (d) "Convention" means the annual meeting of messengers of Cooperating Baptist Churches;
- (e) "Cooperating Baptist Church" means a church determined at that particular point in time by the Convention to be a cooperating Baptist church;
- (f) "director" means a director of the Foundation for the time being, and includes, if any, an appointed, elected, first or replacement director;
- (g) "elected director" means a director of the Foundation elected in accordance with these bylaws;
- (h) "first director" means a director whose name is listed in the List of First Directors filed with the Registrar at the time of incorporation;
- (i) "Foundation" means the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Foundation;
- (j) "members" means the applicants for incorporation and those persons who subsequently have become members in accordance with these bylaws, and, in either case, have not ceased to be members and a "member" means any one of them;
- (k) "ordinary resolution" means
  - (i) a resolution passed in general meeting of the Foundation by a simple majority of the votes cast by those members of the Foundation entitled to vote at such general meeting; or

- (ii) a resolution that has been submitted to the members of the Foundation and consented to in writing by 75% of the members who would have been entitled to vote on it in person or by proxy at a general meeting of the Foundation;
- (l) "registered address" of a member or director means the address of that person as recorded in the register of members or register of directors;
- (m) "replacement director" means a director of the Foundation appointed or elected in accordance with these bylaws as a replacement director;
- (n) "Society" means Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Foundation;
- (o) "Society Act" means the Society Act of the Province of British Columbia from time to time in force and all amendments to it;
- (p) "special resolution" means:
  - (i) a resolution passed in general meeting of the Foundation by a majority of not less than 75% of the votes cast by those members of the Foundation entitled to vote at such general meeting; or
  - (ii) a resolution consented to in writing by every member of a Foundation who would have been entitled to vote in person or by proxy at a general meeting of the Foundation;
- 2. Except where they conflict with the definitions contained in these bylaws, the definitions in the Society Act on the date these bylaws become effective apply to these bylaws.

#### PART II - MEMBERSHIP

- 3. Membership in the Foundation shall be restricted to the applicants for incorporation and those persons who are directors of the British Columbia society having the name Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination. Persons who are directors of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination shall be admitted as members of the Foundation immediately upon becoming directors of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination. All such persons shall be members only by virtue of their office as director of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination and shall remain members only so long as they hold such office.
- A. Notwithstanding the foregoing paragraph those persons who are members of the British Columbia society have the name the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination shall be admitted as members of the Foundation immediately upon becoming members of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination. All such persons shall be members only by virtue

of their office as members of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination and shall remain members only so long as they hold such office.

- There shall be no annual membership dues.
- 6. Any member may withdraw from the Foundation by delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Foundation or by mailing or delivering it to the address of the Foundation.
- 7. A person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Foundation:
  - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Foundation or upon delivering it to the address of the Foundation; or
  - (b) upon his death;
  - (c) upon ceasing to be a director of the Foundation for any reason other than the expiration of that person's elected or appointed term as a director;
  - (d) upon an office holder of director or member of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination ceasing to hold the office set out in Bylaw 3 or Bylaw 4 by virtue of which he is a member.
- 8. There is no manner in which a member may be expelled.
- 9. The membership of a person in the Foundation is not transferable.
- 10. All members shall be in good standing except a member who has failed to pay any debt due and owing by him or her to the Foundation, and such member is not in good standing as long as the debt remains unpaid.

## PART III - MEETING OF MEMBERS

- 11. The general meetings of the Foundation shall be held at such time and place, in accordance with the Society Act, as the board shall decide.
- 12. Every general meeting other than an annual general meeting is an extraordinary general meeting.
- 13. The board may, whenever it thinks fit, convene an extraordinary general meeting.
- 14. The Foundation shall give not less than 14 days written notice of a general meeting of the Foundation to its members entitled to receive notice of a general meeting; but those members may waive or reduce the period of notice for a particular meeting by unanimous consent in writing.

- 15. Notice of a general meeting shall specify the place, the day and the hour of the meeting, and, in case of special business, the general nature of that business.
- 16. The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting to, or the non-receipt of notice by, any of the members entitled to receive notice does not invalidate proceedings at that meeting.
- 17. The first annual general meeting of the Foundation shall be held not more than 15 months after the date of incorporation and thereafter an annual general meeting shall be held at least once in every calendar year and not more than 15 months after the holding of the last preceding annual general meeting.

#### PART IV - PROCEEDINGS AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- 18. All proceedings at a general meeting shall be governed by <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u>, revised, except that, should there be any conflict between any section of these bylaws and <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u>, these bylaws shall prevail. All business at an extraordinary general meeting shall be "special business" and all business that is transacted at an annual general meeting shall be "special business" except:
  - (a) consideration of the financial statement;
  - (b) the report of the directors, if any;
  - (c) the report of the auditor, if any;
  - (d) the election of directors, if any;
  - (e) the appointment of the auditor, if required;
  - (f) such other business that, under these bylaws or any governing statutes, ought to be transacted at an annual general meeting, or business as brought under consideration by the report of the directors issued with the notice of the meeting.
- 19. No business, other than the election of a chair and the adjournment or termination of the meeting, shall be conducted at a general meeting at a time when the quorum is not present.
- 20. If any time during a general meeting there ceases to be a quorum present, business then in progress shall be suspended until there is a quorum present, or until the meeting is adjourned or terminated.
- 21. A quorum at a general meeting is the greater of one-half of the members then in good standing or three members.
- 22. If within 30 minutes from the time appointed for a general meeting a quorum is not present, the meeting, if convened on the requisition of members, shall be terminated; but in any other case, it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week, at the same time and place, and if, at the adjourned

meeting, a quorum is not present within 30 minutes from the time appointed for the meeting, the members present constitute a quorum.

- The President of the Foundation or in his absence, the First Vice-President, or in his absence the Second Vice-President, or in the absence of any of the foregoing, one of the other Directors present shall preside as chair of a general meeting of the Foundation; but if at any general meeting the President, or the First Vice-President or the Second Vice-President is not present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the general meeting, or requests that he not chair that general meeting, and there is no other director present willing to act as chair, the members present may choose one of their number to be chair of that general meeting.
- If the person presiding as chair of a general meeting wants to step down as chair for all or part of that general meeting, the chair may designate an alternate, hopefully neutral person, to chair such general meeting, or portion thereof, upon receiving the consent of either the Vice-President or the majority of the members present at such general meeting.
- 25. A general meeting may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at an adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
- 26. It is not necessary to give notice of an adjournment or of the business to be transacted at an adjourned meeting except where a meeting is adjourned for 10 days or more, in which case notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given as in the case of the original meeting.
- 27. All resolutions proposed at a general meeting must be seconded. The chair of such a meeting may move or propose a resolution.
- 28. Any issue at a general meeting which is not required by these bylaws or the Society Act to be decided by a special resolution shall be decided by an ordinary resolution unless the bylaws dictate otherwise.
- 29. A member in good standing present at a meeting of members is entitled to one vote.
- 30. The chair may vote, but if it does so and the result is a tie, the chair shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie and the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 31. Voting shall be by a show of hands or a voice vote recorded by the secretary of such meeting unless proxy votes are to be counted or the majority of the persons eligible to vote present shall determine that a secret vote by written ballot is required.
- 32. Voting by proxy is not permitted.

#### PART V - DIRECTORS

- The board may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Foundation may exercise and do, and which are not by these bylaws or by statute or otherwise lawfully directed or required to be exercised or done by the members in general meeting, but subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of:
  - (a) all laws affecting the Foundation;
  - (b) these bylaws; and
  - (c) rules, not being inconsistent with these bylaws, which are made from time to time by the Foundation in general meeting.
- 34. No rule, made by the Foundation in general meeting, invalidates a prior act of the board that would have been valid if that rule had not been made.
- 35. The property and the affairs of the Foundation shall be managed by the board.
- 36. The number of directors shall be five or such other number, not being less than three, as may be determined from time to time by an ordinary resolution.
- 37. Elected directors shall be those persons elected by the messengers at the Convention by Cooperating Baptist Churches at the Convention's annual meeting from among the nominees brought by the Nominating Committee and shall hold office commencing at the close of the Convention at which such person was elected. The term of office of each such elected director shall be one (1) year.
- 38. Directors may be elected or appointed to five consecutive terms but then must cease to be a director for at least one year before being eligible for re-election or re-appointment.
- 39. Notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws, the persons whose names are listed in the List of First Directors filed with the Registrar at the time of incorporation shall be the first directors and the first year of their term shall be deemed to terminate at the close of the first annual general meeting of the Foundation.
- 40. Notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws, the Convention Executive Director-Treasurer shall be an appointed director of the Foundation so long as he shall hold such office and shall have the right to receive natice of and attend meetings of the board but shall not have the right to vote at meetings of the board.
- 41. A person must be a member of a Cooperating Baptist Church in order to be eligible to be a director of the Foundation.

- 42. A person need not be a member of the Foundation to be eligible to be a director of the Foundation.
- Every director shall retire from office at the close of the annual general meeting in the year in which his term expires; but if no successor is elected or appointed and the result is that the number of directors would fall below three the person previously elected or appointed as director continues to hold office until such time as additional directors are elected or appointed.
- 44. Each director shall unreservedly subscribe to and support the purposes of the Foundation.
- 45. Notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws, if an elected director resigns his office or otherwise ceases to hold office during his term, and the number of directors falls below the number four the Convention Executive Board shall appoint a person as a replacement director to take the place of such elected director until the next annual general meeting.
- 46. No act or proceeding of the board is invalid by reason only of there being less than the prescribed number of directors in office.
- 47. The directors may by a resolution passed by a minimum of two-thirds of the directors then in office remove an elected director before the expiration of such director's term of office and may elect a successor to complete the term of office.
- 48. A person shall immediately cease to be an elected director of the Foundation:
  - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Foundation or to the address of the Foundation; or
  - (b) upon his death; or

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- (c) upon ceasing to be a member in good standing of a Cooperating Baptist Church; or
- (d) upon being removed by a resolution pursuant to the immediately preceding bylaw; or
- (e) upon failing to attend or participate in two consecutive meetings of the board of which he had notice, unless the board passes a resolution, evidenced in writing, specifically waiving this condition with respect to a named member.
- 49. No director shall be remunerated for being or acting as a director, but a director may be reimbursed for all expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by him while engaged in the affairs of the Foundation.

- The board shall have the power to make expenditures for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Foundation. The board shall have the power to enter into trust arrangements or contracts on behalf of the Foundation for the purpose of discharging obligations or conditions either imposed by a person donating, bequesting, advancing or lending money to the Foundation, or assumed by the Foundation in expectation of such donations, bequests, advances or loans. Such arrangements or contracts shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions that the board may prescribe.
- 51. The board shall take such steps as it deems necessary to enable the Foundation to receive donations, bequests, funds, trusts, contracts, agreements and benefits for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Foundation. The board in its sole and absolute discretion may refuse to accept any donations, bequests, trusts, funds or property.
- 52. In investing the funds of the Foundation, the board shall not be limited to securities and investments in which directors are authorized by law to invest, but may make any investments which in its opinion are prudent. Subject to the provisions of the Society Act, the directors shall not be liable for any loss which may result from any such investments.

## PART VI - PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD

- The meetings of the board may be held at any time and place to be determined by the board, provided that 3 days notice of such meeting shall be sent in writing to each director. However, no formal notice shall be necessary if all directors were present at the preceding meeting when the time and place of the meeting were determined or are present at the meeting or waive notice thereof in writing or give a prior verbal waiver to the Secretary of the Foundation.
- The meetings of the board may also be held, or any director may participate in a meeting of the board, by conference call or similar communication equipment or device, so long as all directors participating in the meeting can hear and respond to one another. All such directors so participating in any such meeting shall be deemed to be present in person at the said meeting.
- The board may from time to time fix the quorum necessary to transact business, and unless so fixed, the quorum shall be a simple majority of the directors in office at the time when the meeting convenes.
- The President shall be chair of all meetings of the board; save that, if at any meeting the President is not present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for the meeting to commence, or the President requests that he or she not chair that meeting, the directors present may choose one of their number to be chair of that meeting.
- 57. The President and the Convention Executive Director-Treasurer as an appointed director or any three directors may at any time, convene a meeting of the board.

- For the purposes of the first meeting of the board held immediately following the appointment or election of a director or directors at an annual or other general meeting of members, or for the purposes of a meeting of the board at which a director is appointed to fill a vacancy in the board of directors, it is not necessary to give notice of the meeting to the newly elected or appointed director or directors for the meeting to be properly constituted.
- 59. All resolutions proposed at a meeting of the board must be seconded. The chair of a meeting may move or propose a resolution.
- 60. A simple majority of votes cast at a meeting of the board shall be required to pass a resolution of the board.
- 61. The chair may vote, but if it does so vote and the result is a tie, the chair shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie. In those circumstances the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 62. Voting shall be by a show of hands except as otherwise provided. At the request of any one director, a secret vote by written ballot shall be required.
- 63. A resolution in writing, signed by all the directors and deposited with the Secretary, is as valid and effective as a resolution of the board passed at a meeting of the board.

#### PART VII - COMMITTEES

- The board may delegate any, but not all, of its powers to committees as it thinks fit. At least one director shall be a member of each such committee.
- 65. A committee so formed, and in the exercise of the powers so delegated, shall conform to any rules that may from time to time be imposed on it by the board, and shall report every act or thing done in exercise of those powers at the earliest meeting of the board to be held next after it has been done, or at such time or times as the board directs.
- The members of a committee may meet and adjourn as they think proper and the meetings of committees shall be governed by the rules set out in Part VI of these bylaws governing mutatis mutandis the meetings of the board.
- 67. It shall be the responsibility of the Nominating Committee to bring to the Convention, nominees to serve as elected directors of the Foundation.
- 68. There may be an Executive Committee consisting of directors of which there must be at least three, elected annually by the board at the first meeting of the board held after the annual general meeting of each year.

- 69. Subject to the control of the board the Executive Committee shall have power to transact all business of the Foundation in the interim between the meetings of the board. Three members shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the chair of the Committee or of any two members thereof.
- The board may create such standing and special committees as may from time to time be required. Any such committee shall limit its activities to the purpose or purposes for which it is appointed, and shall have no powers except those specifically conferred by a resolution of the directors. Unless specifically designated as a standing committee, any special committee so created must be created for a specified time period only. Upon completion of the earlier of the specified time period or the task for which it was appointed a special committee, the committee in question shall automatically be dissolved.

## PART VIII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 71. At the first meeting of the board held after the annual general meeting in each year, the board shall elect from among the directors a President, which person shall hold office until the first meeting of the board held after the next following annual general meeting.
- 72. A director may be removed from any office by a resolution passed at a meeting of the board by a majority of not less that 75% of all the directors present.
- 73. Should a President for any reason not be able to complete his term, the board shall elect a replacement without delay.
- 74. The board may appoint and remove such other officers of the Foundation as it deems necessary and determine the responsibilities, term and remuneration, if any, of all officers.
- 75. The Secretary shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements for:
  - (a) the issuance of notices of meetings of the Foundation and directors;
  - (b) the keeping of minutes of all meetings of the Foundation and the board;
  - (c) the custody of all records and documents of the Foundation except those required to be kept by the Treasurer;
  - (d) the custody of the common seal of the Foundation;
  - (e) the maintenance of the register of members; and
  - (f) the conduct of the correspondence of the Foundation.

76. The Treasurer shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements for:

(a) the keeping of such financial records, including books of account, as are necessary to comply with the Society Act; and

(b) the rendering of financial statements to the directors, members and others when required.

77. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one person who shall be known as the Secretary/Treasurer.

78. In the absence of the Secretary from any meeting of the Foundation or the board, the directors present shall appoint another person to act as secretary at that meeting.

79. Notwithstanding Bylaw 78, the board may elect a secretary of the board for purposes of preparation and custody of

minutes of meetings of the board.

## PART IX - SEAL

- 80. The board may provide a common seal for the Foundation and it shall have power from time to time to destroy such seal and substitute a new seal in the place of the seal destroyed.
- 81. The common seal shall be affixed only when authorized by a resolution of the board, and then only in the presence of the persons prescribed in the resolution, or, if no persons are prescribed, in the presence of any two directors.

#### PART X - BORROWING

- 82. In order to carry out the purposes of the Foundation the board may, on behalf of and in the name of the Foundation, raise or secure the payment or repayment of money in any manner it decides, and in particular, but without limiting the foregoing, by the issue of debentures.
- 83. No debenture shall be issued without the previous passing of a special resolution.
- 84. The members may restrict by ordinary resolution the borrowing powers of the board.

#### PART XI - AUDITOR

- 85. This Part applies only where the Foundation is required or has resolved to have an auditor.
- 86. The first auditor shall be appointed by the board which shall also make appointments to fill all vacancies occurring in the office of auditor.
- 87. At each annual general meeting thereafter the Foundation shall appoint an auditor to hold office until he is

re-elected or his successor is elected, at the next following annual general meeting.

- 88. An auditor may be removed by an ordinary resolution.
- 89. An auditor shall be promptly informed in writing of his appointment or removal.
- 90. No director and no employee of the Foundation shall be auditor.
- 91. The auditor may attend general meetings.

## PART XII - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

92. The board may nominate and Executive Director-Treasurer and set the terms of his duties, responsibilities and employment who shall be elected by the Convention in annual session or by the Convention Executive Board between annual sessions.

#### PART XIII - NOTICES TO MEMBERS

- 93. Notice of a general meeting shall be given to:
  - (a) every person shown on the register of members as a voting member on the day notice is given;
  - (b) the auditor, if appointed or required by the Society Act;
  - (c) the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination at the registered office of the said society; and
  - (d) the President of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination at his address for business.

No other person is entitled to receive a notice of a general meeting.

- 94. A notice may be given to a member or a director either personally or by first class mail to such person's registered address.
- A notice sent by mail shall be deemed to have been received on the day of mailing and shall be deemed to have been received on the second day following that on which the notice was posted. In proving that notice has been given it is sufficient to prove the notice was properly addressed and put in a Canadian Government post office receptacle with adequate postage affixed provided that if there shall be, between the time of mailing and the deemed receipt of the notice, a mail strike or other labour dispute which might reasonably be expected to delay the delivery of such notice by the mails, then such notice shall only be effective when actually received. Any notice delivered by hand or sent by telegram or telex shall be deemed to have been given on the day it was so delivered or sent.

#### PART XIV - GENERAL

- The board shall from time to time determine whether and to what extent and at what times and places and under what conditions or regulations the documents, including accounting records, of the Foundation shall be open to the inspection of members of the Foundation, not being directors. In the absence of such determination by the board, the documents, including accounting records, of the Foundation shall not be open to inspection of any member of the Foundation, not being a director.
- 97. Any meeting of the Foundation, the members, the board or any committee, may also be held, or any member, or director or committee person may participate in any meeting of the Foundation, the members, the board, or any committee by conference call or similar communication equipment or device, so long as all the members, directors or persons participating in the meeting can hear and respond to one another. All such members, directors or persons so participating in any such meeting shall be deemed to be present in person at the stated location of such meeting and, notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws shall be entitled to vote by a voice vote recorded by the secretary of such meeting.

#### PART XV - COOPERATION

98. The Foundation shall have the right to subscribe to, become a member of and cooperate with any other society, foundation, corporation or association whether incorporated or not, whose purposes or objectives are in whole or in part similar to the Foundation's purposes.

#### PART XVI - INDEMNIFICATION

- 99. Subject to the provisions of the Society Act, each officer, director, employee or agent of the Foundation shall be indemnified by the Foundation against expenses reasonably incurred by him in connection with any action, suit or proceeding to which he may be made a party by reason of his being, or having been an officer, director, employee or agent of the Foundation, except in relation to matters as to which he shall be finally adjudged in such action, suit or proceeding to have been derelict in the performance of his duty as an officer, director or employee. "Derelict" shall mean grossly negligent, criminally negligent, or intentionally engaged in tortuous conduct with the intent to defraud, deceive, misrepresent or take advantage improperly of an opportunity available to the Foundation.
- 100. The Foundation shall, to the full extent permitted by the Society Act, indemnify and hold harmless, every person heretofore, now or hereafter serving as a director, officer or agent of the Foundation and his or her heirs and legal representatives.
- 101. Expenses incurred with respect to any claim, action, suit or proceeding may be advanced by the foundation prior to the final disposition thereof in the discretion of the board and upon receipt of an undertaking satisfactory in form and amount to the

board by or on behalf of the recipient to repay such amount unless it is ultimately determined that he or she is entitled to indemnification hereunder.

- 102. The Foundation shall apply to the Court for any approval of the Court which may be required to make the indemnities herein effective and enforceable. Each director and officer of the Foundation on being elected or appointed shall be deemed to have contracted with the Foundation upon the terms of the foregoing indemnities.
- 103. The failure of a director or officer of the Foundation to comply with the provisions of the Society Act or of the constitution or these bylaws shall not invalidate any indemnity to which he or she is entitled under this Part XV.
- 104. The Foundation may purchase and maintain insurance for the benefit of any or all directors, officers, employees or agents against personal liability incurred by any such person as a director, officer, employee or agent.

## PART XVI - BYLAWS

- 105. On being admitted to membership, each member is entitled to and the Foundation shall give him, upon payment of a photocopying charge not exceeding \$1.00, a copy of the constitution and bylaws of the Foundation.
- 106. These bylaws shall not be altered or added to except by special resolution.
- In addition to the requirements to give notice to the members of the Foundation, notice of any special resolution altering or adding to these bylaws or the constitution of the Foundation shall be mailed to each member of the board of directors of Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination according to and at the address listed in the records of the Registrar of Societies in Victoria on the day notice is given and such notice must be given at least 30 days prior to the general meeting at which such alterations will be considered. Such notice shall specify all of the proposed changes. No additional changes not specified may be made at such general meeting. Notwithstanding Bylaw 16, failure to give notice pursuant to this paragraph may, at the option of any person entitled to such notice, invalidate any special resolution altering or adding to these bylaws or the constitution of the Such option must be exercised within 16 months of Foundation. the date of such general meeting.

- Encourage churches to provide adequate compensation and retirement benefits for pastors and church staff.
- 4. Offer assistance to associations to conduct stewardship clinics.
- GOAL 5 To encourage each church to give at least 10% through the Cooperative Program by 1995.

## ACTION PLANS

- Encourage churches to give a progressive percentage increase in Canadian Cooperative Program giving.
- 2. Encourage new churches to give 10% through the Canadian Cooperative Program from the beginning.
- GOAL 6 To encourage and assist each church to develop an ongoing Church Training program by 1995.

## ACTION PLANS

- Provide field servicing, materials and other resources to churches to begin ongoing Church Training.
- 2. Inform churches of the availability of free curriculum materials for the first quarter.
- Encourage each association to have at least one major CT event per year.
- 4. Encourage leadership development in every church through the Church Study Course Program.

## OBJECTIVE III - MINISTRY

To encourage and assist cooperating churches to lead each person to relate Biblically to all people.

GOAL 1 Encourage all pastors to study and preach on the Biblical perspective of value of persons by October, 1989.

## ACTION PLANS (Goals 1-6)

- Share information with the churches concerning relevant Equipping Centers, Lay Institute For Equipping (LIFE), Christian Life Commission materials and how to use these.
- Assist associations to conduct clinics/conferences in these areas as requested.
- Encourage all our churches to have literature from the Christian Life Commission on subjects relating to ministry\* to persons available in their churches by October 1989 (or when available).

  \*Ministry expresses a practical application of the value of persons.
- GOAL 3 Train 200 pastors and church leaders by 1990 to structure their vocabulary and church programs to be genuinely responsive to their communities.

## ACTION PLANS

- Encourage and train churches to study and understand their communities in order to respond to real needs.
- Approach the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary for opportunities for Convention and Association staff and pastors to address these concerns in ministry.
- 3. Encourage each church and association to develop CMDP and AMDP.
- GOAL 4 To encourage and assist cooperating churches to develop a comprehensive church based family ministry by 1991.

#### ACTION PLANS

- Utilize the materials and resources provided by the Church Training Department and Family Ministries Department of the BSSB.
- Encourage associations to develop resource libraries of equipping centers, etc. to lend to churches.
- GOAL 5 Train 150 people in the methods for beginning church-based social ministries by December 1992.

## ACTION PLANS

- Utilize resources of the HMB and materials from CLC to develop these ministries.
- GOAL 6 Inform all churches by 1993 on ways to involve their members in community organizations and decision making processes.

## ACTION PLANS

- Encourage churches to study units in the Life and Work Curriculum and Church Training on these subjects.
- Feature articles on churches involved in this area in our Convention newspaper.

#### MISSIONS DIVISION REPORT - JACK CONNER

In November 1987 one of the goals adopted by the Convention is "To assist cooperating churches to plant 75 new churches by 1994, 30% of these being ethnic churches." Ten were to be started during 1989 and add one a year to this for a total of 75 by the end of 1994 -- that is, 11 in 1990, 12 in 1991, etc. This can be done and more. Starting new churches continues to be a major way to reach more people for Christ.

One of the great resources that has helped us in the past is pastoral supplement from the Home Mission Board. For this we are grateful. However, we will need to ask God to help us start additional new churches with very little new supplement available. Most of the budget for 1989 has been committed. But we need to continue to strengthen our existing churches while planting new churches in new communities. God "is able to do exceeding abundantly beyond all that we ask or think, according to the power that works within us, to Him be the glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations forever and ever." (Ephesians 3:20-21).

As each church responds to the leadership of Christ He will enable each church to be faithful to the Great Commission. The following new missions have started since the Convention in November, 1987:

Hope, Victoria, B.C.....Larry Wade
Church on the Point, UBC....Joe Rust
Holly Springs, Entwhistle, Alberta....Roy Williams
Hamilton Spanish, Hamilton...Julio Cornelio
Longueuil, Longueuil, PQ....Lumann Bain

There are some Bible studies that may soon become church starts. At least one church is considering becoming a part of Southern Baptists. To God be the Glory!

Again, all of the Missions Budget of the Convention is possible because of the faithfulness of each church in Cooperative Program giving. It is my prayer that each church will give on a percentage basis, each month. Also, I pray that each church will plan to increase the percentage for 1989. We must if we want to reach the nation for Christ.

At least two churches - Garden Park in Winnipeg, Manitoba and Watrous in Watrous, Saskatchewan - are planning to build new buildings this summer.

"Baptist Associations: Missionary At Heart" is the theme of this year's Associational Emphasis Week, May 16-22, 1988. The association was begun as missionary and has given its life to missions. We must commit its future to missions.

We welcome D.K. and Brenda Hale to the Northern Lights
Association. D.K. is serving as Director of Missions for that
Association. By Convention time Rev. B.E. Pitts should be in
Winnipeg as the new Director of Missions for Keystone

Association. This is a subsidy position. Plateau Association has considered a man as Director of Missions and has approved his election. He will be presented to the Convention Board for approval in Winnipeg. This was formerly a subsidy position as well. It will be presented to the Executive Board for approval that the position be upgraded to Church Strategist/Director of Missions, a full-time position. Pray for Ontario as they continue to seek God's person for their Director of Missions.

Eglise Baptiste Haitienne-Siloe, Louis Benoit, pastor, had a Building Dedication service on April 24th, 1988. The building was full as people from each of the other Haitian churches gathered for a great time. It was followed by a great time of fellowship around a potluck dinner.

## BAPTIST STUDENT MINISTRIES - JOHN NANCE

This has been the best half + year recently for Canadian Baptist Student Ministries. We have seen professions of faith on almost all of our campuses! We are seeing the first elections of student officers. We are sending our first Canadian BSM Summer Missionary overseas. Attendance at our regular weekly scheduled events is definitely on the increase. Attendance at special local events is also much larger. We have started BSM on a brand new campus - Grande Prairie Regional College. Bible studies have also begun on the campus of Northern Alberta Institute of Technology. We will have just finished our first ever CANADIAM STUDENT WEEK, May 1-6 and you will be hearing verbally about the results. There have been problems...we still are looking for local BSM Directors at Saskatoon and in the Toronto area, but...to God be the glory for the great things He is doing through Baptist Student Ministries on our campuses and in our churches!
