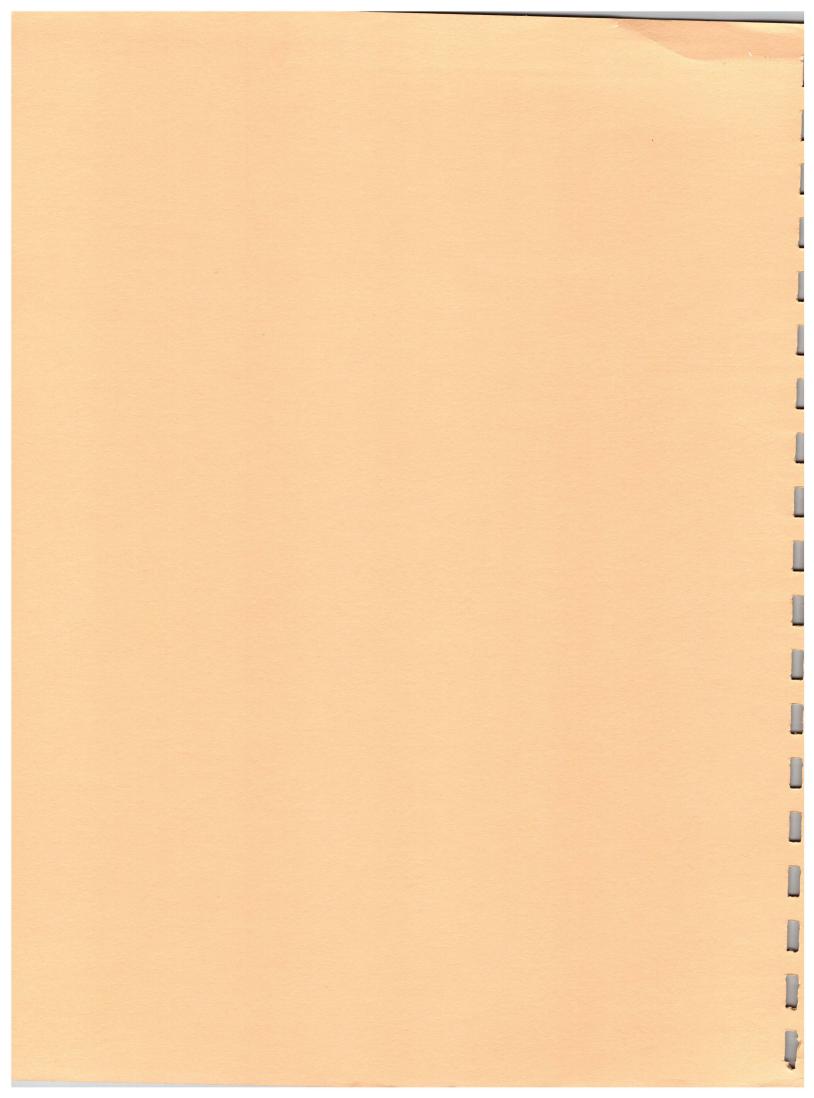

CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION

SOCIETY ACT

CONSTITUTION

- 1. The name of the Society is the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION.
- 2. The purposes of the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION are:
 - (a) to provide an entity for cooperating churches to work together to carry out Christ's mission of preaching, teaching, healing and ministering to all persons throughout the world;
 - (b) to receive bequests, trusts, funds and property, and to hold, invest, administer and distribute funds and property for the purposes of the Society as presently set out and for such other organizations as are "qualified donees" under the provisions of the Income Tax Act and for such other purposes and activities which are authorized for registered charities under the provisions of the Income Tax Act; and
 - (c) to do all such other things as are incidental and ancillary to the attainment of the purposes and the exercise of the powers of the Society.
- 3. The Statement of Faith of the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION is:

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true centre of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

A. GOD THE FATHER

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God

through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

B. GOD THE SON

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ he was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jesus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself the demands and necessities of human nature and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His death on the cross He made provision for the redemption of men from sin. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

C. GOD THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts of sin, of righteousness and of judgement. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the assurance of God to bring the believer into the fullness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence; whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin, and as soon as they are capable of moral action become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, sanctification, and glorification.

- A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace. Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and favour with God.
- B. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.
- C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the Earth. This church is an autonomous body, operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is testimony to his faith in the

final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper. The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observances. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, work of necessity and mercy only being expected.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labour that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrection and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSION

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavour to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by preeminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and

by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in his own life and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus. The Christian should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice. He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

- 4. The Society shall have perpetual succession and has power to acquire by purchase, gift, devise, bequest, trust agreement, contract or otherwise, real and personal property within and without the province, and may hold, sell, dispose of, exchange, mortgage, lease, let, improve and develop any such property, and without restricting the generality of the foregoing, may acquire in any way or ways real and personal property for the purpose of funding the purposes of the Society and deal with any and all such property as empowered by this Section.
- 5. The activities of the Society shall be carried on without purpose of gain for its members and any income, profits or other accretions to the Society shall be used in promoting the purposes of the Society.
- 6. Upon winding-up or dissolution of the Society, the assets remaining after the payment of all costs, charges and expenses properly incurred in the winding -up, including the remuneration of a liquidator, and after payment to employees of the Society of any arrears of salaries, or wages, and after the payment of any debts of the Society, shall be distributed among and to such registered Canadian charities as are affiliated with or involved with the ministry of the Southern Baptists as shall be designated by the directors. If that shall not be possible the assets shall be distributed to such charities, registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act, as shall be designated by the directors. Any of such assets remaining which had originally been provided for specific purposes, shall, wherever possible, be distributed to charities registered under the provisions of the Income Tax Act carrying on work with similar nature to such specific purposes.
- 7. Paragraphs 3 and 7 are alterable.
- 8. Paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 8 are unalterable.

CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION

BYLAWS

PART I - INTERPRETATION

- 1. In these bylaws and the Constitution of the Society, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - "agency" means an organization, whether or not incorporated, set up or a relationship entered into with an organization or person which requires accountability to the Convention and the purpose of which is to facilitate the carrying out of specific activities and programs of the Convention;
 - (b) "board" means the directors acting as authorized by the constitution and bylaws of the Society in managing or supervising the management of the affairs of the Society and exercising the powers of the Society;
 - (c) "bylaws" means the bylaws of the Society as filed in the Office of the Registrar of Companies in Victoria;
 - (d) "Convention" means the meeting of messengers held in accordance with these bylaws;
 - (e) "Cooperating Baptist Church" means a church determined at that particular point in time by the Convention in accordance with Part III of the bylaws to be a Cooperating Baptist Church;
 - (f) "directors" means the directors of the Society for the time being elected or appointed in accordance with Part VII of these bylaws;
 - (g) "Executive Board" means the Executive Board of the Convention as elected in accordance with the provisions of Part IV of these bylaws;
 - (h) "institution" means an organization with its own constitution and bylaws set up by and accountable to the Convention and the purpose of which is to facilitate the carrying out of the specific activities and programs of the Convention;
 - (i) "members" means the Applicants for incorporation and those persons who subsequently have become members in accordance with these bylaws, and, in either case, have not ceased to be members;
 - (j) "messengers" means the persons accepted by the Convention as messengers in accordance with these bylaws;
 - (k) "registered address" of a member means his address as recorded in the register of members;
 - (l) "Society" means the CANADIAN CONVENTION OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS DENOMINATION;
 - (m) "Society Act" means the Society Act of the Province of British Columbia from time to time in force and all amendments to it;

- (n) "Statement of Faith" means the Doctrinal Statement of the Society as set out in the Constitution.
- 2. Except where they conflict with the definition contained in these bylaws, the definitions in the Society Act on the date these bylaws become effective apply to these bylaws.

PART II - MEMBERSHIP

- 3. Membership in the Society shall be restricted to the applicants for incorporation and those persons who are then elected as messengers to the Convention by Cooperating Baptist Churches. Between meetings of the Convention membership in the Society shall be restricted to those persons who are elected to the Executive Board of the Convention and the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention. All such persons shall be admitted as members of the Society immediately upon their application for membership being received by the Society. All such persons shall be member only by virtue of his or her office as a current messenger or as a current member of the Executive Board of the Convention or as the current Executive Director-Treasurer and shall remain members only so long as he or she holds such office.
- 4. There shall be no annual membership dues.
- 5. Any member may withdraw from the Society by delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or by mailing or delivering it to the address of the Society.
- 6. A person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Society:
 - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or upon delivering it to the address of the Society; or
 - (b) upon his death.
- 7. There is no manner in which a member may be expelled.
- 8. The membership of a person in the Society is not transferable.
- 9. All members shall be in good standing as long as such member is a member in good standing of a Cooperating Baptist Church.

PART III - CONVENTION

- 10. The Society shall hold a Convention at least annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Society.
- 11. The Convention shall consist of messengers who are members of Cooperating Baptist Churches who are elected and certified by Cooperating Baptist Churches.
- 12. Each Cooperating Baptist Church with up to 50 resident members shall be entitled to a minimum of four messengers with the right to send one additional messenger for each additional fifty resident members or major portion thereof to a maximum of twelve messengers.
- 13. Messengers from new Cooperating Baptist Churches may be seated at an annual Convention session by a two-thirds vote.

- 14. As an autonomous Baptist entity the Convention reserves the right to determine what constitutes a Cooperating Baptist Church. Cooperating Baptist Churches will be those churches which are in sympathy with the purposes of the Society, and are cooperating with and contributing financially to its work and have not adopted a statement of faith in conflict with the Statement of Faith of the Society.
- 15. The Convention shall be the final judge of its messengers' qualifications and whether a church is a Cooperating Baptist Church. Cooperating is voluntary and any church may withdraw at its discretion.
- 16. Should a church cease to cooperate with the Convention or become corrupt in doctrine or practice, as determined by the Convention, it shall no longer be a Cooperating Baptist Church and its messengers shall be refused seating. Such church will be considered no longer in fellowship with the Convention until it reapplies and is accepted again by the Convention as a Cooperating Baptist Church.
- 17. The Convention shall respect the autonomy of each Baptist body and shall not exercise ecclesiastical authority or control over any Cooperating Baptist Church.
- 18. Except as otherwise provided in the Constitution and Bylaws, <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> shall be the parliamentary guide in conducting the business of the Convention.
- 19. Visitors to the Convention may be granted the privilege of speaking, but not voting. Only duly elected messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches may vote at a Convention.
- 20. Messengers must register with the Credentials Committee and provide certification from their Churches that they are duly elected messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches before voting in the Convention Business Sessions.
- 21. In addition to messengers from Cooperating Baptist Churches, an invitation shall be extended to Churches from outside Canada which are sponsoring missions in Canada, to elect two messengers from each of their missions in Canada. Upon registering and being accepted by the Credentials Committee such messengers shall have full voting rights in the Convention business sessions.
- 22. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.
- 23. The Convention shall express its official position only by vote of the messengers and the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society. The receiving, acceptance or adoption of a report shall not, in the absence of specific implementing motions be construed as authorizing action by the Convention's or the Society's Committee's, employees, boards, agencies or institutions.
- 24. Special meetings of the Convention may be called or a change of time and place for the annual meeting of the Convention may be made by the President or Executive Director-Treasurer, with the consent of the Executive Board, provided at least 30 days' written notice is given to all messengers attending the last Convention and to Cooperating Baptist Churches listed in the most recent annual. A printed agenda shall accompany such notice.

PART IV - CONVENTION MANAGEMENT

25. The officers of the Convention shall be the President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President and Executive Director-Treasurer.

- 26. The President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the annual Convention after nominations from the floor for a term of office of one year and shall be full voting members of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 27. No person is eligible for election to the office of President for more than two consecutive one year terms. After a person has been elected to serve two full one year terms as President he shall not be eligible to be elected President again.
- 28. The messengers shall also elect a minimum of twelve persons who shall as nearly as possible be persons equally distributed from the Cooperating Baptist Churches with not more than three persons elected belonging to Cooperating Baptist Churches in the same association as full voting members of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 29. A person shall have been a member of the Cooperating Baptist Church for at least one year prior to election to be eligible to be elected as a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 30. No person (or their spouse) employed by the Executive Board, agencies or institutions of the Convention or Society shall be eligible for election to the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 31. The Executive Board shall consist of both ministers and lay persons of not more than two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board shall be drawn from either category.
- 32. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice annually.
- 33. Elected members of the Executive Board of the Convention may be nominated and elected to four consecutive one year terms. No person having served on the Executive Board for four consecutive one year terms shall be eligible for re-election to the Executive Board until one year has passed. One-fourth of the Executive Board positions shall be rotated annually.
- 34. In elections where there are more candidates than there are vacant positions, an election shall be by secret ballot with the name of each duly nominated candidate appearing individually on the ballot. Candidates shall be deemed to be elected when they receive a majority of votes cast.
- 35. Each messenger shall not vote for more officers or members of the Executive Board than there are vacant positions. If more names are selected on any one ballot than there are such vacant positions, that ballot shall be deemed to be void.
- 36. Each member of the Executive Board shall retire from office at the close of the Convention in the year in which his or her term expires.
- 37. The President or in his absence or at his request, the First Vice-President, or in his absence or at his request, the Second Vice-President, shall preside as the chairman of the meetings of the Convention.

PART V - MEETING OF MEMBERS

38. The general meetings of the Society shall be held at such time and place, in accordance with Society Act, as the board shall decide.

- 39. Every general meeting of the Society other than an annual general meeting is an extraordinary general meeting.
- 40. The board may, whenever it thinks fit, convene an extraordinary general meeting of the Society.
- 41. The Society shall give not less than 14 days written notice of a general meeting of the Society to its members entitled to receive notice of a general meeting; but those members may waive or reduce the period of notice for a particular meeting by unanimous consent in writing.
- 42. Notice of a general meeting of the Society shall specify the place, the day and the hour of the meeting.
- 43. The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting of the Society to, or the non-receipt of notice by, any of the members entitled to receive notice does not invalidate proceeding at that meeting.
- 44. The first annual general meeting of the Society shall be held not more than fifteen months after the date of incorporation and thereafter an annual general meeting of the Society shall be held at least once in every calendar year and not more that fifteen months after the holding of the last preceding annual general meeting.

PART VI - PROCEEDINGS AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- 45. All proceedings at a general meeting of the Society shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, except that, should there be any conflict between any section of these bylaws and Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised these bylaws shall prevail. All business at an extraordinary general meeting shall be "special business" and all business that is transacted at an annual general meeting shall be "special business" except:
 - (a) consideration of the financial statement;
 - (b) the report of the directors, if any;
 - (c) the report of the auditor, if any;
 - (d) the election of directors;
 - (e) the appointment of the auditor, if required;
 - (f) such other business that, under these bylaws or any governing statutes, ought to be transacted at an annual general meeting, or business as brought under consideration by the report of the directors issued with the notice of the meeting.
- 46. No business, other than the election of a chairman and the adjournment or termination of the meeting, shall be conducted at a general meeting of the Society at a time when the quorum is not present.
- 47. If any time during a general meeting of the Society there ceases to be a quorum present, business then in progress shall be suspended until there is a quorum present, or until the meeting is adjourned or terminated.
- 48. A quorum is the greater of one-half of the members then in good standing or three members.
- 49. If within thirty minutes from the time appointed for a general meeting of the Society a quorum is not present, the meeting, if convened on the requisition of members, shall be terminated; but in any other case, it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week, at the same time and place, and if, at the adjourned

meeting, a quorum is not present within thirty minutes from the time appointed for the meeting, the members present constitute a quorum.

- 50. The President of the Society or in his absence, the First Vice-President, or in his absence the Second Vice-President, or in the absence of any of the foregoing, one of the other Directors present shall preside as chairman of a general meeting of the Society; but if at any general meeting the President, or the First Vice-President or the Second Vice-President is not present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the general meeting, or requests that he not chair that general meeting, and there is no other director present willing to act as chairman, the members present may choose one of their number to be chairman of that general meeting.
- 51. A general meeting of the Society may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at an adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
- 52. It is not necessary to give notice of a adjournment or of the business to be transacted at an adjourned meeting except where a meeting is adjourned for ten days or more, in which case notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given as in the case of the original meeting.
- 53. All resolutions proposed at a general meeting of the Society must be seconded and the chairman of such a meeting may not move or propose a resolution.
- 54. Any issue at a general meeting of the Society which is not required by these bylaws or the Society Act to be decided by a special resolution shall be decided by an ordinary resolution unless the bylaws dictate otherwise.
- 55. A resolution consented to in writing by every member of the Society who would have been entitled to vote on it in person shall be deemed to be a special resolution passed at a general meeting of the Society.
- 56. A member in good standing present at a meeting of members is entitled to one vote.
- 57. The chairman may vote, but if he does so and the result is a tie, he shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie and the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 58. Voting shall be by a show of hands or a voice vote and the secretary of such meeting shall record the vote, provided always that the majority of the persons present and eligible to vote may determine that a secret vote by a written ballot is required.
- 59. Voting by proxy is not permitted.

PART VII - DIRECTORS

- 60. The board may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Society may exercise and do, and which are not by these bylaws or by statute or otherwise lawfully directed or required to be exercised or done by the members in general meeting, but subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of:
 - (a) all laws affecting the Society;
 - (b) these bylaws; and
 - rules, not being inconsistent with these Bylaws, which are made from time to time by the Convention.

- 61. No rule made by the Convention invalidates a prior act of the board that would have been valid if that rule had not been made.
- 62. The property and the affairs of the Society shall be managed by the board.
- 63. The number of directors shall be fifteen or such other number, not being less than three, as may be determined from time to time by an ordinary resolution.
- 64. Directors shall be those persons elected by the messengers at the Convention to the Executive Board of the Convention and shall hold office commencing at the close of the Convention at which such person was elected to the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 65. Directors may serve for four consecutive one year terms. Notwithstanding Bylaw 68, no person served on the board for four consecutive one year terms shall be eligible for re-election to the board until one year has passed. At least one-fourth of the board shall be rotated annually.
- 66. Notwithstanding the foregoing bylaws, the persons whose names are listed in the List of First Directors filed with the Registrar at the time of incorporation shall be the first directors and the first year of their term shall be deemed to terminate at the close of the first annual general meeting of the Society.
- 67. A person must be a member of a Cooperating Baptist Church in order to be eligible to be a director of the Society.
- 68. Every director shall retire from office at the close of the Convention in the year in which his or her term expires; but if no successor is elected or appointed the person previously elected or appointed as director continues to hold office.
- 69. No act or proceeding of the board is invalid by reason only of there being less than the prescribed number of directors in office.
- 70. The members may, by special resolution, remove an elected director of the Society before the expiration of such director's term of office.
- 71. A person shall immediately cease to be a director of the Society:
 - (a) upon delivering his resignation in writing to the Secretary of the Society or upon delivering it to the address of the Society; or
 - (b) upon ceasing to be a member in good standing or of a Cooperating Baptist Church;
 - (c) upon his death; or
 - (d) upon failing to attend or participate in two consecutive meetings of the board of which he had notice, unless the board passes a resolution, evidenced in writing, specifically waiving this condition with respect to a named member.
- 72. No director shall be remunerated for being or acting as a director, but a director may be reimbursed for all expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by him while engaged in the affairs of the Society.
- 73. The board shall have the power to make expenditures for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Society. The board shall have the power to enter into trust arrangements or contracts on behalf of the Society for the purpose of discharging obligations or conditions either imposed by a person donating, bequesting, advancing or lending money to the Society, or assumed by the Society in expectation of such

donations, bequests, advances or loans. Such arrangements or contracts shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions that the board may prescribe.

- 74. The board shall take such steps as it deems necessary to enable the Society to be the beneficiary of such donations, bequests, trusts, contracts, advances or loans for the purpose of furthering the purposes of the Society. The board in its sole and absolute discretion may refuse to accept any bequests, trusts, funds or property.
- 75. In investing the funds of the Society, the board shall not be limited to securities and investments in which trustees are authorized by law to invest, but may make any investments which are prudent. Subject to the provisions of the Society Act, the directors as a body shall not be liable for any loss that does not arise from any fault on their behalf, but which may result in connection with any such investments made by them.

PART VIII - PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD

- 76. The meetings of the board may be held at any time and place to be determined by the board, provided that 3 days notice of such meeting shall be sent in writing to each director. However, no formal notice shall be necessary if all directors are present at the preceding meeting or waive notice thereof in writing or give a verbal waiver to the Secretary of the Society.
- 77. The board may from time to time fix the quorum necessary to transact business, and unless so fixed, the quorum shall be a simple majority of the directors in office at the time when the meeting convenes.
- 78. The President shall be chairman of all meetings of the board; save that if at any meeting the President is not present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the meeting to commence, or the President requests that he or she not chair that meeting, the directors present may choose one of their number to be chairman of that meeting.
- 79. The President and the Executive Director-Treasurer or any three directors may convene a meeting of the board.
- 80. For the purposes of the first meeting of board held immediately following the appointment or election of a director or directors at an annual or other general meeting of members, or for the purposes of a meeting of the board at which a director is appointed to fill a vacancy in the board of directors, it is not necessary to give notice of the meeting to the newly elected or appointed director or directors for the meeting to be properly constituted.
- 81. All resolutions proposed at a meeting of the board must be seconded and the chairman of a meeting may not move or propose a resolution.
- 82. A simple majority of votes cast at a meeting of the board shall be required to pass a resolution of the board.
- 83. The chairman may vote, but if he does so vote and the result is a tie, he shall not be permitted to vote again to break the tie. In those circumstances the resolution being voted on shall be deemed to have failed.
- 84. Voting shall be by a show of hands except as otherwise provided. At the request of any one director, a secret vote by written ballot shall be required.

85. A resolution in writing, signed by all the directors and deposited with the Secretary, is as valid and effective as a resolution of the directors passed at a meeting of the board.

PART IX - COMMITTEES

- 86. The President and the First and Second Vice-Presidents shall serve as a committee on committees and shall nominate to the Convention at its first session necessary committees to serve the following year. One alternate for each committee shall be elected to fill any occurring vacancy.
- 87. It shall be the responsibility of the Nominating Committee to bring to the Convention nominees to serve on the Executive Board of the Convention and any trustees of institutions and agencies.
- 88. The board may delegate any, but not all, of its powers to committees as it thinks fit.
- 89. A committee so formed, and in the exercise of the powers so delegated, shall conform to any rules that may from time to time be imposed on it by the board, and shall report every act or thing done in exercise of those powers at the earliest meeting of the board to be held next after it has been done, or at such time or times as the board directs.
- 90. The members of a committee may meet and adjourn as they think proper and the meetings of committees shall be governed by the rules set out in Part VII of these bylaws, which rules govern the meetings of the board.
- 91. There may be an Executive Committee consisting of directors of which there must be at least three, elected annually by the board at the first meeting of the board held after the annual general meeting of each year.
- 92. Subject to the control of the board the Executive Committee shall have power to transact all business of the Society in the interim between the meetings of the board. Three members shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the chairman of the Committee or of any two members thereof.
- 93. The board may create such standing and special committees as may from time to time be required. Such a committee shall limit its activities to the purpose or purposes for which it is appointed, and shall have no powers except those specifically conferred by a resolution of the directors. Unless specifically designated as a standing committee, any special committee so created must be created for a specified time period only. Upon completion of the earlier of the specified time period or the task for which it was appointed a special committee, the committee in question shall automatically be dissolved.

PART X - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 94. The persons elected to the office of President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President of the Convention shall concurrently be elected to the office of President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President of the Society for a term of office of one year.
- 95. The President shall be an ex officio member of all boards and committees of the Convention and the Society.

- 96. A person may be removed from the office of President or First Vice-President or Second Vice-President by a resolution passed at a meeting of the board by a majority of not less than 75% of all the directors.
- 97. The First or Second Vice-President shall succeed to the office of President in the order of their election in the event that the office of President is vacated between annual sessions of the Convention.
- 98. The board may appoint and remove such other officers of the Society as they deem necessary and determine the responsibilities, term and remuneration, if any, of all officers.
- 99. The Secretary shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements for:
 - (a) the issuance of notices of meetings of the Society and directors;
 - (b) the keeping of minutes of all meetings of the Society and the board;
 - (c) the custody of all records and documents of the Society except those required to be kept by the Treasurer;
 - (d) the custody of the common seal of the Society;
 - (e) the maintenance of the register of members; and
 - (f) the conduct of the correspondence of the Society.
- 100. The Treasurer shall be responsible for making the necessary arrangements for:
 - (a) the keeping of such financial records, including books of account, as are necessary to comply with the Society Act; and
 - (b) the rendering of financial statements to the directors, members and others when required.
- 101. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one person who shall be known as the Executive Director-Treasurer.
- 102. In the absence of the Secretary from any meeting, the directors shall appoint another person to act as secretary at that meeting.

PART XI - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

- 103. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall be elected by the messengers at the Convention for an indefinite tenure of office after nomination by the Executive Board. When the position of Executive Director-Treasurer is vacated, a search committee shall be elected by the Executive Board from members of Cooperating Baptist Churches.
- The Executive Director-Treasurer shall plan, coordinate, and promote the activities of the Convention through its boards, departments, committees, agencies and trustees. He shall receive and disburse all funds coming under the direction of the Convention and/or the Executive Board of the Convention. He shall give to the annual session of the Convention and at least twice annually to the Executive Board complete and accurate reports of all funds received and disbursed. He shall receive and disburse designated funds accepted by the Board as directed by the donor, and shall be bonded in sufficient amount as to insure faithful handling of all funds. He shall submit to the Executive Board an annual audit of all funds handled and disbursed.

The Executive Director-Treasurer shall serve ex officio as secretary of the Convention and its Executive Board. He shall faithfully keep accurate minutes of all sessions of the Convention and the Executive Board. He shall cause these to be published in suitable form in the annual of the Convention, together with the

Constitution and Bylaws and such other information as the Convention or its Executive Board deems necessary and proper. He shall be an ex officio member without voting privileges of all boards and committees of the Convention.

PART XII - SEAL

- 105. The board may provide a common seal for the Society and it shall have power from time to time to destroy such seal and substitute a new seal in the place of the seal destroyed.
- 106. The common seal shall be affixed only when authorized by a resolution of the board, and then only in the presence of the persons prescribed in the resolution, or, if no persons are prescribed, in the presence of the Executive Director-Treasurer and the President. In the absence of the Executive Director-Treasurer or the President, the First Vice-President and/or the Second Vice-President may substitute for them.

PART XIII - BORROWING

- 107. In order to carry out the purposes of the Society the board may, on behalf of and in the name of the Society, raise or secure the payment or repayment of money in the manner it decides, and in particular, but without limiting the foregoing, by the issue of debentures.
- 108. No debenture shall be issued without the previous passing of a special resolution.
- 109. The members by special resolution may restrict the borrowing powers of the board, but such a restriction imposed shall expire at the next following annual general meeting.

PART XIV - AUDITOR

- 110. The Society shall have an auditor.
- 111. The first auditor shall be appointed by the board which shall also make appointments to fill all vacancies occurring in the office of auditor.
- 112. At each annual general meeting thereafter the Society shall appoint an auditor to hold office until he is re-elected or his successor is elected, at the next following annual general meeting.
- 113. An auditor may be removed by an ordinary resolution.
- 114. An auditor shall be promptly informed in writing of his or her appointment or removal.
- 115. No director and no employee of the Society, nor the spouse of such person, shall be auditor.
- 116. The auditor may attend general meetings.

PART XV - AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

117. The Society shall control all institutions and agencies it deems necessary to fulfill its purposes.

- 118. The Convention alone shall authorize new institutions and agencies and these only after a study by the Executive Board and favorable action by two successive Conventions, one of which shall be an annual meeting.
- 119. The trustees of institutions and agencies shall report to and be accountable to the Convention through the Executive Board.
- 120. The executive officers of institutions and agencies shall be nominated by the trustees of those institutions and agencies and serve at the pleasure of the Executive Board.
- 121. The trustees of institutions and agencies shall present to the Executive Board a policies and procedures manual which shall be used in the development and operation of the institution or agency.
- 122. The financial affairs of the Convention and its agencies and institutions shall be planned on a calendar year basis, January 1 to December 31.
- 123. Convention Boards, committees and trustees shall present budget recommendations to the Executive Board at least ninety (90) days before the annual session of the Convention.
- 124. All persons who handle funds or securities of the Convention or Society shall be adequately bonded or insured. The securities of all Society agencies and institutions shall be placed in a safety deposit vault in a bank, trust company or credit union for safe keeping.
- 125. Each agency and institution of the Convention shall submit a semi-annual report to the Executive Board which includes total receipts, total expenditures and financial position. The annual audit of each agency and institution shall be printed in the Convention annual.
- 126. As normal operating policy, each agency and institution of the Convention shall refrain from entering into any business transaction with a trustee or employee, or any business enterprise in which a trustee or employee has an interest. An exception to this policy may be made by the Executive Board.
- 127. Each agency and institution of the Convention is hereby instructed and ordered to keep all trust funds and designated gifts sacred to the trust and designation. Trust funds and designated gifts shall be kept separate from all other funds and are not to be used, even temporarily, for any other purpose than the purpose specified.
- 128. Total debt or liability in excess of \$20,000.00 or involving more than one year repayment shall not be incurred without approval of the Convention.
- 129. The chief administrative officer of any agency, institution, or board of the Convention whose funds are falling below anticipated budget income by as much as 20% at the end of any quarter shall immediately notify the Chairman of the Executive Board and the officers of the Convention.

PART XVI - NOTICES TO MEMBERS

- 130. Notice of a general meeting shall be given to:
 - (a) every person shown on the register of members on the day notice is given;
- (b) the auditor, if appointed or required by the Society Act; No other person is entitled to receive a notice of a general meeting.

- 131. A notice may be given to a member either personally or by mail to a member at such member's registered address fourteen days prior to the commencement of a meeting.
- 132. A notice sent by mail shall be deemed to have been given on the second day following that on which the notice is posted, and in proving that notice has been given it is sufficient to prove the notice was properly addressed and put in a Canadian post office receptacle.

PART XVII - GENERAL

- 133. The board shall from time to time determine whether and to what extent and at what times and places and under what conditions or regulations the documents, including accounting records, of the Society or the Convention shall be open to the inspection of members of the Society, not being directors. In the absence of such determination by the board, the documents, including accounting records, of the Society shall not be open to inspection of any member of the Society or the Convention, not being a director.
- 134. Any meeting of the Society, the members, the board or any committee, institution, or agency may also be held or any member or director or committee, institution or agency person may participate in any meeting of the Society, the members, the board, or any committee, institution or agency by conference call or similar communication equipment or device so long as all the members, directors or other persons participating in the meeting can hear and respond to one another. All such members, directors or other persons so participating in any such meeting shall be deemed to be present in person at the stated location of such meeting, and notwithstanding the foregoing by-laws, shall be entitled to vote by a voice vote recorded by the secretary of such meeting.
- 135. The Society shall have the right to subscribe to, become a member of and cooperate with any other society, foundation, corporation or association whether incorporated or not, whose purposes or objectives are in whole or in part similar to the Society's purposes.
- 136. The Society may purchase and maintain insurance for the benefit of any or all directors, officers, employees or agents against personal liability incurred by any such person as a director, officer, employee or agent.

PART XVIII - BYLAWS

137. This Constitution and these bylaws shall not be altered or added to except by special resolution. Such special resolution cannot be voted on until the proposed alterations and additions have been presented in writing to the Convention, debated by the messengers and approved by a majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the Convention. The proposed alterations and additions as amended by that Convention shall be held over to the next annual Convention and after further debate the proposed alterations and additions may be changed in form but not in character and if passed by a two-third's vote of the messengers present and voting at the Convention shall be able to be voted on by the members by special resolution.

PROCEEDINGS

The Convention general sessions were preceded by a Missions Conference. The theme of the Conference was "Crossing Barriers With The Gospel". Speakers included Richard and Wendy Buckley, Journeymen in Yemen; Henry and Ila Mae Dueck, missionaries in Zimbabwe; Convention Ethnic Missionaries Julio Cornelio, Jerry Wortman and Gerry Taillon; and Convention President, Paul Johnson.

TUESDAY EVENING, MAY 9, 1989 - JIM GRAHAM PRESIDING

- 1. Tommy Lyons, Minister of Music, Trinity Baptist Church, San Antonio, Texas, led in congregational singing and worship in music. Tommy Lyons served as music director for all sessions. Mrs. Charlotte Lyons was the pianist for all sessions.
- 2. Paul Johnson, President, led in prayer.
- 3. Jerry Wortman, Ethnic Missionary: Native Indian, presented the theme interpretation from Isaiah 54:1-

3.

- 4. Paul Johnson, President, called to order the Fifth Annual Meeting of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and welcomed all present to the session.
- 5. Paul Johnson recognized the other officers of the Convention that had served over the past year, Bill Blackmon, First Vice President, pastor Faith Baptist Church, Saskatoon, SK; and Jim Graham, Second Vice President, pastor Westlynn Baptist Church, North Vancouver, BC.
- 6. Vic Morrison, Victory Baptist Fellowship, Lloydminster, SK, presented the report of the Credentials Committee and moved that those messengers duly elected by their churches, presently registered and those yet to register be seated and compose these sessions of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists. Carried.
- 7. Jim Graham, presented the report of the Order of Business Committee, and moved the acceptance of the agenda of the meeting as presented. Carried.
- 8. Vic Morrison, brought the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and moved that the following churches be seated: Hope Baptist Church, Victoria, B.C.; Selkirk Baptist Church, Selkirk, Manitoba; Mission Baptist Church, Kelowna, B.C.; Mapes Baptist Church, Vanderhoof, B.C.; and River South Baptist Church, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Roy Parker, Salmo Baptist Church, Salmo, BC, moved to amend the motion to read that the four churches (Hope Baptist Church, Selkirk Baptist Church, Mapes Baptist Church, River South Baptist Church) be seated and that the seating of Mission Baptist Church be referred back to the Credentials Committee to evaluate further and bring a new recommendation to the Convention. Second Jack McKay, Vancouver, BC. Motion defeated.

Original motion carried.

- 9. Jim Graham introduced Rev. Jim Yoder, pastor of Gladstone Baptist Church, who brought greetings and a welcome on behalf of the Vancouver churches and the Capilano Association.
- 10. Jim Graham introduced Rev. Jonathan Cheung, pastor of Vancouver Chinese Baptist Church, who brought greetings and a warm welcome from the host church.
- 11. Jonathan Cheung introduced the Right Honourable Dr. David Lam, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of British Columbia, who brought greetings as a representative of the Queen, the Province of British Columbia and a fellow Baptist.

- 12. Jim Graham introduced a group of young people of the Capilano Southern Baptist Association " New Image" and they presented special music and drama.
- 13. Paul Johnson, President, brought a message from Esther 4: 12-16. He encouraged the Convention to recognize the rich heritage we have as Southern Baptists and to draw on that rich heritage; to recognize that we have been called to a task we have a job to do; and to look to the future for our identity, an identity from those whose lives we as Canadian Southern Baptists need to touch.
- 14. Jim Graham led in prayer.
- 15. Jim Graham called on Allen Schmidt, Executive Director-Treasurer to introduce the new pastors, workers and staff present at the meeting and led in prayer for them.
- 16. Paul Johnson called the meeting into a business session.
- 17. Paul Johnson called on Mike Richardson, Village Hills Baptist Church, Delta, BC, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, to bring the report and recommendations of that committee.

REPORTS

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER'S REPORT

Since we met in convention a year ago in Winnipeg, God has blessed us richly in many ways. At our meeting last year we noted that our Seminary owed more than \$250,000.00 from the water line and completion of the building. In an act of faith our Convention voted to set a goal of \$150,000.00 for our fall Harvest Mission Offering and dedicate the offering toward paying off the debt. Our churches responded marvellously, and in some cases sacrificially, giving more than \$100,000.00. God then laid it on the heart of Second Baptist Church, Houston, Texas, to contribute \$75,000.00 to the fund. Along with other gifts this put us over the top and allowed us to pay off the total debt. To God be the glory!

Our Convention staff works diligently and cooperates beautifully to serve the churches in every way possible. A total of eight new works were begun in 1988. Hundreds of people were trained by our ASSIST Team workers and others. Our Convention received an award from the Sunday School Board for leading every association in Canada to conduct VBS Clinics. We also received a plaque for an outstanding number of our people receiving Church Training Study Course Awards.

We began publication of our own Canadian newspaper, <u>"The Baptist Horizon"</u>, in September, 1988. Nancy McGough is our volunteer editor and Catherine Schmidt volunteers the typesetting. Both are doing an excellent job. We have received numerous compliments on the quality and the appearance of our paper from Baptist State Convention editors and publishers. It is nice to get a compliment from anyone...but to get a compliment from a professional in the field is even nicer.

Our Evangelism Conferences this past January were the best attended and the most enthusiastically supported of any we have held thus far. A total of more than four hundred people attended the meetings in Vancouver, Edmonton, Regina and Toronto. Those participating appreciated the expanded conference time on "The Dynamics of a Growing Church" by Dr. Ken Carter; and "Principles of Sunday School Growth", led by Allen Schmidt. The Evangelism Conferences in 1990 will be equally helpful with Dr. Charles Roesel from Florida and Dr. Jeff Pound from Ohio as guest speakers.

Florida Baptists have offered to help us with the "Here's Hope" revival meetings in the spring of 1990. They will supply, free and postpaid, evangelists and singers for our meetings. Get your requests in now! An association in North Carolina is teaming up with Midwest Association for the "Here's Hope" meetings.

Along with the blessings there come some challenges. Special offerings have been very generous. Lottie Moon was over \$68,000.00; World Hunger over \$11,000.00; Annie Armstrong is coming in well. Our churches and our people far exceed the Southern Baptist average in giving to special offerings. Our weakness is in our regular giving through our Cooperative Program. This is the base/the lifeline of our Convention operation and our Missions Program. Our churches last year gave an average of only 6.5% of total undesignated gifts through the Cooperative Program. Southern Baptists gave an average of 8.7%. To continue to expand our support for our churches and our mission outreach, we must increase contributions through our Cooperative Program.

Another challenge we face that is creating a budget crunch is the rise of the Canadian dollar. For every cent the dollar rises vis-a-vis the U.S. dollar, it costs us an extra \$9,000.00 on our budget. The Finance Committee worked diligently on the 1990 Budget and trimmed a total of \$40,000.00 Canadian below the 1989 Budget. However, it will still cost an extra \$35,000.00 in Canadian Cooperative Program to meet the smaller budget due to the dollar's rise.

As we move forward boldly proclaiming God's grace in the power of His Spirit, and faithfully claiming God's promises, supporting each other in prayer and offering words of encouragement, we can meet every challenge before us!

MISSIONS DIVISION REPORT

June is Baptist Heritage Month in Southern Baptist life. The theme for the 1989 emphasis is "Cooperation: A Southern Baptist Trademark". This idea has been true since 1845. "Combining and directing the energies of the whole denomination in one sacred effort, for the propagation of the Gospel" is still a key factor in what we do as Southern Baptists.

As Canadian Southern Baptists we exist to do missions. All other programs or activities are secondary. The central emphasis is on cooperation. This cooperative effort has enabled many good things to happen in the last year among our churches in Canada. Eight new congregations started since May of 1988. They are:

This brings to a total of ninety-eight congregations presently in the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists with forty of these being church type missions. Thirty-two of this ninety-eight are Ethnic congregations. We should be well over one hundred before the end of 1989. There were twelve new pastors called since May, 1988. We need fourteen more pastors now for pastorless churches. The goal for new church starts in 1989 is ten.

We received approximately \$925,381.00 in 1988 from the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Disbursements to the Associations were \$875,782.00 -- a tremendous cooperative effort. This simply points out the need for us to continue to support and increase our Cooperative Program giving. This is true of the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, Harvest Missions Offering and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Our churches averaged giving 6.3% of the undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program. Associational Mission giving was 2.5% of the undesignated receipts for a total of \$66,012.00. These were figures reported on the 1987-88 Uniform Church Letters. Some churches had not reported at the time of this report. Just a 1% increase would have enabled us to have available an additional \$235,646.00 from the Home Mission Board for mission work. Wouldn't it be great for each congregation to move toward 10% giving through the Cooperative Program as a minimum? This would enable us to do even more mission work, for it to be more "ours".

There was an increase to \$191,422.00 in Cooperative Program giving in 1988 from 1987 of \$181,048.00 - or a 5.6% increase. There was a decrease in the Annie Armstrong Offering from \$19,812.00 in 1987 to \$18,406.00 in 1988. This must not continue. Perhaps this was caused some by the increased giving through the Harvest Mission Offering for a total of \$86,946.00 from our churches.

Congratulations go to Midwest Association of churches who continue to lead in mission giving by a considerable margin.

Two churches, Garden Park in Winnipeg and New Life in Grande Prairie, moved into their new buildings this past year. Watrous in Saskatchewan hopes to be able to complete their building debt free by the end of 1989. Redboine in Winnipeg and Sheba in Montreal purchased buildings for themselves. Great!

Plateau has their new Director of Missions, John and Kayloma Capps, in place. By the middle of June, Capilano, Midwest and Ontario should have new Directors of Missions. The Associations have approved them. We are sorry to lose D.K. and Brenda Hale as Director of Missions in Northern Lights. D.K. is moving back to pastor. Thanks D.K. and Brenda for the good job well done in the year plus in Northern Lights.

As Southern Baptists our missionary programs are under central control of the Convention. The concept of electing trustees with management authority and responsibility to the churches provides a practical, trust-based working relationship with a continued accountability to the Convention in annual session. A cooperative style of messenger system is the principle of representation. Messengers come from cooperating and supporting churches. Cooperation is our way to reach a lost world for Christ.

Our celebration taught us that the organization begun by our foremothers has matured with age, has adapted to the mission needs of today, and continues to provide the best channel for Southern Baptist Women and girls to grow in missions, leadership and service. Inspired by those who have gone before, we step into the future reaffirming our purpose of promoting and supporting missions. We desire to help our churches fulfill their mission and to help educate in missions.

The Uniform Church Letters show 839 enrolled in our W.M.U. organizations. We sense a new interest in providing missions education for the people in our churches.

We were able to lead conferences in three of our churches in Ontario. Gladys Goertzen from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan and Jimmye Winter from Birmingham, Alabama, helped us in Ontario, in Keystone Association, and in Northern Lights Association. Ellen Kibblewhite from Edmonton, Alberta, helped us in Northern Lights Association also. I trained the Midwest W.M.U. officers and led conferences for three churches in Plateau Association. I participated in a missions meeting in Capilano Association.

CHURCH GROWTH DIVISION

Canadian Southern Baptist churches are expressing excitement about church growth. Our churches are reaching out in evangelistic outreach as well as training and discipling church members. This year's statistics show a growing use of outreach, Bible teaching, and discipling tools.

The Baptist Sunday School Board gives strong support to our efforts in church growth. During the year they provided forty consultants from the BSSB and some State Conventions to lead various training events in our Canadian work. Twenty-eight were funded by the Board. Oklahoma Baptists provided for much of the funding of the twelve Growth Campaign directors. The BSSB also paid for training outside of Canada for some twenty of our Canadian Southern Baptists. They provided many thousands of dollars beyond the Church Growth budget for help in carrying out major Church Growth projects such as Summer Youth Celebration, the Canadian ASSIST Institute and VBS Clinic, etc. Finally, they provided our Convention and associations with some \$5,000.00 worth of free materials and resources for use in training.

<u>SUNDAY SCHOOL</u>: Twenty-three organized projects which focused on Sunday School outreach and leadership training were carried out by our associations during the past year. Nearly all of our churches and missions participated in one or more of these efforts. Canada was recognized by the Baptist Sunday School Board as having the highest percentage of training in church leadership in the SBC. As they put it, "Canada has the best trained Southern Baptists for this year."

Two associations, Capilano and Keystone, were awarded diplomas for having Standard Associational Sunday School Programs. Two other Canadian associations will probably also meet those requirements. If so, Canada may be awarded the BSSB plaque in 1988-89 for the highest percentage of Standard associations in the SBC.

By the 1989 ASSIST Institute, Canadian Southern Baptists had named seventy-five ASSISTeam members across our Convention. Most of these associational leaders in Sunday School training attended the ASSIST Institute held in Calgary March 16-17, 1989. There, Baptist Sunday School Board consultants led them in new and updated training in key areas of how to teach Sunday School outreach, growth, curriculum, planning, and administration.

Our Canadian Convention also received a BSSB plaque this year for holding VBS clinics in every association, one of only five conventions to do so. The training helped our churches to enroll over 4,000 people in Vacation Bible School and Backyard Bible Clubs last summer. George Knight gave exceptional leadership in guiding our Canadian VBS Teaching Team as they prepared at Glorieta and then trained the associational VBS teams.

Midwest Baptist Association held a Sunday School Growth Campaign in April, 1989. Twelve churches participated. Many new prospects were located; the churches received much good training in growth techniques, and at least eighty people were immediately enrolled in Bible study for the first time. Plateau Association has begun preparations for their Campaign next May.

CHURCH TRAINING: If the SBC approves the name change in June, Church Training will become Discipleship Training. However, under whatever name, training disciples continues to be one of the highlights of Canadian Southern Baptist life. "Summer Youth Celebration" came to Canada for the first time this past year. One hundred and thirty-three youth and youth leaders attended this wonderful event coordinated by Barbara Wyman, Director of Church Training for the Canadian Convention. Led by Dr. Clyde Hall, worship leaders of the Harbor music team, with preaching by Dr. Don Wilton from New Orleans Baptist Seminary, all of the youth were stretched spiritually. Eighteen youth leaders expanded their abilities to guide our young people in the five day intensive learning experience. Sixty-eight youth made public commitments and decisions of various kinds during the week. Many youth and leaders are already making plans for the 1989 Summer Youth Celebration, July 31 - August 4, 1989.

Church Training also coordinated a New Member Orientation tour by Dr. Henry Webb of the BSSB, attended by seventy-eight Church Training leaders. In February, Dr. William Stephens led Midwest pastors in a teaching clinic for the 1989 Baptist Doctrine Study, <u>Doctrines Baptist Believe</u>. He also led Plateau

Association in the study of the doctrine study, The Priesthood of the Believer.

A DiscipleYouth I Workshop was sponsored by the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary and the Church Training Department on April 28-30, 1989. The intensive course in how to use youth discipleship materials could be taken for Seminary credit. Twenty participants attended representing churches from Montreal to Victoria. Four language groups were represented - Spanish, Chinese, French and English.

Children's Bible Drill has been used successfully in at least four churches. This is an excellent tool for training children in use of the Bible.

The Canadian Convention's Church Training Department earned two BSSB plaques this year in areas of training. Midwest Association had two churches recognized for being among the top twenty-five churches in the entire SBC in the total number of Church Training awards received during the year. The Vancouver Chinese Baptist Church was honored through the Church Training Magazine for its large and effective MasterLife program which has trained one hundred and sixty-eight certified MasterLife leaders.

CHURCH MUSIC: Marian Owens, volunteer Director, CCSB Church Music Department, continued to gain experience in leading the Convention's efforts in music curriculum, evangelism, worship participation, and leadership. Generally, one or two BSSB-led field service events per year in music will be available to Canada. Capilano availed themselves of this opportunity this past year through a Youth/Adult Music Workshop. Mrs. Owens will help our churches to develop their programs of music through associational workshops and other creative training events and procedures. Requests for help with music needs should be directed to Mrs. Owens.

CHURCH ARCHITECTURE: A two-week tour of Capilano, Plateau, and Midwest Associations (covering 4,000 miles) was made last year by Dr. David Wyman and Dr. Robert Lowry, BSSB Church Building Consultant. Twenty-nine churches and pastors received consultations on church facilities needs. During the year churches in four associations completed building projects and dedicated new education and/or worship facilities. Contact is being maintained by Dr. Lowry with a number of our churches in regard to building plans and actions. We are grateful for his ongoing relationship with the Canadian Convention.

CHURCH MEDIA LIBRARY: A large step forward was made in media library training this year. Mrs. Kathy Seidler accepted the position of volunteer Media Library Consultant for the Church Growth Division. She will lead in developing field servicing, leadership resources, and consultation in church media library ministries. Mrs. Seidler brings excellent academic credentials and library experience to the task. We are grateful for her acceptance of this role. Dr. Glynn Hill, BSSB consultant, led a Church Library Development Conference for ten Midwest church members in March. He also worked with the Seminary in developing the Curriculum Lab which is provided for our Seminary by the BSSB and other SBC agencies and updated each quarter.

SPECIAL EDUCATION: Marybelle Cruikshank, Church Growth Consultant in Special Education, along with her husband, Mel, received training in Special Education at Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly last summer. She recently took time off to have their third child but continues to develop resources and contacts to help lead our churches in ministering to families and individuals with needs in Special Education. Please contact Mrs. Cruikshank regarding any church needs in this area. Tens of thousands of prospects for our churches could be included by ministering through meeting Special Education needs.

<u>BAPTIST TELNET</u>: Individual churches will be encouraged to subscribe to BTN in the coming years rather than our Canadian Convention trying to provide the service by recording and mailing tapes. The cost of distributing BTN through the Convention would be prohibitive.

BAPTIST STUDENT MINISTRIES

The year of 1988-89 was a year of growth for Canadian Baptist Student Ministries. That growth showed itself in most facets of Baptist Student Ministries. God guided in the reaching out and helping more students make professions of faith. Many of those new Christians have already been baptized and are growing in their Christian faith. There is also a growing involvement on the part of students in their local churches.

There are also new Baptist Student Ministries forming in new locations, such as Okanagan College, Kelowna; Senaca College in northern Toronto; revived Bible studies at Kwantlen College in Vancouver; and Bible studies at Moose Jaw Technical Institute.

Programming, both locally and nationally, also showed evidences of growth. The first Canadian Student Week was held in May 1988 at Deer Valley Meadows Camp near Red Deer, Alberta. Over sixty participated in the week long emphasis of "God's Best In Me For The World". Speakers included Charlie Baker, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Woolf, and Henry Blackaby, with music led by Candy Smith. We will have just finished our second annual Canadian Student Week immediately before the Canadian Southern Baptist Convention.

During the Fall of 1988, we held our first regional BSM Conventions. The Prairies BSM Convention met last Fall in Calgary at Willow Park Baptist Church and at the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary in Cochrane. Very calculatedly, we are striving to have Seminary personnel on all Regional and National BSM events in order to acquaint BSM'ers with the Seminary. The British Columbia BSM Convention was held in early November at Mt. Baker Baptist Conference Center just inside Washington State. The combined attendances at the two regional BSM conventions was almost double what it had been two years earlier in Saskatoon at that national BSM Convention.

Attendances at regular weekly meetings of local Baptist Student Ministries has also grown during 1988-89. The regular weekly activities usually include Bible Studies - most led by students themselves; a "worship" time usually with singing, speaker on topic of importance to students, and sharing time; an emphasis upon both local and summer missions; and regular monthly fellowship activity. God is guiding to have more such activities planned and led by student leaders. This creates the need for more training for student leadership and for involving more people on committees in order to reach out and help still more people to become Christian and grow in their Christian faith. Along the way, God is working through Baptist Student Ministries to help "call out the called".

Laura Cloppert, a student at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, was one of two BSM students sent as 1988 summer missionaries. Laura served in the Philippines and returned to share some "trying times", but a clear sense of God's calling to career foreign missions. David Latta served in the Plateau Association.

In the summer of 1989 we will be sending out three Canadian BSM summer missionaries: (1) Dave Brooks from Douglas College in Vancouver will be serving in the Philippines; (2) John Tsui from Alberta College of Art in Calgary will be serving in the Sacramento Association in California; and (3) Joy Nightingale from the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg will be serving at the Douglas-Naco Baptist Center in Arizona. Canadian BSM students raise funds to send and support their chosen BSM summer missionaries. The funds raised are beyond the tithe and with special projects. This year, for the first time recently, the summer missionaries were interviewed locally, selection was made nationally; and agencies notified well within the prescribed time limitations! In other words, God is helping our BSMs grow in concern and doing things together and in a proper order! In addition, many other BSM students serve under the Home Mission Board in summer missions.

Tennessee Student Work is forming a tentative partnership with Ontario Student Work. Plans were laid during this current year for Tennessee sending regularly student missionaries who will serve for a full academic year as local BSM Directors at colleges in the greater Toronto area.

Work has also progressed in development of Associational Student Work Committees (Councils). We now have working Councils in Capilano, Plateau, Midwest, Northern Lights, Keystone and Ontario

Associations. These Associations have received some guidance/training from the new pamphlet published in Nashville about their responsibilities and work. The Associational Student Work Councils have also begun to join, with the National Director, in annual evaluations of each local BSM Director.

We believe that the growth in Canadian Baptist Student Ministries is helping us fulfill the mandate we have both from God and the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists "to help students to personally follow Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour; and to help students to grow in grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ (II Peter 3:18 NASB); and to encourage students to become involved in a local church in their campus community."

We have retained Blake Bromley of Douglas, Symes & Brissenden, Vancouver, B.C., as legal counsel. His office is the registered office of the Foundation.

Your Foundation has requested support from the Convention and the Seminary to allow the Foundation to manage funds for the benefit of our Southern Baptist institutions, such as wills, living trusts, endowments, scholarships, RRSP's.

Your Foundation would also desire to establish an Endowment Fund for the Seminary to fund a portion of the operating costs of the Seminary.

As well, plans have been discussed to establish a "Minute Man" revolving site loan fund. Individuals would be enlisted to be on call to make up to two donations annually to provide funds to make the initial purchase of land for new church type missions.

CANADIAN SOUTHERN BAPTIST SEMINARY

The second academic year of the Seminary is complete. It has been an exciting year of growth, challenge, and change. Presently there are twenty-five students enrolled in the M.Div. program, five in the Associate program, and two are auditing classes. In addition, thirteen students are enrolled in the mini course on "Baptist Polity" being taught in Edmonton.

The best news, and that to which we give praise to our Lord Jesus Christ, is the reaching of the Challenge goal of \$250,000.00. The Seminary is now debt free. The reaching of the goal is a significant

event in the brief history of the school. I wish to give special thanks to each individual and to every church which chose to give their support in the meeting of this goal. I am proud of Canadian Southern Baptists for their generous response to this challenge.

Coming and going is a part of any school. Coming to help us in the administrative offices is Mrs. Georgia Stanford. Georgia, a Mission Service Corps appointee through the Foreign Mission Board, is from Jackson, Mississippi. Georgia is doing a good work and we are glad to have her here. In February, E.V. and Fran May returned to Livingston, Texas. E.V. served for over a year as bookkeeper at the Seminary. We thank them for coming our way, and appreciate their work on our behalf.

Another departure is forthcoming. James Teel has announced his retirement from the Foreign Mission Board effective this August. James and Georgie will return to Abilene, Texas, where James will work as a Development Officer for Hardin-Simmons University. We will miss the Teels. James has made a tremendous investment in the development of the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary. He has been an integral part of the school from its beginning. We are grateful to James for his deep love and tireless commitment to the establishment of the Seminary. We pray for God's finest blessings on the Teels. Thank you for your ministry to each of us.

As we began our second year of class, the faculty became aware of the difficulty in implementing the current curriculum. The difficulty is seen in the almost physical impossibility of five professors being able to adequately cover a full curriculum of ninety-six hours. This curriculum requires ninety-six credit hours for completing the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) degree, as well as the Associate Degree. The curriculum requires thirty-two courses, therefore, leaving little room for electives.

After a lengthy study of the curriculum, the faculty concluded that the present curriculum could be retained with little modification, except for the number of credit hours given in each course. The faculty recommended to the Board of Trustees that we offer the curriculum on term system (meaning a course every day for two months, with the student taking a maximum of four courses per term). This change will allow the faculty to cover the curriculum design of ninety-two credit hours, and also allow the student to choose sixteen credit hours for electives. The Trustees approved the recommendation.

This year the Seminary has offered intensive mini courses as part of the Continuing Ministry Education program. These courses will typically be one week in length with sixteen hours of instruction plus outside work. The student can earn one-hour credit on either the Master's or Associate level for work completed. We encourage pastors and interested laypersons to participate in these courses. The mini courses for this year are:

"Baptist Polity" - Dr. Broadus Hale, February-March, Edmonton

"DiscipleYouth Workshop" - Dr. Clyde Hall, April 28-30, Cochrane

"Working With Volunteers in a Local Church" - Dr. William Caldwell, May 1-5, Cochrane

"Counselling for Laymen" - Dr. Wayne Cook, May 15-19, Vancouver

"Planning For Growth" - Dr. Bob Tucker, May 15-19, Vancouver

"Studies In Proverbs" - Dr. Duane Garrett, May 29-June 2, Calgary

In conclusion, I express heartfelt gratitude to our Seminary faculty. I rejoice in the fine quality of men God has brought together to form the teaching team of this school. They love the Lord, they love one another, and demonstrate an intense commitment to the task before them. And in case you think I intentionally omitted something, they especially love the students. These men are also active participants in their churches, association, and in the activities of the Convention.

I commend to you our fine staff and volunteer personnel who serve our school: Mettie Jane Workun, Shelley Robinson, Danny Valdez, Kevin Cook, Catherine Schmidt, Andi Cook and Meg Tucker.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1988

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

The Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists (the Convention) commenced operations on January 1, 1985 as an unincorporated, non-profit organization. The Convention incorporated on April 8, 1987 as the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists Denomination under the Society Act of the Province of British Columbia.

The purpose of the Convention is to provide a channel for co-operating churches to work together to carry out Christ's mission of preaching, teaching, healing and ministering to all persons throughout the world.

The Convention consists of messengers who are members elected and certified by Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing financially to its work. The Executive Board, elected by the Convention, handles the Convention's affairs and functions as the Convention between its annual meetings.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and reflect the following policies:

Basis of statement presentation

These financial statements include the accounts of the Convention and the accounts of the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary, an educational institution controlled by the Convention.

Fund accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Convention, the financial statements are presented in accordance with the principles of fund accounting.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances are grouped into four funds which are classified according to nature and purpose as follows:

General Fund - Convention

Undesignated general funds are used by the Executive Board to carry on the general operations of the Convention. The general fund consists primarily of Convention-approved budget items for programs and administration. The principal sources of revenue are from member churches, Baptist Sunday School Board and the Home and Foreign Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention.

General Fund - Seminary

Undesignated general funds are used by the Seminary Board of Trustees to carry on the general operations of the Seminary.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1988

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fund accounting (continued)

Designated Funds

Designated funds account for amounts given by donors for specific purposes.

Capital Fund

The capital fund accounts for general funds expended for the Convention's facilities and depreciation thereof. This fund also accounts for the financing of the facilities with debt service costs being funded by general revenue.

Accrual basis of accounting

The accounting records of the Convention are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting summarized as follows:

Revenue

Unpledged contributions from member churches are recognized when received. Home Mission Board revenues relating primarily to the reimbursement of budgeted expenses are recognized in the year of the expenditure.

Expenditures

Administrative, program and other expenditures are recorded in the year incurred.

Income taxes

The Convention is a registered charity as defined in Section 149 of the Income Tax Act of Canada and is exempt from Federal and Provincial income taxes.

Land, buildings and equipment

Land, buildings and equipment are stated at their original cost. These assets are depreciated on the straight-line method for the Convention and the diminishing-balance method for the Seminary at rates (Note 4) calculated to depreciate the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Inventory

Inventory of bibles is stated at the lower of cost and replacement cost.

3. WORLD MISSIONS

It is the Convention's policy to give 20% (1987 - 20%) of its undesignated receipts from Canadian churches to World Missions via the Cooperative Program administered by the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). The Executive Board of the Convention has elected to retain a portion of its Cooperative Program gift for use within Canada. Therefore, 20% (1987 - 20%) of undesignated receipts from Canadian Churches has been used as follows:
