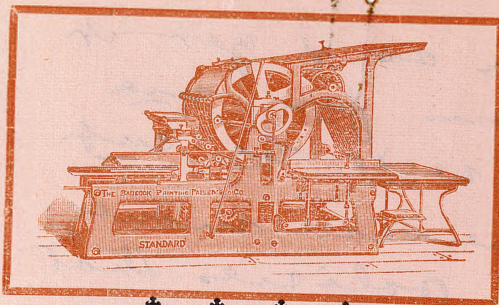

Dear Bro. Willingham:—

I wish you a Happy New
year, and may God's richest bles-
sings be on you and yours.

My dear Brother, I am happy
to say that we are not being
bothered by the rebellion down
here, except in the matter of
subscriptions—they are slow in
coming in, as business has been
paralyzed in many places. Here
everything is at a stand still, but
we are hoping that soon the
clouds will clear away. We have
kept our preachers I think all
straight and will come out in
good condition.

I am writing you principally
to inform you that we are plan-
ning to build us a little home
out in the suburbs. We will
still be in town and not so far
away from our work as to inter-
fere in the least with it. I will
have to borrow some money
and as long as I have to pay the
interest, will expect to continue

drawing the rent, but as soon as I get it paid for, the rent proposition for me as long as I stay in Leon will be cut off. I have about \$700.00 American money and have two life insurance policies that I can draw some \$300.00 on - I mean as a loan. I will want to borrow about \$1000.00. I was thinking that the Board had a trust fund, or something, that they loaned on interest, of course, and that perhaps they might let me have some money that way. If I am mistaken, then no harm is being done. I can pay it back at the rate of about \$300.00 a year, besides the interest, after the first year. If there is nothing of this, and I do not remember how I get the idea in my head, you will know how to overlook it. I wanted to advise you of my plan any way before beginning it, so you would know just what I was about to do. I will not lose any time on account of it, and guarantee to "hold fair" as we Missourians sometimes say, in every particular.

I am nearly sick with a cold today. We are having a few days of rainy, cold weather, that we call here "los carburelos," common to this season of the year. It does not rain hard, but drizzles two or three days and then after some two or three weeks come for. Hoping my long letter will not weary you, and wishing you a prosperous 1911. I am fraternally J.
