My dear Brother Davis:

I have this morning your letter of Sept. 30, and I am greatly pleased with it. It is this sort of cooperation that will help to keep the Foreign Mission Board out of debt, make it a steady and strong helper to the missionaries, and stimulate confidence all-round. I will go over the estimates in the light of your figures and hope the Board may grant all that you ask. I had reviewed the estimates and had written Brother Marrs about some items for the Publishing House which seem to me excessive.

You are doing exactly right in pressing the Argentine and Cuban brethren to pay their bills. This Board makes appropriations to cover the needs of all the fields, and I presume the Home Board does the same things for Cuba, and you ought not to be put at a disadvantage and forced to make a poor showing for your work by the delinquency of other missions.

I am hoping to attend the Texas Convention the first of December, and if you can get away from your work, it will be a pleasure to see you at Dallas.
