Dear Brother Davis:

I appreciate greatly your letter of Aug. 29. I have been missing your letters. Please do not treat me in such silence again. I always enjoy hearing from you. I am profoundly interested in what you are doing and want to keep up with it very closely.

I do not believe it will be possible for the Board to appropriate as much as \$1,000 a month next year for the Publishing House, but we will come just as near doing that as we can.. I will say to you that I think it more important this year to keep the Mexican Publishing House going, because we shall be able to appropriate only a very little sum to the Publishing plant in Buenos Aires, or in Chile, and so ask the missionaries in those countries to use freely the publications the Mexican Publishing House will put out. I cannot tell just now the exact sum which we will appropriate for you, but I do want to assure you that we will go the limit of our ability.

I am glad to hear you are in good health. May God prosper you in all things.

The Emergency Offering has not yielded as much as we hoped it would give, but it has given us enough to possibly pull us through to the end of the year. We have been able to effect some savings which have helped us.
