



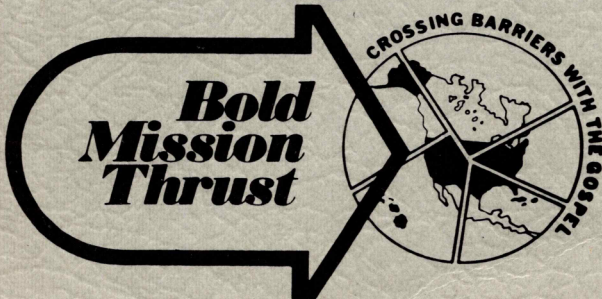

SECTION II
CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Section 1. This body shall be known as the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio (affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention).

ARTICLE II

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Section 1. We adopt as our statement of Faith, **The Baptist Faith and Message**, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

ARTICLE III

CONSTITUENCY

The Convention shall consist of Messengers elected by the Southern Baptist churches cooperating with and making financial contributions to the work of the Convention during the current year.

Section 1. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers for the first 50 members or fractional part thereof, and one (1) additional messenger for each 50 members thereafter, or major part thereof, provided no church shall have more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. The churches represented by messengers shall be friendly to this Convention and in agreement with its purpose, work, and with the Statement of Faith in Article II.

Section 3. The messengers shall be elected and certified by the churches to the Convention.

ARTICLE IV

OBJECT

Section 1. The Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority whatever over its separate churches or assume to write creeds or exercise control over its separate churches.

Section 2. This Convention is purely a co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which its component churches in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all enterprises which they collectively deem necessary in carrying out Christ's Great Commission.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a president, two (2) vice-presidents, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected annually by this Convention and shall be duly installed at the closing session of this Convention, and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected and installed (except the executive secretary who shall be employed for an indefinite period by the Executive Board).

Section 3. The president may be elected for only two one year terms in succession.

ARTICLE VI

BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to appoint such boards, trustees, and committees, standing or temporary, as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. These boards, trustees, and committees shall make detailed reports to this Convention of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VII EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. There shall be an Executive Board elected by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its cooperative work and handle its affairs between annual meetings.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president, first vice-president, second vice-president, recording secretary and assistant recording secretary of the Convention, with a maximum of sixty (60) members who shall be chosen by the Convention at the annual meeting.

Section 3. A member of this Board must have been a member for at least one year of any church qualified to seat messengers at the Convention. The term of office for members of the Board shall be three years. Any member who is elected to fill an unexpired term shall be eligible for re-election. After a member shall have served for a three (3) year term, one (1) full year must elapse before he is eligible for re-election.

Section 4. The executive secretary shall be the administrative officer of this board and shall make a full report of the work committed to it. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be bonded.

Section 5. This Board shall appoint all staff members, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work of each.

ARTICLE VIII PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of this Convention, the report of the Executive Board, and such other useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention, shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE IX ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and time and place of meetings may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Executive Board in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE X SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All designated funds paid into the Treasury of the Convention shall be applied as designated.

Section 2. All undesignated funds paid into the Treasury of the Convention shall be distributed among the agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention or otherwise, according to percentage agreement adopted by this Convention.

ARTICLE XI STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

Section 1. All staff members employed by the Executive Board shall furnish evidence of piety and zeal for the Master's work, agree with the Statement of Faith in Article 2 and have talent for Christian service.

ARTICLE XII CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

Section 1. Any alterations may be made in these articles, except Article IV, Section 1, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken, without regard to total enrollment at any annual meeting of the Convention, provided, no amendment may be considered after the second day of the Convention and that the amendment shall have been presented at the previous annual meeting in writing.

*Note: The Constitution appears here as it was amended in 1972 and again in 1974. The action of the Convention in amending the Constitution is found in the annual for those years.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses until same has been presented to the Executive Board and proper publicity has been given and the churches fully informed as to the purpose of such move.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the Convention without notice served as provided by Section 1 of this Article.

Section 3. In case any proposal not conforming with the above requirement shall come to the Convention, this proposal must be held in abeyance until the next meeting.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Sessions of the Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2. Persons invited to seats in the Convention shall have the privilege of speaking in debate, but not of voting.

Section 3. Each member when he speaks in debate, or has any communication to make to the Convention shall address the President and be recognized.

Section 4. No member shall speak oftener than twice in any debate on the same day without unanimous permission from the Body.

Section 5. When a member shall be called to order he shall sit down until the President has determined whether he is in order. An appeal may be made from the decision of the President in this as in any other case.

Section 6. When the President shall desire to be heard in debate, or to be temporarily absent, the Chair can be taken by one of the Vice-Presidents, or by some member whom the President may select.

Section 7. Any question that is not provided for by the foregoing rules, shall be decided according to Roberts Rules of Order.

Section 8. The foregoing rules may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Nominating Committee at the State Convention shall nominate all Board members as called for in Article VII, Sections 2 and 3 of our Constitution.

Section 2. A minimum of five (5) Executive Board Members shall be selected at large from over the State Convention territory.

Section 3. For the other members of the Board there shall be one (1) member from each associational area having 2,000 members of co-operating churches or a major fraction thereof, provided that no more than three (3) members shall be chosen from each associational area on this basis. Not more than one (1) member shall be elected from any one church.

Section 4. At least one-third of the Board members shall be required for a quorum.

Section 5. Members shall attend at least one out of two meetings unless providentially hindered, and in such cases notice shall be given to the Board. Two successive absences without notification shall give the Board the right to appoint a new member to replace the absent one. In the event a vacancy occurs in the Executive Board between annual Convention sessions, the said Board shall elect a replacement for the unexpired term. The President shall appoint a representative Nominating Committee to make nominations.

Section 6. The board members shall take office on January 1, and serve until December 31 of the year they are to rotate off.

Section 7. The President of the State Convention shall appoint the Nominating Committee, which shall include one representative from each Associational area. These members of the Nominating Committee shall be appointed and notified one month prior to the annual meeting.

 November 1-3, 1978**

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION NOVEMBER 1, 1978

1. The 25th Annual Convention of Baptists in Ohio was opened by Brother John LaPrarie leading us in singing "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name." Brother George H. Ellis, Jr., led in prayer.
2. T. A. Benefield, host pastor, welcomed Ohio Baptists to the Toledo area, and extended greetings to all from the churches in the Northwestern part of Ohio.
3. John Brashear, chairman of the Program Committee, made a motion to adopt the printed program with all necessary changes as our program to follow. Seconded and carried.
4. Glen Davidson, chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave a report that 265 messengers and 49 visitors had registered and he had examined the registration and found all to be in order, and he made the motion to seat these messengers, and they and all others from cooperating churches make up the body of this State Convention. Seconded and carried.
5. President Jack Tichenor appointed the following committees:

15. James Pinkley led the congregation in singing "Send The Light," and George W. Bryant led in prayer.

16. John Brashear, Chairman of the Program Committee, introduced Dr. D. L. Lowrie, pastor of First Baptist Church, Texarkana, Texas, as our Bible teacher. Dr. Lowrie led in an overall theme of The Church Proclaiming. His first Bible study was from Acts 2:1-21, "The Power for a Proclaiming Church". 1. The Power is provided according to promise. 2. The Power is provided in a Person. 3. The Power is provided as a Gift.

17. Dr. Roberts presented the Executive Board report, pointing out the mission giving of our churches, and brought the report up to date with October figures. He presented the new accountant in the office, Miss Melba Welker.

18. Recording Secretary Jim Varns presented the summary of the actions of the Board which included: the organization of the Board, Executive Board personnel changes, staff personnel changes and proposals, financial actions, and the general actions. Seconded by Ed Kirk. Brother Efird spoke to the amendment. Stanley Clark made a motion to amend the amendment, the Pastors' Wives' Conference be designated \$300.00 of this money. Seconded by James Efird and carried.

Charles Burress spoke against the amendment and Lamar O'Bryant spoke for the amendment. Amendment carried. Budget carried.

22. Book Store announcements were made by Jon Fisher, manager of the Book Store.

23. James Pinkley led in the singing of "Ring The Bells of Heaven."

24. Dr. Roberts introduced Dr. Porter Routh, executive secretary of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. Dr. Routh stated that Ohio is the sixth highest out of 34 conventions in their percentage giving to the Cooperative Program. He spoke concerning the Bold Mission Thrust, that the goal of Southern Baptists is by the year 2000 to make Jesus known to every person in the world and to have an opportunity to respond. Dr. Routh presented a study that Gallup Poll had made, and the results were that people are open to Bible study, and they are ready to or are on a search for a religious life.

State Convention program that there would be no way we could get our business done if they were allowed to do this. Motion defeated.

82. Election of Officers.

Brother Tichenor referred to Article V of our constitution and named the officers that are needed.

Art Patterson nominated T. J. (Jack) Tichenor. James Goforth moved that all nominations cease and that Brother Tichenor be nominated President by acclamation. Carried. (Brother Tichenor's acceptance speech "Lord, Forgive them, for they know not what they do!")

5 — On Retirement Provision *

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention has taken action which appears to provide funding to supplement the retirement provisions of the Annuity Board program and **WHEREAS** the funds to accomplish this supplement are expected to be derived from the Cooperative Program, Be it resolved that we object to the precedent being established in the apparent unwise use of the Cooperative Program funds which should be employed within the intent with which these funds were given, particularly in view of our Bold Mission Thrust. Be It Further Resolved that we feel that any such continued action may have an adverse effect upon our churches' response to our challenge to sacrificial giving through the Cooperative Program. Be It Further Resolved that the Ohio Convention call for a moving toward adequate provisions for all Southern Baptist Church and Convention employees on a fair and equitable basis.

This will be adjusted for cost of living increases. In addition, he will be provided secretarial help after retirement and his expenses for attending annual meetings of the Southern Baptist Convention will be paid by the Convention." This resolution was adopted by a 73 to 63 margin.

Salary Arrangements for Joint Support of Missionaries for 1979

For the first twelve area directors listed below, the State Convention provides the following Personal Benefits: (1) Retirement benefits equal to 5% of salary and housing after 5 years employment; (2) a \$50,000 accident insurance policy, (3) a Christmas bonus of 1% of the salary; and (4) workman's compensation.

Travel expenses are paid by the State Convention from a fund based on \$4,000 for each area director. A basic \$170 per month is paid, plus 7¢ per mile for convention business, plus other business related expenses. Most of the associations provide some extra funds for convention expenses.

The Home Mission Board pays 50% of the premium costs of an Insurance Plan (including Hospitalization, Major Medical and Term Insurance) for each man. The State Convention pays \$5 per month of the balance and the associations are asked to provide the balance (about 46% of the total cost).

II. PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT HIGHLIGHTS

1. ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY-TREASURER

The objective of the assignment is to share with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer the responsibility of taking care of administrative details of the state convention.

- (1) Mission gifts from churches properly accounted for and disbursed according to budget of state convention.
- (2) Worked with Finance Committee in planning and preparing proposed budget for 1979.
- (3) Salary analysis and revised fringe benefits including retirement, insurance programs, etc., for convention employees.
- (4) Material prepared and arrangements made for printing of convention pocket diaries.
- (5) Insurance on all convention property kept up-to-date.
- (6) Family Bible Conference Week at Seneca Lake had a record attendance of 130.
- (7) Two new pastors and staff orientations had a total attendance of 92.
- (8) Resignation of Property Management Director increased workload with regard to auto leasing plan for convention personnel, maintenance of buildings, etc.
- (9) We were without a bookkeeper for two months following the resignation of Miss Bea Addington, and the coming of Miss Melba Welker, as our new accountant. Other office personnel went the second mile in taking care of the workload and are to be commended for their service.
- (10) Office personnel changes during past year were as follows: Virgil Barnett resigned as Property Management Director, effective December 25, 1977. Executive Secretary and Associate Executive Secretary assumed responsibilities of this department. Miss Bea Addington resigned as bookkeeper May 2, 1978. Miss Melba Welker was employed as accountant June 5, 1978. Duane Carter replaced Bruce Dorrough as printing supervisor in September, and Lloyd Bullock replaced Paul Rickles as building maintenance and custodial supervisor in August. Miss Kim Williams served as part-time secretary in the BSU department for the summer.
- (11) Several meetings of Baptist Benevolences, Inc. trustees with regard to proposed retirement center resulted in continued progress of plans.
- (12) Conference was provided for associational stewardship chairmen at Annual Associational Leadership Conference held at Seneca Lake in May.

2. ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The "Southern Baptist Retirement Program," administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, along with the Insurance Services of life insurance, medical insurance and long term disability, protects not only the pastor and his family, but the church as well by relieving the financial crisis which can be created so suddenly by death, disability, sickness, or retirement of the pastor. The Annuity Board, in

cooperation with the state convention, is committed to providing the best programs of protection possible at the lowest possible cost.

(1) **ANNUITY BOARD REPORT TO THE 1978 BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION**

A "time of contrasts" is a phrase used by Dr. Darold H. Morgan, Annuity Board president, to describe the denominational insurance and pension planning organization's financial state of affairs in recent times.

"Even though we have been able to count many blessings which have resulted from strong growth in new retirement accounts," Dr. Morgan explains, "the contrasts have resulted mainly from an erratic stock market performance — an occurrence that has influenced investment strategy strongly."

At the end of the second quarter of 1978, total assets administered by the Annuity Board stood at \$539,242,775. The Board marked a milestone in its 60-year history during the first quarter when assets surpassed a half billion dollars.

Premium and dues through the first two quarters of 1978 reached a record \$25,305,031. Through June this year, the Board distributed \$7,211,220 to 13,662 annuitants.

Churches entering the retirement program since January 1, 1978 numbered 154. In 1977, a record total of 545 new churches enrolled in the basic retirement plan.

By mid-summer, the number of members joining the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program totaled more than 5,000. The program was officially inaugurated on January 1.

A total of 21,176 churches and associations are participating currently with 24,613 employees in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

(2) **ROUTE 10 PROMOTION**

Realizing that the basic plan and Social Security will not be adequate at retirement, the Annuity Board is encouraging the churches to set a goal of 10% of salary and house allowance for retirement. If the goal cannot be achieved immediately, a plan for increasing the amount for retirement each year should be adopted until the 10% goal is reached.

The State Executive Board has adopted a formula for upgrading convention personnel over a five year period in order to reach the 10% goal.

(3) **STATISTICS FOR STATE CONVENTION OF BAPTISTS IN OHIO — 1978**

- Members enrolled in Family Benefit Plan as of July 1, 1978 — 408. (385 churches and associations; 23 state convention).
- New members enrolled in Basic Plan since January 1, 1978 — 28. (Approximately 190 churches have upgraded their pastor's retirement in the Ohio Convention.) Many churches are also using the medical benefit plans, the level term life insurance and long term disability as a means of providing fringe benefits for their pastor.
- Protection is provided for Executive Board members and Foundation Directors under Special Risk Accident Insurance.

(4) **ANNUITANTS**

There are 30 annuitants living in the State of Ohio. The Annual Annuitants' Breakfast is held each year during the Annual State Convention Meeting. Officers elected in 1977 as follows: Leonard Stigler, president; Jack Tichenor, vice-president; and L. H. Moore, secretary.

Following is a list of those who have joined annuitant rolls in the

past year:

- A. Death benefits for family of Reverend Roger Powell, former pastor of East Patterson Road Baptist Church, Dayton, Ohio.
- B. Death benefits for family of Reverend Paul O. Thomas, pastor of Stonelick Baptist Church, Batavia, Ohio. (Brother Thomas was approved for disability benefits, but died before the first check arrived.)
- C. Disability benefits for Reverend Charles A. Clark, pastor of Maple Heights Baptist Church, Fairborn, Ohio.
- D. Retirement applications were filed for Reverend William F. Atto, Loveland, Ohio and Clarence H. Eiland, former Ohio pastor, now living in Slidell, Louisiana.

(5) **ANNUITY RECOMMENDATIONS**

- A. That churches not participating in the retirement program vote to enroll their pastor at the earliest possible time for the protection of the church, pastor and his family in the event of disability, death, or retirement.
- B. That churches already participating in the basic plan of the Southern Baptist Retirement Program consider the possibility of upgrading the pastor's retirement to 10% of salary and house allowance. Some advance should be considered each year.
- C. That churches consider use of "medical insurance," "group life insurance" and "long term disability" as a means of providing protection for the pastor through fringe benefits that are tax exempt.

III. **STATE CONVENTION SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

The State Convention Scholarship Fund is limited, and the amount set as a goal in the state convention budget is pro-rated according to mission gifts received from the churches.

Much correspondence is necessary before files are processed and properly set up for presentation to the State Executive Board. Following approval of the Board, checks are mailed, proper people informed, and publicity given through the *Ohio Baptist Messenger*.

Files are in various stages of completion and additional scholarships will be granted as budget permits. Some of these to be considered by Executive Board on November 1, 1978, preceding Annual Convention Meeting.

Scholarships granted to students from October 1, 1977 to September 30, 1978 totaled forty-nine. Two others received a scholarship from the Baptist Foundation, making a total of fifty-one. They received \$200 scholarships. V. **BOND PROGRAMS ENDORSED — OCTOBER 1, 1977 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 1978**

The State Convention of Baptists in Ohio first entered into an agreement with Broadway Plan, Inc. in 1956, and continued until 1963 at which time an agreement was entered into with the Brotherhood Bond Company of Columbus, Ohio. After ten years with the Brotherhood Bond Company, the convention voted in 1973 to again resume a working agreement with Broadway Plan, Inc., which continues up to the present time.

During the years with Broadway Plan, Inc., there have been 50 bond issues processed by the bond company, and endorsed by the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio, totaling \$2,696,300.00. Of this amount, \$1,340,000.00 has

been endorsed since 1973. There were 48 additional issues handled by Brotherhood Bond Company from 1963 to 1973 totaling \$2,986,000.00. This means that the state convention has endorsed a total of 98 bond issues, totaling \$5,682,300.00, during the past twenty-one years. There has never been a default, and in only one instance was it necessary for the state convention to dispose of property involved. No church has failed to sell its bonds and accomplish its building objective.

At the preparation of this report, all current applications for bond programs have been processed. Several churches have requested information with regard to Convention Endorsed Bond Program. Two applications were endorsed during the past year for First Baptist Church, Vandalia, Ohio an issue of \$350,000.00 and Bay Village Baptist Church, Bay Village, Ohio an issue of \$175,000.00.

The bond programs endorsed since the new program with Broadway Plan, Inc. began in July of 1972 are as follows: (one percent of issues, totaling \$6,650.00 has been placed in New Work Loan Fund, and the fees of \$1,500.00 for Sheffield Lake, \$3,500.00 for Vandalia and \$1,750.00 for Bay Village will increase this amount to \$13,400.00).

Effective January 1, 1977, Broadway Bond Company processing fees to the churches were increased to 1.25% (instead of 1%) with a minimum of \$400.00. Approved by Executive Board.

During the year, priority of second mortgage on church bonds was waived for Pisgah Heights Baptist Church, Cincinnati Association, in order to allow the church to refinance their loans from the bank and secure an additional \$65,000.00 for the purpose of building additional building.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The trustees are men of business ability, moral responsibility and integrity. They serve without compensation. Funds placed with the Foundation are rigidly protected and managed by the Foundation trustees in strict compliance with the wishes of donors. Earnings on funds held by the Foundation go to the cause donors designate. An investment placed with your Baptist Foundation is an investment for eternity. Your Baptist Foundation can help you fulfill your highest opportunity in continuing support of the Baptist cause near your heart and Christian faith, which has sustained you through all the years.

I. SERVICES OF YOUR BAPTIST FOUNDATION

1. The services of the Baptist Foundation are free. It is committed to serving our Baptist people who take their eternal stewardship seriously.

2. The foundation may be named in your Will to serve as trustee for any funds you desire used in support of the Lord's work after your death.
3. The Foundation accepts gifts of cash, stocks, bonds, life insurance policies, property, etc. for support of the Lord's work in keeping with the donor's request.
4. The Foundation will establish and manage memorial funds in memory of a loved one for the cause you wish to give support to.
5. The Foundation will establish and manage a trust fund or life income agreement.
6. The Foundation brings to the attention of our Baptist people the need for making a Will and provides information and personal assistance upon request.

4. Two sound films "Watch Out — Tomorrow Is Coming" and "A Train Goes By Our Town" are available to the churches upon request. There are also eight excellent filmstrips with recorded scripts available. Subjects include: "The Best Years of Our Lives", "Case History of a Gift", "Preaching the Gospel Till Jesus Comes", "The Future That I Hold", "Enough to Be Happy", "Living Keepsake", and "Generations to Come."

EXECUTIVE BOARD PERSONNEL CHANGES

1. T. J. (Jack) Tichenor, First Vice-President replaced Bob Bateman as president due to his leaving the state to accept a pastorate in Sebring, Florida.
2. Resignations received during the year were from: Bob Bateman as president and Arles Bingham as Assistant Recording Secretary, who moved out of the state.

STAFF PERSONNEL CHANGES AND PROPOSALS

1. Will Pollard came as the new Associate in the Sunday School Department.
2. Miss Bea Addington, bookkeeper and Office Coordinator resigned to get married.
3. Miss Melba Welker, came as the new Accountant and Office Coordinator.
4. The Board approved Cary Harden's request for tenure leave of absence for January-April, 1979, to allow Cary and his family to serve in preaching and teaching opportunities in our churches and Seminary in Tanzania. He would apply two weeks vacation allowance toward the longer time requested in order to teach a full semester at the seminary.
5. The Board approved Grady Evans' request for tenure leave of absence for a four months period in 1979 to attend a full semester of classes at Southern Seminary in Louisville.
6. The Board approved Grady Evans' request for a three week trip in July involving a week at the Baptist World Alliance Youth Evangelism Congress in Manila. Two weeks would be vacation time and the week for the Youth Evangelism Congress would be in the place of a Directors of Student Work Fellowship which Grady normally attends and recommends that our Convention grant \$200 toward Grady's travel expenses.
7. The Board realigned the Property Management-Operations Committee to become the Seneca Lake Committee with Clyde Bowen designated as the staff person to meet with such committee. (Present Property Management-Operations Committee would serve as Seneca Lake Committee. The Executive Committee would consider matters that apply to the building management of the facilities in Columbus.)
8. The Board approved one month's salary bonus check for Miss Bea Addington, who has resigned and will be leaving us to get married, in appreciation of her excellent service to our State Convention.
9. The Board approved that Dr. Roberts be allowed to apply the time normally allowed for the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta and the \$500 convention expense allowance to enable Dr. and Mrs. Roberts to make the three weeks preaching trip to Europe.

FINANCIAL ACTIONS

1. The Board approved the purchase of a new copy machine (cost \$4,100 with some supplies) and this money to be taken from the New Work Loan Fund excess (there was a limit last year put on the New Work Loan Fund of \$270,000 and it is now \$277,516.69).
2. The Board authorized the Architect, A. C. Voorhis to develop a presentation of the Retirement Center for the State Convention in Toledo, that will include a scale model, a slide presentation, an outside design in room layout, at a cost of \$12,000. This would be for 600 hours of work, most of this will be recovered in building plans and architect fees if we proceed with the building of the Retirement Center.

GENERAL ACTIONS

1. The Board recommended that the Seneca Lake Committee do a study at Seneca Lake and make an evaluation report on whether to rebuild the recreation building which was destroyed by a winter storm (Ron Martin, Helen Allan and Mike Collins to serve with the special study committee).
2. The Board allowed an increase of fees at Seneca Lake for next year. Approximately 20% — exact amount will be recommended during the fall meeting.
3. The Board recommended that our Convention send a letter of highest commendation and appreciation for the excellent leadership given to our convention by Bob Bateman, who moved to the pastorate in Sebring, Florida. Also send a copy of the letter to the Florida Baptist Witness.
4. The Board authorized Ernst and Ernst to do an audit.
5. The Board approved a new policy concerning travel and business expense with regard to reimbursement of travel and business expense for convention personnel in 1979.
6. The Board approved the adoption of the Proposed 1979 Budget.
7. New rates for accommodations and meals at Seneca Lake approved.
8. Purchase approved for new pews in the auditorium at Seneca Lake Assembly at a cost of \$12,000.
9. Resignation accepted from Jules Soule, student ministries regional director for southwestern Ohio.
10. Approved state convention — HMB joint employment of David J. Hoyte to serve as pastor of Spanish Chapel, Fremont, with added responsibility as catalytic missionary in that part of the state.
11. Authorized state convention office to print up identification cards for those ministers who believe they will need them for getting into hospitals, prisons, etc.

II. OBJECTIVES OF PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT

1. Keep before the churches of our convention the New Testament program of evangelism, working with pastors, churches and associations.
2. To assist pastors, churches and associations in planning and promoting a continuous program of evangelism and stewardship, seeking to win the lost and helping the saved to grow "unto a spiritual maturity."
3. To lead our churches to increase their percentage giving through the Cooperative Program.
4. To direct and promote the Columbus Branch of Boyce Bible School and to encourage those who have answered God's call to a church related vocation to consider Boyce as a step to further their education.

III. PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT REPORT**A. EVANGELISM**

1. The State Evangelism Conference was held in Dayton at Far Hills Baptist Church, although the weather was an obstacle, over 700 were in attendance for the Thursday night session. Out-of-state speakers were: Bailey Smith, from Oklahoma, Charles Carter, from Alabama and Frank Crumpler, from Georgia.
2. Assisted the Steel Valley Association in planning and promoting their simultaneous revivals in October, 1977. 32 churches participated.
3. Associational Evangelism Clinics were held in all of the 18 associations with approximately 2,600 in attendance to receive inspiration and training.
4. The annual Youth Evangelism Celebration was held in Dayton with 1,500 young people and leaders in attendance.
5. The Growing An Evangelistic Church Seminar was held at the Walnut Heights Baptist Church in Columbus in May with 125 pastors and leaders receiving training on how to grow an evangelistic church.
6. Working in cooperation with the Brotherhood Department, the Laymen's Witnessing Retreat was conducted at Seneca Lake, August 4-5. 360 men were present to hear Dr. Tal Bonham, from Oklahoma and Fred Gregg, President Carter's Sunday School teacher, challenge all to be involved in personal witnessing.
7. There have been several conferences conducted with the Chairmen of Evangelism and Directors of Missions as we make plans for the Year of Evangelism and Simultaneous Revivals, April 1-8, 1979.

B. STEWARDSHIP

1. Associational Stewardship Awareness Conferences with pastors were held in ten associations with 145 present.
2. Eight churches across the state participated in the pilot project for the "Great Challenge" stewardship promotion, November 12-16, 1979.
3. Directed two Great Challenge programs in local churches, First Baptist, Heath and Pisgah Heights, West Chester.
4. Associational Stewardship rallies were held in Greater Dayton, Lakeview and Northern Associations with 253 people in attendance to receive assistance in budget promotion.
5. A statewide conference on the "Great Challenge" budget promotion was conducted in Columbus, August 17, with 75 pastors and church leaders being trained and given an overview of this new program.
6. Cooperative Program plaques were presented to 64 churches who increased their percentage giving during the past year.

C. BOYCE BIBLE SCHOOL

1. Four eight-week terms of Boyce Bible School were conducted at the Columbus Branch with 145 students enrolled for the four terms. An average of 36 students per term. These students came from all

sections of our state and are receiving a quality and practical education and study under warmhearted, dedicated and concerned teachers.

- Two full weeks of study were held during the year at Seneca Lake, January 9-13 and May 15-19. 25 students attended these two weeks of study.

Missionary to the Deaf

John A. Cooper, RR 1, Box 474, Plainfield, Indiana, serves as a Missionary to the Deaf in a 4-state area, including Ohio. John maintains constant contact with our churches with deaf ministries and makes many trips into Ohio annually. He directs a Deaf Conference at Seneca Lake each June.

II. OBJECTIVES OF PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT

The over-riding objective of the State Missions Director is to give leadership in establishing and developing New Testament churches. This is, in fact, the objective of the entire Department, including our staff of missionaries, especially the Area Directors of Missions.

This main objective moves in several directions, of course, since "establishing" and "developing" covers a wide area of concern and activity. I see these various facets of the main objective as follows:

1. Starting new missions and churches.
2. Working with the associations in developing ministries of outreach to all segments of the population.
3. Working with area directors of missions in developing new work programs and programs for growth of the churches.
4. Assisting churches and missions to secure pastors.
5. Administering the pastoral aid programs of the State Convention and the Home Mission Board.

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2. BOLD MISSION THRUST AND NORTH CENTRAL MISSION THRUST

(1) The observance of the "BOLD MISSION THRUST" theme throughout the Southern Baptist Convention has turned the eyes of churches in the older state conventions to the newer areas of SBC work. Hence, an increasing number of mission teams from other states have engaged in church starting activities in Ohio this summer. Others have helped to strengthen small churches through VBS, revival, visitation and cultivative witnessing activities. Two noteworthy BMT developments: (a) Since the Home Mission Board designated Cleveland as a "Key City" last year, extensive studies have been made and priorities and goals have been developed for advancing mission activity in Ohio's largest city; (b) in Ohio's last two counties without SBC work, a new mission was started in Carroll County and work was expected to begin in Morrow County in October.

(2) Ohio and the other six states in the "NORTH CENTRAL MISSION THRUST" adopted goals for new work for the three Bold Mission years (1977-79) — a total of 397 for the 7-state area. Ohio's goal for the three years is 140 with half of that number (70) designated for this year. Ohio's record for this year is **45 chapels and 2 churches that had not been missions** for a total of **47 new congregations**. Twenty-seven new congregations in 1977 adds up to 74 new congregations to date and leaves 66 to be started by the end of December 1979.

(3) The area directors of missions have shared the responsibility and the spotlight in attempting to reach the above goals. Some of the men were able to lead their associations to surpass their goals. Here is the record (new missions only):

Columns 1 and 3 reflect the number of churches and missions as reported by the area missionaries. Additions and subtractions are made when reported by them.

Column 3 includes both new chapels and new fellowships in Column 4, but not the fellowships in Columns 5 and 6.

Columns 5 and 6 list the fellowships that are still in the beginning or probing stage and those not intended to become permanent missions. Some of these may be transferred to Columns 3 and 4 later, as they develop.

*Two missions in Northwest Ohio Association are sponsored by churches in Maumee Valley Association. One in Southern Hills is sponsored by a church in Cincinnati Association.

4. STAFF CHANGES

David J. Hoyte, student pastor of the Spanish Chapel of the Good Shepherd (Templo Bautista El Buen Pastor), Fremont, became the full-time pastor October 1 and will also serve as catalytic missionary in the counties surrounding Fremont.

Miguel Gonzalez succeeded Sidney Pistone as pastor of Primera Iglesia Bautista, Lorain, effective December 16, 1977.

Michael Rector resigned as Pastor/Director of the Weekday Ministries at German Village BC, Columbus, effective June 30, 1978.

Efforts are being made to fill three vacancies at this time: (1) Pastor/Missionary, First Spanish Baptist Chapel, Cleveland; (2) Pastor/Director of Weekday Ministries, Central BC, Akron; and (3) Pastor/Director of Weekday Ministries, German Village BC, Columbus.

5. STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONS PROGRAM AND SUMMER SEMINAR '78

Twenty-eight student summer missionaries assigned by the Home Mission Board served in Ohio this summer for ten weeks. In addition to these college people, several of our area directors of missions enlisted local teams of young people from the churches to help in Vacation Bible Schools and other mission projects. Also, one Sojourner was assigned by the HMB to serve under the direction of Missionary Robert Hall.

In addition to the above, a team of 12 Southwestern Seminary students and 2 Southern Seminary students worked in seven new mission places in Northern Ohio, Lakeland, Steel Valley and Summit in a program known as "Summer Seminar '78", sponsored by the Church Extension Dept., HMB, the State Convention and the two seminaries. These students received Seminary credit for their work. Dr. Cal Guy, Missions Professor at Southwestern Seminary, visited the students early in the summer for an on-the-field check-up and seminar session. Results: four new chapels started, two new fellowships that need to develop a little more before they become chapels and one church saved from disbanding.

6. TRACT AND FILM DISTRIBUTION

The Missions Department has distributed more than 147,729 tracts during the past year. These have been in the following categories: Evangelism, Doctrinal, Children's Tracts, Christian Life, Family Life, Anti-Alcohol, Stewardship, Home Missions, Foreign Missions and miscellaneous titles.

Also, copies of the updated slide presentation "The Ohio Story" were distributed to each associational office. Two HMB films (16mm) have had wide circulation from our office this year: "Bold Sharing" and "Planned Parenthood for Churches." Two new films are now available from our office: "Bold Mission Update" and "An Act of Love." Reserve these films by calling Mrs. Collins in the Missions Office. Only requirements: Return film immediately after use, and repair any damage that occurs.

7. DISTRIBUTION OF MISSION FUNDS

The term "Church Pastoral Aid" (CPA) is applied to all long-range pastoral aid monies paid to missions and young churches to make possible a full-time ministry. CPA funds are provided both by the Home Mission Board and by the State Convention (from budget and state missions offering).

(1) State and HMB Pastoral Aid Funds

From September 26, 1977 to September 25, 1978, Pastoral Aid supplements (CPA) in the amount of \$99,800 were paid by the Home Mission Board's

Church Extension Department to 64 pastors. During the same period, the State Convention paid \$75,625 to 66 pastors from State Pastoral Aid funds, including State Mission Offering money. A total of 74 pastors were assisted from one or both of these sources.

(2) New Work Fund

During the past convention year, a total of \$11,765 was spent from the New Work Fund in initiating new work and meeting emergencies in young missions and churches. This included initial rent for meeting places for many new missions and assistance in moving pastors to new missions and weak churches.

(3) Other Funds

We administer funds regularly provided by two out-of-state churches: (1) Eighty-Fifth Street BC, Birmingham, Alabama, sends funds once each year to be paid out monthly to three different missions and churches selected by them.

(2) Severn's Valley BC, Elizabethtown, Kentucky, sends funds regularly to be used in mission work in Northwest Ohio and Maumee Valley associations. The associational missions committees approve and request this money under the guidance of the area director of missions.

From time to time, other funds are channeled through our State Convention to Ohio churches from out-of-state churches.

PERSONAL REPORT OF WILL POLLARD, ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR:

On the field since late February. 70 Churches visited.

35 Associational visits made in 17 of the 18 Associations.

1 Week of leadership activities at the invitation of the Maryland Convention.

Attended Ridgecrest in keeping with responsibilities of the Department.

II. PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The general objective of the Sunday School and Church Architecture Department is to provide program of Sunday School work to assist churches in establishing, improving, conducting, and enlarging Bible Teaching and Outreach ministries. Objectives include: (1) To assist church leaders in locating, reaching, teaching, winning, and developing persons to Christ and church membership; (2) To work with Associational leaders in conducting Associational Sunday School programs, to design and advance Bible Teaching and Outreach programs in the churches; (3) To utilize the Sunday School Organization in leadership and advancing the total cause of Christ, among Ohio Baptist churches.

In the Building area, we give assistance to churches that are preparing to build, who are thinking about remodeling, finding additional space, or doing a new unit. We provide services of consultation with the committees, or the church itself for building suggestions and recommendations. We also provide through our office and the Church Architecture Department in Nashville, preliminaries for any new construction, rearranging present space, and a master plan for total use of the property.

Another objective in our Department is the Church Library area. We provide assistance of strengthening church library work, day care, and kindergarten, when called upon.

III. HIGHLIGHTS OF PROGRAM ASSIGNMENTS IN THE ARCHITECTURE DEPARTMENT

1. 35 Individual churches were assisted with building needs; most required more than one visit.
2. In addition to individual conferences, the State Building Conference was held in March at the Baptist Building, reaching 89 individual persons, 13 of them being Architects from across our state.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

1. Annual planning of the Associational Sunday School Program was conducted in all 18 Associations.
2. In providing training for workers, 8 Associational Training Schools were held.
3. 2 Action Campaigns were conducted and several individual church Action Campaigns were conducted by Department personnel.
4. This year our January Bible Study Previews were held in 6 Associations. These projects had a total of over 100 in attendance. Other Associations are conducting their own January Bible Study Preview, giving us a total of 12 to 14 of our Associations conducting January Bible Study Previews.
5. Assistance was given in the form of conference leading or speaking to 9 Associational Sunday School Meetings. In addition to this, 6 Literature Interpretations were conducted.

6. The first Bus conference was held in May in the Northern part of our state with 16 in attendance. This project was sponsored jointly by the State Sunday School Department and the Sunday School Board. Several other individual church conferences were conducted in Using Buses.
7. In promotion and training events, there were 940 persons attending the 4 Regional Sunday School Meetings, held in September. At each location there were 14 conferences offered for leadership.
8. 120 Persons were trained in Associational work through the 3 Associational Team Training Meetings held in August.
9. 50 Special Workers were trained or updated during the Special Worker Institute held in February.
10. The VBS Clinic provided training for 18 Associational VBS Teams with special conferences for the experienced, and the inexperienced workers. A total of 135 attended the State VBS Clinic.

In the area of Library work this year, we were able to provide Associational Library Conferences in two associations. In addition to these two associational Library conferences, a Regional Library Conference was held in our state in Dayton.

Added to these projects was a more successful Single Adult Bible Conclave. 78 Persons attended this first conference and plans are being made now for a second Single Adult Bible Conference to be conducted in 1979.

In co-directing with the Church Training Department, in two weeks of Youth Camp, there were 513 attending with 121 decisions recorded. Several had to be turned away because there was no room at the Assembly.

II. OBJECTIVES OF PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT — CHURCH TRAINING

The objective of the State Church Training Program is to assist our churches in helping each member in discipleship development. In an attempt to attain this objective, a variety of events are promoted, sponsored and conducted.

PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT HIGHLIGHTS

1. Special Worker Training Conference. Twenty-nine people were enlisted and given seven hours of intensive age-group training. These conferences were led by Baptist Sunday School Board personnel. These trainees are conducting special conferences throughout our state.
2. Adult Church Training Workshops in Northwest, West Central, Muskingum and Scioto Valley Associations. Ninety-three adults were in attendance.
3. One Church Training Growth Campaign in Miami Valley Association.
4. Four New Day for Training conferences — Cincinnati, Steel Valley, Southwestern and Maumee associations. Emphasis on beginning new programs.
5. Two Regional Preschool Activity Teaching Workshops — Dayton and Cuyahoga Falls. Approximately one hundred preschool workers were trained.
6. Prepared materials and promoted State Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament. Forty-two youth and children participated in the State Drills. Eight associations were represented.

7. Small Church Training Conferences. Southern Hills, Miami Valley, Erie and Summit Associations. Eighty-nine persons attended.
8. Leadership Schools in Lakeland and Southern Hills Association.
9. Promoted "M" Night Programs in every association. Sixteen associations reported "M" Night programs.
10. Youth Weeks (2) at Seneca Lake. Five hundred eleven in attendance. Decisions: twenty-one professions of faith, seventy-six rededications, seven special service, two other.

CHURCH MUSIC

The objective of the Church Music program is to assist churches in teaching members to read, sing and play music to the glory of God.

PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT HIGHLIGHTS

1. Music Training Schools in Buckeye Central, Scioto Valley, Muskingum Valley, Maumee and Steel Valley Associations.
2. Music Festivals in Greater Dayton, Capital City, Greater Cincinnati, Southwestern, Northern Ohio and Steel Valley Associations.
3. State Music Week at Seneca Lake. One hundred forty-two in attendance.
4. Music Reading Clinic in Dayton Association. Twenty-two churches, eighty-three in attendance.

OTHER PROGRAM ASSIGNMENT HIGHLIGHTS

1. Pastor-Deacon Retreat, Camp Willson, Bellefontaine, Ohio. One hundred twenty-seven attended.
2. Family Enrichment Conference. Financial support and enlistment of leadership. Four hundred ninety-six average attendance. Monday - Wednesday, Southwestern Association.

There were numerous other conferences the State Church Training — Music Department served as liaison with the Baptist Sunday School Board.

STUDENT MINISTRIES

Grady Evans, Director

Student Ministries has grown significantly since 1970 in all measurable areas. Previous records of achievements are being broken annually. This year's growth has been exceptionally good.

The number of students involved in campus programs has increased to 759, including 32 preparing for church vocations.

Although our state convention is comparatively small and young, Ohio's registration is strongly represented in national training and mission conferences with representation at Ridgecrest Baptist Student Conference (95 attendance) and the Student Missions Conference, SBTS (152 attendance).

Likewise, registration at the annual State Baptist Student Union Convention (148) and Leadership Training Conference (212) at Seneca Lake Baptist Assembly was exceptionally high — also breaking all previous records.

Students with enthusiasm and commitment gave sacrificially — both monetarily and personally. The student mission gifts totaled \$5,037.83 (June 26 - June 25) to provide the support of 12 student summer missionaries to serve. Ohio State University BSU, is the first BSU to give more than \$1,000, and \$1,500 this year. Ohio students responded to the call of Baptists in the North Central States, Israel and Gaza by supporting and personally serving on the mission field during the summer months.

International students have responded to our ministry with 63 attending the International Student Conference in Detroit, Michigan. Several host families from the 1976 International Student Conference (Columbus) have continued to communicate with and minister to these students. Some have led their international students to a saving faith in Christ and baptism in our churches. Isamu Yaki, a Japanese student, trusted the Lord, was baptized and has been very faithful to his church.

Also, eleven college students professed initial faith in Christ through the BSU ministry in addition to others professing faith among other age groups during student and director led worship and revival services.

Preschool Activity Teaching Workshops: February 20-21; 23-24, 1978

Purpose: To train Mission Friends leaders and other program organization leaders in how to effectively use activities in teaching situations with Preschoolers.

Highlights: Attendance and participation was good. Pastors as well as teachers participated. Four conferences were conducted in two locations: Far Hills Baptist Church, Dayton, and Broadman Baptist Church, Cuyahoga Falls. (105 attendance)

WMU State Council: February 27-28, 1978, Columbus

Purpose: Information and planning related to 1978-79.

Highlights: Guest, Mrs. Robert Fling, Birmingham, Alabama. Work included update of council on plans from national headquarters on work in WMU, 1978-79. Suggestions on conferences for North Carolina team who will lead in October, 1978 leadership conferences were agreed upon. A committee was appointed to study WMU by-laws and make recommendations for WMU guidelines.

Baptist Young Women Gathering: March 3-4, 1978, Hillcrest Baptist Church, Bellefontaine.

Purpose: To strengthen BYW organizations and individuals in Ohio.

Highlights: Fifty-three BYWs attended evening and morning conclaves, participating in various discussions related to young women in relation to family, church, and career.

WMU Annual Meeting: March 23-24, 1978, First Baptist Church, Heath.

Purpose: Business, inspiration, missions, information, and fellowship.

Highlights: Announcement that by-laws of WMU were being studied for revisions. Mrs. Sidney Deskins concluded four years as president of Ohio WMU. Mrs. Deskins served these four years with dedication and Christian commitment.

Mrs. Rodney Thorpe of Dayton was elected to succeed Mrs. Deskins. Mrs. Thorpe at the time of her election was serving as the Associational WMU Director of Greater Dayton Association.

These presidents are unsalaried persons, yet spend many hours in volunteer work in Ohio.

The Annual Meeting was conducted in the First Baptist Church of Heath, Ohio. Reverend Bob Maples was the pastor.

Mrs. Christine Gregory, National WMU President was guest speaker along with Mrs. Frank Gilreath, North Carolina President; Mrs. Clarence Thompson, New Mexico President; Mrs. John Caldwell, West Virginia President; Mrs. Bryan Brasington, former missionary to Peru and, several directors of missions in Ohio kept the missions emphasis foremost in the meeting. Host church and city for 1979 announced, Westwood Baptist Church, Wooster, Ohio, March 22-23, 1979.

Associational Officers Training: May 6, 1978, Seneca Lake

Purpose: To train Associational WMU officers along with all church program associational officers.

Highlights: All WMU Associational Directors except four attended. State WMU events were shared. How to plan a meeting, and goals for beginning new organizations in 1978 were set by individual WMU directors for their associations.

State GA Meeting: May 13, 1978, Chestnut Ridge Baptist Church, Elyria.

Purpose: To help GAs see their role in missions.

Highlights: Bill Richardson, missionary to Brazil and Janet Ferguson, student missionary spoke. All games and activities had as a goal the learning of a Southern Baptist mission fact. GAs from each church made and brought a banner for a banner parade. Almost 300 GAs and leaders attended.

Baptist Women Retreat: May 26-27, 1978, Seneca Lake

Purpose: For inspiration, personal growth, fellowship and awareness of the role women play in the role of mission support of all Southern Baptist mission work.

Highlights: The largest WMU retreat to date for a WMU retreat (202). Mrs. Hassel Mae Tallent, newly elected Baptist Women Director for Ohio and Mrs. Dianne Willey, BYW Director, presided. Guests included Miss June Whitlow, Assistant to Executive Director, WMU, SBC, Mr. and Mrs. Don Gillis, Mrs. Rodney Thorpe, Mrs. Maureen Collins, and Glad Tidings Trio. All spoke to the theme, "The Elegant Christian Woman."

Acteen and GA Camps: June 19-July 7, 1978, Seneca Lake

Purpose: To educate girls in missions, to win lost girls to Christ, and to give girls information on possible career mission involvement.

Highlights: Program structure changed from two previous years. It was well accepted by counselors and girls. Decision at camps totaled 24 professions of faith, 20 rededications, and 13 commitments to fulltime Christian Service. Over 400 attended these camps.

WMU Retreat: September 1-2, 1978, Seneca Lake

Purpose: To lead women to participate in Bold Missions through bold growing, bold giving, and bold going.

Highlights: Miss Carolyn Weatherford, Director of WMU, SBC and Stephen Earle, pastor of First, Perrysburg were leaders. Highlights were the small reaction groups that formed after each speaker's presentation. A "Midnight Special" featured the Baptist Women Year in the Church emphasis. A total of 230 attended the retreat, breaking the record attendance of the May 26-27, 1978 meeting.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

L. H. Moore, Secretary

The Historical Society has had no meetings this year since our last meeting during the 1977 sessions of the state convention at Heath, Ohio.

During the year the secretary has received minutes from the associations, historical documents from the churches and other memorabilia that has been filed in the Historical Library. The file of the associational minutes is complete through 1977 and the minutes have been sent to Nashville to the Historical Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention to be microfilmed.

The manuscript "Southern Baptists in Ohio" which the secretary was asked to prepare by the convention and the executive board after his retirement is complete and is ready to be submitted to the printers. It is approximately 285 pages in length and is composed of ten chapters dealing with Southern Baptists in the state from

1933 to the present. It has been an interesting and rewarding work to put together this story of Southern Baptist work in Buckeye country.

Since the manuscript is finished and the secretary is well into his third year of retirement, this seems a good time for him to resign the post so others who are in the office regularly and thus are better qualified, may keep the Library and other historical properties up to date. I hereby tender my resignation with deep appreciation for the opportunity to share in this work of Ohio Baptists and with thanks to all those who have shared in it and cooperated with me in getting the materials together.

I do not wish to presume, but I would recommend that the editor, Theo Sommerkamp, be elected to this post and that it be for an indefinite period. I hereby move the adoption of this recommendation and his election as historical secretary of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio.

Attached is the inventory of the materials in the Historical Library located in the office building of the State Convention at 1680 E. Broad St. in Columbus.

Too much appreciation cannot be expressed for the work of Mrs. Esther Lafferty who, while she was with the *Ohio Baptist Messenger*, did all of the sorting and filing and set up the files as they are today. Without her invaluable help it would have been a much longer and more laborious task.

A HISTORY

In 1975, the state convention in annual session appointed a Planning and Study Committee to "study and bring a feasibility report concerning a retirement center for the elderly. The study was prompted by the gift of 65 acres of property to the Baptist Foundation by Mr. and Mrs. Flannery Brooks."

Following a year of study, the committee reported to the state convention and a number of recommendations were made and adopted. "We recommend that we begin a ministry with the aging which would include the establishment of a retirement center and the developing of a convention sponsored program through the local church to minister to the elderly in our respective communities." That same year a recommendation to establish three levels of care in the retirement community, to have a separate corporation and cooperation with the Executive Board of the state convention to arrange financing, were adopted.

In 1977 the constitution and by-Laws for Ohio Baptist Benevolences, Incorporated, were adopted. Also, the convention approved \$100,000 for the initial property development and further financing was to be worked out with the Executive Board for the first unit development of the center. A "Job Description for a Coordinator for Ministry with the Aging" was also approved.

A YEAR OF PROGRESS

During this past year, trustees have made significant progress. Mr. A. C. Voorhis was hired as architect for the project. He was asked to take the preliminary drawings from the Baptist Sunday School Board and develop some initial ideas for the use of the land as a retirement community. After this was accomplished, the architect was instructed to do preliminary plans and give cost estimates for the development of the retirement community.

The development of the site would be the first work necessary. This would include the extension of water to the property, the installation of sanitary sewers and trunk lines, installation of a sewer treatment plant, streets, curbing, gutters and sidewalks. It is estimated that this part of the development would cost about \$553,000.

The first housing would be for independent living. These units would need initial construction funds but would be financed by the people using the facilities. It is the thought of the Trustees that there is great demand for this type of housing and that the market is practically unlimited. These units could be built on a market demand basis with little cost to the corporation.

Some type of ancillary space would need to be built for offices, food service, recreation in the early development of the property. The intermediate care units and the nursing care units would be the next construction. These would be built in multiples of 120 units to offer maximum efficiency of operation and cost control. The permanent food service, office space, recreation areas would be built in connection with this part of the construction.

Completion of the plan would be the construction of apartment units and would complete the plan authorized in 1976 calling for the various levels of care in the

retirement community. The suggested development by the architect was approved by the Trustees and it was agreed that this be done in an orderly fashion and within the available financing capabilities open to the Trustees.

Trustees met with the Stewardship Commission representative, Dr. Chapman, and explored the help which they have for the financing of the retirement community. A feasibility study to determine the financial resources available is necessary before beginning the project.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Trustees recommend that we enter into a feasibility study of fund raising at a cost not to exceed \$6,000.

Further, that the board of trustees of the Ohio Baptist Benevolences, Incorporated, recommend that if the results of the approved financial feasibility study is positive, indicating that we can proceed with the development of the Brookhaven Retirement Center, the trustees be authorized to launch the necessary financial campaign, and as funds become available proceed with construction.

PROJECTIONS:

The trustees have approved the name "Brookhaven Retirement Community." This fits well with the site which has a brook running through the property and will keep the name of the donor of the land in view of the denomination.

It is estimated that the entire development of the retirement community would take about eight years and would involve a cost of some \$15,393,000 for the completion of the project.
