Dear Dr. Caudill:

Inclosed you will find the monthly financial statement for Relief for the month of September. I am writing this letter without consulting Mr. Klaupiks, who is out of town until Monday, and does not know that I am writing. I am decidedly worried about the present state of relief finances. Please look at the "Summary."

You will notice that in the DP Transportation there is a deficit of \$3,351.52. These transportation items had to be taken care of. Of course some of this money will be paid back, but it may take two or three years to do it. There is only \$3,886.60 in the general DP fund. If that were used to wipe out the \$3,351.52 debt, there would be practically nothing left for salaries and office expenses.

Then in the Volksdeutsche Program, you will notice the amount of \$5,519.07 in the red. We have only \$3,288.30 in nerestricted funds which would not even take care of that deficit.

The total balance we have on hand including fare and all designated items amounts to only \$10,435.85. The monthly salaries are as follows:

Mr. Klaupiks \$ 440.00

" Travel 150.00 (approximately)

Mrs. Keefer 230.00

Miss Duvelzars 210.00

Mrs. Lau— one-half 62.50

Miss Freeman 25.00 \$ 1,117.50

Three times \$1,117.50 is \$3,352.50, so you see we do not even have enough to take care of the salaries to the end of the year, to say nothing of any other expenses that will come up during the next three months. I am disturbed. Mr. Klaupiks is seriously talking about seeking other employment and just coming to the office once or twice a month to help close things out. Both Mrs. Keefer and Miss Dubelzars are uncertain as to whether they will have a job longer than next month, if that long. It does not seem fair to any of them to have to live in such uncertainty. I do not see how we can well afford to let Mr. Klaupiks go yet, with as many things unfinished as

there are. Mr. Klaupiks is quite upset about this financial situation. Dr. Lewis keeps writing him to come over to Europe and help him close out the work there, and help him select the people for the Old People's Home. Of course there is no money in the relief funds to pay his expenses for such a trip. If we do not get some money from somewhere during November, it looks to me as if we shall have to close out at the end of November.

The Committee in its meeting at Copenhagen voted to continue the work until next July, but you can't continue it if you have no money to carry on with.

Have you decided as yet on the date for your committee meeting?

On September 22nd we received a letter from Dr. Machum of Canada in which he sent us a check for \$1,540.54 to be used for reconstruction of churches in Berlin and Bremen. He said he had sent \$977.10 directly to Mr. Norquist, and \$2,482.36 to Mr. Sturnahn to be transferred to Washington. Up to the present I have heard nothing from Mr. Sturhahn about this sum which is supposed to be sent here. Shall I go ahead and send the \$1,540.54 on to Mr. Norquist?

I am sorry to be writing such a gloomy letter, but I feel that we have just about reached a point of crisis.

I am coming to you with a matter which is causing me deep concernnamely the financial condition of our Rehief Department. You will see from the inclosed monthly statement how near the bottom we are. Last month I wrote Dr. Caudill calling his attention to the shortage of funds, but have heard nothing from him regarding the matter. Of course the death of his father may have caused this delay.

I am inclosing a copy of the letter I have written him today. Mr. Klaupiks is worrying himself sick over the situation, and is constantly being embarrassed by the Church World Service and other relief groups wanting to know what we are going to do in the future. Of course he doesn't know, and doesn't want to them to know that we are practically bankrupt. I have tried to get him to write to Dr. Caudill, but he hesitates to do it. So as there seemed to be no one else to take up the matter, I have taken it on myself.

I don't know that there is a thing you can do about this, but it is a help to have some one to share the burden with. I have been praying much about it, and perhaps the money will come before we reach the end of the rope.

Dear Dr. Sadler:

Your letter containing the check for \$13,000.00 has just come and I hasten to thank you for the generous gift of \$5,000.00 to meet the emergency in our relief work. I shall send the \$8,000.00 for the Home in Munich on to Mr. Norquist at once, and we thank you for this also.

When I wrote the letter to Dr. Caudill explaining the situation in our relief work, I debated as to whether I should send the copy of that letter to you or to Dr. Adams. My reasons for not sending it to you were, first of all, I did not feel that I had the right to ask you for funds, that should be done by Dr. Caudill or some official of the Alliance. Dr. Adams is a member of both the Relief and the Administrative Committees, so I felt that if he thought it was the proper thing to do, he would take the matter up either with Dr. Caudill or you. My other reason was that you and the Foreign Mission Board have been so generous to the Alliance, that I felt a hesitancy in even mentioning the need to you. I knew you would consider it an appeal, and I felt sure would do your best to help meet it, but in the face of all that you have done in the past for our relief work, I hesitated to ask for more. I felt that with the information in hand, Dr. Caudill and Dr. Adams would know whether or not such an appeal should be made to you.

I hope that you will understand my position in this matter, and if my reasoning was false, I hope you will overlook such mistakes as I have made. At any rate, I thank you not only in behalf of our Relief Department, but personally, for your response to our need.

You will be interested to know that Mr. Klaupiks is now at his home sick. His wife called yesterday saying that he had a high fever, and they were having the doctor. I am hoping that it is nothing serious.
