

An Appeal to Southern Baptists

At a conference of the undersigned representatives of the Baptist World Emergency Committee and the Foreign Mission Board, in Atlanta, January 29, continuing the work of a full meeting of the Baptist World Emergency Committee and representatives of the Foreign Mission Board, in Atlanta, January 14, the following statement of appeal to Southern Baptists was unanimously adopted:

Urgent appeals now in the hands of the Foreign Mission Board, fully certified, led us to recommend that a minimum of \$300,000.00 be set as the goal for an emergency offering to help meet the needs of imperiled, starving peoples, to whom we have definite access, throughout the war-torn world.

This emergency fund is to be administered by the Foreign Mission Board, through our missionaries and other trusted agencies. Distribution of this emergency fund will be made by the Foreign Mission Board on the basis of meeting poignant human need as quickly and effectively as possible, and as far as our gifts justify, remembering Paul's injunction: "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith." (Galatians 6:10).

The first Sunday in April is suggested as the day on which all our churches are urged to make worthy offerings for this emergency fund. Churches finding it necessary will make the appeal and receive the offering either before or after this day.

All gifts made through the Foreign Mission

Board from January 1, 1942, for China Relief, and for Bibles for Russian prisoners, and for the relief of peoples of war-torn lands, will be credited to this Baptist World Emergency Relief Fund.

The Foreign Mission Board is now advancing funds to meet imperious emergencies that cannot wait until April.

We bespeak a generous and prompt response on the part of all our people to this emergency appeal. Details of the many urgent instances of immediate need will be made from time to time by the Foreign Mission Board. May we unite daily in prayer for

the success of this appeal, for Christ's sake.





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THE HUNGER-BITTEN MULTITUDES WAIT

A number of times in the New Testament, we are told that Jesus, seeing the multitudes scattered abroad like sheep without a shepherd, was *moved* with compassion toward them. This compassion of Jesus always brought forth immediate and practical results. We know that He, the Living Christ at God's right hand today, looks down on the sorrowing, suffering, hungry multitudes in these war-ravaged lands and is moved with great compassion for them. He is saying to us, His children in the twentieth century, just as He said to His disciples in Galilee in the long ago, "Give ye them to eat."

For four and one half years, the Foreign Mission Board has carried on a well organized program of relief work in China, using our missionaries in that sorely tried and suffering land as directors and dis-

pensors of the funds sent us by the churches. Up to January 1, 1942, about \$142,000.00 had been received by the Foreign Mission Board for Chinese relief.

Now the World Emergency Relief Committee, appointed by the Birmingham Convention, has issued an appeal to the churches for \$300,000.00 for Emergency Relief in all war-stricken lands. This gift is to represent the concern and compassion of the 5,000,000 Baptists of the South for the hungry and starving millions in Europe and Asia. In comparison with the magnitude of the heartbreaking and appalling need in these war-ravaged countries, it is a small and inadequate sum to ask of Southern Baptists.

More than one-half of our gift will go to China where the awful suffering and need is beyond words to describe. Some of this fund will go to Spain and some to the starving people of Central Europe. A portion of our generous contribution will be used for the purchase of Bibles for Russian prisoners in Germany and the Balkan lands. We sincerely hope that some of our gifts may be sent to the noble and heroic Greek people who are literally threatened with complete extinction as a nation.

We know that Southern Baptists are going to answer this call with a most generous and joyous response, and give us the funds necessary for meeting these imperatively clamorous needs across a sin-stricken and hunger-bitten world.

The World Emergency Relief Committee has requested the Foreign Mission Board to take the lead in raising this Relief Fund and to assume the responsibility for its administration. A joint committee of the World Emergency Relief Committee and the Foreign Mission Board has been set up for the purpose of raising and administering the contributions. We pledge ourselves to see to it that every dollar given shall be wisely used to help relieve all the suffering possible in this world gone mad with hate and murderous cruelty.

Let us remember that the first Sunday in April or one of the Sundays immediately following is the time set by the Committee for the offering to be taken in all the churches.

Many times the amount asked for world emergency relief would come in if all Southern Baptists could see such sights as Missionary John Lowe and some of us have seen: a woman whose trail was marked with blood dripping from her eyes, afflicted with trachoma; Chinese with ankles swollen several times their normal size from elephantiasis; children dead from starvation or exposure. Such suffering now is greatly increased due to war.

I WAS HUNGRY AND YOU FED ME

One of the marvelous elements in the make-up of the Master was His ability to identify Himself with human need. On one occasion He wrought His most memorable miracle because His heart went out to hungry persons. Seeing the milling mob and realizing that there was no nearby source of food, the hard-headed disciples would have sent them away faint for lack of food, but the sensitive spirit of Jesus was touched by their need and He ordered them fed.

On still another occasion the great Teacher wished to make His disciples understand the nature of the new Kingdom. In dramatic fashion He pictured the day of reward when all nations should appear before His throne. Those who had identified themselves with the hungry, the sick, the imprisoned, were recognized to be possessors of His nature. These would be at home in the new scheme of things, and to them He said: "Come, ye blessed of my Father."

The same test is being applied today. As we move in person and in imagination amongst the multitudes of maimed and imprisoned and starving men and women and children, the Master walks with us. As we reach out to bind up broken bodies, open prison doors, put food into bony hands, He says to us, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of . . . these . . . ye have done it unto me."

FIGHTING SPIRITUAL STARVATION

Many parts of our tragic world are faced with famine, and tens of thousands will die for lack of food. Through our great voluntary World Emergency Relief offering we are trying to meet some of these awful needs wherever the opportunity presents itself. In ministering to hungry children, we are ministering to the One who took them in His arms and blessed them. It was He who said: "I was hungry and ye fed me."

Tragic as this hunger of body may be, there is another world-wide hunger which we must meet—the hunger of soul. As in the days of Amos, the world faces not only "a famine of bread . . . but of hearing the words of the Lord" (Amos 8:11). Thousands of Russian prisoners who have never seen the Word of God will have opportunity, through the long hours and days of life in concentration camps, to read its blessed message of hope.

With Mexico still closed to our missionaries, there remains the wide open door of Bible distribution through the publishing house in El Paso. Our South American neighbors, dominated for centuries by a medieval Church which has kept the Bible from the people, are now ready, through our great publishing house in Rio de Janeiro to distribute tens of thousands of copies of the Bible in Portuguese. Let us feed hungry bodies. Let us not forget hungry souls who need the Bread of Life.

Good News From Most Mission Stations

As THE COMMISSION went to press, the safety of at least 112 of the 129 Southern Baptist missionaries stranded in war-torn lands had been confirmed and no news was taken to be good news in the case of 17 others.

At least 17 of the missionaries were in free China where their activities were unrestricted and unlimited funds could be sent. Four more are in Macao, a Portuguese colony in south China where mission work presumably is still limited only by lack of funds and workers.

The missionaries not specifically named in dispatches based on direct contact are in other central China stations besides Shanghai, where 24 missionaries of the board are reported safe in a recent cable.

At least three missionaries, Misses Clifford Barratt and Josephine Ward and Mrs. W. E. Sallee of interior China, are reported interned in their homes by the Japanese. The other missionaries in occupied China presumably are also confined to their homes.

The last news from Shanghai was "business as usual," with the banks still operating and permission granted for individuals to draw as much as \$80 a month. According to a recent cable from Dr. R. E. Beddoe, the Shanghai schools are "there as usual" and presumably still operating with peak enrolments.

The \$300,000 to be raised during April by Southern Baptists for world emergency relief will not be used primarily to help the missionaries, Secretary Charles E. Maddy has announced. The board is endeavoring to take care of their normal expenses out of current funds. Most of the money to be raised will be used directly for relief.

To date Southern Baptists have already sent about \$200,000 to help save the work of British missions, \$3,500 to keep Spanish sufferers alive, and \$150,000 to China, where one dollar can still keep a Chinese from starving for about one month and \$10 can save him for a year. From Dr. M. T. Rankin, secretary for the Orient, has just come the renewed plea that Southern Baptists support an enlarged program in West China.

Alliance Secretary Stresses World Relief Needs

The following message has been received from Dr. W. O. Lewis, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance, in Washington:

"REJOICE SOUTHERN BAPTISTS PLAN TO RAISE ADDITIONAL \$300,000 FOR RELIEF. NEEDS IN EUROPE AND ASIA GREAT. CHANNELS STILL OPEN FOR TRANSMISSION OF FUNDS. RELIEVING DISTRESS IS SERVING JESUS. (MATTHEW 25:40.)"

Anyone happening to receive more than one copy of this "relief handbook" should pass the extra information along to others who should know the needs of a suffering world and help relieve it.

Varied Calls Come To Southern Baptists

Southern Baptists would like to follow the injunction of the apostle Paul and "do good to *all* men," but they already have the great task of trying to provide for their own household.

Efforts are being made by Southern Baptist leaders, however, partially to answer some of the more urgent calls that come from Christian agencies other than the Foreign Mission Board.

Some help is being provided through World Emergency Relief for the American Bible Society in its splendid work of providing scriptures for Russian prisoners in Germany and the Balkans. At the last report from Secretary Francis C. Stiffler the society had overspent its emergency fund by \$23,000 in trying to meet this pressing need.

Funds will go also to help provide scriptures for Latin America through Southern Baptist publishing houses for Mexico, Brazil, Argentina and Chile, where skyrocketing printing prices threaten closure or curtailment.

Work of Friends

Among projects with which Southern Baptists sympathize but which have not yet received wide-spread support in the denomination are those of the kind carried on by the society of Quakers or Friends, done under the general direction of Professor Rufus Jones.


According to a wire received from John Rich of the Quakers nearly two months after America's entry in the war, this society still was "feeding in whole or part 84,000 school children, 10,000 mothers and infants, also women, children and aged people in the concentration camps of unoccupied France." Mr. Rich is working with the governments of China and the United States in an effort to transport more ambulance drivers and doctors from this country to serve in west China.
