NAUL admonished Timothy to use sound words. This is necessary if one would correctly convey his thoughts to another, for words are the vehicles of expression; they are the buckets that carry one's thoughts. Words however like some

The Baptist other things, are affected by Vocabulary use. They change their meaning, they pour out the content they had in one age and fill themselves in another age with a new content. Not only so, but they have different meanings on the tongues of different groups. Hence, the same words may mean different things under different circum stances. This makes it necessary to know what one means when he uses a word. The most static words in the language are liable to be filled with different contents when used by different groups The word, "God", does not mean the same to a Mohammedan that it does to a Christian, and an atheist would give to the word a meaning differ ent to either Mohammedan or Christlan

Sometimes we do not recognize this fact in our discussions, with the result that we write and talk to no purpose. Baptists, for instance, use the same words that other Christian bodies use, but the words used do not always mean the same thing. The words "church," "baptism", "com munion", "Christian union" and many others do not have the same meaning to Baptists that they have to Protestants and Catholics. A church, to Baptists, is a local organization. Baptism is the immersion of a believer by the proper authority in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit Communion is the Lord's Supper set in the church for the Lord's people to commemorate the Lord's death until He returns. Christian union is the fellowship of all believers in Christ. But to other Christian gro has these words have different meanings.

Baptists with these other Christian groups, use the same words but we do not speak the same language.

Are Baptists Becoming Ideologists?

BAPTISTS are a people with a great faith, a great Christ, a great Book, a great destiny In fact, they are a people who have a God worth believing, a Christ worth trusting, a church worth joining and a task worth sacrificing for

We wonder sometimes, however, if they are not becoming ideologists. That is, are we supplanting individual faith with public belief? To put it another way, do we have a faith the content of which is Christian, but do we have it in an academic way-bearing the name Christian, but living a life that is in essence and spirit materialistic and pagen?

Belief is the sap which vitalizes the tree of life in all of its branches, big and little. As the sap so is the tree. As the belief - real and not simply "public belief" so is the life of Baptists. But belief always answers the question HOW? as well as the question WHAT? True belief is the same as true realism. That is to say, we understand ourselves realistically only when we see our existence not as isolated from but as connected with the ultimate real.

What is the ultimate real? It is not an idealistic society created here on earth. That would be to perfect naturalism and clothe it with a Christian name. The ultimate real is the real ultimate and can be nothing less than the spiritual regeneration of man and the actual triumph of Christ in the creation of a new world through the transcendency of the spiritual over the ma-

The present ideology from which we must be delivered if Christianity is not to suffer disintegration is the partly idealistic and the partly naturalistic rationalism which in the past century housed itself in Christianity with the modern the ological slogan, "Ethical Religion", by which Christianity is characterized in the new theology This slogan reduces Christian faith to stoic religious idealism. It confounds the Gespel of Christ with the general rational ideas of the universal brotherhood of man and the universal fatherhood of God, which the stoic philosophers taught. It transforms the New Testament message of the kingdom of God into the rational idea of a nat ural historical process of ethical and social evo-

The proponents of this idea take the Sermon on the Mount as a statement of the ethical program of Jesus and concern themselves about what is to be done, without asking the question who can do it. Christianity is concerned with the one who can do it as well as the what is to be done and he who assumes that the law or the ideal is a sufficient dynamic for morality is enmeshed in a mistaken ideology; he does not see the human will as it is-sin-bound and egoistic. History In The Making

ECRETARY OF STATE Cordell Hull is not a clergyman. However, he "preached" a powerful "sermon" in that "Mission to Moscow" report before joint congressional sessions, where members had joined with Dr. James Shera Montgomery, House chaplain, in jointly repeating the Lord's Prayer for the first time in congressional history.

Cordell Hull's speech delivered in his colorful Tennessee twang, Indicat ed our country's firm determination to join with other peace-loving nations in winning a Christian neace after the bombs stop falling, and Johnny comes marching home

His message, warmly received by Democrats and Republicans allke, strongly implied that we intend to win that Christian peace through proper political economic and social machinery and through that spirit of Christian neighborliness that is char acteristically American. In the hustle and bustle of modern living, it seemed that old-time neighborliness had vanished. But it has not died.

Good WIII Growing

For these Christians to whom Coulet Russia is a big question mark, there WAS a reassuring note in Cordell Hull's sermon" - a feeling that Christian good will is now beginning to rise, and will continue to rise, above any fears of Communism or Bolshevism

As we sat in that packed House gallery recently and heard (ordell Hull roundly applauded as he called Stalin one of this age's greatest statesmen and leaders, we got to thinking about the people of Russia, their vallant struggle against the Nazis, and their inherent religious spirit

Secretary Hull's reference to the need for world neighborliness reminded us of a family we knew "back when" Everyone called them "The Battling Smiths" they fought so among themselves. But something happened one day to one member of the family Family honor was at stake. Old quarrels soon were for getten in the family's grim determi nation to fight together as a solid bloc against a common menace. The stateaman's reference to nations hav ing some together in a brotherhood for self-preservation has a lesson in it

If we cannot live together as peace ful civilized human beings, even for the sake of self-preservation, then we will bases to die like beasts of the

Verily, Layman Cordell Hull "preached" a "sermon". His "congregation" of all faiths, races, and creeds who heard the message beside their radios and in the stately halls of Congress were the people of America moon whom ultimately will rest responsibility for putting some of that smalltown back-fence neighborliness into international relations

We Can Live Together

It can be done. After hearing Cordell Hull's "sermon" we know it will be done, with the help of the Godfearing peoples of the family of nations. The Moscow parley was a big step in that direction, it was history in the making, the shape of things to

French Missionary

RECENTLY I was in a revival with the Northport Baptist Church. Northport, Alabama, at the invitation of the pastor, Brother A. T. Atkins.

It happened that a few hundred French cadets from France, Corsica. and North Africa were in training at an air base at Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

I made arrangements and went over and they understood my Louisiana French almost perfectly. There is not as much difference between our Louisiana French and theirs as some might think. I immediately wrote to Brother Gustave Morter of New Orleans, a converted French Catholic from Paris who has a little Christian book store in New Orleans. He immediately sent me 500 tracts and some Gospels but 1 was not permitted to give them out at the air base.

However, my opportunity came when a parade was held in Tuscaloosa one afternoon while I was there. 1 took my tracts and Gospels and went out on the streets and as I would meet these boys in groups I would greet them in French and they would giadly respond. "The tithing system," he says, "if adopted by the churches, would give astounding figures. A compilation shows that the annual business turnover in this country amounts to more than five hundred billion dollars it is estimated that of this amount four fifths pass through the hands of the church people. One per cent of this amount would mean five billion dollars a year. Assuming that there is a profit of 10 per cent on this turn over, it would mean that there is coming each year to the church neonle of America an income amounting to forty billion dollars. If the tithing process were in operation this would give the churches in tithes about four billion dollars a year."

Dr. Ellis A. Puller, president of the Southern Baptist Theological Semi nary, in his radio address on the Bap tist Hour, said that if Baptists of the South tithed they would turn five hun dred million dollars into the treasure of their churches.

It does seem that a tithe should be come a minimum for giving, and if we all gave that amount, think o what it would mean to the kingdom of God!

A The Home Mission Board contemplates enlarging its program of rural work early in 1944. The executive secretary was instructed by the Board in its annual meeting to work out a co-operative rural program with the state mission boards.
