From 1920 to 1932, church giving totaled \$5,534,906,

178, but for the next thirteen years, from 1930 to 1945, it totaled \$4,479,560,695, a decline of better than \$1,000,000.

The per capita gifts averaged from church members slumped from \$20.31 during the first period to \$13.90 during the second period. This, of course, is for the total church membership in the United States.

#### Education and Religion

The Home Mission monthly of the Northern Baptist Home Mission Society, under the title of "A Great University Acknowledges That It Cannot Be Neutral in Religion," has this to say: "One of the few hopeful signs of the times is the announcement of a new development of religion at Yale University to develop greater ethical and spiritual values. When a leading university thus admits that it cannot be neutral in religion and that religion must be motivating force in the lives of students and in the world, it is back on those solid foundations on which the colleges of America were originally established."

It should be said, however, that religion is not Christianity and that morals and ethics are principles of conduct taught by the pagans as well as by Christians. If we do no more than teach ethics we may have better behavior and may come to think that this is all that is essential, thereby failing to secure that which the gospel provides, namely, salvation through a personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

It might be detrimental to the progress of Christianity to have our colleges throughout the country establish a department of religious education, since it would hardly be likely that they would teach the New Testament doctrine of regeneration as essential to salvation, and leaving this our would lead our people away from Christ.

### THE HOME MISSION BOARD AT HOME

NOVEMBER, 1946

The Home Mission Board at last is in its permanent home. This has been quite an achievement. For about two years we have been working to find a place suitable in every way and well located where we could house the Board for the next hundred years. We have at last secured the place. The Board, for the first time in its history, is adequately housed in its own home with ample room for effective work.

It has taken time and thought, as well as a hit of wise trading, to secure the place we have.

For six or more months the property committee searched the city of Atlanta for either a lot on which to build or a building that could be adapted to the needs of the Board. After looking at dozens of pieces of property, the com-

mittee found a building at 494 Spring Street, N. W., that was in every way suitable. It was fireproof, air-conditioned. with full basement and two stories, all together about 25,000 square feet of space. But it was twelve blocks up from the downtown section, and when we moved into this building, adequate and fine as the building was, we immediately found

acceptate and me as the obtaining was, we immediately found it very inconvenient as to location.

We then found that the building we are in, right in the heart of the downtown section, could be bought. It was agreed by the property committee that if we could sell the building we had purchased and were in, that we would buy the downtown building.

We paid \$87,500.00 for the uptown building. We bought We paid \$87,700.00 for the uptown building. We bought an adjoining lot to keep anyone from shutting us in with a building, for \$4,000.00. The property uptown cost us approximately \$91,500.00. We sold this property for \$125,000.00, which gave us a profit of \$29,132.00. We had rented the uptown building for an annual rental of \$20,500.00. We netted in rentals \$11,410.00. This gave us in addition to our own rent a profit on our sale and rent of

addition to our own rent a profit on our sale and rent of the uptown property of \$40,542.00 to apply on the purchase of the downtown building.

The downtown building cost \$200,382.00. Deducting the profit made in the sale and net rentals of the uptown building, our new, permanent home cost us \$159,839.00.

The 161 Spring Street Building is fireproof, but not airconditioned. It is three stories high, but the foundation is constructed to carry six more stories, making a nine-story building. Each floor contains 6,000 square feet of actual office space, not including halls. A moderate resital for this

space is \$1.75 per square foot, or \$10,500.00 per floor, or \$31,500.00 for the three floors per year, with the rentals for basement rooms not included.

The Home Mission Board occupies the entire second floor.
We have private offices for each department of work, a

chapel large enough for our Board meetings, and room for a library. In the basement we have ample storage room for our records and a studio for our Visual Education depart-

On the present rental basis we will get our own rent free, amounting to \$10,500.00 per year, and 4% net on our

#### The Catholic Church and the Negro

In a Labor publication, the statement is made that 300,000 In a Labor publication, the statement is made that 300,000 Negroes were received into the Catholic Church in the last few years. If this be true, it is significant indeed. The paper making this statement says further that "the Catholic Church is making the best approach to the Negro people and the Negro problem." It justifies the statement on the ground that "Catholics have taken the lead in fighting racism and in movements to promote better racial understanding."

It is true that the Catholic Church makes no dist It is true that the Catholic Church makes no distinction between races and that the policy of the Catholic Church would put the Negro on the same social basis with the French, Italians, German, Russian, and other immigrants from European countries.

Southern Baptists have on a very sensible, sane, wise, effective, and efficient mission program for our Negro brethren. Dr. Roland Smith, a well-educated, well-trained Negro, ren. Dr. Koland Smith, a well-educated, well-trained Negro, is the assistant to the Executive Secretary in this program. We are enlarging that program just as rapidly as funds will permit. We believe that the enlargement of this program will meet and effectively stymic the Catholic program which is being backed up by millions of dollars.

The Catholic Year Book reports that there were 57,430 converts to Catholicism in 1945, and that 705,557 children were baptized. This gives, according to Catholic statistics, a total of 24,402,124 Catholics in the United States, Alaska, and the Hawaiian Islands. This number, of course, includes the infants baptized. There are 38,980 ordained priests and 139,218 nuns reported. The Catholics are spending millions of dollars to make America Catholic. The antidote for Catholicism is the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

#### A News Day for Hayes, Louisiana

We have just closed a ten-day revival with the church at Hayes, Louisiana. Rev. M. Aguillard is the pastor. This is more of a missionary story than a re-vival report. I hope that everyone who reads this article will be more missionary

For many years the work at Haves has been very, very low. The old church building was practically rotted down, and the few Baptists who could be found there were very discouraged, as there were no regular services being held. The Holy Rollers had come in and used the church building, and finally after some time built their own build-ing, but took all of the pews and the piano to their own church.

Some of the faithful few Baptists got

in touch with Brother L. C. Smith, one of our French missionaries at Pineville, Louisiana, and he began going there and holding services as often as he could. He saw the need of a missionary on the field and the great possibility in that part of the state, as there is no Baptist church between Lake Charles and Lake Arthur, a distance of forty-five miles, or between Welch and the Gulf of Mexico, another forty-five miles. Haves is located in the center of this field, and is a very thickly-populated Catholic and

Holy Roller country.

In November of last year Rev. M. Aguillard, another French missionary resigned his good church at Bridge City, Texas, where he had led the people in building a beautiful building and had seen the church grow into one of the preatest rural churches in southeast Texas. Brother Aguillard felt God was calling him back to his own country,

and among his own people.

When Brother Aguillard moved on the field everything was very difficult. They had moved out of a nice, modern pastor's home at Bridge City, and had now found shelter in a tumble-down shack with no heat. They had to go to bed many times when they would get

cold.

The Home Mission Board has appropriated several thousand dollars for this work. An entire city block of land has been bought in the heart of the town. There are many beautiful pecan trees and a fine well of water on the ground. A beautiful modern church building 30 x 50 has been erected and completely furnished, and the pastor's home, a 36 x 40 modern bungalow, will soon be ready

## FOR THE GLORY OF GOD

#### Pastor William Fetler of Russia, now known as Basil Malof of Washington, D. C.

In response to an inquiry from a kindly interested Southern Baptist leader, the following authorized explanation is given about the change of the name of Pastor Ferler to Malof, and about his present work.

Many will remember Pattor Fetler-Mollof as the founder of the First Russian Baptist Churches at St. Petersburg and Morcow, Runia. He was born in Russia, his further be ne one of the early Baptist pointer prescher there. He received his theological training at the pastons' college of the great Baptist prince of preschera, C. H. Spurgeon, in London, England. Pastor Malof first came to America in 1911 as leader of a delegation of fitty Baptist pastors to attend the Baptist World Alliance in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. His addresses at the meeting are princed in the Alliance volume of that year. It was at the meeting of the Alliance when Dr. J. H. Shakappeare, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance, made the public statement: "The future religious life of Russis depends more upon William Petter than upon any other living man."

Pastor Fetler built the first Russian Baptist Church at St. Petersburg, with a seating capacity of 2,000. The building was dedicated on Christmis, 1911, by Dr. Robert Sturrt MacArthur, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of New York City and president of the Baptist World Alliance.

Because of the widely spreading influence of his work all over the Russian Empire, Patter Feller was sentenced in the Kremlin of Moncow to imprisonment in a forteres and later was banished to Siberis. Finally he was exiled from Russia. Feller was the first Baptist preacher whose presence in Russia Abstraction and the stress of the Russian State Church.

Patter Feller's manifold experiences are described in interesting detail in his life history, Sentenced to Siberis. The price of the book is \$1,00 and can be ordered from the Russian Bible Society, P. O. Box 2709, Washington, D. C.

During his exile from Russia, Pastor Fetler made several visits to the United States and was a welcome speaker in assistors of the Southern Baptist Convention. During his exile years Fetler established, with the assistance of misionaries, about 200 new Baptist Curches in Foliand and chere Eastern European countries. Pastor Fetler and his family orchestra have sisted many churches in Georgia, South and North Carolina, Virginia, Florida, and other states. At the New York World Enhibition they gave a concert in the Temple

When war came, Paster Fetler was unable to return to his mission field in Eastern Europe. Having come to the United States as visitors, the family had to leave the country. By special consideration of the Government, they were allowed to go to Canada and from three to return to the States with the right to become American citizens.

The Fetler children were placed in various tehnols and universities in the United States and since then have graduated with honors and degrees. Four of the sons were drafted into the American Army where they served with distinction.

Pastor Fetler moved to Washington and brought into being again the Russian Bible Society, which was first established under Car Alexander the First, the conqueror of Napoleon in 1813 in St. Peresburg, In 1826, because of strong reactionary influence. Cara Nicholas the First cloud the Bible Society. One hundred and eighteen years later under the presidency of Pastor Fetler, who had already changed his name to Bail Malof, the Russian Bible Society was incorporated in firer America. Pastor Malof is a member of the First Bapilat Church of Washington, D. C.

The Russian Bible Society has recently purchased the former Italian Embassy for \$73,000 as its American and international headquarter and as a home of the Russian Missionary Training Institute.

The Society has sent an offer to the Soviet Government to publish in Moscow one million copies of the Russian Bible and five million copies of the New Testament.

The Society is building up a fund of \$45,000 for the purpose of bringing to Washington from camps in Belgium and Germany the first group of fifty refoge Baptist young men for training in mission work to be sent back to Soviet Russia as evangelists and missionaries.

#### THE REASON FOR CHANGE OF NAME

Twenty-five years ago Pator Feller began to use the name of Malof as his literary and pen name. Under the Rustian name he published \$1,000 copies of the Rustian Bible following World War I. Under the Rustian name he published a book of poems in English which was printed in London tome twenty years ago.

After his exile from Kussa, while president of the Kussan Bible Soci-city, Felter realized the necessity for adopting a name in the language of his minutry, Rusia. In a spiritual experience which thowed him the greatness of God and the timeliness of himself, Pastor Felter ideo-logically chose a new name, Malof, which in Russian means. "a little one," It might be added parenthetically that the family name, Felter, had

logically chose a new name, Malof, which in Russian means." In title one, "It might be added parentherically that the family name, Fetter, had been imposed upon his grandfather, a Larvian peasant werf of the German barrons of Russia, at the time when the Russian Crast freed the serfs. In the change of name, Pator Malof followed the example, of the Apostle Paul who chose the name Paul, which means exactly the same in Greek as the word Malof means in Russian—"a little one."
Paul discarded his Jewish name and adopted a Greek, and his ministry was mainly to the Gentille. As Paul felt he should be a "Greek to the Greek," to Pastor Malof delived to be a Russian to the Russian.

Jesus said that the children of this world are often wiser in their affairs than the children of light, and this is clearly evidenced by the present Russian rulers in the changing of these original names into simple-sounding Russian names. ## A VACATION IN CUBA

A Suggestion to Southern Baptists By E. A. STANISTREET
