Missions Committees Key To 30,000 Success

The use of the missions committees of churches and associations in 1964 will determine the success of the final year of Southern Baptists' 30,000 Movement.

The leaders in the movement are C. C. Warren of Charlotte, N. C., and M. Wendell Belew of Atlanta. Warren, director of the 30,000 Movement, is employed by the mission agency and the Sunday School Board.

Belew is secretary of the department of associational administration services and church extension for the Home Mission Board.

"Some 9,000 missions and churches must be started this year, if we are to reach our goal," Warren said. "This is an impossible task unless churches and associations use their missions committees in discovering areas of need and enlisting workers to start such missions."

Warren and Belew said the primary duties of the committee are discovery of needs, distribution of information, enlistment of workers, and correlation of mission activities.

SBC Polish Work Grows With Buffalo Mission

The organization of the Polish Baptist Mission in Buffalo, N.Y., has accentuated Southern Baptists' recent work among Slavic peoples in the United States.

The Buffalo congregation will be the third to affiliate with the Convention in recent months. The others are in New York City and Cleveland, Ohio.

To establish the Buffalo work, the Home Mission Board of the SBC purchased property in the city at 821 Fillmore Avenue, within a two-mile radius of 20,000 Polish-speaking people.

The Board is cooperating in the effort with the Frontier Baptist Association of New York and the Polish Baptist Association.

E. L. Golonka of Atlanta, general field worker in the Language Missions Department of the mission agency, said a missionary pastor will be secured to lead the work.

Golonka, himself a native of Poland and easily at home with six languages, says there are more than seven million people in the United States who were born in Poland or descended from Polish parents and speak Polish.

Survey Shows Gadsden Below Nation's Average

A religious survey of Baldwin County, of which Gadsden, Alabama is the principal city, shows only 82.8 per cent of its nearly 100,000 people members of a church. The national average is 64.5 per cent.

"The survey findings came as a surprise to most of us who thought the county above or at least equal to the national average in church membership," said survey coordinator, Hugh Chambliss of Gadsden.

The denominational structure of the county shows Baptists with 60.3 per cent of the church members, Methodists with 20.4 per cent, the Church of Christ with 3.3 per cent, Presbyterians with 3 per cent, Church of God with 2.4 per cent, Catholics with 2.1 per cent, and all others with less than two per cent.

Moffatt Elected HMB Photographer-Technician

Gene Edward Moffatt of Nashville, Tenn., was named photographer-technician in the HMB department of promotion.

Moffatt, 37, has had experience in still, black and white color, and, motion picture photography and with radio and television.

He has done special assignments for Broadman Films Department, Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, in still and motion picture work.

Courts Radford, in recommending Moffatt to the Board, said, "I believe he has the attitude, motive, talent, experience, and training to enable him to preach missions with his camera."

A native of Memphis, Tenn., Moffatt is a graduate of Union University, Jackson, Tenn. He attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Tex., and was graduated with the BD degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky.

He has served as an associate pastor in Texas and as pastor of missions and churches in Tennessee, Indiana, and Virginia.

Until April 1 Moffatt will serve the Home Mission Board only on a part-time basis.

His wife is the former Joyce E. Arnold of Forrest City, Ark. They have three children.

The Excitement of an Offering

When the special offering for home missions is taken in your church what prompts you to give?

Probably most of us give to the inclusive concept of missions when we take part in the Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions. The difference in how much we give may be determined by economic factors at the time, other emphases crowding into our consciousness, and the effectiveness of those in the church calling our attention to the needs.

However, if how the offering will be used is a factor, this year's should have a special appeal for most of us. It contains funds for some of the most promising and exciting ministries in years.

One of the more interesting is the \$50,000 which will enable 100 ministerial students from our seminaries to spend 10 weeks this summer holding revivals in churches which did not report baptizing anyone last year.

This not only meets a mammoth need (since there were more than 5,000 such churches), but evangelism is an area in which Southern Baptists have always responded.

In faith that Southern Baptists will again respond in prayers and gifts, the personnel of the Division of Evangelism is enlisting students for the effort. The secretaries of evangelism in the states are contacting churches where the revivals may be held. Of course, no one will hold a revival without being invited by a church; but many of these churches will need encouragement even to schedule the revival since they are without full-time pastors and most probably went through last year without any special evangelistic effort.

The offering of \$3,500,000 is again the largest in history and will share almost equally with the Cooperative Program gifts in providing the total home mission budget.

These funds, besides the continuing mission programs, will continue Southern Baptists' strong ministry toward resettlement and assistance of Latin-American refugees, provide for additional mission pastors in our expanding work in pioneer missions, and enable leaders to deal with the metropolitan crisis in the inner city and downtown areas.

The theme of the offering, "In Freedom's Holy Light," emphasizes what these special efforts accomplish: Freedom from sin's curse for souls reached in evangelism; freedom in a new country for the insecure refugee; freedom to give full time to his task for the struggling mission pastor; and freedom to build for the small, pioneer congregation.

Miss Annie Today



The results of what Miss Annie Armstrong started and promoted for world missions mean a host of Southern Baptists are studying, praying, and giving millions of extra dollars each year for home and foreign missions.

On a warm November Saturday last year, the Maryland Historical Society erected a marker recognizing the spiritual contribution of Saters Baptist Church, started in 1742 about 10 miles from present-day Baltimore. The church, the oldest Baptist congregation in the state, continues an active ministry today.

Members and visitors, as they did the Sunday following the erection of the marker, reach the church through a picturesque lane from the highway where the marker stands.

Down this same lane 100 years ago, Miss Annie Armstrong, with her mother and two sisters, drove their carriage to attend the annual June meeting, or "cherry meeting," of the then century-old church. It was here that Miss Annie received her first impressions for missions.

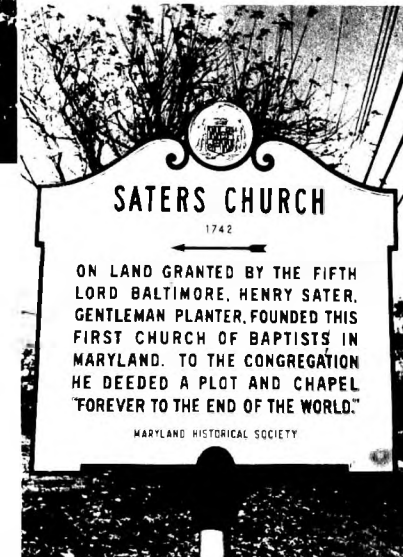
Henry Sater, the great, great grandfather of Miss Annie, first had held services in his barn. His mission-minded wife thought that a church building should be erected. Mr. Sater erected a small building from English brick that would seat about 30 people. It was dedicated July, 1742.

Miss Annie was, no doubt, impressed in this annual meeting when she heard that Mrs. Henry Sater, her great, great grandmother, was the one asked to place the cornerstone in the first meetinghouse in 1742. In this annual meeting, there

was fellowship, food, and always the telling of the story of the beginning of the church with an emphasis on missions.

The cemetery and church building look very much as they did when Miss Annie attended the services on the second Sunday in June in the 1860's. The building has been doubled in size, joining American brick with the original English brick.

In the Sunday morning service, November 8, 1863, the pastor of the Saters Baptist Church poured out his heart to the people to be missionary, beginning with the people near them and going to all others. Prayer was offered in this morning service in a reverent, earnest manner for the unsaved in the community and in the world. When the offering was taken, missions was given as the motive. All ages, even pre-school-age children, put money into the offering plates. When the pastor gave the invitation, a Junior girl came forward expressing her faith in Christ.

Three simple mission principles crystalized early in the mind of Miss Annie Armstrong after she became a Christian and began to participate in missions. She felt that intelligent prayer for missions came after study of missions, that study and prayer resulted in the commitment of life, and commitment of life included money for missions.

The Saters Baptist Church is practicing today what Miss Annie lived and taught.

There is hardly a phase of mission work sponsored by Southern Baptists today in which Miss Annie did not take the initiative in starting, in promoting, or in assisting denominational leaders.

Miss Annie has the label of home missions. Actually, she was a moving force to aid J. M. Frost, Sunday school executive secretary, in getting Sunday school literature plans developed and accepted by Southern Baptists. She gave Frost a mailing list of Sunday school superintendents. She promoted the idea of annuity for missionaries and ministers.

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Miss Annie started the study for the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions and special offering for foreign missions in 1888. The inspiration that came from Miss Lottie Moon regarding the need led Miss Annie to recommend that the offering be called the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. There are many other foreign mission projects to which Miss Annie gave her time and talent in starting.

She worked with Isaac Tichenor, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board, in promoting an offering for church sites and church loans. She began the study and the week of prayer and offering for home missions in 1895, which later was named in her honor.

Miss Annie studied and worked with Negro Baptist leaders and did much to help them in their work. The Indians



and language people received much of her time as she traveled at her own expense and without salary to visit, to see the need, and to raise funds. She used every means available to tell the people about the needs.

The lack of printed materials on home and foreign missions greatly disturbed Miss Annie. She started a great thrust for missionary education. The Maryland state paper and later other state papers were enlisted to use a column or page on missions. A mission room was established in Baltimore where many volunteer workers assisted in sending out tracts which Miss Annie had printed on different phases of mission work.

Miss Annie is buried in the Armstrong family lot in the Greenmount Cemetery in Baltimore, Maryland. Many people visit this grave, especially since the book on Miss Annie's life has been written by Elizabeth Marshall Evans of Richmond, Va. Almost every day, fresh flowers are placed on the tomb by someone who believes in what Miss Annie taught and practiced about missions.

Today, there are thousands of Miss Annies who lead people to study, to pray, and to share in missions by service and money.

A ministry started by Miss Annie for seamen who came to the Baltimore port with important cargo and returned with loaded ships to many lands is being carried on today by David Nyquist and other laymen.

Thousands who are participating in missions, beginning where they are and joining with others to take the gospel to all people, are living the life of missions for Miss Annie Armstrong.

In terms of people, just from the home mission standpoint with this special offering for missions, there are 2,200 home missionaries where there would be 1,100 without the offering. There are two church buildings for Indians, lan-

guage people, and other groups where there would be just one. There are approximately 50,000 professions of faith annually in services conducted by home missionaries. This would be 25,000 professions or less without the Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions. A practice of what Miss Annie lived and taught—study missions, pray for missions, give service and money to missions—will change the life of every Southern Baptist.

Don served as a summer missionary in North Dakota. He speaks at length of that mission field and adds, "when I think of my campus, there is a hurt inside, because the needs are so great, and there is so little I can do." 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No Diminution of Mary's Role by Ecumenical Council

"The general secular press reaction to the Marian vote—that the slim 1114-1074 majority was a victory for 'liberals'—had several Council Fathers and experts recalling to their journalistic friends and acquaintances Pope Paul's warning to the press that there is little substance to the alleged 'division.'"

The bishops tried in vain to head off the misinterpretation. Before the vote was taken the day's moderator Gregorio Cardinal Agagianian, asserted:

"No vote on either side can be construed as constituting any lessening of the dignity of the Blessed Virgin or any diminution of her preeminent role in the church."

While it is true there are some minimalists who want to stick to Scripture and tradition and say no more, they are a small minority.

A larger group held that a separate treatment of the subject would widen the gulf between Protestants and Catholics because of the non-Catholic misunderstanding of the Church's position.

Many hope that by the inclusion of Mary in the schema on the Church, Protestants will see the true relationship. Mary is not more important than Christ and she is not considered apart from Christ.

On the other hand, the result of the vote means that the Church is not being considered apart from Mary—and this meets with the approval of the Catholic minimalists as well as some of the separated brethren.

Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta, a member of the Council Commission on the Liturgy, recalls how he was misinterpreted in the United States press when he issued the following statement:

"If Our Lord Jesus Christ is kept in the center of the Christian's life of prayer and worship, all other elements appear in their proper place. Surely the place of His Mother Mary was made clear by Christ Himself at the wedding feast of Cana and at Calvary, by Mary herself, and should be clear to all of us. Because she is the Mother

of Christ she has a claim upon our filial love and our proper veneration."

"But to attempt to center our religion in Mary, to exaggerate her cult, to multiply her devotions, in such a way that Christ is obscured or forgotten would be a blasphemy to the Son, an embarrassment to the memory of the Mother, and a pathetic deviation on the part of those baptized in Christ."

He later felt obliged to issue a second statement which said: "If any implication was reported which would downgrade the place of our Blessed Mother, such an implication was not in my statement nor could it be, since I simply stated the traditional teaching about the Blessed Virgin Mary."

It is significant that of the ten amendments approved to chapter V of the liturgy schema, the very first puts greater emphasis on the preeminent role of the Blessed Virgin in the Church's liturgical cycle.

Another amendment, rather than downplaying Mary and the Saints, declared that they are to be honored and their images and relics held in veneration" (The Tablet, October 31, 1963).

The Ecumenical Council is merely reaffirming the official teachings of the Roman Catholic Church throughout the centuries. In that church prayers are addressed to Mary, and she is honored with hyperdulia. This is a word used by Catholic theologians to indicate the highest kind of worship which, according to them, may be given to a created being. Hyperdulia is said to be a kind of worship inferior to that rendered to God, however, it is practically undistinguishable from it. It ascribes to her names, offices, attributes, and miraculous powers, which exalt her to a level with Christ.

The Roman Catholic doctrine of Mary asserts, "She (Mary) is truly the Mother of God, because Jesus Christ is the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, equal to the Father and the Holy Spirit, and truly God" (A Catechism for Inquirers, p. 83).

The title is altogether unscriptural.

Mary was the mother of Jesus as man, but not as God. We cannot separate the Godhead of Christ the Son from the Godhead of the Father and the Holy Spirit, as there is but one God. Therefore, to give Mary the title "Mother of God" is to erroneously exalt her, and affirm what is utterly illogical, anti-scriptural, and impossible.

Yet Pope Sixtus V in 1587 officially approved the title "Mater Creatoris" Mary, Mother of our Creator. Roman Catholics today publicly pray to Mary as "Mother of our Creator" in the "Litany of the Blessed Virgin" (Manual of Prayers, p. 71).

In Scripture, Mary refers to herself as the "handmaiden" of the Lord. (Luke 1:48). Realizing her sinful nature, and her need of salvation, she brought God a son offering after the birth of Christ, and called him "My Saviour." (Luke 1:47, 2:24).

An official teaching of the Roman Catholic Church is "The Immaculate Conception of Mary." On December 8, 1854, Pope Pius IX defined that "the doctrine which declares that the most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of Almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved exempt from all stain of original sin, is a doctrine revealed by God, and therefore must be believed firmly and constantly by all the faithful." (Question Box, pp. 358, 359).

There is not a single text in the Bible that teaches directly or indirectly that Mary was conceived without sin. The whole word of God teaches the contrary, even as Paul declares that "As all have sinned and have need of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). Mary's own language shows that she regarded herself as a sinner needing salvation. "... my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour" (Luke 1:47).

Another dogma is "The Assumption of Mary." This doctrine became a dogma in November 1950, with the solemn

area. As a result of his report, Ann Garner was appointed by the Home Mission Board to serve with us.

By the time Ann had come, we had already organized a mother's club, primary club, pre-school club and a nursery. On Friday nights we had a boy's club and a teen club.

The WMU of the association promised that they would support with \$75 a month to help with the program. This helped greatly, with the \$800 a month we received from the association.

Another concern of ours was the lack of doctor and medical care for these people whose income averaged \$40 a week. Then came the idea of a clinic. We prepared for it and on January 10, 1962, we began with our first patients. In the first year we registered over 1700

children. We only registered them up to 16 years of age.

By the end of the year we had six regular doctors coming each week and had nine other specialists in the city who volunteered their services.

The pharmaceutical companies have been very gracious. The representatives and doctors bring us their free samples. Since there is a lack of money, few prescriptions are filled. The medicine is furnished at the clinic for those who ask for it. We do pay for the penicillin, but very little other is bought, except for cough syrup and a few other medicines.

Many of the people who come to the clinic are Catholic. One very intelligent young woman came. After I had talked to her about the Lord, read her Scripture, she said, "Brother Davison, I've

been a Catholic all my life. I've learned the prayers, but you've taught me more Bible here in these few minutes than I've heard in all my life. I didn't know these things were in the Bible." And she said, "I'm so glad that I came to clinic today."

This young lady and her husband did visit our church. I have hope of being able to baptize them as a result.

We also believe since it is a ministry of the Lord that we ought to carry on the spiritual emphasis, for Jesus went preaching, healing and feeding the people. His greatest interest was their spiritual welfare, therefore, we want them to know that Jesus is interested in their spiritual welfare. I have talked to them about their souls. Since February of '63, we have had 37 professions of faith. All of these being adults but two.

Fire Station Provides Great Lakes History

Nothing about the physical setting indicated anything historic was taking place.

The small, concrete block building had once housed a volunteer fire department on the expanding north side of suburban Indianapolis. The date was two days before 1963 closed its record, and this Monday night was caught in 8-below-zero temperature.

Warmth for the 150 who packed the area where fire trucks had once stood came from a noisy, overhead heater, but the defiant cold still crept in under the big, front doors.

The noise of the heater and the occasional wail of a tired baby would take turns harassing the speakers during the next two hours.

Mission leaders from Georgia, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan, and nearby Baptist neighbors had come to help the

26 members of the Northside Baptist Chapel become the 1500th Southern Baptist church in the Great Lakes area.

The audience included many who had measured the spiritual need for the 70 million people living in the eight states which border the Great Lakes.

Present were state Baptist executive secretaries, Noel M. Taylor of Illinois, Fred D. Hubbs of Michigan and E. H. Moore of Indiana; Southern Baptist Convention Home Mission Board executive secretary, Courts Redford; and Indiana convention president, James Abernathy of Evansville. Expected, but unable to attend at the last moment, was Ray E. Roberts, executive secretary of Ohio.

These were men concerned that less than 50 per cent of the population of these states were members of churches. They were especially concerned with the

big, commercial cities of the area. These Great Lakes states have 20 of the largest metropolises in the country.

The presence of these men, together with state mission directors of three states, area missionaries, and most of the pastors of the Indianapolis area, heightened the historical sense of the occasion.

Taylor emphasized it when he said, "Fifteen years ago there were barely 600 Southern Baptist churches in the Great Lakes states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York."

"In fact, almost all of these were in one state (Illinois), and they were in the southern part of that state. Now Illinois alone has 883."

Actually the 1000th church for the area came in 1956. Five years later the

The First Southern Baptist Church of Indianapolis, which was started in 1953, was the first Southern Baptist work in greater Indianapolis, which has a population of 697,550. Gordon W. Paschall has pastored this church since its beginning as a mission.

It was at the First Southern Baptist Church that the State Convention of Baptist in Indiana was organized five years ago in January, 1959. E. Harmon Moore served as executive secretary.

This area has had a steady growth of Southern Baptist work since that time. During the last three years, 14 churches and missions have come into existence in greater Indianapolis, which includes all of Marion County.

Due to the fact that Indianapolis was one of the largest capital cities in the nation where Southern Baptist work was not strongly developed, the Home Mission Board has in recent months given

special assistance in four missions located in strategic areas of the city. It has made possible a full-time salary for the pastors, as well as making possible loans for some church sites.

The first of these began as the Westwood Baptist Chapel in August of 1962. This chapel meets in a fire station on the suburban westside where Lenard Leftwich serves as mission pastor.

Leftwich came from a Texas pastorate and is a graduate of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. The Westwood Baptist Chapel is being sponsored by the Coggin Avenue Baptist Church, Brownwood, Tex. George M. Slayton, pastor of the Coggin Avenue Baptist Church, was the former secretary of missions in Indiana and thus knew of the need. The Temple Baptist Church, Terre Haute, is the local sponsor within the association. Property for a building has been purchased in a good location

Northside Baptist Chapel was the second of this group which began work in March of 1963. It, also, meets in a fire station. Memorial Baptist Church in Brownburg, Ind. was the local sponsor and Southwayside Baptist Church, Ft. Worth, Tex., has co-sponsored it. The pastor, Gene Lake, was a member of this church before graduating from Southwestern Seminary. They have been able to purchase property and are planning to build as soon as possible. This chapel was constituted on Monday evening, December 30th, as the 1,500th Southern Baptist church in the Great Lakes area.

The third chapel, the North Suburban Baptist Chapel, was begun in July 1963. It has been able to purchase a church and pastor's home from another denomination through a local loan. L. L. Daye has been called as the mission

Pioneer Church Grows Rapidly

The Calvary Baptist Church of Greenwood, Ind., on the Indianapolis southside, has had an unusual history and quick growth during its brief existence.

This work was first begun in the heart of a mission pastor whom the Lord moved to Indianapolis through a transfer in his secular job. Greenwood, an area of 8,000 people, had no Southern Baptist witness at that time. F. S. Butler saw this needy area and felt God's leadership. The Trinity Baptist Church to which Rev. and Mrs. Butler belonged and which was located four miles away, voted to sponsor the work and the chapel was on its way.

Preceded by much visitation in the area, the chapel was started on December 2, 1962, in the kindergarten room of the local community building, with 23 in attendance. This meeting place was not available for evening services, so these were held in the homes. But then from January to March a nearby local funeral home allowed them the use of one of their funeral parlors for evening services.

These meeting places were outgrown and in March they were able to rent and remodel a furniture store building which the area missionary, Chas. E. Smith, had sought to rent for them from the very beginning.

With the pastor and his wife continuing to lead in visitation and organization, the chapel within six months had outgrown the facilities there also. By faith, this congregation began negotiations for a church in the heart of the city which was the former meeting place of the Christian church. In the meanwhile, they had been constituted into a church on May 19.

Just nine months from their first Sunday service this church purchased and moved into the former Christian church, the financing of which was all done locally. The building is brick construction and the sanctuary has a seating

capacity of 350. There is also educational space. For the unbelievable sum of \$20,000.00, they not only obtained this church building, but also a good three-bedroom parsonage located next door.

By the time of the first anniversary, the church had 57 additions by letter and 46 by baptism. There was an average

of 115 in Sunday school with an average of 60 in Training Union, and an active WMU with its auxiliaries. Since then a Brotherhood has been organized and the pastor has become full time.

They have had in their budget from the beginning, eight per cent to missions through the Cooperative Program as well as two per cent to associational missions. This church now has one mission, Capital City Baptist Chapel, in downtown Indianapolis, and is anticipating another one in the near future.

It is evident that consecration on the part of a pastor, concern on the part of a church, and visitation, evangelism, stewardship and missions in the proper perspective on the part of the new chapel have been important contributing factors in such rapid growth for a mission in the pioneer area.

The immediate need of the Indianapolis area is for many more such dedicated men to come support themselves temporarily and establish in this same manner other churches.

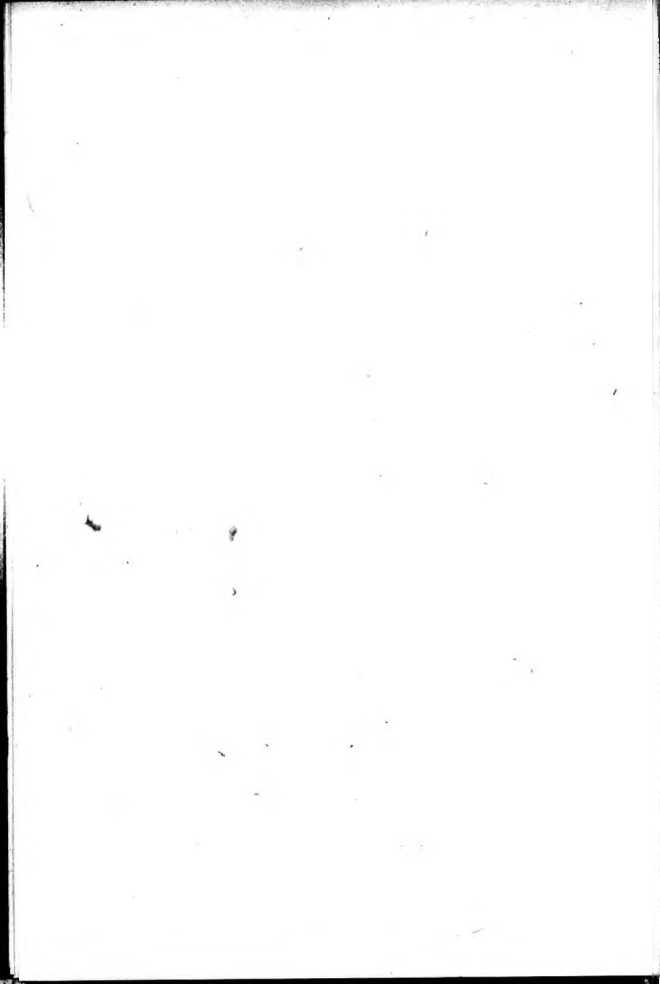

CAPITAL NEEDS — 1964 LANGUAGE

The capital needs expenditures, those funds used for buildings and loans for sites and churches, are detailed below. Of the \$817,408 designated for mission buildings, 45 per cent will come from the Annie Armstrong Offering, the remainder from the Cooperative Program.

In addition \$200,000 from the Annie Armstrong Offering will be used for church site loans. The Cooperative Program is also providing \$933,733 for the building loan funds.

ARIZONA

Phoenix, Spanish, Church and Residence \$25,000.00

This is for a new church building and residence for the Spanish Mission meeting at the corner of 20th and Buckeye Road. The present property is to be sold and the amount received from the sale applies on the cost of the new property in addition to this \$25,000. This project was deleted from the 1963 planning because of insufficient funds.

Nogales, Spanish, Site and Church Building \$35,000.00

This is for a church site and building to be used to minister to the large Spanish-speaking population in this border town.

CALIFORNIA

San Jose, Chinese, Church Site \$30,000.00

This is for a site upon which at a later date a church building for the Chinese congregation will be erected.

Fresno, Spanish, Church Building 22,000.00

This is for the erection of the first unit of a church building on a site previously acquired for this congregation.

FLORIDA

Miami, Spanish, Mission Chapels \$50,000.00

This is for the construction of one or more buildings for Spanish-speaking congregations in Miami. It is impossible to give the specific plans at this time.

MICHIGAN

Detroit, Spanish, Church Building \$30,000.00

This is for the construction of a church building for the Spanish-speaking congregation in Detroit.

NEW MEXICO

Church Building \$20,000.00

The specific project for which this will be used is to be selected.

NEW YORK CITY AREA

Church Buildings \$50,000.00

This is to acquire one or more properties for language missions congregations in the New York City area.

OHIO

Cleveland, Slavic, Church Building \$25,000.00

This is to acquire a property for a language missions congregation in Cleveland. This will be the first such project in the state of Ohio.

OKLAHOMA

Oklmulgee, Indian, Church Building \$25,000.00

This is for the erection of a church building for the Indian mission in Okmulgee.

WASHINGTON-OREGON

Sunnyside, Washington, Spanish, Church Building \$20,000.00

This is for the erection of the first unit of a building on the site owned by the Home Mission Board.

PANAMA

Chapels and Residences \$90,000.00

This is for the erection of church buildings and residences in the Republic of Panama, The Canal Zone, and the San Blas Islands. The exact designation of the funds for the areas where the buildings will be built will depend on developments in the early part of 1964.

PUERTO RICO

Ponce, Site and Church Building \$35,000.00

This is for the securing of a site and the erection of the first unit of a building. This is the first project planned for Puerto Rico since the entering of this field by the Home Mission Board.

MISCELLANEOUS PROJECTS \$53,000.00

Because of the rapid development in language missions in the north and northeast, it is necessary to have Capital Needs money available to meet needs that arise during the year which cannot be foreseen.

This will be a new work in a very needy area where there are many children and older people. First Baptist Church is expecting to help with building and it will be an associational project.

Columbia, South Carolina, Reese Good Will Center \$15,000.00

This allocation was placed in the 1961 budget, but Columbia was not able to proceed. The amount was used elsewhere. Columbia is about ready to move and construct a new center. This will be a gift to assist them.

Cass Park, Detroit, Weekday Program, Additional \$20,000.00

A new building for Cass Park program is to be constructed by state convention. The 1963 offering provided for \$60,000 from the Home Mission Board to assist. It appears that an additional amount will be needed to complete plans and equip the building.

Portland, Oregon, Mission Center \$50,000.00

A new program in cooperation with the state convention is planned for a very needy area of Portland. The above allocation will help in buying the ground and getting building plans under way. It is anticipated that an additional amount will be needed to complete this project.

New Orleans, Louisiana, Good Samaritan Home \$26,000.00

The new building for the Good Samaritan Home is to cost more than has been provided in previous offerings. The Virginia WMU has allocated an additional amount of \$26,000 to be added to amounts already approved.

A Chaplain's Ministry When the President Died

What does a hospital chaplain do? The answer was recently given by a Southern Baptist minister, Kenneth Pepper, chaplain of the Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, Texas, as he told of his ministry to Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, Governor and Mrs. Connally, and the family of Lee Harvey Oswald.

After entering through this door chaplain Kenneth Pepper met Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and Mrs. John Connally, immediately after their reaching Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Chaplain Kenneth Pepper of Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas was having lunch with a physician when the intercom called, "Chaplain Pepper please come to the emergency suite." An emergency call is part of the daily routine for a hospital chaplain, because with any emergency there is a family to be cared for as well as a patient. In this case Chaplain Pepper's services were to be primarily to the loved ones of those who had been struck down by an assassin's bullets.

As the chaplain walked into the emergency suite he saw the stunned Mrs. John F. Kennedy with the blood of her husband on her clothing. Realizing she would prefer a minister of her own faith to be with her at this time, Chaplain Pepper called a Catholic priest. The chaplain of a general hospital has the responsibility of providing a spiritual ministry for all patients. When a service is required which is not according to the chaplain's own faith he then obtains the services of a clergyman of the patient's faith.

Chaplain Pepper's ministry was primarily to Mrs. Connally as Gov. John

Connally was in very serious condition. His ministry to Mrs. Connally was to be with her through one of the most anxious, distraught times of her life. He took Mrs. Connally to one of the offices in the surgery suite. He stayed with her during those hours of waiting while Governor Connally was in surgery. During these hours there was a time for praying, supportive care, and listening to Mrs. Connally. She was able to cast her burdens or share them with a man of God, a minister who being there was representative of the love and concern of the churches who make this ministry possible. In hospitals where there are full time chaplains "news" from surgery is often communicated through the chaplain to those who wait, the patient's family. The good news came; "Governor Connally will live." The chaplain lead in a prayer of thanksgiving to God with Mrs. Connally and the governor's staff.

This crisis situation; these shocked and fearful loved ones; these suffering and dying patients are only removed from being typical by who they are. The crises are the same. Those caught

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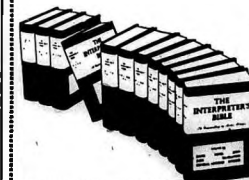
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up in it change. In crises of this nature the finitude of man crushes all delusions of man's being any more than mortal. In such moments of terrifying truth the hospital chaplain stands as a reminder of eternal truth, power, glory and love of an infinite God.

At times the chaplain may not have to say or do anything. The point is he is there, in His name; of His church! Chaplain Pepper, like the 160 other Southern Baptist ministers who serve as full-time hospital chaplains, was there when he was needed.

Hospital chaplains are always "on call." On Sunday, November 24, the regular chapel services were held in the hospital. Chaplain Pepper then left the hospital to worship in his own church. The ushers know the pew he occupies in case he is needed. He was needed again on this Sunday morning. The hospital called on him to come at once as Lee Oswald had been shot. Another family would need him, the wife, mother, and brother of Lee Oswald.

Chaplain Pepper said, "When I got there the secret service men were with the Oswald family. The family was very upset. The wife, not being able to speak English, could hardly comprehend what had happened. I secured the services of an interpreter so I could minister to her. The mother, like any other mother, had the same feelings any mother would have for her child. The brother remembered Lee as a child, but we could say he hardly knew him as a man."

Chaplain Pepper tried to give them spiritual strength for such hours only few have known. He tried to help them see the context of hysteria the whole community was experiencing. How difficult it was to accept the limitations of the hysterical society. As the brother said to Chaplain Pepper, "I'll bet no one thought to pray for the soul of my brother." He was wrong, for Chaplain Pepper reassured him prayers were made in his church that morning for Lee Oswald.

It is only natural in such a crisis for loved ones to think and some to say, "How will this affect my life?" The mother of Lee Oswald wondered if any one would ever hire her as a nurse's aid again. Some often wonder if God cares. The hospital chaplain is a confronting one to the guidance, love, and forgiveness of God. When he comes to a family in such a crisis he reassures them of the fact that Jesus Christ came to seek and to save the lost; for those in need of a physician. If there was ever a time when they needed the proclamation of the Good News of Jesus Christ it was then—it was proclaimed through Chaplain Pepper's ministry.

Chaplain Pepper's ministry included the pastoral care of the hospital staff. As he said, "The ministry to the staff has been one of the big things to me because we were so close to it." In any crisis the staff has to put aside their feelings and function as professionals. The staff of Parkland Memorial provided the best medical care possible, but Kennedy was their president and Connally was their governor. Their grief, shock, and incapacitating bereavement would have to wait. Like all, their tears would flow and they would be confronted by their chaplain. Special services were held for the hospital staff only by Chaplain Pepper. As he said, "We had a very meaningful service yesterday and many people all over this hospital have been withdrawing to the chapel after they have done their jobs."

This story illustrates what hospital chaplains do. Southern Baptists are proud of their chaplains and how thankful we are to have ministers like Chaplain Pepper serving as pastors in the specialized setting of the hospital since one out of every eight Americans will be hospitalized this year.

1200th was organized and now, nearly three years to the day, the 1500th was being constituted.

According to Moore, 187 churches make up the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana. Hubbs reported 121 in the Baptist State Convention of Michigan. Most of the others are in the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio, which also includes parts of western New York and Pennsylvania. There are 18 churches in Wisconsin and Minnesota, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Quite often during the services, speakers referred to the possibility of having 2,000 churches in the area soon. Indiana expects to double its churches by 1968, and Illinois will exceed 900 in 1964.

Redford, making his first speaking engagement since a heart attack last August, called the Great Lakes area one of the "greatest mission areas in the nation."

"When one sees the cities and their people, the complexity of commerce, the variations of nationalities and the spiritual need, he realizes this is a mission field unparalleled," he said.

"And if the states of the Great Lakes are to have Southern Baptist churches in the same ratio to the population as such states as Georgia or North Carolina, we must organize 12 times as many as we now have," he added.

Southern Baptist work in these states is a mission effort in every sense of the word, and this 1500th church is typical.

Pastor and Mrs. C. E. Lake, natives of Dallas and Benjamin, Tex., were foreign mission volunteers. His health denied them appointment to Africa. They have retained their sense of a mission call and have poured their lives into struggling missions in Texas, California and now Indiana.

Lake, 34, is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University (Baptist) in Abilene and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He brought his family to the speedway capital of Indianapolis in February, 1963.

That month the chapel started with a small, interested group of Southern Baptists in the home of Lu Thomas, an engineer. It has continued to be a group of young middle-class families. By March there were 30 in Sunday school in the fire station.

Sponsorship for the chapel came from two sources. Southwayside Baptist Church in Fort Worth, where the Lakes were members during seminary days gave financial assistance. Memorial Baptist Church of Brownsburg, Ind., extended the arm of fellowship. Chapel members were officially members of the Memorial Church.

The months to follow were filled with surveys, Vacation Bible school, a school of missions and a revival. Attendance reached 63 in Sunday school and 43 in Training Union.

Members have become as missionaries as the Lakes. They gave \$840 for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, set aside 12 per cent of their \$9,000 budget to missions and look forward to the day when they can sponsor other chapels.

As early as April they began looking for the right property, and finally secured 12.36 acres in the center of a heavy residential area. A site loan from the SBC Home Mission Board provided the financing.

Come the thaw of spring, they will seek a loan for a building, again probably from the Home Mission Board, which also supplements Lake's salary.

Charles E. Smith, area missionary for a big part of central Indiana, including Indianapolis, said, "Our greatest need is dedicated, sacrificing leaders like the Lakes. The impact we can make is then without limit."

Smith sees the Northside Church as one additional step toward a more effective Southern Baptist witness among the nearly 700,000 residents of greater Indianapolis.

The cult of Mary is both unscriptural and anti-Christian. The Christian finds the need for a Savior and Mediator, supplied by Christ. Why go to Mary, when Christ says, "If you ask me anything in my name, I will do it." (John 14:14)

The best way to honor and respect Mary is to follow her directive: "Do whatever he tells you." (John 2:5)

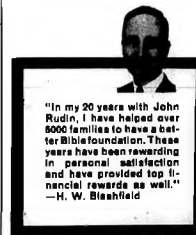
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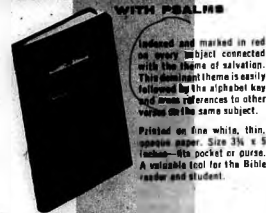
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Mission Weeks To Stress Inner City, Rural Work

Conferences stressing a church's ministry in the inner city and a church's mission in a declining, rural community have been announced for home mission weeks at Southern Baptist assemblies.

The conferences will differ from past sessions sponsored by the Home Mission Board in that they will appeal to the pastor and the church worker in these situations, as well as to the mission leader.

"A more effective ministry in these areas must be immediately assumed by more of our churches if Southern Baptists are to provide the Christian witness which is our responsibility," stated Arthur B. Rutledge of Atlanta, director of the Division of Missions for the agency.

The week, July 30-Aug. 5, at Glorieta Baptist Assembly, Glorieta, N.M., will have Ray E. Roberts, executive secretary of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio, as preacher.

Bible teacher at Glorieta will be W. R. Pettigrew, pastor of Walnut Street Baptist Church in Louisville, Ky.

At Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly, Ridgecrest, N.C., August 13-19, the preacher will be Kenneth Chafin, associate professor of evangelism at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth.

Bible teacher at Ridgecrest will be

Hugo H. Culpepper, associate professor of missions at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville.

pastor. He formerly served Indiana Southern Baptists as area missionary in East Central Indiana before accepting this work. Plans for constituting are on March 2. The sponsoring church was Pleasant Heights Baptist Church.

In the downtown area is the fourth of these new missions. It is the Capital City Baptist Chapel, which meets in a church building rented from another denomination. The building has a seating capacity of 1,000.

In this township there is a population of 333,000, which is about one-half the population of the entire county. The people are largely of a southern background and have moved to the area due to industry. The area is characterized by apartments and rent houses. There are also three 30 story apartments in a new center within six blocks of this building. M. Grady Pennington is pastor of the Capital City Chapel.

The state director of missions, F. J. Redford, has given guidance in the selection and planning of the areas to be chosen for this special program through the Home Mission Board.

As the first step in the establishment of each of these missions, the area missionary, Charles E. Smith, has worked with student summer missionaries in surveying the areas to locate prospects. Visitation, publicity, and fellowship meetings followed in preparation for Sunday services.

Thus, all along the Home Mission Board has greatly assisted the local people in meeting the tremendous challenge in Indianapolis, the capital city of Indiana.

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HOME MISSIONS

Home Board To Stress Associational Missions

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is placing a major emphasis on associational missions, not a de-emphasis, through its recent organizational changes.

This was stressed by Arthur B. Rutledge of Atlanta, director of the division of missions for the agency, in answer to questions from state mission leaders meeting in Atlanta.

The mission leaders, executive secretaries and superintendent of missions from state conventions, were taking part in their annual conference with the mission agency.

"The changes which we have made will enable us to have more of our personnel working in associational missions," Rutledge said.

"The association is the basic denominational organization for Baptists, formed by messengers from as few as five churches to as many as 200 or more in a given area. There are more than 1100 such groupings of Southern Baptist churches.

"The major change we have made," Rutledge explained, "was the creation of the associational administration services and church extension department."

"This will enable us to stress the philosophy and functions of the association, working with other convention agencies and state mission groups."

Associations will be assisted in doing mission work, however, by three "action" departments, Rutledge added. These are the pioneer missions department, the urban-rural department, and the metropolitan missions department.

The pioneer work will be with churches and associations primarily in those 22 states where Southern Baptists do not have state conventions.

The metropolitan work will be with churches and associations in those areas declared standard metropolitan by the United States government, all having more than 50,000 population.

The urban-rural work will be with churches and associations in areas with less than 50,000 population.

Rutledge told the state mission leaders that the organization was still under study, especially in its program alignment.

The Southern Baptist Convention is in the process of establishing programs for all its agencies, and Rutledge indicated those of the Mission Board will be presented at the 1965 meeting of the Convention.
