

At that time our facilities and buildings on the campus proper consisted of one building, a combination dormitory-administration building, Griggs Hall, farm lands, a custodian's home, a dairy and other farm equipment.

PURPOSE OF THE SEMINARIAN

The American Baptist Theological Seminary has felt for some time that there should be some way of keeping the great host of Baptist people in touch with its growth and progress. The Seminary belongs to the Baptist people; it is supported by their prayers and gifts; so it is right that they should know what it is doing. With these things in mind, we direct the publication of this bulletin mainly to four groups:

(1) To the many interested pastors and lay people, both of National Baptist U.S.A., Inc., and Southern Baptists, who are praying and giving for the support of this institution, and who will never see it except by the printed page.

(2) In the Baptist Churches, there are scores of young ministers who need the teaching and instruction that it is able to offer, who aren't even aware that the school exists and that it opens its doors to all ministers, to prepare them for a more fruitful ministry.

(3) To hundreds of Alumni, scattered over America and foreign lands, who will never know of their classmates' and fellow ministers' activities unless they see it in this bulletin.

(4) There are still many others who have heard little or nothing of this unique cooperative work of Baptists, but who would be more than glad to encourage and support such a venture if they had the opportunity.

It is the hope of those who labor in love on this publication, that, little by little, all these groups may be reached and profit thereby. It is also our fervent prayer that it may be one more forward step in the program that is already under way, in so many instances, of drawing the Baptist people together in the spirit of love and cooperation.

American Baptist Theological Seminary Faces The Future

Three years from now the American Baptist Theological Seminary will be just one quarter of a century old. When compared with many other institutions engaged in the training of a Christian leadership in America, one may well place the institution in the class of a comparatively young one. What she has accomplished over these few brief years cannot be matched with the significance of the purpose in which it is engaged. A. B. T. Seminary in the years past has wrought well. In the few years ahead its responsibilities and opportunities will be greater than ever in her history.

Tomorrow American Baptist Theological Seminary will be faced with the responsibility of supplying a ministerial leadership to cope with the problems of Race Relations, the Rural and Urban Church problems, strengthening the rapidly weakening links in our Home Mission Chain as well as giving fresh and creative impetus to our Foreign Mission interest in Africa and other centers throughout the world.

No other protestant religious institution in the world has a larger constituency with which to work and serve. The combined forces of the two Baptist groups in America and others whom they serve, give the institution a profoundly significant and unlimited opportunity.

To face the responsibilities and match these opportunities in the days ahead, the American Baptist Theological Seminary must largely increase its facilities and services, if it will justify its place in the high and laudable undertaking in which it is engaged.

Without assuming the obligation of making this school second to none, Baptists cannot longer lay claim to the democratic way of life and worship; those cardinal principles of their faith which have made possible their large and rapid growth, and shall forever remain as Baptists see it, as the very essence of truth and the genius of her existence.

ACTIVITIES OF THE PRESIDENT

President Ralph W. Riley was the special lecturer of the Midwestern Bible Institute in Des Moines, Iowa, and brought the closing message. The meeting was held in Des Moines, Iowa, and is composed of Ministers and Christian leaders from Iowa, Nebraska and Minnesota. Dr. Riley repre-




sented the school at the State Baptist Convention at Savannah, Georgia. He preached the Memorial Sermon, Sunday October 17, 1946, of the former pastor, Dr. R. L. Bradby of the Second Baptist Church, Detroit, Michigan. The Pastor and Laymen of the State of Delaware held an annual Seminary Day at the Shiloh Baptist Church, Dr. Perry S. Liscombe, pastor and Dr. Riley delivered the message. Dr. Riley has been invited to bring the message on Race Relation and Evangelism before the General Baptist State Convention of Texas. Dr. Riley delivered the summer Convocation Baccalaureate Commencement Message at the Tennessee A. & I. State College in August.



Reading from left to right, first row: DR. S. L. McDOWELL, A.B., B.D., D.D., Professor of Homiletics. Dr. McDowell has served the Seminary twice—1916-1922 and 1937 to the present. He teaches part-time and is the pastor of the Sylvan Street Baptist Church, Nashville. DR. JAMES C. MILES, D.D., Professor of Bible and Librarian. Dr. Miles has served longer than any member of the present faculty, having taught for sixteen continuous years. DR. W. M. FREEMAN, A.B., M.Th., Ph.D., Professor of Theology and acting Registrar. Prior to coming to Nashville, Dr. Freeman held pastorates in Denver, Colorado, and served as field representative of the International Council of Religious Education. He joined the Seminary faculty in 1941. REV. GEORGE W. HARVEY, A.B., M.A., B.D., Professor of Pastoral Theology. Rev. Harvey has taught since 1945 part-time, being the Editor-in-chief of Church and Sunday School Literature of the Sunday School Publishing Board of the National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc. DR. He came to this position from the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, Montgomery, Alabama, of which he was Pastor.
