

TWENTIETH ANNUAL MINISTERS and MISSIONARIES' CONFERENCE

BACCALAUREATE SERMON



The thirty-first annual Baccalaureate service will be held at the First Baptist Church, 319 8th Avenue, North, Sunday, May 29, 3:00 p.m., at which time Dr. C. L. Franklin of Brooklyn, New York, will preach the sermon.

Dr. Franklin is a graduate of Virginia Union University, Richmond, Virginia, Union Theological Seminary, New York, and has had special study in the field of psychology. He is chairman of the Baptist Educational Center of Brooklyn and Long Island, president of the Long Island Baptist Association, and holds membership in the Young Men's Christian Association, National Urban League, Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity, and is a member of many other scholarship, fraternal and debating groups. He is the minister of Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York.

COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS



The Commencement services will be held on Monday, May 30, at the Seminary, 1800 White's Creek Pike, 8:00 P.M., and the address for this occasion will be delivered by Dr. Carl J. Giers, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Dr. Giers was educated in the public schools of Tacoma, Washington, University of Washington, Southern Baptist Theological and Princeton seminaries. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention and of the Tennessee Baptist Convention. He is also a member of the Rotary Club and other civic and religious organizations of the city of Chattanooga and the nation.

FOUNDER'S DAY



Another one of the highlights of the institution's program in connection with the May board meeting will be the annual observance of Founder's Day to be held on May 6.

Each year the institution invites one of its alumni to bring the message on this occasion. This year the address will be delivered by Rev. E. A. It is expected that many of the Trustee Board members who will attend the May 4 meeting will remain for the Founder's Day celebration.


BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on May 4, 1955. The meeting consists of twelve members from the Southern Baptist Convention and twenty-four from the National Baptist Convention, Incorporated, who are expected to be present for the annual event.


The meeting schedule will be a one-day session, beginning at 9:30 in the morning and will last the entire day. Matters of importance to come before the Board will deal with plans for the expansion program of the institution for the next five years.
