BAPTIST NEWS

Vice-President Richard Nixon and Dr. Billy Graham will speak on the Ridgecrest Program at Home Mission Week. Dr. Graham will speak Saturday evening, August 4, on "Christ for America" and Vice-President Nixon will speak August 5, morning hour, on "Christian Freedom and our American Heritage."

Southern Baptists are working at the job of winning unsaved people to Christ and bringing them into the churches. From 1945-1955 Southern Baptist churches baptized an average of 6,663 persons each week. During this period the Sunday School increased 88.4 per cent, the Training Union 240 per cent, the WMU to a membership of 1,245,358 and the Brotherhood to a membership of 404,281. Sunday School enrollment 6,641,615 with the Training Union enrollment of 2,223,502.

AMERICAN BAPTIST CONVENTION in session at Seattle, Washington, elected Dr. Harry L. Dillin, president of Linfield College, McMinnville, Ore., as the president of the convention. The convention reported that their Sunday schools had exceeded the million mark for the first time in fourteen years.

Annie Armstrong Offering for home missions has shown a large increase over a comparable time in 1955. Receipts through May 31 totaled \$1,221,754, nearly \$500,000 above the same period in 1955.

Southeastern Seminary awards contract for the library to a Durham contractor who bid \$230,000. The firm will also convert two dormitories into apartments and renovate the administration building.

"Southern Baptist Career News" will be launched in October by the Southern Baptist Education Commission. The eight-page publication will aid young people between 13 and 18 in choosing careers of Christian service and influence. This will include careers in both religious and secular fields.

Illinois Baptist State Association purchases 40 acres adjoining its Sallateeska Baptist State Camp Grounds near Pinckneyville and will bring its size to 80 acres.

John E. Frost, pastor of Longview, Washington, and president of Oregon-Washington Convention, has accepted a call to become Training Union Secretary for the California Convention and will take up his new duties on August 1.

SCHOOL FOR CHRISTIAN TRAINING was authorized by the trustees of the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary with Dr. Thomas J. Delaughter as the director. It is directed to improve the effectiveness for religious service on the part of those God-called servants who are not college graduates.

Japanese Baptist Convention has 140 Sunday schools with an enrollment

Japanese Baptist Convention has 140 Sunday schools with an enrollment of about 12,000. There about 9,119 Baptist church members and Japanese Baptists are preparing for a record summer at the Amagi Baptist Assembly near Mount Fuji. Estimated registration will exceed 13,000 this year. 9,000 registered in 1955.

The Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention has reelected its entire staff of officers and administrators. Frank Hooper, Atlanta, Georgia, continues as chairman; W. Douglas Hudgins, Jackson, Mississippi vice-chairman; and G. Allen Wost, Nashville, Tennessee, recording secretary.

Texas Baptists approve \$10,000,000 Missions Budget. The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas has approved a record missions budget in the amount of \$10,000,000. This will be used for missionary work in Texas and around the world.
