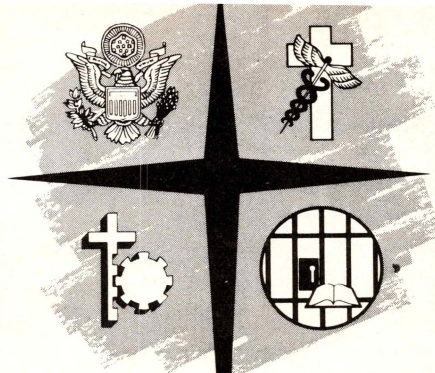

Chaplains Meeting in Atlanta

The first conference of the National Business and Industrial Chaplains Association will be held in Atlanta, April 16-17, at the Air Host Inn, near the Atlanta airport. This association was brought into being in March of 1973 during the College of Chaplains Convention in Atlanta. Chaplain Jack Boston of Holly Farms, Wilkesboro, North Carolina, was elected as president. David N. Morris, chaplain at Pharr Yarns, McAdenville, North Carolina, was elected Vice-President. Lowell F. Sodeman, Associate Director of the Chaplains Commission, Atlanta, was elected consultant.

The program is scheduled to begin with registration at noon on April 16. Business and industrial executives and pastors of churches are invited to share in what promises to be a stimulating presentation of the business and industrial chaplain's ministry.

CPE Aids Churches, Ministers

The following excerpts and ideas were taken from an article appearing in *The Christian Index*, January 31, 1974. Written by associate editor, Robert E. LeFavre, the article is typical of or similar to many others over our nation.

Many Georgia Baptist pastors are finding their desire for more specialized training met by the clinical pastoral program of the chaplaincy service at Central State Hospital in Milledgeville.

James L. Travis is in the forefront of this venture. Travis, director of Chaplaincy Service, is offering seminars, workshops and yearlong training programs to equip ministers to cope with diversified psychological and sociological problems they face.

Travis, who joined the chaplaincy staff in 1963 and became director in 1965, points out that there are four areas of chaplaincy work and training.

These are the work of the full-time staff, chapel program and ministry, hospital-church training pro-

gram and individual clergy training.

Milton P. Snyder, also a Southern Baptist, is director of training for the chaplaincy service. According to Snyder, the hospital-church program offers the trainee an opportunity to participate in ministry in two settings.

Ministers are placed half-time in the hospital and the other time in a church where they become associate minister.

Joe Thomas, minister of education at Milledgeville First Church, is a graduate of this one-year program.

Following graduation from Southern seminary, he worked with the hospital and Hardwick church, receiving a scholarship from the Georgia Baptist Convention.

Three such scholarships in the amount of \$1,200 each are available yearly from the GBC. Eight scholarships of \$100 each are available from the convention for other programs of training for Baptist ministers.

Individual training takes the shape of one-day conferences, periodic seminars and yearlong internships. One-day conferences have been held on the subjects of marriage counseling, churches ministering to the retarded and their families, plus the minister and grief.

Workshops of three or four days duration are conducted, according to Snyder. Sometimes one-day-a-week workshops are stretched over a number of weeks.

Six Georgia Baptist pastors working on their doctor of ministry degrees from Southern Baptist seminaries have earned required credit in clinical pastoral education from Central State Hospital. Others are expected to make application.

Chaplain Travis said, "Our expressed, focused intent is to make this program available to ministers on a much wider basis." He then concluded by saying that "the church and we can join forces to help each other."

Multidiscipline Conference

The Veterans Administration held a Multidiscipline Conference in New

Orleans, January 28-31, 1974. Those attending the conference were the VA chiefs of staff and the chiefs of other VA Services—Medicine, Psychology, Rehabilitative Services, Social Work, Nursing, Voluntary Services, and chairman of Chaplains.

One of the purposes of the conference was to develop more effective ways for VA staff members to work together to serve the needs of patients. It appeared that the chaplain's contribution in treatment of the whole person is becoming better understood and more meaningful to members of the other disciplines.

Chaplains Raymar Bobber, James E. Rogers and Simeon Kobrinetz of the central office met with the chaplains in several chaplain sessions. They discussed the relationship of VA chaplains to the central office, to other disciplines, and to other chaplains. They also discussed the change of title from chairman of chaplains to the chief of Chaplains Service. Another important item discussed was the professional updating programs of the other disciplines, and the possible development of a professional updating program for chaplains. This program would require VA chaplains to acquire additional professional training within a designated period under VA sponsorship or in approved educational institutions.

Chaplains Bobber and Kobrinetz were guests at a dinner sponsored by the VA Southern Baptist chaplains and the Chaplains Commission, represented by Bill Clark.

Collegiality and Pastoral Care

The chief of Chaplains of the United States Army, Major General Gerhardt W. Hyatt, in a communication to chaplains, writes concerning a pastors conference held in St. Louis. He views it as a turning point for chaplaincy. "If my perceptions are correct, there is more openness among us, more sensitive listening, more risk taking, a greater awareness of the total system within which we minister."

His letter emphasizes the importance of collegiality and pastoral care. "At the St. Louis conference, we talked a lot about collegiality. For me, it was the upbeat which introduced a relatively new, yet very old, concept of ministry. It was new because many of us had not systematically analyzed its components nor ingested its exciting dimensions. It was old because generations of professionals have attempted to express and fulfill their need for collegial support. However, old or new, it will not mean a great deal unless we adopt it as a style of ministry, make it a part of our pastoral care, and let it become identified with our faith and practice.

"Collegiality is a risky model for ministry. When we expose our professional practices to our peers, we become vulnerable. We also open up a significant environment for personal and professional growth, and find new and better standards for judging our effectiveness. When we initiate a collegial relationship with lay persons, both inside and outside the church, we become vulnerable. We might also find the most rewarding team work, mutual confidence, and common planning that we have known. When we weave our professional lives into those of other specialists—physicians, psychologists, sociologists, theologians, educators—we become vulnerable. We also become aware, sensitive, knowledgeable human beings. I believe the gains are worth the risks."

Historical Study of U.S. Army Chaplaincy

Several active duty and reserve Army chaplains have been designated to produce a comprehensive and up-to-date history of the U.S. Army Chaplaincy. This extensive project, assigned by the Army chief of Chaplains to be under the auspices of the commandant, U.S. Army Chaplain Center and School, is conceived to be a five-volume, objective and readable account of the development of the Army chaplaincy from its early conception to the present.

CHANGES FOR NEXT QUARTER

Baptists Encourage Involvement

"There are too many preachers serving tables and too many deacons doing nothing."

These were the words of Owen Cooper, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, himself a layman. Cooper was speaking to a meeting of area Southern Baptist ministers at the Baptist Hospital, Pensacola, Florida. Chaplain Robert E. Lowery served as host to the group.

Cooper's topic, "Ministers, Men, Mission, and Money" dealt with

problems the Southern Baptist Convention is having in each of these areas. He said pastors should place more administrative responsibility of local churches on laymen.

Cooper, of Yazoo City, Mississippi, is vice-president of the Baptist World Alliance and president of the Pan-American Union of Baptist Men.
