ON THE BLIZZARD CIRCUIT

WITH THE AREA MISSIONARY

The Northeast has just experienced one of its coldest months in history. The mercury dipped to 53 below zero in one Western New York community. And several severe snow storms have kept our area blanketed with several inches of snow since the last of November. Ever wonder what the area missionary does in the midst of all this?

This was a winter wonderland during most of December with a 20-inch snowfall a week before Christmas. Our "white Christmas" helped us to make the decision not to try a trip to visit loved ones in Kentucky and Tennessee during the week between Christmas and the New Year. It was a good decision, for the family has spent no more enjoyable Christmas -- together, shoveling snow, decking the Christmas tree, and family prayer for the pastors, their families, and the churches and missions in our area, at family altar time on Christmas eve. By previous agreement, each pastor and family had a similar season of prayer at the same hour on that evening.

It was my joy to preach Christmas morning at Amherst Baptist Church (where my membership is -- though I seldom have the privilege of attending with my family). That evening we attended the services at LaSalle Baptist Church in Niagara Falls.

On Tuesday night, Dec. 27, I was privileged to preach at the initial service of a mid-winter revival at Grand Island Chapel. Their evangelist, Rev. Clyde Gordon, of Raymond, Miss., was delayed an extra day by the snow and ice on his trip north. While some of us doubted the wisdom of trying to have a revival at this particular season of the year, Bro. Don Bennett and his people experienced the greatest revival since their beginning two years ago. This chapel meets in the living room of the pastor's home, and 50 or more were crowded into these quarters on the last night of the revival. Several additions were reported.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST HISTORICAL LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES Nashville, Tennessee

On Jan. 1, I left Buffalo at 6 a.m. for Elmira—you guessed it, in the midst of a snowstorm. When I was 50 miles from home it became apparent I would never get there in time—my decision to turn back was further facilitated when the windshield wipers of the car conked out.

On Jan. 8, I preached at both services for Fastor Henry Johnson at LaSalle, and the following week journeyed to Rome, N.Y., to make a Home Mission Board survey for a loan to the Grace Baptist Church. I experienced an enjoyable visit in the home of Pastor J. T. Davis and in the mid-week services of Grace Church. The January 1 snow storm had really hit the Syracuse-Rome area and turned the countryside into a veritable wonderland of white. The already beautiful countryside around Rome in the foothills of the Adirondacks with its majestic spruce and its blanket of snow is some of the most beautiful I have ever seen.

But one's exultation in the beauties of nature is soon dissipated with the effort of starting a Renault at 16 below zero with a 2-year-old mileage weary battery, as was my lot the next morning as I prepared to leave the Davis home. When it was thawed out and clicking (or clacking) again, I drove into Syracuse and spent most of the day visiting prospective missions points at Mallory and Dewitt with Pastor Paul Becker.

Late in the afternoon I entered the toll gate onto the New York Thruway and turned the car toward Buffalo, only to have my journey interrupted a few miles later by a cessation of operations beneath the hood. After determining that it would be more than a do-it-yourself job, I awaited the tow truck which came two hours later. I was pleasantly surprised to learn that the young man driving the truck was the son of a Kentucky Baptist preacher—the late G. W. Ellers of Harrodsburg. Another Kentuckian, Dr. Bill McBeath picked me up at the garage and an otherwise hectic evening was turned into a time of blessed fellowship in a choice Christian home.

After some delay the next day a new timing gear was installed in the bug. So 24 hours and a flat pocketbook later I again headed for Buffalo. This time I made it. The next Sunday I remained in the Buffalo area as Mrs. Walker was scheduled to enter the hospital on Sunday for minor surgery the next day. All went well—she was home in two days and is doing fine.

On Jan. 22, I preached in the morning at the Utica Chapel where Charles Barron is the lay pastor, and back to the mother church at Rome in the evening for the ordination of two deacons—Raymond Monk and Tom Jenkins. Again, wonderful fellowship was experienced in the Barron and Davis homes. On Tuesday evening, Jan. 24, the associational Executive Board met in my home, and the next day most of our pastors drove to Dayton, Ohio, for the State Evangelistic Conference. The following Sunday I preached at Lockport, while in the central part of the state three South Carolina pastors were preaching at pastorless chapels.

On Friday, Feb. 3, Mrs. Walker and I made another trip to Rome where she taught the Year Book to the W. M. S. that evening. We planned to go on to Elmira the next day for the weekend, but we awoke Saturday morning to a waist-deep snow—the greatest in several years in the area. A state-of-emergency was declared in Syracuse and we were completely snowbound—and our trip to Elmira had to be called off for the second time this year. And while attempting to dig out, the radio carried the news that the Seventh-Day Adventist church where our Chapel meets in nearby Utica had burned to the ground. The Chapel has since moved to the Y. M. C. A.

We were able to get into Syracuse the next morning in time for the services at First Southern Baptist Church. After a very fine sermon from Pastor Paul Becker with an adult couple and a Junior girl coming on profession of faith and a fine young airman surrendering to full time service for Christ, the pastor tendered his resignation as pastor of the church and the church proceeded to call him to be pastor of its mission at Elmira. This consecrated pastor has labored faithfully for three years in growing a great church, both in soul-winning and in mission outreach, and now goes to a mission of 10 members in the great Southern Tier of the state.

On the following Sunday, my third effort to reach Elmira was successful!

CHURCH NEWS, Cont'd. --

GRAND ISLAND CHAPEL recently adopted a budget for 1761 which calls for gifts of \$4,421.11. Eight per cent is designated to World Missions through the Cooperative Program, and 2% to Associational Missions. Don Bennett is pastor.

THREE PASTORS from South Carolina were supply preachers at missions in our area on the last Sunday of January. Rev. John Tollison was at Elmira; Rev. Coley Harrison was at Alexandria Bay and Mallory; Rev. Norman Fell was at Utica and Fotsdam. These men are prayerfully investigating the possibility of service in this area. Already Alexandria Bay and Potsdam have issued calls—others may be forthcoming. Fray for these men and these fields of service that God's will be done

PASTOR FAUL RECKER of Syracuse contributed significantly to the program of the Evangelistic Conference in Dayton with his message, "Strengthened Through Togetherness."

AMHERST BAPTIST CHURCH of Buffalo is making plans to build immediately. Purchase of land was completed last month, with the Home Mission Board holding the larger acreage while Amherst takes title to enough land on which to erect their first unit. The first unit will be an educational building. The Home Mission Board has approved a \$25,000 loan to help with the project. Unified Structures of Mt. Clemens, Mich., will erect the basic structure, with some finish work done by members of the congregation and some jobs sub-contracted to local concerns. Walter C. Heilig is pastor of Amherst. Building site is at the corner of Willow Ridge Rd. and Park Ave. in the Willow Ridge Estates off Niagara Falls Blvd.

ORCHARD PARK CHAPEL has recently gained several new members and broke their record of recent months with 57 present. Membership now stands at 26. H. Garland Sparks is pastor.

LOCKPORT CHAPEL has adopted a 6-month budget calling for \$1,798.12. Gallatin Road Church in Nashville, Tenn., will supply \$300 and LaSalle Church \$130 of the total figure. The budget includes 10% for Cooperative Program and 2% for Associational Missions.

BOLIVAR DRIVE CHURCH at Bradford is just completing the Forward Program of Church Finance. Rev. H. G. Sparks was their Loyalty Dinner speaker on Feb. 23. James. O. Beck is pastor.
