ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AREA MISSIONARY

Charles E. Magruder

August 26, 1961 - August 25, 1962

Early in January, 1962 we assumed the duties as your area missionary over the 43 counties of Western and Upstate New York and Northwestern Pennsylvania. The content of this report, however, shall extend back to the close of the last annual report by my predecessor, Arthur L. Walker, dated August 25, 1961.

PROGRESS

A NEW ASSOCIATION, Central Baptist Association of New York, was organized September 29, 1961 at the First Southern Baptist Church of Syracuse. Three churches—Syracuse, First Southern; Grace, Rome; and Massena—with their nine missions, formed the new association.

TWO NEW CHURCHES have been constituted. The Emmanuel Baptist Church, Potsdam, constituted on December 2, 1961. It was sponsored as a mission by the Massena Baptist Church. On May 19, 1962 the First Southern Baptist Church of Endicott was constituted with 30 charter members. It had been a mission of the First Southern Baptist Church of Syracuse since June, 1961.

We thank the Lord for this progress and the witness of each of these places. But, while expressing this gratitude, we are also mindful that thus far we are falling short of the goals set for this year in mission extension. For, the churches of Frontier Association have only started three of their goal of six new missions, and Central Association, two out of its goal of three. It is indeed regretful that none of our churches achieved honor roll status this year, though the goal was set for nine. May this serve not as a discouragement, but as a determining factor to resolve for better efforts next year.

PRESENT PICTURE

There are at present eleven churches, fourteen missions, and five mission extensions in the area. By associations, Central have five churches, eight

missions, and three mission extensions, while Frontier has six churches, six missions, and two mission extensions.

PROGRAM OF SUMMER MISSION WORK

Four talented, dedicated, students served as summer missionaries in our area for ten weeks. They were Johnetta Calhoun, 1115 E. Lincoln Rd., Hobbs, New Mexico, (Baylor Univ.); Miriam Loftis, Rt. 4, Taylors, S.C. (Furman Univ.); Tom David, 1005 Overland Ct., Shawnee, Okla. (Okla. Baptist Univ.); and Neal Schooley, Tyrone, Oklahoma (Okla. State Univ.). With the exception of Miss Calhoun, who was sponsored by the B.S.U. of Texas, all were sponsored by the Home Mission Board.

Only Eternity will reveal all they meant to the Lord's work in this area. But, statistic-wise, they worked on 5 new fields, in eleven missions, and five churches. They helped conduct 10 Vacation Bible Schools (3 of which were two-week schools) with a total enrolment of 435 and an average attendance of 365. They witnessed 20 professions of faith and 8 other decisions in these schools. Offerings of \$108.97 for the Cooperative Program was received.

They participated in 2 revivals which averaged an attendance of 49, and resulted in 3 being received for baptism, 2 other professions of faith and 1 re-dedication.

Much of their time (465 hours) was spent in conducting 12 surveys (2 for a two-weeks period). They contacted 5,011 homes (2,465 more did not answer), completing 324 family survey cards with 1,149 prospects discovered. They distributed 4,438 tracts.

An additional 17 hours, and more, was spent in pre-registering pupils for V.B.S. and doing cultivative witnessing and personal work. Their talents were put to use by the churches and chapels in their regular services as well. They taught 12 classes, delivered 25 sermons or addresses, sang or led singing 80 times, and were personally responsible for 2 professions of faith and 4 other decisions.

The total expenses out of State Convention funds for our summer program was \$162.73. The churches and chapels using their services were graciously responsible for most of their expenses while on the field.

PROGRAM OF COOPERATIVE GIVING

Mission giving of our congregations for the first eight months of 1962 (Jan.-Aug.) reveals the following picture:

For comparison with last year's giving habits, we must use the total figures for both associations. A careful study shows an increase so negligible that we hesitate to mention it. Are we satisfied with this record of our world-wide mission concern?

PLACES AIDED

AID FROM OUR STATE CONVENTION, made available by the congregations of our Convention giving through the Cooperative Program, has been received by several of our congregations.

LOANS FROM OUR STATE'S NEW WORK LOAN FUND has been granted to First Baptist, Orchard Park, and Emmanuel Baptist, Potsdam.

HOME MISSION BOARD PASTORAL AID has been given this past year to First Southern, Endicott; Emmanuel Baptist, Potsdam; and W. Elmira Chapel.

PASTORS WELCOMED

One of the greatest needs being that of pastors, we are always delighted to welcome new men who have caught the vision and were led of the Lord to serve in this area. This year the following were welcomed to the area:

Rev. Roger Knapton, to First Southern, Endicott, from First Baptist, Bethel, Kan.

Rev. Ansel Gambrell, to Mallory Chapel, from Rehoboth Baptist, Piedmont, S.C.

Rev. Jerry Dorobiala, to Sheridan Park Chapel as mission superintendent.

PUBLICATION

THE FRONTIER BAPTIST ends the associational year with a circulation of 675. This missionary has published four editions in the eight months on the field. Testimonials, written and verbal, give evidence of its being widely read and appreciated.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES

For the first eight months of this year your missionary has traveled 20,355 miles, delivered 75 sermons, participated in 4 ordination services, 3 revivals, held numerous conferences with individuals and groups, witnessing 22 additions by baptism and 12 by letter. We attended an orientation and installation for new missionaries in Atlanta, the Spring Missionaries Conference in Columbus, and Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest.

PROSPECTUS

We would like to make the following recommendations:

1. That each church seek to extend its witness by starting at least one new mission for the new year (Oct. 1, 1962 - Sept. 30, 1963). This would mean a goal of 6 new missions for Frontier Association and 5 for Central Association.

2. That each association have a functioning missions committee to work with the area missionary in planning, promoting, and considering mission advance in our area.

3. That each church have a functioning missions committee, the names and addresses of which will be forwarded to the area missionary. Upon invitation, the area missionary would desire to meet with each of these committees to conduct a clinic, or be of assistance as needed.

4. That each association set a date in its calendar, possibly the early Spring of 1963, for a WORLD MISSIONS RALLY.

5. That each association set a goal of 3 (a total of 6 for the area), for Honor Roll Churches.

6. That every congregation work toward giving a minimum of 2% of its undesignated gifts through the Association and increasing annually its percentage giving through the Cooperative Program.

7. That each association seek to send its Chairman of Missions and Chairman of Evangelism to Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest, August, 1963.

8. That we join hands, hearts, prayers, and means as we work in "sharing Christ with the whole world" in 1963.

SCHOOLS OF MISSIONS HAILED A SUCCESS

The first Schools of Missions in our area were held in both Central and Frontier Associations, September 9 - 14, 1962.

Missionary speakers for Central Association were William P. Andrews, Chile; Elfansio Estrada, Language Director, New York City; Miss Edith Vaughn, N. Brazil; and Charles E. Magruder, Area Missionary. Rev. R. Z. Boroughs, director for Central Association reported a total attendance of 1,123, an average of 37. There was one dedication, 24 subscriptions, and an offering of \$87.90. The congregations participating included the church at Massena, Potsdam, Syracuse, Endicott, Rome, and the missions at Elmira, Phoenix, and Ithaca.

Missionary personnel appearing in Frontier Association were Mrs. Thomas E. Lee, Field Worker, H.M.B.; Miss Letha Saunders, Brazil; Pat Brock, Pastoral Missionary, Weirton, W. Va., Rafael de Armas, Language worker, Miami; and Donald Heiss, Japan. Participating congregations were Rochester, Lockport, Niagara Falls, Grand Island, Orchard Park, Bradford, and Amherst. Wm. Raper, director for Frontier Association reported gratifying results in each of the schools.

THE SUMMER MISSIONARIES SPEAK...

To adequately express the impact of an experience as vast, as many sided, and as soul-searching as the ten weeks I spent as a summer missionary...is most difficult, for it is my deep conviction that only as my impressions and discoveries are translated into action can the full impact of such an experience be realized.

When I arrived on the field, after a very informative orientation in Columbus, I somewhat smugly told myself how fortunate I was to have been exposed to such solid missionary instruction through G.A.'s and Y.W.A. and to have had opportunity for actual participation in various missionary activities through my home church and on my campus. I thought these experiences had taught me what it meant to love compassionately, to really give of myself, and to be willing to serve faithfully under any circumstance.

But the needs of New York and Penn. and the Lord's ambassadors in these areas taught me much about my own needs, those on my campus, and the multiplied needs of our distraught world. As I related myself to people and situations with which I was unfamiliar I realized that hearing about missionary advance and being involved in it are two entirely different propositions.

As I talked with children in busy cities who had not been to Sunday school for five years, some never having attended; as I met indifference, complacency, atheism, ignorance in human form, I realized that these gripping needs were not isolated to an eastern society. They are universal problems which means that they extend as far west as Hobbs, N.M., or Waco, Texas...even to Baylor University and Alexander Hall.

I discovered anew that I am a significant part of accomplishing the greatest task in the world---that of sharing an all-sufficient Saviour. I discovered anew that Christ must love the world through me. ---JOHNETTA CALHOUN

I thank God that I had the privilege of serving as a summer missionary with

the dedicated people in the New York State area. I have a deep appreciation for all the wonderful people with whom I came in contact.

The churches in my town do not realize the great need in the Ohio Convention area. The people here want to hear about this work, and after hearing about it, some become truly burdened for the struggling churches in the North.

Through my work this summer, God has shown me the tremendous need for the Gospel to be preached throughout the United States. I have been burdened, and I have dedicated my life to be a missionary wherever the Lord leads.

My prayers as well as those of hundreds of others here in my town (Shawnee, Okla.) go out for the congregations in the pioneer areas of the North. May God continue to bless your work, and may we do our best to give you support.


missions a reality for me.

PROBLEM


George Fletcher, church building consultant for our State Convention, announces the proposed visit of Mr. Ellis Evans to our area November 26-29, 1962.
