CHURCHES CHALLENGED TO SET LONG-RANGE GOALS

Representatives from seven of our eleven congregations met on Friday, January 15, at LaSalle Church to receive instructions for church goal setting. Mrs. A. L. Kirkwood, of the State Convention in Ohio, served as instructor in explaining the goal setting instruments.

SET GOALS Each church will now set its own goals in nine areas. These long-range goals are to be achieved in the nine year period between October 1, 1965 and December 31, 1974.

AREAS OF INCREASE The various areas of church progress will include increases in church membership, new churches started, denominational usefulness, ministry to community and the world, gifts to the total work of the church, usefulness of individuals and groups withing the life and work of the local church, and in improving the church's worship,

RETURN COPY TO SIALE After the church has set its goals and selected its strategy, a copy of the instrument will be returned to the State office. This is to be done by MARCH 1; if possible, and no later than MARCH 15.

RECEIVE STRATEGY MANUEL on MARCH 30, Mrs. Kirkwood will return to meet with the pastors whose church has completed and returned the instrument by the deadline. At this meeting, in ROCHESTER, the strategy issuels with detailed actions to help the church reach its goals will be distributed and explained.

MAP STRATEGY Each church will then decide its detailed strategy to reach the goals it has set for itself. This will be done through the various organizations of the church.

VALUES

VALUES TO THE CHURCH: A church which plans its work and works its plan, with God's help, shall be able to accomplish more for the Lord and the church. The church--which knows its own situation best--sets its own goals.

TO THE ASSOCIATION: From year to year, by looking at the goals the churches set for themselves, the Associational organizations will be able to set realistic goals for the Association.

TO THE STATE: The State Staff in consultation with the Southern Baptist Convention program leaders and associational leaders will be able to plan the special field services needed to assist your church in reaching the goals you have set.

The State has already set some goals (see elsewhere in paper) on the basis of a sampling from 31 churches in our Convention (26 actually returned their instruments). After the goals are beturned from all our churches the State will be able to intelligently adjust its goals and seek to serve you better in reaching yours.

The best thing in all of this is that it is <u>initiated</u> by the LOCAL CHURCH, and you will in effect be telling the denomination what help you can best use in doing the job you want to do for your church and the Lord. So a word to the wise is sufficient. YOUR CHURCH WILL BE THE LOSER BY NOT PARTICIPATING IN THIS.


