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RELIGION IN LIFE

A CONFERENCE ON COURTSHIP, MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY

If you have read the facts listed in the middle of this page you are probably convinced that it is time for those of us with Christian ideals to do something constructive to meet the challenge which is before us.

Here is a program for the local church. It may also be done in co-operation with other churches. It is only a suggestion for action and should be modified and adapted to the local situation.

The following groups are suggested for the Conference; they are determined by the individual's area of interest rather than the conventional criteria, such as age, sex, etc.

1. Children's Hour

This group is a necessary and essential part of the Conference so that parents can attend the forums of their choice. The conduct of this group will be left completely to the discretion of the local church, it may be a study course, a story hour, or handwork period.

11. Dating and Courtable

Young people of various ages will comprise this group. It is possible that for some discussions the boys and graining the meet separately. This division would be determined entirely by the group itself and the subjects under consideration.

111. Preparation for Marriage

This group will be reserved for the couples who are approaching marriage. While it is not a prime prerequisite that they be "engaged." some care should be taken to restrict this group to those immediate interest qualifies them for the study of preparation for marriage.

IV. Adjustments in Early Marriage

It is a fact today that the largest number of divorces occur in the third year of marriage. One cannot draw too many dogmatic conclusions from this evidence but it is quite certain that the first three or four years of marriage are crucial years of adjustment between husband and wife. In this group such adjustments will be discussed.

V. Problems of the Expanding Family

With the coming and development of children in the home, the family is thrust into new areas of adjustment. Distinctive relationships emerge and with them are problems to be solved and decisions to be made. The objective of this group will be to meet the needs thus created by the growth of the family.

LOOK AT THESE PACTS

In the past ninety years while the population has increased 251% in America the divorce rate has increased 2000%.

In 1880 one divorce was granted for every twenty marriages: in 1947 one divorce was granted for every four marriages.

In Florida, during the twelve months of 1948 there were 17 divorces for every 21 marriages. In the state of Tennessee during the same period there was one divorce for every two marriages.

A recent study has shown that in the past few years there have been more desertions and mutually agreed-upon separations than di-

During one year of the war, Dr. Morris Fishbein estimated that there were 3,000,000 births and 1,000,000 abortions.

Approximately 300,000 illegitimate babies are born each year now in America; of these at least 50,000 are born to young girls still in high school or of high school

agc.
There are at least 250,000 new cases of syphilis every year in our rountry and more than 1,000,000 new cases of gonorrehea. Only about 30% of the former and 25% of the latter cases are discovered and treated.

VI. Adjustment of the Contracting

Few couples are ever fully prepared for the rather sudden adjustments that are necessary when the children leave home and the climacteric or change of life begins. This group should be attended by those who are approaching this period as well as those stready involved in the processes of a contracting and changing family relationship.

For many and varied reasons some

people do not marry. They are often forgotten in the emphases such as are given in a conference like this. They too face problems. They too need the counsel of the church. Those who are interested in such a group are welcome to this conference. Provisions will be made for their interests. The organization of this group will be determined by the response of those interested.

This is perhaps the most vital aspect of the Conference planning—its leader-ship. The committee in charge of preparations will have to exercise careful judgment in its selections. The first prerequisite for the leaders will be that they possess Christian character. It would be tragic indeed for any person thus selected to presume to speak as a Christian while at the same time, by personal conduct and ideals, to be otherwise.

It should be understood at the time of the enlistment of the personnel that the services requested cannot be compensated by an honorarium. It is expected however that any traveling expense will be taken care of by the church. A gracious gesture of appreciation can be made through some small useful gift to those who give their time in service.

It is entirely possible that all of the suggested leadership persennel may not be available in every local situation. Changes in the program are always possible in order to compensate. To meet

certain specific needs with expert advice, however, it might well be worth while to ask someone to travel even a considerable distance in order to participate. It should also be noted that these specialists do not participate every night, instead only one or two nights for the most part. Several ministers can be used as the outline suggests.

Suggestions for Advance Preparations .

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- 1. Prepare announcements and invitations which can be taken home by the children of the elementary departments of the Sunday School and of the Training Union. These announcements should be planned to acquaint the parents with the general program which will begin the following Sunday.
- 2. A thorough analysis of the plans and purpose of the Conference should be made at a meeting of the teachers and officers of the Sunday School. Or, if possible, it would be well to call for a special meeting of all of the Deacons and officers of the church. In this way the leadership of the entire church can be acquainted with the plans and objectives of the Conference.
- 3. Registration Day should be set at least one week in advance in the Sunday School and Training Union. At this time those who register for the Conference may obtain their books or pamphlets which can be read prior to the beginning of the forums. It should be explained that these books will not be studied during the course as is usually done, rather they will be utilized for the purpose of laying a foundation and to stimulate questions which should then be brought up for discussion in the forums.

The pastor will find this registration quite useful. He will be able to make suggestions to those whom he knows are confronted with problems as to which group will benefit them most. He will further know from the registration and from his experience in pastoral counseling those people who have not registered but who ought to take advantage of the week. Thus he will have a full week between registration and the actual beginning of the Conference to advise and counsel with his people in relation to their personal

4. Department superintendents should be asked to prepare special programs for presentation on the opering Sunday of the Conference. These programs should deal with the theme of the Home and the Family.

The film begins with a discipline problem and which the parents of two-year old Sandra have taken to a doctor. At the conclusion of the interview they leave the doctor's office much relieved and with greater understanding of their dyughter's need.

Opening with a family scene in which a tray and girl briefly discuss the mean-

ing of adolescence, shifts to their classroom where the class prepares to see a film on human growth and reproduction by means of animated diagrams, is shown in its entirety, and the teacher encourages questions and discussion by her class and the actual audience of this film.
