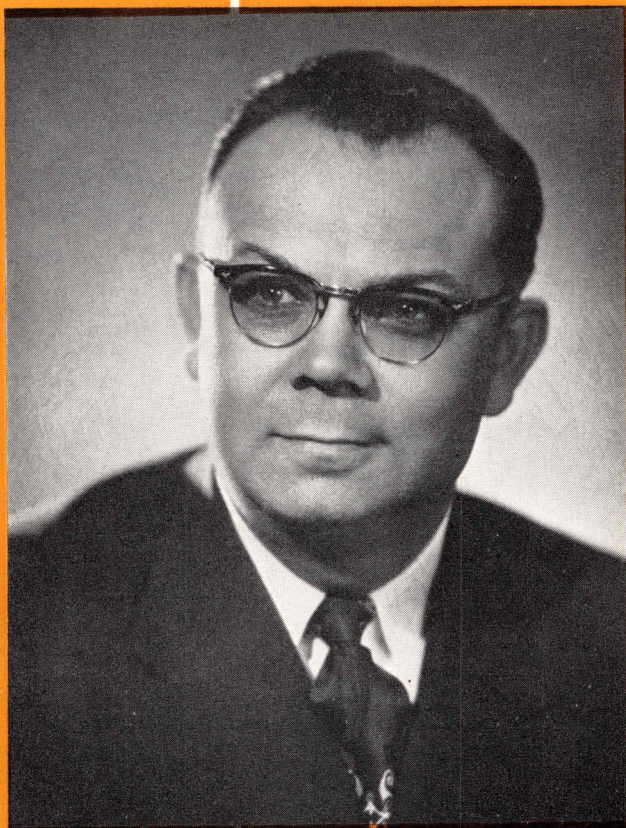

Last quarter we featured the statistical record of Southern Baptists as a denomination. It was the record of 31,906 churches, which comprise the Southern Baptist Convention. It analyzed the characteristics of the churches, their size, their location, and their total achievements.

The record, however, of any denomination is a record of its individual churches, for a denomination is no stronger than its churches. As churches grow, so grows our denomination.

This issue features the record of some 3,000 churches. Compared with 31,906 churches, this may be called a small "sample"; but it would take a volume several times the size of this issue to list all the churches. Therefore, there had to be some method of "selection" for this list. It was agreed that the list would contain all open country and village churches with a membership of 400 and above; town churches with 650 members and above; and city churches, 800 and above. We regret that some of our readers will not find their churches listed because of this division.

Southern Baptists are a denomination of many small churches. A total of 17,831, or 55.9 per cent have under 200 members each. They represent 20 per cent of our total membership. A total of 12,538 have memberships ranging from 200 to 999 members each; and only 1,537 of our 31,906 churches have more than 1,000 members each. However, these 1,537 churches represent 27.6 per cent of our total membership.

We trust that this listing of individual churches will encourage those that have made a good record, and will cause all churches to restudy their record in the light of their mission opportunity.

This You Must Know

I HAVE BEEN MARRIED to my preacher-husband for twenty-five years. However, I do not believe he can recall a time during all these years when I have made it hard or unpleasant for him in the performance of his pastoral duties.

Perhaps to be perfectly honest, I should confess what might be considered exceptions—those times during our early marriage when my husband would call from the church to say that he was leaving immediately for lunch, and arrived an hour or two later. That was before I learned that it was better to serve a cold meal late than to serve a hot meal on time, and have my husband eat across the table from an unhappy wife. And it was before I understood that all the people who stop him between the church and his home are also a part of his work.

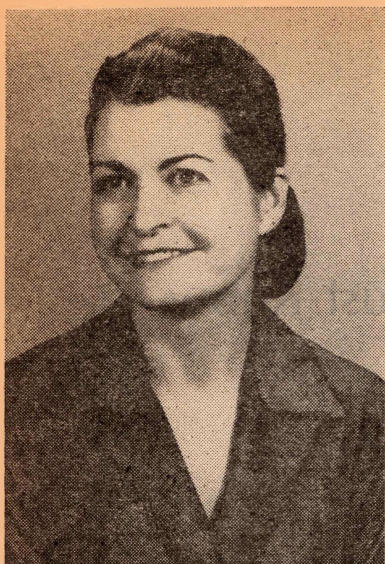
My ability to be happy and accept conditions brought about because my husband is a minister is not due to my own perfect estimate of myself. The credit really goes to my respected and adored husband who made a most

important fact very clear to me soon after we first discussed marriage. "This you must know," he said, "you will always have to come second; my work will come first."

So unexpected, so profound, and so shocking was this statement, I remember the very hour it was made, the very room, and the very chair in which I was sitting.

Momentarily I suffered a pang of disappointment. Who ever heard of any lover wanting to come second! Questions rushed to my confused mind faster than I could answer them: What did my fiance really mean to say? How second would this second place make me? Was my love being tested? Was he trying to discover my interest in his work? Was he using this as an excuse to change our plans?

But before I could satisfactorily answer these questions, I suddenly felt no need for an answer. I remembered a very significant occasion in my own life. I saw myself as a teen-ager, after an appealing missionary sermon, walking down what seemed an endless

aisle to say that I was surrendering my life to definite Christian service, pending God's leadership. I remembered I had asked God many times to show me his will. I remembered how finally I had concluded that it was all right to marry a minister—that I could serve God in a definite way still. Why now, should I doubt the love of one who was so dedicated to his work that he felt compelled to be absolutely honest with me? And after all, would I want for a husband a minister of the gospel who would not put his work—God's work—ahead of everything else, including his wife?

I broke the silence as casually as I could bring myself to appear. "Oh, well," I said, "I wouldn't mind coming second—to your work." But the subject was not dropped. It was necessary for me to understand that I would be lonely; that I would have to work hard; that I would perhaps

have to move often (and I had lived in the home where I was born until marriage); that I would in all likelihood never own a home.

THE GLAMOR HAD BEEN BRUSHED AWAY, stroke by stroke. I weighed and considered as much as I could in those moments, but I did not reverse my decision.

Many times during these years, I have been grateful for the "this you must know." It prepared me to face realities which were inevitable. It helped me to want to help my husband in every possible way in order that he could do his best work. It has helped me during these married years to accept quietly disappointments, cancellations of family plans, irregular home schedules, and hours of anxious waiting. I have known I had no right to complain because I chose to be second. A consciousness of this choice has trained me never to accept even church or denominational engagements without first consulting with my husband about his own schedule and seeking his approval of the engagement.

PERHAPS I HAVE BEEN MOST THANKFUL for the "this you must know" as I have listened to a few outbursts of other preachers' wives. These outbursts have clearly revealed a lack of understanding, disappointment, a feeling of neglect, and a sense of enslavement. And I have been sorry that their husbands did not paint for them a more realistic picture of what probably lay out ahead.

I recall one preacher's wife seeking me out at a meeting. With tears in her eyes, she said: "We're going to

move again! What does one do to keep her husband from moving? I feel almost like refusing to go with him."

"It is hard," I consoled, "but I accepted all this when I accepted my husband."

"Well, I didn't," came the quick reply. And I was sorry she had not fully understood.

Second place has been a good place for me. I have never felt that my

husband deliberately neglected me. Indeed, he continues to be as thoughtful, helpful, and co-operative in the home as his work will allow. I have never expected "housework" from him, though he has done some. I have been happy—so happy that my sincere wish to all the brides I know is, that they will be as happy as I have been. And next to aspiring to be the best Christian it is possible for me to be, I still aspire to be the best wife any preacher could have!

Observance of the Lord's Supper in Southern Baptist Churches: A Survey

Through the co-operation of a group of pastors, practices connected with the observance of the Lord's Supper in Southern Baptist churches have been described and summarized in a recent survey. The survey project, conducted by the Research and Statistics Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, interestingly points up the autonomous and individualistic interpretation of Baptists as related to an ordinance so dear and so vital. Whereas certain of these differences and variances are apparent from the survey results, there yet winds a thread of solidarity and hard-core agreement at many other points which is just as definite.

Portions of the survey results were used as a basis for the September 18, 1960, Training Union lesson material in the *Baptist Married Young People*, a Training Union quarterly for young couples.

Shown on the next four pages are the descriptions of the survey, high lights of the findings, and detailed summaries of complete findings.

Description of the Survey

Method.—A brief eighteen-item printed questionnaire was used for securing the data from pastors. Although the project objectives did not require a sample which could be reliably projected to all 31,000 Southern Baptist churches, it was desirable to make the limited sample reflective of the *range* of practices throughout the Convention. Accordingly, six hundred churches were chosen from:

1. Three membership size-groups (under 150, 400-750, and 1500 or over).

2. Nine Convention states which represent wide differences in history of Baptist work and in geographical location.

The time schedule did not allow a follow-up reminder for nonrespondents, and the cut-off date for usable replies was relatively soon. Nevertheless, a fine 68.4 per cent response rate was achieved for the 528 questionnaires mailed and delivered. This excellent response rate, without reminder, is indicative of unusual interest in the survey subject matter on the part of pastors.

Response.—The response, while high over-all, was related somewhat to size of pastor's church. Pastors of churches in the two larger size-groups responded at a higher rate than did those whose churches were smaller. Because of the sample design, however, there was a sizable *actual number* of replies for each size group:

High Lights of Survey

Strictly speaking, these statements of high lights apply only to the survey churches; in principle and in direction, the general conclusions would seem to apply to all Southern Baptist churches as a group.

▲ *Most churches observe the Lord's Supper once each quarter.*—Four out of every five churches observe the ordinance quarterly, and most of the others observe it monthly. To a great extent, those churches having a monthly observance are large churches.

▲ *There is no one "usual" or customary time for observance of the ordinance.*—Half of the churches observe the Lord's Supper during a morning worship service. Observance during the evening service is practiced often, and almost one fifth of the churches rotate the observance among various services.

▲ *Pastors occasionally administer the Lord's Supper apart from church services.*—About one out of five pastors will administer the ordinance in a home or hospital for ill or shut-in persons. This practice appears to be infrequent and is usually specifically authorized by the church.

▲ *The term "closed communion" has widely varying meanings for pastors.*—The meanings range from "only Christians may partake" to "only members of the particular Baptist church in which the ordinance is being observed may partake." (See detailed summaries.)

▲ *There is no concensus, either, of the meaning of the term "open communion."*—Through a check list provided, indications of meanings varied from "any individual may partake" to "any Baptist may partake." (See detailed summaries.)

▲ *According to the pastors' definitions of terms, both "open" and "closed" were felt to describe the practices of various churches.*—Practices in three of every five churches, according to their pastors, are described by the term "closed communion."

▲ *Statements by pastors while presiding at the observance are related to the size of church.*—As the size of church increases, the pastor is far more likely to make no reference as to who may partake of the Supper.

Detailed Summaries

The numbered summaries shown below are presented under the question exactly as used in the questionnaire. The answer alternatives under each

question are also shown in the order used. In this way, the results can be properly evaluated in relation to the manner of questioning and range of answers suggested in the check list. Percentages shown under each numbered summary are computed on a base of 361 churches.

Sermon Suggestions

Listen, My Son

Proverbs 20:12

A teacher, thinking one of her pupils might have a physical handicap, asked, "Johnny, do you have trouble hearing?"

"No, ma'am," was the prompt response, "I just have trouble listening."

The Bible abounds in calls to listen. We are encouraged to listen to wise men (Prov. 1:5; 19:20; 22:17), but especially to God (Isa. 1:2). "Take heed therefore," said Jesus, "how ye hear" (Luke 8:18). Listening is a fine and very important art. It has been said that man is given two ears and only one mouth, that he may listen twice as much as he speaks.

I. THE WAYS OF LISTENING

1. Reading.

- (1) A vast treasury available.
- (2) An important art to learn.
- (3) The greatest Book.

2. Observation.

- (1) Learning to be observant.
- (2) Discovering nature's secrets.
- (3) Seeing human beings.

3. Sound.

- (1) The beauties of music.
- (2) Interpreting inarticulate sounds.
- (3) Listening in conversation.
- (4) Sermons and addresses.

II. REQUIREMENTS FOR LISTENING

1. *Humility*.—Others are worth hearing. Be not enamored of your own voice.

2. *Imagination*.—Must be able to put self in place of other.

3. *Curiosity*.—One must have an inquiring mind and want to know things.

4. *Discrimination*.—Some things must be shut out, in order to give attention to anything.

III. ADVANTAGES OF LISTENING

1. The talent of youth.

Children hear more than they appear to. Old age prefers to talk, rather than to listen. Listening keeps us young.

2. The charm of conversationalists.

If you want to be liked, learn to listen. The charming girl is one who lets the boy talk.

3. The art of counseling.

The wise counselor spends most of the time in an interview listening attentively.

4. The key to education. We rarely learn much while we are talking. We learn when we are busy asking questions and seeking answers.

5. The heart of true religion.

(1) God usually speaks quietly. We hear him in the still, small voice, rather than the whirlwind and the fire.

(2) The most genuinely religious people are great listeners. Their mood is: "I will hear what God the Lord will speak."

(3) Personal character requires listening to the still, small voice of conscience. Passion and social pressure are loud and clamant, but conscience speaks quietly.

(4) Courage and morale are maintained by listening and quietness. "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." "He leadeth me beside the still waters."

CONCLUSION: You have given me a courteous hearing. Now will you listen to God, and let him direct your life.

Stand Up to Be Counted

Joshua 24:14-15

A young man came to talk with his minister about the strained relations between himself and other members of his Sunday school class because he had become a Communist. "They just can't understand that one can be a Christian and a Communist at the same time," he complained.

"What do your Communist friends think of your being a Christian?" asked the pastor.

"Oh," came the revealing answer, "I don't think they suspect it!"

Joshua had no sympathy with a loyalty that nobody would suspect. He called on his people to stand up and be counted.

I. WHAT JOSHUA URGED ISRAEL TO DO

1. Fear the Lord.

(1) See themselves before God.

(2) Not in easy familiarity, but awe.

(3) Obedience would naturally follow.

2. Serve him in sincerity.

(1) As he is God, we are his servants.

(2) Lip service does not impress him who sees all. He sees our works.

3. Put away false gods.

(1) They must break with the idolatry of the past, and separate themselves from the idolatry of their neighbors.

(2) We, too, have been idolatrous, and live in a society that serves other gods.

4. Take an open stand. God is ashamed of those who are ashamed of him.

II. REASONS ADVANCED FOR THE COURSE

1. God's demonstrated power and willingness to preserve his own.

2. The fate of those who oppose him. It is not petty spite, but immutable law: "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God" (Psalm 9:17).

3. The treasures of lands, cities, vineyards, and olive yards their God had given to them.

4. The testing pressures they would have to face. Half-hearted, secret loyalty would not suffice.

5. Great tasks to be done. Canaan to be subdued and the rule of God advanced.

6. The heroic example of their great leader: "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

7. The revealed will of the Almighty. This was God's challenge and invitation.

III. THE ALTERNATIVE TO BE AVOIDED

1. Outright desertion to the enemy was not threatened or likely.

2. Their temptation was to indecision, compromise, and neglect. Ingratiating neighbors, with loose morals and many gods, asked only to be met half way.

3. Compromise, indecision, and neglect constitute the deadly danger of our day.

(1) Sin's power becomes effective through compromise. No sin is so vile that it cannot be approached by easy stages.

(2) The weakness of the church is compromise. It is defeated by lukewarm, compromising lack of commitment.

(3) The doom of the lost is neglect, indecision, compromise. Men are not lost because they are committed to evil, but because they are uncommitted to God.

CONCLUSION: If, then, truth be truth, and God be God, two things we must do:

1. Stand up to be counted for God.

2. Make our open and uncompromising choice immediately.

Why Doesn't God Do Something?

Psalm 119:126

A little girl, hearing the story of the Crucifixion, cried out, "Why didn't God do something?" The answer, of course, is that he was doing something. He was at that very moment striking the greatest blow ever struck against sin.

The ancient psalmist, meditating on the law of God, exclaimed: "It is time for thee, Lord, to work: for they have made void thy law." Presumably he looked for a great demonstration of miraculous power. But how does God work? Read Isaiah 5-6.

I. THEY HAVE MADE VOID THY LAW (Isa. 5).

God prepared soil, planted, protected and tended a vineyard, and his harvest was bitter grapes. Israel was the vineyard. Here are the fruits:

1. Inordinate greed absorbed in amassing wealth (v. 8). Listed first. May be most harmful. Always insidious.

2. Mad pursuit of pleasure (vv. 11 ff.)

(1) Drinking of wine.

(2) Inflaming music.

(3) Excitement of lower nature.

(4) Feasting.

(5) Forgetting God.

3. Cynical disbelief in practical operation of God's power (v. 19). Challenged him to prove himself.

4. Perverted sense of values, good for evil and evil for good (vv. 20-21). What draws the crowds? A prayer meeting or a pornographic movie?

5. Perverted system of justice (v. 22 ff).

(1) *Liquor drinking officials.*
—The liquor interests can influence justice.

(2) *Money dominated justice.*
—It is hard to convict wealth.

(3) Disregard for human rights.

II. HOW GOD WORKED (Isa. 6)

He laid his hand on a sensitive boy in a temple, and made him an instrument for the preservation of a nation.

1. When things looked darkest. The king had died.

2. It happened in the temple. Much of our worship is sterile, but inspiration must come out of it.

3. It was a vision of God himself, but not a sociological study.

4. Resultant sense of sin.

(1) Seeing God showed him his own sin.

(2) Fully shared with his people.

(3) Brought heartbroken concern: "Woe is me."

5. The experience of cleansing.

(1) Completely God's work.

(2) A burning fire touched his lips.

6. Call for volunteers heard.

(1) Previous experience prerequisite.

(2) Recognized as from God.
7. The ready response.

(1) No questions: What cost? Where to? What do I have to do? What salary? What kind of pastorate? What kind of organization? God had called. That was enough.

(2) But awaited orders.

8. The strange commission.

(1) Go and speak. A story had to be told.

(2) To an unresponsive people. No success was promised.

(3) Warn of coming judgment.

(4) A blessed remnant will be called.

CONCLUSION: They have made void his law. Only as God speaks is there hope. Let us be in position to hear his call, and ready to volunteer for his work.

The Weakness of a Strong Man

Judges 16:20-21

Samson's story seems out of place in the Bible, and he was little like an Old Testament saint. He had only physical strength, with its accompanying defects. His fierce hatred, grim humor, and exploits resemble a Homeric or Norse hero.

A man of strong, uncontrolled passions, with no moral elevation or religious fervor, he led no army, and had no plan of resistance. He had nothing of the stern purpose and righteous wrath of a soldier of Jehovah. His story concerns his amatory adventures and sports. He attacked because of personal injuries, and his own arm got him the victory. His life was strangely contradictory.

I. HIS GOD-GIVEN HERITAGE

1. Pious parents in a wicked time.
2. Reared by God's instructions.
3. Given divinely promised strength.
4. Lived in a time when strength needed.

II. STRENGTH STRANGELY MIXED WITH WEAKNESS

1. Elements of strength.
 - (1) Abstinence from alcohol. Good any time: Proverbs 20:1; 23:20-21; 29-32; Isaiah 5:11,22-23; Habakkuk 2:15. More so now with high-powered automobiles, high-powered liquor, and high tension living.
 - (2) A strong body. Every human body a trust from God. The Christian's body is a temple of the Holy Spirit.
 - (3) Courage. His was physical. Ours needs to be moral and spiritual.
 - (4) Sense of humor. His was crude, cruel. Good to be able to laugh in good humor.
2. Glaring weaknesses.
 - (1) Tempted at points of strength.
 - (2) A divine trust used as means of personal pleasure. Physical vigor debased.
 - (3) Failed to observe danger signals. There usually are warnings before life breaks down, which we ignore to our sorrow.

III. A STRONG MAN'S STRONG PUNISHMENT

1. Personal suffering.

He was "eyeless in Gaza at the mill with slaves." The eyes that got him into trouble were put out. The strength that was his glory was harnessed to menial toil. He who had

possessed women at will did a woman's work.

2. The penalty God paid. The worshipers of Dagon celebrated, and Jehovah's champion became a buffoon for drunks. Man's sin crucified Christ. Our sin hurts his cause.

IV. THE FINAL PARADOX

1. Misery became a blessing. Blind eyes and shackled arms kept him from sin.
2. Strength that left suddenly and unconsciously returned slowly and consciously.
 3. Contradiction even in death.
 - (1) Hurling insults, calling for vengeance.
 - (2) Praying a prayer that God answered.
 - (3) Willing to give up life that he might destroy others. Jesus gave up life that he might save others.

CONCLUSION: These are the lessons:

1. "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."
2. However low sin may have brought us, and however faulty our prayer, God listens when his children call.
3. He yielded to temptation. From temptation there are three steps up or down: Being tempted, yielding, leading others into sin; or resisting temptation, outgrowing some temptations, helping others to overcome.

The Little Foxes

The Song of Solomon 2:15

What animals pose the greatest threat to mankind? Lions? Elephants? Kodiak bear? Cape buffalo? Jaguar? No; none of these. If we except disease germs, our greatest warfare is against insects. They are tiny, but powerful.

So the greatest threat to character is not the temptation to commit murder, armed robbery, or some other heinous crime. Rather it is temptation to indulge in little, seemingly harmless sins. It is the little grapes that spoil a life.

I. WHY ARE LITTLE FOXES DANGEROUS?

1. They enter so easily. No big hole is needed.

2. They are numerous. Relatively few crimes to commit. Many little vices.

3. They grow. A little weakness quickly becomes a big one.

4. They are hard to catch and destroy. We meet great faults head-on; little ones are slippery.

5. They are cunning and attractive. We enjoy them without condemning conscience.

6. They are especially destructive to tender vines. Habits are formed in youth.

7. Their destruction is not easy. Influence can be weakened, reputation damaged, and character undermined by the seemingly insignificant.

II. WHAT ARE THE LITTLE FOXES' NAMES?

1. The little fox of gossip. We even feel virtuous speaking of other's faults.

2. The little fox of cheap reading. Seems innocent enough to enjoy vicarious thrills through confession magazines.

3. The little fox of profanity.

4. The little fox of gambling. Starts with little chances. Becomes a fever.

5. The little fox of social drinking. Every alcoholic started as temperate. Not all fall, but many. Also starts others.

6. The little fox of sabbath desecration. Starts with carelessness. Grows fast.

7. The little fox of lying. First step is to recognize it. Starts so easily.

8. The little fox of cheating. To pass an examination, make a dollar, or gain a reputation.

9. The little fox of prejudice. Bad attitudes toward other races, religions, social groups are very insidious.

10. The little fox of hypocrisy. We want to appear better than we are.

III. WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT LITTLE FOXES?

1. Beware of:

(1) Loss of perspective. Is it not true that little sins are bigger than big ones?

(2) Defending and coddling little foxes.

(3) Shooting at those a long way off. We see clearly the little faults of others.

(4) Becoming self-righteous for lack of them. If you lack some, you have others.

2. Remember:

(1) Little faults destroy great values.

(2) They can cause great suffering. Tiny creatures have punishing stingers. What seems little to us may pain others.

(3) The Bible speaks much of so-called little evils.

(1) Guard against starting little vices.

(2) Recognize and destroy those we have.

(3) Face honestly the fact that they are not so little after all.

(4) Trust Christ for cleansing.

(5) Devote yourself to his great cause.

CONCLUSION: May God give us close-up vision to see our own little faults, and far-off blindness to the faults of others.

The Lifetime Reading Plan

From over one hundred authors, Mr. Fadiman has selected outstanding works for *The Lifetime Reading Plan*. These include some from the beginning of time as Homer's *The Iliad*, from the Middle Ages, from plays, narratives, from writings of philosophy, politics, essays, poetry, history, biography, autobiography, and eight selections from contemporary writers and five from miscellaneous writings. The plan is for a lifetime of reading that will make the interior life of the reader more meaningful and interesting. The personal introductions of the author to these varied works make a distinctive contribution to the reader as he prepares to follow the suggested reading plan. A complete bibliography which may serve as a buying list is included also. This is a valuable book for any person who desires continued growth through self-discovery. This story and the comparison with Martin Luther will give new insight into the inner thoughts of two outstanding religious personalities. This book is beyond the understanding of the layman. This volume is not designed for the average reader, but is highly technical from the standpoint of language and also application. The original volume is an outgrowth of the Gnostic movement, and because of its direct bearing upon Christianity in the first century, it is good background material.

Thirteen years have passed since the first edition of this immense volume, already considered a "classic" in its field of study. The first edition was hailed as a "rare accomplishment in its intermingling of history, archaeology, and the development of religion." This

second edition carries on the tradition of the first but has the advantage of more than a decade of accumulated knowledge by new excavations and further studies.

Light from the Ancient Past for the student of ancient history through the recent discovery and interpretation of the now famous Dead Sea Scrolls is an indispensable source book of fact. It is comprehensive enough for the skilled geologist and yet simple enough for the new ministerial student. Content-wise, the book consists of the archaeological background of the Hebrew-Christian religion. Its 638 pages, of which a generous supply is photographs, are crammed full of facts which make the Bible live, although it can only be considered a companion volume. Prayer Power is a brief development of the Lord's Prayer, divided into seven chapters:

1. Our Father who art in heaven

4. Give us this day our daily bread
5. Forgive us as we forgive
6. Lead us not into temptation
7. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever.

The material is very good, especially for devotions. There are some choice illustrations and poems in the book. In one of the illustrations, the idea is implied that works is a part of salvation. The author's material comes from his own personal experience in school, pastorate, and as a chaplain. It is well written, and I believe that the book would be enjoyed by all who would be interested in material on the Model Prayer.—*James T. The Bible in the Making

Geddes MacGregor (12L), \$6.00

The author endeavors to show why the Bible commands the respect of even the most skeptical of those of its readers who approach it intelligently. He says: "The Bible, whether approached with skepticism or faith, is certainly the most astonishing book in the world." Starting with the first writings of the Bible some three thousand years ago, the writer brings us down to the latest Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish translations. The author gives much time to the English printed versions, including the King James, Revised, and Revised Standard versions. For a book that necessarily covers so much detailed material, it is refreshingly interesting and alive. It is a book every student of the Bible, Baptist and otherwise, would do well to study and keep for reference material. It is fair and I believe unprejudiced in its treatment of the Catholic and Jewish translations and versions. The appendices are particularly helpful.—*Robert G. lation. The author's very involved concept of God's kingdom, bordering on dispensationalism, leads him to forced interpretations and unconvincing conclusions. A few expository comments are helpful, but not enough of these exist to warrant the price. This reader *cannot* recommend the volume as representing mature scholarship and insight.—*Paul W. Ronald Bridges and Luther A. Weigle (5n), \$5.00

Readers of the King James Version of the Bible are aware that the meaning of many passages is obscured by words whose meanings have changed since the translation was made. Out of his experience as chairman of the committee charged with revising the King James Version, Dr. Weigle has collaborated with a competent authority on Elizabethan literature to produce this interesting and helpful volume. Over eight hundred words that are likely to confuse the present-day reader of the King James Version are explained and their modern alternatives given. In many cases the compilers give the history of words they discuss, making this book much more than a glossary. It affords, in fact, fascinating reading.—*Donald F. Christ and the Fine Arts (Revised)

Cynthia Pearl Maus (9h), \$5.95

Since the first edition of *Christ and the Fine Arts* has already become a classic, and since only the revised pages of the enlarged volume were reviewed, this report covers only those pictures, poems, and stories which have been added to the original. Miss Maus herself indicates that perhaps Catholics address Mary too much which may tend to diminish the importance of Christ. That did not prevent her adding quite a few pages to the collection in the first edition. To the Protestant reader there appear some statements which will be objectionable, but perhaps not to the extent of not buying the book. Another article, factual in approach, explains Christian symbols. Others may not agree with the inclusion of material in such a book by the writer Kahlil Gibran. In all, there are ten new pictures and in-

terpretations, sixteen new poems, and six new stories. All additions continue the pattern of the first edition which has become so well known that to say the volume is simply enlarged is an understatement.—*W. Murray Severance, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Exploring Your Bible has made available to Bible students a guidebook and study-method manual of high quality. Some of the outstanding characteristics of the book are a good discussion of the growth and development of the Bible; information concerning the language of the Bible, with illustrations and suggestions; a good brief summary of the apocryphal writings; short sketches of the more important early Greek authors; very interesting sections on each of the English translations; a section of helps of various nature in Bible study; and an easy-to-follow method of arriving at the interpretation of various passages. It combines astute explanations of "The Law" with refreshing views of God's love. It dares to mark the harmony of scientific evidences with points of faith reaching beyond objective reality as a proper method in the study of the Bible. The Gospel According to St. John

R. V. G. Tasker (1e), \$3.00

This is another in the series of Tyndale Bible commentaries. This commentary on the Gospel of John is the third one written by Professor Tasker himself. This work consists of a valuable introduction to the Gospel and a brief commentary. The introduction reviews the matters of authorship, date, and purpose. The conclusions are in line with conservative scholarship and add very little to our information. The value of the introduction is in its conciseness and clarity. The commentary on the text will have value for the general reader who wants help in understanding the English text *per se*. It has little to add to the scholars' understanding of the Greek or to the problems inherent in the Fourth Gospel. This commentary, and indeed the entire series, will be of most value to the general reader, Sunday school teachers, and beginning students of Bible in college and seminary.—Wilbur C. The Gospel According to Thomas

Translated by Henri-Charles Puech, et al (9h), \$2.00

About the same time that the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in Jordan, a very

important library of Gnostic writings was found in Egypt in the region of Nag Hammadi on the east bank of the Nile near ancient Shenestet-Chenoboskion. It is only now that some of the manuscripts are being made available to scholars in the world for study. This volume presents a preliminary setting-forth of the Coptic text with a few notes and a translation. Fuller publication is to follow. This so-called Gospel of Thomas has already been deemed exceedingly valuable by scholars who have examined it. It will provide new material for the study of Gnosticism, the Oxyrhynchus sayings of Jesus, and also the sayings of Jesus preserved in the canonical Gospels of the New Testament. Excitement is already running high as to the possibilities for New Testament study, and many are saying that these documents may prove to be even more important than the now famous Qumran documents. Laymen will be interested in reading the translation and scholars will rejoice in the text.—Marc Lovelace, *Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina.*

Interpreting the Bible

J. C. K. Von Hofmann (19a), \$4.50

While appreciating the historical meaning of the Scripture, the thesis of this work is that the interpreter must be ever conscious of the distinctive character of the Bible. The author makes a strong case for the miraculous origin and content of the Scriptures. He likewise emphasizes that the Israelitic origin of the Bible has been reflected in its language. This becomes the "key" for our understanding such important terms as "Gentile," "spirit," "flesh," and "righteousness." In support of the Scriptures being the witness of saving truth, the author shows that the Bible is not an infallible textbook of cosmology, anthropology, and psychology. The book is enhanced by the use of much illustrative material of interpretation from the Scriptures. It is none the less "heavy reading," and the fact that it is an excellent translation in English from the German does not make it any easier to comprehend. Isaiah Speaks

S. Paul Schilling (25c), \$3.00

In the preface the author states that two aims are paramount in writing this book: (1) to discover what the book of Isaiah sought to say to its original audience and, (2) to clarify its message to our own day, particularly to Christians and the Christian church. With keen insight and understanding, and in a very fresh, inspiring, and provocative style of writing, the author seeks his aims. In this reviewer's opinion, however, the author fails to achieve his aims fully due to his desire to bow at the throne of rationalism. One gets the impression that the author is actually begging the questions of authorship, date, and Messianic prophecies with his feeble analogies and faulty conjectures. Though few among Southern Baptists would agree with the author's position regarding authorship, date, and Messianic prophecies, the author has wrought well in clarifying and interpreting Isaiah's message to our day. The Minor Prophets: The Men and Their Messages

G. Campbell Morgan (6r), \$2.75

The author has chosen to print in full the context of each of the books of the minor prophets, and follows this with an outline of the book that includes dates, characteristics, and analysis of the book of prophecy. The outline is quite thorough and detailed and would be especially helpful to one preparing to teach any one of the twelve books. Following the outline, the author gives a very concise statement concerning the message of the prophet. He concludes his treatment with a section on the permanent message of the book both stated and applied. The treatment given to this section of the Old Testament has special value to any concerned student—whether he be minister or layman. The presentation is stimulating and yet easily understood by those who seek to learn. It would be especially helpful to workers who were making a survey approach to the Old Testament and even more helpful if an intensive study of

The Old Testament Speaks

Samuel J. Schultz (9h), \$7.00

This work constitutes a thorough introductory study to the Old Testament. A principal value is its good summary of the history of those nations of the Near East contemporary with the unfolding story of Israel, along with a good summary of the political background for each period of Hebrew history. The author makes good use of reliable works in the fields of archaeology and ancient geography and history in his accounts of the influence of various civilizations upon Hebrew life and culture. A list of selected readings at the end of each chapter is quite valuable. Indeed, these bibliographical notes may be of more value to the discerning reader than is the text itself. This work has little to add to our insight into the text of the Old Testament. It fails to mention any documentary or textual problems. The book will have value for the Sunday school teachers and others who want a sound, comprehensive, and conservative study of the Old Testament.—*Wilbur C. Prophecy Interpreted

John P. Milton (19a), \$2.75

Dr. Milton's primary achievement in this book is to lay down principles to guide the interpreter of Old Testament prophecy. As the author explains, the book consists of four essays that may overlap in content but do complement each other in order to give a well-rounded view of the basic principles behind prophetic interpretation. One of the major emphases is that the Old Testament moves toward a goal: the fulfillment of God's covenant promises. Prophecy must be seen in its own historical setting, as well as its relation to the past (when the covenant was given) and the future (when God's purpose will be fulfilled). The book forcefully defends the essential unity of the Scriptures. The serious student of prophecy will find this book thought provoking. It is not a work for the seeker of what the author calls "fanciful interpretations" of the

The Secret Sayings of Jesus

Robert M. Grant and David Noel Freedman (11d), \$3.50

When a new discovery is made, the reading public waits expectantly for scholarly insight to be shared through readable and reliable publications. The public also has to be subjected to reams of unworthwhile blurbs of hash and rehash. Frequently a new book has to wait on other books by other scholars even to be properly and fairly evaluated; this is true of this book under review. The authors have done more than translate the sayings of Jesus from the Gnostic library in Egypt. Comparisons are made with previously known similar materials, and an attempt is made to evaluate the Gospel of Thomas in the light of the Gnostics themselves, the environment of Thomas, the canonical Gospels. Finally, there is a discussion of Thomas as author and theologian, with attention given to his method and his theology. Caution and critical appreciation should characterize a reader's approach to this or any other similar work on this subject for several years to come.—Marc Lovelace, professor, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina.

Doctrinal Theology Baptist Confessions of Faith

W. L. Lumpkin (2j), \$6.00

The pastor of the Freeman Street Baptist Church of Norfolk, Virginia, and former professor of church history at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary has put Baptists deeply in debt to him. He has brought together all the significant Baptist confessions, including many by the earlier Anabaptists, and has written a commentary which is both accurate and inspiring. The last such work to be done was by another Southern Baptist, W. J. McGlothlin, but it has been long out of print. Also, since it was published in 1911, our knowledge of Baptist history has greatly expanded, and Dr. Lumpkin in his own researches in Great Britain has brought to light some long-forgotten but very important confessions. The present work is thus considerably longer than McGlothlin's and incorporates the very latest scholarly findings.

This volume will remain for years a standard tool for any student of Baptist history and should prove interesting and even exciting to the lay reader. I urge every Baptist who is at all interested in his heritage to purchase, read, and keep for reference this fine work. It is the ideal companion on the bookshelf for S. L. The theme of Professor Hanke's book is the unity of the biblical message. Whether or not one agrees with all his premises, he must conclude that the book is stimulating and, at times provocative of further study of the subject. God in the Space Age

Martin J. Heinecken (21w), \$3.50

God in the Space Age reveals a brilliant mind and accessibility to source material. The book is largely a commentary on the theological and philosophical and scientific views of others. In itself, it presents no

great contribution either to the fields of theology or science. The author purposes to answer and discuss the following questions:

1. What is the relationship between science and religion?
2. Will man discover God and heaven in outer space?
3. What if there are other living beings on other planets?
4. To whom will the planets and airways belong?

His discussions and speculations are interesting. The greatest value of the book for those who will read it clear through, will be a deeper conviction that science and religion are not in conflict, and that science, even in this space age, can strengthen and confirm religious faith.—*R. J. G. Davies (18a), \$4.75

He Ascended into Heaven is a thorough-going study of the Ascension doctrine, from its earliest to its present-day understanding. Dr. Davies' presentation of the total biblical record relating to the Ascension goes beyond the New Testament records to examine the prefigurements in the Old Testament. After this penetrating study of every Bible evidence, the author recounts the Patristic polemics and first sermons, and the reasoning of later Greek and Latin writers concerning the Ascension. In the final chapter he

seeks to assess the importance and the significance of the Ascension for Christian believers at the present day. The Greek, Latin, and Hebrew references make the book a little difficult for laymen and clergymen who have not had preparation in these fields. Yet, the basic arguments are so stated that the layman, as well as the minister, will understand and appreciate the book.—*John R. Cobb, pastor, Inverness, Mississippi.*

How to Serve God in a Marxist Land

Karl Barth and Johannes Hamel (18a), \$2.50

A well-written and very thought-provoking work. It is shocking to Western minds, but very relevant to today's problems. A pastor in the East Berlin sector grapples with the problem of how to fulfil a ministry under a Communist reign. A theologian, Karl Barth, tries to understand and encourage those who serve God in such circumstances. The idea that hostile and pagan powers must be considered as the instruments of God is startling when applied to the contemporary scene. Equally startling, to our minds, is the idea that Western civilization is just as formidable an enemy as communism. However stunned readers may be, the general theme, which insists that Christianity must rise above governments and systems to preach to and challenge all, is a healthy emphasis. We would say that Barth lacks understanding of and appreciation for the Western world, but this book will give most thoughtful readers at least one sleepless night.—*W. E. Carroll E. Simcox (92s), \$2.25

Briefly discussing philosophies of immortality, the author turns to the religious side. His primary approach is from God and what we know about him. He turns to the Word of God for the answers. Simcox discusses briefly the teachings of Jesus on the life hereafter, then gives a brief but excellent review of the doctrines of the resurrection, death, judgment, heaven, and hell. Jesus and the Future Life

William Strawson (8w), \$3.95

The author's position would not generally be acceptable to Baptists. (1) He is very weak on the subject of saving faith, and has next to nothing to say about repentance in connection with the salvation of the lost. (2) He puts more emphasis upon salvation by works than would be acceptable to Baptists. (3) He advocates the doctrine of annihilation or extinction for the lost rather than everlasting punishment in hell, which Baptists will not accept. (4) Many Baptists would not agree with his efforts at textual criticism in which he minimizes the authority and authenticity of certain Scriptures. (5) He often quotes from the Apocrypha with seemingly as much authority as references from the Bible as we know it. (6) He is weak on the subject of the death of Christ and does not deal clearly with the matter of Christ dying for the sins of the world, when forsaken of God, which made his death all the more horrible. Ministers and teachers may find the book helpful. The average reader would not read the book with great interest or appreciation because the writer becomes so heavily and laboriously involved before his point is finally made.—*J. A complementary anthology to *Christ and the Fine Arts* and *The Old Testament and the Fine Arts*. This one portrays the history of the Christian church from the time of Christ until today. There are 278 poems, 109 stories, and 73 hymns and interpretations used in the portrayal. Five specialists in church history worked with the author in preparation of this valuable anthology. It is interesting to note that since these specialists represent the Dis-

ciples of Christ, the Greek Orthodox Church, the Roman Catholic Church, the Protestant Reformation in Europe through the Ecumenical Institute, University of Geneva, the Protestant Church in North America through the Texas Christian University, that much consideration has been given ecumenical relationships, the sacraments, Eucharist, and lives of "Saints." However, although Southern Baptists have not been featured, I am grateful that I have had the privilege of giving this galley a careful examination. In an imaginative style and a meditative mood, the author gives to us his inner communings with the Word and with God during his imprisonment by the Chinese Communists. The sense of meditation is heightened by the figurative style and only occasional references to the realities of the prison cell. At times the thought seems too intense. The author often uses figures of speech that would be unintelligible to anyone not well grounded in the Word, and he introduces Scripture quotations and allusions that are irrelevant and disconnected. Yet, as a whole, it is a good book, well written, containing many fine passages and excellent interpretations of the Scriptures. Most certainly it contains the inmost experiences of a man who passed through the fires of affliction and found the resources of God and his Word sufficient. As leader of the Baptist Student Union for more than ten years, Dr. Keegan has watched many young Christians mature under tension, and in this book he shares the secret of their 'growing up' in Christ."—*W. Pastoral Theology Dynamic Preaching

James W. Clarke (6r), \$2.50

With penetrating insight which could come only from a wide range of experience, the author develops the historical antecedents for preaching from the time of the prophets to the present, and then exalts the ministry with his emphasis upon the proclamation of God's revealed Word. Without apology the author

puts his finger upon the points which most often lead to failures in the ministry, and in so doing, renders a great service to preachers both young and old.

The only objectionable feature of the book is the place which the author gives to liturgical worship in the development of his theme. This does not affect the over-all value of the book for Baptists in general.

This volume has been needed. Now that it has been written, it is a must for all of us as preachers. Serious contemplation on the contents of this book will make us rethink many areas of our expanding ministries, and place new emphasis upon preaching.—*Landrum P. The Gracious Calling of the Lord

Robert John Versteeg (1a), \$2.50

In the eleven chapters there is a new appraisal of the evangelist and evangelism. Subjects include a definition of evangelism, what decision involves, reasons for refusal, the means, methods, and results of acceptance. Chapter six on the psychology of refusal needs to be read by every pastor. In the first half of the book, he discusses the ideals of a minister; in the latter half he deals with the obstacles which the minister faces as he seeks to reach these ideals. The book is heart-searching, yet the author stands beside the reader in that one feels a spirit of sharing of knowledge and

experiences on the part of the writer with the reader. The author reflects his humility in the preface by saying, "Among all the books I have written for ministers this one has cost me more." He means that the work came forth as a part of himself and his love for ministers. The book is deeply spiritual and will give courage and assurance to the frustrated and discouraged minister of any age. It is a book that should be read and studied by all ministers and ministerial students. Franklin Segler frankly positionizes himself as a Christian pastor of the free church, congregational tradition. The life of the church, a fellowship of believers, is the divinely appointed orbit in which the work of the pastor is set. Segler is in vital dialogue with contemporary emphasis in pastoral care and pastoral leadership. In fact, he uniquely brings the tasks of pastoral care and church administration into harmonious focus with each other. He can do this because he has been a working pastor for many years. Ecclesiastical Theology

Authority and Power in the Free Church Tradition

Paul M. Harrison (24p), \$5.00

This is a significant study which deserves pages rather than a few paragraphs for review. However, let it at least be said that no Baptist who stands in any position of leadership on the local or Convention level can afford to ignore it. Though the study was made with specific reference to the American Baptist Convention, the discussion in large measure is relevant also for Southern Baptists.

The author, a Baptist, seeks to explore in depth the degree of effectiveness of the democratic processes among American Baptists. He sees real danger in the present situation since the increasing size and complexity of the Convention have not been met with a corresponding development of democratic safeguards. For example, though the executives are given grave responsibilities, they are not given clear delegation of authority and have necessarily built up tremendous informal power. Similarly, large numbers of churches (especially small and rural) are without true representation in the national convention.

It is to be expected that there will be disagreement with the author at many points, but this book deserves to be widely read and intelligently discussed, debated, and profited by.—Pope A. Duncan, professor, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina.

Co-operation Without Compromise

James DeForest Murch (1e), \$3.50

A history of the National Association of Evangelicals which is "based upon a sound biblical confession of faith that accepts the Bible as the only infallible and authoritative Word of God."

References are made to the growth of liberalism in many denominations and in the National Council of Churches and to the organization of the National Association of Evangelicals and its constituents in broadcasting. Christian education, foreign missions, evangelism, religious liberty, human welfare, and publication are discussed.

The book will be of interest to those who desire knowledge of various aspects of the

It is a compilation of thirty-seven chapters each by a different author and on different subjects. The four main divisions deal with principles; programs, materials, and methods; administration and agencies and organizations of religious education.

The book is valuable as a textbook and as a source book for educational leaders in the church. Although Southern Baptists will frequently prefer other organizational patterns than those recommended herein, serious students of the church educational program will be profited by studying this new survey of religious education compiled by educational leaders in other denominations.—*Allen W. The authors present in this text their ideas concerning the place of music in worship. In most instances the position of the authors would be acceptable though there are included some organizational and architectural suggestions that do not at all correspond with our concepts. There are many fine ideas included, but there are many that are old and overdone. I have seldom read a book of this type which had so many good points, yet was marred so often by trite jibes toward types of music unsuitable to the authors. Christian Church History The Nineteenth Century in Europe: The Protestant and Eastern Churches, Volume II

Kenneth Scott Latourette (9h), \$7.00

The second in a projected five-volume series on Christian history in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, this is a survey of Protestantism and Eastern orthodoxy in Europe between 1815 and 1914. The subject is organized geographically; Germany and Great Britain naturally receive the most extensive treatment. This volume is a good example of

the abilities that have brought the author recognition as one of America's greatest church historians. It is comprehensive in its sweep but at the same time, rich in details. The reader, in fact, moves from page to page in amazement at the way individual persons and particular events are sharply presented within the flowing context of broad movements. Dr. Latourette has a genius for gathering and organizing his materials. He sees the "trees," but he never loses sight of the "forest." He writes in a style that is clear and interesting, at times almost vivid. Not only students of church history, but anyone with a serious interest in understanding Christianity will find this book rich and rewarding.—*J. F. Christian Churches and Sects The Social Sources of Church Unity

Robert Lee (1a), \$4.50

This book is a scholarly presentation of the contribution of present-day social forces to the ecumenical movement. It should be read by all who desire an understanding of trends toward church unity.

The author also discusses certain social focuses as explanations of countervailing movements to church unity. Thus, he seeks to explore denominationalism, sectarianism, fundamentalism, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

In dealing with the Southern Baptist Convention, the author states that "observers have noted that the Southern Baptist Convention does have *de facto* authority to legislate for its member churches" and then gives examples. This is, of course, the author's opinion. It is another case of an individual's failure to understand what he has seen.

The term "perverse American Southern Baptists" is used. Perhaps not many would describe Southern Baptists by a word which means, "wicked, turned from the right, obstinate in wrong," but a man has a right to his own opinion.—*J. M. Crowe, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

The Truth About Seventh-day Adventism

Walter R. Martin (1z), \$3.50

The first part of this work is devoted to

an objective treatment of the history and theology of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination, based squarely upon what the leaders of Adventism claim for their faith. Later chapters go into greater detail presenting the beliefs of this group, while the author expresses quite candidly his opinions in regard to those beliefs. In many instances, Martin clearly shows by an understanding of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures and pure logic how weak the Adventist position is. Yet he is always fair in pointing out that some accusations against this body are not correct. Although some parts of his criticism are almost too tedious, Martin always strives to appraise the Adventists in the true spirit of Christian love. Because there is relationship in some respects between this group and Baptists, our pastors and leaders would profit in many ways by a reading and study of this book.—*George J. Varieties of Protestantism

John B. Cobb, Jr. (8w), \$4.50

This is a new effort explaining diversity and variety within Protestantism. Two features are especially worthy of mention. First, Cobb classified Protestantism in nine categories: (1) Lutheran (alienation from God and assurance of divine forgiveness), (2) Calvinistic (worthlessness of creatures, divine sovereignty, and devotion to God's glory), (3) Liturgical (worship), (4) Authoritarian (ecclesiastical organization), (5) Biblicist (imitation of primitive Christianity), (6) Experientialist (regeneration and sanctification), (7) Mystic, (8) Individualist (worldly success, peace of mind, etc.), and (9) Socialist. Secondly, seeking to state the best possible case for each perspective, Cobb writes each section as though he were representing his own viewpoint. As the final chapter, "The Unity Beyond," indicates, Cobb rejects both the dogmatic exclusivism of denominationalism and the complacency of modern Christianity. He is an ecumenicist, believing that "the serious acknowledgment of Jesus as Lord" is the principle to overcome varieties. There are no annotations, but select bibliographies are given. The Holy Sword

Robert Payne (9h), \$6.00

The Holy Sword is a complete, authentic history of Islam from its beginning to the twentieth century. The author's style of writing is such that the reader becomes immediately identified with the history of the Arab, and this interest is maintained throughout the entire book. End-pages of well-defined maps, illustrations, a glossary of definitions of Arabic terms used throughout the book, chronological tables, bibliography, and a complete index add to the usefulness of the book as a resource medium. The dramatic march of Moslem through history—cultural, military, political, religious and scientific—with portraits of leaders of the Arab conquest are unforgettable. Muhammad's biographical introduction, as well as those of other Arab leaders, stimulates the reader to follow the unfolding story of this mighty belief. To the Christian there is a challenge for more effective mission work and the deepening of conviction that this is no passing hurdle, but a subject we must understand in order to combat its continued growth.—*Florida Waite, Black Mountain, North Carolina.*
