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The third quarter issue of this magazine reported the statistical achievements of Southern Baptists during 1960, as well as a report of the past decade 1950-'60.

In this issue we feature the individual record of a selected sample of Southern Baptist churches. While we wish we might have included the record of all 32,000 churches, it would have required a volume several times the size of this issue. It was necessary, therefore, to arbitrarily agree on a "breaking point." It was agreed that the list would contain *all* open country and village churches with a membership of 400 and above; town churches with 650 members and above; and city churches, 800 and above.

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The record of Southern Baptists is a record of individual churches. As a denomination, we grow only as individual churches grow. And, Southern Baptists are no stronger than the strength of individual churches.

Therefore, *churches* have an individual responsibility that cannot be evaded. Reaching the masses, teaching the Bible, winning the lost, developing the saved, and meeting the moral issues of our day and generation—this tremendous task can be accomplished only by strong New Testament churches. As they accept and fulfil *their* responsibility, the kingdom of God will move forward in our day.

The Cover

This issue's cover page carries the picture of the new home of the Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, Virginia.

Organized in 1845, the Board was located at Richmond, and has maintained its home there throughout its history. The first meeting of the Board was held in the library of the Second Baptist Church, Richmond; and its first home, at Sixth and Franklin, was purchased through a gift of \$100,000 in 1909 by Mr. and Mrs. George W. Bottoms, Texarkana, Arkansas.

Dr. Baker J. Cauthen is the executive secretary of the Board, which reported 1,519 missionaries under appointment in May, 1961, serving in 45 countries.

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A Lesson for Baptists in Communication

LATE LAST OCTOBER, I opened the November, 1960, *Reader's Digest* and read "The FBI Wants This Man." It described Joseph Corbett, Jr., the most-wanted killer since John Dillinger and included his photograph. A few mornings later I picked up Louisville's *Courier-Journal* and read that the FBI had arrested Corbett in Vancouver, Canada. My reaction was this: "Had the *Digest* known of his imminent capture, there would have been no need for their recent article on Corbett."

But the truth is that the *Digest* article was the cause of his arrest. The magazine hit the newsstands October 24, and a reader called the police the very next day saying, "I know the man whose picture is in the *Reader's Digest*." In less than a week, the FBI arrested Corbett in Vancouver.

Proud of its accomplishment, the *Digest* told the whole story in "How the *Reader's Digest* Helped Catch Killer Corbett" in its January, 1961, issue. The amazing factor is how quickly the magazine article led to his arrest after so many other measures seemingly had failed. For example, the FBI had distributed 1,500,000 "Wanted" flyers to all YMCA's, all

Salvation Army homes, all public libraries, bus stations, hotels, and motels. A description of Corbett was mailed to all barbers in the United States, all bus drivers in cities over 50,000, all hospitals, and all service stations.

A Lesson for Baptists

But where these failed, a single story in a mass-circulation magazine succeeded. And here is a valuable lesson for Baptists in communication: *To tell our story effectively, we must tie on to existing channels of communication.* It is often said that one of the first aims of a new person in denominational work is to publish a new tract. If we can start a newsletter or get out another mailing, we feel we are succeeding in telling our story. But the same story can often be told more effectively through established publications.

For example, in the tract room of the Kentucky Baptist Building, we have more different titles of tracts and posters than the mailing clerk can keep up with. There is literally an avalanche of tracts, leaflets, posters, streamers, ad infinitum, pouring forth from the various state and Convention-wide institutions and agencies. Most are good, and their story needs

telling. But the big question is this: How many are being read? True, the clickity-click of the mimeograph and the whirl of the presses give us a quiet sense of achievement. And we like to report so many thousands of pieces of free literature distributed last year (even if many of them *are* collecting dust in church closets).

All of this is another way of saying that publication is not the total answer. Distribution is just as important, or more so. Any church or denominational office preparing any piece of literature should first answer, "How are we to distribute it?" Until that question is answered, let's give the presses a rest.

Perhaps the greatest untapped potential in our denomination is the state papers, as established channels of communication. They now have a combined weekly circulation of over 1,415,000.* If an agency has a story to tell, could it find a better, more economical, and more effective way than through these papers? Which is better, to print 100,000 new tracts, half of which will never get to the readers, or to publish the same material in these papers with an *established* readership of over 1,415,000? This is not saying there is no need for supplementary publications. It is saying that *we are not aware of the tremendous potential lying latent in our established state papers.*

Role of State Papers

State Baptist papers perform many helpful functions. They keep readers abreast of state, Convention, and world Baptist news. They promote the work of the denomination and all of its agencies. They serve as clear-

ing houses for individual expression through "Letters to the Editor" and publication of unsolicited manuscripts. They pinpoint trends, dangers, and items of doctrine in editorials. For the most part, they are aimed at Baptist readers who already have some interest in their churches and denominations.

But there is another function which more and more of our state papers are coming to see, that of a great missionary arm of communication. They can be designed to appeal to the nominal Baptist—even to unsaved and unchurched readers. They should be so attractive and persuasive that no thinking minister would even attempt to pastor a congregation unless the paper was in the church budget going to every family, and perhaps even to prospective members.

How can this be done? Happily, it is already being done. State after state is making tremendous progress in producing better papers. This can quickly be demonstrated by placing a recent issue of any of the state papers alongside an issue of ten years ago. Inevitably, there is improvement. Improvement will continue as the following steps are taken:

▲ *Personnel and money.*—States must put enough money into their state papers so that adequate staffs, trained in photography, layout, copywriting, etc. can be employed.

▲ *Quality printing and paper.*—Funds must be available to provide good paper stock and first-class printing.

▲ *Coverage.*—Papers must be alert for Baptist news as it breaks, giving balanced emphasis to local, state, and worldwide features.

*A few are monthly or semimonthly.

[^] *Utilization.* — Denominational workers must utilize the state papers for their basic promotion, rather than flooding the mails with competitive bulletins, newsletters, etc.

[^] *Attractive.*—Papers must appeal to the eye of the casual readers, so they will notice them as well as the slick, highly illustrated magazines that come in the same mail.

[^] *Circulation.*—Pastors must insist on the state paper in the church budget going to every family whether or not they request it, and whether or not they agree to read it. If a nominal Baptist receives good from one issue a year out of fifty-two, it is worth the cost.

Long Way from Corbett

Well, we have wandered a long way from Corbett and the FBI, haven't we? Or have we? Are there not basic principles of communication that apply alike to the FBI and our churches? Are we, too, not after men? Do we not serve a Saviour who told us to be dissatisfied until the last person in the last highway and hedgerow is reached?

Now, if this is done, if we reach the last person with the Baptist message, we must go beyond what has already been suggested. Some day we must tap the mass-circulated secular newspapers and magazines with our message.

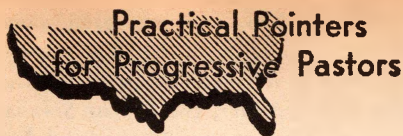
For example, take the *Reader's Digest* again. It is published in 29 languages and boasts 65,000,000 readers. More people read it than any other publication of any kind. More read it than watch the average night-time network TV show. Other slick magazines likewise reach millions of readers.

Now, can we reach some of those readers with our Baptist message, *most of whom* will never read the *Western Recorder*, the *Baptist Standard*, *Home Life*, or the *Brotherhood Journal*? (It might be good for all of us who write or edit to remember that far more people will *not* read what we publish than will!)

There are two ways to reach the readers of the established, mass-circulated magazines. First is paid advertising. This is a costly method and may be prohibitive in our present concept of values. Second is for Baptist writers to develop such skills that their work merits publication in these periodicals. This does not imply that the *Saturday Evening Post* is looking for sermons to print. It does mean that skilled writers can utilize poetry, essays, features, short stories, novels, etc. to convey the Baptist message indirectly.

As I write, a big gasoline-type transport passes on the highway. It is lettered, "Printing Inks." "Flammable" is not imprinted because ink used to print books and magazines does not explode like gasoline. But on second thought, are not printing inks far more explosive than the highest octane gasoline? What about the "Sermon on the Mount" and the "Gettysburg Address?"

World War III, which in the opinion of some has already started, may not be won on sea, or in the air, or on land, but rather, on the battlefield of men's minds. So, let us write well. And once written, let's publish it where it will reach maximum readership.



Sermon Suggestions

How Could Jesus Die for Me?

Isaiah 53:4-6

NO FACT IS MORE CENTRAL to the Christian gospel than that Christ died for our sins, and yet none is more difficult for the modern mind to accept. How could it possibly make any difference in my life in America in the twentieth century that a young Jew was executed in the first century in Palestine? The modern man's question is not, "Is Christianity true?" but rather, "What difference does it make?" Consider the following questions.

I. DO I NEED ANYONE TO DIE FOR ME?

1. The sense of sin is strange to modern man. A scientist remarked: "The higher man of today is not troubling about his sins." He usually does not deny that he has done things that were wrong and made mistakes,

but his attitude is that there is no use crying over spilled milk. He will do his best to correct what he has done and go blithely on to better things.

2. Yet modern man is disturbed because of his sins. He may not call them sins, but the sense of moral failure is present. And where there is real guilt, the psychiatrist has not found an adequate cure. Without a sense of God, one has nobody to ask for forgiveness. This dilemma makes many a neurotic.

3. Our deep fears are more justified than our superficial confidence. The outlook is extremely dark for anyone as a person and for society unless there be some way to deal with sin.

II. IN WHAT SENSE DID JESUS DIE FOR ME?

1. Why did the man Jesus die?

(1) He died as a completely human man.

(2) He could have compromised and escaped, and he knew it.

(3) His offense was his attitude toward sinners. For this he died.

2. His disciples saw in this the love of God.

(1) They might have thought the opposite, that he was simply an offering to the wrath of God.

(2) They saw in him the fulfillment of Old Testament sacrifices. The earliest sacrifices were for ritual errors, without provision for forgiveness for breaking the law. The prophets taught that the great sins are not ritual sins, that God forgives freely, and that the sacrifices are for the great sins. In the New Testament we find God seeking the sinner, and himself providing the sacrifice. Here are combined the ideas of free pardon and costly sacrifice.

3. God has always been the sin bearer. Jesus was the "Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." And he ever liveth to make intercession. The Son of God is crucified afresh by our sins. In the words of Dinsmore: "There was a cross in the heart of God before there was one planted on the green hill outside Jerusalem." And as Pascal said: "Jesus will be in agony 'til the end of the world."

4. Calvary brought God's redemption to men.

(1) Man's tragedy is separation from God.

(2) God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself. Not reconciling God to us, but us to God.

(3) If God so loved, why the atonement? Because God so loved. The suffering of Calvary was not merely because of holiness, but also because of love. The greater the love, the greater the cost of forgiving.

(4) The story of the cross is God's instrument for saving men.

III. WHAT GOOD DOES THIS DEATH DO ME?

1. It enables me to face and deal with my guilt.

2. It changes my suffering for sin from punishment to loving discipline.

3. It changes my good works from striving for personal merit to expressing loving gratitude.

4. It links my life to his saving ministry. Because he loved and suffered for me, I will love and suffer for others for his sake.

5. It gives to me eternal life, the only kind of life that would be endurable for eternity.

We do not have to come to God. In Christ God comes to us, knocks on the door of our hearts, and pleads with us to open and let him come in and sup with us.

Backsliding Made Easy

Mark 14:31,71

WE THINK ABOUT THE PLAN OF SALVATION and outline as clearly as we can the steps a man takes toward God. But there are also equally clear steps by which one may go away from God.

The experience of Simon Peter in the night in which Jesus was betrayed illustrates these steps very clearly. In the evening after supper, he was so devoted to Jesus that he wanted the Master to wash his hands and his head that he might be completely his. He was sure that although all others might deny him, he would not. Yet by dawn the next day he was cursing and swearing he never knew the Master. The rapidity with which he changed is not more striking than the definite steps that can be traced.

I. THE STEPS AWAY FROM CHRIST

1. Self-confidence. Although warned by Jesus, and himself knowing that others were weak, he was quite sure of himself. The Christian is in danger when he reaches the point at which he feels that he does not have to cling to God because he himself is strong, and will not fall to temptation.

2. Asleep at the hour of prayer (v. 37). Jesus asked the three to pray with him. Perhaps because he was so confident of himself, Peter did not pray. All meet the temptation to prayerlessness, and it is a long step away from the Lord.

3. An act of service without divine guidance (v. 47). When he saw the servants of the high priest lay hands on Jesus, he did not ask for direction, but did the thing that came natural to him. He wanted to serve the Master, but not in the Master's spirit. Too much of our service to Christ is not Spirit led.

4. Following afar off (v. 54). Jesus rebuked him, but he still followed, though far off. Many members of churches count themselves as followers of Jesus, yet are so far away as to be completely out of touch with him and his work.

5. Warming himself by the enemies' fires. Separated from Jesus, yet not united to anyone else, Peter got cold. The servants of the high priest built a fire and gathered around. So Peter came and joined them. Too many Christians are seeking their social and spiritual warmth at the devil's fires. Ordinarily people will find warmth somewhere, and if they do not seek and find it in the church they will seek and find it elsewhere.

6. Open denial. The servant girl was surprised to find a follower of

Jesus (Peter) in the company. But he denied that he was a follower of Jesus. When she insisted, he cursed and swore.

II. THE WAY BACK

Two things are mentioned as reminding Peter and turning him back.

1. A rooster crowed. It was a reminder because of something that Jesus had said. Many a person has been reminded of Christ by some little thing which turned his mind back to earlier loyalty.

2. Jesus turned and looked on him. In the eyes of the Master, there must have been compassion, understanding, love, and concern. It was really Jesus who brought Peter back and not anything else.

Let us be warned of the danger in which all of us stand of going away from our Lord. And let us be encouraged that he does not despair, but is ever trying to bring us back.

Practical Religion

Deuteronomy 30:11-16

A THOUGHTFUL LAYMAN COMMENTED that for him a sermon to be good had to have three qualities. *First*, it had to be simple and understandable. *Second*, it had to be related to his everyday life. *Third*, it had to come out of the Bible. He wanted, he said, a practical religion.

I. SOME POPULAR IDEAS OF WHAT IS PRACTICAL

1. Keeping your eye on the dollar. An epitaph in a country graveyard reads: "Here lies the body of Martha Hanks, beloved wife of Thomas Hanks, marblecutter. This monument was erected by her husband as a tribute to her memory, and as a specimen of

his work. You, too, can have a monument of this same style, \$250." To some people that only is practical which is financially profitable.

2. The thing that is usually done. To some, "practical" means what is usually practiced, and anything out of the ordinary is impractical.

3. Something fully understood. This would exclude all real religion and confine the preacher to the discussion of human concerns.

4. That which fits one's preconceived ideas. A person may consider as practical only that which is helpful toward reaching his own goals.

II. CHARACTERISTICS OF PRACTICAL RELIGION

1. There are real difficulties.

(1) Religion has to do with God, who is infinite, and beyond finite understanding.

(2) The demands of religion are measured by the holiness of God and can only be approached by his grace.

(3) Sinful man is by nature incapable of weighing spiritual values.

2. Some characteristics are understandable and helpful.

(1) It must be related to the nature and needs of real human beings.

(2) It must be applicable to the situation of the individual listening.

(3) It must be capable of bringing about desirable results.

(4) It must be available for his use.

III. CHRISTIANITY IS PRACTICAL

1. Faith in God is practical. Rational existence is impossible without some measure of faith. The character of God deserves trust.

2. Prayer is practical. The experiences of millions have demonstrated the reality and value of communing with God.

3. Personal morality is practical. Nothing is more irrational than immorality of any kind.

4. Love and service to neighbors are practical. Albert Edward Whigham wrote: "The supreme art above all others is the art of living together, justly and charitably. There is no other thing that is so taxing, requiring so much education, so much wisdom, so much practice, as how to live with our fellowman." Unneighborliness is the most impractical and costliest thing in the world. The secret of living with people is to love them for Jesus' sake.

5. Church loyalty is practical. The church is given to us to satisfy our deepest needs, and as a channel for our most meaningful contribution to the kingdom of God. Life that is built around the church is stable and worthwhile.

"But the word is very nigh unto thee, in thy mouth, and in thy heart, that thou mayest do it" (Deut. 30:14).

Knock on Every Door

Luke 10:1-17

CLOSE TIES BIND TOGETHER the Christian individual, the Christian family, and the Christian church. We cannot have Christian homes without Christian persons, nor can we continue to have Christian persons without Christian homes. And we cannot have either of these without Christian churches. The three are interdependent.

It is necessary for individuals and families to go to the church, but it is just as essential for the church to go

to the homes and to the individuals. No church can accomplish its mission without planned, persistent visitation.

I. CHURCH VISITATION CAMPAIGNS

1. Perennial and occasional
2. Individual church programs and programs in co-operation with other churches
3. To every house for census information and to homes of prospects

II. A VISITATION CAMPAIGN ORGANIZED BY JESUS

1. Definitely enlisted and appointed workers: "The Lord appointed other seventy also." The selection, training, and direction of workers was an important part of Jesus' ministry.

2. Organized team: "And sent them two and two before his face." Jesus had a passion for organization. When he fed the five thousand, he had them to be seated in companies. He frequently sent out workers two by two. This plan was followed later by the church in sending out missionaries.

3. Clearly defined territory: "Into every city and place, whither he himself would come." The success of a census depends in large measure upon preparation beforehand, including clear definition of the entire territory and careful assignment for every team.

4. Magnifying the task: "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few." Our harvest is great because of the numbers of people, the worth of every individual, and the greatness of their need.

5. Admonition to prayer: "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest." Workers were to be found and enlisted through prayer, and they were to pray for every house visited.

6. Warning of varied receptions. In some houses there would be "sons of

peace," and in others not. Jesus faced friendly and unfriendly people, and his disciples must expect the same.

7. Instruction as to procedure (vv. 5-11). They were told what to carry, where to go, and what to say when they got there. They were not to be contentious, nor to let rebuffs discourage them. Every visit for Christ can be of value.

8. Representing Christ (v. 16). The worker goes in the power of Christ, doing the work of Christ, with the assured presence of Christ, and will be received as people are ready to receive Christ.

9. God's judgment involved (vv. 12-15). Ours not just a friendly social visit.

10. Joyful reports (v. 17). No reference was made to the failures they must have had. They were impressed only with the demonstration of God's power through them. This is reward enough for the Christian worker.

The same Christ directs our visitation today, and the furtherance of the gospel waits on our faithfulness.

How to Treat a Sinner

Matthew 9:1-13

FROM WESTERN THRILLERS WE HAVE learned about good and bad people. The bad people are cattle rustlers, horse thieves, mine jumpers, and stagecoach holder-uppers. The good people are innocent victims and shining heroes. They walk differently, look differently, and act differently. The hero sings, hits harder, and shoots straighter. Good and bad drink, gamble, fight, shoot people, but the good are still good.

The way to treat bad people is to find them, beat them up, show them up, tell them off, and send them away. In the fade-out there are only good people left.

In Jesus' day there were stereotypes of good and bad people. The accepted treatment was to denounce, condemn, and avoid sinners and keep oneself pure. Jesus rejected this attitude. He found none good except God. He came to seek and to save the lost.

I. A SINNER FORGIVEN

1. A strange reception for a paralytic man: "Thy sins . . . forgiven."

2. Man's first and greatest need. Most of our misery comes from sin, either our own or that of others.

3. Forgiveness is an act of God.

4. Jesus claimed the right to forgive sins.

5. The evidence confirmed his claim. A state of rightness and wholeness came to those with whom he dealt.

II. A SINNER HEALED

1. He healed sick souls. Christ dealt with the whole man, in whom both soul and body needed healing.

2. None is wholly sound. All have need of the physician of souls.

3. The church is to carry on the work of spiritual healing in the spirit and power of Christ.

III. THE SINNER ENLISTED

1. A different kind of sinner. Levi was physically active and financially

solvent. Yet Christ saw his deeper need.

2. The call to discipleship was a call to service. His dark past did not keep Jesus from accepting present service.

3. The simple call brought a ready response. The fact that Levi was a busy man gave Jesus his opportunity.

IV. THE SINNER ACCEPTED

1. Matthew's invitation. The newly won disciple wanted Jesus to know his friends. So he gave a dinner and invited them to meet his Lord. Jesus never refused an invitation. He met the motley crew graciously.

2. Sharp criticism. The point was "he eateth with them." To accept them as social equals was unpardonable.

3. The error of the Pharisees. Misinterpreting the Scriptures.

4. Christianity creates loving fellowship. Christian fellowship is the most exclusive in the world, for it is shared only by the royal sons of the divine King. Yet, it is the most inclusive in the world because even the humblest and lowest of men can qualify for it. The barriers are never on the part of the Christian. Men are not shut out from this fellowship; they can only shut themselves out.

This is what Christ offers to the sinners: forgiveness of sin, healing of his malady, enlistment in kingdom service, and full acceptance into the Heavenly Father's family.

Book Reviews

GENERAL WORKS

The Treasury for Special Days and Occasions

Compiled by E. Paul Hovey (6r), \$3.95

This book is a wealth of information for anyone needing inspiration, illustrations, or quotations. It includes information and illustrations about secular as well as religious days. It tells of days not observed by Baptists; but so far as I can see, there is nothing that would be objected to by Baptists.

The author is very definite and positive in the expression of his ideas. While the information contained in this book is very worthwhile, there are many other such books on the market today.

PHILOSOPHY

Metaphysical Theories Love Almighty and Ills Unlimited

Austin Farrar (11d), \$2.95

This work by Austin Farrar is a philosophical approach to the problem of evil. The style of the book is that of a dialogue; and at times it makes for very difficult reading in trying to keep up with which viewpoint is that of the author, and which viewpoint is that which he is trying to controvert.

It is written, supposedly, within the framework of the Christian religion. But there are several points which would not be acceptable to the Baptist audience. Among these, he holds to the idea that man will have a chance for salvation after death; and he rejects, as a fable, the doctrine of Satan. There is an apparent inconsistency here, for later on he refers to the devil and his influence on men. The book makes several definite contributions to the problem of evil in the world. It is very thought provoking, and should be a real challenge to a pastor or a seminary student.—*Robert L. Cate, pastor, First Baptist Church, McRae, Georgia.*

PSYCHOLOGY

The Importance of Being Imperfect

John Robert Clarke (7m), \$3.50

The author tells how the effort of people to attain perfection, or to give the impression of perfection can result in unhappy lives ill-adjusted to the society in which they live. He impresses on us that we can be happy in spite of our imperfections, but some readers could read into his book that it is desirable to be imperfect—a philosophy contrary to biblical teachings.

His subject is directed to the average reader as a popular book for self-improvement. However, he uses excessive and unnecessarily large words making reading difficult and slow.—*T. Lee Anderton, Church Architecture Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville 3, Tennessee.*

The Search for Meaning

A. J. Ungersma (8w), \$4.75

This is a book about existential logotherapy, a term coined by Dr. Viktor Frankl to cover a method of ministering to the spiritual nature of man in its broader nontheological sense. The author was a student of Frankl, who helped him formulate the book, and the discipline he describes is the third school of depth psychology to come out of Vienna. Frankl is a survivor of a Nazi death camp. He has pioneered existential analysis as a therapeutic tool for dealing not only with psychotic patients, but "the whole gamut of difficulties that the average psychotherapist of whatever orientation is called upon to face."

This author seeks to make these insights available to educators, counselors, pastors, and social workers, and thus aid the already existing trend to combine the resources of science and religion in aiding troubled man. His existentialism is not that of Sartre who thinks of man as "inventing himself" but that which presents man "detecting himself" in his true dimensions. This method would consider trouble as ennobling, not degrading. It capitalizes on man's freedom to change his attitude and "puts the psyche back in psychotherapy."—B. F. What About Women?

John Henry Cutler (16-L), \$3.95

Mr. Cutler has written on a theme which will be of interest to many people, both men and women. He has gathered much information on the subject of the changing status of women, and certainly one would say that he is sympathetic to women. However, he makes what seem to be two basic mistakes: (1) While insisting that women are "just as good" as men, he persists in comparing them with men, thus showing his bias that he considers manhood the "norm" of life. He refuses to accept the fact of psychological differences between sexes. (2) He shows himself enamored of the sexual part of woman's nature, thus falling into the old trap of considering woman

purely a sexual being. This book may be, as the jacket suggests, a "provocative examination . . . of women," but it hardly qualifies as a serious study of womanhood in this century.—Velma Darbo, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville 3, Tennessee.

Faith and Health

Kristofer Hagen (42m), \$1.00

This little book of seventy pages is certainly worth taking the time to read. Written by a physician who is now practicing medicine in Kodaikanal, South India, it conveys an undertone of love and understanding. It is easily read, scientific, and accomplishes what is needed in many Christian circles today. The foreword says: "Saying what we believe in such a way that others, without too much difficulty, will understand what we are talking about is the test of our own grasp of what we believe and hold to be true."

Dr. Hagen says: "The purpose of these pages is not to discount the miracles of modern medicine." They are a welcome gift from God. Has not God created and inspired the human intelligence that has inspired these miracles? *As science advances, however, we want to be sure that man does not lose an important essential in his personal health—his faith and trust in God.*—A. Chester E. Swor (26b), \$2.50

Multitudes of Dr. Swor's friends have looked forward to this book because they have enjoyed *Very Truly Yours*. Similar in approach and atmosphere, this new one points out areas which Christians need to examine themselves and inspires them to explore those frontiers of morals and faith with the help of God. The first section deals with dedication, forgiveness, obedience, and prayer; the second section, with the stewardship of talent, Christian service, cross-bearing, and Christian faithfulness; the third, with Christian loyalty, hatred, fear of death, and various obstacles to victorious Christian living. *If We Dared!* will challenge older

Companion of Eternity

W. Gordon Ross (1a), \$3.95

This book is a psychological study of man in relation to the various facets of life. There are thirteen chapters. Chapter one is entitled "What Is Man?" The author discusses Man in Nature, Man and Animals, and Science and Man. With this as a starting point, he leads through twelve chapters with the following chapter titles: "Questions and Questioning," "Language," "Statements," "Definitions," "Meaning," "Science," "Approach and Method," "Psychology," "Personality," "Religion," "What Is Religion?" "The Idea of God," and "The Worth of Person." Each of the chapters is a discussion of the relationship of the subject to man in life. I would recommend this book as being helpful to counselors. I find nothing objectionable as far as Baptist doctrine is concerned.—P. C. Williams, Houston, Texas.

The Minister as Marriage Counselor

Charles William Stewart (1a), \$4.00

This book provides sound insight into, and methods for, meeting many problems brought to the minister in the area of marriage and the home. Since this is one of the largest and most vital areas of ministry, the author has made a worthy contribution to Christian leadership.

The choice of subjects about which he gathers and presents material is most commendable. The place of the minister in marriage, the counseling process, premarital counseling, estrangement and reconciliation, divorce and postdivorce, family life and education in the church, and others are treated in a very helpful way.

The author gives several analyses of typical problems, some model interviews, and counseling record forms which suggest pertinent facts and their sequence needed in the minister's effort to help a family in trouble. The bibliography on the various fields of marriage and the home is worth the price of the book. Not

Bernard Martin states that the church should carefully consider the fact that he still has a ministry to perform in the area of healing physical illness as conducted and commanded by Jesus Christ. He uses many biblical references to support his arguments that there is a direct relationship between the physical diseases of people and their spiritual health. The author believes that the failure to regain health is directly due to a lack of faith both on the part of the sick person, as well as the members of the church who pray for the recovery of that person. This is a field of ministry which deserves careful consideration by every Christian, and Martin points to some questions which should stimulate the thinking of any who are serious in their search for the answer to, "What about healing of the body through faith?" The objective of this re-examination is to find the answer to some significant questions such as: What is the place of sex in God's design? Language, Logic and God

Frederick Ferre (9h), \$3.50

The problem of communication is perhaps receiving more attention now than at any other time in history. In the past this frequently has been an almost insurmountable obstacle to any sort of constructive dialogue between philosophers and theologians. The language, starting premises, and systems arriving at conclusions have been written off as irrelevant mainly because each was basically unaware of what the other was really saying. Some sort of synthesis of approach, therefore, has become a blatant necessity. Dr. Ferre's book is one effort to move in that direction. It is, in fact, an attempt to set forth an intelligible analysis of the significance of logical

The Context of Decision

In such the author rationalizes his position as one in the "Mennonite traditions"; namely, to die martyrs' deaths—if God grant us the strength—before we bear arms against a fellow man."

While it gives due credit to man's ability to build the structures of society and of government, to gain the whole world of material resources, and to achieve technical scholarship, it warns that neither these values nor even religion itself can be sufficient. Speculation and Revelation in Modern Philosophy

Richard Kroner (8w), \$6.50

The author of *Speculation and Revelation in Modern Philosophy* has done a superb job in developing his thesis which is stated in the title of the book. This is the last volume in a set of three, all dealing with the same subject. This book deals with speculation and revelation as found in modern philosophical writings. It is clearly pointed out that when man arrived at the position where he thought he was free, and could do his own thinking, independent of the church, he started to formulate radical ideas in areas that were not in keeping with revelation. Speculation was separated from revelation by the Renaissance, and the Reformation. This separation led to speculation in practically every field of learning. The arts and sciences were affected and new areas of interest were opened, that heretofore were forbidden. The writer examines the works of the leading philosophers to show us the influence of revelation and speculation in their thinking. Natural Religion

The Life of Christian Devotion

Mary Cooper Robb (1a), \$3.00

The Life of Christian Devotion, a compilation of excerpts from the writings of William Law in answer to his critics, points the way step-by-step to a more meaningful view of a full Christian life. His extensive treatment of the prayer life of the believer seems to be the high point of this book. The chapter dealing with the workings of the Holy Spirit is also revealing and inspirational. If one can wade through the wordy, but beautifully expressive passages so alien to our present-day style of

writing, the message of this book can be a real value to one searching for a close personal fellowship with God. In the main, the writings of William Law are hardly in keeping with Baptist theology, but they are not intended to be. Modern Science in the Christian Life

Modern Science in the Christian Life brings nothing new to the person trained in science. The chapter on the tools and methods of science should be interesting reading to the layman in science. The discussion on science and the supernatural places God and science in the proper relationship, but really adds nothing new. Possibly too much is made of the apparent differences in the Genesis story of the creation and the teachings of science. Particularly, this is true concerning the image of God concept. The writer does a fine job with the wonders of nature which are so nicely made for man's existence on this planet. Robert Pfeiffer has presented, in his most classical form, the historical religious faith of the Hebrew race.

This book shows the development and change in the Israelite form and mode of worshipping God. It shows how they grew into a religious congregation. The religion of Israel did not suddenly become Judaism, and neither does God reveal all of himself at one time, but in a gradual manner.

Through shadows and symbols the Israelite faith develops into Judaism and then into Christianity as we know it today.

In this book Dr. Coulson attempts to show that there should be strong ties between science and technology, on the one hand, and the Christian faith on the other. He sees that science and technology, by themselves, may become gods to people; and he states that without the guiding influence of Christian faith the result of the age of technology will be to develop a world of technological humanists. He strongly urges Christians to refrain from ignoring the tremendous power for good that technology can be, and to add the Christian influence to it which it lacks, and without which it (technology) can never become a unifying influence in the world.

The book is well written on a topic that is somewhat ignored today. It is important that Christians recognize their obligation to be influential in this usually "isolated from Christianity" area of life. Ministers and laymen will find this interesting.—*Walter H. These subjects are considered skilfully and interestingly in the light of this present time and some fundamental truths of God's Word. As the chapter headings suggest, he shows that God not only has great concern in saving us, but wants our fellowship in constructive service. Though all will not agree with his leaving out the impor-

tance of one becoming a new creature, he does stress God's forgiveness and what he says is good. Christians who want to keep themselves reminded constantly of the need of the hour will like and be greatly helped by the book.—*F. W. Taylor, retired pastor, Estancia, New Mexico.*

The Gospel According to St. Matthew

Floyd V. Filson (9h), \$5.00

This volume has much excellence. The author has done a good job of presenting his material. He gives an extended introduction in which he discusses the leading features of the Gospel of Matthew, authorship, purpose and outline, and prominent themes of the book. He includes a bibliography, but one looks in vain for several of the classic commentaries on Matthew. The author has given his own translation of the Scripture text, section-by-section, and then comments in the style of a paraphrase or amplification of the Scripture passage. The key words of the text are woven into the commentary and put in boldface type. Many will not agree with his position on the church, or his middle-of-the-road position on baptism and the virgin birth of Christ. He is, in the main, conservative in theology. The Interpretation of Scripture

James D. Smart (8w), \$6.00

This book is a valuable addition to a growing stream of writings on biblical interpretation. The author, believing that "we are now moving into one of those periods . . . when doors of understanding come open and the Bible speaks with new clarity," writes to "mark out" the road being traveled. He points out the pitfalls of the past, and lays bare, and offers solutions to, problems which must be solved if the Bible is to speak plainly to modern man. The purpose is achieved in nine inter-

esting and provocative chapters. Some of the problems discussed are the following: the unity, inspiration, and authority of Scripture; the use of typology, allegory, and analogy; and subjectivity in approach. The book concludes with a two-chapter survey of interpretation in modern times.

The present trend in biblical studies, of which this book is a part, takes the Bible as the Word of God in a serious manner. The book will be appreciated by all who are interested in hermeneutics, but the beginning student will want to read such a book as Glaze's revision of Dana's *Searching the Scriptures* before attempting this work. The advanced student will find that the survey of recent literature, as well as the writer's freshness of style and approach, makes the book well worth its price.—*W. T. Jeremiah

H. Cunliffe-Jones (9m), \$3.50

This volume is a scholarly presentation of the book for mature Bible scholars. The introduction deals in a splendid way with the historical background and critical problems in the book. As so often happens with the British scholars, the author takes a liberal view concerning some material in the book, insisting that it is non-Jeremianic.

The commentary material, however, is excellent. It deals with sections, and many times with verse-by-verse comments, although, of course, not nearly every verse in the book is dealt with. Word studies and phrase studies are helpful. This is one of the best commentaries to come out on Jeremiah in a number of years.—*Fred M. Woods, pastor, Eudora Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee.*

of Luther's teaching ministry. The role of Romans in inspiring Luther's creative concept of God's righteousness-by-faith is epic. Burton H. Throckmorton, Jr. (8w), \$1.25

The author, who is on the faculty of the Bangor (Maine) Theological Seminary, does not follow a verse-by-verse method of comment, but pursues the course of the epistle of expounding the major ideas of Paul.

For Dr. Morgan, the biblical revelation is complete, trustworthy, and authoritative. Also, the biblical revelation may be seen to be progressive in nature while at the same time maintaining its basic unity and purpose. Some of it is of value, but much is speculative and irrelevant. It is difficult to separate the wheat from the chaff.

C. L. Mitton (1a), \$1.00

The Good News is the thirteenth volume in a series of twenty-two dealing with the entire Bible. This volume deals with the Gospels in a very clear and concise way.

It does not give parallel accounts but the most complete account that, in the mind of the author, was given in one or the other of the Gospels. Nothing but Scripture is used in the manuscript. The Apostles' Creed

J. T. Wiersma and J. W. Schulte Nordholt (8w), \$1.65

An excellent treatment of this ancient creed bringing its statement of the Christian faith to us today. Part 1 is a penetrating and incisive exposition of the Creed, while Part 2 is a treatment of it as found in art. This reviewer can appreciate Part 1 better, due to the fact that he is not well versed in sacred art.

The Apostles' Creed, while not a part of Holy Scripture, does point up basic Christian convictions generally held through the years. Gunther Bornkamm (9h), \$4.00

This is a history of Jesus based upon the tradition of the Synoptic Gospels. The author's primary objective is to demonstrate that the Gospels do give an authentic knowledge of the historical Jesus and that such great New Testament concepts as the messianic character of Jesus and the doctrine of the church have their origin in the teachings of Jesus himself.

Bornkamm is well aware of the historical problems involved in such a study as this, and he deals with the critical problems masterfully. The work shows a deep insight into the nature of the person and teachings of Jesus, and it is inspiring as well as interesting reading.—Robert B. Robert A. Raines (9h), \$3.00

This volume has to do with what the author calls the need for "conversion" within the church. One has to read this volume with the knowledge that the background of the author is that of a group which believe that one can be reconverted after the initial experience. The reader will have to read into the word conversion the idea of reconsecration rather than a new experience of regeneration. In Christ

E. Stanley Jones (1a), \$2.50

The thesis is, to use the author's words, "If people are 'in Christ' they have eternal life; if 'outside Christ' they have eternal death." The thesis is developed by a systematic discussion of the places where "in Christ" appears in the New Testament. The book is divided into readings of a page a day. The following topics of daily readings show how the thesis is developed. "Who is Christ," "The Christian Way," "In and Out of Christ—Two Worlds," "The Door," "The Free Gift of God," "Redemption in Christ," "Faith in Christ," "Love in Christ," "Abundant Life in Christ," "One Body in Christ," and "In the Lamb's Book of Life."

The author's position is acceptable to Baptists, except for two contradictory statements in the introduction. This book has good thought to offer on dedication of a life in Christ to the pastor and layman.—*Burl McMillan, pastor, Armona Baptist Church, Alcoa, Tennessee.*

This Is Protestantism

Arthur Mielke (6r), \$2.50

The author displays the good scholarship evident in most Presbyterian ministers. The book deals with the Protestant movement from the standpoints of its main principles of belief and the results of these beliefs in their impact upon society. The five principles discussed are justification by faith, the priesthood of believers, the authority of the Bible, sacredness of every vocation, and right of private judgment. The two richest fruits of Protestantism discussed are public education and political democracy.

The book does an excellent job of contrasting and defining Protestant as against Roman Catholic belief in regard to these principles. The history of Protestantism and Roman Catholicism is included to the degree that it is needed to develop the above mentioned principles. Some Baptists might be disappointed in that the author includes Baptists as just another of the Protestant denominations. However, I feel that all will agree

Christ Liveth in Me and Game with Minutes

Frank C. Laubach (6r), \$1.00

Christ Liveth in Me sets forth a doctrinal position which becomes his proposition, which is that a Christian can have Christ living in him all the time. In a rather dry manner the author proceeds to prove this proposition, and from it to draw seventeen corollaries. The strength of the book, if any, is to be found in these corollaries based on his thesis of proposition. Yet another weakness of the book is that one gets bogged down in the mire of the corollaries. In the second section of the book, the author attempts to give practical suggestions for practicing the presence of Jesus. He says that a few minutes a week given to thinking about Christ by one fourth of the people is not saving our country or our world. He says that Christians need to practice abiding with Jesus and to play a game at it by which they are constantly checking to see how many minutes out of each hour or how many seconds out of each minute they are spending with Jesus. There have been many books written on practicing the presence of Jesus or on spiritual exercises, most of which are more practical than this particular one. I doubt if much good will come to anyone who reads this book, although the proposition is well taken.—*James Basden, Commission on Human Welfare, Grand Prairie, Texas.*

For Better Church Members

Eugene May (14b), \$1.50

The author says that he writes this book with the hope that the reader may have a growing joy in a growing stewardship of life. The book has a devotional approach to the following subjects: The Christian Must

Pray, Sustaining the Soul Through Worship, Why Do We Have the Church, and Why Am I Here? The chapters are loosely knit and do not hold together well. The reader gets the impression that he is reading "the same old thing" rather than a fresh, stimulating approach to familiar subjects.—Howard B. Hear Our Prayer

Roy Pearson (6m), \$3.75

Those who think of prayer as being partially directed at the congregation, or at least given for the help of the congregation, will find much value in this book. The prayers are grouped as follows: prayers in the vestry, prayers of invocation, pastoral prayers, prayers at the offering, before the sermon, after the sermon, at the close of worship, and for the sacraments and ordinances. Under this last subhead, prayers for most every Holy Day, recognized in any type of communion, are furnished. Though Dr. Pearson is of the liberal school of theology, a cursory examination does not reveal any taint of heresy or question of orthodoxy as Southern Baptists would think of it.—F. F. Heart in Pilgrimage

Reginald Cant (9h), \$2.50

This brief book of nine chapters by an English minister is designed to make Christians keenly conscious of their need for a serious, consistent, soul-searching prayer life. The author insists that Christian holiness, meditation, and Bible reading are distinctly related to prayer in all its forms. No prayer method will suit all people. There always will be a difference between wishful thinking about God and real power to him. The author urges every Christian to pray whether he feels anything unusual or not right at the time. A prayer life increases in intensity as the *prayer* keeps on praying.

Prayer is needed by and effective for ordinary people. The Christian who prays alone should relate this to corporate worship. Materials helpful in worship should include Bible

lessons, psalms, or hymns. Perhaps the author places strong emphasis upon Holy Communion as the straight-line channel to God, a position common to the so-called liturgical churches. But these meditations contain more than reassurance and comfort; they are stimulating, too—vitamin shots rather than soporifics. He addresses himself to Christians; and in a series of thirty-seven brief chapters discusses duties, goals, motives, resources, and rewards for worthy living. Key Next Door

Leslie D. Weatherhead (1a), \$3.50

Key Next Door is a book of sermons preached by Dr. Leslie D. Weatherhead, pastor of City Temple, London, for twenty-four years. These sermons were preached toward the close of his ministry. After reading the book, I have not gotten a single new idea or a new illustration.

There is much that is objectionable in the book. Dr. Weatherhead considers many hymns and much of the Bible out of harmony with the mind of Christ. He says, "Some passages in the Bible in the light we have now are quite untrue, others very misleading, others have been mistranslated, while some passages are sublime; and we feel that their value will never deteriorate."—*Harry P. Wherefore Art Thou Come?

James T. Cleland (1a), \$2.50

The author selects eighteen meditations written especially for the communion service, plus an epilogue giving advice for preparing and

using such meditations. These meditations concentrate the attention of the congregation on the reasons for, and meaning of, the Lord's Supper.

The author supplies valid information which gives the customs of some denominations as related to their interpretation of the Lord's Supper. John Wesley believed that the Lord's Supper was a converting and confirming ordinance. One instance related it as a fellowship and reunion sacrament of secular nature.

The titles are as follows: "What Can Christianity Offer Modern Man?" "Does Life Have Meaning?" "Is Each Man Saved by His Own Faith?" "Is Faith Opposed to Reason?" "How Do I Obtain Peace With God?" "How Is Everyday Christianity Practical?" "On God Alone," and "Eternal Longing and Faith in Christ." These are excellent sermons on faith with helpful illustrations. The author being a Lutheran presents their teachings on baptism

In every sermon, Mr. Thomas brings out the great truths of the Bible with vivid imagery and expression. He has a way of expression and viewpoint which causes the reader to think, "Now why didn't I think of that?" The sermon on temptation is worth reading again and again. And his gentle irony as he characterizes those who are looking for an easy religion, causes any reader to search his own soul. His chapter on God's servants is a review of the diversity in human kind that God uses mightily. And the sermon on the pain of Christian growth is painful pleasure indeed.

Other sermon chapters that stick in the consciousness like sandbars are the ones on the world judging Christians and prayer. The man just can't seem to miss. The City Church—Death or Re- newal

Walter Kloetzli (42m), \$3.75

This book is a fascinating interpretation of the findings of an intensive study of Lutheran churches. The study was undertaken by a number of major Protestant denominations, under the leadership of the National Councils' Bureau of Research and Survey.

The survey results point up dramatically the dynamic of urban communities and the plaguing problems that churches face in the changing city.

Case histories of eight churches are presented in detail. The remaining chapters present a multitude of charts, survey results, comparisons, and summary statements of the findings.

Although this study is taken of Lutheran churches, much of the encyclopedic information discovered can readily be used by Southern Baptists. Excellent survey methods are presented along with a comprehensive questionnaire used as a part of the study. This book would appeal to church staff members who are interested in better understanding their urban churches and the sociological factors involved.—Howard B. How to Operate a Sunday School

R. O. Woodworth (1z), \$2.95

This book sounds strangely familiar. Although the author is from the Fundamental Baptist group, he no doubt has some Southern Baptist background. The book is written in familiar study course book style. It contains about the same amount of material at five times the cost.

The same or similar principles and methods of Sunday school work are crudely set forth here that are found in many of our publications. Although the suggestions are similar, they are different enough to be unnecessarily confusing to the novice in Sunday school work. I would be more inclined to recommend a book of this type if it differed radically from our viewpoint. As it is, we can secure better prepared and more up-to-date material through our present Church Study Course for Teaching and Training. Planning for Church Music

James Rawlings Sydnor (1a), \$1.25

For a general approach to the organization and promotion of the music ministry, the author has certainly achieved his point. He writes in an easy-to-understand style, is practical at most points, and has compressed each area of discussion into brief, but succinct developments.

Any person having responsibility for setting up a music ministry will find numerous helpful suggestions and ideas that he can use. Of course, there may be such matters as choir location, organ console placement, and other ideas on which there is not unanimity of opinion, but he has so indicated. Therefore many ideas are set forth, and the author leaves it to the reader to select the one which best suits and is adaptable to his church. I can enthusiastically recommend *Planning for Church Music* as a source book for pastors, ministers of music, church musicians generally, and others who have an interest in expanding the church music program.—*Loren R. The Outsider and the Word of God

James E. Sellers (1a), \$4.00

This is a study of evangelism from an entirely new perspective. The categories of thought are those of modern critical scholarship rather than pietistic Christianity. Both the approach of the author and his conclusions are controversial but provide fresh insights of value. The author's thesis is that the problem of evangelism is more complicated today than ever before because in the Western world, the majority of people are inoculated by Christian symbols which have been emptied of their transcendent and transforming message. Thus, whereas second-century Christianity could use pagan symbols as a point of contact issuing in an awareness of the uniqueness of the gospel message, this is not possible today in Western society. The use of mass media of communication for evangelism is sharply questioned. The analysis of the problem is quite clear. The purposed solutions are ambiguous. Thus, the reader must provide his own solutions out of his understanding of the gospel and the "lost" of this day.

This book is recommended because it divorces dogmatics and apologetics in a way which would be helpful to every Baptist concerned with communicating the gospel of redemption.—*Duke K. McCall, president, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky.*

The Role of the Bible in Contemporary Christian Education

Sara Little (5k), \$3.50

It is obvious that this book was originally a graduate thesis. Also, as the author confesses, the book presupposes a familiarity with writings and terms in Christian education.

The author presents the historical background and an analysis of the current role of the Bible in Christian education. It is emphasized that Christian education cannot be considered an autonomous discipline and that the structure and process of such education must grow out of its content. This book is not light reading, and it contains no promotional "gimmicks." The chapters, "The Relevance of the Bible" and "The Appropriation of the Biblical Message," will have special value for the serious religious educator.—*Arthur L. How to Develop a Tithing Church

Charlie W. Shedd (1a), \$1.25

Any volume which emphasizes the place of stewardship in the Christian life, the church, and the kingdom is to be encouraged. This volume is written out of the experience of one church in seeking to lead its members to tithe or at least become "proportionate givers." A part of the volume tells something of that church's experience. It outlines a program which is a forward step for that church and for many other churches, but which is partial and sketchy in comparison with programs such as the Forward Program of Church Finance.

Approximately half of the volume is given to statements for the church bulletin, sample monthly pulpit statements, starter ideas for tithing talks to children and youth, sample congregational letters, suggested sermon thoughts, and seed thoughts for development.

The Small Church and Christian Education

Rachel Swann Adams (8w), \$1.00

This is a useful resource book for leadership in small churches. It was not written by a Southern Baptist. However, the material is excellent and will find many uses in our small churches. Since the large majority of our churches are under three hundred in membership, this book should have a wide reading constituency. This quote gives an insight in the author's thesis: "The attitude of the church toward its mission in the world is one of the most important factors in its educational work. The small church can be as dynamic as a large one, for it is not size that counts, but the quality discipleship." Features found in the book are advantages, program, administration, facilities, and then adaptations in the small church education opportunities.—*C. Basic Principles of Singing

William C. Rice (1a), \$1.25

This brief discussion of problems frequently encountered in singing seems to be practical and sets forth some generally accepted principles and methods. It is always agreed that this is an extremely difficult subject to give literary treatment without the benefit of oral comments. However, in view of these limitations, the author has achieved well in his discussions. He has set forth some sound, fundamental, generally accepted principles of vocal pedagogy. The author has actually set forth his ideas used in teaching students and training choirs; therefore, they are based on years of practical experience and a successful teaching career. Even though there might not be complete agreement on points, he has said much in these six chapters.

Particularly helpful are the reference materials, solos, and anthems suggested as study materials to supplement the various areas of discussion. This book should be quite useful for general reading, private teaching, and for class voice and choir training.—*Loren R. Williams, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

The Art of Handbell Ringing

Nancy Poore Tufts (1a), \$3.00

This is an excellent, practical, understandable discussion of handbells. There is an increasing interest in handbells, and an ever-increasing number of churches are adding them as a part of the music ministry program and equipment.

Since there are so few books dealing with the subject available, plus the fact that very few musicians have had experience or training in organizing and teaching these groups, any new source of information will be welcomed.

The author deals with many of the questions one would naturally expect—how to start, how to get the bells, how to care for them, selecting members, training the choir, using the choir (benefits to be derived), and a host of similar queries. For those merely desiring to know more about this interesting movement that seems to be very much on the incline, this is profitable, informative reading.—*Loren R. CHRISTIAN CHURCH HISTORY

The Nineteenth Century Outside Europe, Vol. III

Kenneth Scott Latourette (9h), \$7.50

This volume traces the nineteenth-century expansion of Christianity in the two divisions of the world outside Europe. "Larger Europe" is those lands dominated by those who were European by birth or ancestry. The other division is the one in which non-Europeans are in the majority. By virtue of the background of its inhabitants the first division had the earliest and most effective contact with Christianity.

The discussion of "larger Europe" deals primarily with developments in the ideals and practice of the Christian faith. For the non-European world this was a time of expanding missionary outreach. The facts dealing with both areas are encyclopedic in scope but are presented in a very readable fashion.

The great value of the book is the discussion of the roots of movements and developments. In the Americas particularly these were related to such movements as separation of church and state, sectarianism, revivalism, activism, and the social implications of the Gospel. Among the non-Europeans there was the preparation for the present-day dynamic movement toward world power. The fourteen pages of bibliography are of value in themselves.—*Arthur L. Brothers in Christ

Fritz Blanke (33h), \$1.25 paper

This brief monograph deals with the history of the Anabaptist congregation at Zollikon, Switzerland, during its short existence in 1525. Based upon contemporary sources, it is scholarly in approach—assuming in the reader a working knowledge of the church history of the period. The book is, however, short enough that its rather pedantic approach is not stifling. Therefore it would be of interest to Baptist people interested in their denominational antecedents, even though it seems primarily meant for students of church history.

Dr. Blanke is professor of church history at the University of Zurich, Switzerland, and the book has been rendered in fairly comfortable English by Dr. Joseph Nordenhaug of the International Baptist Seminary at Zurich-Ruschlikon.—*Glen M. William L. Lumpkin (26b), \$4.50

This is a readable and worthy manuscript. It makes a real contribution to the historical background study of Baptists by pointing up the distinctive contribution of the Separate group of Baptists growing out of the Great Awakening. Baptists of today need to know these foundations to be better able to understand themselves and to account for their positions today. Although the author used some secondary sources when he might have used primary ones, he certainly reveals his familiar-

Handbook of Denominations— In the United States (Revised, 1961)

It has more information packed in shorter space than I have seen elsewhere in print. The alphabetical arrangement by denominations makes it very simple to use. The Religious Factor

Gerhard Lenski (11d), \$5.00

A thorough study of the lives of 750 Detroit citizens, originally entitled *Religion and the American Metropolis*, and subtitled *A Sociological Study of Religious Impact on Politics, Economics, and Family Life*. Some 165 questions were asked in the study. The answers, their implications, and projections of their significance for the community as a whole are exhaustively explored.

The book may be of interest to pastors, ministers of education, students, and those few laymen who are interested in a sociological study that is not representative of the bulk of Southern Baptist life. Some of the conclusions have direct interest for us. Others have little or no validity except in their own geographical and ethnic context. Here is an astonishing little book—small only in number of pages. The idea is big. His father became interested in the subject and together they collaborated to expand the paper to its present length of sixty-four printed pages. His purpose is reasonably well carried out in the first half of the book. The second half is a recital of accomplishments and involvements of the National Council of Churches in public affairs.

This book gives basic procedures to follow in establishing the camp, choosing and developing the site, and all phases of administration and programing. There is a helpful chapter devoted to the rainy day at camp. It is a truly significant book in the field. The book will serve well as a craft cafeteria, but does not have enough detail to carry the interested craftsman very far. The illustrations are so poor as to be unnecessary. Biography China Doctor

Raymond S. Moore (9h), \$3.95

This biography of Harry Miller, a medical missionary to China, is excellent in every way. Dr. Miller, affiliated with the Seventh-day Adventist group, has made a great contribution to the medical profession, as well as to evangelism. The book tells in an interesting, readable manner of his many adventures with the Chinese, his having been in China for the most part of the period of 1903-50.

Dr. Miller found that the best way to reach the Chinese was to be as much a part of their culture as possible and to minister to their physical needs, thus enabling their spiritual needs to be met. He was recognized by both church leaders in the States and leaders in the Chinese government as being a real friend of the people. Medically, his greatest contribution was in the development of processes to convert the soybean to a usable product. Kagawa of Japan

Cyril J. Davey (1a), \$2.50

With the death in April, 1960, of Dr. Toyohiko Kagawa of Japan, it is fitting now to have a new and complete biography of a man who was known at one time as the world's greatest Christian. This straight-forward account tells Kagawa's story from his unhappy childhood until his death, in a simple and sympathetic manner. The accomplishments of his life are astounding in the light of his constant ill-health and frail body. The Christian-socialist, pacifist, reformer, mystic was consumed by the compassion of Christ. "I know of no man . . . who so possessed the mind of Christ," wrote a missionary.

Kagawa never desired to be a public figure, but his literary and social work brought him into the public eye, and his ardent pacifism brought him notoriety, hostility, and several imprisonments of short duration. Strong denominationalists could not agree with all his

beliefs, but the reader cannot but be challenged by the utter selflessness and abandon with which he gave himself to evangelism and to the betterment of living conditions for the underprivileged and needy of Japan in the name of Jesus.—*Mrs. Ralph E. Gwin, Palmetto, Florida.*

Protestant Patriarch

George A. Hadjiantoniou (5k), \$3.50

The author tells of Cyril Lucarus' life from the age of twelve until his martyrdom at age sixty-six. The narrative is given in such an interesting manner that one feels as though he had known the Patriarch of Constantinople personally. The intrigues of the Roman Catholic Church and those who promoted them are dealt with quite thoroughly. The machinations that the Roman Catholics used in that day are well worth us looking at in the happenings of our own time.

It would be well if all of our people would read this book when it is released for, even though the Greek church and its people are dealt with, a lesson in faith and courage is shown. This is the life story of William Booth, the Methodist English evangelist who later founded the Salvation Army, and his wife, Catherine, who acted as a stabilizing force to his flamboyant personality. The author has seemingly tried to be an unbiased biographer by presenting the weakness of his subjects, as well as the strength. He gives us fresh, human insight into the life of a minister who met opposition to his evangelistic zeal in the established churches in England.

We follow Booth from a lad of sixteen as he leads a "motley collection of unwashed humanity" into the Wesley Chapel in Nottingham, to the ninety-three-year-old General of the Salvation Army. Eventually his influence spread to many foreign countries. I feel that the author has done a very acceptable

From this general information beginning, he moves on to show how findings had served to ratify and substantiate the Bible. Discoveries in Assyria, Babylonia, Persia, and Egypt are discussed in regard to their relation to the Scriptures. Although the ground has been covered before in similar works, this is a book which pastors and interested laymen will find both enjoyable and informative.—*A. B. 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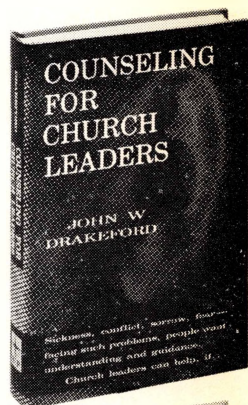

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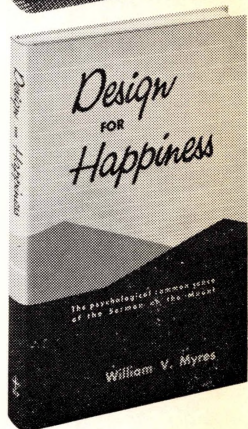
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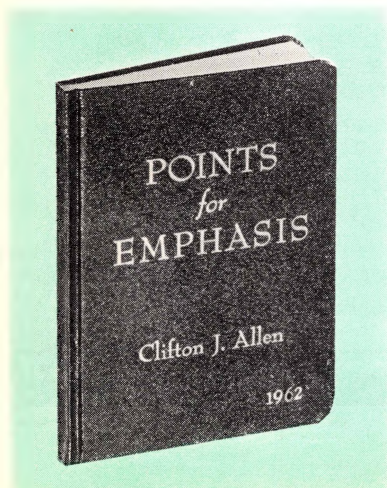
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
