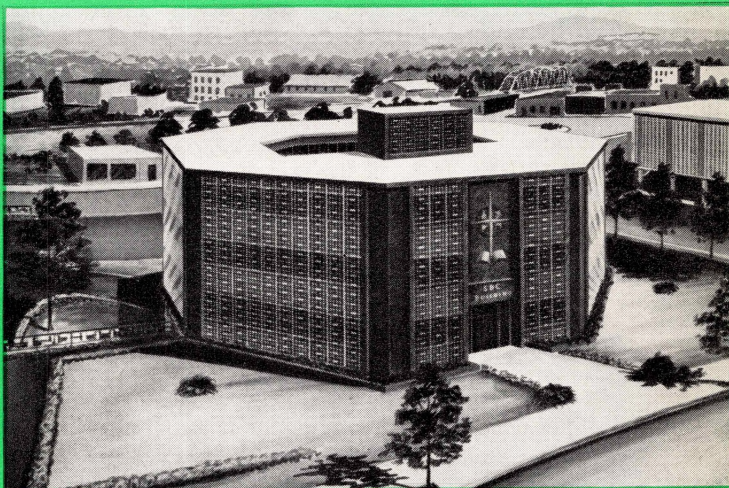

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Last year 242 churches were dropped from the records of Southern Baptists. One hundred and eighty-eight of these were rural churches, and 54 were city churches. They had a combined membership of 18,000, which ranged from a very small membership to a membership of over 450.

Perhaps the first question to be raised is, "What happened to these churches?" "What caused them to be dropped from our records?" A few of them merged with other churches, but most of them disbanded for various reasons. In some cases, members moved to urban areas. In a few cases, entire communities were depopulated. In most cases, however, it appears that they disbanded because of inadequate leadership.

Whatever the cause, the fact that Southern Baptists are losing an average of over 200 churches per year should alert Southern Baptist leaders to examine and try to correct this increasing problem.

What about the record of our remaining churches? The last issue of this magazine carried the record of Southern Baptists, as a denomination, for the preceding year. This issue carries the individual record of over 3,000 churches. While we wish we might have included the record of our 32,598 churches, it would have required a volume several times the size of this one. We are listing, therefore, *all* open country and village churches with a membership of 400 and above; town churches with 650 members and above; and city churches with 900 members and above.

Churches are important, and only as they accept and fulfil their rightful place will the cause of Christ move forward in our day.

The Cover

The picture on the cover page is a drawing of the new Southern Baptist Convention building, which is scheduled to be completed for occupancy by January 1, 1963. It will house the Convention's Executive Committee, Southern Baptist Foundation, and Christian Life, Education, and Stewardship Commissions.

The three-story building fronts on James Robertson Parkway in the Capitol Redevelopment Center near the Tennessee State Capitol.

The building provides an auditorium which will seat 250.

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This Nation Under God

Isaiah 60:12: "For the nation and kingdom that will not serve thee shall perish."

Second Corinthians 3:17: "And where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty."

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

Thus reads the first sentence of the Declaration of Independence, the historic document adopted by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. As the Declaration continues, the grievances against Great Britain are named and the official declaration of freedom is made. In the last paragraph we read further:

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions. . . . And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

● Never in our nation's history have we more desperately needed to re-examine the contents of this entire document, but more specifically these quoted portions. Evidently our nation was founded upon the assumption and conviction that only as we rely on God shall we have liberty for which our forefathers willingly fought and died. Some "so-called patriots" are telling us that this fact is in the Declaration of Independence only by inference, but I suggest to you that it is spelled out as clearly as any elementary truth could be expressed.

● However, if the statement of a nation's dependence upon God is only by inference, you and I could examine God's Word and see the truth clearly stated and dramatically illustrated. Hear the word of the prophet: "For the nation and kingdom that will not serve thee shall perish." Unless we learn from history of the rise and fall of empires and nations we perish. After freedom was a reality in our nation's history and efforts failed for adopting a constitution, it was Benjamin Franklin who advised adjournment for the purpose of reading God's Word and praying for his guidance. He said, "If it be true that a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without his notice, surely a nation cannot rise without his aid." In the light of recent developments, perhaps some of our national leaders would say that Franklin and his contemporaries were naive, if not stupid!

● The danger of destruction comes not from without, but from within. Hear this statement ascribed to Abraham Lincoln:

All the armies of Europe, Asia, and Africa combined, with all the treasures on the earth in their military chests with a Bonaparte for a Commander, could not by force take a drink from the Ohio or make a track on the Blue Ridge in a thousand years. At what point, then, is the danger expected if it ever reaches us? It must spring up amongst us. It cannot come from abroad. If destruction be our lot, we must ourselves be its author and finisher.

Lincoln was here reciting history, but we need to examine things more current.

● Some time ago, the Supreme Court ruled that it is unconstitutional for the Federal Government or any

state to require a "belief in the existence of God" as a qualification for public office. In so doing, official sanction and official status were placed upon a new religion in America—atheism. This opinion of the court has created some serious problems.

● First, there is the problem of precedence. Did the court have sufficient precedence to make such a ruling? Are our laws so vague that an interpretation of this kind is justifiable? The Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives in a report to Congress in May, 1954, reminded our legislators that "the Supreme Court of the United States ruled in 1892 that 'this is a religious nation.'" The committee further reminds the members of Congress that the Court reiterated and affirmed this ruling in 1951, when it stated: "We are a religious people whose institutions presuppose a Supreme Being." One wonders what has happened between 1951 and 1961 to the thinking of some of the justices still sitting on the bench of the high court who participated in this 1951 ruling concerning the Supreme Being.

● The quotation from the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives referred to above was in connection with a resolution introduced in the Congress of the United States and passed in 1954 to the effect that the words "under God" be added to the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States.

It would be for us to examine again portions of this report as cited by David Lawrence in his syndicated column and published in *The Columbia Record* on July 1, 1961.

At this moment of our history the principles underlying our American Government and the American way of life are under attack by a system whose philosophy is at direct odds with our own . . . the inclusion of God in our pledge therefore, would further acknowledge the dependence of our people and our government upon the moral directions of the Creator. The same time it would serve to deny the atheistic and materialistic concepts of communism with its attendant subservience of the individual. . . .

At this point in the report, the quotations referred to above were given and then the report continues as quoted by Mr. Lawrence:

Those words by our Supreme Court are true in a very fundamental and realistic sense. From the time of our earliest history our peoples and our institutions have reflected the traditional concept that our nation was founded on a fundamental belief in God. On July 4, 1776, our founding fathers proclaimed our Declaration of Independence which no less than four times refers to the existence of the Creator. This same document appeals to "the Supreme Judge of the World" that this nation be free, and pledges our nation to support the declaration with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence. The Supreme Court has clearly indicated that the references to the Almighty which run through our laws, our public rituals, and our ceremonies in no way flout the provisions of the First Amendment. In so construing the First Amendment, the court pointed out that, if this recognition of the Almighty was not so, then even a fastidious atheist or agnostic could object to the way in which the court itself opens its sessions, namely, "God save the United States and this honorable court."

● During the past summer across these United States, millions of boys and girls in Vacation Bible school were faithfully saluting the Christian flag and the flag of the United States saying:

"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands: one nation under God, indivisible . . ."

I remind you again that these words were officially placed in the pledge to the flag by an act of Congress in 1954, but they are in the hearts of every God-fearing American. Now, as *The Columbia Record* points out editorially, the question is asked, "Shall the pledge now be said, 'One nation under God, indivisible [except for atheists]?' Permit me to quote further from the column of David Lawrence to which I have referred above. In his concluding paragraph he says:

What a pity that the Supreme Court on June 19 last didn't follow the reasoning cited by Congress instead of arbitrarily reversing the rulings of the high court in the past! Maybe it is time for the Supreme Court justices to reread carefully the warning given by George Washington in his Farewell Address in 1796.

Let it simply be asked, where is the security for property, for reputation, for life, if the sense of religious obligation desert the oaths which are the instruments of investigation in courts of justice? And let us with caution indulge the supposition that morality can be maintained without religion. Whatever may be conceded to the influence of refined education on minds of peculiar structure, reason and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle.

In a stimulating novel Taylor Caldwell has one of her characters exclaim:

In God we trust, that is on our coins, we in America pretend to believe that. We do not. We trust only in weapons, and bribes, and treaties and admonitions—as does our adversary.¹

● In 1955, the Congress of the United States passed a law requiring that the phrase "in God we trust" be put on all new money issued by the

United States. For more than four-score years the phrase had been inscribed only on certain silver coins, but now it is on all money, currency bills and coins in circulation in the United States.

We must agree that this recent ruling by the Supreme Court puts us in an untenable position in the eyes of the world. On one hand, there is this inscription on our coins; there is this phrase, "one nation under God, indivisible," in the official pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States; there are these former rulings by the Supreme Court; and there is that undeniable reference to and dependence upon God in the Declaration of Independence. But on the other hand, we now hear the Supreme Court stating that it is unconstitutional for any state or for the Federal Government to require a belief in the existence of God.

I believe there is agreement that our situation concerning our nation under God is tragic. However, it is not enough to decry the situation, to wring our hands weeping and wailing! There are things that you and I can and must do. What are they?

● First, we must as individuals, make this spirit of the Lord about whom the apostle Paul was speaking, so completely the Lord of our lives that we shall act at all times as if there is a God alive today. This faith in a God who supersedes the United Nations, the Supreme Court, and the United States, is a God who issues his own edicts, grants his own judgments. Yes, he is a God who issues his own decrees and keeps his own books on all that is done. We believe that the nation and kingdom that will not serve him shall perish and

we plead for our fellow Americans to hear him! Today we face certain destruction if there is not a turning to God. My plea is that we who believe in God will fall upon our knees and agonizingly beseech him to have mercy upon us and upon all Americans.

● Again, I suggest that we who not only believe in God, but who believe in his Son and who have affiliated with the church of the living God, so live in devotion to him and to his church that the church shall make the impact and impression upon the world as God intended that it should. You and I who have been born and reared in a Christian climate and who have had the advantage of what some sarcastically call "the Bible Belt" ought to live as disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ and as the born again of the Son of God through the power of the Holy Spirit.

As we live under his lordship and invest our lives in his church, the institution for the redemption of the world, we shall in a realistic way make our influence felt the world over. I realize there are those who belong to the church that Satan would claim as his own and use them as tools to undermine the very foundation of the church. He would have them, through inactivity, weaken the witness of the church. As our world burns in this hour when war could break out in any one of a dozen places within the next twelve hours, where are God's people?

● What are they doing? Where are the more than one hundred million Americans who claim to believe in God? Are they quietly in worship, or are they out where the devil can use them more effectively for his avowed

purpose of defeating the will of God in this world? Hear the Word of the Lord, "Because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth" (Rev. 3:16). God issues his own decrees, my beloved, and God brings his own judgment.

● Finally, I would suggest that not only by our Christian discipleship, but by our Christian citizenship we manifest our interest in the Government of the United States to such an extent that we shall make it impossible for atheism to continue in places of responsibility. If you and I could exemplify Christian statesmanship as God would have it, we not only would make it impossible for atheism to reach the levels of government at any point, be it local, state, or national; but instead, we would see that there is a warmhearted Christian concern in these places.

We hear a great deal during these days about our "new freedom." The Lord spoke to us about new freedom also. He says there are only two ways, and you and I have the freedom to choose one of those two ways. I am convinced that the freedom of choice which the Lord points out is open for us as individuals and as a nation. We either enter the narrow gate and travel the narrow road which leads to life eternal, or we enter the broad gate, and we travel the broad road that leads to eternal damnation. There is no neutrality nor inbetween routes. We either believe in God or we don't; we accept Jesus as Saviour or we don't; we either live for him or we don't. How long will we waver between these two ways? When we, with conviction, enter into that narrow gate,

we will be entering not only the new life, but will be leading countless others in that direction.

● In conclusion, I come to ask this question. Who will aid us in the preservation of a Christian society, and who will help us to regain and to preserve our liberty "under God"? Will charters, alliances, agreements, world governments? Never! Hear these words, "We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in number, wealth and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God.

"We have forgotten the gracious hand that preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with the unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God who made us. It behooves us, then, to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins and to pray for clemency and forgiveness."

Whose words are these? Those of a modern preacher or prophet as Billy Graham or Billy Sunday, George Truett or J. B. Gambrell? No. It is reported that the President of the United States, Abraham Lincoln, uttered these words in an official pronouncement.

The Dream of Building

I Chronicles 22:7-8

AS WITH EVERY GREAT UNDERTAKING the building of Solomon's Temple began with a dream. The man who dreamed the dream was David, who did not live to see it realized. But like all great dreams, it came true.

I. MANY DREAM OF WHAT THEY NEVER SEE

1. Abraham and God's covenant
2. Moses and the Promised Land
3. Paul's missionary undertaking
4. Early church and the kingdom
5. All truly great men

II. DAVID DREAMED OF A TEMPLE

1. The idea—

(1) Possible influence of heathen temples.

(2) Rebuked, and yet approved.

2. He was rejected as builder.

3. Yet he made preparation for building.

(1) Location—rock foundation and prominent place.

(2) Provided for magnificence—"must be exceeding magnificent"—no stinting.

(3) Design and plan were not original. He used best available architects.

(4) He gathered materials.

(5) He arranged for artisans.

4. David passed on his dream to Solomon.

III. THE DREAMS MEN DREAM

1. They do not all come true.

(1) Some are self-defeating, unworthy to be fulfilled.

(2) Some do not pay price of realizing.

(3) Some are superseded by worthier dreams—Paul's second missionary journey—Abraham Lincoln's early endeavors.

(4) Greatest dreams are greater than the span of one life.

2. Your dream is the most important thing about you.

(1) It is the measure of your soul.

(2) It reveals your true values. Your objectives may be more revealing than your accomplishments.

(3) It extends your powers. Nothing can so extend a man as his dreams. Because David had a great dream, he did great things.

(4) It keeps you alive. Many a man has lived longer because of a dream. Any man is dead who no longer has a dream.

3. Every Christian ought to have a dream.

(1) For his family.

(2) For his church and community.

(3) For the kingdom of God.

IV. SOLOMON WAS HEIR TO A DREAM

1. He was David's son. Fortunate is the father who can bequeath his dreams to his son.

2. We have other fathers whose dreams descend to us.

(1) The fathers of our nation.

(2) The builders of our community.

(3) Those who dreamed our church.

3. Solomon was a worthy heir.

(1) He accepted responsibility soberly.

(2) The dream became his dream.

(3) He went far beyond the vision of his father.

(4) He became worthy of honor. It is known as Solomon's Temple, not David's.

CONCLUSION

1. Let us not fail those whose dreams are wrapped up in our lives.

2. Let us get for ourselves a dream that is bigger than we are and give ourselves to it.

3. Let us share with others the dream of Christ for his church, and give ourselves to its fulfilment.

The Difficulty of Building

Ezra 1:3; 4

THE SECOND GREAT HOUSE of worship built in Jerusalem, the Temple of Zerubbabel, was built under great difficulty. A remnant of the people returned to the city under Nehemiah, rebuilt the walls of the city, erected homes to live in, and made sporadic efforts at Temple building. But it took twenty years to complete the task.

I. THE ADVERSARY WAS ACTIVE

1. Those who wished to defeat the building program first tried infiltration. Unsympathetic helpers may do more to defeat an undertaking than honest opponents.

2. They weakened the hands of the workmen (4:4-5). We are not told just how they did this, but there are many ways to weaken the hands of workers.

3. They made accusations against them (4:6 ff.) Satan is always the accuser against God's servants. Sometimes his accusations may be true; often they are false; usually they are distorted.

4. They stopped the work by force (4:23). In many lands, building churches is forbidden.

II. THE PEOPLE BECAME COMPLACENT

1. They were not without religious services.

(1) Built altar for sacrifices (3:2).

(2) Feast of tabernacles (3:4).

(3) Had ministers, worship (3:5).

(4) Made free will offerings (3:5).

(5) Even had great revival (3:6).

(6) Prepared to build some day (3:7).

(7) Waited for propitious time (Hag. 1:2).

2. Their lives were as lax as their religion.

(1) The powerful became greedy. They became money lenders and slave owners like Babylon.

(2) They profaned the sabbath. Six days were not enough to make money (Neh. 13:15-18).

(3) Tithes were withheld (13:10).

(4) Homes became luxurious (Hag. 1:4).

(5) Families were heathen (Neh. 13:23 ff.). Married heathen wives. Children speak language of Ashdod, not of Zion.

III. GOD COMMANDED TO BUILD

1. Through heathen king. Cyrus saw importance more clearly than the Jews.

2. He called the leaders.

(1) Nehemiah, the layman

(2) Ezra, the pastor

(3) Haggai, the fiery prophet

3. He moved the people to liberality.

4. He stirred them up to go forward.

5. He held before them the challenge of the future of his kingdom (Hag. 2:7-9).

IV. GOD SOMETIMES CALLS CHURCHES TO RISE AND BUILD

1. He speaks through voices now silent in the dreams handed on by others.

2. He speaks through pressing need, as churches outgrow their facilities.

3. He speaks in the development of plans that will set forward his work.

4. He speaks by opening doors, making property available, and removing obstacles.

5. He speaks in the growth of cities, multitudes of people to be reached.

6. He speaks in the talent, dedication, and availability of workers.

7. He speaks in the hearts of people as interest rises; the vision is shared.

8. He speaks in material blessings upon the members and a sense of stewardship grows.

9. He speaks in laying the burden upon hearts of chosen leaders so that they cannot escape it.

Churches may build from wrong motives, but when God calls a people to rise and build, they must respond.

The Delight of Building

I Chronicles 29:9

REJOICING IS MENTIONED INNUMERABLE times in the Bible. Twice in connection with the building of Solomon's Temple it is emphasized. One is in the giving for it, and the other in its dedication.

Is it strange that people who gave rejoiced? When we take offerings we apologize, tell jokes, try to ease the pain, but love always gives gladly.

I. THE PEOPLE WHO SHARED IN IT

1. The leaders led in giving.

(1) David headed the subscription list with some \$60,000,000.

(2) Only generous people can lead effectively in stewardship.

(3) Great pastoral leaders give freely.

(4) Lay leaders must lead in giving.

2. The wealthy gave of treasures.

(1) The Bible does not teach absolute ownership.

(2) Nor does it teach that all should be exactly equal in what they have.

(3) Christian stewardship is more demanding than communism.

(4) Wealth brings dangers.

(5) Some wealthy are good stewards.

(6) For others wealth is a curse.

(7) These gave liberally to God.

3. All the people gave.

(1) This is a greater work than raising much money.

(2) None refused; none excused.

(3) They only rejoiced who shared.

(4) The goal of stewardship is not money, but faithful servants of God.

II. THE SPIRIT IN WHICH THEY SHARED

1. Reverently (vv. 11-13)—

(1) Giving to God

(2) An experience of worship

(3) An occasion for praise

2. As duty: "All things *come* of thee, and of thine own have we given thee" (v. 14).

(1) The basic sin is putting self in God's place, as owner and controller of all.

(2) Our giving is in obedience to a command he has the right to give.

3. Out of love: "Because I have set my affection to the house of my God, . . . I have given" (v. 3).

(1) We love the Lord.

(2) We believe the church is his body.

(3) Love is spelled "g-i-v-e."

4. Willingly: "Then the people rejoiced, for that they offered willingly, because with perfect heart they offered willingly to the Lord" (v. 9).

5. Humbly: "Who am I . . . that we should be able to offer so willingly of this sort?" (v. 14).

(1) It would not be his temple.

(2) His name would not be on it.

(3) He gave magnificent gifts.

(4) And he counted it an undeserved honor.

6. Joyfully: "Then the people rejoiced, for that they offered willingly . . . and David the king also rejoiced with great joy" (v. 9).

Giving that does not bring joy to the heart of the giver will hardly bring joy to the heart of God.

7. This giving was symbolic of the giving of self. When only money is given to build a church, there is no use in building it. Every act in the service of the church is measured by the extent to which it represents giving self to God.

When self is truly given to God, the giving of material things follows inevitably.

The Dimensions of the Temple

2 Chronicles 2:5

THE SIZE OF OUR BUILDINGS is not all-important. But for the Temple, as earlier for the tabernacle, exact dimensions were prescribed.

I. IT IS DIFFICULT TO MEASURE A TEMPLE

1. Our membership statistics are not exact and may be meaningless. Perhaps we ought to weigh our members more, and count them less.

2. It is not easy to determine the size of building needed by any church.

3. So great care is needed.

II. BUT THE TEMPLE MEASUREMENTS WERE EXACT

1. Our childish questions—

(1) How many would it seat?

(2) Were the pews comfortable?

(3) What about the furnace?

(4) Answers: No pews, no furnace, no auditorium. The altar outside.

2. The building is described: 30 by 30 by 90 feet, inside measurements. Chambers around. Small windows high up. Porch at east end. Altar and columns, Jachin and Boaz.

3. We are told of courts. In the area were palace, harem, judgment hall, and temple court. Entire plot of 35 acres; 600 square feet in enclosures. Capacity was outdoors.

4. The plan variously referred to David's own mind, divine guidance, and architects.

III. OUR TEMPLE MEASUREMENTS IMPORTANT

1. Building shapes the program.

(1) Pulpit-centered sanctuary, acoustics, atmosphere, seating capacity for worship.

(2) Offices, study, library, for service.

(3) Educational facilities for Sunday school departments and classes.

(4) Training Union provision.

(5) Youth facilities.

(6) Fellowship for all—dining room—recreation.

(7) Music Ministry.

2. Building reflects the church.

(1) Their values.—What is important to them?

(2) Their vision.—Do they foresee growth and development?

(3) Their dedication.—How much are they willing to give and work?

IV. HOW TO MEASURE A TEMPLE

1. In keeping with what it is—

(1) Not a warehouse or parking space for storage of inanimate bulk.

(2) An operating room for the Great Physician, measured by his works in and through it.

(3) A classroom for the Great Teacher.

(4) A home, measured by love and lives of the children.

(5) A lighthouse, measured by its steady light and the safety of the ships.

2. A church is measured by its windows. How far and how broad is the view from it? Some would shut

windows, not see life around. The religion of the Bible sees whole world.

3. A church is measured by its doors. What goes out? Missionary volunteers, gifts, support? What do the people go out to do?

4. A church is measured by its ceiling. The significant dimension is upward. A college professor loved to walk in his garden. It was not wide, but it was a million miles high, as he walked under the stars. A church in which people meet God, worship him, are confronted by his will for their lives, is a big church.

So measured, your church ought to be the biggest house in your city.

Dedication of the Temple

2 Chronicles 5:6; 7

WHEN IT WAS COMPLETED, Solomon's Temple was dedicated for God's service. What they did and what they said can be helpful to us in thinking about the place of the house of worship in our lives.

I. WHO DEDICATED IT?

1. Solomon the king took the lead. He was a layman, rather than a priest; but as a leader of the nation and builder of the Temple, he led in setting it aside for worship.

2. All of the priests took part (5:11). The activity of the ordained ministers was central.

3. The musicians led in praise (5:12). This included both singers and instrumentalists. Music was important in Hebrew worship.

4. All of the people shared (7:4).

5. It was God who sanctified it (7:16). The house was important only because he approved it and chose it as a place to meet with the people.

II. WHAT DID THEY DO?

1. They placed the ark of the covenant in the new sanctuary. It contained the tablets of the law, and had been the center of their worship through the years. In the Temple they would worship the same God who had delivered them from Egypt, given the law through Moses, and led them to Canaan.

2. Led by the singers and instrumentalists, they praised God.

3. The king made a brief address and a dedicatory prayer.

4. They all made sacrifices to God.

5. They feasted for seven days before going home rejoicing.

III. WHAT SIGNIFICANCE DID THIS HAVE FOR THEM?

1. It did not mean that God was confined to the Temple, so that they would meet him nowhere else.

2. It was a place to worship the God whose eye would be on them in many places.

(1) In dealing with neighbors (6:22).

(2) In sunshine and rain (26).

(3) In unproductive fields (28).

(4) In sickness and sorrow (28 ff.).

(5) In time of war (34-35).

(6) In captivity (36-39).

3. Wherever they might pray, it would be toward Jerusalem and this

house, that is to the God of this place, rather than some other.

4. They were to meet God on his terms. Men prefer to meet God on their own terms, in a fishing boat or reading a Sunday paper with a glance at a television service. God says, "I have chosen a house. Meet me where I say."

5. When they strayed, and were rebuked, they were to seek restoration here (7:13-14).

IV. WHAT OF THE FUTURE OF THE HOUSE?

1. We might expect a promise that such a Temple would stand for ever.

2. Rather, there is a warning of a day when it would be desolate (7:21).

The whole nation being carried into captivity is seen as a possibility (6:36).

3. The future of the house depends upon the obedience and faithfulness of the people. If they obey faithfully, it will be a symbol of his glory. If they turn away, it will go down.

4. Even the neglected and ruined Temple would witness to the majesty of God, who judges a sinful people.

5. Yet, however heavy his hand might fall upon them in judgment, he would remain attentive to their repentant prayers. If they called to him in captivity, he would hear and restore them.

Much of the function of the Temple in Jerusalem is done away in Christ, but the deeper meaning remains valid for us as we gather to worship in his name.

● "Oh, God, help us today to insure a quality and a caliber of citizenship that would give us national leadership that would lead us to our knees. Only through repentance, through the grace of God shall this nation ever live under God."

"If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land" (2 Chron. 7:14).

BIBLE AND BIBLE STUDY HELPS

Old Testament Studies

Edward Bossenbroek (66b), \$3.50

This book is a contribution to the vast field of introductory works in Old Testament studies. Its contents and style reflect the thorough study, as well as the classroom procedure of its author. A statement on the jacket of the book declares it to be "an excellent book for use in Bible schools and institutes as a survey of the Old Testament, and in the Junior and Senior (Young People's) departments of the church school, and in midweek Bible schools and Vacation Bible schools as an introduction to the facts of Scripture."

The fact that the author of this book is a teacher of Bible in a Christian high school should enhance its worth for those who may be serving in like positions in a number of church related schools throughout the country. The maps, questions, conclusions, and suggestions for further study enhance its worth as a possible text for high school and academy Bible classes.—*Thomas J. The Old Testament Roots of Our Faith

Paul & Elizabeth Achtemeier (1a), \$3.00

The theme of this little book is that God's action in Jesus Christ is the fulfillment of

the events in the Old Testament. In order to understand Christianity, we must know "the Old Testament roots of our faith."

In six chapters the authors survey Old Testament history and text to show the development of the covenant concept and how it culminated in the Messiah, Jesus Christ.

It is a readable book, written for lay students of the Bible. Although it offers nothing new, it does bring together in brief scope God's unfolding purpose for his people. It is worth reading.—*Wilbur C. Lamm, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

The Old Testament Roots of Our Faith

Paul & Elizabeth Achtemeier (1a), \$3.00

The authors of *The Old Testament Roots of Our Faith* seek to present the Old Testament story as basic to our understanding of the New Testament. They present an excellent panoramic view of the history of the Old Testament.

The title could be a misnomer if one accepts the authors' view that Genesis 3-50 is composed of secular legends and myths. Other parts of the Old Testament seem to be presented as a compilation of traditions; writers and prophets are called editors. Such subtle suggestions could be a detriment to our faith rather than an encouragement. Many would disagree with the authors in the synonymous use of Israel and Christian Church.

This book might have an appeal for a trained student of the Word. There are other books more fundamental on this subject than the one being reviewed.—*Doyle L. Lumpkin, pastor, First Baptist Church, Sparkman, Arkansas.*

A Survey of the New Testament

W. W. Sloan (12p), \$4.75

Addressed to the needs of laymen and college undergraduates, this book has all the appeal of attractive literary style, but all the disadvantage of the liberal approach to Scripture. The writer is weak in regard to basic

Christian doctrine. The virgin birth, for example, is left without reference in the incarnation story, and the divine sonship of Jesus is vaguely discussed. We are told that there is "poetry and figure of speech" in the birth and childhood stories about Jesus and that baptism was probably performed by pouring water on the candidate. One also finds serious concessions to the Roman Catholic attitude toward Mary. In short, this is not a book to be recommended to laymen and college undergraduates—or to anyone else, for that matter.—*Donald F. Ackland, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

New Testament Commentary

H. C. Alleman (42m), \$5.00

Basically, the *New Testament Commentary* is a reliable and somewhat incisive one-volume commentary. However, since it is a product of Lutheran scholars, there are several instances in which their particular ecclesiastical commitment is evident. For example, we read, "Then, too, baptism is conferred upon little children, bestows upon them the forgiveness of sin, and marvelously begins the new life." Despite such defects as that just indicated, we can recommend this commentary as a valuable aid, particularly for Sunday school teachers and others who may be able to afford only a one-volume commentary on the New Testament. A valuable feature is the quite extensive treatment of introductory and background materials.—*Fred D. Howard, Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, Texas.*

The Old Testament: Its Formation and Development

Artur Weiser (18a), \$5.95

This book is the fourth revision of this monumental work of the European scholar Weiser. It is a critical and scholarly study of the text and canon of the Old Testament with a review of intertestamental literature and the Qumran findings.

Conservative students will not like Weiser's treatment of the Old Testament documents. He leans heavily on the higher form—critical studies of men like von Rad and Noth. He deals fairly with all major schools of modern research.

Weiser's book will not appeal to the average Bible student. It is too technical to be of interest to many besides professors and other adept biblical scholars.

Part IV, which treats the Apocrypha, Pseudepigrapha, and Qumran texts, is the most valuable section of the book.—*Wilbur C. Lamm, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Laymen's Bible Commentary (Micah-Malachi)

James H. Gailey, Jr. (5k), \$2.00

The seven minor prophets from Micah onward are usefully expounded in this volume of the Laymen's Bible Commentary. One would not know where to look for a more thorough exposition in such condensed form. Perhaps the author yields too readily to literary criticism in his acceptance of interjected "fragments" and editorial additions, but by and large, he renders good service in explaining these Old Testament books.—*Donald F. The Bible Is for You

Stuart E. Rosenberg (16l), \$3.75

This book seeks to make the Old Testament relevant to our lives. The author is a gifted rabbi who writes reverently and brilliantly to share insights that can be of rich value to Christians, as well as Jews. The book is divided into two sections made up of twelve chapters. The first part presents some insight into what the Hebrew Bible is. It seeks to interpret its meaning and outline the various basic translations and commentaries and how they developed. There are sections that deal with aids to the study of the Old Testament, its influence, and some of the insights of modern theology and psychology.

The second section of the book is entitled "Tales for Adults." Actually these chapters are unusual studies in the Old Testament. Any of these studies might well be worth the price of the book. This reviewer was especially impressed with the chapters entitled, "Fathers and Sons," and "The Failures of Success."

Rabbi Rosenberg believes the Bible is a continuing source of self-understanding for all believers. He sees it as a library of spiritual truth for adult minds. It becomes our Bible and we receive its truth when we enter into the experience about which it speaks. This is a book that will offer genuine stimulation to all thoughtful students of the Bible, and yet it is written in such a way as to be valuable to the average reader.—*J. The Beatitudes of Jesus

William Fitch (1e), \$3.00

Thesis: That the Beatitudes, contrary to the prevailing standards of both past and present, are pictures of the person whose life is "hid with Christ in God," one to whom true blessedness is given. The Beatitudes are the essence of Christianity and the gospel, even a picture of God himself. The Beatitudes are links in the golden chain or plateaus on man's pilgrimage from the inception of the Christian life to its consummation. The development of the author's thesis is logical with a composite summary in each chapter—well organized and thought-provoking. This book contains voluminous evidence of exhaustive research and clarity of presentation and solid biblical interpretation. This work will appeal to student and teacher alike, acceptable to Baptists in general. It will be of inestimable value to ones doing special research on the Beatitudes.—*Alfred T. Light for the Gentiles

Leland Jamison (8w), \$1.50

This is a study book concerning Paul and the spread of the gospel into the Roman Empire. The author begins, as does the book of Acts, in Jerusalem. He discusses the work of the Holy Spirit through the apostle Paul as the gospel is carried as far as Rome.

It is a small book of ninety-one pages and is very readable. It was written to help the ordinary layman understand this important period in Bible history. It reveals a thorough knowledge of the background of New Testament scholarship, and yet presents it in a very simple and understandable style.—*Fred M. The Twelve Speak, Volume 2

Derward W. Deere (68a), \$2.95

The author of this volume has been an active student of the Scriptures for over twenty years and has been teaching at the Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary since 1950. From the jacket of the book we quote, "Dr. Deere is the translator of the books of Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Jeremiah, and Psalms 116-134 for the Berkeley version of the Old Testament."

This second volume is the completion of the author's work in the translation of the minor prophets of the Old Testament. In addition to the translation from the original Hebrew text, Dr. Deere has included detailed footnotes providing historical and exegetical materials which are essential in correct interpretation and exposition.

Even though the book is Calvinistic, one who studies it will find a challenge for prayer, personal testimony, use of the Word of God, and even persuasion in his evangelistic efforts. Clovis G. Chappell (1a), \$2.50

The name Clovis G. Chappell on a book has come to mean a book of good reading, and this book will be no exception. In the Beginning

Jack Finegan (9h), \$3.50

The subtitle of this book, "A Journey Through Genesis," needs the qualifying information that it is an erratic journey with a few, selected stopping places, and not an exhaustive tour. The author only has time, in spite of the \$3.50 fare, to consider a few landmarks along the road.

His comments are always interesting and stimulating. Dr. Finegan couldn't be dry if he tried! But they are of mixed value—some placing us in real doubt, others raising serious questions, and a few provoking strong disagreement. His attitude to Genesis 1-11 is hard to determine. He describes it as containing "myth" and "legend," yet he goes to the trouble, by mathematical calculation, to prove that Methuselah was drowned in the flood. From Genesis 12 onward, he is more positive; and some of his pages on archaeological research make the book worthwhile.—Donald F. Ackland, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.

The Way of the Righteous

John W. Wevers (8w), \$1.50

This is one of the volumes in the series of *Westminster Guides to the Bible*. It is a splendid little book which contains ninety-six pages of material dealing with the Psalms, the book of Job, Ecclesiastes, Proverbs, and Song of Solomon. Naturally, one cannot do much detailed work in this limited space; but the author has summarized in an excellent way the central message of each of the books. He divides the psalms topically after a six-page introduction concerning Psalms in general. He discusses the psalms of complaint, confession, thanksgiving, trust, dedication, intercession, and adoration, giving on an average of about six pages to each discussion. This is an excellent book for the layman to use as a guide to Bible Study.—Fred M. Wood, pastor, Eudora Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee.

Luther's Meditations on the Gospels

Translated by Roland Bainton (8w), \$3.75

Judged by modern standards of exegesis, *Luther's Meditations on the Gospels* would rate comparatively inferior. For example,

Luther defends infant baptism on the ground that John the Baptist responded to the Holy Spirit by leaping in his mother's womb during the visit of Mary. He interprets the miracle of turning water into wine in terms of the wine representing the joys of marriage which only Christ can supply. In connection with the same occasion, he states that Jesus' apparent rebuke of Mary was an indication "that in matters of salvation, we are not to run to the Virgin Mary."

Despite his faulty interpretation at points, Luther is quite refreshing to read, and there is a boldness about him that is admirable. The context of his break with Rome is much apparent in this and his other writings, as he interprets many Scriptures in contrast with the doctrines of the Roman Catholic Church. The average reader will not appreciate this book greatly, but informed laymen and pastors should find it stimulating.—Fred D. Howard, Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, Texas.

The Roman Letter Today

A. Leonard Griffith (1a), \$1.00

This paperback book contains eight messages on the letter of Paul to the Romans. In these messages the author applies the teaching of this book to the problems of today. It is written in a simple style and deals with subjects of much interest in our day. Some of them are "A Text That Changed History," "Where Judgment Begins," "Peace with God," and "Liberated from Death."

The writer says, "We are studying the Roman letter, not with a view to scholarly exposition—others have done that more competently—but with a view to discovering its relevance for our own lives and our own time." And in this he has done a good job. Ministers will appreciate this work, and many of our laymen will profit greatly by it.—B. Mr. Guthrie gives a simple outline of each book that covers the main topic. There are more than 407 references used in this volume which clearly indicate the intensive study which was taken to compile this book. Black and white pictures have been enhanced by color overlay in the same shades of the maps. Some 30 maps cover the physical aspects of Bible lands, as well as eras from the time of the patriarchs through New Testament times, and then today's geographical and political divisions. This is a colorful, handy book—a good study companion for teacher and pupil—at a reasonable price. Scholarly study is involved; these are presented; conclusions are drawn based on evidence. Photos cover areas of Sinai, Kadesh-barnea, and Jeziret Fara'um in the stark splendor of the desolate ranges and plateaus, as well as the huge sweep of the breathtakingly beautiful coast.—*W. M. It contains twenty-four full-colored maps which have been prepared by George Philips and Son. The Significance of Barth's Theology

Fred H. Klooster (66b), \$2.95

The author is a theologian and presents in this book a review of his firsthand observations of Karl Barth and the influence he has had on contemporary theology. The author spent a year in Basel, Switzerland, and had almost daily association with Barth.

The book is divided in three sections. The first deals with the over-all significance of Barth's theology on the theological thinking of our day. The last two chapters deal with an evaluation of Barth's theology on two subjects—election and reconciliation.

Author Klooster rejects the position of Karl Barth primarily on Barth's rejection of the authority of the Scriptures and his departure from the simplicity and glory of the gospel.

An objective view of Barthian theology is that it has not brought strong churches or enthusiastic Christian witnesses. The author's conclusion for this is that the unbiblical character of the theology has left the church in a lethargic situation.

Christ and the Powers

Louis Berkhof (33h), \$1.25

European theologians appear to have a tremendous ability to deal with difficult and controversial ideas in meaningful ways. This book certainly supports this contention. And while some of his conclusions may not be "orthodox" according to some of our traditional interpretations, nevertheless, he points up in many graphic ways the reality of the struggle between the forces of light and the forces of darkness. The Virgin Birth

Thomas Boslooper (8w), \$6.00

The author traces the idea and interpretation of the virgin birth of Christ from its beginning in primitive Christianity to its culmination in Mariolatry and through the centuries to modern times. He finds that men have variously judged the idea of the virgin birth as irrelevant, illogical, impossible, inescapable, borrowed, or mythical. He points out that many theologians have been tempted to approach the question of the virgin birth from presuppositions which determine the conclusion in advance.

After a very comprehensive discussion, the author concludes that the doctrine of the virgin birth not only can, but should, remain a part of the Christian faith. His discussion of the theological meaning of the virgin birth is one of his best contributions. In an age when scientific and rationalistic skepticism, along with radical biblical criticism, appears to threaten or deny various doctrines of the church, here is a welcome discussion. Election and Reprobation

James Henly Thornwell (66b), \$1.00

To comment on a tract that was written in 1870 would be difficult if it were not for the Barthian and liberal strange and harsh

Paul's calling is vividly told in a very stirring and very appropriate manner, for Paul himself was stirring in his ministry and very appropriate and stern in his own manner. It is amazing that this Jewish scholar can write so well about a man whose gospel message he does not accept.

Who Was Jesus?

John T. Theodore (19e), \$4.00

After a very brief summary of New Testament criticism, the author gives his answer to the title of the book, *Who Was Jesus?* In his presentation he denies the virgin birth; holds that Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Galilee; comes to the conclusion "that most of the words in the Synoptic Gospels do not suggest any other office for Jesus but that of a prophet and a teacher"; denies the historicity of the miracles; and says "it seems to be evident that the details of Jesus' betrayal, trial, and crucifixion must fall outside the realm of history."

The author served as a pastor for sixty years, and in his book gives evidences of a compassion for people and a love for one he calls "the historic Jesus." The book has value in that it helps to explain to the more tradi-

tional Christian how a person who rejects the traditional positions can still serve in a church. Recommendation of the book should be restricted.—*Arthur L. Walker, Jr., associate professor, Howard College, Birmingham, Alabama.*

Life After Death

T. A. Kantonen (42m), \$1.00

Dr. Kantonen calls upon all the eschatological knowledge he has to give the best answer to the question: "Does the God who gave me my present life which ends in death offer me the hope of life after death?" This little volume is an excellent treatment on the subject of life after death. Such questions as "What is Life?" "What is death?" "Is there life after death?" are brilliantly answered. It is so compact, yet so biblically based and so doctrinally sound. As Dr. Kantonen says, the answers to these questions may be sought in biology, or psychology, or philosophy; but they are best found in God's Word.

Redemption Accomplished and Applied

John Murray (1e), \$1.50

The author shows the centrality of the atonement in our Christian faith. The author's position would be accepted by many Baptists, but there are some few interpretations which should be questioned. He gives more emphasis to predestination and the idea of a limited atonement than most Baptists will accept. One of the most serious questions is his interpretation of regeneration. If I understand the author correctly, he makes regeneration a prerequisite to faith, and makes faith a prerequisite to justification, as though one could be regenerated without being justified.

The book has many fresh and scholarly interpretations; although, generally, it is quite conservative. The author is rather definite and positive in the expression of his ideas. He exalts some of the very fundamental doctrines of our faith. Ministers of the gospel in particular will profit by a study of this book.—*J. Redemption Accomplished and Applied

John Murray (1e), \$1.50

The author undertakes to state the scriptural meaning of redemption in a clear and concise manner. This is done from the conservation point of view, and in a scholarly way. He treats his subject under two main divisions: I. Redemption Accomplished, and II. Redemption Applied. There are five brief chapters under Redemption Accomplished: "The Necessity," "The Nature," "The Perfection," "The Extent of the Atonement," and "Conclusion." Redemption Applied has ten brief chapters dealing with such subjects as "Regeneration," "Faith and Repentance," "Justification," "Adoption," and "Sanctification."

This material was published in the Presbyterian *Guardian* in 1954. I think the author has done a very fine job in a limited scope. I should have liked for him to have elaborated more on some of his ideas. I would like a fuller treatment of doctrine of "Limited Atonement" and his position of regeneration coming before faith. His faith in the Scriptures and familiarity with them is heartwarming. Much of the material in this book may well be used as a basis for sermons on the great Christian doctrines.—*R. The Creed in Christian Teaching

James D. Smart (8w), \$4.50

Dr. Smart has written a fresh interpretation of theology based on the Apostles' Creed which would be of interest to all Bible teachers, as well as ministers. He has done a remarkable job. The content is presented in such a readable fashion that it is hard to lay the book down once it is taken up. It is a fresh approach. Most of the content could be acceptable to Baptists, although we must differ on some points. For example, the author is quite insistent on a sound acceptance of most plain Bible doctrine but holds that the virgin birth may be a myth.

There is so much good in the book that I think all should study it and accept what

is good. I received a great blessing from studying this book. It is fresh and new, and this is almost impossible in a day when so many books are published. Sunday school teachers will especially enjoy this study if they keep in mind that they will not agree with every point in the theology of this book.—*Vaughn M. The Universe: Plan or Accident?

Robert E. D. Clark (42m), \$2.40

The basic problem faced in relating modern science to Christianity is reconciling certain scientific theories with the evidence in the universe for divine creation. Dr. Clark, who has written several other excellent volumes in this same problem area and dealing with this same particular approach, approaches the question of divine creation from a number of differing scientific disciplines.

In demonstrating the support scientific findings give to the biblical divine creation, Dr. Clark gives much comfort to the high school or college young person who has fallen victim to the "scientific" atheism which is so much a part of our educational system. This volume has only one drawback—originally printed in Great Britain, it deals with British scientists and their writing, which may put its arguments out of the context of some American young persons.—*Belden Menkus, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

An Encyclopedia on the Evidences

J. W. Monser (66b), \$4.95

Here is a compilation of rich thought from history's outstanding thinkers on some of the topics of life that shall ever demand man's keenest analysis. The editor has gathered quotes and brief discourses from philosophers, scientists, educators, politicians, theologians, and others through the ages such as: Augustine, Aristotle, Arnold, Bacon, Beecher, Bushnell, Byron, Cicero, Clay, Conybeare and Howson, Cowper, Darwin, Descartes, Franklin, Hegel, Heraclitus, Horne, Hugo, Irenaeus, Ingersoll, Jefferson, Jorvett, Locke, Longfellow, Macauley, Melancthon, Napoleon, Niebur, Origen, Pliny, Socrates, Taylor, Trench, Watts, Westcott, and nearly three hundred others.

Their thinking is shared on such subjects as God, creation, moral evil, man, the Bible, Christ, immortality, retribution, and others. The editor has brought together this wealth of thought to show that the ages all give positive "evidence" to the validity of God's revelation to men. The reader will not agree with every view, but he shall find this worthwhile source of reference and stimulating thought.—*Gene E. Moffatt, pastor, Greenbrier, Tennessee.*

PHILOSOPHY

The Philosophy of Judaism

Zvi Cahn (9m), \$7.50

The author is a member of the staff of *The Jewish Daily Forward* of New York. From a technical or scholarly standpoint, there are probably better treatments of this subject; but I doubt that there are any more readable. (Quite frankly, I wish that writings in doctrine and church history could be as readable as this volume is.)

The author views Judaism as a changing and dynamic thing, rather than a static set of principles. He considers it to be a philosophy rather than a theology because it does not exist to perpetuate doctrinal principles, but is a climate in which principles may be studied, interpreted, and personally applied. I doubt that he is aware of it, but the author shows much of the influence of the Reconstructionist movement.—*Belden Menkus, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Religion, Reason and Revelation

Gordon H. Clark (66b), \$3.75

The author starts with the assumption that the Westminster Confession is an authoritative statement of Christianity, and that it provides a definition and a solution of the problem of Christian conversion as raised by humanism. He makes a strong plea for consistency in the use of terms when defining man's religious experiences. He deals very courageously and forcefully with the inconsistencies of the many philosophies which attack the biblical view of faith and reason and the inspiration of the Scriptures. He shows that no consistent morality can be developed apart from revelation from God. Probably the weakest chapter of the book is the one on "God and Evil."

This book will be helpful in getting a broad view of current philosophies in their relationship to biblical thought. The advanced theological student and pastor will have their intellectual curiosity challenged and stimulated.—*Billy P. Smith, associate professor, Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas.*

Religion, Reason and Revelation

Gordon H. Clark (66b), \$3.75

This book is a potent contribution in the field of philosophy and theology by the head of the department of philosophy at Butler University. The volume is one in a series forming the International Library of Philosophy and Theology.

Perhaps the heart of the book is the chapter on "Faith and Reason," which the author discusses under four easily remembered sub-headings: Reason and Faith—natural theology and the Roman Catholic view; Reason Without Faith—rationalism and modern philosophy from Descartes to Hegel; Faith Without Reason—the constructive Christian view of faith and reason as complementary rather than incompatible, a plea for a sane intellectualism. It is the author's conviction that "reason apart from revelation has come to grief. The only remaining possibility of escaping revelation now is to abandon reason." Sermon Outlines on the Letter to the Churches

Jeff D. Brown (66b), \$1.00

Philippians, Thessalonians, Colossians

This is a series of sermon outlines on outstanding texts in the Epistles to the Romans, Corinthians, Galatians, and Ephesians. It follows the author's first series on the Gospels and Acts.

They are brief, succinct outlines, evangelically orthodox and scriptural. They are timely and can serve as good "starters" for busy pastors. They are skeleton outlines upon which the preacher may put "meat" and substance. Covering only one page, and leav-

ing the back of each page blank, the room is left for each preacher's personal notes as he builds upon these skeletons.

One could wish that the author had used more great texts from the separate books covered rather than use fewer texts and cover more books of the Bible. However, there are fifty-two sermons in this booklet. The book is worth its price.—*Wendell H. Rone, pastor, Bellevue Baptist Church, Owensboro, Kentucky.*

Sermon Outlines on Romans

Michael Daves (6r), \$1.00

Sermon Outlines on Romans is a collection of outlines for sixty-one messages from as many verses or parts of verses. The outlines reveal, on the whole, a fairly good interpretation of the verses used, though it could not be called a commentary, of course.

The author seemed to take a great deal of liberty as to the interpretation of some of the texts. He does not use or refer to other passages on the subject under consideration except in very few instances. Parts of some outlines seem rather shallow.

The little book is thought-provoking and can be used in saving time as one prepares hurriedly for a message. I cannot agree to his use of the term "Fatherhood of God" referring to all men and speaking of spiritual relations. Nor do I agree to his calling the Lord's Supper a sacrament.—*F. W. Sermon Outlines on Favorite Bible Chapters

Faris Daniel Whitesell (6r), \$1.00

About sixty chapters of the Bible are outlined in easily understood outlines. The verses seem to fall logically into place for this author, as he selects a chapter subject and proceeds to break the chapter into its divisions. He makes good use of alliteration. There are no illustrations and no applications; only the presentation of the biblical material of the chapter in outline form is given.

This would make a good basis for a chapter-by-chapter study of the Bible. A subject index is included, as well as a table of contents.—*Cooper Waters, pastor, Orange, Texas.*

Sermon Outlines on Favorite Bible Chapters

Faris Daniel Whitesell (6r), \$1.00

For those who preach, this book will prove to be a valuable aid. Not all preachers attempt to use a full Bible chapter for a sermon. This could encourage them to try it out. The outlines are, of course, not exhaustive; nor should they be. Explanatory and illustrative material must be added.

If there is a weakness in this little book, it will be in the subheads. But lack of meat here may be intentional, so as to keep the preacher from making a "crutch" out of the book. The main headings are excellent. Some are alliterative, and some are not. There is consistency in the number of words in the outlines, which is desirable and makes them easy to memorize. For example, the outline of Romans 5 is I. The Reign of Justification, II. The Reign of Death, and III. The Reign of Grace. The author has been a master homiletician for years, and is one of our beloved teachers of preachers, serving at the Northern Baptist Theological Seminary. These outlines will preach!—C. Outlines for Evangelistic Sermons

Billy Apostolon (66b), \$1.00

Fifty topical and expository sermon outlines designed "to help the young minister, the busy minister, and ministers everywhere rekindle the spirit of evangelism within their own heart and cause evangelism to spread among their congregation for the salvation of precious souls" There seems to be no organizational patterns followed. Outlines for Evangelistic Sermons

Billy Apostolon (66b), \$1.00

This is a very good collection of evangelistic sermon outlines. The outlines are simple but logical for the most part. Most of them are built on a subject with a text. The outline rarely comes out of the text. But most every point is backed up with an appropriate

Scripture passage. The outlines do exalt Christ and magnify the Bible. In my opinion most of the outlines are too long. Some of them have seven points with several subdivisions. The one on hell has nineteen points. The outline on "Come" is typical: I. Come and Reason, II. Come and Take, III. Come and Dine, Drink, Rest, etc. for seven points each with three subpoints. One of the better outlines is "Grace for the Sinner." The outline: The Crime of the Sinner, The Grace of the Saviour, The Growth of the Saved, and The Guidance of the Spirit.

The book might prove helpful for lay-preachers or those with very limited training. It might be used of God to help any preacher see the importance of seeing that his sermon makes use of the inspired Word of God.—R. Ray Stone, pastor, Waverly Place Baptist Church, Roanoke, Virginia.

My Sermon Notes on Salvation

William P. Van Wyk (66b), \$1.00

This is a collection of sermon notes, based on 1 Peter. It is sort of key-word-by-key-word devotional study of the epistle, beamed to his own congregation, in much the same form he used them in sermons. They were published posthumously, with little editing. There are sixteen of them, covering seventy-four pages. The "notes" apply more to the Christian life than they do to salvation, per se. Being a minister of the Christian Reformed Church, logically his points of doctrine follow the pattern of that faith. The little booklet will not likely be too widely accepted.—H. H. Funeral Sermons

Al Bryant (1z), \$.50

Here are brief sermon outlines dealing with death, heaven, sorrow and consolation, resurrection, and a catchall section marked "Miscellaneous." They are basically sound scripturally, though this is subject matter about which we have only limited biblical information. For this reason, some readers may disagree with the included interpretations at some few points.

The approach is positive, toward the overall view that death for the Christian should be met victoriously. However, there seems to

be nothing unique nor really fresh in this collection of outlines that would stimulate much new thinking. Many of the outlines are too sketchy to be of any real value.

This is a work that might be used by those who lean heavily on the originality of others. One brief survey seems sufficient. It is unlikely that many ministers would turn to it a second time.—*Gene E. Moffatt, pastor, Greenbrier, Tennessee.*

Sermon Outlines for Soul-Winning

Jack R. Whitesell (6r), \$1.00

This is a book of suggested sermon outlines on the topic of evangelism. In the fifty-six outlines presented, there is enough stimulation for preachers and others who present messages on evangelism that the price of the book would be considered well spent.

Besides the old standby texts for evangelism, there are some new approaches. Some of the outlines are labored, some too involved, many are rather brief, and a great number are just right, veritable jewels of exposition of presentation of a topic.

There are very definite preaching values here on the subject of the necessity of soul-winning. It approaches as closely as any book of sermon outlines or sermons the actual "how" of soul-winning, but doesn't quite make it, as the others also fail. This "how" approach and presentation will have to be the subject of a different kind of book. All-in-all, the book is very inspiring in places, and worth the small price.—*W. B. This is a book made up of expository and topical outlines dealing with evangelism. Each outline is the development of one major truth basic to evangelism. These simple outlines should suggest preaching possibilities to the minister and be of help to him as he endeavors to lead his people in this all-important task of winning men to Christ. His thinking is sound, and his

Characteristics of Jesus

W. McFerrin Stowe (1a), \$2.50

Throughout the book, one is very conscious that each of the chapters was written to be preached. Taken as a whole, no one of the sermons is especially strong. The theology is not profound. It is difficult to see how some of the texts and titles are related to what is said in the sermon. Homiletically there is much to be desired. There is much about the book which is excellent. There is hardly a

sermon which does not have at least one statement which reveals understanding of man and his need. The illustrative material is fresh and well used. There are numerous single ideas and paragraphs which must be described as exciting. An example of this is the statement about life. ". . . a child's laughter while playing, the pages of a book being turned, the hammers ringing on nails are the symbol of all life's meaning. The incomplete struggling the completion—that is the meaning of life."

PSYCHOLOGY, COUNSELING, AND THE PASTORAL MINISTRY

Psychology of Motivation

John Fry Hall (12L), \$6.50

The study of motivation is a relatively recent pursuit of psychologists. Dr. Hall, professor of psychology at Pennsylvania State University, gives up-to-date information in this textbook. He gives a brief historical outline, then deals with contemporary research in the field.

This book consists largely of details of experiments, both with animals and human beings, concerning the psychology and physiology of motivation. It would probably interest only the serious student in the field or one who has a background in psychology.—*Gomer R. Lesch, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Art and Skill of Getting Along with People

Sylvanus M. Duvall, Ph.D. (20p), \$4.95

This book is in the tradition of "How to Win Friends and Influence People." The author takes the theme of good relations with others and develops popular appeal but, like many other books, it is an oversimplification of the problem. He uses such frameworks as: "Four ways you will gain by self-acceptance"

and "Four principles for dealing with irrationality in others." Enough studies are cited to make the book appear to be based on good, factual material. The appearance is more surface manifestation than the real thing. However, there is enough acceptable material to give the book a limited usefulness. It should not be stressed as a content book.—*G. Learning, Remembering and Knowing

Patrick Meredith (18a), \$3.50

This is a 174-page book in educational psychology. The average reader will put the book aside after a few pages. It will capture the interest of most educators and psychologists and a few people who conscientiously want to improve their learning ability.

The author seeks to help the reader to develop his own power of learning through the ability to know and remember what he reads. He offers a series of steps which might be employed to help. It is shown how a person unwittingly hinders his own learning processes. Simon Doniger, Editor (9h), \$6.00

Simon Doniger, the founding editor of *Pastoral Psychology*, has selected several articles on the nature of man from the above publication and supplemented them with articles from other journals to form this volume. Without failure he presents an unbiased and more nearly complete and fair picture of the various concepts of the nature of man from the theological and psychological points of view. In this dialogue on the "Nature of Man," there is presented some basic differences, yet some striking and significant similarities of thought.

The compilation of thoughts on the "Views of the Nature of Man," "The Good and Evil in Man," and "Man's Problems and Potentialities" supplies stimulating material for the

mind of the minister and student of theology and psychology. To anyone who is vitally interested in the human personality, this volume presents a wealth of material.—*Ray Fowler, pastor, Springfield, Tennessee.*

Your God Is Too Small

J. B. Phillips (9m), \$1.10

Dr. Phillips is famous for his readable translations of the New Testament. This book will add to that fame as he seeks to deal with the truths of our existence on this planet (and beyond) so as to meet the facts of our situation and the deep needs of the human spirit. He feels our conception of God can never be too big. Every gain in human knowledge from any and all sources will enlarge our understanding of God's vast and complicated wisdom. It is when we accept Jesus Christ as God's own planned focus of himself that we begin to get a clearer picture. It is here we find satisfactory and comprehensive answers to many problems and a reasonable "shelf" on which the unsolved perplexities may be left with confidence. Our "way in" to this faith is, in part, intellectual and yet a matter of moral commitment. Dr. Phillips sees the world's sickness as love wrongly directed. The sins or results of this misdirection are seen in what we call "sin" or "selfishness." The conversion which Jesus called for is the reversal of the wrong attitudes. The man in Christ comes to know a God with a quality of living, which physical death is powerless to touch. He sees the role of the church as the spearhead which cannot fail ultimately any more than God can cease to exist.

Counseling for Ministers

William H. Mikesell (12c), \$4.00

Theme: The minister can expand his ministry through the art of personal counseling. Aim: To present counseling as a door of wider opportunity for more effective service—to encourage ministers to study the techniques of counseling. Introductory in nature: The

author deals broadly with the areas of (1) Diagnosis—showing the need for counseling and at least three general methods of approach; (2) Frustration—its nature, its results, and some defenses; (3) Details of critical defenses—showing nature and futility; (4) Therapy—proposing Christianity as the best means for personality development. The writing is clear and nontechnical. Weakness of the work is in its scope.

The author is only able to suggest numerous factors involved in counseling without developing any of them to a conclusive degree. The weakest aspect is in not adequately correlating psychological methods to the Christian faith. While setting forth Christianity as the ultimate answer, the author fails to interweave its facets into the methods and approaches used in counseling.

While this volume does not propose to answer all the questions, it does seek to stimulate interest and encourage further study in this field. I feel it perhaps would have its strongest appeal to ministers who are just awaking to the ministry of personal counseling, and who have as yet made no extensive study in this area.—*Gene E. Marriage, the Family and the Bible

Henry E. White, Jr. (12c), \$2.50

Henry White is pastor of the Palmyra Baptist Church, Palmyra, Alabama. He writes as a pastor and conveys his pastoral concern for the families in his church throughout the book. Pastor White was motivated to write this book because of the need for a small, yet carefully put, statement of the biblical teachings on marriage and family. He faced constant need for such a resource in his own pastoral ministry; and not finding a satisfactory resource elsewhere, he set out to produce it himself.

The book deals in a clear, forthright, and commendable way on such themes as "The Meaning of Marriage," "The Purpose of Marriage," "The Bases of Marriage," "The Holiness of the Sexual Union," "Monogamy," "The Will of God," "Divorce and Remarriage," "The Family Subordinate to the Kingdom," and others. Some will not agree with all of the

convictions which he sets forth. Most pastors, however, will find this is a useful resource in their pastoral ministry to families in their beginnings as well as in their expanding stages.—*Ellis M. Bush, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

The Preacher's Portrait

John R. W. Stott (1e), \$3.00

The author seeks to reveal God's ideals concerning what the God-called preacher is and how he should do his work. Such subjects as the "preacher's proclamation and appeal, the preacher's message and authority, the preacher's experience and humility, the preacher's love and gentleness, and the preacher's power and motive" are all graphically covered. It is a book that gets next to you. It will convict, humble, and yet also bless any God-called preacher whose conscience is prompted by the Holy Spirit.

The call of God to preach God's Word is placed on a no uncertain, high plane; and the preacher himself is shown to be a nothing whom God has chosen to preach something; and at the same time, to be that something he tries to preach. He plainly shows that the being, preaching, and living what God requires come from God himself through surrender to him. I have nothing but praise for the book! The book should be on the required reading list of every Bible school, college, and seminary; and preachers should read it the first few weeks of school. This book should be placed in the hands of every man being ordained as a preacher and should be read before ordination. The book is most biblical, yet nondenominational. I shall reread it often.—*T. The book contains: "The Medium of the Press" by Hiley H. Ward, "Free-Lance Writing: Your Opportunity" by Webb B. Garrison, "So You Want to Write a Book" by Frank

S. Mead, "Public Relations in your Community" by James L. Christensen, and "Broadcasting Religion" by Clifton E. Moore. The work may prove helpful to pastors, professors of practical theology or pastoral care, and ministerial students. Although other materials are available on these subjects, this work offers fresh practical advice from experienced men in one volume. The work will not likely be objectionable to Baptists.—*Thomas J. In successive chapters he deals with the theology of preaching, the qualities (theological) which make the sermon a part of God's plan of redemption, the complexity and glory of the pastorate, pastoral preaching and the fulfilment of persons, the social responsibility of the pulpit, and the minister as a maturing person. Creative insights in the book include: (1) The minister's significance and calling are found in relation to the nature of God, especially to God's revelation; (2) A part of the function of preaching is to find the words in our culture which will translate truth to those "who are outside looking in"; (3) The pastorate has always been complex, but in this complexity the preacher can develop the "scholarship of involvement"; (4) The social responsibility of the pulpit is inescapable, but the ground of social preaching is man's relation to God. The book is outstanding. One may not fully understand some of its emphasis on preaching as *The Deed*, but no one will fail to recognize it as a masterful treatment of preaching from a pastoral perspective.—*Gordon Clinard, professor, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.*

Preaching During a Revolution

C. Ray Jordan (45w), \$3.50

This is not just "another book" on preaching. For the experienced preacher, as well as the beginner, this book will be helpful. The author-preacher, as well as teacher, in fifteen wisely and clearly planned chapters,

helps the reader examine carefully the glorious privilege of being a preacher of the gospel. Not only does the writer illustrate his purposes with well-chosen illustrations from history, biography, personal experiences, and applicable poetry; but by the treatment of texts from both the Old and New Testament, he shows how human individual needs can be met. This volume is filled with a critical analysis of the preacher's task. Encouragement for him to be the instrument in the hands of God to bless this generation is forcefully emphasized. Pentecost and Missions

Harry R. Boer (1e), \$5.00

Harry R. Boer's book *Pentecost and Missions* originally appeared as a doctor's thesis entitled "Pentecost and the Missionary Witness of the Church." The dissertation was written for the Department of Missions of the Free University, Amsterdam. May I add here that, although Mr. Boer indicates in the preface that he reworked this study for the book form, it has the drawback of most theses. For the general reader, at least, it is too wordy. In this respect it would have made for smoother and easier reading had the author combined some of his many "proofs" into a few representative ones.

Mr. Boer's theme is the thing that makes his book interesting and enlightening. He points out that missions did not begin with the Great Commission, but actually with the Holy Spirit dealing with the church. His prime illustration is the Holy Spirit's use of Peter in the conversion of Cornelius. He points out that the early Christians had no missionary vision until the Spirit revealed the task to them. Therein lies the power to keep the Great Commission. This is an excellent book for the increasing of one's insight into missions and mission methods. I recommend it heartily.—*W. Barriers and Bridges to Brotherhood

Haskell M. Miller (1a), \$3.50

Barriers and Bridges to Brotherhood is the appropriate title of another provocative book by Haskell Miller. It is a fresh and cogent treatment of current phases of social and religious conflicts. It is a book that is scientific in method and content, but written in simple style and language. The author does not preach; he teaches. A hasty reading of this treatise will not suffice. It will require close application and study by the layman, but he will be amply repaid for the time and work he puts into it.

The author presents his material within the brief scope of 192 pages arranged in five chapters. In his first chapter, he discusses some of the facts and principles involved in the solution of intergroup problems. In his three following chapters, he discusses race relations, social class problems, and religious group problems. His fifth and final chapter deals with a very helpful and practical discussion of the principles and techniques in meeting these current and challenging problems.—*A. C. Japan's Religious Ferment

Raymond Hammer (5-o), \$2.95

This book is one in a series of *Christian Presence* books which also includes volumes on Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism. This particular volume is concise, but covers the entire history of religion in Japan. Each of the religions is traced from its beginning with special emphasis being given to present conditions.

The last half of the book is devoted to the crises brought about in religion in Japan at the close of World War II. Considerable space is devoted to the new religions which have developed.

Material found in two appendices giving statistics on religions in Japan and a brief history of religion-state relationships, along with a word list and a short book list, is as valuable as the text itself.

This volume would not be popular reading for the average layman, but should be of great value to one interested in contemporary comparative religion. There is good docu-

Sergeant Chung Ming

Hans Maeter (15d), \$4.50

This is a book written against a background of Communist China. You must have a strong stomach to take it. I have spot-read it and from what I have read, I would not recommend it. I think we ought to feel keenly what Red China does, and this novel might make us realize it, but I do not believe I can recommend it.—*Mary Christian, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

A Vital Encounter

F. Ernest Johnson (1a), \$2.25

I cannot recommend this book. It is not that it is a bad book; it is simply that it is not a good book. Others have dealt with this question far better. This book is not clear. It is not concise. And it is not practical nor realistic. It is the concluding part of a two-part study of the subject under the sponsorship of the Methodist Board of Social Concerns. If it were not for the present rash of books in this general subject area, it would probably have been issued in the same comparative obscurity as the first study.

The basic defects of the book are many. Principally, the author does not consider Christianity as the unique revelation of God. Rather, he seems to consider it a particular philosophical system preferably because of its identity with Western values. He sees it as meeting communism as equals. He does not see the hand of God in the survival of Christianity, but is concerned with organizing to protect the system instead. But, of course, this is understandable in the light of his long-time connection with the Federal Council.—*Belden Menkus, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Challenge and Response in the City

Walter Kloetzli (20a), \$2.00

Walter Kloetzli, in approximately 150 pages, has edited a stimulating series of papers, reports, and group discussions. The contents center around a theological consultation on the urban church situation in which theo-

logical and sociological lectures were delivered. Depth probing by the group participating brings to light theological implications, sociological insights, and practical concern relative to the urban church.

While not written by a Baptist for Baptists, its pages convey areas of interest that confront a Baptist church in consideration of the urban church. The system of procedure and response for lectures, reactors, group leaders, and recorders may well serve as a basis for any group interested in considering the responsibility of a church or denomination in studying the urban area.—*L. Challenge and Response in the City

Walter Kloetzli (20a), \$2.00

One sentence in the foreword of Walter Kloetzli's *Challenge and Response in the City* explains the heart of the book. It states: "Only as the church is willing to face realistically the challenges and the perplexities of the city and her own inadequacies will she discover the hard, lonely road of obedience and response in her mission to urban man. For this mission, only God's grace is sufficient."

A collection of papers given in the 1961 Home Missions Conference of the National Lutheran Council pinpoints some of the problems facing urban churches.

Capital Punishment

James Avery Joyce (5n), \$5.00

Capital Punishment by James Avery Joyce is an emotional appeal for the abolition of capital punishment. It does not purport to be a detailed account of the historical development of capital punishment. It is an extremely biased conglomeration of arguments against this practice. The author, said by the front jacket blurb to be "an international lawyer and sociologist," and by the back jacket blurb to be "an international lawyer, economist, and author," undertakes to make

a survey of the historical and present-day practices of capital punishment. He includes a considerable amount of background material which will be helpful to the increasingly large number who are concerned about the problem of the legal taking of life.

His most helpful chapter is the "United States Against Itself," in which he presents a great deal of useful information concerning capital punishment. One of his recurring themes is the notion that war and capital punishment have a common motivation. The book is not objective enough to be recommended to the general reader, but will be of value to those especially interested in its significant subject. Where the States Stand on Civil Rights

Richard Barnett (78s), \$2.95

This book is a concise listing in readable fashion, state by state, of the facts concerning this serious internal problem in the United States. No attempt is made to explain or evaluate. The material is presented in outline form for ready reference. This book should be in every church and public library, and in the personal library of leaders and laymen who try to keep up to date in this field. While changes within the states are transpiring rapidly, any quotations from this book would need confirmation by current legislative documents.—*Miriam J. The Sacred Journey

Ahmad Kamal (16-L), \$6.00

For a Moslem taking a pilgrimage to Mecca or for one making a detailed study of Islam, this book would make interesting and helpful reading. However, for the average reader, there would be little appeal in the book. The format is excellent, and the eye appeal interesting. Explanations of the preparations and requirements for the Moslem pilgrimage are interspersed with quotations from the Koran, to be used in the various steps of the sacred journey.

The latter half of the volume is written in Arabic which is fascinating to thumb through, but would be of little value to

the average reader. This volume would be valuable for those wanting a profound knowledge of Islam, but it will probably not be found in the average library.—*Helen E. Falls, missions professor, New Orleans Baptist Seminary, New Orleans, Louisiana.*

Africa—Angry Young Giant

Smith Hempstone (58p), \$7.95

The author deals with the emergent African states south of the Sahara and north of the Congo, which he calls New Africa. The area includes twenty-six countries. In this area is taking place the great experiment of African freedom. In 1955 there were two independent nations—Liberia and Ethiopia. In the following five year period, nineteen new nations were born. Birth and youth bring problems to nations as to individuals. Africa today is a continent where old age is the exception rather than the rule—young men in places of leadership in young nations. The book presents each country giving details of history, geography, leadership, and potential.

Although the New Africa will make its own decisions, it will inevitably be influenced by the attitudes of the former masters and present friends. Africa is intoxicated with the wine of self-government. She is alive, not stagnant—a continent on the move. A new synthesis is in the making, and something new in political organization is about to emerge—an "Afrocratic" system which utilizes the form, but not the substance of democracy. We may not understand this new Africa, but we ignore her at our peril.—*Edwina Robinson, executive secretary, Woman's Missionary Union, Jackson, Mississippi.*

Hurricane from China

Denis Warner (9m), \$3.95

This is a factual study about Red China which should be read by every person who wants to know what is happening there and why its hate is directed at America. The author, an Australian journalist, sees China as important because of its tremendous population (over a billion by 1980) and because of its fanatical dedication to revolutionary communism.

He believes Russia has moved away from the revolutionary phase, leaving China as the most dangerous aggressor in the contemporary

picture. He shows how Mao believes the principles he applied against Chiang Kai-shek may be applied with equal success in Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The outworking of this has already been seen in Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Korea, and other Asian countries. There is good insight on the history of China's revolution, from early guerrilla phase to the complete elimination of nearly seven hundred million people. Now there is every prospect that China will succeed in exporting this revolution to distant areas of the world.—*Ross Coggin, Christian Life Commission, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Certainties for Uncertain Times

John Sutherland Bonnell (9h), \$3.00

The author picks up first one then another of the problems that affect us and deals with them in the light of both Bible and modern history. The thesis is not developed in the form of a story. Each chapter deals with a subject all its own, but there is a thread of a fear of God and our utter dependence upon him that winds its way throughout the book. The author is extremely up to date on national and international affairs. He treats controversial issues with abandon and takes sides confidently. He favors the ecumenical movement and predicts that a great united, co-operative church will be operating in mission fields all around the globe within a quarter of a century. He believes the church should be concerned with social issues; that there is an alarming possibility that the greatest weakness today in America is the lack of a national purpose; that the faith which is embodied in the Bible is "the sovereign remedy for fear."

The book is written on a high intellectual level and presented in such a way as to be understood by all readers. It should be interesting to anyone who is even remotely concerned with world situations.—*Wallace Anderson, Tennessee Baptist Convention, Nashville, Tennessee.*

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

How to Evaluate Your Christian Education Program

D. Campbell Wyckoff (8w), \$3.50

For the church interested in a self-evaluative survey of the educational program, this book will be a good resource book for prepa-

ration and follow-through. It will take concentrated study, but the suggestions offered will give you a new appreciation of the educational program in your church as you evaluate the system.

If a church is to do a significant job in its program of Christian education, periodic evaluation is required. The author calls our attention to four vital aspects of the educational program that needs to be evaluated: (1) Individual religious growth, (2) The teaching-learning process, (3) Program and curriculum material, and (4) The way congregation and home are doing their work.

Though some terminology indicates it is not written specifically for a Baptist church, the principles and objectives could advantageously be used by any church seeking the answers to such questions as: What are the facts about our situation? What are our objectives? What are we accomplishing? What then, do we need? What next steps shall we take?—*Idus V. Owensby, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

Training to Teach

Harry G. & Betty Goodykoontz (8w), \$3.50

This book, written from the Presbyterian standpoint, is subtitled "A Basic Course in Christian Education." The reader needs also to orient himself to the fact that it is an outgrowth of a Louisville area Council of Churches teacher training course.

Principles are dealt with in depth; methods, briefly. The book contains much valuable information on teaching and learning. It should be of interest to students of Christian education who will be able to identify doctrine unacceptable to Baptists.

The book was reviewed in galley form. If they appear in the book as published, two fascinating new words will be added to the jargon of religious education. A new adverb, "christianly," appears in the chapter on "Communicating the Christian Faith in Our Era." Perspectives on a College Church

Edited by Marilee E. Scaff (18a), \$4.00

This book is an intriguing three-year-depth study of the "College Church" of the Associated Colleges (5) of Claremont, California, made possible by a Danforth Foundation grant. This church was developed in 1949, as a result of a desire on the part of students, faculty, and administrators, to provide more adequately for the religious needs of students. Chapters in the book were written by a philosopher, a sociologist, a theologian, a teacher of social ethics, two university pastors, a chaplain, and a student. Each attempts to examine the church from the framework of his own discipline or perspective.

Certain portions of the book would be relevant to all Christians and to Baptist pastors, especially because of the discussion of the development of the covenant relationship in Baptist churches. The Reformation and Its Significance Today

Joseph C. McLelland (8w), \$2.25

This is a rather unique and challenging book. The author takes the Reformation from its historical setting with Luther, Calvin, Zwingli, Knox, and others and brings it up to the fascinating age of space and astronauts.

The author deals with strong Protestant reactions or extremes which came out of the Reformation. He calls for a new look at ourselves, our terms, and practices. He puts new content into old words and builds new houses on old foundations. He causes two opposing philosophies represented by the terms "beatnik" and "neatnik" to walk across this dramatic new world stage.

Doctrinal emphases, church policy, unity, ecumenicity, and church-state relationships are discussed in the light of the Protestant

Pulpit and Table

Howard G. Hageman (5k), \$3.00

This is a historical study of worship in the churches that trace themselves to the Calvinistic phase of the Reformation. Although some Baptists will assume that such study has no meaning for them, the fact is that we have received far more from the Calvinistic tradition than we ordinarily recognize. The book begins by showing the contrast between Zwingli and Calvin. Zwingli emphasized preaching and almost no congregational participation in worship. In this, he has been followed by most Presbyterians—and most Baptists. Calvin, however, sought a balance between preaching and such other elements of worship as prayer and the Lord's Supper, with greater congregational participation.

The author shows that there is a growing recognition in Reformed and Presbyterian churches that Calvin's approach is sounder than Zwingli's is. The concluding chapter, which deals with principles rather than with history, is particularly helpful. Baptists today are groping for greater adequacy in worship. We cannot find it merely by copying the Presbyterians; yet we should be willing, as our forefathers were, to learn from them.—*J. F. Green, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee.*

This is a book dealing with total stewardship. It is very well written and touching every phase of Christian stewardship. Beneath the Cross of Jesus is a call for volunteers to explore the power and the purpose of the cross, and its soul-searching claim upon the lives of the modern-day Christian.

This book is a clarion call to a world of unreality to come forth, exploring God's message for this day of atomic power in view of the God who made the atom. A. Leonard Griffith (1a), \$1.00

In this book, A. Leonard Griffith exalts the place of the cross in Christian experience as opposed to the modern trend toward "positive thinking" or behavioristic theological concepts which offer little more than "peace of mind." He supports his idea with abundant use of Scripture passages and presents it with many well-chosen illustrations, as well as with well-documented references to an extensive bibliography.

Mr. Griffith will find hearty agreement among Baptists and other Bible-believing Christians, who believe there is more to Christianity than an escape from frustration. While this is no new doctrinal concept, it is forcefully presented with freshness and with many absorbingly interesting stories.

The ideas presented are theologically sound and forcefully presented in positive language. The author leaves no room for holding a compromising position. His language is simple and clear-cut, but forceful.

This is recommended for general devotional reading, particularly during the pre-Easter season, as well as for prayerful study by any

Even though there seems to be an abundance of published works on this subject, this book's presentation is simple and direct. Readers will find these meditations inspirational and challenging. He is a native of Tanganyika, the son of one of the first Christian converts after the Augustana Lutheran Church began working in Africa in 1926. 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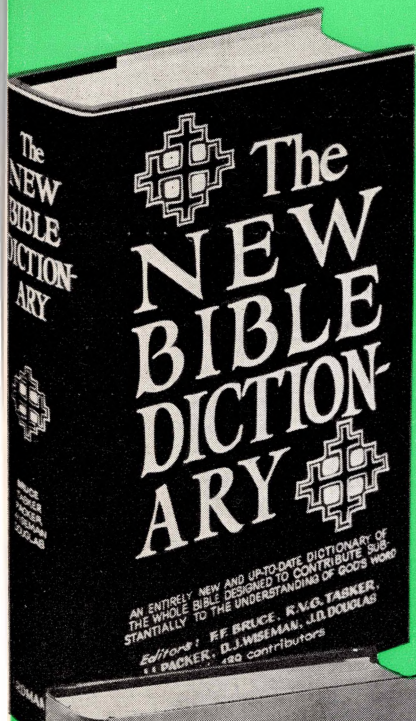
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
