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The phenomenon of voluntary co-operation and "unity in diversity" among Southern Baptist churches continues as a riddle to many observers. In times of particular crises which threaten our togetherness, the bond of common purpose inevitably shows through and prevails.

Fortunately, amidst this spirit of unity, we have not *seriously* or for long, lost sight of the basic bulwark to be found in the individual churches. Also, we aver that our collective strength is directly due to the faithful ministry and individual vigor of autonomous churches.

This issue features the partial record of approximately 3,000 churches. The reader can verify that stories of zealous witness and of lagging effort are reflected by these records. There is challenge and inspiration to be found in a careful study of the recorded activity of such a group of churches.

To list the partial record of all 32,892 churches would require nearly seven hundred pages in a magazine this size. Therefore, churches with largest memberships were arbitrarily included because of the large number of individual members involved. A membership size cutting point was determined for each location—open country, village, town, and city; it was adjusted downward for certain new or small states. The editor is regretfully aware that the method *excludes* listings of countless "smaller" churches whose vital ministry is far more effective in God's sight than is true for many larger churches which are listed.

Let us all rejoice in the achievements of the limited number of churches listed, all the while remembering the equally faithful witness of those who are not. Verily we rise or fall together, each affecting the other.

Sermon Suggestions

The Light Is Still Shining

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5, RSV).

THE GOSPEL OF JOHN WAS WRITTEN to a church under attack in a world that was changing. Its message, stated in the opening paragraph, speaks to our age as directly as to its first readers.

I. The Light is come.

1. This Light came in a person, rather than a message. The book presents a succession of witnesses to his deity.
2. The life was the Light.
 - (1) *On the face of God.*—We have seen his works, but not his face. To know him, we must meet him personally.
 - (2) *On the face of my brother.*—No one really sees who his fellowman is until he sees him as a brother for whom Christ died.
 - (3) *On our own selves.*—We see what we are as sinners against a loving God, and what we can be as his sons.
 - (4) *On the history of our race.*

- (5) *On eternity.*—Not a description or location of heaven, but an eternal Saviour whom we can trust.

II. The darkness resists.

1. Darkness that was unaware (John 1:10).
2. Darkness that was perversity.
 - (1) *Religion was scandalized by its God.*—Sure of its superiority to others, diligent to preserve its institutions, faithful in attendance, positive in condemning others, and anxious to make converts. But strangers to the meaning of redeeming love. Religion was in darkness.
 - (2) *Legally constituted government condemned the Judge of all the earth.*—Roman rule established peace, but knew nothing of real freedom and human rights.
 - (3) *Scholarship was blind to him who was truth.*—Minds were filled with facts, but blind to meaning. Only fools would shackle minds of Christian scholars. But scholars may lose sight of central truth.

- (4) *Honored disciple betrayed him.*—Whatever his motives, Judas was the symbol of disciples who became enemies of their Master.
- (5) Death undertook to put out the Light.
- (6) Time was expected to witness his disappearance (Acts 5:38).

- (4) The relation of the soul to the Saviour is indestructible (Rom. 8:35-39).

The Light comes from heaven. The darkness resists. But victory belongs to the Light.

Lovest Thou Me?

John 21:15-22

III. The Light still shines.

1. John saw that the opposition had failed to put out the Light.
2. Centuries have added to his glory.
3. The Light is always coming into the world. Our sun did not light the world a million years ago and abandon it. Rather, its radiation comes constantly. Likewise God is forever coming—
 - (1) To each new believer.
 - (2) In every fresh, new insight into the meaning of the Bible.
 - (3) To apply his truth to the needs of an ever-changing world.
4. The Light is undimmed.
 - (1) The hope of his final victory is not fainter, though we know not the time or the manner of his coming.
 - (2) His lordship over history becomes clearer in spite of our rebellion.
 - (3) The gates have not destroyed his church. He still draws redeemed men into living fellowship to do his works.

TWO IDEAS ARE FATAL IN MARITAL LOVE. One is the belief that it is merely emotion; that if he doesn't "send you" any more, love is gone. The other is that it is a bargain. "If he will do so much, then I will do so much."

Hear Paul on love: "Love suffereth long . . . seeketh not its own . . . beareth all things . . . endureth all things . . . never faileth" (1 Cor. 13:4-8, ASV). Jesus looked for love.

I. "Lovest thou me?"

1. Love was always his emphasis.
 - (1) The great commandment.
 - (2) He expected response to his love.
2. His final examination question.
 - (1) He could have asked others: "Are you sorry you denied me?" "Will you obey me?" "Are you willing to suffer?"
 - (2) One question covers all. He who loves repents, obeys, and suffers willingly. Without love, nothing can compel the rest.

II. "Lovest thou me more than these?"

1. Two possible meanings: "Do you love more than the other disciples do?" or "Do you love me more than you love your boats and nets, the wind in your face, the challenge of the sea, or your way of life?" Language would bear either.
2. The latter more likely.
 - (1) It was unlike Jesus to ask Peter to compare his devotion with that of others.
 - (2) Peter's real decision was not whether he loved more than others did, but to what he would give his life.
3. This is our dilemma. Which do I love more, the Saviour or my success? the Son of God or financial security? the Master or my money? Christ or comforts?

III. "Feed my lambs, tend my sheep."

1. Peter, who loved him, was entrusted with special pastoral responsibilities.
2. Love for Christ always expresses itself in service to others.
 - (1) *Spiritual ministry*.—If we love him, we love people, and want them to love him too.
 - (2) *In meeting every human need*.—Down to a cup of cold water or a crust of bread.

IV. "Lord, thou knowest."

1. By painful experience Peter had learned that Jesus knew his heart.

2. Questions were not for information, but to get Peter to search his own heart.

3. His knowledge of us is thorough.

- (1) He knows our frailty, how little our love really is, and does not reject us.
- (2) He knows our real devotion, when others think us hypocritical.
- (3) Is silly to try to fool him.
- (4) Is comforting to know that he understands.

V. "Signifying by what death He should glorify God."

1. Warnings to disciples proved true.
2. There have always been martyrs.
3. We are not exempted.
4. Love must face death.

VI. "What shall this man do?"

1. Peter's question about John.
2. The answer: "What is that to thee? follow thou me."
3. A text for those who are critical of their brothers, or measure their duty by what others do.
4. A reminder for those who stay apart from the church while pointing at others: "What is that to thee? follow thou me."

This is what Jesus is looking for. This he asks preachers and people. The important question is "Lovest thou me?"

Remember and Proclaim

1 Cor. 11:25-26

WORSHIP IS THE HIGHEST ACTIVITY of which the human personality is capable. The Lord's Supper offers a good case study of what is involved in worship.

I. Worship is an inward experience.

1. Protestants, and especially Baptists, have stressed this.

2. "Let a man examine himself."

(1) *His relationship to Christ.*

(2) *His guilt.*—Confession of sin is as much a duty for Baptists as Catholics. Not mere general confession, but of guilt involved in specific acts.

(3) *Relations to others.*—Jesus made right relations with others prerequisite to worship (Matt. 5:23-24).

(4) *Commitment.*—In worship we remember what Christ did for us, and decide what we will do for him.

3. "In memory of me."

(1) Remember his life, teachings, and death.

(2) Remember our own spiritual experiences.

(3) Remember his promises.

II. Worship is also an outward act.

1. Jesus said, "Let a man examine himself." He spoke of "discerning the Lord's body," but he also said, "Ye do shew the Lord's death." He said, "In remembrance," but he also said, "This do."

2. We have done harm by implying that worship is only important because of what we feel or "get out of it." Many say, "I don't see that I get much, so why go?"

3. Our worship is important to God.

(1) Hymns and prayers are addressed to him. Sermons are offered for his Spirit's use in ministering to hearers.

(2) Worship is due to him, for he is God.

(3) He wants us to worship him, even if we learn little and do not feel very pious. Our neglect does not please him.

2. It is important to other people.

(1) Our most eloquent proclamation is by acts. Daily behavior determines whether our profession is credible or not, but worship proclaims the source of our life.

(2) Proclamation is our business. The most important consideration in our daily walk, worship, and conversation is whether or not we show forth Christ.

(3) Inner experience is affected by outward acts. If our feelings are the only things that are important, even in the worship of God, then we are making ourselves more important than God. But if the things of God are given priority, regardless of how we feel, we shall find ourselves responding to him as God.

Let us not lose sight of the fact that Jehovah looketh on the heart, and inner attitudes are important. But let us not focus attention on our own thoughts and feelings, so that we forget that "the Lord is in his holy temple," and all the world should keep silence before him.

Living on Tiptoe

Philippians 3:13-14

LIKE A GREAT ATHLETIC COMPETITOR, the apostle Paul had forward drive.

We face life either on our toes or back on the heels; and the difference determines whether we are alive or dead, useful or "on the shelf."

I. We live on a moving planet.

1. The whole world is moving. Each day brings news about new nations and new alignments, new discoveries and new accomplishments, new communications, and new ideas.
2. Our nation is changing. People are multiplying and moving to cities. Automation brings unemployment. The Negro race is awakening. Old problems are aggravated and new ones appear.
3. Change will continue. No reason to believe that the next fifty years will not be as revolutionary as the past fifty.
4. New problems require new approaches. Education, science, politics, sociology, and religion must face the new day.

II. Each individual is traveling.

1. Adults need only look back to see.
2. Youth faces a changing world.
 - (1) May retreat, back on heels.
 - (2) Or, go out to meet it.
3. Christians must be on their toes.
 - (1) Paul was. He might have looked back; but he dreamed of preaching in Rome, Spain, and of deeper and sweeter fellowship with Christ.
 - (2) A Christian's future is inviting. He has limitless opportunities to serve, possibility of growth, and eternity in which to live.
 - (3) The world in dizzying change needs God more than ever.

III. Every church is on the march.

1. It ministers to a changing community. It cannot serve yesterday.
2. Its members are changing. Greats of other times cannot do our work.
3. It can fail to meet the challenge.
 - (1) By living in the past, and shrinking.
 - (2) By majoring on building itself, by spending resources on itself, muting its witness, and striving for popularity.
 - (3) It can become so like the world that it is irrelevant or just another club.
4. Or, it can follow its Christ as he marches forward.

IV. Our Lord has not changed.

1. He is the eternal contemporary, the same yesterday, and today and forever.
2. He has a purpose for his world.
3. He is a participant in the struggle, not a mere spectator.
4. He is always out ahead of us. The most radical system of economics is not communism, but Christian stewardship. The highest demand in race relations is not civil rights, but Christian love.

The deepest insights into human frailty come not from modern novelists, but from the holy Scriptures. The highest goal for human society is not Utopia, but the kingdom of God.

5. The church has a vital role in his purpose for the world. But only as an instrument in his hand can it serve that role. Power and direction come from him.
6. Every human life is significant to the extent to which it is related to God and to what he is doing in the world.

The greatest invitation one ever receives is to follow Christ in faith and commitment. The weightiest decision one ever makes is what he will do about that invitation.

This Grace Also

2 Corinthians 8:7

PAUL GATHERED FUNDS AMONG HIS mission churches for the famine-stricken Christians in Palestine, both to relieve suffering and to draw the

two groups closer together. In chapters 8 and 9 of 2 Corinthians, he urges his readers to share generously in the collection. The motives he stressed answer some of our questions about giving today.

I. Why give money through the church?

1. We join hands with other great-hearted, generous people (vv. 2-5).
2. We express Christian love (v. 8).
3. We follow the example of Jesus (v. 9).
4. We discharge obligations already assumed (v. 11). Our obligations to God and his church already exist.
5. Because we have prospered (vv. 12-14).
6. The funds will be handled honestly (vv. 18-22).
7. We shall reap as we sow (9:6).
8. Our gifts will meet needs and encourage hearts of others (9:12).

II. Why pledge to the church?

1. Why not pledge?

- (1) "I prefer to give secretly, as the Bible says." The secret giving (Matt. 6:3) was for charity; offerings in the temple were observed (Mark 12:41). Pledging is no more public than giving.

(2) "I'm afraid I may not be able to pay." We pledge in faith that God will provide. Pledges can be changed or cancelled.

(3) "I do not like to obligate myself." We obligate ourselves for anything we need or want. We are already obligated to God.

(4) "I don't want to be dunned," None of us do, but we need to be reminded when we neglect our duty.

2. Why do we pledge?

(1) It is scriptural (Psalm 116:14).

(2) The church needs a basis for planning its program.

(3) We need to have a plan for systematic giving, and to commit ourselves to it. Otherwise we neglect it.

(4) By pledging we put God first in our budgets.

(5) Our co-operation in underwriting the budget of the church encourages others to give also.

III. Why tithes?

1. Some words of caution.

(1) Let us not go back to legalism. This puts giving on the wrong basis for the wrong motives.

(2) Tithing does not justify wrong money-making.

(3) It does not excuse failure to pay debts.

(4) It does not mean that God has no authority over my use of the nine tenths.

(5) It does not entitle me to feel superior to others.

(6) It gives no license to condemn others.

(7) It is no money-making scheme.

(8) It is no substitute for service.

2. We preach and practice tithing.

(1) It is scriptural.

(2) It is systematic and sensible.

(3) Many have found that it leads to deeper commitment and spiritual growth.

(4) It solves financial problems of the church.

(5) It has brought blessings to thousands who have tried it.

No man is more spiritual than his concept of money. The primary concern of the church is not raising money, but developing Christians.

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Book Reviews

THEOLOGY

Man: The Image of God

G. C. Berkouwer (1e), \$6.00

Man: The Image of God is the eighth book in a series dealing with the great themes in systematic theology. This one is pertinent to the controversies that rage today around the nature of man. Berkouwer's discussion, however, never rages. It is very deliberate, very logical, very biblical, and very thorough. While treating the Scriptures as normative, it looks to the interpretations of men like Martin Luther, John Calvin, and Herman Bavinck for many rays of light. While conversant with all trends of thought in theology and philosophy, expounded by prominent men like Barth, Brunner, Bultman, Kuyper, Buber, Berdyaev, Dooyeweerd, Schilder, and so on, it brings their views into judgment constantly before a clear, consistent, evangelical interpretation of the Scriptures. This is perhaps the great value of the book: It will help the thoughtful, studious preacher prepare to separate the chaff from the wheat in modern theological discussion. For instance, chapter three deals with the meaning of "the image of God," and it goes a long way in explaining creation in the image of God as taught in the first chapters of the Bible.—*Wash Watts*

Essential Christianity

Walter R. Martin (1z), cloth, \$1.95; paper, \$1.00

This book, written by a Baptist who has become recognized as one of the outstanding authorities on religious cults, seeks to set out in brief fashion those doctrines that are at the heart of the Christian faith. In writing the book, Walter Martin points out that his purpose is not to provide a complete study of all biblical doctrines but to provide a brief introductory survey of the essential foundations of Christian theology.

The doctrines treated are as follows: God in Three Persons (the Trinity), The Divinity of Christ, The Virgin Birth of Christ, Christ Died for Us, The Gospel of Resurrection, Sovereign Grace and Human Works, The Hope of the Ages, The Judgment of God, The Error of Universal Salvation, and The Unanswerable Argument. Throughout the presentation of his understanding of these doctrines, the author provides biblical references, gives exegeses of key passages, sets out historical views, and provides summaries of the main issues.

Altogether it would seem to the reviewer that the author has accomplished his purpose. There are, however, some interpretations that will be questioned by some scholars who are as conservative as the author. Anyone who studies the book without a background of knowing other views concerning the judgment of God will tend to assume that the six judgments set out in that chapter are in reality accepted by all Bible-believing scholars. This is hardly so. Perhaps the stronger parts of the book, in the reviewer's opinion, are the chapters on the "Triune God and Sovereign Grace," and "Human Works."—*Russell Ware*

Things Most Surely Believed

Clarence S. Roddy (6r), \$3.95

Clarence S. Roddy, editor of this very fine volume, is professor of homiletics at Fuller Seminary in California. This book is a compilation of eleven subjects, each of which is presented by a Fuller Seminary professor with the exception of Harold J. Ockenga, who is chairman of the board at Fuller and pastor of the famed Park Street Church in Boston.

In this volume the quality of writing is outstanding. At times there are devotional aspects in the material which add spice for the Christian reader. There is coherence, unity, and readability here. The content is rich both with stimulating insights and meaning for our age. The reading of this book will enlighten the scholar and bless the hearts of growing Christians.

There are no objectionable features for evangelical Christians regardless of their name tag.

The chapter headings are as follows: "Holy Scripture" by G. W. Bromiley; "God's Sovereignty in Creation" by Daniel P. Fuller; "The Triune God" by Paul K. Jewett; "Jesus Christ, Son of God" by Clarence S. Roddy; "The Resurrection and Ascension of Our Lord" by Wilbur M. Smith; "He Shall Come Again" by George Eldon Ladd; "The Holy Spirit" by William Sanford LaSor; "The Biblical Doctrine of Man and His Predicament" by G. L. Archer; "Atonement" by E. F. Harrison; "Justification" by H. J. Ockenga; and "Regeneration" by W. C. Lantz.—*Harold F. Green*

The Moderns

William C. Fletcher (1z), \$3.00

This book is conceived and written from the standpoint of conservative, Bible-based Christianity. It is intended to help the already well-grounded Christian become better acquainted with the various current theological thinkers and their opinions. It seems to be the author's desire that through the medium of this book, such Christian will become well versed enough to witness to those holding such liberal and modern theological views as expressed here.

There is also a secondary motive evidenced here: That the reader might gain a better understanding of his own theological position. Conservative Christians, as a whole, tend to be careless in their theological concepts and expressions. It is hoped that through careful reading of this book, the reader will be helped to better identify his own position, thus making him a better and more positive witness.—*A. B. Cothron*

Our Knowledge of God

John Baillie (9s), \$1.45

The late professor emeritus of Divinity and principal of New College in the University of Edinburgh was a scholar and a saint, whose writings combine in a remarkable fashion these two dimensions. This particular book exhibits unobtrusively both the Christian scholar who refused to be satisfied with simple answers to difficult questions and the saintly man ever

sensitive to human need and the presence of God. This is put magnificently in the first sentence of the book: "The great fact for which all religion stands is the confrontation of the human soul with the transcendent holiness of God."

Principal Baillie vigorously attacks the knowledge of God which rests upon implications such as, "whatever God has revealed on God's authority." Revelation, Baillie insists, is "not in the communication of truths about God, but in the self-revelation of the Divine personality." Thus the knowledge of God is immediate and not merely derived. This is indeed a classic. It exhibits that combination of clarity and profundity which were his special gifts.—*Penrose St. Amant*

The Place of Bonhoeffer

Martin E. Marty (18a), cloth, \$4.50; paper, \$2.25

Current interest in Dietrich Bonhoeffer's thought undoubtedly has been heightened by his fame as a Christian martyr to nazism. Yet it deserves attention for its inherent significance. Bonhoeffer's concern was for the meaning of Christian life in our era—an era in which increasing numbers regard God and faith as unnecessary. He saw the problems that Christians need to face. He pointed toward some possible solutions that at least demand serious consideration. The present book surveys his contribution. Eight outstanding American theological leaders have contributed to the interpretation and evaluation. Seven of these write from the perspectives of their own disciplines. Some indicate that Bonhoeffer's work in their areas was not particularly helpful. Walter Harrelson, for example, points out that his work in the biblical field is not exactly a model of careful exegesis. Perhaps Bonhoeffer's greatest contribution has been in the area of ethics. George Forell, in discussing this area, confronts us with possible approaches being advocated today. He shows how Bonhoeffer criticized these, and how he offered helpful insights toward a Christian alternative.

The appeal of this book is largely limited to serious students of contemporary theology. For these, regardless of their level of acquaintance with Bonhoeffer's work, there is value in the differing viewpoints of the contributors.—*Joe Green*

A Systematic Theology of the Christian Religion

J. Oliver Buswell (1z), \$6.95

While the current emphasis is on biblical theology, the values of systematic theology are not discounted; and among conservatives there will be a welcome for this careful statement by a well-known evangelical scholar. Dr. Buswell begins his study with the doctrine of God, proceeding from that to the works and revelation of God. He writes interestingly, for the most part, in terms which the average reader can understand, although his logical method requires close application on the reader's part. His defense of traditional viewpoints is interesting, if not always convincing. At times one becomes irritated by the use of the first personal pronoun, a device which contrasts with Dr. Buswell's obvious scholarship revealed in his wide knowledge of theological literature.—*Donald F. Ackland*

Barth's Christology

Cornelius Van Til (66b), 75 cents

Here is a summary of *Barth's Christology* and an effort on the part of the author to make Barth's position clear in its deviation from biblical theology. Van Til demonstrates how Barth's views of Christ as the elected God, the elected man, and as the indirect revelation of God are inconsistent or self-contradictory.

According to Van Til, Barth has evolved a Christ who symbolizes the idea of man's virtual omniscience. He does this despite the fact that it is his avowed purpose "to laugh at Feuerbach," who said that theology was merely a projection of man's consciousness. Barth's God is a God who knows not himself, actually, the projection of a would-be autonomous human experience. Barth has in effect evolved a new consciousness-theology. *Who really is laughing? Feuerbach or Barth?—and at whom?—A. B. Cotbron*

The Church and the Reality of Christ

John Knox (9h), \$3.50

Dr. John Knox is one of the leading New Testament scholars in the world today. He is an original interpreter and has led the way in a deeper understanding of the New Testament.

There is considerable repetition in this book in relation to his previous works. However, this is a good summary of his thinking, and has an added thrust of insight.

The book points out that the early church was in existence long before the New Testament was written. The Gospels are theological works of the early church. There is a real historical basis for our faith, but the inner reality of the church's existence is the central proof. The memory of Christ, vivid and alive, is as important as facts about Jesus.

The book makes a real contribution in the current theological debate of this age. It is most profitable for the New Testament scholar, but it is not a book which would be understood or appreciated by the average layman.—*Robert McCan*

An Introduction to Barth's Dogmatics for Preachers

Arnold B. Come (8w), \$4.75

How does one read the major works of a great thinker and theologian like Karl Barth without becoming a Barthian? This question is a problem, and thus the basis for this book. Before introducing the reader to *The Dogmatics* itself, the author introduces him to Barth. In a brief biographical sketch he shows how Barth's thinking has changed and finally evolved into the theology of *The Dogmatics*.

Next follows a summary and critique of *The Dogmatics* itself. Included here are Barth's work on: God, Christology, Creation, Man, Redemption, and the Word of God. The author enters into an interesting discussion of Bultmann's and Barth's positions concerning the Scriptures.

The final portion of the book is practical and is intended to show the preacher how to read Barth (always with reservations—"We do not preach another man's theology") and find a wealth of preacherable ideas.

The author's aim is to interest the working pastor in reading Barth for the fresh and constructive value such a reading could have upon his preaching. He insists all along that this should not be a reading of "underlining phrases" and taking them as the ultimate in truth just because Barth has said them (this applies to any human system).

This is a book primarily for pastors, but not necessarily limited to them. Anyone interested in current theology and philosophy would also enjoy this book.—*A. B. Cotbron*

Christianity and Barthianism

Cornelius Van Til (41p), \$6.95

Professor Van Til's work on Karl Barth is divided into four sections. The first section presents "Barth's Main Doctrines." Here the author defines Barth's *Geschichte* as that action of God in Christ which determines the relationship of all men to God. He then shows how this idea of *Geschichte* molds Barth's conception of grace, election, the resurrection, time, and eternity. This is by far the most readable part of the book.

In the second section Van Til uses criticisms of Barth by C. C. Berkouwer, Runia, Schilder, and others.

Section three presents the author's own evaluation of Barth's work. This section also includes more than a hundred pages given to a treatment of medieval, modern, and recent dialecticism.

Section four is entitled "The New Consciousness Theology." Here both Roman Catholic and Protestant thinkers are surveyed.

One could wish that Van Til's own evaluation of Barth was more biblical and less philosophical. He rarely appeals to Scripture, but seems willing to build upon the opinions of other Dutch theologians. In so doing, Van Til lays out Barth's alleged philosophical presuppositions and draws implications (Barth's?) and arrives at the following conclusion: "Barth's theology is only a higher humanism."

Positive Protestantism

Hugh T. Kerr (20p), \$1.75

Both the quality and style of writing in this book are good. The format and general appearance are attractive.

There are but few other books on "Evangelism" which are written from the point of view maintained in this book. The author of *Positive Protestantism* has strongly developed the thesis that the gospel, the good news that God is in Christ redeeming the world unto himself, is the most urgent and all-important emphasis in Christianity. He insists that the good news must be communicated to all the peoples of the world in every possible effective manner. He incorporates the evangelical uses of the "sacraments."

By way of explaining the word "Positive" in his title, the author says: "Important and distasteful as the contemporary Roman position

may be, particularly on the question of State and Church, our chief concern is not to show how we differ from Romanists, but to indicate in clear and unmistakable terms just what it is we do believe." Evangelicals do this he says "by showing in doctrine and life that Protestantism is true Christianity."

I regret that the author seems to accept the idea that we are now living in the post-Christian period!—Julius Avery

Evangelical Theology: An Introduction

Karl Barth (20h), \$4.00

The only unfortunate thing about this volume is its title. It could much more appropriately be labeled a "summary" of the theological work of Karl Barth. Its first five chapters are the lectures which Barth gave to several American audiences during his 1962 visit to this country. The additional twelve lectures make up a series of lectures which he prepared as his closing work as professor at Basel. Together, these seventeen brief chapters are said by their author to be in very brief form what he has tried to say about evangelical theology during the fifty-seven years of his active work upon it.

One could not claim to know all about Karl Barth after reading this small volume. But the diligent student of his works from their inception in his *Commentary on Romans* then until the latest sections of his *Dogmatics* now will be able to discern in these chapters the point at which Barth has arrived in his theological pilgrimage.—Stewart Newman

Exploring Christianity

David F. Siemens, Jr. (29m), 59 cents

Exploring Christianity is an unusual book. The author has arranged statements followed by pertinent questions dealing with the Bible and Christian living. Answers to these questions are found on pages elsewhere in the book as indicated at the end of the question.

This is not a book to read for enjoyment, but is designed to be studied. It is true to the Bible. It would be helpful to young Christians. There is the possibility, however, of the unusual arrangement leading to discouragement instead of stimulating interest. For this reason there would be a question relative to highly recommending it.—Roy Boatwright

The Problem of Pain

C. S. Lewis (9m), 95 cents

This is a great book and is highly recommended. C. S. Lewis, converted from unbelief, has become a leading exponent for the validity of Christianity. Originally published in 1940, it now appears as a paperback. "The Problem of Pain" has troubled theologians and philosophers through the centuries. With penetrating logic and vivid imagination, the author faces this problem and comes out the winner. Mankind has fallen into sin and rebellion against God. It is therefore necessary for a loving God to permit (not necessarily cause) painful experiences for the benefit of man.

The reader will encounter theological differences with the writer, but the major thrust of this work is scriptural and thoroughly Christian. Lewis approaches his subject with great humility, nowhere claiming to know all the answers; but his answers do make sense, and are well illustrated. Intellectuals who would doubt the goodness of God because of human pain will find this book helpful. All who suffer heartache, disappointment, and persecution will learn that their troubles have eternal meaning.—*Harvey C. Roys*

The Faith to Doubt

M. Holmes Hartshorne (20p), \$1.75

This book is worthy of reading and reading again. It is an attempt to look at religion as objectively as possible. The author skilfully considers the different criticisms of religion and their validity—for example, the sociological criticism which indicates that religion is relative to its environment and culture. Even the Bible characters were products of their times. Though this criticism is valid, religion is influenced to varying degrees. While some religion is patterned according to environment and culture to a large degree, it is not true in all religions. The author argues that criticism of religion is compatible with Protestantism. He indicates that the answer to the doubts of our day is not the ready answers of unthinking religionists, but to challenge people to have courage to doubt honestly and creatively.—*Hudson Baggett*

A Reasoned Faith

John Baillie (9s), \$3.50

This book is a good, penetrating, convincing presentation of the Christian faith, making

timely application to some of the most important and urgent issues before our world today. The author's literary gift is outstanding, his style is good, and there is coherence and unity throughout the script.

In this book the author does not fall into the absurd fallacy which some other present-day writers have done on the subject of "rational" and "irrational" faith. His development of his subject or theme represents faith as growing out of and stemming from reason, but projecting belief beyond the point where reason can go. Such modern writers as Eric Fromm and others call this "irrational" faith; but, in so doing, they actually do not concede that faith has any ground at all. The author of *A Reasoned Faith* gives strong evidence of a true Christian faith in himself, and he inspires such faith in his readers.—*Julius Avery*

Faith Beyond Humanism

David Rhys Williams (12p), \$5.00

The author's purpose in the book is to help those who have lost their faith and who are struggling with doubts to achieve a dynamic faith of their own. The author is a Unitarian, and this viewpoint colors his concept of God and faith. The author identifies faith as God, and holds that God cannot be the object of man's faith. He states that faith is something apart from man which man does not possess, but faith possesses man. Jesus is pictured as just another of the great teachers of religion. The author denies the supernatural and explains the miracles as mere "lucky breaks" in some instances. He said Jesus was a magnetic personality who healed by physiological means alone. Palm Sunday is magnified as the ideal religious holy day because the author contends that sham, superstition, and dubious dogma are connected with most of the other days as Easter and Christmas. The author is not sure whether God is personal or not. The true purpose of life is found in the achievement of character by giving full rein to the potential divinity within ourselves. Man's redemption lies primarily within man himself. Sin is viewed as the failure to live our lives according to the inner light which we behold within ourselves.

The book will be wholly unacceptable to Baptists because it denies the fundamental tenets of the Christian faith. If one wants to know something about what one Unitarian believes, the book may be helpful; but beyond this the book cannot be recommended for

Baptists to read because there are too many excellent books which will help the Christian to grow in the knowledge of Christ.—*Billy Smith*

The King of the Earth

Erich Sauer (1e), \$3.95

Despite his sin and rebellion, man has been destined by God to rule the earth. Erich Sauer sets forth his theme in the foreword. "Our theme is not a defense of the faith, but a testimony to the nobility and kingship of man." And yet this does not contradict the Christian virtues of self-denial and humility. This book deals with the tensions that have existed between science and religion and testifies to the harmony between true science and biblical faith. The author squarely faces the problems that arise and deals with them boldly, fairly, and yet not dogmatically.

Sauer believes the Bible to be inspired, infallible, and authoritative; and yet he shows how that it is written in the languages of appearances. In this sense, he is not a literalist. He uses keen logic, and his enthusiasm is refreshing. Like any book dealing with scientific matters, some of the material may have to be re-evaluated in the light of future discoveries. This book has no objectionable features and is highly recommended. Anyone interested in the relationship between science and Scripture will find this to be worthwhile reading. Those who want to believe in the accuracy of the Bible will find this book very helpful in answering questions that unbelievers have raised.—*Harvey C. Roy*

BIBLE STUDY

The Prophets

Abraham J. Herschel (9h), \$6.00

An eminent Jewish theologian, who has made the prophets of Israel his special study, affords in this volume perceptive insights into the character, task, and method of the prophets. About one third of his pages are given to studies of individual prophets. The rest of his book contains the result of the author's scholarly obsession with the prophets as men, with their function, and with their understanding of God. The author's magnificent literary style, his conservative approach, and his keen spiritual perception will commend

this book to Christian as well as Jewish readers. The former will recognize its limitations, mainly in the absence of reference to the messianic hope.—*Donald F. Ackland*

The Nature and Purpose of the Gospels

R. V. G. Tasker (5k), \$1.50

This is the seventh printing of a little book which first appeared in 1944. The very fact that there has been such demand for it should make anyone eager to discover the reason. A thorough reading of the book will reveal it.

The book is very ably written and entirely interesting. It is doubtful if many Baptists will agree with everything which Dr. Tasker has to say. Certainly, his discussion of the sources behind the Gospels will be too conservative for the more liberal thinkers and too liberal for the more conservative readers. However, what he has to say cannot be ignored. Rather, it must be faced.

The book ought to be required reading for every Sunday school teacher in the Southern Baptist Convention. It will serve as a good refresher course for seminary graduates, and would prove of great value in a college Bible class when taught by a dedicated professor.

Certainly, no one can read this book without turning again and again to the Four Gospels. If this book makes the Gospels read more and better understood, it will have been a worthwhile investment of time and money, however little or much one may agree. The book will certainly lead the reader to come to some definite conclusions concerning the nature and purpose of the Gospels.—*Robert L. Cate*

St. Paul and His Letters

Frank W. Beare (1a), \$2.75

Poured into the mold of this book is the extensive research in ancient history and the life of the apostle Paul, classical archeology, and Hellenistic literature. Dr. Beare digs into the gold mines of the apostle's writings to expose the nature of the people to whom Paul wrote and the major issues of his letters. The author's scholarship is superb.

St. Paul and His Letters deserves a place in the library of every minister, teacher, and layman. The nature of the book makes it of especial interest to the theological student. There are some who no doubt would take issue

with Dr. Beare on some suggestions he makes. But in fullest respect and admonition, they will admit and confess that his book is to be commended in its style, nature, and scholarship.—*Ray Fowler*

The Forty Days

Geoffrey R. King (1e), \$2.00

This book seeks to explore the events of the resurrection and the activities of the risen Christ prior to the ascension. The thesis is that Christ entered paradise, visited the Old Testament saints, preached to them, and took those who believed on to heaven. Then the author makes a literal harmony of the New Testament records of the appearances of Christ. He expounds the meaning of the Emmaus Road appearance, deals reverently with the appearance of the Ten—Thomas absent—and discusses the meeting of Christ with a “disbeliever”—Thomas—and with an “unbeliever”—James the brother of Christ. He then gives what may be the worthiest section of the book—an exploration of the meeting and breakfast between Christ and the weary fishermen by the shore of Galilee. Throughout these events the author finds suggestions for preaching material.

Evaluation: In a devotional vein the book has some merit, but the form and content of the book leave much to be desired. The writing is only mediocre; the theology is a rehash of an uncritical variety (especially in the area of Hades and death); and the book is unfaithful to the facts at least at one point. On page 65 the distinctions between the Greek words *apostello* and *pempo* cannot be maintained. *Apostello* is used of the twelve (Matt. 10:16) and even of evil spirits (Mark 5:10). *Pempo* is used by Christ of his mission (John 4:34) and of his sending the Holy Spirit (John 16:7).—*Gwenn McCormick*

Journeys After St. Paul

William R. Cannon (9m), \$4.95

Neither as a travelogue nor as a source book of New Testament information, does this volume have any outstanding qualities. The author traveled, over a period of years, along the routes taken by the apostle Paul in his missionary journeys. The record of his journeys is mediocre, too brief to furnish the human interest for which one looks in such a book. Little light is thrown upon places and

events in Paul's life, the writer having to acknowledge that most of the sites visited yielded little of real archaeological value. Of course, there are occasional high lights; but the reader is warned against expecting too much.—*Donald F. Ackland*

And the Prophets

Clovis Chappell (18a), 95 cents

Clovis Chappell never fails to stir one's heart through his writing. On reading his new book, *And the Prophets*, one is able to wish that “all the Lord's people were prophets.” The prophets are not presented as men of the past. They are met anew and characterize a group of dynamic men with a vital message for today's world. The prophets are seen as men of human frailties, insight, loneliness, fiery earnestness, and men who were not popular and who had many vivid religious experiences.

In these vital messages on the prophets, the busy pastor finds a wealth of material which will inspire his preaching on the prophets. The historical material presented in discussions of each prophet is invaluable to the preacher of the gospel, the Sunday school teacher, the seminary student, and the average layman in his study of the holy Scriptures. The depth and insight into the prophetic life provides a storehouse of information from which to draw. Dynamically, Dr. Chappell has presented these messages which so relate the prophet's time to ours.—*Ray Fowler*

God's Word and Man's

George K. Bowers (45w), \$3.50

The author has taken common, everyday sayings and counters them with biblical insight. People often say, “Love is blind.” Dr. Bowers says, “Love is not blind” and uses scriptural truth to prove his point. His style is witty, pithy, occasionally barbed, and always clever. He uses the sharp scalpel of insight to lay bare the weaknesses of men, then seeks to apply a biblical remedy. His ability in revealing the ailment is often greater than is demonstrated in prescribing the remedy. Nevertheless, this is a very helpful book. It is easy to read and well written. Every chapter will serve as a springboard of thought, particularly for the preacher. Excellent illustrations and well-chosen poems are plentiful.—*M. O. Owens, Jr.*

Taking the Bible Seriously

Leander E. Keck (18a), \$3.75

The assertion of this book is that there is a way of reading the Bible which opens the way to vital faith without shutting the door to critical thought. Dr. Keck believes that the historical-critical method is an indispensable tool for anyone who wants to know what the Bible says. The author states that this approach will increase the authority of the Bible. Interpreting the Bible in creative dialogue leads the reader to argue with the biblical writers and thus discover what they are really saying. This approach is then illustrated in the fields of science and ethics.

Unfortunately, Dr. Keck's approach neither opens the way to vital faith nor increases the authority of the Bible. His historical-critical method discounts passages in the Old and New Testaments. It discredits some miracles in the Bible and leaves the serious-minded wondering if the Bible has any authority. The book might have an appeal for a trained neo-orthodox theologian. It would not have appeal to many others. This is not a book to be recommended to laymen and college undergraduates.—*Ralph Smith*

The Birth of the New Testament

C. F. D. Moule (9h), \$5.00

This book is neither an introduction to the New Testament nor a theology of the New Testament in the normal use of those terms. It rather discusses the circumstances which led to the making of the New Testament. It takes into account such things as the effects of worship, the Jewish background, the fact of persecution, the evangelistic and catechetical needs, and the wide variety of outlook on the production of the New Testament literature. It discusses, too, the process of collection and canonization of the books.

Author Moule employs the approach of form criticism. However, many of his conclusions are much less radical than those frequently associated with that approach. Nevertheless, this is a book representative of the direction and present status of critical New Testament scholarship. Since this study is written in a rather technical style and with full critical apparatus, only those who have some background of mature New Testament study will find its reading understandable or particularly helpful. For those with such a background who

are concerned to know what modern New Testament scholarship is saying on this subject, this should be a useful book.—*Pope A. Duncan*

Philippians

William Hendriksen (66b), \$5.95

As the weary Bible student travels through the arid wastes of modern critical scholarship, he experiences great delight when he discovers an oasis which brings spiritual refreshment for the journey yet ahead. Such is Dr. Hendriksen's commentary on Philippians. The warm heart of the pastor and the penetrating mind of the scholar are combined in this book. The author has a good introduction to the book as a whole, and this is followed by a verse-by-verse commentary on the text. Probably the most unique thing about his translation is his method of distinguishing *you* singular from *you* plural.

Dr. Hendriksen has made a thorough study of the literature on Philippians and has a full bibliography. He uses the fruit of his scholarship as the basis for a multitude of practical homiletical suggestions, which will be valuable for the pastor and the Bible teacher. The pastor will be delighted with this scholarly, yet practical commentary on this epistle. The student will find the author's style stimulating and inspiring. The book has an excellent format, and the reader will be pleased with the arrangement of divergent views on crucial passages. Baptists will appreciate the author's reverent and scholarly approach toward the Word of God.—*Billy Smith*

Letters to the Churches

Morton S. Enslin (1a), \$1.00

Letters to the Churches is one of the twenty-two volumes of Bible Guides being written essentially for "nontheologically equipped readers who want to know what the Bible is about, how its various parts came to be written and what their meaning is today." This volume, number 18, is on 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus. The author shows that the letters of Paul to Timothy and Titus are an important part of the sacred Scriptures. Now that the first age of the church is past, the time has come for steadfastness among the Christians. They are in need of rules for governing the church and her leaders. The purpose of this "guide" is "to arouse a keener desire to read the epistles to Timothy and Titus with fresh interest and concern."

The author has done a good job in accomplishing his objective. He gives to readers a nontechnical book with chapter and subject divisions that make for easy and understandable reading. He sums the book up with a chapter on the "Abiding Values of the Letters." I see no reason why this book will not be widely read by those who desire to know more about the Scriptures and particularly by the lay people of the church.—D. W. Edwards

Job: Defense of Honor

Roger N. Carstensen (1a), \$3.25

This intensely readable and penetrating study of the book of Job interprets the problem of all mankind. In Job's struggle with the question of human suffering, the traditional view of a moral law gives way to a view of God in which man chooses the will of God for its own sake and not for personal benefit.

The author builds his interpretation around the theme of honor, which, with reference to man, means his essential worth or dignity. Though Job was not guilty of particular sins in the traditional sense and thus did not deserve the suffering he endured, his real sin was a basic egocentricity plus insubordination inasmuch as he attempted to dictate terms to God. His painful physical experience, fraught with much mental and spiritual anguish, brought him to a firsthand knowledge of God that rendered irrelevant and obsolete his questions concerning the justice of God. This book can be read with immense profit by every Christian, pastor, and layman alike.—Fred D. Howard

The Epistles of John

Lehman Strauss (15-L), \$3.00

This book is composed of devotional studies of the Epistles of John. The author's purpose is to treat the major emphasis of the epistles. Accordingly, he arranges the studies topically. He writes on the purpose, person, perils, precept, and prospect of 1 John. Second John is treated as a unit, and 3 John is organized around the characters of Gaius, Diotrephes, and Demetrius.

Although the book sets forth many good concepts, it adds nothing new to the interpretation of the epistles. Frequently, the author's love for alliteration causes him to include questionable interpretations.

The pastor can find some sermonic material in the book; but if he has good commentaries

on these epistles, he will have very little need to add this work to his library.—W. T. Edwards

Isaiah

Elmer A. Leslie (1a), \$5.00

The author interprets the book of Isaiah from the standpoint of Old Testament higher criticism and rearranges the individual prophecies in what he has determined to be the correct chronological order. Basing his work upon latest manuscript evidence, the author presents a very readable translation, although his choice of words in certain key passages is questionable. There is also the problem of his interpretation of chapter 53 in terms of Israel as the "Suffering Servant." Actually, we did not observe sufficient evidence of keen insight to rank this work highly as a commentary; and we feel that the author should have been more definitive in his interpretations of crucial passages. Pastors, teachers of religion, and other advanced Bible students will find the commentary helpful, but it probably will not appeal to the average lay student of the Bible.—Fred Howard

Singers of Israel

George S. Gunn (1a), \$1.00

The student will find most refreshing reading in the *Bible Guide* which contains a wealth of background material that makes the psalms live. Studying it will give a new and deeper appreciation for the book of *Psalms* as the author, George S. Gunn, reviews and focuses attention on "a Bible in miniature."

In this work, the author shows an excellent grasp of and respect for the sacred Word. It can be highly recommended to all readers. Deep insight, careful interpretation, clear expression, and true reverence combine to make this a most worthwhile book. In my opinion, both the layman and the minister can profit from it. The preacher will find it homilectically useful; all will find it devotionally helpful; and, I think, most satisfying for its size and purpose.—Daniel Cloer

The Gospel of Philip

R. McL. Wilson (9h), \$3.75

The author, lecturer in New Testament language and literature at St. Mary's College, University of St. Andrews, translates one of the Gnostic works found in the Nag Hammadi tomb in Egypt. This is a scholarly work, and

will be of great importance in reconstruction of the history of Christianity in the first and second centuries. Scholars, no doubt, will be greatly interested in this translation. However, the average pastor, unless greatly interested in this type of study, will find the book of little use. The author, in his translation, follows the Coptic text line for line and page for page. He provides a perceptive introduction and a running commentary for this source book. He not only provides a bibliography, but a person and subject index as well. A New Testament index of echoes and allusions is also given.—*H. R. Horne*

Psalms of David

David A. Redding (6r), \$3.00

Thoughtful discussions and interpretations of twenty-three psalms attributed to David's authorship are included in this valuable book. The four-page introduction deserves careful consideration as it is informative and presents facts which aid a better understanding of the Psalms. The entire book will be more meaningful if careful reading is given to this portion of the book. The King James Version is used in recording the psalms discussed. Here are a few of the comments made on several psalms discussed: "Life is strangely satisfying for the man who has God." "God and gossiping will not go together." "Creation is God's first sermon to us." "Faith can grow stronger, more sure of itself, but there will never be a time when we are perfectly safe from temptation, for earth is not heaven." "The big day ahead of us is not the trip to the moon or meeting another planet's men, but our trip to meet God the Father Almighty." New light is used to bring additional meaning to each of these twenty-three psalms.—*Florida Waite*

Colossian and Philemon Studies

H. C. G. Moule (1z), \$3.95

Here is another excellent commentary by Handley C. G. Moule. He writes this time on two Pauline epistles—the epistles to the Colossians and to Philemon. The author makes some references to history and geography. His purpose, however, is not to give attention to the historical and critical, but "to assist the believing reader of the epistles in the way of

such exposition and reflection as may, under the blessing of God, tend to edify." He accomplishes his purpose in an excellent manner. He deals with the epistles chapter by chapter, giving a verse-by-verse translation with remarks upon words and grammar. He uses the Greek text freely in both his exposition and reflection, but translates it. The book is divided into fourteen chapters with titles and Scripture passages covering the subject matter of the chapter.

I saw nothing objectionable in the book. On the subject of baptism, he says, "Beyond doubt the ideal of baptism was immersion." He says also that, "There is no proof that actual immersion was ever a vital necessity to the rite." He speaks of baptism as being the "sealing ordinance" of salvation or union with Christ, which we enter in by our faith. For a devotional commentary I would commend this work, not only for the minister but for students and Sunday school teachers.—*D. W. Edwards*

So Now He Speaks Again

Frank E. Butterworth (1a), \$2.50

Frank E. Butterworth has developed a unique vehicle for discussing God's call to men. He has done this through the recounting of the experiences of biblical characters—Abraham, Moses, Samuel, Nathan, Nehemiah, Saul, Barnabas, and John—to mention a few. The entire work is couched in chatty, vernacular language for the teen-ager.

Perhaps the language tool mentioned above is the book's weakest point. The reader finds this to be a clever theme at the outset, but soon it begins to draw attention away from the main purpose of the book itself. However, it is not to be completely discredited. It will hold the teen-agers' interest through the pages of the book.

The work is alive with colorful illustrations, to back up the portrayals of the theme characters. Among these instances, however, it is obvious at times that the writer becomes a bit "preachy." Often the truth to be presented winds in and out of so many incidents and illustrations that it is almost lost.

All in all, this is a useful, attractive book. It should find warm response from today's youth who is seriously trying to seek God's place for his life.—*Lloyd Householder*

Words and Wonders of the Cross

Gordon H. Girod (66b), \$2.50

The title of the book has been well chosen. The author attempts to look at some of the sayings of Jesus, while on the cross, in the light of biblical theology. Rather than deal with these sayings in a manner that has become so common, the author deals with them against a background of biblical history and the Old Testament Scriptures. His thesis is that the sayings of Jesus are not important alone because they are the words of a dying man, but the words of God as he is bringing about the completion of redemption. His attempts at times to read into all the sayings certain passages of Scripture, calls for a very loose interpretation, yet none the less is most interesting.

The chapters on "I Thirst," and "It Is Finished," are indeed most interesting from an evangelical viewpoint. The author goes much farther than just some of the sayings of Jesus, but he deals with the miracles attendant to the events of the crucifixion. I would say that all in all it is interesting and a little more unusual than most works on this subject.—Howard Judah

Family Living in the Bible

Edith Deen (9h), \$4.95

Mrs. Edith Deen wrote *Family Living in the Bible* from the stimulus of graduate research toward a master's degree on this subject. The outline of the book is both impressive and intriguing. In a sense, Mrs. Deen has done a very unusual piece of work in setting almost every significant Bible story in its family perspectives. These perspectives will serve the worthwhile purpose of giving pastors clues for sermons on family themes.

In the development of this tremendous outline, however, the author does not bring any new insights. In fact, she offers little more than a recounting of biblical incidents in the light of their family involvements. Some of the chapters, such as the father's role and the mother's role, are misleading in that they really do not discuss roles but rather become the occasion for retelling stories that have some relationship to the role idea. What I am saying in essence is that the book seems to promise much more than it actually gives.—Ellis Bush

Nelson's Bible Commentary Vol. 6

Frederick C. Grant (5n), \$5.00

This brief commentary on the Gospels and Acts is based on the Revised Standard Version. The entire text of Scripture is given and the expository and exegetical notes follow page by page. The very cream of scholarly study is here presented in clear, concise form by one of the great biblical scholars. The reader is furnished unerring insight as he follows the sacred Word. This book will prove useful to the more general student, and will serve as a trusted guide through the more exhaustive critical works, which deal with the many problems in biblical criticism. One could wish for fuller discussion by this gifted author, but the very brevity has its advantages.

High praise is due both the publishers and the author.—Owen F. Herring

Nelson's Bible Commentary Vol. 7

Frederick C. Grant (5n), \$5.00

This volume of the Nelson Bible Commentary deals with the twenty-one letters of the New Testament and the Revelation. The full Scripture text (RSV) is given and along with it, page by page, are the expository and exegetical notes. Valuable information as to customs, circumstances, and viewpoints of the first readers, as well as the relevance of counsel, doctrine, and exhortation, serve to make these writings come alive.

Here as elsewhere in this series one could wish for fuller discussion, but brevity has its distinct advantages as well both for the general reader and for the thorough student of biblical critical problems.

This commentary deserves high praise and wide use.—Owen F. Herring

Zondervan Pictorial Bible Dictionary, The

Dr. Merrill Tenney (1z), \$9.95

This book is a completely new, fully illustrated one-volume work. A wide variety of scholars have contributed articles, most of which are written from a conservative, but not narrowly fundamental, viewpoint. Authors usually show awareness of liberal viewpoints and deal fairly therewith. At times, only one view of a debatable matter is presented in

detail; and one could wish the opposing views were given equal time. The historical and geographical material is of greater value than the interpretation of doctrine, etc.

The work is somewhat uneven in quality. That is, certain articles are treated at length when shorter treatments would suffice, and vice versa.

In general, this book will be inoffensive to Southern Baptists. The excellent Rand-McNally maps and the many, many photographs add interest and meaning to this fine volume.—*Wilbur C. Lamm*

Harper's Topical Concordance

Charles R. Joy (9h), \$8.95

Based on the King James Version, this revised edition of Harper's concordance has much in favor of its recommendation.

It has a subject listing which omits many lesser important words. It does not attempt to be complete in the sense of giving every reference to every subject. It lists the major topics and the principal verses pertaining to each. There are more than 2,100 topics and 25,000 verses. Each topic includes a list of cross references to similar topics.

The work is nonsectarian. It should prove useful to pastors, teachers, and all diligent students of the King James Version of the Bible.—*Wilbur C. Lamm*

Dictionary of Ecclesiastical Terms

Canon J. S. Purvis (5n), \$6.50

As the title indicates, this is a dictionary of ecclesiastical terms intended to serve as a ready reference for the divinity student and for the more general reader. It should serve that purpose well.—*Owen F. Herring*

1010 Sermon Illustrations from the Bible

Charles L. Wallis (9h), \$3.95

It is not often that an anthology of sermon illustrations can be enthusiastically recommended for the creative minister. Among the exceptions is this volume edited by Charles L. Wallis. Feeling that a great many preachers use the Bible "in an incidental manner," Wallis has pointed to the wealth of sermon illustrations in Scripture. One thousand and ten biblical illustrations are arranged under

two hundred topics, listed alphabetically. The book's value is increased by a cross index which relates the illustrations to other topics and by a special index for "special day" sermons which lists the illustrations, according to the Christian and civic calendars. Wallis' work has value both for reference and inspiration.—*H. Gordon Clinard*

Theories of Learning in Christian Education

Robert Boehlke (8w), \$4.50

Dr. Boehlke describes representative theories of learning in Christian education. Then he explains the theological foundations for learning. He undertakes to relate the two, giving the weak and strong points of each theory of learning. The last chapter is devoted to the "creation-engagement" learning theory which, he says, means "the human learner and God are in active relationship at every point in the learning process" (p. 188).

Educators will do well to read this book. It provokes thought even if the reader does not agree with every line.—*Doris Cutter*

CHURCH HISTORY

Who Was Who in Church History

Elgin S. Moyer (29m), \$5.95

This biographical encyclopedia contains in alphabetical order brief biographical sketches of more than 1,750 people who have made significant contributions to the spread of Christianity and the development of the church. It does not, of course, contain data about Jesus or the disciples whose stories are told in the New Testament, but does have data from earliest days to the present.

The biographical sketches are, as the name implies, brief with no attempt at exhaustive biography or evaluation. It is, therefore, mainly of interest to the speaker or teacher who needs a ready source of information about important churchmen for illustrations or general use, but is not concerned with minute details.

This book represents many years of tedious work. It is exceedingly well done and is recommended as most helpful in all libraries.—*W. L. Borom*

Highlights of Early Church History

Rev. James W. Hervey (19e), \$3.50

The author has chosen four historical highlights—A.D. 100-200, Origin of the Old Catholic Church; A.D. 354, St. Augustine; A.D. 1073-1085, Pope Gregory VII (Hildebrand); A.D. 1182-1226, St. Francis of Assisi.

First, the author deals with "Special Problem of Second Century Christianity"; "Church's Constituency in Middle of Second Century"; "External Conflict of Christianity and Heathenism"; "Internal Conflict"; "Causes of Centralization"; and "Constrictive Activity of the Church." CAUTION: Baptists will not agree with author's logic in development of ecclesiastical hierarchy.

Second, the author deals with "St. Augustine—The Man, Times He Lived, Influences in His Awakening, Conversion, and Results." In his spiritual pilgrimage, Augustine surrendered, in position similar to Saul of Tarsus. Then even as a voice said, "Read the manuscript" and he turned and read Romans 13: 13-14—then it happened! "A serene light diffused itself through his heart . . . and peace was shed upon him."

Third, the author deals with "The Conception of the Papacy of Gregory VII (Hildebrand, 1073-1085)—the moral reformation of clergy and separated church from bondage of state.

Fourth, the author deals with "St. Francis' Idea of Christianity"—son of rich merchant in Assisi, denounced it for marriage to "Lady Poverty." Through gradual stages his conversion came, and he was able to say, "My Beloved is mine and I am his."

I recommend this book with great caution and warn reader against the validity of author's (who is Methodist) view of Catholic Church. The illustrative materials on Augustine and Francis of Assisi are excellent for the busy pastor and seeking layman!—*Don E. Dillow*

Great Moments in Church History

Frederick Norwood (1a), \$1.00

This little book title could well be "Great Movements in Christian History." It deals with such movements as Catholicism, Monas-

ticism, Intellectualism, Reformation, Puritanism, Methodism, Revivalism, Secularism, and Ecumenicalism.

Each great movement is introduced by a dramatic incident of human interest. The incident is somewhat typical of the movement, as well as introductory. For instance, the discussion of the great century of Christian missions is introduced by a vivid description of Carey's baptism of his first Indian convert, December 28, 1800.

The author laments that "for many Christians, events of the centuries between the time of Paul and the defiance of Martin Luther are nearly unknown." He declares that "study of these centuries provides the larger part of this book." Since these centuries comprise about three fourths of Christian history, it is only reasonable that such a book should give most space to them. Actually, events *since* Luther occupy a proportionately larger share of the book.

Here is a little treasury of readable information on historically important characters who have been only vague names to many. The speaker and writer on historical and religious themes will find here a surprising supply of illustrative material.

Many Baptists will not agree with the author in his zealous emphasis on the ecumenical movement, but he has the right to be heard—and read.—*George Redding*

The Reformation and Its Significance Today

Joseph C. McLelland (8w), \$2.25

The author's primary goal is to achieve a foundation of principles upon which the Reformation principles are applicable in our twentieth century. He makes this attempt by exalting the "humanity" of the sixteenth-century reformers and by analyzing the dimensions of faith which compelled their zealous lives and deaths.

In chapter 1, "New Wine in Old Skins," the author deals with church history as "church memory"; the papacy and mass; the printed word; the geopolitics of reformation; and the making of a reformer.

In chapters 2-6, the author gives a meticulous account, summarizing the lives of "Luther—Man of the Word"; "John Calvin and Mother Church"; "Peter Martyr—Servant of the Sacrament"; "John Knox and the Kingship of Christ"; and "Thomas Cranmer and

Our Common Prayers." The material is most illustrative, but this one criticism, i.e., there should be more documentary evidence listed.

In chapter 7, "The Counter-Church of Rome," the author portrays the development of the Roman Catholic Church from its foundation to papal infallibility with its inconsistencies, and its evil personified in false logic and nonscriptural authority.

In chapter 8, "Always Reforming," the author indicates that the church is never fully self-governing, but rather always ready to respond to divine instructions of Jesus Christ.

In chapter 9, "Liturgy—Reformation of Roman Catholicism," the Baptist reader should observe the Presbyterian concept of "sacrament of baptism" as a "sacrament of regeneration."

In chapters 10-14, the author's view of the reformer's significance today can be phrased: "The Servant Lord and His Servant People." "New life through obedience unto death" is the pattern to which twentieth-century Christianity is called.—*Don E. Dillow*

PASTORAL MINISTRY

Power in Expository Preaching

Faris D. Whitesell (6r), \$4.00

This is the latest of several high caliber books by the author, an eminent American Baptist seminary professor in homiletics. Believing that "communicating the gospel is the greatest of all privileges given to mortal man," he writes with the aim of stimulating expository preaching which is the highest type of biblical preaching, yet done the least and often quite poorly. Following the table of contents, the book shows that power in expository preaching may be found through motivation, diversification, explanation, organization, argumentation, illustration, application, imagination, preparation, and communication.

This book is the most practical the reviewer has read in this field; it literally abounds in illustrations, quotations, examples, and suggestions. The author's style is simple, yet forceful; and he makes frequent appeals to the Scriptures which he approaches with respect and balance. Additionally, he indicates that a preacher must depend upon the power of the Holy Spirit.

While there is little original material in this book, Dr. Whitesell has rendered a great service in compiling this material. I predict that it will quickly earn a valid place in the libraries of pastors and preaching students, along with college and seminary professors of preaching.—*Walter G. Nunn*

How to Have a Soul-Winning Church

Gene Edwards (Soul-Winning Publications), \$.250

Here is an excellent book. It is timely, for here is perhaps the greatest need of our present-day churches. It is well written, showing where we have failed in the past and some reasons for this failure. It then presents a method which can be adapted to any church, and which should produce wonderful results. The chapter entitled "A New Concept in Soul-winning Methods" lays down plans which could revolutionize soul-winning.

Every pastor should study this book. It should also stimulate laymen into activity for the Lord.—*Hylon Vickers*

Our Church Meeting Human Needs

James M. Carr (Progressive Farmer, Birmingham, Alabama), paper, \$1.00

The author, who has served as pastor and denomination leader, wrote the book to serve as a practical set of guide lines for church leaders. The book covers such areas as financing, planning, pastoral ministry, serving the total community, etc. Many reactions and case studies from the experience of the rural ministers fill the book. The book provides a wide and sweeping panorama of practical areas of church administration. Although the illustrations are not typically Southern Baptist, some profitable information is contained.—*Howard B. Fosbee*

With Heart and Mind

Kenneth L. Pike (1e), \$1.75

Dr. Pike draws from his own personal Christian experiences to speak to the reader about the proper relationship of true scholarship and a strong Christian faith. The author can speak with sufficient authority from both sides of a question that puzzles many to give much support to his discussion. The essays, most of which appeared originally as magazine articles,

do not really debate the question, but assume the position that one can be a true scholar or seeker after fact and still be firm in Christian faith.

In his work in the field of linguistics, Dr. Pike works with the Wycliffe Bible translators. He draws from his work in this field of interest to illustrate his essays. He speaks from a warm, rich Christian devotion and yet with authority from the scholastic point of view. Though some of us may not be able to follow him into one or two of his more technical essays, the reader will share with personal profit the problems the author faces with Christian hope. Excellent support for continued and increased missionary effort runs through the volume along with the central theme.—*Monroe Hopkins*

The Missionary Nature of the Church

Johannes Blauw (5m), \$3.95

This book is a critical survey and frank appraisal of what theologians of the last three decades have been saying with relevance on the subject of missions in respect to its biblical basis and motivation. The author, being a European, has used for his resources primarily the thought of eminent continental theologians. His closing chapter deals with his own theology of mission, which he says is a theology of the church as the people of God called *out* of the world, placed *in* the world, and sent *to* the world. His unique contribution to the theology of mission comes at the point of distinguishing between the centripetal force of Old Testament and New Testament mission.

The book has value not only for the student of missions, but for the Old and the New Testament student as well. It abounds in biblical interpretations, which is, for the most part, sound and constructive. The book is decidedly written for the student of theology. However, many laymen will be able to fathom much of the depth of this book.—*Clifton Courtney, Jr.*

The Dynamics of Church Growth

J. Waskom Pickett (1a), \$2.50

In this book *The Dynamics of Church Growth*, the author approaches the study of world missions in a positive manner. He gives

some points that are very refreshing and helpful, stating both the urgency and possibility of real mission expansion in the world. He also sets forth the tremendous challenge of such an expansion.

Imparting the Word

Iris V. Cully (8w), \$3.95

There has been a growing concern over the gap which exists between theology and religious education. The gap has been considerably narrowed by this book. *Imparting the Word* is a serious attempt to show how the findings of technical biblical scholarship can be related to Christian education.

In the first six chapters, the procedure is to summarize various positions of contemporary theology and to indicate how these can be communicated in the teaching ministry of the church.

The author includes in her summaries such topics as the Bible as revelation; its authority; textual, literary, and form criticism; the theme and unity of the Bible; and the use of myth in the Bible. The last four chapters are specifically concerned with means of imparting a proper appreciation and use of the Bible in the various services of the church.

Many Southern Baptists will not agree with all the book's theological positions, but all should appreciate its constructive approach. Indeed, one of the book's contributions is to show that contemporary theology is positive, and not negative, in its study of the Bible.

Those who prepare Bible teaching curricula, religious education directors, pastors, and seminarians will find this book deserves serious study.—*W. T. Edwards*

The Word in Worship

Thomas H. Keir (5-O), \$3.50

In this book, one is conscious of a fresh look at the reading and preaching of the Word of God in a church's regular service of worship. Unique, also, is the author's treatment of the congregation's response. While written by a minister of the Church of Scotland and based on the historic tradition of the Reformed Churches, it provokes thought in ministers of all religious groups.—*L. J. Newton, Jr.*

When the World Is On Fire

Hyman Appleman (1z), \$1.95

Beginning with a stirring message on the second coming of Christ and concluding with a message on "A New Evangelism," Mr. Appleman brings to the literary world a book of ten thought-provoking messages. These are powerful evangelistic and revival-centered messages. Among these was the excellent message on "Peace of God" and the "Failures of Jesus."

One would find this book both interesting and stimulating as well as presenting a great challenge. I believe this book will be widely accepted.—*B. Carter Elmore*

Stories for Pulpit and Platform

John B. Wilder (1z), \$1.95

My first impression was "not another book of illustrations!" As I read further, however, I found myself to be both pleased and helped.

Mr. Wilder has brought together, out of his wide experience as a pastor, more than 140 story illustrations which are in the main worthy, pointed, helpful, realistic, and documented. Several are from the unusual customs of his part of south Texas and prove quite interesting. I noted what I personally would consider only one fault: There are quite a few stories dealing with deathbed experiences which I personally could not use. However, these may prove helpful to many others.

A real strong point: The stories are told so interestingly one feels Mr. Wilder is sitting in one's living room telling the stories personally! I found I read the book at one sitting. I recommend this book to those who are searching for story illustrations to sparkle their addresses, as well as to young preachers as a case in point. (They need to begin collecting stories from their own experience.)

The book is relatively short (117 pages), but carries an attractive price of \$1.95—*R. M. Perkins*

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

Parliamentary Procedure

Byrl A. Whitney (7m), \$3.95

Particularly attractive features of this book are its small page size, its large type size, charts showing privileged and subsidiary motions according to rank, its glossary of terms,

and its clear explanation of proper motions to accomplish specific purposes.

Another interesting feature is a discussion of the use of modern techniques such as brainstorming, buzz sessions, and role-playing in parliamentary procedure.

This book would be helpful to all who preside over or participate in meetings which are conducted in an orderly manner.—*J. M. Crowe*

The Church Today

J. W. C. Wand (33p), 95 cents

This book is based on Christ as the pivotal center; and from that center, the church has three main concentric circles of work—the social, the constitutional, and the spiritual.

The author writes his book according to the dimensions of the three concentric circles, with Christ as the center. In Part I, the author deals with the "Church in Society" through public welfare, church and culture, and church and politics. Part II, "The Constitution of the Church" deals with growth of organization, diversity, Anglican view, expansion, types of constitution, and return to unity. The author omits pointedly in "types of constitution" the "congregational: polity as a type of constitution." Part III, "The Soul of the Church" deals with church in idea, function of church in worship and evangelism, inner life of church, authority of church, and the genius of church. Part IV, "Some Special Questions" deals with relation to church history, origin of ministry, tradition, and way of salvation.

Caution on author's stereotyped Anglicanism of the church, authority of bishops, sacraments, prayer and origin of ministry. These would not be accepted by Southern Baptists, even those who are basically classified as "conservatives" with an open mind.—*Don E. Dillow*

Handbook of Church Administration

Lowell Ditzen (9m), \$7.00

Though recommended with reservation because many references, examples, and terms used are not in keeping with Baptist policy and educational procedures, this book can be a valuable reference to the discerning administrator.

Ideas of benefit can be gained from the discussions on organization, activities and programs, personnel, building and furnishing, grounds, records, office procedures, civil matters, and public relations.

The tone of the book throughout can be described in the words of the author in his opening paragraphs—"Efficient administration of the church can undergird its spiritual purpose . . . administration is an inescapable necessity."—*Idus V. Owensby*

A Practical Church Administration Handbook

Norman E. Mygaard (66b), \$1.95

This small book is a compilation of pamphlets the author has prepared on specific administrative areas in churches he has served as administrative consultant and Presbyterian minister.

This reviewer sees merit in seven of the twelve proposals. Most every church administrator would find help in the following: *Proven Methods for Publicizing Your Church* covers well a needed area for most churches; *Handbook for Church Calling* gives emphasis to a church visitation program; *Integrating New Members and Greeting Strangers* can always be used; *The Handbook for Church Usbers* will help these men do a better job; the flower committee will be helped by *Bringing the Flower Seasons into Your Church*; those in charge of food services will welcome *How to Serve a Church Dinner Speedily and Easily*; and the drama group can use *How to Costume Biblical Play Inexpensively*.—*Idus V. Handbook of Advanced Secretarial Techniques

Eds. of Prentice-Hall (20p), \$7.50

This is a "How To" book for the secretary. The major divisions cover subject area in complete detail such as: (1) "The secretary and the outside world," which includes human and public relations and special events, (2) "The secretary and office management" includes office machines, office layouts, office practices, and supervisory responsibilities, (3) "The secretary and the printed word" includes the many aspects of reporting and printing processes, and (4) "The secretary and executives finances" outlines the basic principles of bookkeeping.

Written for the business executive secretary, this book can be a valuable resource for the church secretary.—*Idus V. Owensby*

Handbook of Church Correspondence

G. Curtis Jones (9m), \$5.00

This *Handbook of Church Correspondence* presents a wide array of sample letters illustrating the many areas of church correspondence. Only two chapters and the brief appendix are devoted to instructions in basic letter construction. Copying samples to improve written communication skills is like painting the pump to make the water taste better—it looks good, but fails to get to the source of the problem. Letter writing skills must be learned through mastering the basics of logic, vocabulary, grammar, syntax, and sequence. Sincerity—a necessary prerequisite to written communication—cannot be gleaned from a sample letter. The examples chosen are often weak and institutional.—*Ralph C. Atkinson, Jr.*

SERMONS AND SERMON OUTLINES

Expository Sermons on Revelation

W. A. Criswell (1z), \$2.95

About seventeen years ago the author began preaching through the Bible by taking one verse at a time and preaching an expository sermon from it. This book covers the first nineteen verses of Revelation 1.

These sermons are not the result of a carefully written manuscript, but come from tape recordings of sermons as they were delivered in the pulpit without notes.

Dr. Criswell declares that we are in the plan, program, and unfolding of the consummation of the age—now. "It is not something far off; the time is at hand." He often compares the various theories held concerning this great book. He then states his theory and points out why he thinks it is correct. One may not agree in theology but there is much to get from the fire and the fervor of our friend. Pastors would do well to read the book in their sermon preparation. Laymen would receive much inspiration.—*Ben Broadway*

Sermons on the Holy Spirit

Hyman Appelman (66b), \$1.00

Seven messages of Hyman Appelman are here combined into the little volume, *Sermons on the Holy Spirit*. Even though the Holy Spirit is supposed to be the central subject, several only allude to him. The sermons are helpful. Several are well illustrated with the author's own unique experiences, but several are devoid of any illustrations.

The book will be helpful to many laymen and to some ministers. There is little originality or "sparkle" in several of the messages even though much needed truth is presented in all.—*I. B. Hall*

Sermons on the Holy Spirit

Hyman Appelman (66b), \$1.00

The author, an excellent preacher, has prepared in book form for the minister and layman alike an excellent series of seven sermons on the Holy Spirit. These sermons deal with the work of the Holy Spirit, the power of the Holy Spirit, the effect the Holy Spirit has on the Christian's life, the theology of the Holy Spirit, and the conviction brought by the Holy Spirit.

These sermons are helpful for personal reading and source material.—*Carter Elmore*

What Think Ye of Christ?

W. B. Walker (66b), \$1.00

This is a volume of eight sermons with the final chapter bearing the title of the book. Mr. Walker deals with such subject matter as soul-winning, the Holy Spirit, salvation, responsibility, and Jesus.

The sermons are short in content but very strong in subject matter.—*Carter Elmore*

Seven Words of Men Around the Cross

Paul L. Moore (1a), \$2.00

The book consists of seven sermons, each based on a statement made at the cross by individuals other than Jesus. These sermons are of an inspirational nature, and the author's aim is to lead the reader to practical insights that he can apply to his own life. The sermons are sound, easy to read, and delightfully interspersed with many anecdotes and illustrations. This book should be of special interest to pastors searching for ideas for Lenten and Easter messages.—*Robert Barnes*

Simple Sermons on the Christian Life

W. Herschel Ford (1z), \$1.95

Dr. Ford has added again to the distinctive list of "Single Sermons." These messages on the Christian life touch such areas as "The Christian and His Love, His Life, His Sin, His Sorrow, and His Future Prospects." Three sermons on the "The Potter and the Clay" complete the book. These well-illustrated sermons bring pointed truths of the Scripture that are impressive to both minister and layman alike.

The excellent method of outlining used by Dr. Ford and the "down-to-life" approach make this volume very helpful.—*I. B. Hall*

Stewardship Sermon Outlines

Burris Butler (17s), \$1.00

This is a book of sermon outlines by the author and numerous others having to do with Christian stewardship.

The outlines are simple and show some originality, even though such a ready-made outline which can be torn from the book will not appeal to the minister who feels he must strive for originality.

One feels that these outlines would be very mediocre when lifted out of the book and preached by another.

Possibly some young and inexperienced pastors would find help here, but most mature pastors would not be interested.—*I. B. Hall*

Simple Sermons for Funeral Services

W. Herschel Ford (1z), \$1.50

Simple Sermons for Funeral Services is another work from the prolific pen of W. Herschel Ford, pastor, First Baptist Church, El Paso, Texas. This book consists of eight messages. They are (1) For a Christian man; (2) For a Christian woman; (3) For one who has met with a tragic death; (4) For a baby or a small child; (5) For an aged Christian; (6) For a Christian woman; (7) For an unsaved person; and (8) For a Christian man. These messages present the Christian gospel in fine fashion. They are full of hope and assurance of personal immortality. Various Scripture verses are appealed to and many apt illustrations are interspersed throughout the book. This work should prove helpful to pastors and lay workers alike.—*Bradford Curry*



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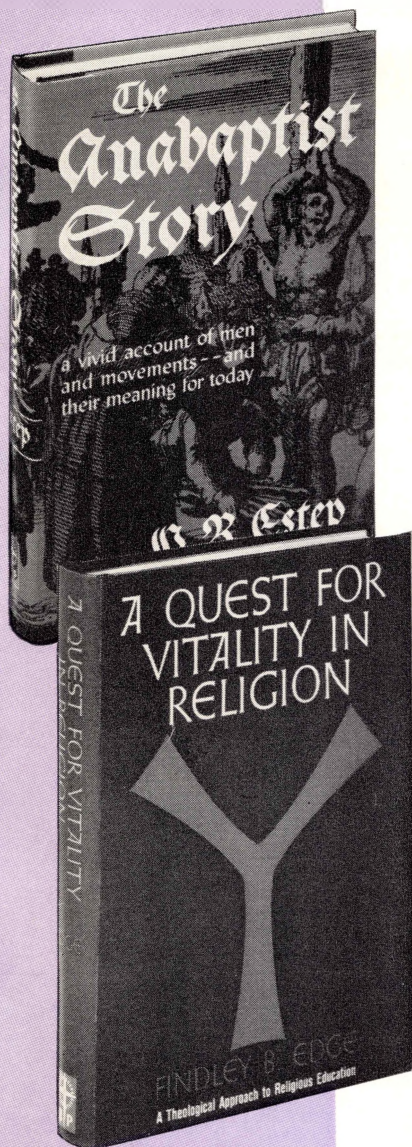
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
