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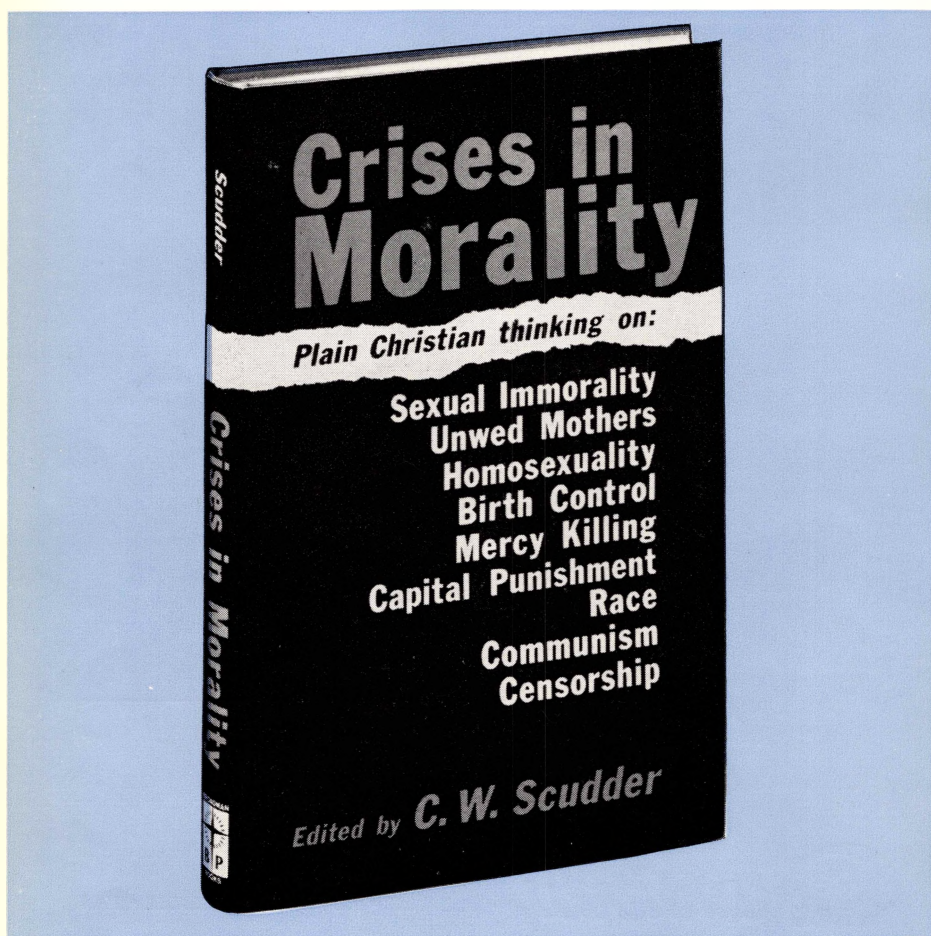
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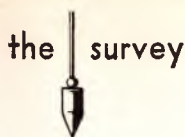

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Where Do Pastors Go When They Leave a Church?

THIS QUESTION PRESENTS an opportunity to explore a subject of increasing interest among Southern Baptists. Question thirty-one of the Uniform Church Letter to the Association, 1963, read as follows:

When a pastor *last* left your church, did he (circle one number):

1. —become pastor elsewhere?
2. —take church or denominational position *other than as pastor*?
3. —take full-time secular work?
4. —have other reason (retired, death, etc.)?

(Answers under 4 above likely include pastors leaving a church to enter school full time, part-time school, and part-time secular, etc.)

It should be remembered that we are *not* talking about *frequency* of pastors leaving, but the position or status they assumed *when they left* a church. The time elapsed since a pastor left a church is unknown and could be anywhere from a few weeks to many years. Since the average pastorate duration is approximately three years, this information essentially refers to the last few years.

The Response

For the analysis, churches who responded to the question have been grouped by location (e.g., city, town, open country, etc.) and by age of state convention¹ (older, more established conventions or newer conventions).

Churches in the older, more established state conventions responded to the question better than those in the newer areas, 77.0 per cent and 69.5 per cent respectively. (See Table I.) The lowest responding groups (by location) in both the established and newer state conventions were the open country churches and the large city suburban churches. The highest responding group in both categories of conventions was the group classified as located in a "town."

It is possible that many churches still have their first pastor. This might help explain the lower response in the newer areas and some of the nonresponse in all conventions and locations.

¹Since the Maryland State Convention includes some pioneer areas and is a small convention it is included in the category "newer conventions."

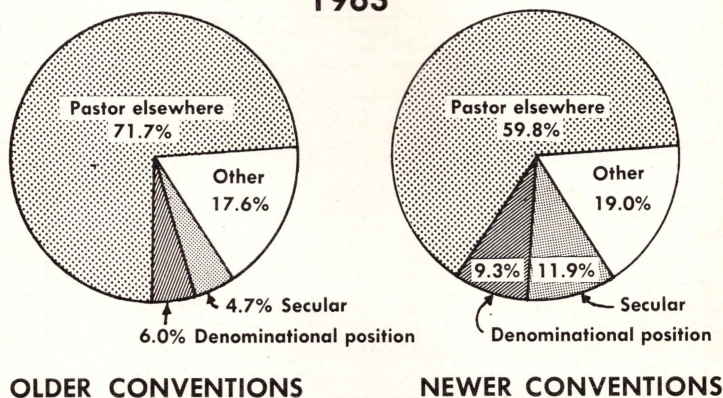

Where Did Pastors Go?

The pastors in older, more established state conventions, left to accept another pastorate in a higher percentage of instances than did pastors from the newer conventions. Thus, we found that a higher percentage of pastors from the newer areas left pastorates to enter other denominational work, secular work, or for other reasons. (See Figure 1 and Table II.)

The 15 Older Conventions (see page 8)

By location of church (open country, town, etc.), the large city downtown churches had the smallest percentages of pastors leaving to accept other pastorates (62.5 per cent), and the highest percentage going into denominational work other than pastoral duties (15.2 per cent). These two facts might partly be explained from the mundane point of view that by pastoring the large city downtown church the pastor felt he had reached the height of his original vocational calling. Doubtless, the leadership such pastors have exhibited is good reason, and places them in good position for their consideration by denominational organizations.

The large city downtown church, as many would guess, had the smaller percentage of pastors leaving to go into full-time secular work (2.6 per cent). An opposite fact is found for the large city suburban churches which had the largest portion going into full-time secular work (7.7 per cent).

The 12 Newer Conventions (see page 8)

The findings here are similar to those of the older state conventions regarding reasons for leaving, by location of church. The large city downtown churches had the lowest percentage of pastors leaving to go into other pastoral jobs (51.0 per cent), and the highest percentage (13.3) going into denominational work other than the pastorate. A significant finding which is also true of the older state conventions, but not yet mentioned, is that open country churches showed the smallest percentage of pastors leaving to enter denominational work other than the pastorate.

Also a significant fact is that characteristically the newer areas had a higher percentage of pastors in all church location categories leaving to enter full-time secular work than did the more established conventions.

THEOLOGY

A Systematic Theology of the Christian Religion

James Oliver Buswell (1z), \$6.95

Being the second of a two-volume study, this book deals with soteriology and eschatology; the first dealt with theism and anthropology. It is written from the conservative and premillennial point of view and, as the author states, "one's eschatology determines his philosophy of history" and, thus, his system of doctrine.

This work is "beamed" at students, ministers, and Christian laymen; and its style could almost be characterized as that of a study course book.

Though this is not a definitive treatise, it is a book I am glad to have in my library, along with others. The author draws heavily from such authors as Charles Hodge and A. T. Robertson, as well as various catechisms, confessions, and creeds in presenting his theology. Great use is made of the Scriptures.

The Immobilized Christian

John R. Fry (8w), \$4.00

This is a small but powerful book written, so the author avows, to the private individual whose inner being is frozen like filings between the poles of conflicting forces, immobilized in his inner thought and exterior actions. This is not a book of irrelevant answers to impossible questions—as so many so-called Christian ethics books turn out to be. Here is rather a bold strike aimed at all of us (who talk a good game but stay out of the arena) in the hope that we can "re-envision possibilities for the performance of contemporary germane Christian ethics." The author desires to hit those whom so much of contemporary Christian ethics has missed, and I believe the writer has struck the bull's eye. Fry puts it this way: "The Christian public is largely aware only of bucolic-type ethics," and there is, by the way, another kind.

A casual reading of the book will enable one to discover a multitude of shocking, captivating, moving illustrations of the web of contradiction and immobility in which most of us struggle for awhile, but eventually surrender. A casual reading, however, is not sufficient. A careful reading should suggest a complete reorientation and redirection for Christian ethicists with the challenge to desist from telling the already immobilized Christian what he *cannot* do or even what he *can* do, but rather that he can do something.

This is an excellent, stimulating work that ought to be widely circulated and carefully read.

My single criticism is the author's choice of the term "Privacy" which is, it seems to me, misleading. But after all, this is a small point. I especially commend this book to those who are genuinely concerned with the ethical dilemmas of our day.—Alan Preston Neely

Morality and Beyond

Paul Tillich (9h), \$2.75

This little book is one volume in a series on religious perspectives which represents a quest for the rediscovery of man. Since modern man is threatened by a world created by himself, it is hoped that the rediscovery of man will point to the rediscovery of God. This particular volume deals with "how the moral is related to the religious."

The subject matter of the first three chapters is "religious principles of moral action." "The first deals with the religious dimension of the moral imperative, the second with the religious source of the moral demands, and the third with the religious element in moral motivation." The last two chapters discuss the transmoral conscience and ethics in a changing world.

This book is thought provoking and challenging. The author's treatment of the place of love in the morals and ethics of our day is excellent. He insists that morals are not determined by a set of rules but must spring from our natures as they are influenced by God.—Ben F. Broadway.

An Introductory Theological Word Book

Cully and Cully (8w), \$2.25

This book is just what its title affirms. It is a treatment of theological and religious terms in alphabetical order. Some words are biblical, but many are not found in the Bible—rather they relate to Christian teaching.

This work is intended for readers who are not trained theologically. It is written in a popular vein and makes for clear, light, easy, and sound reading.

The treatment of various terms is done fairly. It will prove helpful and inoffensive to Baptist readers.

For quick insight into meaning of theological words, from "Adoption" to "Wrath," this book will perform a worthy service.—*Wilbur C. Lamm*

The Christian Opportunity

Denis De Rougemont (20h), \$4.50

This book is a refreshing stream of hope in the modern desert of religious and cultural frustration. In it a deeply spiritual Swiss intellectual matches loyalty to Christ against the worldliness which threatens to engulf the Christian heritage.

Outstanding is his statement of the Christian answer to secularism, the crisis of home life, the degradation of art, and to cultural materialism. Without glossing over the sins of a profit-mad capitalist society, he probes the basic and self-defeating nature of communism, showing how it, and not Christianity, is guilty of offering "pie in the sky." When a man is converted to Christianity, he says, "Suddenly the kingdom is within him. . . . What Marx saw only at the end of an historical process, he already possesses: the *person*. And then he proceeds to attack the world." This makes the Christian the true revolutionary. "The action of the Christian never begins with prudent consideration of the forces he believes he can muster, but with what God wants him to do."

The author indicates how the ecumenical movement must clean house and emphasize diversity within unity instead of the present watered-down uniformity which condemns no sin except non-co-operation and compromises all individual values and virtues.

No discerning Christian can read this book and fail to be challenged and encouraged

to persevere in his effort to rise to the true potential of the Christian vocation.—*B. F. Smith*

The Half-Known God

Lorenz Wunderlich (21c), \$1.95

This little volume is a very delightful study in the person and work of the Holy Spirit. The style is plain and easy to read with very little, hard to understand theological words which make it a good book for laymen. The little volume is wholly based on the Bible, which is quoted all the way through. There is nothing, in my opinion, in this book that will in the least way be offensive to what most Baptists believe. The author covers the subject very well within the limits of a short work. With such a small amount of literature on the nature and work of the Holy Spirit, I suggest our Book Stores carry this volume.—*James F. Tisdell*

The Kingdom of God in the Teaching of Jesus

Gosta Lundstrom (5k), \$7.50

This book will undoubtedly go down as one of the all-time classics on the subject of the kingdom of God. Beginning with Albrecht Ritschl's interpretation of the kingdom of God, the author skilfully brings forth a comprehensive study of the great theological minds from the eighteen-nineties down to current thought. Literally hundreds of sources are used. If anyone suspects that the book is overly technical, let him erase this impression. It is exceptionally readable, brilliantly written, and logically concluded.

It is my impression that the book will become a standard text in colleges and seminaries. The twenty-five page postscript is very helpful in contemporizing the subject. I have nothing but praise for the style, content, and readability. Get this book!—*Andrew M. Hall*

Word and Faith

Gerhard Ebeling (48f), \$6.25

Serious students of theology in general and biblical theology in particular will appreciate this volume of essays by the successor to Emil Brunner at the University of Zurich in Switzerland. Ebeling discusses in these eighteen essays the major topics under consideration by present-day theology. He moves swiftly through the vast historical and biblical studies of the past and present.

Professor Ebeling's wide study appears at once in his profuse use of references and footnotes in each essay. While he is a bit difficult to follow at times, the translation is clear in following his thought. He states that he is moved by the dynamic that the task of biblical interpretation "consists for theology in nothing else but in understanding the *gospel* as addressed to the *contemporary man*" (his italics) and that he is committed to the tension he finds between the tasks of theology and proclamation. Professor Ebeling not only will command a serious study, he is worthy of such study.—R. M. Perkins, Jr.

Pharisaism and Christianity

Hugo Odeberg (21c), \$1.75

This book is a study of the similarities and differences between Christianity and Pharisaism. One basic contention of the author is that the differences between Christianity and Pharisaism frequently have been exaggerated and at other times wrongly stated. He concludes that much in Christianity is not really Christianity at all, but Pharisaism. His concern is also to clarify the real distinction between Christianity and Pharisaism. This reviewer is tempted to argue with the author at several minor points, dogmatic assertions, and generalizations. However, such argument would not accomplish very much since he regards Mr. Odeberg's basic contentions as valid. Ministers should find the book very stimulating; and although it may require the revision of some sermons, the end result will be beneficial.—E. Earl Joiner

The Old Testament and Christian Faith

Edited by Bernhard W. Anderson (9h), \$5.50

This book is a collection of essays by outstanding scholars concerning the relevance of the Old Testament to the Christian faith. Among the contributors are such men as Rudolf Bultmann, G. Ernest Wright, and Emil Brunner. There are thirteen articles which are divided as chapters in the book. Including the introduction entitled "The Old Testament as a Christian Problem" and a selected bibliography and index at the conclusion, there are 271 pages. Several interesting chapters

are "Bultmann Against Marcion" by Carl Michalson of Drew University and "History and Reality" by G. Ernest Wright. "The New Covenant and the Old" by Bernhard Anderson was especially interesting to this reviewer.

Graduate students will find this book very stimulating. The average Southern Baptist layman and probably the average Southern Baptist preacher will find little to interest them. Many questions are raised in which most people are not particularly interested. Seminary students grappling with intellectual problems will find this book helpful. Indeed those who are interested in depth study in Old Testament materials will welcome this as an outstanding contribution.

It is an excellent book. Every thoughtful student of theology should have it in his personal library.—Fred M. Wood

The Neglected Factor

Eric Baker (1a), \$2.25

The Neglected Factor is a very timely and fresh treatise of old familiar passages of Scripture. In the opening chapter Dr. Baker reminds the reader that "a serious attempt is being made to keep religion and morality apart." Religion deals with man's relation to God, and morality with his relation to other people. It is not correct to assume that religious and moral activity can remain independent of each other. "If religion bows out of the door, morality soon disappears through the window."

The thesis, the need for reunion of religion and morality, runs through the book. If we, as Christians, are going to make an impact on the world, our lives must exemplify what we believe as far as Christ our Redeemer is concerned. In the second part of the book, the author uses the Beatitudes to show that truth, goodness, religion, and morality are integral parts of the gospel. Each chapter is a brief gem on the subject. It deals with the materials from a fresh point of view. The mourners are capable of sorrow because they care. All of the ethical virtues find their consummation in purity of heart. The peacemakers are not the sentimental or easygoing, but they are those disciples of Jesus who "made peace by the blood of His cross."

Part three, "Conclusion," deals with the importance of incorporating Christian ethics with Christian theology. Christian ethics

and Christian theology are alike. This is the message the church should proclaim. The book is excellently written, has a warm appeal, and is easy to read. I recommend it without reservation.—*B. C. Tschudy*

Man in the New Testament

Werner Georg Kummel (8w), \$2.95

Usually monographs are so brief that they tend to be superficial or so extensive that they become tedious. Rarely does one find the combination of brevity and depth that Professor Kummel has achieved in his *Man in the New Testament* (a translation of a book published in German in 1948). The development employed by the writer is along the familiar pattern of viewing the subject from the four perspectives of the Synoptic Gospels, the writings of Paul, the Johannine writings, and the remainder of the New Testament. The reader will be misled if he considers the lack of originality exhibited in the chapter divisions to be characteristic of the text. There is no veneer, no superficiality in this book. Rather, there is hard, careful thinking and exciting treatment of a critical subject.

Likely some readers will be agitated by the critical method employed by the writer in his analysis of various Scripture passages, and doubtless others will violently disagree with the author's view of unredeemed man. But no one who reads this work carefully will fail to review and rethink for himself what the New Testament declares about man.

Surely the impulse and imperative to Christian witness depends not only on "what think ye of Christ," but also on "what think ye of man" to whom Christ came and for whom Christ died.—*Alan Preston Neely*

Karl Barth's Table Talk

John D. Godsey (5k), \$1.75

Imagine Karl Barth, one of the world's truly great theologians, with a few students about him at the dinner table. After a delightful time of fellowship, one of the students reads a paper on some facet of Barth's thought. The theologian then comments on the paper and answers questions dealing with it. The value of such an intimate learning process is immediately grasped by any serious student.

Karl Barth's Table Talk gives its readers the opportunity to join in the informal bi-

weekly dinner meetings which Barth arranged for years at Basil for his Anglo-Saxon students. The meetings were first held in Barth's home but, when the crowd grew larger, were later moved to a private room at the University. In the present volume the reader can participate in discussions dealing with Barth's *Church Dogmatics* as to architecture of his basic work and his doctrine of "the Word of God." In addition, discussions on baptism, revelation, and the relation of church and state are shared. The delightful personality of Barth discovered in his recent lectures in the United States is all the more confirmed, and valuable insights into his thoughts are gained.

The book will have maximum value for those who are already somewhat acquainted with Barth.—*H. Gordon Clinard*

Them He Glorified

Bernard Ramm (1e), \$3.25

This is a systematic study of the doctrine of glorification.

There are eight chapters which appear to be lectures given by the author. In the first four he sets forth the idea that God is a God of glory; that Jesus Christ is the Lord of glory; that God intends to share his glory with his children in the form of their glorification; and that our present salvation, already begun, is a process which shall terminate in the end-time, eschatological glory.

The remaining chapters are given to the details of this final glorification. To show forth this final glorification the author discusses: The Glorification of the Soul; The Glorification of the Body; The Glorification and The New Jerusalem; and Glorification as Glorious Existence. He gives a select bibliography and, also, an index of authors along with an index of Scripture passages and subjects. The theological approach is conservative and will be acceptable to most Baptists. The entire book will prove helpful to the busy pastor and also to the Sunday school teacher.—*D. D. Smothers*

The Abolition of God

Hans-Gerhard Koch (48f), \$3.75

This is a thoughtful and penetrating book on atheistic ideology. Its roots lie deep in materialistic philosophy. The author gives a reasoned, convincing answer to this misleading

ideology. The best part of the book consists of the Christian answer to atheistic philosophy. This is a deep book. It will appeal mainly to those of a philosophical turn of mind and to those who are interested in defeating atheism.—C. Aubrey Hearn

PASTORAL MINISTRY

Beginning Your Ministry

Samuel M. Shoemaker (9h), \$3.00

This is a much needed work by a competent writer, most of whose works are directed toward the ministry. The author takes the sequence of the ministry beginning with enrolment in the seminary right on down to graduation, and the first pastoral relationships. Problems confronted in the decision to enter the ministry; first impressions; questions upon entrance; disillusion upon first contacts with teachers, visiting pastors, and students; and the relationships forced upon his wife—all come up for treatment. He gives a generous evaluation of the minister's resources; he looks at the parish and the problems in administration, and at meeting the needs of the community with the church program. Others included are preaching, co-operation, and leadership.

In general, this is an excellent treatment of the subject. Shoemaker begins far from the average Baptist pastor, however. His beginning ministry comes before he reaches the seminary. There are some pertinent suggestions in chapter 9, "Some Pointers About Preaching," which the beginning preacher will find helpful. Naturally one would find areas of disagreement here, but the credits outweigh the liabilities.—Lee Gallman

The Christian Pastor

Wayne E. Oates (8w), \$5.00

A "revised and enlarged" edition of an older book is usually cast aside as of no particular value. This book should not receive such treatment. The very fact that it is a revision of a 1951 edition of a good book in the constantly expanding field of pastoral care should elicit a careful reading of its contents. Here is a book both philosophical and practical, both a reference book and a handbook, profoundly

foundational in its discussion of the theological and biblical bases for the science of shepherding, and a useful and workable guide for the pastor as he gives himself to this ministry of shepherding.

Two chapters in the book are worth the price of the whole book. The first is chapter 4, "The Identity and Integrity of the Pastor." The author explains: "This is a shift from a task-oriented, work-centered meaning of the existence of the Christian pastor to an identity-centered and being-centered integrity of the pastor." The other is chapter 7, "The Deeper Levels of Pastoral Care."

The appendices are helpful, especially the one which is a selected and descriptive bibliography of books that can be read in a systematic program of reading on this general subject.—James Basden

The Reformed Pastor

Richard Baxter (5k), \$1.50

The Reformed Pastor is a paperback reprint of a larger work of the noted English cleric Richard Baxter (1615-1691). Baxter represents Puritanism at its best, and also in its deepest meaning. "Reformed pastor" means recalled or rededicated to faithful service; and if this were to be accomplished, it would be reflected in the lives of the people as well as in the life of the minister.

Basically, the book is setting forth the work and calling of the ministry as well as the ministry of the church. This same material can be found in many other writings. However, the book has value from two viewpoints. (1) The phraseology of the period and their means of expressing themselves have great value to the modern minister. (2) The problems and burdens of the modern-day ministry are not new, because the minister in the day of Richard Baxter faced the same type of problems. From this little book (126 pages) one receives many encouragements.

This would be a fine book of devotional reading for any pastor.—Doyle L. Lumpkin

The Relevance of Preaching

Pierre Marcel (66b), \$2.95

The Relevance of Preaching is a clarion call to the preacher to review the call of his ministry of proclaiming the Word and to a world dedicated more and more to a theology of

dialectical materialism, and dedicated to a philosophy of ceremonies induced into our churches under the guise of worship. Much of the straying from the preaching relating to the matter at hand is in fear of offending anyone, and the desire to influence greater numbers. If this straying is not thwarted, we shall gradually creep back to the Dark Ages, as Mr. Marcel infers.—*Quenten M. Boyd*

A Protestant Approach to the Ministry

John E. Cantelon (8w), \$1.95

This is a scholarly work which contains a great deal of information which will be helpful to those in the field of campus ministry. It is broad enough to be helpful to college pastors, Christians in the field of education, and to student ministers on or adjacent to the campus.

The book is highly ecumenical in its approach. It is virtually devoid of any helpful suggestions to denominational approaches to the problem. Indeed, this is a part of the author's thesis—to do the Christian work on the campus in a united way.

The author makes it clear that Church and university need the mutual support that comes from continual dialogue between them. The Church furnishes the illumination by faith, and the university challenges the Church from its parochial smugness.

The book can be read with much profit to the reader. It is a bit academic in spots, but this is not detrimental to the over-all theme of the book.—*Andrew M. Hall*

Filing Your Sermon Ideas

Paul L. Clem (1a), \$1.00

For the pastor who likes to use his own ideas for filing materials, this little book offers some excellent suggestions for organizing a personal file.

A definite program of filing provides the remedy for the "hole in the bucket" of sermon ideas and helps.

The simplicity, flexibility, and economy of the suggestions presented will be welcomed by the busy pastor who has experienced the loss of ideas because they were not written down and filed.—*Idus V. Owensby*

You Have a Ministry

R. Eugene Sterner (45w), \$1.50

This book should be as widely distributed as possible. It describes and illustrates the kind of Christian motivation that promotes fellowship and unity within the church and moves out into the daily life of each Christian. This book could add a new dimension to the thinking of an ordained person in his Christian responsibility. The author seeks to show that no Christian is exempt from the responsibility of accounting to God for his life's witness. In this sense every believer has a ministry for Christ.—*Stanley J. Watson*

COUNSELING

Bachelor of Divinity

Walter D. Wagoner (18a), \$3.50

All those concerned with the supply of spiritual leadership for the churches and the boards and agencies of the various denominations will want to read this very intriguing volume.

With frankness, and with very penetrating insight, Wagoner examines first the forces "impinging" upon the young people who are considering the ministry as their lifework. He then focuses on the role of the seminaries in preparing young people for the exacting demands of spiritual leadership today. A closing section deals with the nature of the ministry and the meaning of ordination.

Wagoner is not awed or paralyzed by all the critical "sociological thunder and cultural lightening in contemporary literature." He recognizes the need for some group or organizational structure to carry forward the assignment given to the church.—*Allen W. Graves*

Counseling the Childless Couple

William T. Bassett (20p), \$2.95

The title of this book may suggest to the pastor a type of counseling situation which he will not encounter often in his ministry. According to the author, the pastor is more likely to come upon this problem than he realizes. This book has many strengths. It

sets forth a detailed study of the causes of sterility and gives case illustrations which a minister can use as he seeks to help people understand the nature of sterility. In a sense, the book is more technical than others in this series. This is not a condemnation of the book; it rather points out the quality of work which the author has done. The annotated bibliography and the lists of biblical references and of pertinent literature available will be very helpful to the pastor who wants to perform at his best in the matter of counseling the childless couple.

The chapter on artificial insemination and the chapter on "Attitude of the Sterile Couple" will be very helpful to the pastor who must help his counselees to face up to these contemporary problems.

I recommend this book and welcome it to the series of successful pastoral counseling.—*James Basden*

The Christian Understanding of Human Nature

W. Norman Pittenger (8w), \$3.75

The material in this book has been given as lectures in the United States, Puerto Rico, England, and Australia. So, it is presented in good, well-organized form. The writer emphasizes the importance of studying the nature of man. He says that this is the key to understanding God, the world, etc. In the introduction the author raises the question, "What is man?" After giving numerous answers to this question, he says that the Christian's understanding of man does not contradict any of the truths propounded about man; it only insists that these definitions are partial, limited, and nothing like adequate to the rich reality of the being whom they seek to describe. The material is presented in ten chapters. The explanation of man's nature is sound, according to the biblical message about man, and is based on a good understanding of psychology and philosophy.

There seems to be a renewed interest in understanding man, so this is a book that should be read. Though it is scholarly, it is presented in simple, understandable language. This book should have a special appeal to the psychological emphasis in our time. It is a book that every Baptist should read.—*Hudson Baggett*

Theology and Pastoral Counseling

Edward E. Thornton (20p), \$2.95

The author defines, with amazing clarity, the central purpose of pastoral care and counseling in terms of pastoral theology. No attempt is made to state a "theological creed" to which every counselor must subscribe. Likewise, no attempt is made to set forth a particular school of psychotherapy for the theologian who wants to be a successful counselor. Thornton seeks not for agreement or disagreement, but for stimulation to the reader to think clearly on theology and pastoral care, the interpenetrating disciplines of the successful counseling pastor.—*James Basden*

Group Counseling

Joseph W. Knowles (20p), \$2.95

The book begins with a definitive discussion of a group counseling and the group counselor, and moves to the practical aspects of the formation of the counseling group and holding the initial meeting, and then to the processes and dynamics of group counseling.

The author's basic assumption is that group counseling is an integral part of the ministry of the church. I recommend it for its freshness of idea, its incisive insights, and its usable methodology.—*James Basden*

Grandparents and Their Problems

Dr. Frank Howard Richardson (7m), \$2.95

Every grandparent in the whole world should read and assimilate every word of this book! The advice is excellent for grandparents in many difficult situations. The advice is also excellent for the sons and daughters and grandchildren. There are twenty-three chapters. Here are the titles of some of them: "How to Be a Happy Grandparent"; "Some Things Grandparents Should Know About Their Grandchildren"; "What A Child Should Expect from His Grandparents"; "How Long the Visits?" "Some Slants for Grandparents"; and "Seven Rules for Grandparents."

I recommend this very practical book!—*Mrs. Agnes Pylant*

Sexual Ethics

Sherwin Bailey (9m), \$1.45

Sexual Ethics, a Christian view by Sherwin Bailey, was formerly published as *Common Sense About Sexual Ethics*. Dr. Bailey is chancellor of Wells Cathedral and former study secretary of the Church of England Moral Welfare Council.

An earlier book by him, *The Mystery of Love and Marriage*, has become a classic for students seeking an understanding of the nature of Christian marriage. In the present volume, he traces the traditional Western ideas and attitudes, out of which many present understandings and misunderstandings have emerged. Following this historical perspective, Dr. Bailey sets forth the principles of sexual ethics. His chapters are "The Meaning of Sex," "Sexual Relation and Obligation," "Coition," "Love," and "Marriage." The chapters are carefully and concisely written, and are full of material helpful especially to persons who lead conferences or guide study groups for young people. The author goes on to explore the implications of his principles for such problems as chastity, contraception, and divorce and remarriage.—*Ellis M. Bush*

Look for the Stars

Rev. Henry E. White, Jr. (12c), \$2.50

Henry White is pastor of the Gate Street Baptist Church, Corinth, Mississippi. He has written this book out of experience as a pastor in ministering to persons who have lost loved ones. Through this book he seeks to broaden his ministry to the bereaved. He points them to God's understanding, comfort, and strength. He points us to the hope we have in the resurrection and to God's ability to bring good out of a time of despair. The chapters are enriched with carefully selected passages from the Bible, appropriate hymns, and poems. It would make a fine gift book to a bereaved person.—*Ellis Bush*

Profiles of Church Youth

Merton P. Strommen (21c), \$5.95

This book is the result of an intensive study entered into by four Lutheran groups: American Lutheran, Evangelical Lutheran, Lutheran

Free, and United Evangelical Lutheran. The purpose of the study was to discover critical facts about their young people such as: their concerns and problems, the help they want, their religious beliefs and practices, their evaluation of the church youth group, the obstacles they see as chief hindrances to Christian living, their values, delinquency, church attendance by the youth, and their sense of vocation and mission in life.

The study was made exclusively of Lutheran youth. Of course this places some limitations on the value of the study to other Christian groups. However, surely the results or answers to some of the questions asked of the youth concerning some of the areas above will be of great value.

The book is wholeheartedly recommended as having significance for all adults who have a leadership or counseling relationship with youth in the churches.

The book will not be as helpful to those who restrict their contact with youth aged 18-24 primarily.—*Carlton Carter*

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

The Christian Witness in an Industrial Society

Horst Symanowski (8w), \$3.75

The book, which was translated from German into English by George H. Kehm from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, presents three basic concepts. First, is the concept of "fellow humanity." The author uses this concept in attempting to define new forms of organization and new patterns of responsibility within the industrial world which will protect a man's humanity against the dehumanizing tendencies that have shown themselves in the system of industrial work.

Second, is the concept of neighborhood as a mode of Christ's presence in the world. The modern man may no longer ask Luther's question, "How can I find a gracious God?" but he still asks, "How can I find a gracious neighbor?"

Finally, there is the concept of the church as the community in which men being transformed personally and co-operatively into the "body of Christ" learn what it means to live together as human beings.

Although this book is not easy to read and most illustrations are of German origin, it contains much for the pastors and congregations who live and serve in American industrial communities.

This book is recommended not for its doctrinal content—because nonbaptistic doctrines are inferred—but for the important information it provides about the industrial community and its inhabitants.—*Charles W. Clark*

The Multiple Staff in the Local Church

Herman J. Sweet (8w), \$2.75

This is a superb book that faces up to daily problems of members of a multiple church staff. The author writes from a Presbyterian background, but his practical insights into the complexities of large Baptist church staffs are noteworthy.

With clarity he seeks to interpret the issues as well as to present approaches to better staff relationships. He presents practical help for calling additional staff members and for preparing the congregation for their coming.

The chapter on "Distaff" is unique and exceedingly profitable reading. He doesn't pull any punches as he discusses the women of the church—staff wives, secretaries, and directors of Christian education.

The book provides a most profitable excursion in reading.—*Howard B. Foshee*

The Congregation in Mission

George W. Webber (1a), \$3.50

The book begins with an examination of what is happening to people in an urban culture. Things which the church ought to see, to understand, and to take seriously in its witnessing and serving task are specified. It also deals with the significant failures and blindnesses of the present urban church life. Insights are presented into the cities': size and density, mobility of its people, housing, family life, education, employment, leisure, and racial tensions.

Specific examples of how urban churches are currently conducting Bible study and worship were presented. In these examples, several nonbaptistic doctrines are presented—doctrines with regard to communion and baptism

which are foreign to Baptists. The author also emphasizes unity in missions with other downtown churches. He does not, however, emphasize uniting all Protestant churches into one major Protestant denomination.

In spite of the nonbaptistic doctrines which are presented in this book, it includes some very important information which will be helpful to pastors and congregations of downtown churches especially.—*Charles W. Clark*

BIBLE STUDY

Christ and the Church

Dale Moody (1e), \$2.95

Here we have a scholarly exposition of the most profound book of the New Testament, Ephesians. The author shows that he is quite at home in the Greek language and deals with this epistle with keen insight. The central theme is God's purpose of the ages which is revealed in Christ and embodied in the church, the body of Christ. That purpose is to reconcile all things unto himself. Thus the church has great significance.

The important Greek words are so interpreted that those who know little Greek can grasp the sweep and profundity of the message. In this day when the church is being studied anew, both as to its nature and mission, and when diverse views are held, this book should prove to be of great value.—*Owen F. Herring*

The All-Sufficient Christ

William Barclay (8w), \$1.45

This brilliant and well-known author has produced the finest interpretation of Colossians I have seen. He fully justifies his claim that this is probably Paul's greatest letter. The all-sufficiency of Christ is shown both in the ancient world of Roman power and Greek thought and in our world today.

The description of the situation at Colossae to which Paul was writing is particularly good. There can be, he claims, no synthesis of world religions without discounting the complete adequacy of Christ, whether such amalgamation be in the ancient or the modern world. Paul's Christology is nowhere more exalted

and his portrayal of the qualities of the Christian life is never surpassed.

The style is popular, incisive, and scholarly. This volume will prove very useful to scholars, preachers, and teachers, as well as to all Christians.—*Owen F. Herring*

The Layman's Bible Commentary

Volume 23, Thessalonians, Timothy, Titus, Philemon

Edited by Balmer H. Kelly and Holmes Rolston (5k), \$2.00

This commentary summarizes the last six letters of Paul in the New Testament. In line with the title of the series, it is clearly written with the serious lay student of the Bible in mind. The discussion of the biblical text is at about the same level of difficulty as that in a good Sunday school lesson commentary. Three types of content stand out: background information about the meaning of the text in its original historical setting, summary, or explanation of the central doctrinal or ethical teaching, and interpretation to help Christians today see how this teaching applies to our own situation.

Though the treatment is always addressed to the reader without formal theological training, pastors, as well as laymen, will find this volume helpful. The author's viewpoint is definitely evangelical and conservative, and he develops his material on the basis of careful scholarship. In dealing with the eschatological sections of 1 and 2 Thessalonians, for example, he insists that the concept of Christ's return is important and valid for Christians today. At the same time, he steers clear of the extreme approach that looks for some detailed blueprint for the future in these and other New Testament passages. He recognizes the belief of many present-day scholars that the letters to Timothy and Titus were not written by Paul, but he presents a reasonable defense for his own view that they were. The author has succeeded in presenting the insights of biblical scholarship for any sincere Christian reader.—*Joseph F. Green, Jr.*

Holy Ground

Douglas M. White (66b), \$2.50

These expositions from the book of Exodus are simple and yet very scholarly. They are

interesting and very readable, reflecting a background of much study. The author is a genuine conservative, and all of the studies are written from this standpoint. He would not be classified as an extreme ultra-conservative, but is by no means a liberal. There are twelve chapters with about twelve pages each, tracing the life of Moses from the time he was taken "Out of the Water" to the last expository study dealing with him "In the Top of the Mount." There are a number of good poems which supplement the exposition and discussion.

The book describes the progress of Israel from the "lowest level of licentious Egypt to the highest heights of holy Sinai." The author has done an excellent job.—*Fred M. Wood*

Tradition and Interpretation in Matthew

Bornkamm, Barth, and Held (8w), \$6.50

Tradition and Interpretation in Matthew is an example of German biblical scholarship at its best. Its main objective is to demonstrate that the first evangelist was an interpreter as well as a transmitter of the Christian tradition. The authors' contention is that Matthew really added nothing new to the tradition he received but that he exegeted it, i.e., he elucidated what it contained. To see the way in which Matthew interpreted the Christian tradition is to understand more clearly *his* theological teaching; for example, his teaching of discipleship.

There can be no doubt that this book offers a valuable contribution to the field of New Testament studies, and more particularly to the discipline of form criticism. This is a highly technical work, and it assumes that its readers have a mastery of the Greek text. It would be of interest to the specialists in New Testament studies.—*Robert B. Barnes*

This book is an intellectual attempt to join ecclesiology and eschatology in the book of Matthew. Barth shows Matthew placing emphasis on the Love commandment as interpreted on the basis of the Torah. Held places emphasis on the miracles from Matthew. There is no denominational slant, according to the advertisement.

This book could be of some significance to advanced students, but it could not be recommended for general sales, as far as I am concerned.—*Millard B. Box*

All the Parables of the Bible

Herbert Lockyer (1z), \$4.95

This volume could well be described as an exhaustive compilation of comments on the events and the teachings of the Old and New Testament books which are construed to be parables. Quite incisively, the author defines a parable as a figurative event or verbiage which attempts to relate in human form the ineffable dimensions of divine reality. The work is largely devotional in value.—S. A. Newman

The Layman's Bible Commentary, Volume 4, Leviticus, Numbers

Edited by Balmer H. Kelly (5k), \$2.00

Written to impress Christian laymen with the value and importance of Bible study, the editor suggests that "the stories of Moses and of what happened in the wilderness are as important to us as Christians as the stories of the Pilgrims and the Revolutionary War are for us as Americans."

It is difficult to reduce the depth of this book to a few ideas in only 143 pages of comments, but the little book upholds the scriptural truths and would challenge the serious layman to further study.—Frank Halbeck

The Analyzed Bible

G. Campbell Morgan (6r), \$8.95

Few men have the ability of G. Campbell Morgan in the presentation of Scripture exposition. This book is unquestionably one of his greatest works. He deals with each book in an analytical fashion and presents the entire book in outline form with a biblical exposition which enriches the analytical approach.

The author of this book believes in the Bible as the written Word of God. He believes that the Bible has an answer to every need of life. He has produced in approximately four hundred pages a comprehensive study of the entire Bible which is unsurpassed and probably unequaled in the history of biblical exposition.

Many speakers and writers today either consciously or unconsciously borrow material from this "Prince of Bible expositors." This book will continue to be one of the best.—Fred M. Wood

Old Testament Light

George Lamsa (20p), \$8.95

This is an easily read commentary on Old Testament books. It is based on the Lamsa version of the Bible. It contains many insights which other commentaries omit. These insights are related to customs in the East and the meaning of Aramaic words. There is a strong devotional element in the commentary which makes it readable and spiritually enjoyable. The make-up of the commentary is that the authors have selected certain verses or groups of verses and given a title to the commentary material related to the verse or verses. Thus the book is not a verse-by-verse commentary but related devotional comments on selected verses.

It is a splendid book.—Fred M. Wood

Geographical Companion to the Bible

Denis Baly (6m), \$5.95

Mr. Baly makes a practical approach in helping the Bible student tie Scripture to the ground and to understand it in its proper setting. The first chapter seems to be an elaboration upon some of his earlier research. Chapter 2 yields attractive and informative maps for serious study of regions of Palestine. The chapter on "Camera and the Bible" is only a brief selection of photographs which do not necessarily illustrate geographical matters. The final chapter sets forth place names in the Bible, with brief comments.

It has been so long since anyone has done much in biblical geography that these works have come to us as a breath of fresh air from an ancient land. It is hoped, though, that they will serve as a stimulus for additional work and publication in this important adjunct to an informed interpretation of the Bible.—Marc Lovelace

SERMONS AND SERMON HELPS

John Doe, Disciple

Peter Marshall (6m), \$4.50

I'm not sure I understand what strange power or gift he possessed, but the name of Peter Marshall has had a magic ring for the past twenty years or so. The widow, now

remarried, of the Washington, D. C., Presbyterian preacher, presents here twelve of the more than six hundred complete manuscripts left by her gifted husband at the time of his death in 1949.

Dr. Marshall's voice was heavy with the burr of his native Scotland. He plunged promptly into the message of his sermon without the usual useless preliminaries that too many of us use. He seldom started with a text but quoted or read sufficient Scripture passages to give his earthy sermons a divine basis. His "stair-step" style of manuscript writing is unique and aided his presentation with its rapid change of pace and intriguing oral style. No visible outline gleams through these sermons, but the truth is clearly presented.

The title sermon, "John Doe, Disciple," is probably the best of this collection, but all of them offer good reading.—*Monroe Hopkins*

Expository Sermons on Revelation, Volume II

W. A. Criswell (1z), \$2.95

This book represents the preaching of a great preacher of the Word of God. The volume contains the sermons preached on the first chapter, along with a few texts in the second and third chapters of the Apocalypse.

This work does not pretend to answer all the questions one might have concerning the message of the Revelation, but does represent what the author considers a satisfactory eschatological position—premillennialism.

The reader will have the feeling that Dr. Criswell stands in awe before the unfolding of prophecy as it is written by the finger of God in this amazing book. Here is pre-millennial preaching with a lot of heart.—*John R. Cobb*

Christ Above All

Robert G. Lee (1z), \$2.50

Christ Above All is the title of a book of devotional messages. Dr. Lee, the master preacher, maintains his usual high level of excellent preaching in this book. He gives the Lord Jesus supreme place in these messages.

No words of man can adequately set forth the Lord in all his glory and grace. However, Dr. Lee has done a wonderful job in this book.

I predict that all who read it will be blessed and inspired by the word pictures that have been painted here.

All preachers will find inspiration for many sermons from these rich pages.—*Kenneth A. Chapman*

New Park Street Pulpit

Volume I, Charles H. Spurgeon (1z), \$4.95

This book consists of fifty-three sermons by Charles Spurgeon as they were preached by him in the New Park Street Pulpit. Thus the title of the book is the same. They were recorded in shorthand and, as far as literary compositions are concerned, indeed are faulty because of little or no editing. The reproductions as printed in this book are in small type and thus not easily read. However, the sermons are typically Spurgeon, and those who take time to read them will be blessed by the content.—*Millard B. Box*

Messages on Stewardship

Compilation (66b), \$2.95

This book is a compilation of sermons by eleven Southern Baptist pastors and denominational leaders. The messages are largely inspirational and devotional in nature, and as such do not pretend to make any great contribution to the subject of stewardship as a doctrine.

Most of them have an abundance of good illustrations and quotations. The best message is the one by H. Leo Eddleman, president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. The one by missions Professor Cal Guy of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary is also commendable. Other contributors include H. I. Hester, K. Owen White, J. Ralph Grant, Herschel Hobbs, etc.—*Robert J. Hastings*

Prophetic Preaching

Roland Q. Leavell (66b), \$2.25

Dr. Leavell, in his characteristically eloquent way, has struck at the most urgent need in the pulpit today, prophetic preaching. Essentially he defined prophetic preaching as a message from God, "Thus saith the Lord." Dr. Leavell said: "There is no time for drivel when people are confused and frustrated and lost." The author makes a strong plea for preachers to commit themselves to preaching the Word of God and to stand courageously and fearlessly as prophets of God. He said: "A prophetic ministry is not the place for occasional tourists."

Dr. Leavell dealt with the problems of the prophet and his relationship to God. He covered the major themes of prophetic preaching. He used the preaching of the Old Testament prophets, Jesus, Paul, and others to illustrate vividly how the preacher must deal with the great issues of life.

These messages came from the heart of a prophet and are not just idle words. Years ago when he was a pastor, Dr. Leavell, without fear or hesitation, confronted his church and community with their moral responsibility when a man had been lynched by a mob; therefore, he can speak out of experience when warning of the perils of prophetic preaching. This, in a sense, is Dr. Leavell's last clear call to the young minister to be willing to pay the price of a prophetic ministry.—*Billy P. Smith*

Preaching Through the Bible

Eric W. Hayden (1z), \$3.95

This book is a "pearl of great price." Its content is excellent; its literary style is splendid. The idea of preaching through the Bible as the author suggests is a fine one. Already my own mind reels with the possibilities of using this book, another by Campbell Morgan, and other sources and entering into a sixty-six week program of giving to my people the essence of each of the books of the Bible.

I particularly like the way the author lists the theme, key verse, etc. at the beginning of each chapter. I predict that this book will find a ready market. It is not, happily so, a complex work of scholarship. He takes us to the "meat" of the matter and leaves the detail to the student.—*Andrew M. Hall*

Teaching and Preaching the New Testament

Archibald M. Hunter (8w), \$3.75

This is a collection of essays, sermons, and theological studies.

Part one includes seven essays on differing subjects—mostly concerned with critical problems. Two of them concern the interpretation of the parables, and recent trends in Johannine studies. Part two is a group of sermons. This is the most delightful part of the book. Some titles are "What is Christianity?" "The Unfading Victory," "Recall to Fundamentals," "The Holy Fire," and "The Secret of Fortitude."

Concluding, part three is an analysis of the theology of Peter Forsyth. In brief, the author feels that Forsyth is anti-rationalist and Christo-centric. Hunter calls Forsyth's greatest work *The Person and Place of Jesus Christ*.

The entire volume is readable, inspiring, well documented, and a great help to the pastor and student.—*Paul Brooks Leath*

Power to Master Life

William M. Elliott Jr. (1a), \$2.50

These are the kind of sermons you would like for some people you know to hear. They certainly do need them. And the reader needs them. They will intrigue him.

The book of Philippians is the basis for this series of sermons that seem to be made to be read rather than listened to. They are full of remarkable insights regarding such things as ways of having a radiant, joyful Christian life.

The author has the ability to make well-known Bible verses shine with a new light. Someone has said, "Genius is a fresh pair of eyes." If so, Elliott is a genius. His sermon on "Turning Our Troubles into Blessings" is tremendous.

After you pass the first sermon, a little slow and historic, you come to so many good, short, pithy expositions of verses and sections of Philippians that you feel that each, as you read it, is the best. Occasionally the author directs questions to his reader. This is disconcerting but interesting.

Minor faults are few, such as the somewhat forced dragging in of ecumenicity in one sermon, and the abrupt ending of two or three. But no one can be perfect. This volume is filled with good sense, and delightful applications of Christian living and witness.—*W. B. Timberlake*

Preaching Values from the Papyri

Herschel H. Hobbs (66b), \$2.95

The discovery of the Greek Papyri, containing such common items as census records, birth and death notices, bills, and legal decrees of one kind and another, was of genuine significance in understanding the New Testament. Careful research has revealed that fewer than fifty words occur in the New Testament which cannot be found in the Papyri.

Herschel H. Hobbs has done New Testament exposition and biblical preaching a great service in this study of thirty-five words common to the Papyri and the New Testament. While written by a Greek scholar, the book's style is such that it can be of maximum service to one not versed in Greek. The preacher will find it fruitful for sermon starters and for creative study.—*Gordon Clinard*

Revival Sermons and Outlines

Jowett, Meyer, and Others (66b), \$1.95

This is an excellent compilation of revival sermons and outlines from preachers such as F. B. Meyer, Charles H. Spurgeon, Charles Simeon, Jabez Burns, Alexander MacLaren, Frederick W. Farrar, and Charles Hodge. These masters of evangelistic preaching and their messages serve as a pattern for the preacher of today because their messages are timely and appropriate for any age. Their true value will be seen, not as a sermon "supply" for the too-busy preacher, but as a stimulant to effective preparation.—*Clifford R. Lyon*

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Westminster Dictionary of Christian Education

Edited by Kendig Brubaker Cully (8w), \$6.00

Baptist readers will obtain some values from this pretentious book, but should be warned that the benefits will be minimal. Tested at many points, it fails to furnish information on essential subjects within its sphere of reference. Its main trends are liberal, ecumenical, and sacramental; reflecting, no doubt, the viewpoint of its compiler, a Congregationalist turned Episcopalian. Baptists—and Southern Baptists in particular—are almost entirely ignored. The extensive bibliographies, for example, contain only one identified Southern Baptist writer in the field of Christian (religious) education.—*Donald F. Ackland*

Facing Adult Problems in Christian Education

Helen Khoobyar (8w), \$2.95

Helen Khoobyar presents, in a logical manner, problems which adults face today. She grouped them under the headings of "Questions Adults Ask" and "Barriers to Faith."

She then gives the purpose of Christian adult education and suggestions to be used by the church. The epilogue reminds us that even if the adult is known as one who is set in his ways, he is still the creature God created in his image. There is hope for life changes if we interpret our Christian faith convincingly. I recommend this book to workers with adults.—*Doris Cutter*

The Holy Spirit in Your Teaching

Roy Zuck (50s), \$3.95

This well-written book was authored by a conservative Bible scholar schooled in Dallas Theological Seminary. It is an interesting, convincing demonstration of "the need for the ministry of the Holy Spirit in Christian education," and a thorough, informative discussion of "how the Spirit works in the various phases of the teaching-learning process."

Major areas of study include the doctrine of the Holy Spirit as teacher, and his relation to teachers today, to the Bible, and to the teaching-learning process. The study is designed for "teachers and other Christian workers," particularly Sunday school teachers. It is written in clear style with logical development and noticeable coherence by an author who is well acquainted with the Bible and the fields of religion and education.

Though there are many books on the Holy Spirit, this one is distinctive in its almost exclusive emphasis on the Spirit's teaching ministry and teachers today. Objectionable features are minor and sparse: the conservative author's somewhat unkind, unnecessary criticisms of "liberal religious educators"; discussions of "liberal" viewpoints which may be confusing; and the not especially helpful historical section. Yet these are overshadowed by the high practical value of the book. It would be usable and profitable for any church group.—*D. C. Martin*

Christian Education in the Home

Alta Mae Erb (33h), \$2.50

This is a book for Christian parents. The author's basic viewpoint is that Christian education is involved mainly with building right relationships. These relationships have to do with God, Christ, the Bible, the church, oneself, and others. It is assumed that the home is of crucial importance in building these relationships.

The plan of the book is to devote a chapter to each of the areas of relationship noted above. The chapter indicates the kinds of outcomes parents ought to be seeking and suggests the kinds of attitudes and activities in the home that foster the kinds of learning desired.

The book is theologically sound and the teaching suggestions are helpful and practical. —*Ellis M. Bush*

EVANGELISM AND STEWARDSHIP

Soul-Winning Evangelism

J. E. Conant (1z), \$2.95

This is a handbook for the study of evangelism—its theology, dynamics, and application. The author is a dispensationalist and believes this is the proper concept for an understanding of the Bible. He teaches a universal invisible "church." He defines baptism as "place into" or "introduce into." He says Colossians 2:12 means Holy Spirit baptism.

He insists on a "once-for-all transaction" that permits the Spirit to take over the control of the individual, wholly. "Until this takes place, we are carnal Christians."

Love is the "miracle gift" of God, manifested by eight graces listed in Galatians 5:22. Many sensual gifts or manifestations are satanic. "The evidence of spiritual reality cannot be communicated to us through our nervous systems" (p. 28). Without love, all sign-gifts are worthless (1 Cor. 12-14).

According to the author, until the worker is familiar with the meaning of grace and experiences grace, he is not equipped to be a soul-winner. "The reason so many unsaved people get into our churches is because of the terrible lack of thorough work in attempting to bring them to decision. One great purpose of this book of studies is to help drive out this tragically slipshod work from our churches . . ." (pp. 94-95).

The last section of this book is a splendid presentation of an imaginary conversation with a woman who needs to know the Saviour. The Scripture verses used and the method of approach could well be used as a series of messages to Christians—especially Sunday school workers or to all church members in preparation for evangelistic work.—*Roy L. Johnson*

Deeper Life for You

C. Wade Freeman (1z), \$2.50

In this book, written by the greatest state secretary of evangelism in the Southern Baptist Convention, are presented ten sermons designed to lead Christian readers into a deeper spiritual experience.

Beginning with a discussion of the freedom and fullness of the grace of God in salvation and transformation, the reader is led to understand the price of discipleship, the responsibilities of stewardship, the danger of a misused tongue, the temptation to "bottle" the cross, the growth of the Christian experience, the curse of neglected opportunities, the cure for honest doubt, the necessity of walking in a Christlike manner, and the cure of misplaced faith.

Some of the most unique and original illustrations and interpretations are contained in these messages.

This is an excellent book for use both in conserving the results of evangelism and in presenting the gospel message to the seeker.

Evangelism in the Acts

C. E. Autrey (1z), \$2.50

Utilizing very short and pointed sentences, the author gains and holds the attention of the reader with his recurrent theme that a church or an individual must be an evangel or die. The acts of the early church reveal such a truth over and over as pointed out by the author. Dr. Autrey brings to light the working concept of evangelism and the necessity of it or the ultimate self-destruction of the Christian faith. This is his adaptation of apostolic evangelism to the twentieth century. We must utilize the four characteristics of apostolic evangelism: (1) expansion of churches, (2) effectiveness of personal evangelism, (3) calling upon divine power, and (4) using our modern ingenuity to overcome any hindrance. There is no need for apology in the Christian witness, and we must go where the people are rather than hoping they will come to us through revival meetings and the like.

Basically, Dr. Autrey has not presented anything new but has presented the basic truths of the biblical account of evangelism in Acts in a new and concise manner. Perhaps those who read this book will understand short sentences and not be bogged down in theologi-

cal runarounds or long and supposedly profound sentences. I totally agree with Dr. Autrey when he says, "There is absolutely no way to apply apostolic Christianity without these principles."—Robert L. Armistead

God's Stewards

Helge Brattgard (19a), \$4.50

The author is one of Europe's foremost authors on stewardship. A Lutheran, he is a frequent lecturer on stewardship and related subjects in Europe and America. *God's Stewards* sets forth the theological principals and practices of stewardship as seen by the author.

He traces the historical background of the stewardship idea and gives a strong biblical analysis. Stewardship includes not only the gifts of creation, but also spiritual gifts included in the gospel itself. Here is a concise answer to what is meant by a steward and his stewardship in the Bible.

Brattgard sees it as more than raising money and bringing people into the church, but as a matter of total dimension, as a way of life. Many practical suggestions are made for the teaching of Christian stewardship in the services.—W. E. Grindstaff

BAPTIST HERITAGE

The Baptist Way of Life

Brooks Hays and John E. Steely (20p), \$3.95

Here we have a fresh approach to an old subject, namely, the position and place of Baptists in the world community of religions, and the Baptist genius as a "way of life." The authors treat their subject under four major divisions: Who Are the Baptists? The Baptist Understanding of the Christian Way; How Baptists Do Their Work; and Baptist Contributions to the Christian World. The various chapters deal with such themes as Baptist beginnings, growth, frontier life, conversion, prayer, worship, the ordinances, ethics, social responsibility, congregational government, a typical order of worship, the larger fellowship, evangelism, education, missions, theology, controversies, hymnody, and religious liberty. Obviously, each discussion is neces-

sarily brief in scope and fulness, by reason of space limitations.

It is basically an effort to interpret the Baptist mind to any inquiring student. Portions of the book will appear trite to some, but it should serve well its purpose: to introduce the uninitiated to the Baptist concept.—H. H. Harwell

Man in God's World

Helmut Thielicke (9h), \$3.95

This is a helpful book. It has purpose. It is dedicated to the meeting of a problem.

The problem is clear and current. It will not go away. It must be faced. It is the exceedingly explosive issue between scientific discovery and biblical revelation.

This respected theologian-educator has approached his task knowingly and reverently. He reflects a becoming balance between courage and humility. He has reconciled the differences, for example, between cosmology and Scripture with the happy result of a strengthened and more articulate faith and message.

Actually, he insists that our choice is not between Scripture and science, as such, but between *biblical cosmology* and *scientific cosmology*. From this type of thesis he proceeds to discuss such pertinent topics as creation, miracle, providence, demons, and predestination.

He observes that much of our dogmatism abides at the cost of truth, persistently "ignoring the assured results of scientific research. Old ladies may be willing to wear blinders. . . but nobody who has even small knowledge of what is going on can do this."

Christian leaders in general and Southern Baptists in particular must eventually face up to these issues. We may delay—but face them we must. The longer we delay, the longer our witness and our fellowship will be handicapped by the kind of tensions and suspicions that have "rocked our boat" almost to its overturning during the past two Convention years.—J. T. Ford

A Way Home

James Saxon Childers (20h), \$3.95

A Southern publisher, James Saxon Childers, has put together a book on the Baptists in America, one of several he apparently intends

to edit or produce on denominations. He wanted a book, Childers says, "that would tell, briefly and in an interesting way, something about their (the Baptists') history, about what they do in community service, and about what they believe. About one-third of the Protestants in the United States are Baptists, and many of them are not aware of their history . . . not quite sure of just what Baptists believe."

To achieve his goal, Childers turned to leaders of the American Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention, to Negro Baptists and white Baptists, to pastors, historians, educators, and laymen for individual chapters. The roster of chapter writers reads like a small "Who's Who Among Baptists in America." The very variety of writers, while occasionally resulting in a weakly written chapter, probably adds strength, since it keeps the book from letting a single author seem to speak for all Baptists as their voice of authority—something the book is careful to point out is not characteristic of Baptists. The repetition in different chapters itself helps point out how Baptists see alike, and the difference of viewpoint illustrates their diversity. It is interesting that this book, perhaps accidentally, has come out in 1964, the 150th anniversary year for Baptists' organized fellowship in North America.—*Theo Sommerkamp*

Champion of Liberty

Norman E. Nygaard (1z), \$2.50

Those persons wanting to learn more of our Baptist heritage will appreciate this book. It is a well-written biographical novel of the most important of the Early New England Baptists. Important personages in both England and the New World are worked into the novel so as to throw light on both their character and times.

Of special importance to Baptists is the interpretation given by the writer of Roger Williams' growing awareness of importance of religious liberty. His banishment from Boston and his establishment of Providence, including all the problems of a diverse people, are vivid pictures.

This work is well worth the \$2.50 price and is especially important during this Baptist Jubilee Year. I recommend it highly for the shelves of our church libraries.—*George M. Horton*

WORLD ISSUES

The Supreme Court and Prayer in the Public School

J. Marcellus Kik (41p), \$.75

This monograph is an extremely biased view against the recent ruling of the Supreme Court. The author is a Presbyterian who obviously dislikes the American principle of separation of church and state and who has no stomach for our Baptist insights at this point.

The little booklet sounds essentially the same line of the Roman Catholic hierarchy; namely, that the Supreme Court is responsible for leading the nation into secularism—a notion that is not grounded in fact.

The author served for twenty years in Canada, and his views on church and state are essentially European. Most Baptists will find this booklet unpalatable.—*Foy Valentine*

Communism and the Theologians

Charles C. West (9m), \$1.95

Communism and the Theologians deals with the response of five of the world's leading Christian theologians as they encounter a virile communism. The theologians are Hromadka of Czechoslovakia, Tillich of Germany and the United States, Berdyaev of Russia, Reinhold Niebuhr of the United States, and Barth of Switzerland.

The author, of Presbyterian, U. S. A., background, analyzes what each theologian offers the Christian who day by day comes to grips with communism. He searches for what each theologian provides for helping the Christian guide the Communist back to reality. This is a stimulating book for Baptist leaders versed in and interested in a theology for living in today's world.—*Rice A. Pierce*

Christianity On the March

Edited by Henry P. Van Dusen (9h), \$4.00

This book consists of four lectures in the "January Monday Morning Lecture Series," sponsored by the Women's Committee of Union Theological Seminary, New York City, and three essays. The lectures deal with four

significant periods in Christian history and the essays present seven modern forces which confront Christianity.

The first lecture discusses the beginning of Christianity in which it struggled successfully with the Roman Empire, Greek and Roman philosophies, mystery religions, and asceticism.

The second lecture shows how the control of the church over practically all thought—economic, political, social—was rejected in the Protestant Reformation and replaced by the authority of the Bible. The effects were: (1) the Scriptures were recognized as the norm and source of the Christian life, (2) ceremonialism was rejected, (3) the Christian was seen as a person of faith, and (4) religion must be carried out in life.

The third lecture deals with Christianity's forward movement with expanding frontiers, its reactions to science, the World Missionary Conference of 1910, the theological revival, the role of the laity, the liturgical revival, the maturing of the mission churches, and the deepened faith of Christians who have lived under hostile dictatorships.

The fourth lecture is concerned with the modern ecumenical movement. It describes a typical Christian center as a hospital, a school, and a church. There is optimism reflected in it.

The three essays deal with Christianity in confrontation with Hinduism, Islam, Buddhism, National Religions, Communism, Secularist Humanism, and Stoic Existentialism.—*J. M. Crowe*

The Responsible Self

H. Richard Niebuhr (9h), \$3.50

This volume is the finest contribution of a dedicated Christian scholar. The book is based on lectures delivered by the author at Glasgow University and the Earl Lectures at the Pacific School of Religion, as well as a series of addresses from other places. It was posthumously published with an introduction by a colleague of Yale Divinity School.

The author uses the scalpel of a dedicated critic in setting forth his case to the solution of the moral and ethical problems of our day. This is no book that can be superficially read, but the reader will be well repaid for the study of this penetrating work which emphasizes the importance of the Christian faith to build a finer and better world for believer and unbeliever alike.—*Carl J. Giers*

Man Reaches Out to God

Herbert C. Jackson (2j), \$1.75

Here is a book dealing with the Christian approach to the non-Christian religions written for thoughtful Christians, whether clergy or laymen. Dr. Jackson, former missionary to India, former professor at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and now director of the Missionary Research Library, New York City, has distilled for us many years of study and confrontation with other religions of the world in a way that can profit the average reader.

One chapter treats the fundamental religious nature of man; and subsequent chapters deal with animism, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, and Hinduism. The author does not attempt to survey the whole field of each, which obviously he could not do in a small paperback, but his analyses are incisive. This book will help those who know little or nothing about other religions to have helpful information, as well as provide a distinctive Christian witness to them in missions.—*Victor E. Mantiply*

The Thunder of Bare Feet

J. Wallace Hamilton (6r), \$2.95

The Thunder of Bare Feet is one of the freshest works in print on the trends of modern society. In many places the facts given are quite alarming yet sobering.

Every child of God should read this book, both for its thought stimulation and information.

Twelve chapters cover the racial, political, and religious revolution now going on in every section of our world: "The Big House on the Hill," "Bare Feet in the Palace," "The Great Compulsion," "The Christian Revelation and Revolution," "Does Christianity Have a Chance?" "Beyond the Halfway Place," "The Man on the Watchtower," "What Is Communism Doing for Us?" "The Religion of Our Enemies," "The Battle for the Free Mind," "The Power Is in the Yes," and "The Anatomy of a Rebel."—*J. F. Brewer*

How to Deal with Roman Catholics

Max Stilson (1z), 60 cents

How to Deal with Roman Catholics is a short, easy-to-read presentation of the basic

steps in winning Catholics to Christ. All Christians should study this book by Max Stilson. The author has given a sane and sensible approach to the Catholic Church. Its origin is discussed, and the bloody history is traced through the centuries.

The author firmly states that the evils of the Catholic Church should be kept in the background while talking with a Catholic about becoming a Christian. The approach should be made in love. The doctrines, dogmas, and creeds are explained so the worker may know the background of the one to be led to Christ. The book answers all the major questions that might arise. These answers have biblical references for further study.

Every Christian worker should have this writing in his personal library.—*C. Winfield Rich*

Church and State

J. Marcellus Kik (5n), \$3.75

In twelve chapters the author gives a very outstanding history of the long church-state struggle. His account goes back into biblical times to show the background of the relationships between the state and churches.

Chapter eleven deals with the subject, "The Wall of Separation," which is a prime expression regarding church-state relations. Mr. Kik explains in this chapter that there are many groups active in this vital discussion. One group desires to separate government from religion . . . that is, for government not to show any Christian signs in any of its dealings. The final chapter deals with the foes of church-state separation. He mentions that even today there are areas of violation of the principle of church and state separation. Such example is cited in the National Defense Education Act of 1958, which has allowed fellowships to be awarded to many religious programs.

With this year giving so much needed stress to our Baptist heritage, it may be helpful to study this book in such evaluation of our freedom.—*Charles F. Sexton*

Race: Challenge to Religion

Mathew Ahmann (44r), paper, \$1.65; cloth, \$4.95

This book is a compilation of addresses from the National Conference on Religion and Race held in Chicago in January, 1963. The

essays are from extremely varied backgrounds ranging from Abraham Herschel, a renowned Hebrew scholar, through Martin Luther King and Albert Cardinal Meyer, archbishop of Chicago, to R. Sargent Shriver. It is natural that this volume would be somewhat uneven in quality.

Baptists will find the chapters by Will D. Campbell, trained at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and fellow-Baptist Martin Luther King particularly interesting. The book is billed as "an appeal to the American people," and it is valuable in that connection. Although it is certainly not written with specific Southern Baptist needs in mind, it will be helpful to those who want to move forward for Christ in the area of race relations.—*Foy Valentine*

Drinking: A Christian Position

Arnold B. Come (8w), \$1.25

This is a thoughtful and penetrating book on a difficult subject: "Should a Christian Drink?" The author says that two thirds of the Christians in America drink, that it is foolish to assume that abstinence should be made a test of Christianity when the facts are as they are. There are many good things in the book, but the premise of the book is wrong, in my opinion. There are many statements to which the abstaining Christian will take exception. Nevertheless, the author is to be commended for attempting a book on what is admittedly a sensitive question.—*C. Aubrey Hearn*

Gift-giving is almost synonymous with living and has to do with interpersonal relationships that exist between those who give and those who receive. There is a joy of giving, as there is a joy of receiving.

Dr. Tournier, a consecrated Christian physician, presents a very meaningful concept of giving in his recent book *The Meaning of Gifts*. His entire thesis is summed up in a discussion of God's gift of Christ to the world. "The great gift, the unique and living one, is not a *thing* but a *person*."

Images of Faith

Edited by Wendell Mathews and Robert Wetzler (21c), \$4.95

This is an amazing book! The content will make a distinctive contribution to the life of the reader; for here will be found a searching, provocative collection of illustrations of the Christian faith by contemporary Christian thinkers. Many personal experiences are related in these brief discussions written by over seventy contributors. Many have quoted also from others their equally effective experiences. The reader realizes that his faith must be the kind "which goes far beyond the verbal testimony and (which) leads the confessing Christian to put his life in Christ's hands." Thus does Harold H. Lentz express his view of real faith.

Elmer S. Hjortland jerks us up to our responsibility when he writes: "God has made us, if Christ is in our hearts, so that we feel uncomfortable until we begin working toward making this world a decent place in which to live." Here are 272 pages of thoughts that cause the reader to take stock of his life and to resolve to seek to follow more nearly the plan Christ has for it. Under two main divisions, *Images of Faith* is divided: (1) "Man Seeks Meaning, and (2) "God Seeks Man." Under these are myriad testimonies by those who have experienced active faith and are thereby living by it.

Highly recommended. This will be a valuable reference book for program builders, researchers on the subject of faith, and for the general reader who is looking for worthwhile reading.—*Florida Waite*

Hubert A. Elliott (13g), \$3.95

The Bible continues to be an inexhaustible source of riches for the mind and spirit of man. People of many faiths, and even some of no faith, continue to find inspiration, comfort, intellectual challenge, and great literature in it.

The editor of this volume has assembled choice verses and passages of Scripture from men and women from all walks of life which have been a source of guidance and

strength throughout their lives. The opening chapter is a gem in which a leading minister in Honolulu stresses the importance of the family altar in the home. Twice a day his father and mother would gather their seven children for family prayers. This practice greatly influenced his life.

Expressions of appreciation of Scriptures from such well-known individuals as Colonel John H. Glenn, Jr., Harvey S. Firestone, Dr. Billy Graham, Dr. Georgia Harkness, Dale and Roy Rogers, and a score of others, give a wide range of personal attitudes of the most beloved book in the world.

In addition to the statements from each person, there is a pen sketch and a brief biographical statement which brings the individual right into the home of the reader. Marion Flood French (1a), \$2.00

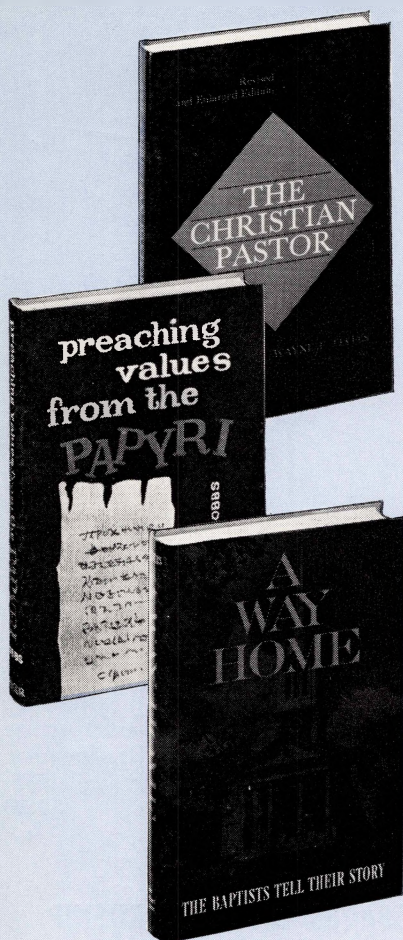
