The Board has at different stations six printing presses in operation, which during the past year have been supplied with 25,000 rams of type, and more than 700,000 pages—about 1,000,000 more, he believed, than any other missionary body in the United States, and probably the largest in the world. Success has been secured in the field of the Board, the spirit of inquiry is abroad in every land, and the work is going on with a rapidity and success which is truly wonderful.
