TO THE PUBLIC.

In sending forth the first number of a new publication, the author can not think it necessary to make the usual apology. To do good is never out of season. Such is the design of this work. Although "not making books that are no good," yet the present work will neither be without nor superfluous. As it will be no invidious identification of any name, status, or denomination, it is sent forth without the usual information respecting the Jewish nation, religious history, and manners, besides the contained in the Bible, is necessary to a proper and useful understanding of the sacred Scriptures.
