You will see that much of the time of the House to-day, was employed in the election of a Chaplain. There were many competitors for the office, but being no pretensions, as well as honor and trust. It appears from good authority, that we are to be favored with a visit from Santa Anna. The story here is, that Gen. Houston, after the Convention of the 10th inst., and the proposition for the liberation of Santa Anna by a vote of 21 to 5, did effect his liberation upon the following terms, viz: a promise to pay the cost of his private fortune one hundred thousand dollars to General Houston; he promises to pay eight hundred thousand dollars to the Government, and his assurance to our government of the inability of Texas to continue the war, and of his determination to cause the independence of Texas to be recognized by Mexico immediately on his return. There is no doubt that the Captain General would have acceded to any other terms as well as these, inasmuch as they involve nothing but his promise. His opinions will have no more effect upon our government than will the menace, thrown out by the Committee of Foreign Affairs, in the Text an Senate, of an alliance with England, provided we do not admit Texas into the Union by the 4th of March next.

GOOD NEWS FOR TEXAS.

SAUL LOUIS, Mex. Nov. 23. About ten days ago, Gen. Brown left for Texas, with three thousand men, part in Matamoros, the whole force, and you are to understand that the men are all the awesping of the jails and raw-corded in the streets to prevent their escape, and yet in spite of all the care taken of them, upwards of seven hundred have escaped from the hold of San Antonio. I have been a letter from General C. who says that the poor wretches have included in the list of those who were to be executed of the clerical party, who insisted on the expedition, and who completely govern poor Carrero. The latest accounts from the city of Mexico represent things in a very low state. The President exists to be as it were, devoted to the death by the hands of the people.
