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#### MEET THE PROFESSOR

Dr. R. T. Daniel: Dr. Daniel has an enviable record of experience and education. A Georgian by birth, he has an A.B. from Mercer, Th.M. and Th.D. from Southwestern, an M. A. from Texas Christian and had done post-graduate study in Furman University, University of North Carolina and Garrett Bible Institute. He pastored churches near Asheville, Ridgecrest, North Carolina and Italy, Texas. He taught in the public schools before entering Southwestern Seminary. From 1935-1952 he taught in the Old Testament Department, first as instructor, then as associate and later as head of the Department.

Last September he began his work as professor of Old Testament in Southeastern Seminary. The first half of Old Testament 121 was written by Dr. Daniel and he's in the process of writing another study on the book of Isaiah for the Extension Department.

#### DIRECTOR'S TRAVELS

Last December the director attended the Inter-Seminary Conference in Nashville. The Commission met before and after the Conference but the director had to sit on the side line with the flu while the Conference and the second session of the Commission was being held.

As it was mentioned last month,

Golden Gate and Southeastern joined the Commission, Dr. Jack Manning representing Golden Gate and Dr. Stewart A. Newman representing Southeastern. Dr. Newman was elected permanent chairman of the Commission.

During the second week in January the director went to North Carolina and Florida. He attended the opening of the Murphy Center in North Carolina and the Jacksonville Center in Florida. The impressions gained in both these meetings were helpful. The encouraging thing was the hunger for God's word and the spirit of brotherhood, both on the part of the students and the teachers. No finer work for the Lord is being done than that of the teachers in our Extension Centers.

Some testimonials from Murphy are given below which indicate the spirit of the school.

Rev. W. A. Cloer of Hayesville: "I preached twelve or thirteen years before I had this opportunity but I know that with the short time I have attended the center, I am better prepared to lead my people. I also understand my pastor brethren better."

W. L. Sarles who travels sixty five miles each way each week, is pastor of the full-time Baptist Church at Iotla. His church took all the honors in the Training Union elimination contests at the district meetings. His is the first full time church in the

association, first church with a unified budget, first with rotating board of deacons. He states, "The fact that we have time enough to assimilate what we learn and use it is one of the greatest values I see in the Extension Center."

We failed to meet Brother C. C. Welch who travels 110 miles each way each week. This speaks for itself.

Rev. J. E. Cagle is pastor of the church in the community where Dr. George Truett lived. He lives in the Truett home, has been preaching 17 years and now has three churches. He states, "This work has opened fields of thought for preaching I never knew existed. My education is limited but I accept this as a challenge. My wife and my folk all say that it has helped my preaching."

Rev. A. G. Brooks, one of the teachers and director, also associational missionary, overheard Brother Cagle's remarks. He turned to us and said, "My wife said the same about my preaching after I had been teaching. She said that it has improved." All the associational missionaries said in substance what Miss Dorothy Edwards, missionary of the Tennessee River Association said, "The Seminary Extension has proved a blessing to the pastors in my association. They have received a greater vision of the world program of Christ and they return to their churches with a greater zeal to preach the true word of God and to win the lost to Him."

After leaving Murphy the director spent a day on Southeastern campus. Out of his visit some new courses will develop. He found the whole faculty enthusiastic over the extension program.

On Thursday he attended the Evangelistic Conference in Jacksonville and met several representatives of the Florida centers. Friday evening he spoke to the group at the opening session of the

second semester in Jacksonville.

#### NOTES

The Springfield Baptist Church, Jacksonville, Florida purchased a building for the extension center. This will become another unit in their growing program.

The Panama City Center wrote letters to the churches asking them to send their pastors and pay their tuition.

The Murphy Center has begun a library. Donations are coming in from several sources in books and money. The Treasurer received gifts this year from some who wanted to help pastors who might not come for lack of finance.

The State Board of North Carolina Baptist Convention has given aid to several centers.

Jacksonville Center meets Monday and Friday evenings; Tulsa has morning sessions once a week and an evening session once a week.
