What Are We Drifting? About two years ago I wrote a series of articles under the above heading for the *Secular Press*, and afterwards considering such sentiment therein expressed, I have nothing to take back. And to-day, if I could ask the question which stands at the head of this, so loud as to startle every citizen of the United States as the hearing of a volcano beneath their feet would startle them, I would ask it. It seems that nothing will come of this. Judges are not any more as if they were angels, and their judgments are based on the expense of the people who have been robbed of their sacred rights by their foul acts. And what have the people said regarding these things? Simply nothing. A few individuals have spoken out, and thus cleared their skirts of the murders which stand out to-day as the foulest blot on the civilization of the country. The history records, Arnold's head, and the patriotisms personified in comparison with these hideous crimes, and yet there has not been a single meeting held in the Commonwealth where the crimes were committed condemning them to the infamy they deserve—not a meeting of the people condemning the deeper infamy of clearing the guilty in the presence of the nation. The people have been held, the people have seen, the people have heard, the people have disowned the acts, at least, but in the absence of such meetings, the Commonwealth stands convicted before God and the civilized world of these murders, and the blacker crime of clearing the guilty parties.

Thus we are drifting from bad to worse. Can it be that the people will never do anything to check this drifting on? The nation has seen another fearful leap in the downward course has been taken, in the designed murder of the President. And what have the people done? Why, verily, they have told Mrs. Garfield that they sympathize with her, and that they are going to pray for her husband, and that Mr. Guiteau is insane, a madman, etc., and then the means of all who have promised to do this have been seen. These same idiots have no words, no acts, no words, no acts, no words. Well, what should the people do in the present crisis of affairs? I say they should hold meetings in every county in every State and demand the immediate execution of Guiteau. All writers on moral science tell us that the moral quality of an action lies in its design. The design was to murder Garfield, therefore Guiteau is guilty of murder, and therefore ought to die. It is as easy to make out every case of insanity, than hang him for being insane. The devil can't make a man insane without his consent, and that in his sane moments, and hence the insane murderer is as culpable as the sane. Our senseless course in clearing the guilty on the plea of insanity is but inviting murder. It is easy to play the madman, and equally as easy to prove a murderer crazy. If the people of these States intend to allow

this plea in their criminal courts there will never be another judicial hanging in this country, except it be one who is too idiotic to put in the plea. And now I close as I began, "Whither are we drifting?"
